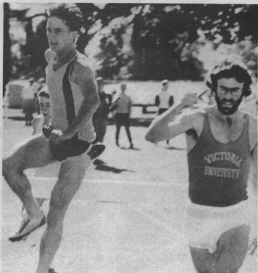

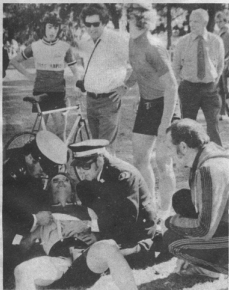

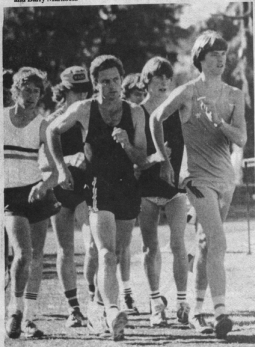

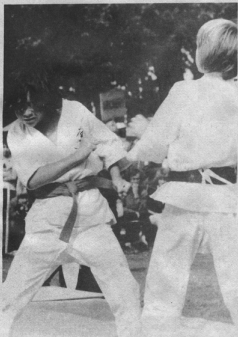

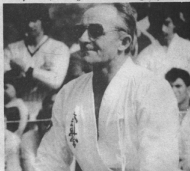

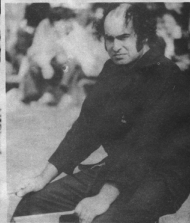

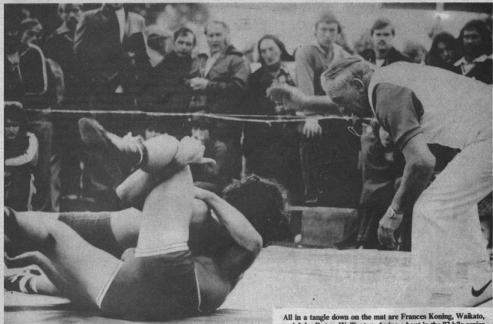

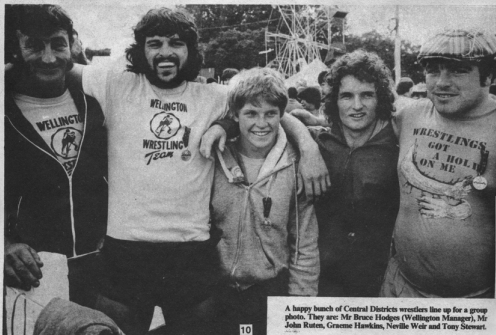

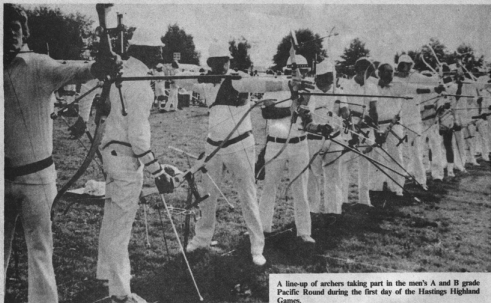

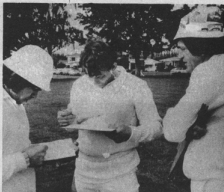

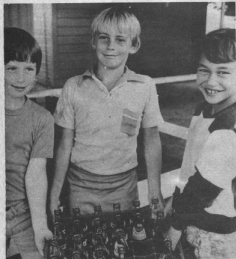

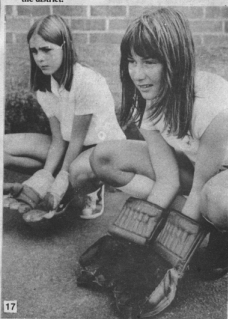

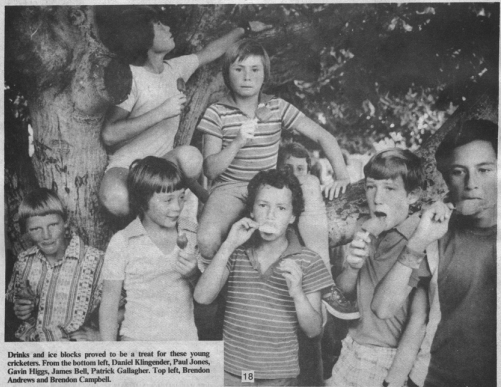

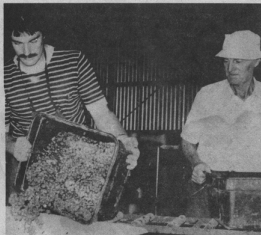

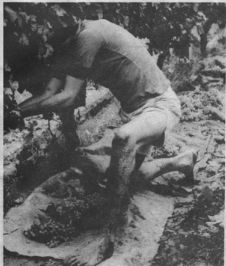

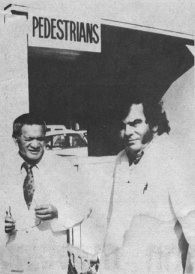

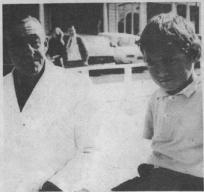

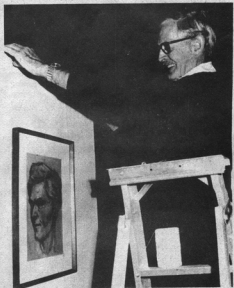

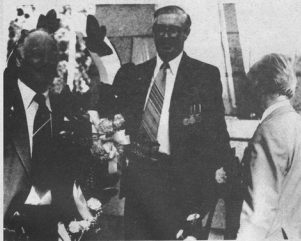

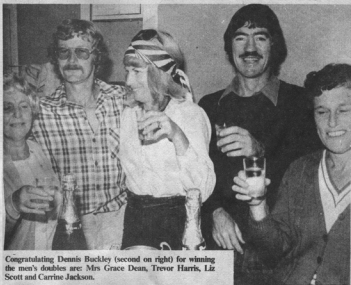

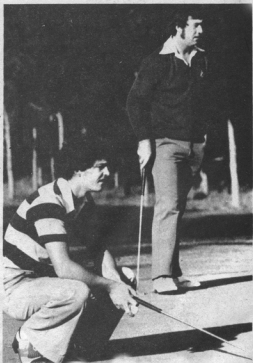


Flaxmere Golf
