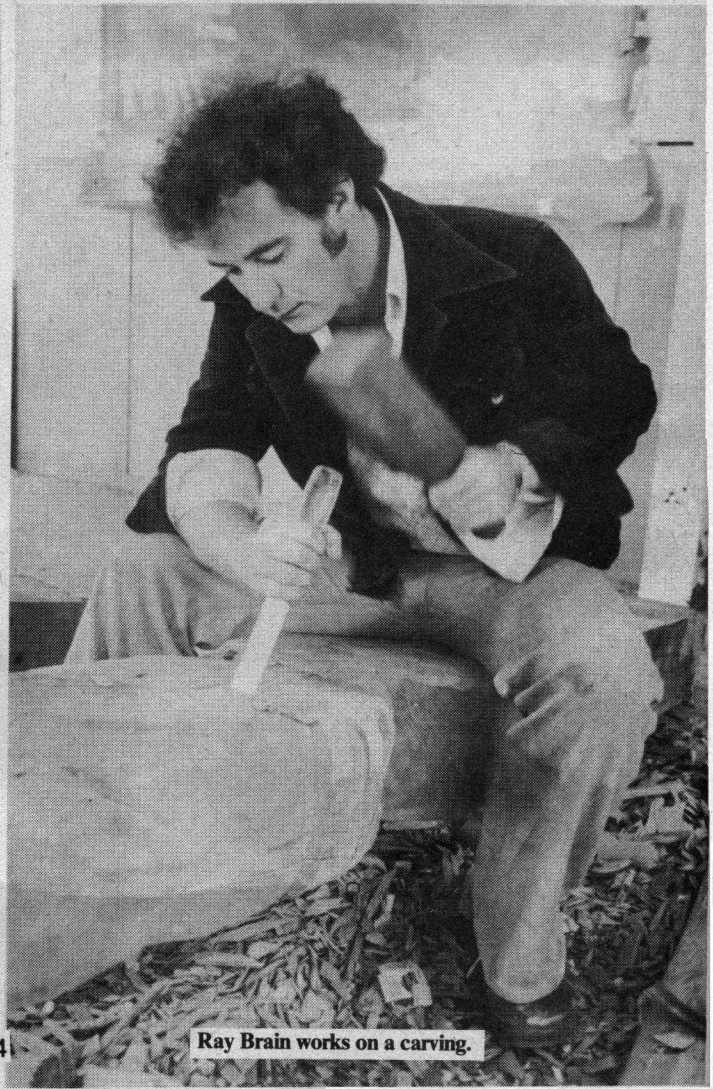
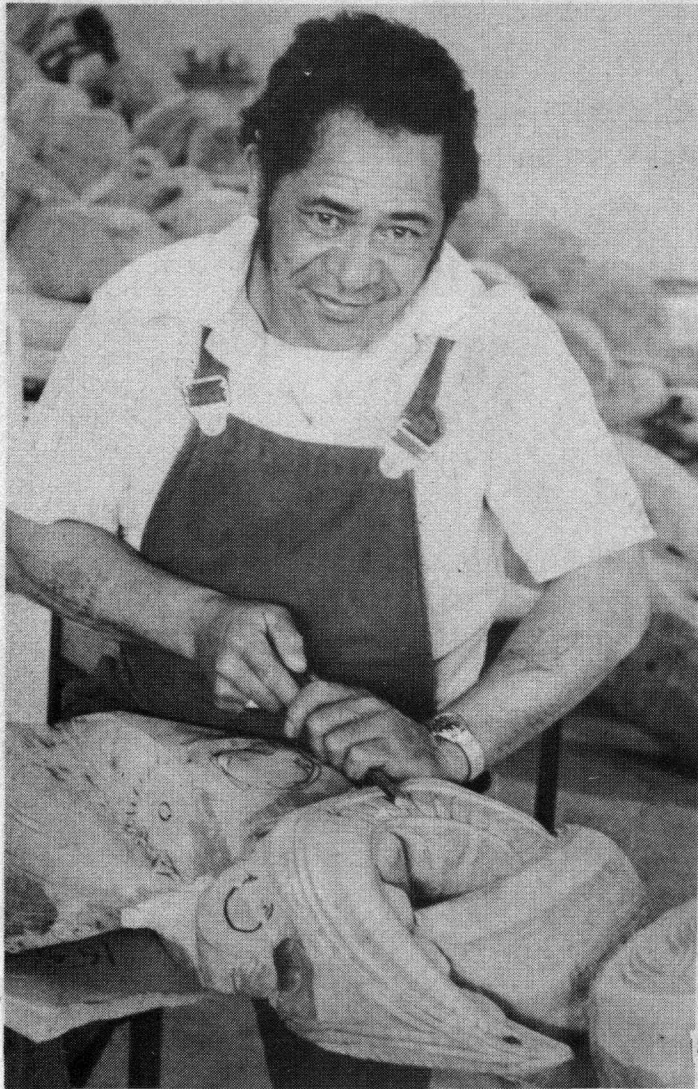

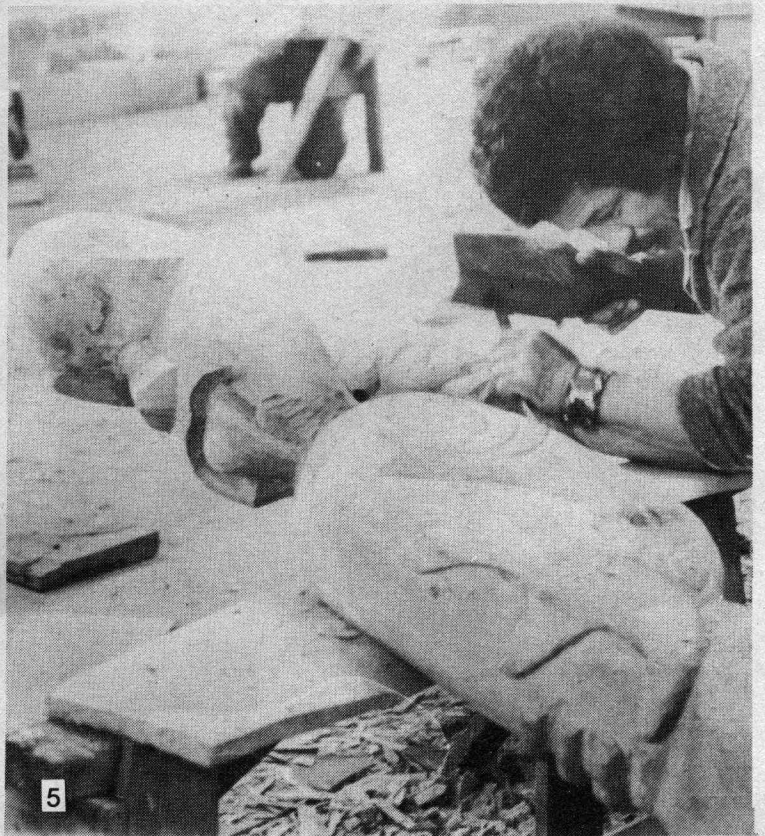
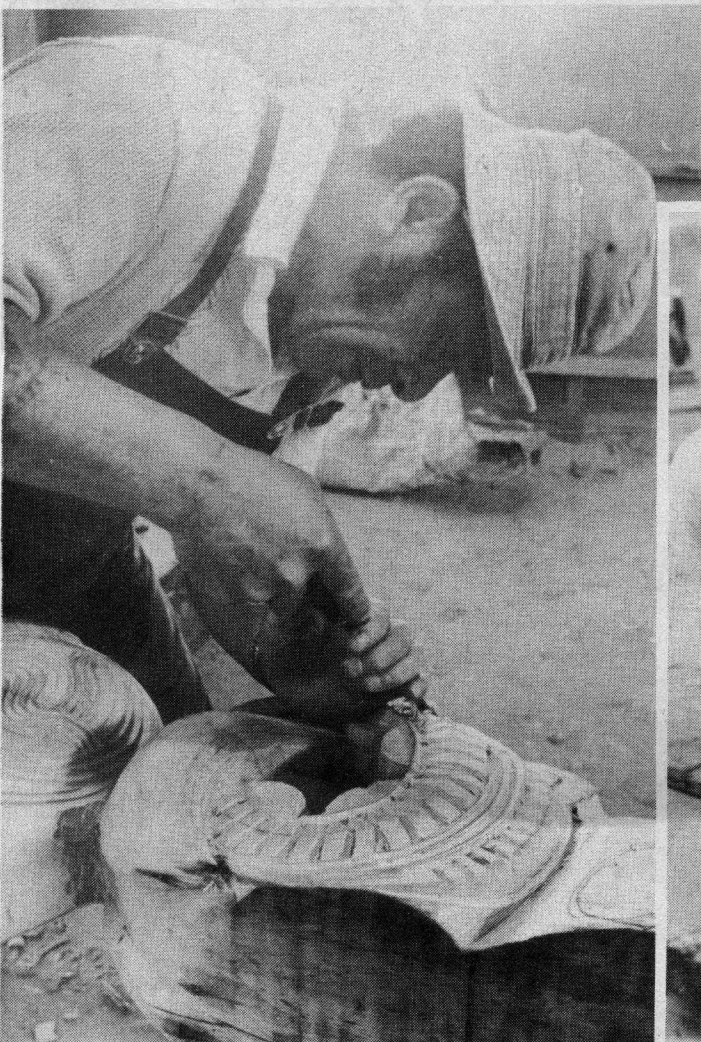

