Mrs Rona McCarthy, a familiar figure to many Hastings netballers, has called it quits after 36 years as coach of the Convent Old Girls team.

Although she retired at the start of the netball season three weeks ago, Mrs McCarthy is still keeping a close eye on the team.

"My heart is still there-you can't give it up when it's in

your blood," she said.

Mrs McCarthy, formerly Rona Tong, began playing netball at school and was a member of the Hastings West End team for some years before being asked to coach Convent Old Girls.

She was a player-coach for the team for a "long time" before concentrating on coaching.

A Hawke's Bay representative player for eight years, she was twice chosen for the North Island team. She was also selected to play

for New Zealand in 1937, but the team's proposed tour was cancelled. Many COG players have

gone into representative teams, and in 1940 they won every competition from Hastings to Poverty Bay. Netballers today lacked the dedication that existed in the

past, said Mrs McCarthy. "It's nothing for a girl to pick up the phone and say she can't make it to practice, with-

out giving a reason." She is a life member of the Hastings and Hawke's Bay netball associations and has a

service award from the New Zealand association. Mrs McCarthy, as an athlete, held the New Zealand 80metres hurdles title for some years and gained a bronze medal in this race at the Bri-

tish Empire Games in 1938.
