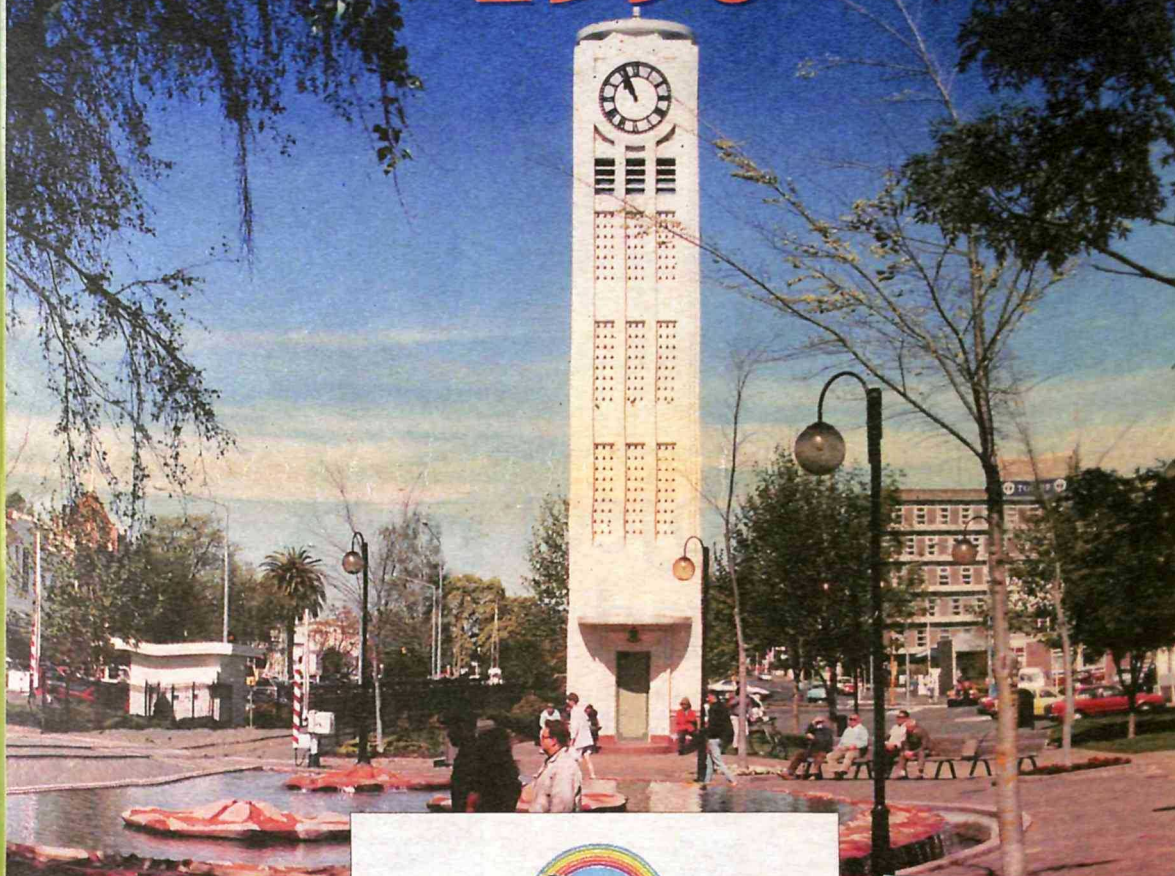

Facelift for centre of Hastings

Hastings has finally reached the end of the Central Business Redevelopment project.

As a result there are now malls, car parks, a water feature and a totally revamped roading and infrastructure network in central Hastings.

This is a huge project that has been undertaken by the council, retailers, businesses and the public. Now that it is over it is opportune to reflect how and why the changes came about.

The city's ring road and parking system was developed during the mid 1970s based around the exist-

ing commercial structure. The ring road started to come under increasing criticism from developers, retailers and the public in the 1980s.

