

WED 1<sup>ST</sup> DECEMBER 1915

A fine day to start with. Ned Smith's last lambs took the shear bales and fodge to Compton. John & M. Baumgart shifted sheep into the paddocks they were in before shearing, big mob on Back, all front paddocks open to the others. Eric took car to Peter Stevenson and he put it right - something simple paid 2/- Put in row of peas today and transplanted some cabbage plants, fear the place where put in garden too shady.

All but "we two" motored to Kermerviel to a concert. M. Baumgart too.

THURSDAY A very fine day, naked in exposed in shady places in garden.

Alice & Charlie came, after dinner all motored to Hughes & burnt off blackberries near house. Eric painting house. John with Duke & Dennis and dice on Back. In the evening Arthur Stevenson & I went bought eggs & lamb.

FRI 3 A very fine day. W. Lewis got his sheep shorn by Mr. Stevenson. Ted Rollers and Charley Hulvers came at midday. M. Baumgart went to Hastings. John digging turnip ground on Back. Started to fence it just in 2 streamers. All but "we two" at Concert in Rosewood. M. Resimo with Norm.

SAT 4 Another very fine day, helped M. Lewis and Arthur Stevenson press their 3 bales of wool. Put in straw in ploughed ground and put 2 stages to corner strainer. John with dice, Iarnie Eric and Douglas at pictures.

SUN 5 A very fine day. John went fishing with J. Tordleton and caught a small trout. After dinner all motored to Compton & when I got off we went to Uncle. The others went with J. Resimo to his mother in Worthing and came back to Uncle when J. Selby was picking out his fat lambs to be sent to Wellington in the morning, and his ewes to be shorn at Dairies.

MON 6 Made a hurdle for new gateway before going out to work at fence. Opened gateway at strainer near gully on Flat-Back. John digging. Mairi and Eric Motors to Compton. M. Baumgart and others went past in train for Dunthorpe. M. Baumgart for Wellington. Paid 15/- Open for separator £2.5.6. Mum has letter from Middleton Bookell. The "four" has a spin to Back today.

TU 7

DEC 3 1915

WED 8 A fine day, rain showering, none came, worked at fence line, big hole on fence line to be filled up - an uprooted tree. John with dice and hamers. Then house boat letter to T. Selly re fat lambs, caught young rabbit on flat for Arthur. All hands but me at pictures tonight. Arthur gone with the crowd.

WED 8 Windy today, worked at fence, put in some heavy wooden posts, filled big hole on fence line. John finished harvesting, drilled in some swedes and with Jolly & Duke舞 a bit lame. Eva did some painting and lawn tennis.

THU 9 A very fine day, worked at fence until dinner time, then met and with Mam Eva & Arthur to see both uncles, they were both up and looking as usual. John finished drilling in turnips at midday and went to Yorkton.

FRIDAY 10 A warm day, finished 1<sup>st</sup> plow of fence around turnips, started on long chain over hill, much levelling and filling up. Good digging excellent soil. W. Baumgart back from Wellington. Mam Eva and he gone tonight to P. Church where he & W. Harvey will have a farewell dinner.

SAT 11 Another warm day, worked at fence, good digging, big heavy wooden posts. All but we two at pictures tonight. W. Hodson bad. Dr. Allanson him.

SUN 12 A very fine day, went over to see W. Hodson, he is in pain in bed, can scarcely speak. So just left him, tells me it is a bad case. Mam Grace and Arthur gone in phætor to Fortilsen, a fishing picnic. Mam & Eva at E Church and at P Church at night. W. Baumgart comes late.

MON 13 Worked at fence all day, all wires stapled on posts, rails up at ends of fences. The fence is fit to keep sheep & cattle back until bottoms are over. Out of £ 11. 1 - 1 Cheque Mackie bill is paid. Mam Eva Grace & Arthur, W. Baumgart and Grant W. P. G. (part brother) motored to Daerwicks. The men loaded for Yorkton.

TUE 14 Killed the 3 ewes whilst Eva & John got in back sheep. T. Selly

Came at 9.30 and picked out 20% fat lambs at £ 1 per lb. No lambs sold. At church bill Friday, let back sheep go to their paddock. Started the reported lambs. Went to Haleness with Jolly. 26 lambs picked here.

WED 16 Saturday D E C 1915

A hot good shearing day, shore 100 and put to ice shed for tomorrow.

After tea Eva had a few rounds in meadow with mowing machine.

TH 16 Another hot day for shearing. Denver dogs came from Hallock with 36 fat lambs and waited here until the cool of the evening. Looked <sup>out</sup> of ours, as near as they could be counted. There was great difficulty in getting them on to road. John went with Denver to Diamond<sup>2</sup> with them & yarded them. They are to be trucked early in the morning for the Gear Cr. Denver came back and stays here tonight and leaves at 4 am tomorrow to truck sheep. Mam & Eva motored to Bonnerwick. A swarm of bees in front room, came down chimney. News that Mr. Baumgart was rejected in Treadwell. 18 lambs to shear.