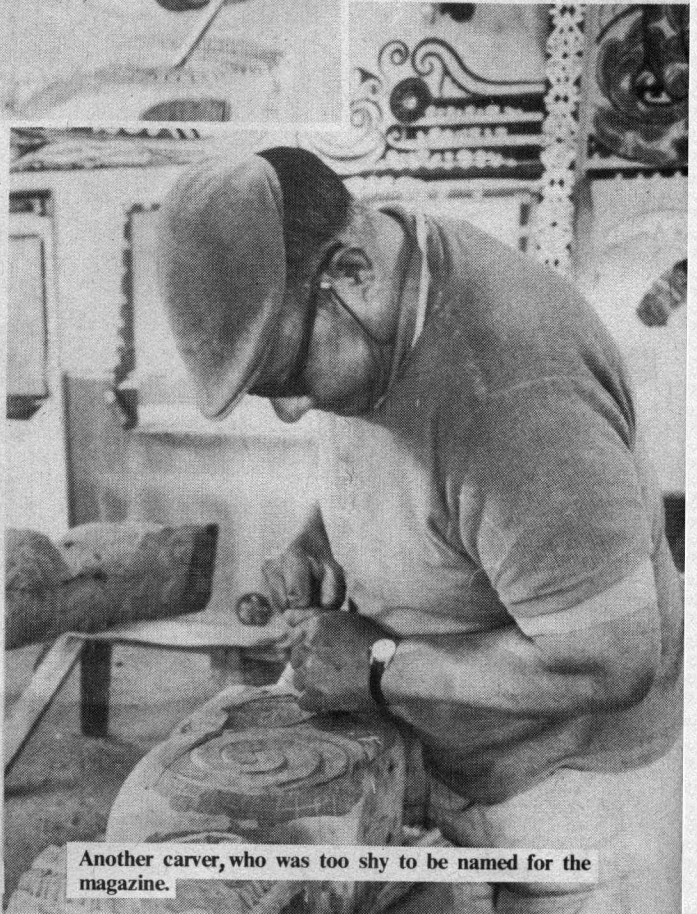

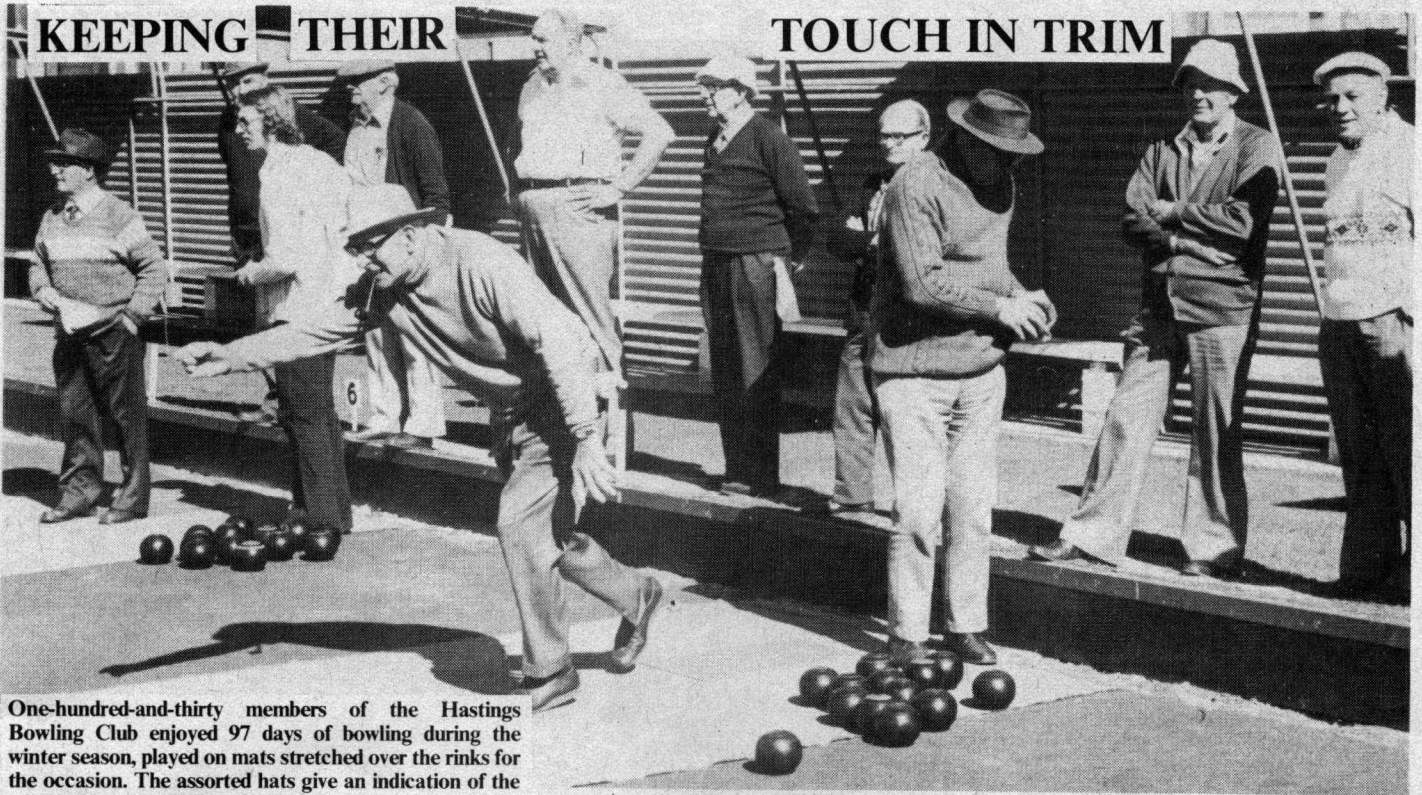

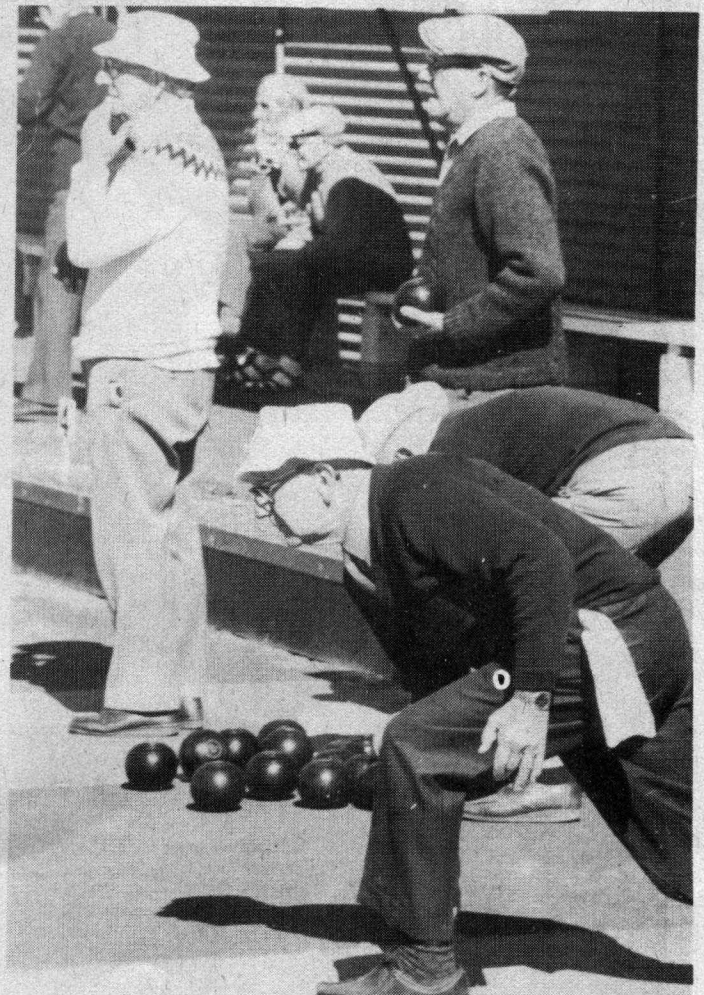

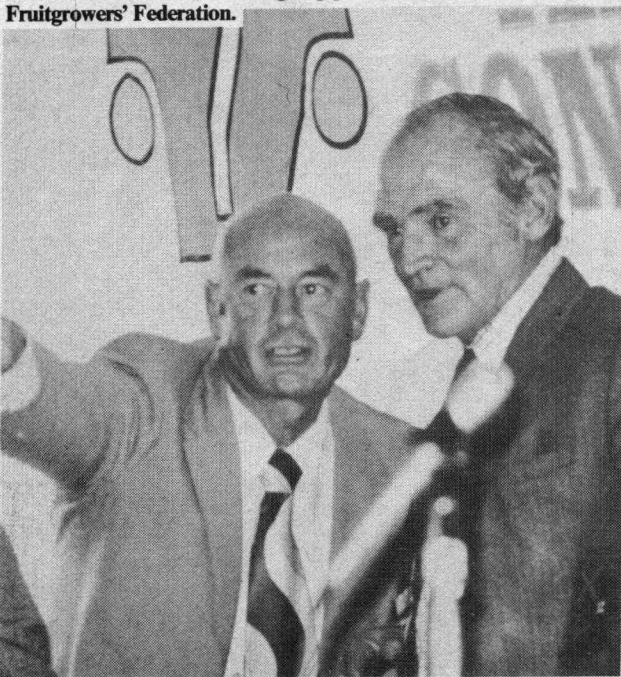

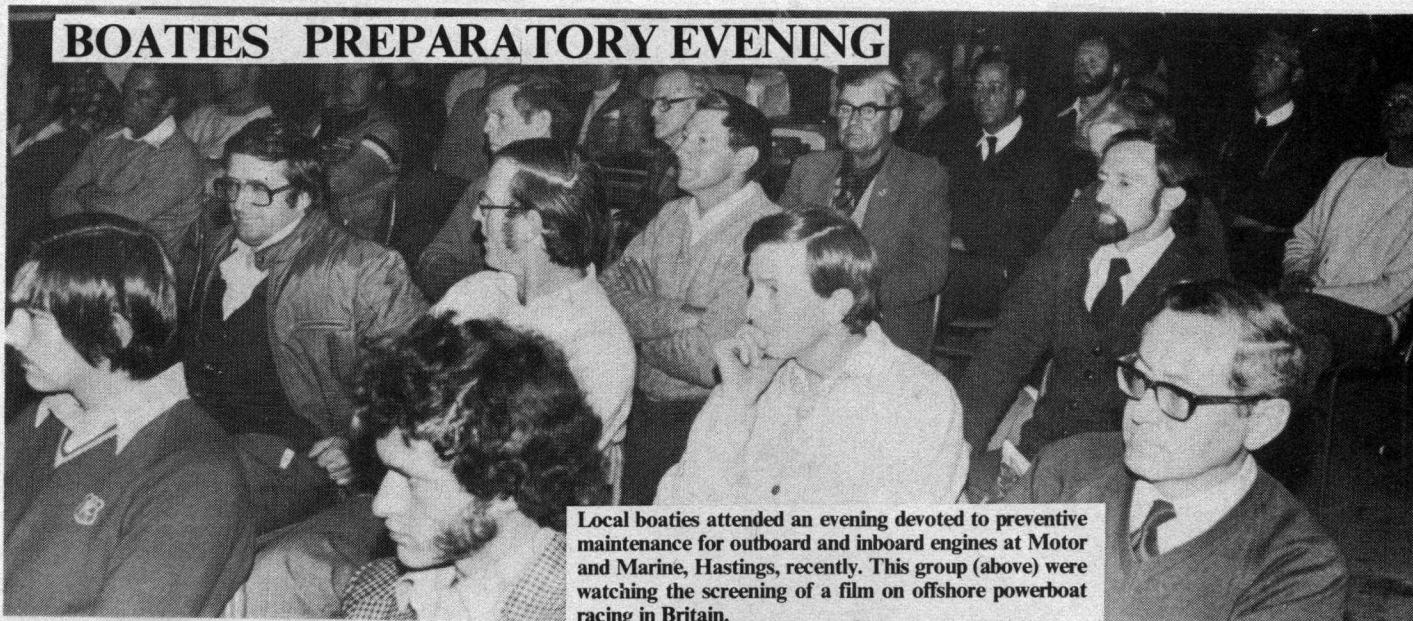

