



CONDITIONS

ENTRIES.

1. All entries must be made with the Secretary on or before Wednesday, the 2nd March, unless otherwise specified.
2. Entries must be made in writing, or on the printed forms, which can be obtained from the Secretary, and must be signed by the exhibitor or some person authorised on his behalf, and accompanied by the entrance fees. The Committee will in no case consider an entry valid unless these conditions are complied with.
3. Each exhibitor may enter any number of exhibits by paying the usual entry fee, except where stated.
4. The exhibitor's pass must be produced to the Gatekeeper, or the exhibits will not be admitted.
5. Exhibitors are specially requested to forward their entries as early as possible and thus facilitate the preparation of the Catalogue, and to state in legible figures the number of the Class in which each exhibit is to be entered.

RECEIVING EXHIBITS.

6. The Society will arrange for receiving and forwarding exhibits to and from the railway station free of charge, but any exhibit on which the railway freight is unpaid will not be accepted by the Committee.

GENERAL.

7. In the event of there being no competition, no prize will be given, unless the judge certifies to particular merit. Competition shall mean two or more exhibits in the same class.
8. All Prizes not claimed within six months after the date of the show will be forfeited.
9. Any person in any way interfering with or using improper language to the judges, or to any officer of the Society in, or as to, the execution of their duty, or being guilty of improper conduct on the Show Ground, may be disqualified from exhibiting at future Shows of the Society, and if an exhibitor at this Show, may forfeit all prizes he may have won.

10. Should any person or firm deliberately infringe any of the rules or regulations of this Society, or refuse to comply with the request of the Committee, the Committee shall have power to suspend such person or firm from exhibiting at the shows of the Society during such period as they may think fit.

11. All persons admitted to the Show shall be subject to the rules and order of the Committee, and in the event of misbehaviour on the part of anyone attending the Show, such persons may be removed by order of the Committee or any three members thereof.

12. No distinguishing mark of ownership will be allowed on any produce entered for competition, and no proprietary tickets shall be placed on any exhibits without a special permit from the Committee.

13. No exhibits will be allowed to leave the ground or buildings until the close of the Show without a special order from the Committeeman in charge.

14. Grain and seed exhibits shall not be opened till the Judge is ready to begin, and none of the public or exhibitors will be allowed in the Show rooms until the judging is finished.

15. A selling price may be attached to each exhibit in the Classes for grain and seeds.

16. Persons desirous of exhibiting goods for which there are no classes in the premium Catalogue, may, subject to approval by the Committee obtain sites for the same on payment of a small premium. Application must be made by 2nd March.

17. All care will be taken, but the Committee will not, under any circumstances, hold themselves responsible for loss, damage or misdelivery of stock or goods exhibited at the Show.

JUDGING.

18. The object being to secure awards free from fear, favour, or affection, no person will be allowed to interfere or converse with the Judges, excepting Class Stewards in attendance. Competitors attempting to interfere by letter or otherwise will forfeit the right to a prize.

19. Judging of Fruit will commence at 12.30 p.m. on Tuesday, 15th March, and other exhibits on the same day at 1.30 p.m., with the exception of Calves, Lambs, Poultry, Fancy Butter, Dressed Poultry, Eggs, and Floral Exhibits, which will be judged at 9 a.m. on Wednesday, 16th March.

20. For the Points Prizes, points shall count as follows:—If five or more entries:—1st prize, 6; 2nd, 4; 3rd, 2; v.h.c., 1. If less than five entries:—1st, 6; 2nd, 4; 3rd, 2; and no points for v.h.c. If there is no competition in a Class, only half points shall be counted in that class. "No Competition" means not more than one exhibitor competing. In the event of a tie, most first prizes shall count.

21. In all classes where two or three prizes have been awarded, the Judges are directed to "very highly commend," "highly commend," or "commend" the other exhibits worthy of these distinctions. Power is also reserved to withhold a prize where Judges consider it ought not to be awarded for want of sufficient merit.

PROTESTS.

22. The determination of the Judge shall be final unless a protest be made and allowed on the ground of disqualification. Protests must be in writing signed by the protestor and delivered to the Secretary along with a deposit of £1, which may be forfeited if the protest be considered frivolous or vexatious. If the protest be lodged before the Judge proceeds to his duties, the onus of disproof will rest with the exhibitor; if after, the onus of proof will be with the protestor. No protest will be received later than two hours after exhibitors have been at liberty to inspect the prize tickets. The Committee will decide all protests as soon as practicable, and there shall be no appeal from their decision.

CLASS STEWARDS.

23. Class Stewards shall attend to the reception, classification, and placing of all exhibits, and to all matters in connection therewith. They shall wait upon the Judges, and afford them all information and attention necessary to the discharge of their duties, and see that there is no interference on the part of the public or exhibitors with the Judges in the execution of their work. They shall also see the prize cards and ribbons properly affixed to the prize exhibits and arrange among themselves for the constant and effective supervision of their sections, the behaviour of the attendants, and the comfort and convenience of both exhibitors and the public.

24. The decision of the Committee for the time being in office shall be absolutely final in all cases.

Gates open to the General Public on Tuesday, 15th March, from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m., Admission 1/-, Children under 12, 6d., Members Free; on Wednesday, 16th March, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Admission, 1/6; Children under 12, 6d, under 7, free; Members free. Admission to Grand Stands—Adults, 2s. 6d.; Children under 12, 1s.; to Second Stand, Adults, 1s.; Children under 12, 6d.; under 7, Free; Members, Free.

Carriages and Motor-cars—Admission, 5s.; Horsemen, 2s. 6d. Occupants of Carriages and Motor-cars also pay the usual charge of admission. Members free on production of members' tickets.

DIRECTIONS FOR SCORING.

Naming.—Misnaming in plate and single-case entries disqualifies the entry. Collection and case entries will lose two points for each fault.

Size.—The standard size includes the margin of allowance above and below measurement as stated. Measurements within the margin limits will be allotted full points, but, all other score being equal, the determining factor will be the entry measuring nearest the actual centre of standard size arranged. Two points to be sacrificed for every 1-16th in. above or below the standard limits.

Condition.—In judging for condition consideration is to be given to the purpose of the fruit at the time of judging. In explanation: The aim for a plate of dessert apples or pears should be prime condition for dessert purposes when being judged, and points awarded accordingly.

Fruit for local market: The show-bench at time of judging should be treated as the market.

Fruit for export: The condition in which the fruit should arrive at its destination—say, six weeks later.

Staging.—Pleasing effect attained in displaying the fruit.

Market Value.—The popularity of the variety on the New Zealand markets, together with the condition of the fruit exhibited, to be the standard of value for allotting points.

JUDGING.

Exhibits in classes of apples "Commercial Type" points will be awarded according to standard size.

In Exhibits in classes for apples "Exhibition Type" standard size will not be taken into consideration in the awarding of points.

A First Prize of £2 2/- and the Hawke's Bay Fruitgrowers' Association's Second Prize of £1 1/- will be awarded to the Exhibitor scoring the highest and second highest number of points in the Apple Section, including Cased Apples.