FR 17 Finished shearing the lambs, shore 70 & black and colored ones. Put 49

in Reserve - mothers, dry ewes, and 4 rams. Put out on Back 383. everything counted. on Ridges & Meadows 318 everything counted. 745 total. All hands work at the hay in the afternoon and turned it, nice trifol.

SAT 18 Rain great part of the day. A great deal of the heavy crop of oats partly flattened.

John came home - case of benzine brain trouble. Letter from Wm & Kitchell and catalogue giving prices of seed sold. 7 bush x 8 rod 18<sup>1/2</sup>. 8 x 8 rod fine 16<sup>1/2</sup> one bush of bellies 1<sup>1/2</sup> on foot of looks & pieces 7. all good prices. Eva and Douglas out on Back found a black & white dog having a lamb tucked up between two logs or under a log, barking at it, brought dog home; has registered collar on. All but us two gone to pictures tonight, raining steadily, oats flattened. Sent Postal dues to J Shaw Fitchell 876 Scranton Street, Hoboken N.J., 2 years account.

SUN 19 A dull cloudy day. Wind and saw Mr. Treadwell, he is weak but not in pain.

Mam & Eva at forenoon church & at St. Oldenham's. John fishing, caught one.

TUE 20 An open sunny day. Put Reserve sheep 36 on Hedges. 8 rams in Reserve.

After dinner all hands turned hay. Mattered to Uncle with Mam & Eva. Met

Mr. Baumgart at town. He came back with us and helped to get in hay.

Two wagons. One on road, late when finished. Mam Eva & Mr. Baumgart met me again.

DEC 1916

- A very hot day. John cutting remainder of hay. dry, potatoes yesterday  
and today, also pulled peas and beans. red potatoes very good, they are either  
Beauty of Hebron or early rose. Two ladies with babies called Mr. Harris and  
another. Mann & Son at pictures, they charged George at Simpsons for £3.0.0  
WED 22 The usual hot day. John went with Mr. Baumgart to his place with man wagon  
until dinner time, afterwards all hands turned hay prepared foundation  
in pool enclosure for stack of hay as sheds will not hold all the hay. dry grass.  
THU 23 Held up a row of potatoes before we went at the hay, dull and close, calm; got  
them in 3 loads when rain came on at 1.30. Mr. Baumgart helping after he  
came back from showing new minister over his farms. a load put in near  
shed and two loads in hay shed. Torrents of rain fell in the afternoon, nearly  
a third of the hay out in this rain. The less in chimney smoked & fired out.  
FRI 24 Mann & Son motored to Omand & and met Gert Will, Bessie & Betty.  
~~WED 22~~ Archie Erickson came in forenoon. Mr. Baumgart went to township  
on an invitation to dinner. He killed a young goose to see what it would be.  
too close & hot to kill a lamb, bought him off from butcher and took a ham.  
At night all but 'the two' went to township, much hanging up of stockings.  
XMAS DAY A thorough wet morning, young ones enjoyed themselves very much  
+ the two over their toys and stockings. Presents for older ones too. At breakfast  
Mr. Baumgart wanted to go to Colinston and tea drove him immediately after  
dinner but there being only one express train today instead of two he was late and  
had to come back. He John and Archie walked to the pictures tonight. The others  
motored and took Arthur. Bobbie's son John took her to Gorisbyke's full.  
SUN 26 A dull cool morning. All but children Mann & Son left in car for home  
soon after 9 o'clock. In the afternoon Mrs. Gert, Arthur, Archie & Mr. Baumgart drove up  
to Agassiz. Arthur is to stay a while with his sister. They brought her on with me to  
Goodsons, he found something on the road for Arthur. Mr. Baumgart has tea in township.

MON 27

D E C 1915

♦ More rain this morning. John drove Mr. Barnard to Ormond's for by train to Palmerston. Ormond's boats postponed, much rain in the forenoon. Ella came in the afternoon and John & I drove her home and stayed at Grants a while. Rain tonight and cold like winter. No cheques for lambs yet. "Held today, no bill shown" TUES 28 Another showery day. Grace got a line of clothes out but only some got partly dry. ~~John~~ John went fishing but got only one or two. He got lamb cheque £209-1-7. In this is included exchange 9/- each lamb bought £1-6/- less 10/- over the whole number. 173 lambs at 7/- the at 6/- per lb. £6-0/- - £109 the at 6/- per lb. This sale is very satisfactory.

WED 29 Much rain fell today, no work done between showers. John got cheques cashed in Rosewood Bank. Letter from Ella, rain down country, very dry before. Received George's letter. Mr. H. and Douglas Grant went to Christchurch. Ella, Maria & Jean here.

THUR 30 A fine day after all the rain. Sent letter to Frank at Palmerston and A.W. Davis to G Armstrong. Joe V came at breakfast time and helped us turn over

~~the~~ ~~the~~ shade out the hay. He and I finished at 2 o'clock and John went with 2 horses and mowing machine at dinner time to his very rough paddocks and out until night. Letter from Mr. Barnard. Doctor de Gaulle called about a rooster.