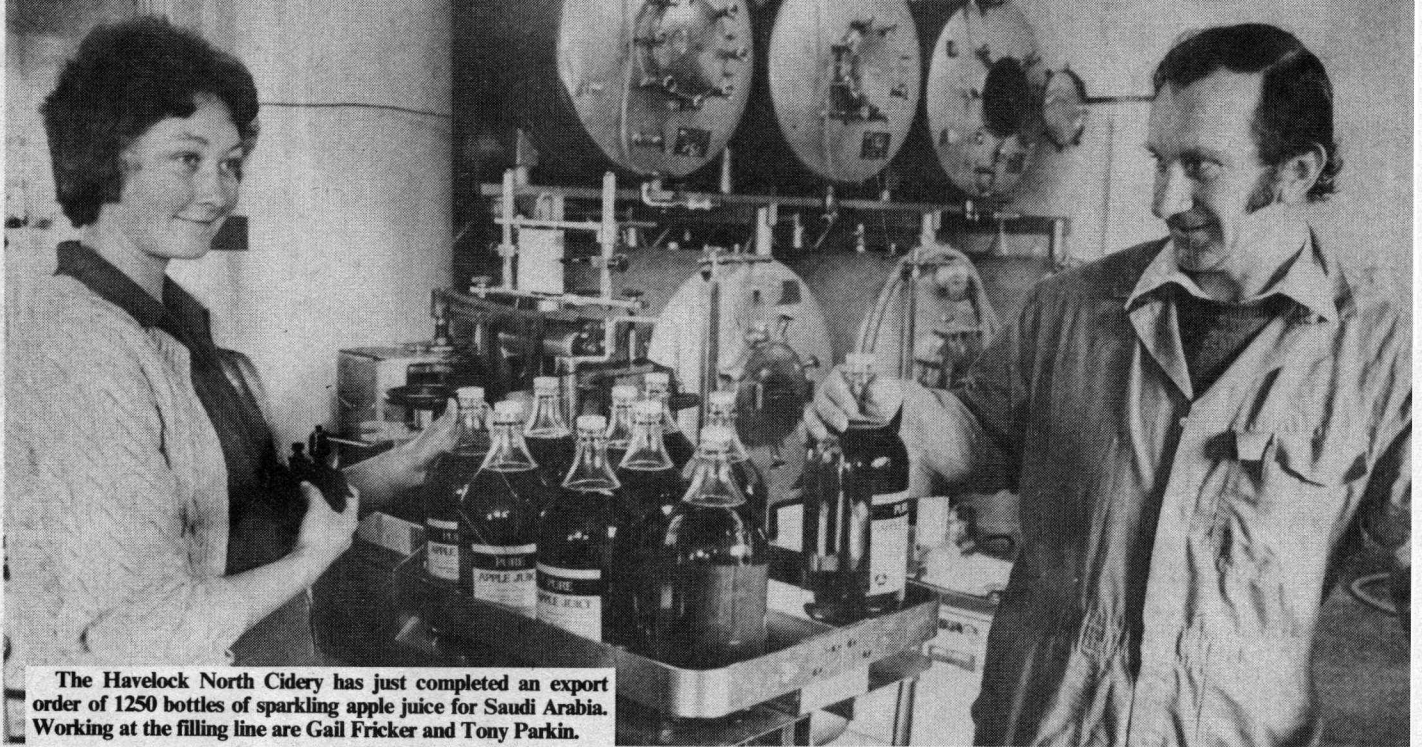

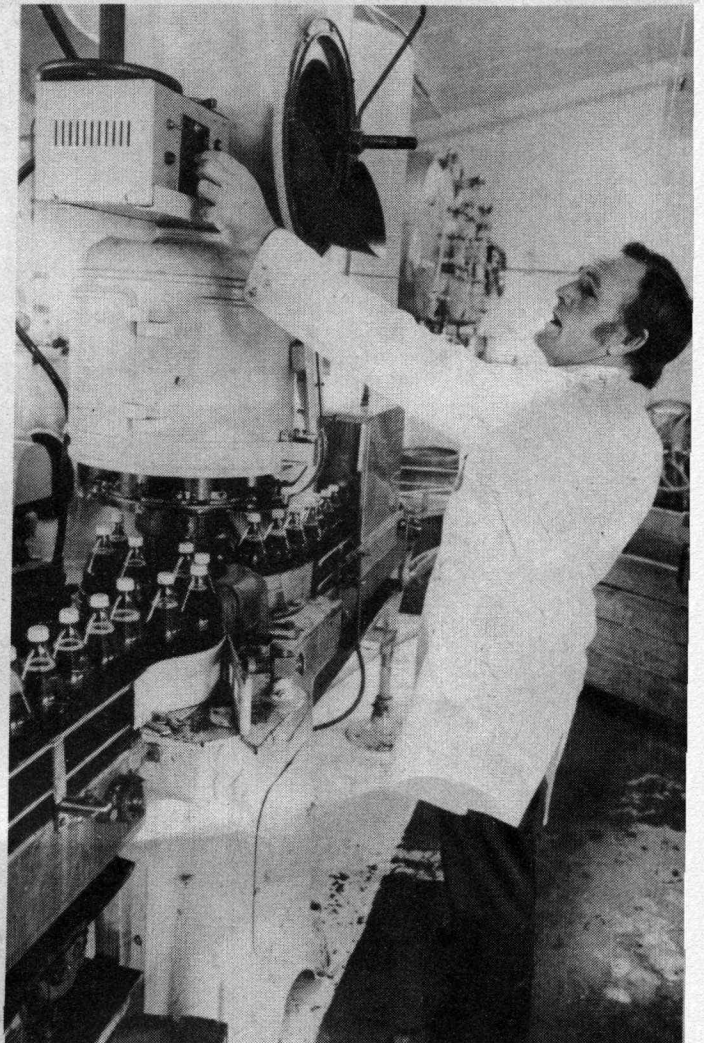

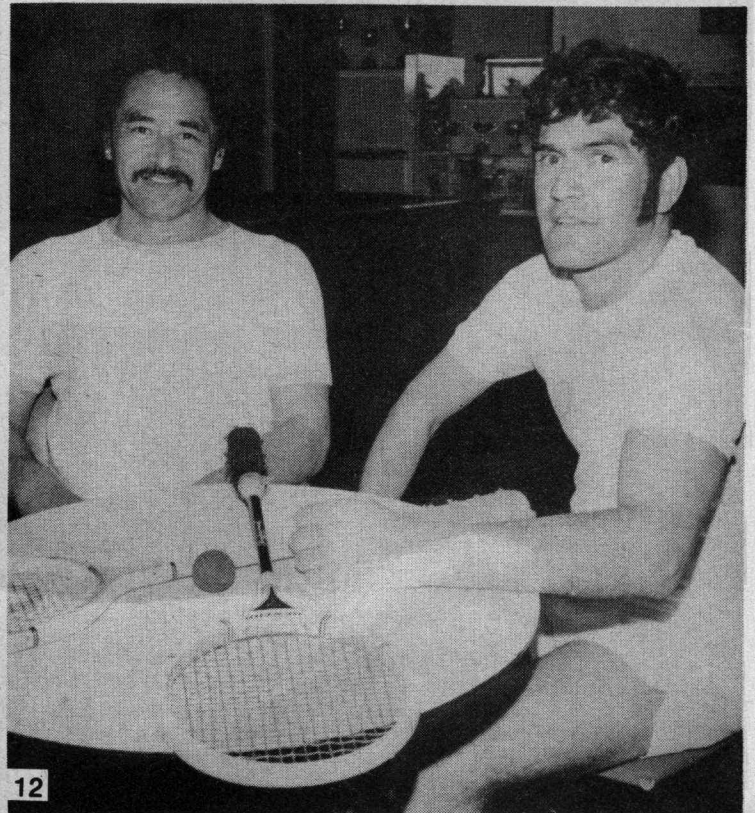

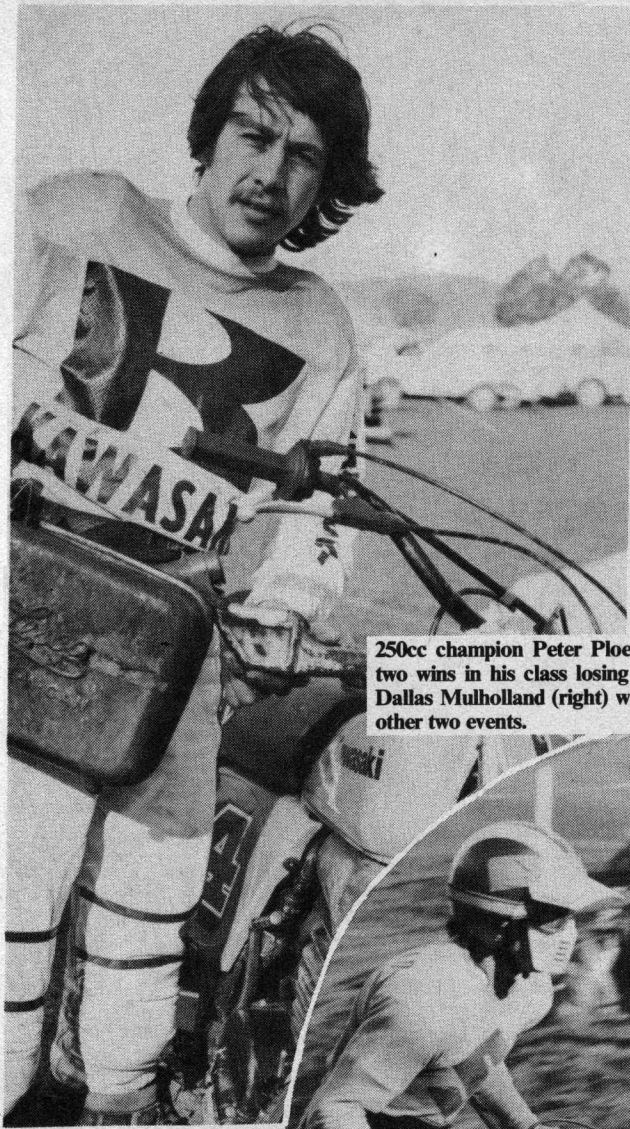
SQUASH CHAMPIONS'

