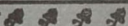

General Regulations.

ENTRIES.

1. All entries must be made with the Secretary on or before Wednesday, the 17th March, unless otherwise specified.
2. Entries are to be made in writing, or on the printed forms, which can be obtained from the Secretary, and to be signed by the exhibitor or some person authorised on his behalf, and accompanied by the entrance fees. The Committee will in no case consider an entry valid unless these conditions are complied with.
3. Each exhibitor may enter any number of exhibits by paying the usual entry fee, except in Classes 31 and 32 in which each exhibitor may enter one exhibit only.
4. The entry fee for private or special prizes is the same as those in the classes to which they refer, unless otherwise specified.
5. The receipt of entry money or class ticket given at time of entry must be produced to the Gatekeeper, or the exhibits will not be admitted.
6. Exhibitors are specially requested to forward their entries as early as possible and thus facilitate the preparation of the Catalogue, and to state in legible figures the number of the Class in which each exhibit is to be entered.

RECEIVING EXHIBITS.

7. The Society will arrange for receiving and forwarding exhibits to and from the railway station free of charge, but any exhibit on which the railway freight is unpaid will not be accepted by the Committee. The Society guarantee that all exhibits will be properly fed and watered during the Show. The Produce Shed will be open on Monday and Tuesday, 29th and 30th March, for receiving exhibits.

Late entries will be received for exhibition only.

GENERAL.

8. In the event of there being no competition, no prize will be given, unless the judge certify to particular merit. Competition shall mean two or more exhibits in the same class.
9. All Prizes not claimed within six months after the date of the show will be forfeited.
10. Any person in any way interfering with or using improper language to the judges, or to any officer of the Society in, or as to, the execution of their duty, or being guilty of improper conduct on the Show Ground, may be disqualified from exhibiting at future Shows of the Society, and if an exhibitor at this Show, may forfeit all prizes he may have won.

11. Should any person or firm deliberately infringe any of the rules or regulations of this Society, or refuse to comply with the request of the Committee, the Committee shall have power to suspend such person or firm from exhibiting at the Shows of the Society during such period as they may think fit.

12. All persons admitted to the Show shall be subject to the rules and order of the Committee, and in the event of misbehaviour on the part of anyone attending the Show, such persons may be removed by order of the Committee or any three members thereof.

13. No distinguishing mark of ownership will be allowed on and produce entered for competition, and no proprietary tickets shall be placed on any exhibits without a special permit from the committee.

14. Exhibitors of Live Stock may arrange with their brokers to offer their exhibits for sale by public auction at 1.30 p.m. on Wednesday, 31st March, the day of the Show.

15. No exhibits will be allowed to leave the ground or buildings until the close of the Show without a special order from the Committeeman in charge. Exhibits will be delivered at the close of the Show, after being checked by the Steward in charge.

16. Grain and seed exhibits shall not be opened till the Judge is ready to begin, and none of the Public or Exhibitors will be allowed in the Show rooms until the judging is finished.

17. A selling price may be attached to each exhibit in the Open and Farmers' Classes for grain and seed.

18. Persons desirous of exhibiting goods for which there are no classes in the premium Catalogue, may, subject to approval by the Committee, obtain sites for the same on payment of a small premium. Application must be made by 17th March.

19. All care will be taken, but the Committee will not, under any circumstances, hold themselves responsible for loss, damage or misdelivery of stock or goods exhibited at the Show.

JUDGING.

20. The object being to secure awards free from fear, favour, or affection, no person will be allowed to interfere or converse with the Judges, excepting Class Stewards in attendance. Competitors attempting to interfere by letter or otherwise will forfeit their right to a prize.

21. Judging in all Classes will commence at 1 p.m. on Tuesday, 30th March, with the exception of Live Stock, Fancy Butter, Dressed Poultry, Floral and District Exhibits, which will be judged at 9 a.m. on Wednesday, 31st March.

22. In the Points Prizes, 1st prize shall count, 6 points; 2nd prize 4 points; 3rd prize, 2 points; very highly commended, 1 point.

23. In all Classes where two or three prizes have been awarded, the Judges are directed to "very highly commend," "highly commend," or "commend" the other exhibits worthy of these distinctions, and honorary certificates will be issued accordingly. Power is also reserved to withhold a prize where Judges consider it ought not to be awarded for want of sufficient merit.

PROTESTS.

24. All Protests must be in writing, and may be entered either before or after the Judges have proceeded to their duties, but no protest can be entertained which traverses the decision of the Judges. The party entering a protest must deposit £1. The deposit will be forfeited if the protest be not sustained. If the protest be lodged before the Judges proceed to their duties, the onus of proof will rest with the exhibitor; if after that, the onus of proof will be with the party protesting. No protest will be received later than two hours after the prize tickets have been affixed. The Committee will decide all protests as soon as practicable, and there shall be no appeal from their decision.

CLASS STEWARDS.

25. Class Stewards shall attend to the reception, classification, and placing of all exhibits, and to all matters in connection therewith. They shall wait upon the Judges, furnish them with the prize cards or ribbons, and afford them all information and attention necessary to the discharge of their duties, and see that there is no interference on the part of the public or exhibitors with the Judges in the execution of their work. They shall also see the prize cards and ribbons properly affixed to the prize exhibits and arrange among themselves for the constant and effective supervision of their sections, the behaviour of the attendants, and the comfort and convenience of both exhibitors and the public.

26. The decision of the Committee for the time being in office shall be absolutely final in all cases.

Gates open to the General Public on Wednesday, 31st March, at 9 a.m.

Admission, 1s; Admission to Grand Stand, 2s 6d; to Second Stand, 1s., Children under 12, half-price. Members free.

Carriages—Admission, 5s; Horsemen, 2s 6d. Horsemen and occupants of carriages also pay the usual charge for admission. Members free.

ONE ACRE MANGOLDS.

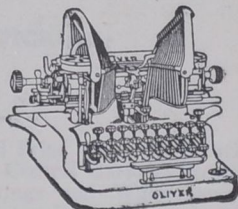

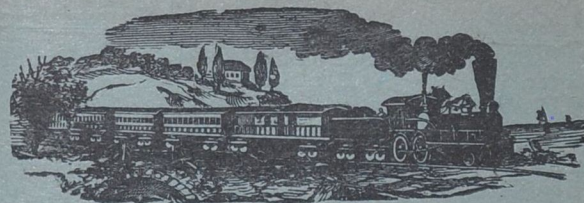