FRI 31 A fine day for haymaking, busy for loading, got it all in rakes cover. Joe Vaughan fishing, his man in one of the wagons. Mrs. & Little sent wool cheque £205-10-11. The cheque comes from Darnmoreside and is on Bank of A.D. Darnmoreside. Hibberts cheques have been in all cases on a Safety Bank which suits me best. All but two tailors in the township tonight, on a visit. Archie too, he was a good help today getting in the hay.

SAT 1 J A N 1916

SUN 2 A very fine New Years Day. Archie left for King Country. Ella & Jean stayed here, the others of us went to Ormond's. I took man & phaeton to Warkworth. It has been a little warmer than usual these last few days, better today, facilities cloudy, foggy. Chopping and running us at sports, articles auctioneera, bid 5/- for gun, 10/- for flag, price more than 10/- When we came home Mum tea for Basil and Betty here.

SUN 2

JAN 1916

~~MON 3~~ A calm day, the company about going away for a pic nic but soon rain fell, enough to dampen the ground, they gathered mushrooms and went for a walk over the paddocks instead. At night Eve & Ella went to church.

~~TUE 4~~ A breezy day. Mum Eve, Gerl & Ida, dear mother & I drove to Danversville. Office closed. John rode round and made inquiries about rafra lamb, home potatoes and in the afternoon walked at turnip fence, fairly high wind. Sent few books.

~~WED 5~~ ~~7 AM~~, the surgeon came at breakfast time, borrowed rate. John working at his place all day, home late, very rough ground, the towns of women and young girls visited river. Gerl & children left by 6 o'clock train. Went to Hughes with Frithkin & sledges, brought back posts for turnip fence and 17 stakes for rafra dividing fence, finished putting in posts in turnip fence. Went to pictures as usual.

Sent wool chequy drawn on Danversbank, to Wm & Hilda to be put in Union Bank. Sent a year's subscription for Herald - \$4. to Diminidie Walker & Co Napoli.

~~THUR 6~~ A fine day. John went early to town for Eve and finished late tired of the rough job of pointing stakes for dividing rafra. Put traps across it with Eve, about 9 chains.

~~FRI 7~~ Drove stakes across rafra paddock and stapled on wire netting, heavy crop of rafra, should have been divided before rafra grew up! Letter from W. Daemont.

6 AM rode over to Rankins to know if his lambs are fat, sick. Cannot tell. Lamb not sold yet.

~~SAT 8~~ All sheep except burns and 38 doves on Hughes put through gates today. Picked out & saddled 336 good breeding ewes, 149 on Widesump. Ewe 197. On a spiff 57 lambs and 12 call ewes with them, 87 ewe lambs, 39 of them on Widesump, 47 on Back, and 3 call lambs on Back. 102 call ewes, 42 of them on Hughes. On Hughes now 80. Killed an old ewe this evening for dogs. All ewes and lambs looking well, much fat.

~~SUN 9~~ A very fine day for carting in hay. Went with John man & wagon & carted in all Joe's hay. W. Quade & Harry also carting and two men forking up. Mum Eve and all at home came in car had his rice in pocket. Pictures tonight. John in bed.

~~MON 10~~ Still calm day. Mum Eve & Max to church twice to Daemont. John at Mortenson's. Grace and Arthur walked over to Thorncroft. Mushrooms very plentiful.

Mr. McElroy at Holman's at 5:30 this morning. John rode up to see him but he was gone without taking any lambs, they were not fat enough. He came round to Mr. Ross's where John saw him and then brought in Hughes sheep and the lambs off the rafte. He picked out 12 wethers and 14 ewes and 28 lambs the latter being sheep are only worth \$8 per head instead of \$12, the owner took them away at once. John cut a light lot of meat at Theodore's. All but Jim and I motored to Danneville, home at dinner time, afterwards Eva, mom & I went to Ella's, her father not well, Auntie Florie & Dorothy there, afterwards went to Diamond's house a little better, his memory has come back somewhat.

TU 11 A hot cabin day. John goes to Waipukaua side, did not buy lambs as they went to high to make any thing out of them. rafte down country beginning to fade, lambs bought up to eat it, woolly lambs 17¢ doos 14¢, the sheep lambs 17¢ per lb behind woolly ones. All but one at the pictures tonight.

Made a partition in front to separate calves, and prevent sucking each other.

WED 12 A dry warm day. Got in Reserve sheep, picked out 4 lambs & 6 ewes & put them on the rafte. Put 28 in Reserve a lamb individual, 37 on West, all old and in good condition. All but John & another goes to Methodist pic nics.

He went to Makalaha side, did not buy. Rafe lambs 17¢, weaner calves 12-15. Eva & Mom motored to Ora & met this Mr. Ross. Price blacksmith bill - \$10.15 out of 26 change.