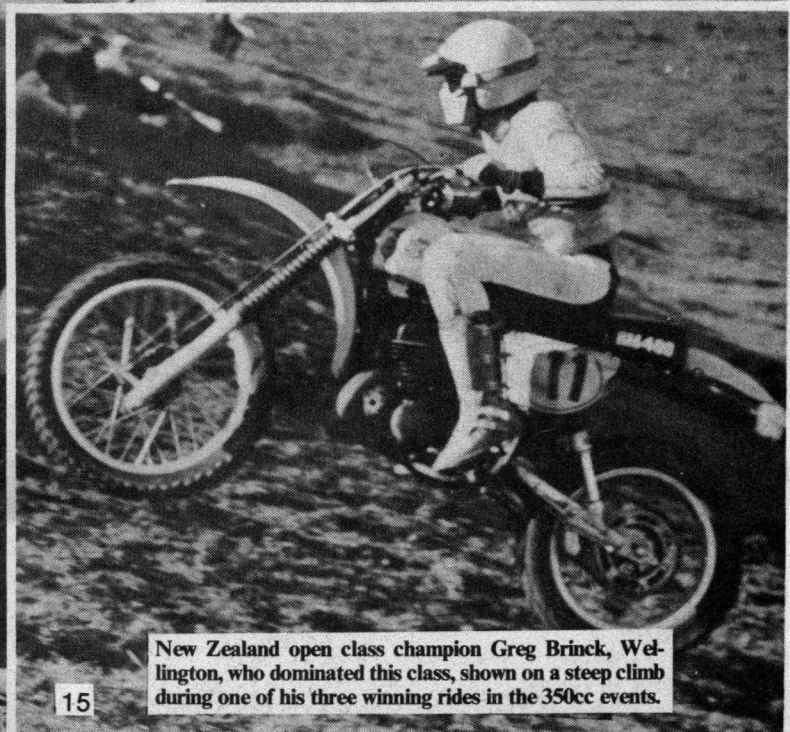

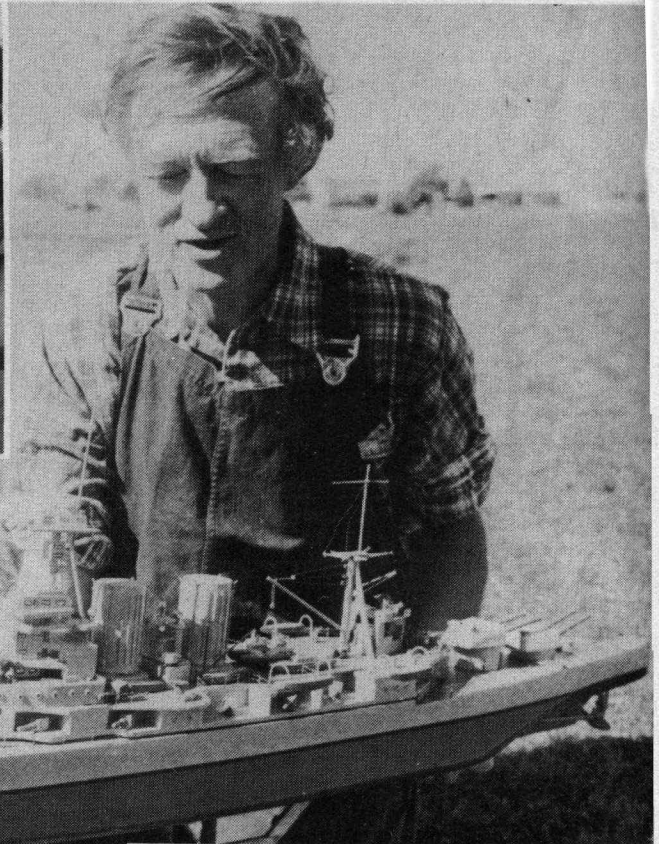

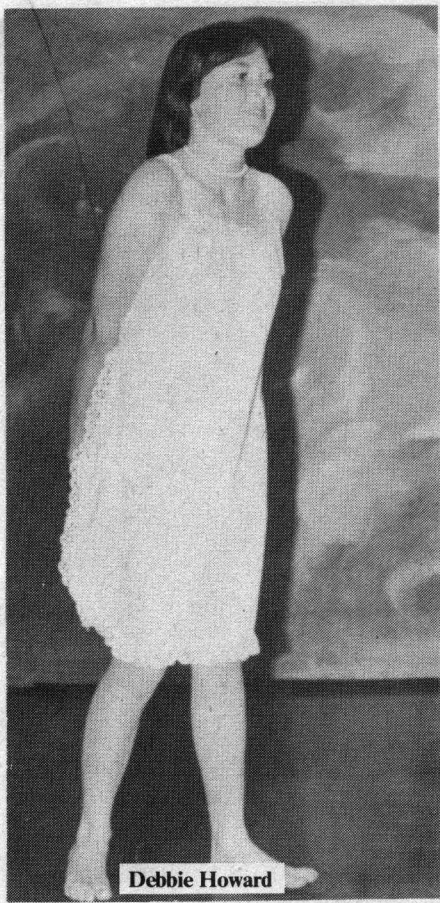
TOTS TO TEENS SHOW FASHIONS

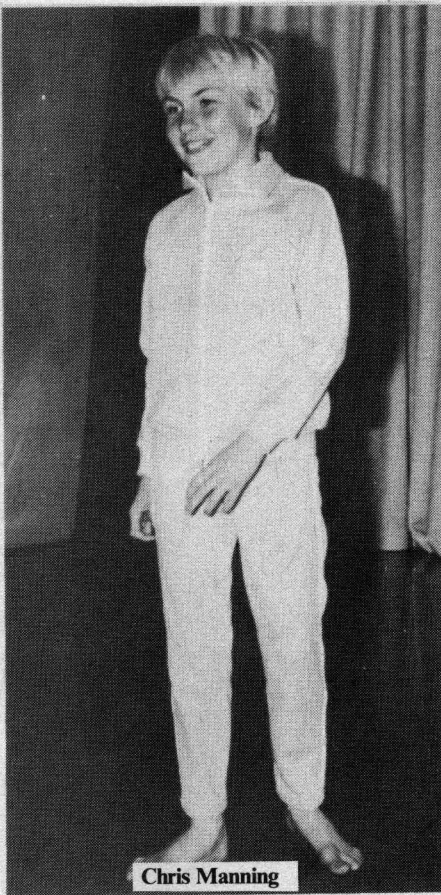

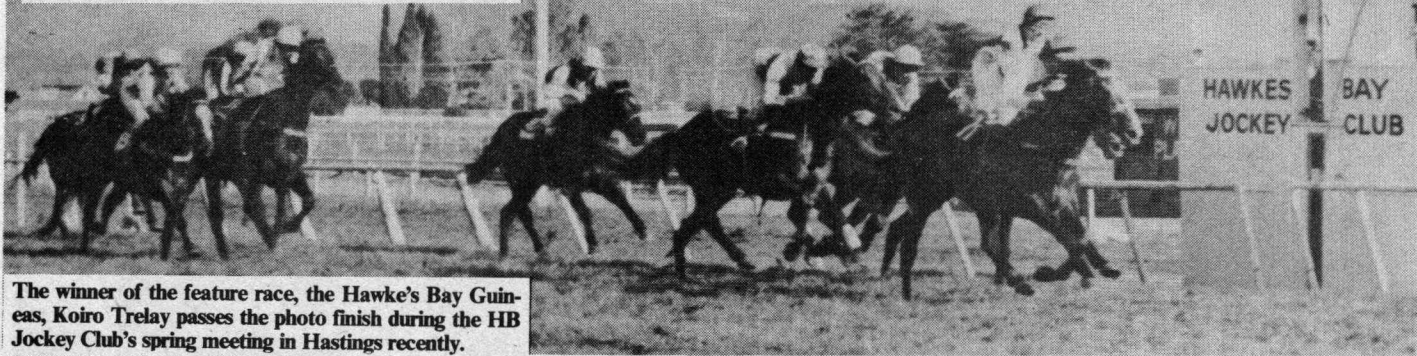