TH 13 Joe Burhan brought the rafte home, one shaft splintered. Caught in a gateway. Pulled the bag at Theodore's and took it home in one load.

Pressed lamb wool in two bales, one light one. John goes to see about a rafte & binder. The Company motored to Manawatu and had their pic nics.

D. H. Cameron blacksmiths bill 75¢ paid yesterday. Weather continues fine.

FR 14 Made & painted frame of gate. Company out in car and phone visiting.

SAT 15 Selected 2 lots of lamb wool to Ora & one bought back 3 bags of Sheep Dip. Cut with mowing machine 2 sheep runs out this Williamson run. Got change \$11.6.9 from Longburn 48 lambs 22 sheep. All hands at W. Walsh's tea & tennis and pictures tonight.

SUN 16

JAN 1916

The usual warm summer day. Mr. Hodson passed away this morning. Many present. All the company went to Church, John fishing, caught some, one big. In the afternoon Mr. and Mrs. Selby came in a hurry for me to come and see their father as he was about to undergo an operation. Dr. Hatch and Dawson present. Also Negro Mr. Ross. The doctors consider that an operation should have taken place a good while earlier. They cannot say at present whether this one will be successful or not. Stayed until 9.30 when Dr. Hatch with Mann came to see the patient. Isa & Mr. Hatch in car on road. Came home with them. Before the operation Uncle gave me instructions what to do about his property.

TUE 17 Went with Doctor at 9 a.m. to see uncle, stayed until Dr. rightly visit, and then came home with him. Isa Mann & Mr. Hatch in car. Mann saw Uncle very low.

THUR 19 Doctor again called for me at 9 a.m. Uncle worse than yesterday. Doctor says

Willie just arrived. Mary Horris & Ella there. Mr. Selby called & Miss Shaw. Nurse Mr. Head attending, very good and attentive. Stayed all day at 4 p.m. Dr. and Mann came. Patient quieting, no hopes now. came home with Mann & Dr. John & Hazel went to Mayflower sale; did not buy. Lamb too dear. Adrienne came with scapins & binders and cut most of the sale. Miss H. Mac left by express. Funeral of Mr. Hodson. All his relatives present, sorry I was unable to go.

WED 20 Pleasant fine dry day. Went with Dr. to see uncle, heating heavily all day long.

FRI 22 Mr. Hastings came and Ada. Dr. will not come again, can do no good. Sports at Somerswood, in aid of women's soldiers. Fred & children came by express. They all went sports and came with car in evening & brought me home.

SAT 23 A fine day, a slight shower in the afternoon. Mr. Head came early to see about digging but John & P. Riggs went to Long sale. Rock Truskell to see Uncle but he passed away at 8 a.m. Back to Diamond's saw Mr. Buckley, Mr. Wilson who is in charge of Cemetery. Mr. Bamboe about digging grave, came home and went back in car with Isa Mann. Fred & children all went to Uncle, Fred & children home by express.

SAT 23 John and Riggs bought 68 lambs at 13 $\frac{1}{2}$ , have all right divided them this morning.

JAN 1916

Mr. McLeod and John brought his (100) ewes & lambs to be dipped last rain  
 Coming on dipping was deferred. Mine from W. Fournier, coming by express.  
 We all went in car & phæton to funeral. C. C. Smith there. Heavis & Col left at 3.30  
 A service in the church. Rain fell most of the time. Bill went home by 5 o'clock  
 train. Neighbors acted as pall bearers. After leaving cemetery went to J. Brincks  
 Will read by T. Hastings. W. Hastings present. Property left equally between  
 Ella and Willy. Ella sole executrix. Contrary to expectations and statement made  
 to me and Willy by his late Father I am not mentioned at Trustee. We came  
 home in car and John came in phæton and drove H. Leeks sheep home undipped.

TUE 22 Much rain today. Metred with Eva & Miss Williamson to Willie's in the rain.

Had a talk over farm matters w/ Henn & Eva attended Anderson's sale.  
 Letter from W. Hobble, wool sale postponed. weight of 2 lake lambs. 3. 3. 4 and 2. 1. 4

Also amount sale of 2 sheepskins realising 12 1/4 worth and put to my acct. in R.R.

MON 21 Light rain all day. John rode to Oron<sup>2</sup> to see T. Sibby about small number of  
 lambs. Did not see him. Mr. Thodson just come for milk. walked with her  
 and Mam over to see Mr. Thodson Son. Mam saw Miss Williamson & their church twice.

TUE 22 Metred to Oron<sup>2</sup> with Eva John & Miss Williamson, latter went in train down

John got 91 lambs from T. Sibby at 15/-, put them on flat. Metred from  
 Oron<sup>2</sup> up & saw Willie back to Oron<sup>2</sup>. took Horrie & luggage to railway station.  
 Then Eva Mam two W. Thodsons to see Sartnups and on to Dawsonville. Willie  
 John in the evening turned most of the wet calvears. Mrs. Nordby called  
 about dipping tomorrow and also Miss H. Leek. Bert Rigger paid 20. 14. 14  
 as his half of price of 68 lambs. Sheep to be sent to William & Kettle 41. 15. 3

THU 25 Sent letter to W. Hollister, Palmerston North and charged £100 - 2 - 1

for drill. W. H. Leek dipped his sheep 289. John helped him drive them

as H. Nordby dipped his ewes 285. G. Holona dipped his lambs 73. Sibby  
 picked 86 fat lambs. Drivor took them away. We picked 7 fat on ropes 99 sheep 19 mostly  
 but on that 109 did ewes. 36 reject lambs. Some of these for Hughes. Mr. Thompson called about  
 800 P.M. and says we

as we will be shipped 237 lambs yesterday. We spent half a day shearing on Mission

Bagley and motored him home again. A deer has sheep & lambs in gas tonight.  
Mr. & Mrs. Douglas Grant home today. Children left here for their home today.  
Sent Cheque to Mr. Shattock for the 68 lambs got at Onga Onga £45-18-0 paid £20-11-2

Piggins oblige to Union Bank to be pleased to my credit. Days warm & calm.

THURS 27 A thorough wet day out shearing again. Mrs. Eva Miss Williamson Mr.  
R. & S. Grant and Mr. McEachern to Lammerville. Willy Tokkelson called.

The girls gathered mushrooms. I Piggins called to talk about Ella's & Willy's farm  
Receipt from Hawks Bay Farmers Co op Assn. Paid £1-14-9

FRI 28 All horses motored to Lammerville, looked on at sale sheep shear. Left letter  
of explanation with manager of Hawks Bay Farmers Co op. Assn. Paid £1-14-9  
County rates. Got change for five pounds Cheque from Mr. McEachern. Paid £2 and 10/-  
to Walter Mortimer and Harold Olson respectively for 2 pigs and 3 steers.  
All but we two at concert tonight. I send off to Mr. Swarbrick, enlisted.

SAT 29 A fine day, trying, sheared the living down sheep. After dinner ladies motored  
to see Mr. & Mrs. to river, went with them to Simpkins bought 3p hat. John went to Peter Simpkins

and brought home a pup. Most of them at pictures tonight. At factory office today

SUN 30 Another day. Ride to town & saw Constable Mr. Lee about Mr. Theodore & the Will

He says it is desirable to see a solicitor, more satisfactory we find dinner and

Although a great deal of oats is out in stock and sheared on ground not dry.

MON 15

FEBRUARY

1916

A close sultry day and big clouds. Started to cart oats and make stack, shears too wet in middle giving symptoms of decay and would heat and rot. All hands turned out, cut the twice less and spread shears out. Between 4 and 5 o'clock heavy rain came on and oats is again rotted. Got W. H. Head's cheque - \$25 for dipping. Mr. Love dipped 1500 lambs. All but us two at pictures tonight. A gentleman from Teekopan called about a horse that he was in charge of belonging to a friend of his at the front, and was promised and is now in the hands of Hobart.

Another hot day, tea some of the oats with Haw, hammered the young bull and ~~the~~ put him into Wedgewood with the young horses, put two of the best looking horses with cows to beffet in calf. Tea finished and got down W. Tokkelson and we had and got 4 loads to stack, just rough shears and a rough looking stack. Got Geers cheque for 86 lambs at 18/- each. If the lambs wool patches of per lb. the lambs will be worth 2½ each. Sent cheque to Union Bank. See Mann at Glees.

A very fine day, Mr. Grant, Mr. Long and Billy helping at the harvesting. Two wagons carting in part of the time an ugly stack took Billy home after tea and went for him in the evening, oats quite dry, sent cheque £79.4. net.

Very dry days of rain in the morning, but we went on with the getting in of the oats.

We got all in by 11 o'clock, not nearly enough to have the stack which is too big and requires another truckload. Some rain after we finished, top shears damp. Sat 3 John went early with C. Malone to Ongu Ongu did not buy anything, stack too high.

All the others went to Laramieville, bought back 15x15 feet log panels from Rasmussen.

Put it over stack just before rain. Mann paid Anderson bill £5.10. 3 out of £16.00 cheque, paid Rose limited for cow & calf bought at last November rate £7.14. 0

After dinner Eva came home to see Uncle much better. After Church she & Williamson and Mann after diphtheria Miss Gurnaway at her home in heavy rain came for me. Pictures lighter.

Got in shop off Hughes & Hall also rope lambs. J. Salley grey & white came in the morning rain, picked out 110 more & 64 lambs to be trucked on Wed. But 167 missed on Hughes and left on flat for a day or two. Miss Williamson left for Aspin.