Y.F.C. FUN SHOW

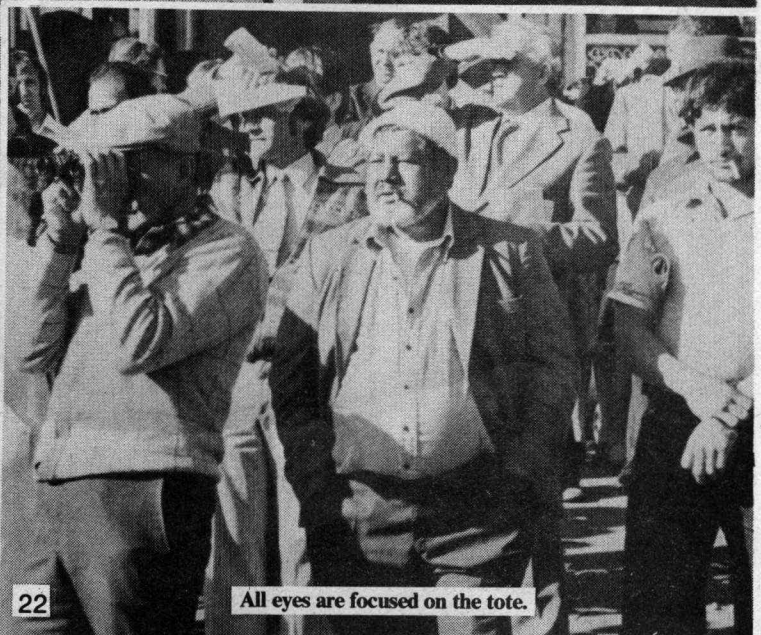

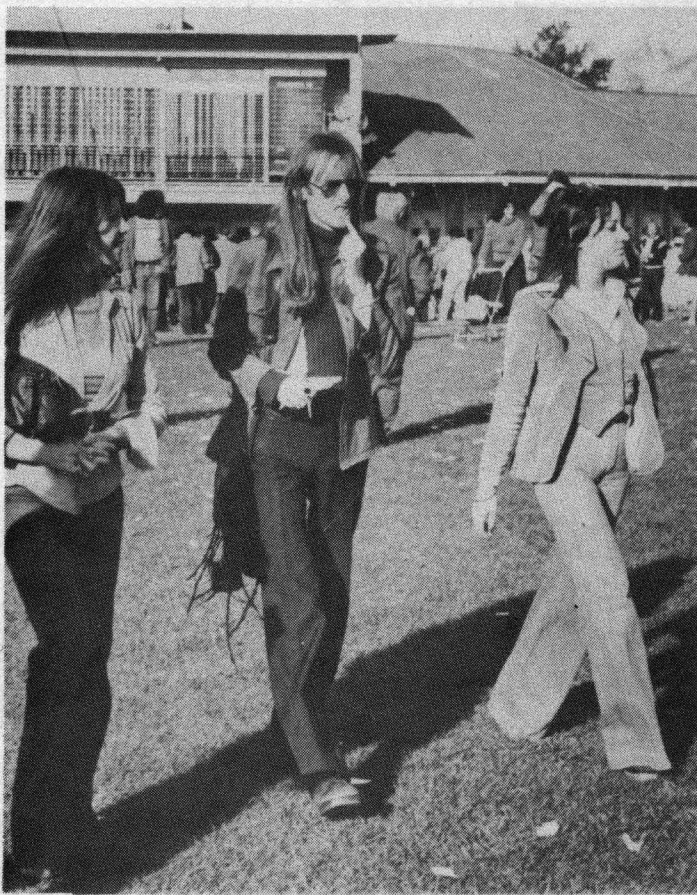

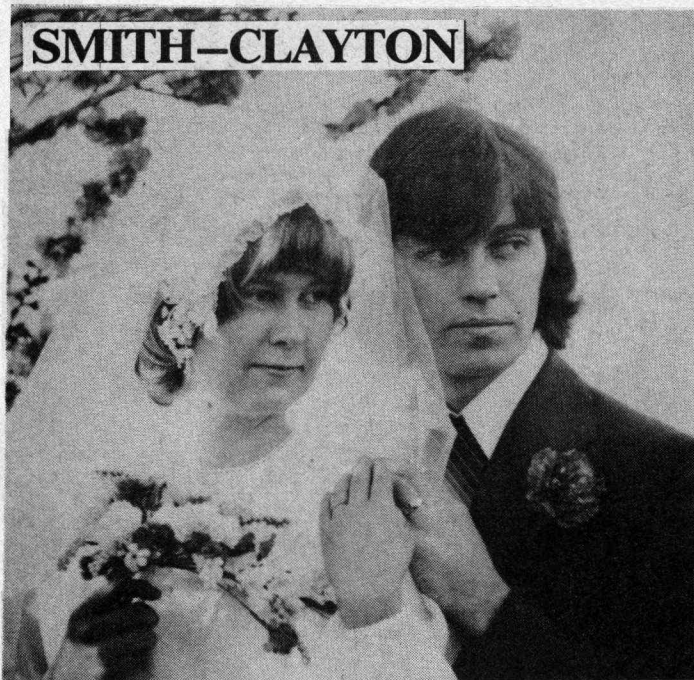

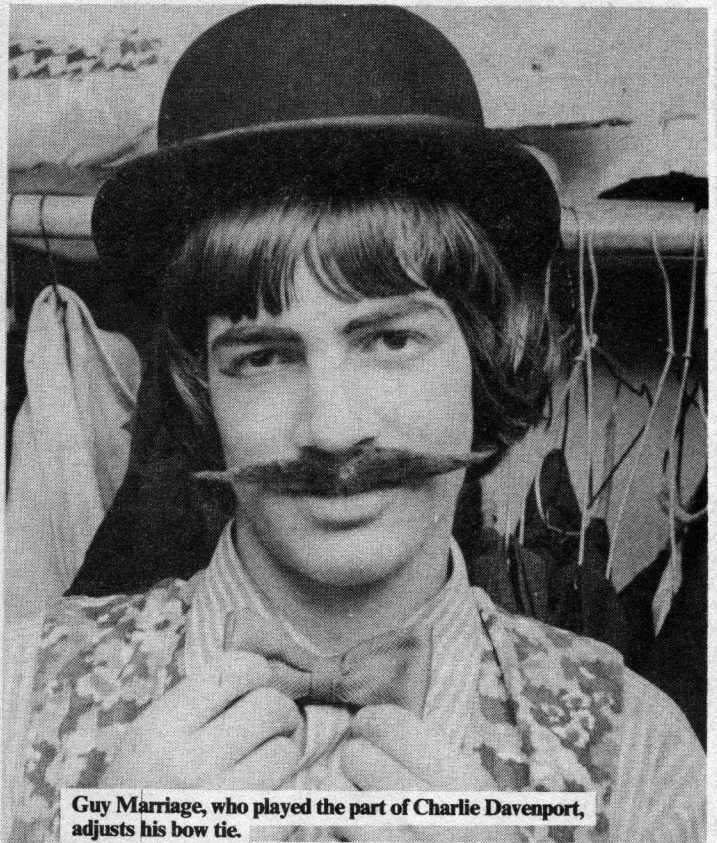

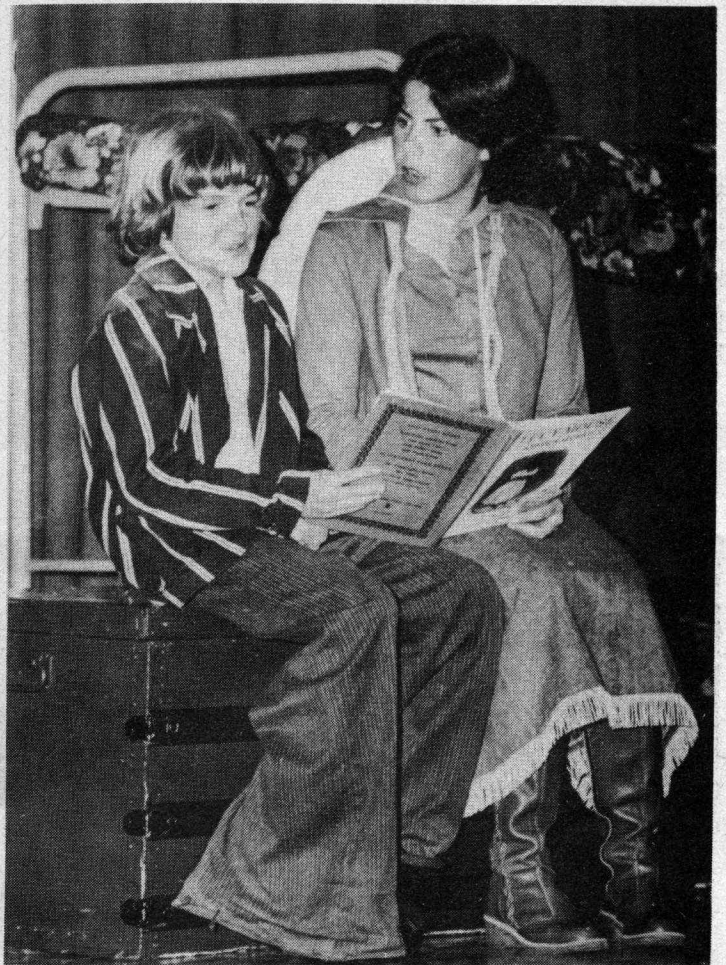

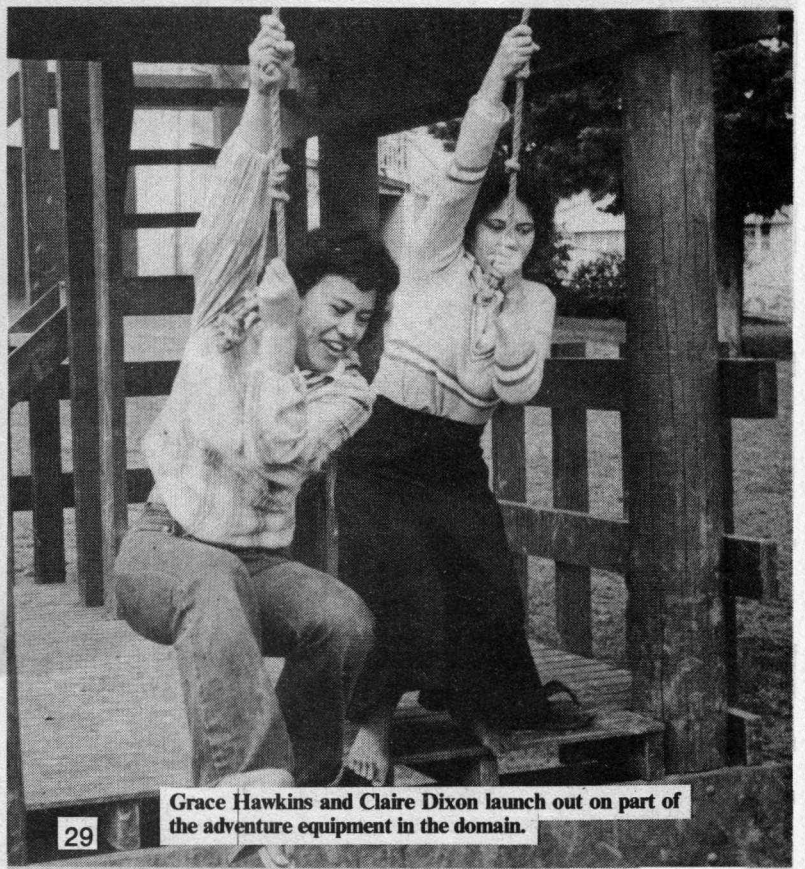