A hot day, no rain. Sheep lamb good condition passed in at 14/- owner wanted 14/- Had afternoon tea at W. Grant's. Bad news in papers. General Townshend surrendered with 9,000 soldiers to the Turks, the latter say 15,000. An insurrection in Ireland confined chiefly to Dublin, by the Sinn Feins propagated by Germans, a great amount of destruction and bloodshed. Jewelry and other shops looted etc. Returns to hand for sheep sent to Longburn, unsatisfactory. Lambs 14/- and one other sent not mentioned, weight of lambs 29 lbs at 5 $\frac{1}{2}$  and 5 $\frac{3}{4}$  guineas 8 lbs nearly 82 lbs at 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ . THU 5 A slight white frost this morning. Eva had to shift Dr. Welch about to sofa car to his and give it a run to warm it up, but first we pushed it along and got it high. Miss O'Brien's car also struck at German time. Went by Cromond & Popata wharf, a bad road, got 2 rams paid £2. 2 each on bigger & heavier than the others, both good mouth, came home by Cromon Line very heavy rain all the afternoon, coming from Cromond. Manager wants the book.

Feb 23 ~~1917~~ A wet forenoon, 700 ewes round by A.B. Morrison and C.P. Anderson very rested and divided in yards here. John dug out Col-thistles and shot 8 hens.

Feb 24 ~~1917~~ A fine day. John got in some lambs off Hughes and took back 1100m and 3 full lambs. Put 182 lambs and one fixed-up ewe on the 2 acres of rope - untouched. Got in Widders and Reserve sheep and went through them. Put 210 tooth ewes on Ridge and 30 on Rivers Flat. Put 24 ewe lambs in Reserve. Put 140 full ewes and 20 others on Hughes. 134 good breeding ewes in shed packed tonight 7 full lambs amongst sheep. All but 3 of us motored to Darrovicke. Paid £572-4-0 Cheques to C.L. Nielsen, out of which he deducted his account to 170-2-5. The old Ford car suffered a puncture beyond Matamau, had to go on as it was, no spare wheel or any means of rectifying it. Brought home one 2m and a spare wheel. A decent concert tonight. Harr and Eda there.

Feb 25 ~~1917~~ Back sheep got in before breakfast bagged all ewes. Put on back 450 good ewes and 3 lambs. On Hughes 125 ewes and 3 lambs. Widders 113 ewes 5 lambs. Reserve 121 ewe lambs and 20 two tooth ewes on Rivers Flat. 9 rams on flat. On rope 182 lambs and 1 ewe. Total 720 ewes, 314 lambs, 9 rams, sold 16 ewes, 395 lambs. Total before any were sold 736 ewes and 709 lambs. Rain came on before we could finish bagging the lambs, some of which are very bad. Alice & Chas. Petersen

Feb 26 ~~1917~~ A fine day. John & Freddy went fishing to Agamore, caught 15. home late they milked 7½ cows late. All of us but one motored to Urchies to Sheepwash walked over the pastures with H.V. abundance of feed, big Romney sheep. At 7pm went with Harr & Cos & W.M. Walter to Church, not many people there.

A very fine warm day. Dipped 86 lambs for Poyothorne paid 7/- Got in Reserve lamb tagged & dipped them & put back - 112. W. Torkilson came to us after day for dipping. H. Hart and S. Fredericksen had 82 of them come by Hart he paid 10/- S. F will pay later on. We dipped 7 lambs and with 7 others put them on the sage. Got in 200s of fat and those off Hughes picked out 12 ewes of the best and put them on Ridge, 115 ewes here now and 5 lambs. Put back on Hughes 202 call ewes and a few small lambs. Heavy the WED 28 244 Motors to Takapau Sports with Mom and Eva. Met Gert and Tom. Sports less than formerly. Will went back home. Gert & children come with us. Went over with them to Alice's yards. Spotted a pig that we intend to buy & fatten for killing.

MARCH 1917

THURS 1 A fine day. Mum, Gert and I restored to Dannevirke, got back early. John finished ploughing out stubbles. Long potatoes fair crop of white Mamahoki potatoes inferior. Mrs Nordby came with part of his flock to be dipped tomorrow. Sarah M<sup>r</sup> Satchwell, came up by coach & holiday in Dickson. FRIDAY A very fine day for dipping. Put through 93 for Mrs. Stoddle, a third or so of them woolly lambs. Alice and C. Helena running up. Mum & car load went to Alice's. As usual up to there, you work, making money and building castles.

SAT 3 A dull doubtful looking day. C. Helena come and then got in last sheep and dipped, put back and put 2 Romney and 42 Down rams with 330 ewes on lamb with them. Dipped Widenups 167 including 120 two teeth. put 3 s. down rams with them. Dipped the 9 rams, 3 pets and 2 strange lambs. total 581 today. Mum & the crowd went to Rosewood, changed a £3 cheque. Most of them at Pictures. Three of four late lambs amongst ewes on Widenups. Painter Olson dips on Monday.

SUN 4 A fine day. John and W. Torkilson fishing up Mamahoki. 7 Boys appearing up that way. After dinner Eva, Mum, Gert & I restored up the heavy shower fell, not beyond bounds. At night Eva, Mum & Sarah at Church wrote a letter to Superintendent State Fire Insurance.

TUE 6 A fine day rain threatening none came. Gert and barns flourished with tea and Mann in Choo. John died, some with disease and 3 horses. He divided lambs 50 in Reserve, 12 & Reserve flat. 13 in meadow. Slaged and gravel to 5<sup>th</sup> flat.

TUE 6 H Nordby and C Helena dipped 945 sheep for latter paid £1.25. Constable H. Head came and spoke about selling his farm and buying some of Sanderson's Kipuna land, gave particulars in writing as to terms. Took train to Hastings was met at station by Eva and Will, acquainted Will about H. Head's place, after talking the matter over with Gert and considering that he may have to go to the war and that it would in that case suit her to live on, agreed to take the place at the figure and terms mentioned. This decision was come to before Wednesday morning WED 7. A fine day in Pakowhai. All came to Hastings and saw Will off in afternoon train after spending great part of day at Autumn Show. John met him at Ormonde 4<sup>th</sup> with buggy. He paid H. Head deposit £400.

THU 8 Another fine day. Eva and Mann met Will at Hastings station. He brought me Bank slip Hastings, Village & Hill, price 1/- for me £337.16-4<sup>th</sup> 10<sup>th</sup> 12<sup>th</sup> 14<sup>th</sup> 16<sup>th</sup> 18<sup>th</sup> 20<sup>th</sup> A color cloudy day. Mam also went up to hall with our car wagon & brought home sandwiches my box of bass uncole bought by ourselves. Cost  $\$0.00$  -  $\$0.6$  brought in by E. guess & name of game "Mickey" guessed by ten and won by Ella Grant. A cake brought in, by guessing the weight, to a guess to a doll & 1-1 guessing name. Two sheep donated by Mr. Meaking a large amount, and 2 ton of shaff  $\$3.10 - 0$ . The whole affair brought in  $\$50$  or more. Put up netting where trees are to be planted in Reserve and collected stakes etc. The 10 hedgeh taken out and 10 rows put in their places in Reserve flat. John took in another section of green turnips and killed a lamb. Eva rode over Morni. See Mam Mr. & Miss Allen visits Mr. Oldershaw.

A Spring day, warm and mild, drove Lakes fenced plantation and planted some trees. Eva rode over paddocks & dug her garden. John returns Grady's goods.

A 70 year old wagman called for a feed. Mam gave him a blow out & the eating to Grants & dinner, note "Twin". Mam also to church John & son to Cockshaws.

Mam got up late last night and this morning, washing soon before some of us got up. Very fine day. dug up sledged away and planted pine trees (spare ones) in pine rope plantation, fenced and planted now with gun Jane while she sat in. John worked at lookout fence. Eva in her garden. A warm good growing day.

Rain last night and this morning. Eva found another of Hills was drowned. This makes the 3<sup>rd</sup>. Think they went in after watercress. Mam and Eva motored to Allentown. 

On Reserve 122 ewe lambs, amongst them 13 wefters make up the 122. No trucks until 2.30 tomorrow, a big one in our shea paddock tonight. Today Roydon's Kordby Hamer Land ewes make 47 & to be trucked tomorrow.

Eva & Mr. Walker motored to Darnaville after tea, brought back Ham & George. Put on Back 74 ewes & wefters 250 more off Reserve. Off Hughes 237. Total 4 Ram 150

TUES 23 JOHN drove the big one of 47 & fat ewes & lambs owned by various Hawkesbury farmers to Cromond<sup>2</sup> and with the assistance of A. J. Hanmer we put them in trucks for 2.30 train. John went with them to Nepean 35 miles & 30 in bottom of the George left by express. A hawkie called. Ham bought cloth from him, pair of shorts £1.00. Tonight Ham & Eva at Methodist Sunday School Annual meeting.

Very high wind today, down up to hall in express with Mam Eva & Mr. Walker took 2 carts forewood a variety of goods for a jumble sale & 2 roosters from Fosdile took charge of a sheep for gassing purposes, a 2 tooth wether weight 60 lbs worn by 2 people & bell fitted for 57 guineas. sale gassing bill & kitten gassing we bought for Red Cross. Pictures at night. children asleep came home before the storm. drove up a pecan tree for Mam Eva and parcels, home not till after 12 o'clock.

DRIVE up to Hughes and carted home load of firewood. Sent Anna Lee to <sup>minister</sup> Com. TH 25. WED. A calm again after yesterday's storm. John came up by coach, was at Gates. Picked out 34 of the best old ones left on Hughes & some - 29 of them, and put them on <sup>leaves</sup> ground. Put 35 of them on road, one was unable to stand. Killed for dogs, in good condition.

At night all but Grace & kids went to see conjurers in hall, enjoyed a good entertainment.

FRIDAY Bagged and dipped (a second time) 97 rape lambs on flat tonight.