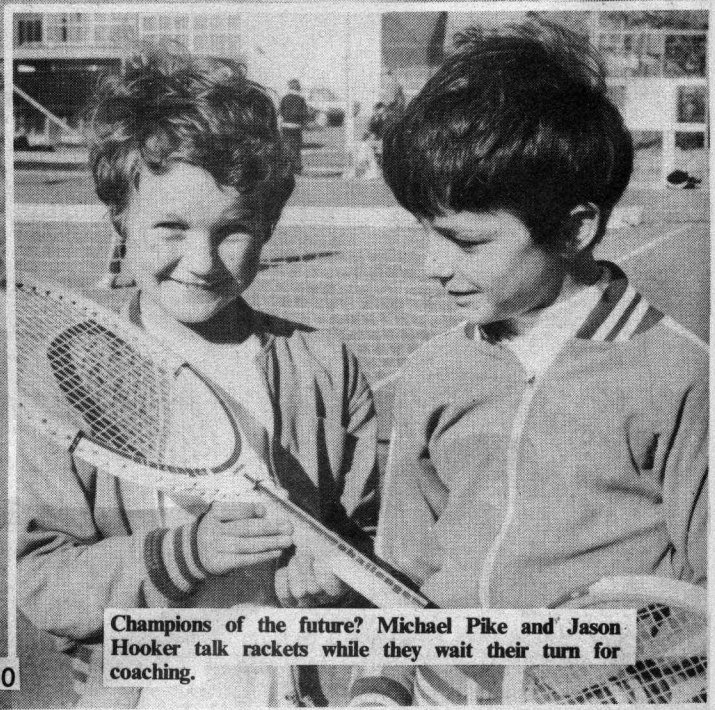

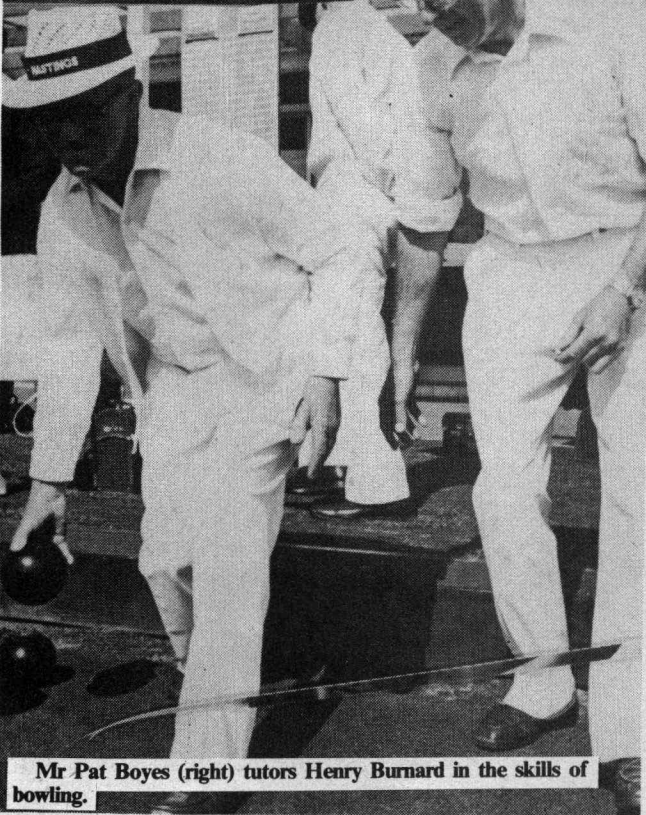

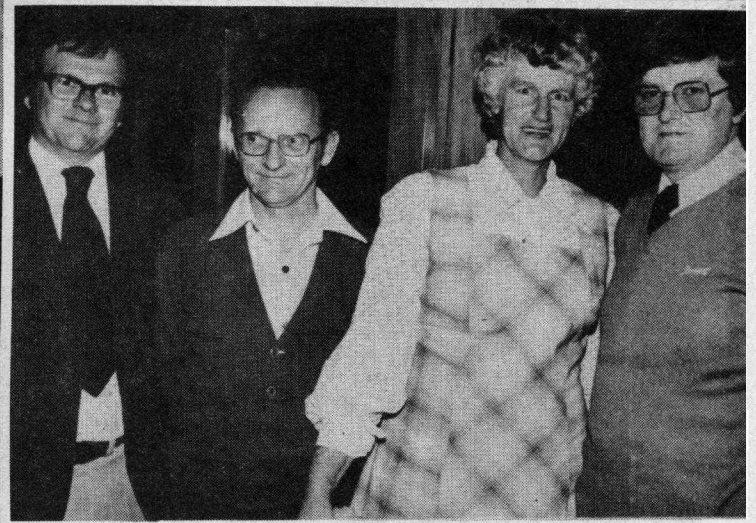

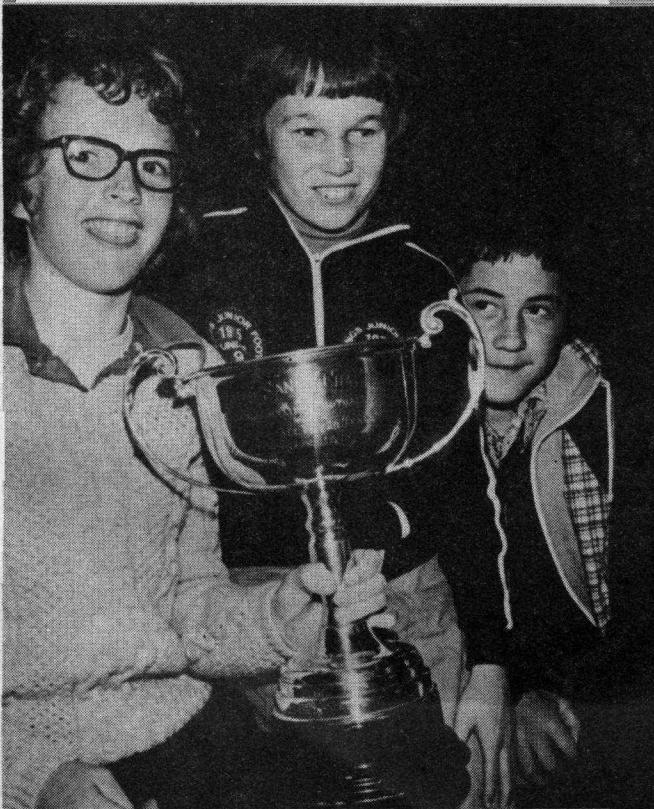

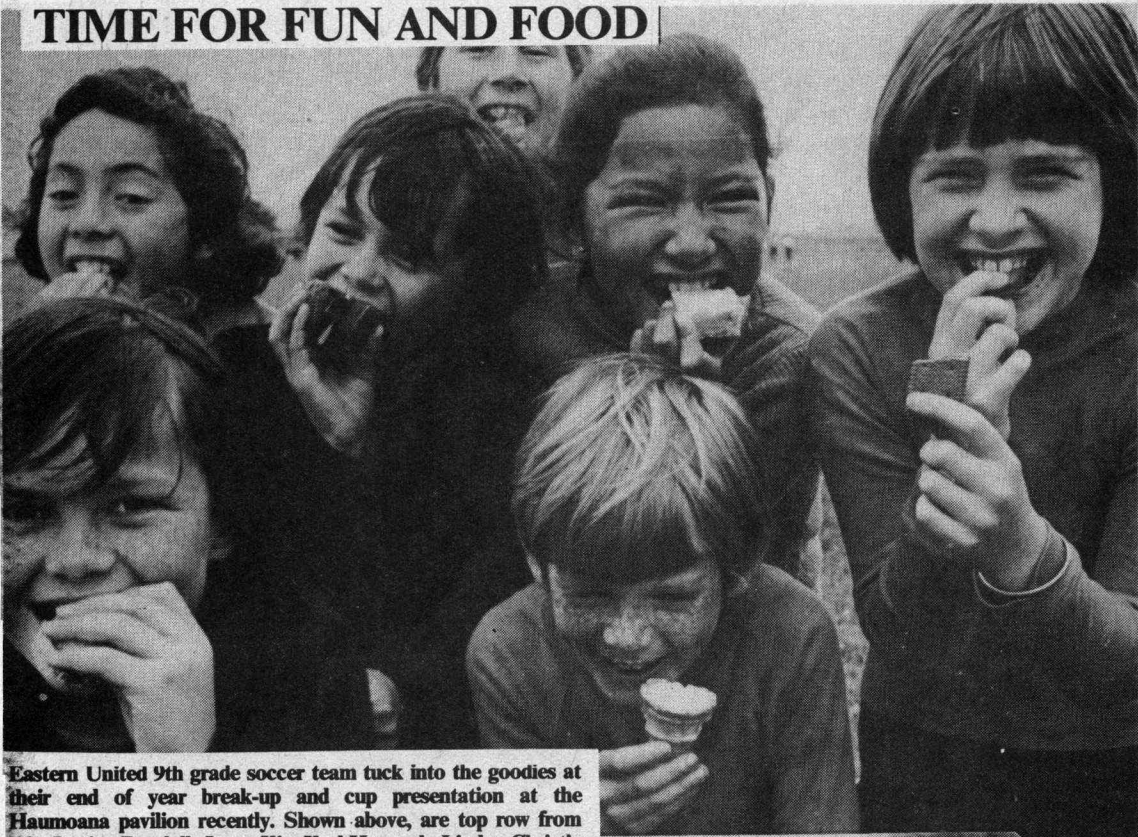