Kept out of them & for killing undipped. Dipped Reserve lambs - 123. fourteen with lambs amongst them. Another puppy from Lounds, 5 dogs now. Mam Eva at Allens.

SAT 27. A beautiful day, rained some rain on flat for chaff cutter excepting here on Tuesday night. 

SAT 2 ~~1<sup>st</sup>~~ Borodino allowed a few day yesterday for shifting, the usual thing to do, snow shown. All hands from two houses motored to Danvershire. Attended Patriotic meeting. The usual applications for aid, soon to start in business, bought small bag illustration postals for 15¢ each of them 20c. Repaired, influenza, Mam window glazing, gave her a \$5 check, she paid William Shultz bill £2.2.5.

SUN 3 ~~2<sup>nd</sup>~~ Another wintry day. Mam & Ida motored to church and back again, no one there, then on to Concord. Also brought over Blum over from Mamie.

One of the greatest days ever Horwood saw. A great procession started from Harties corner motor cars and all sorts of vehicles decorated soldiers in uniform, boy scouts, fabrication band, civilians over 70000 marching tall. Britannia and representatives of allies, all marched and met on school grounds. Tea and coffee served out, children's races and prizes for all little ones, more money prizes for older boys and girls. Day of our men between Horwood & Sydenham, former won. Speeches made at end and thanks to all. Rain light set in at finish and increased, continued all night. In the forenoon before starting for procession John and Eva got back 5½ acres into saps just in time. At night Ham & Eva started to Dm - Mr. Morris. a procession held there.

Not much noise or rejoicing in Davenports, too much influenza and deaths, many deaths it is said in Fontham camp Wellington and other places. Robertshaw, Ham & John had rain last night, took up this forenoon. Rain I think it was 5-16-6 out of a forty pound charge, also W H Thomson for 5 cases of benzine £7-10-6. Then Mr. Bryant £4-13-0 a man received 3/- discount. Ham & Eva started to Davenports John took horses out to paddocks where saps must be sown again. Youngster took bull away for a few days. News of a Mr. Johnson in Waipukurau hospital dead.

FRI 15 ~~1918~~ A sunny day. Ham and Eva harrowed, rolled, and drilled Wills pastures a second time, seed of first sowing did not grow, buttons tea used this time, ~~1918~~ cut down thistles tall wing on turnip paddock to be ploughed. Found on Wills paddock a good weasel, skinned and took shoulders home for dogs. Found in Marine creek a hogget unable to get out of water. Ham bought 23 lbs tea, 2 pints from a travelling tea seller. None of us troubled with influenza so far. Birthday T.D.

SAT 16 ~~1918~~ A fine day. John & Eva harrowed, rolled, and drilled Wills pastures a second time, used 4 bags lime, used manure before finished fairly early. Cut down all big thistles on turnip paddock, put all sheep off flat on to turnips. Many bad cases of influenza about. Son Higgin J. Man & Ham at Alice's, tonight they are at a Horticultural meeting and Tennis meeting in Rotorua. This evening killed a lamb, not fat, they are about done, no turnips, lamb poor.

TUE 12 A breezy cold day, with rain and tea has a difficult job to drag a cow up a face of precipice from large bunch in creek. She grazed her out in front where she is doing all right. Cow in top yards unable to stand yet. Laid in some weather boards in shed. John came for gelegonite to blow up stumps. The Rev. Dr. Chappell gave him by Anton Sorenson he brought over tonight. THU 24 A horrid wet day and at 10.30 a.m. heavy and continuous rain now stops. John got his teeth out unable to lamb, put his right, a big lamb, will take with her to see Rangi to Auntie's, post station Master, can travel with anything to show.

FRI 25 Another dreadful day, heavy rain and wind from E. and cold. A newly born lamb can stand up against it. The good lamb that John took away from the 2 tooth ewe this morning, his judgement should be left on lamb last night. Live on dry bottoms tonight, her lamb near fire will get strong.

Both sheaged home from back, east over her lamb to be mured, and penned up with her lamb to get her to take. I left her a good bit better than she was yesterday, she can use her hands the swelling having left them, she can move her toes, is not in pain, can eat, the Dr calls the complaint "acute rheumatism".

Tu 2 ~~1~~ A dreadful looking morning, raining and Ranga Flat covered, after a couple of hours it ceased, sun shone and snow disappeared, the ewe sheaged in by John got on her legs and can walk & feed in little orchard. Other ewes lambs brought in two ewes won't take to their own lambs, are penned up. 8 lambs in boxes to be fed on cows milk out of bottle with teat. Skinner a ewe that John found dead in Spring Ridge gully. A Basket Social in Hall brought in over £7. Tea stages to help work up home 12.33.34.

We 3 ~~2~~ John still bringing in motherless lambs andwick ones and skinning to put on ewes without lambs busy all day. Message from Mr. Paget to Eva, she wants to see a sick or newly calved cow at grass near South Makaretu. Eva motored her and her boy to cow and picked them up at Thompsons coming home from golf.