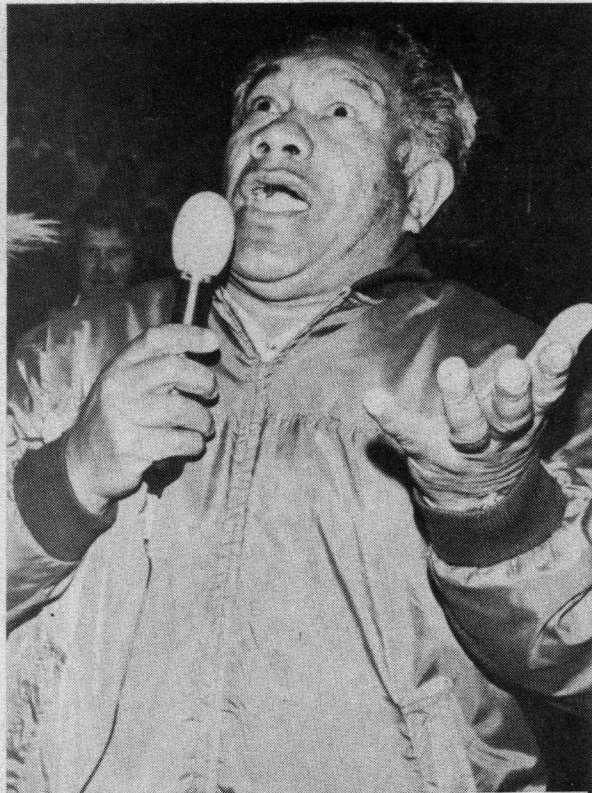

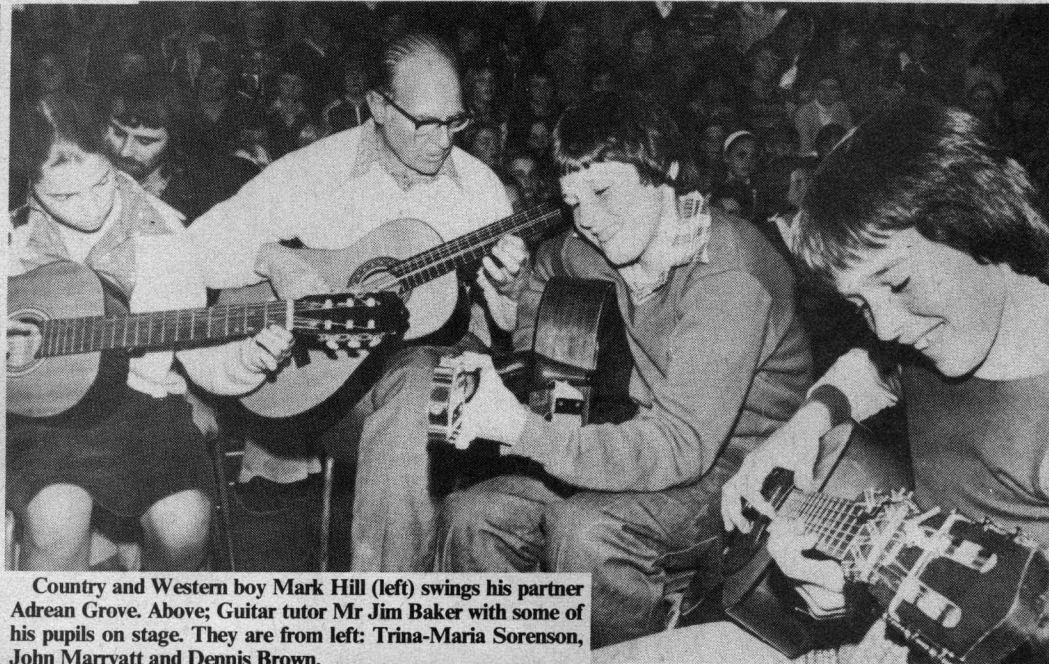

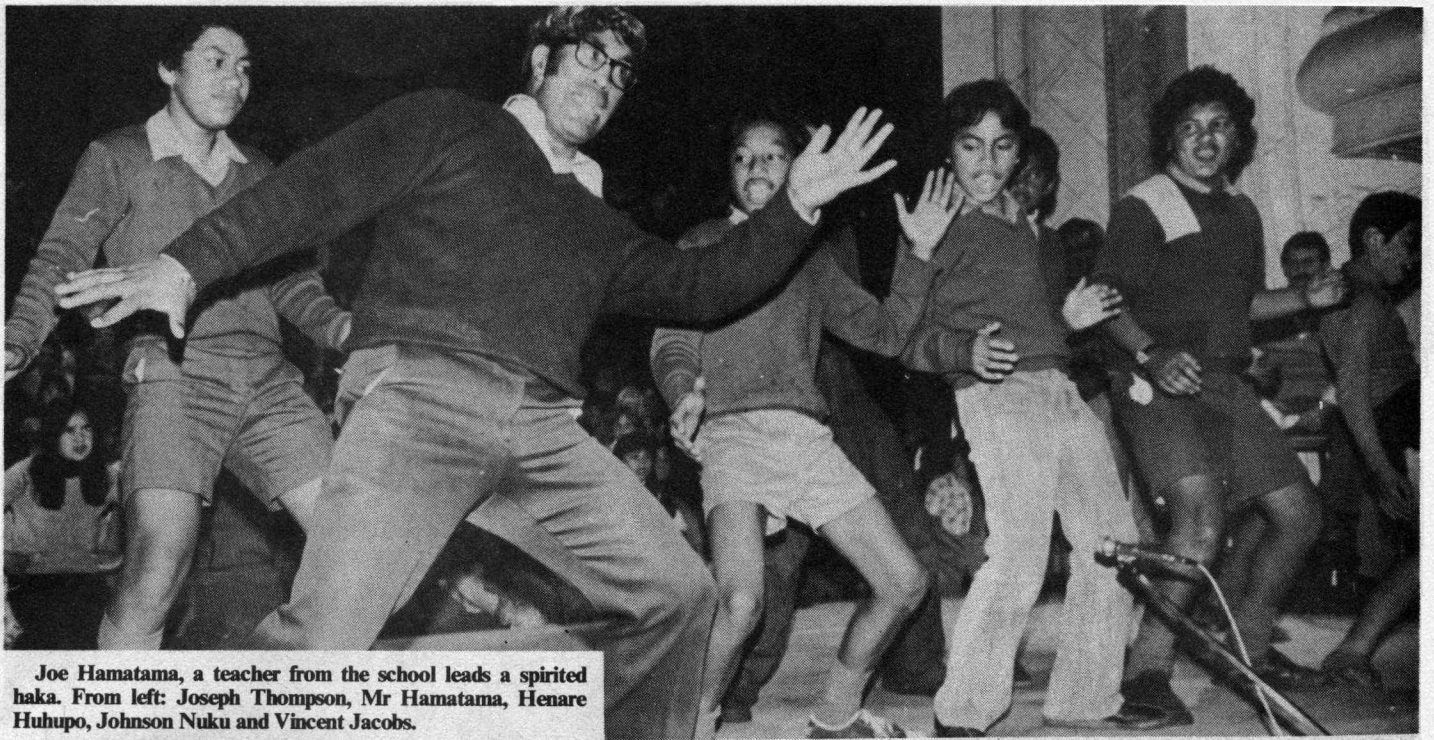

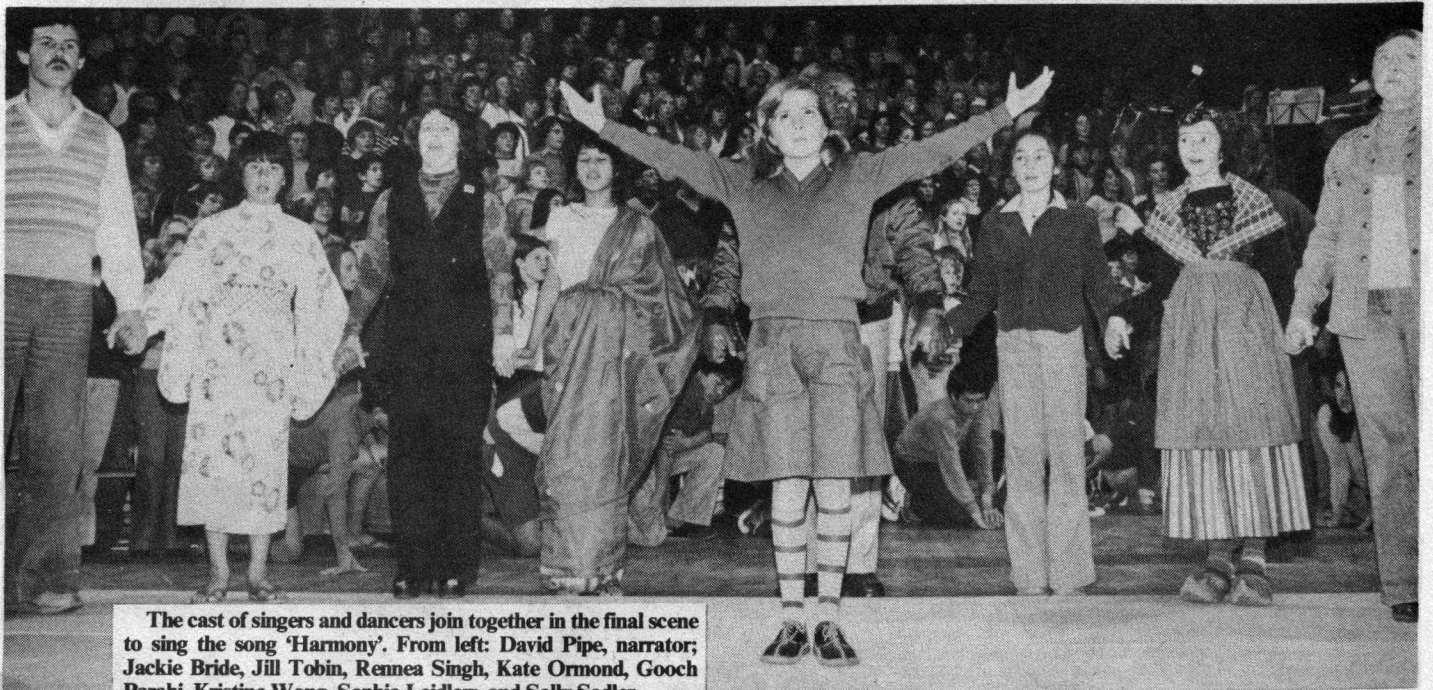

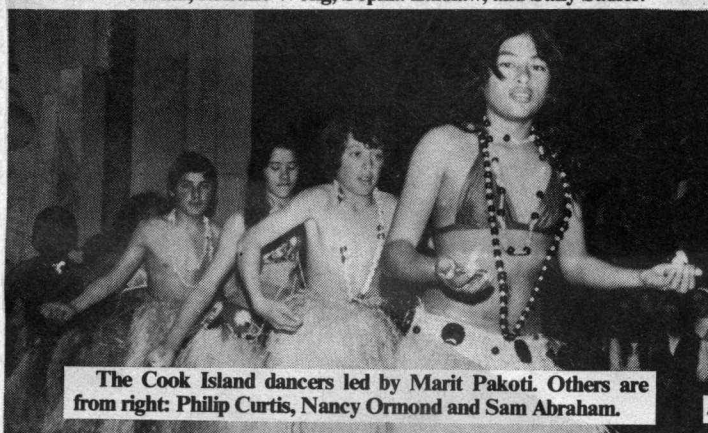

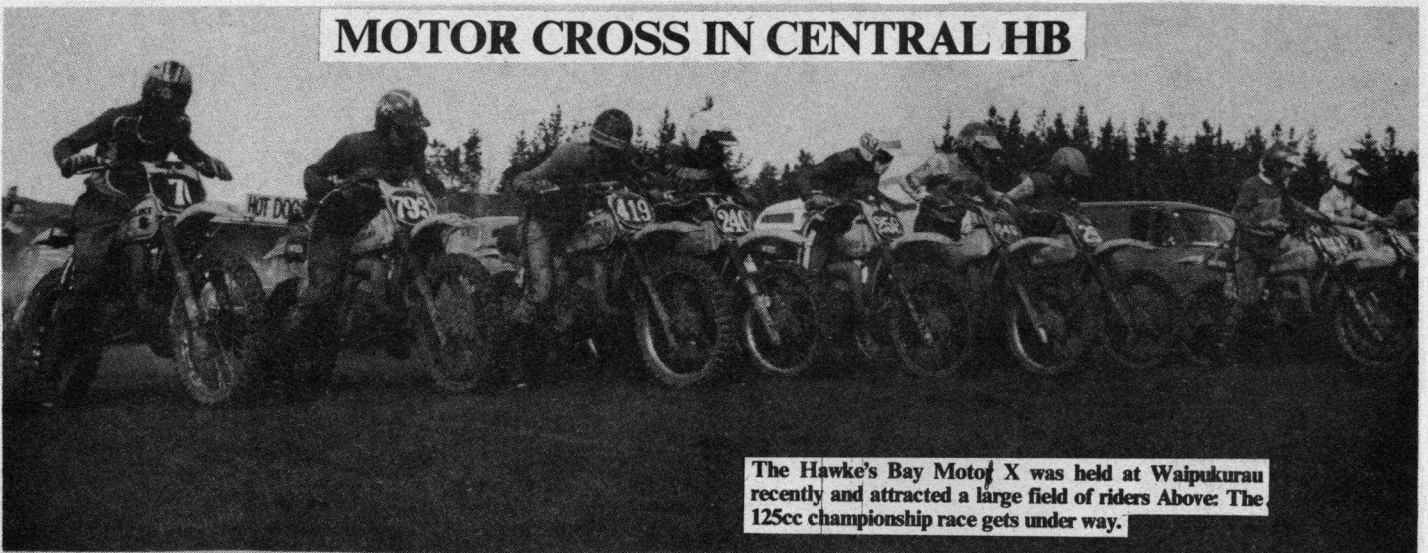

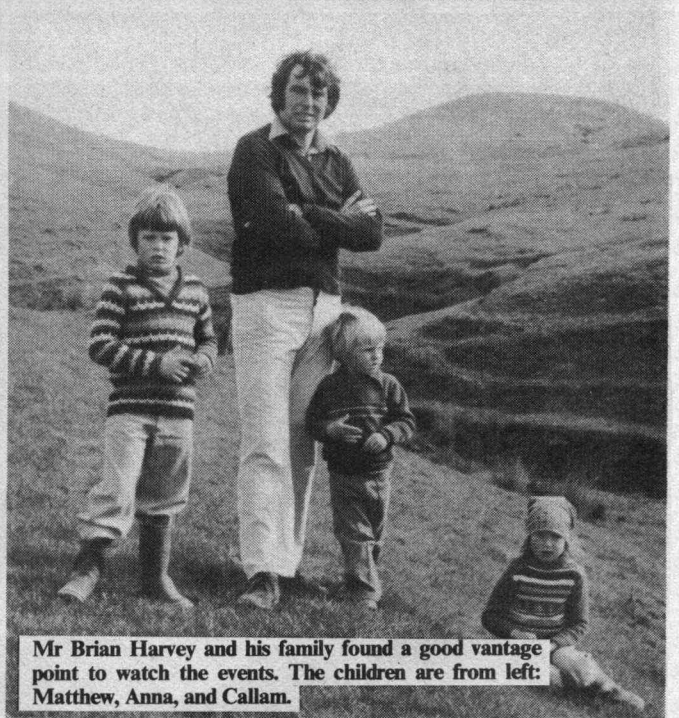

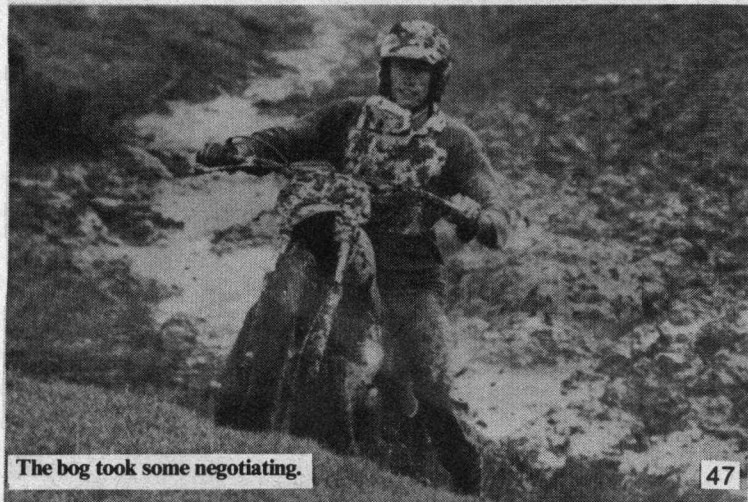

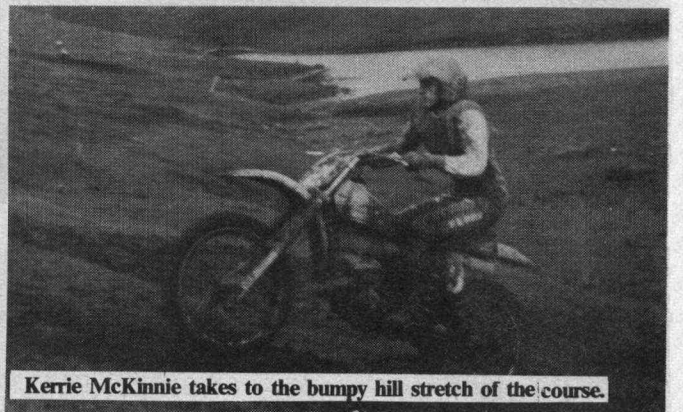

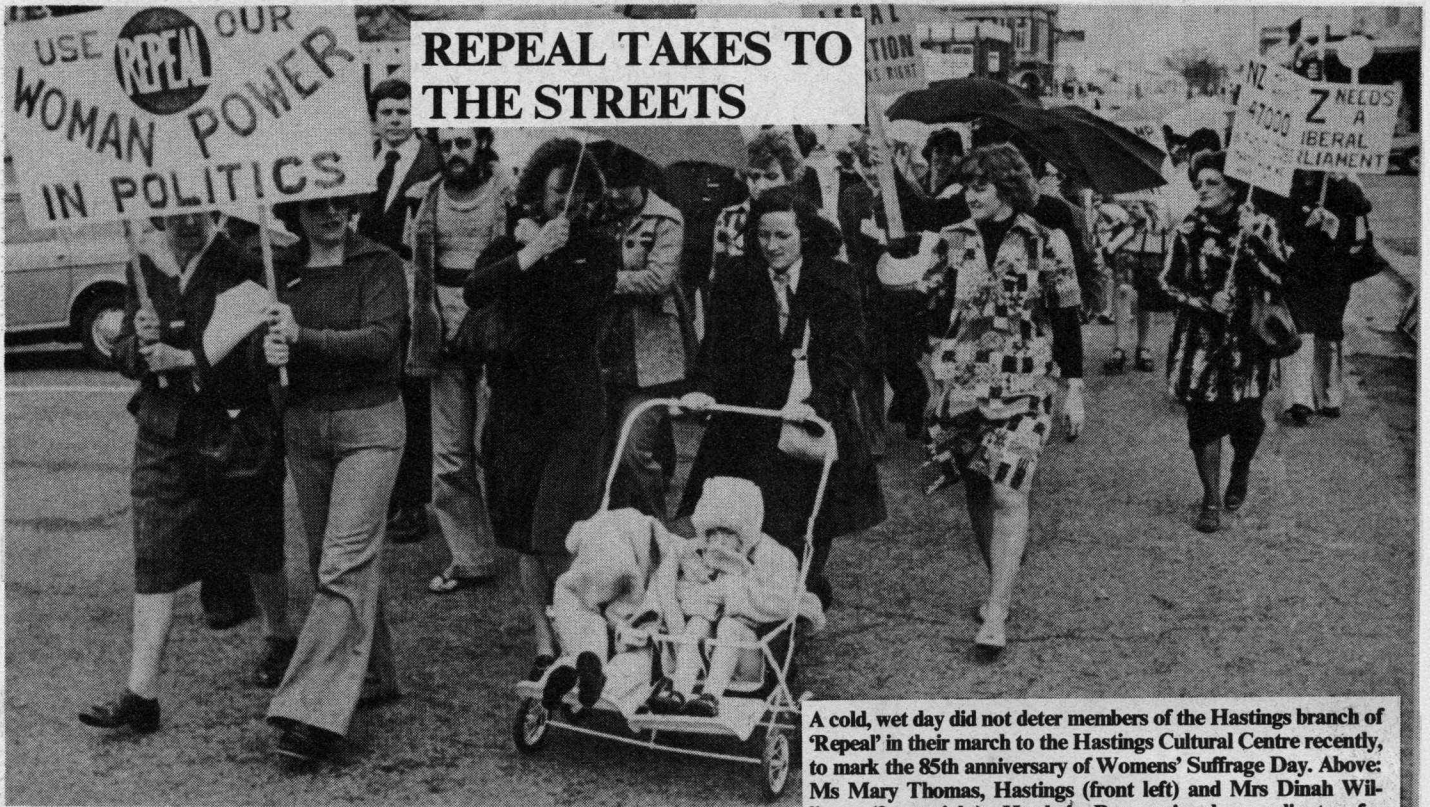

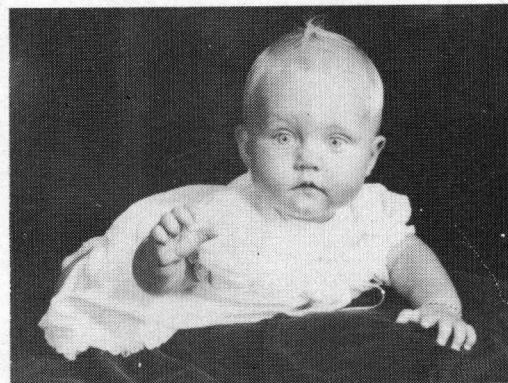
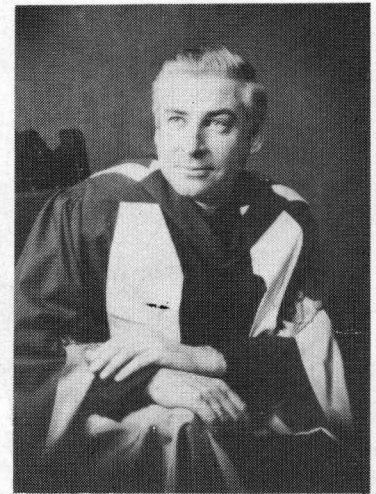