In 1984 the Hastings City Council resolved to reassess the planning requirements in the district scheme that no longer reflected the commercial development patterns. This became phase one of the six-phase planning exercise culminating in the infrastructural improvements that resulted in the central business area developing into the working and shopping environment it is today. The only visible signs of the project are the sixth phase that involved the phys-

ical work.

Extensive planning, public consultation and a design work were undertaken in the first five phases. From these this objective for the central business project was identified "to promote the central business district of Hastings as the main location for shopping and office activities within Hastings."

In phase four and five, the design and planning phases, the characteristics that were to be developed and promoted were formulated. This was undertaken through a number of different means including; reviewing the

town planning zoning's and rules to better reflect the present and future development, town planning philosophies were developed and have been followed in conjunction with public investment to achieve the desired outcomes of the project, the design theme of Spanish Mission has been developed and used throughout the project to strengthen and enhance the existing image of Spanish Mission Hastings.

The malls have had the highest public profile of the project and are the most visible example of the development of the central business area. They include; cob-

blestone paving, plantings and street furniture in context with the Spanish Mission theme to create a pleasant pedestrian environment. Also in the malls, areas are available for public use by food bars, hawkers, buskers and street cafes and areas are set aside and regularly used for street entertainment to create a lively and interesting atmosphere.

The project is now complete and the functioning and management of the central business area is now carried out by the businesses in the area in conjunction with the council.

City outgrows its ring road

The completion last month of work to return Hastings' roads to two-way traffic represented the end of a project which had its beginnings in the early 1980s when both retailers and the public began to express dissatisfaction with the ring road.

Hastings district councillor Terry Coxon, a long-time opponent of the ring road who from 1988-1991 chaired the council's central business district committee, said that while the ring road had been a brilliant piece of engineering, by the mid-1980s it had outlived its usefulness.

"Before it was introduced, Heretaunga St ran in one long stretch from Stortford Lodge to the outer edge of the city in the east and everyone just zoomed up and down. Heretaunga St was clogged, especially in the middle around the railway line. It solved those problems, but eventually became a noose around the CBD. It constrained the CBD and didn't allow for development," he said.

As a result, commercial activity had drifted out in ribbon development along the main traffic corridors toward Stortford Lodge and Karamu Rd North.

In 1984, as the ring road came under in-

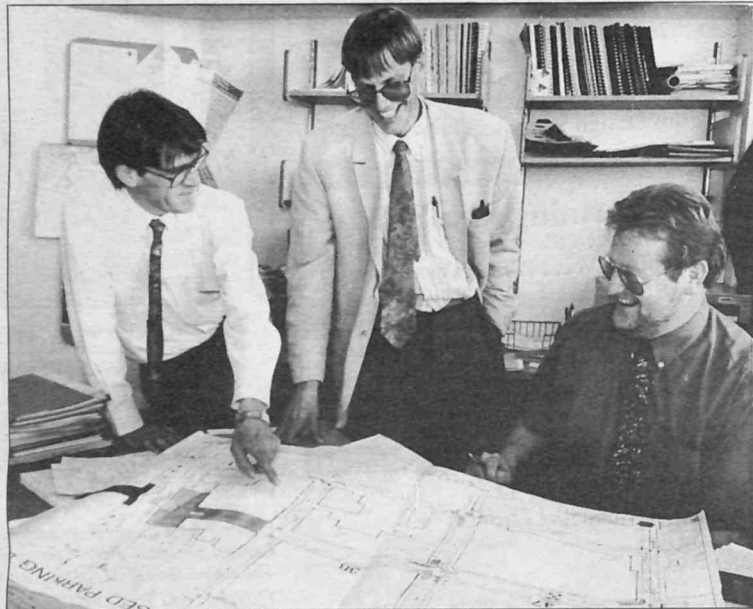
creasing criticism from retailers, developers and the public, the Hastings City Council commissioned an independent reassessment of zoning in the central city, thus beginning a six-phase planning exercise that resulted in a comprehensive proposal for the revitalisation of the CBD.

A shopper survey conducted as part of the public consultation involved in the planning, showed that 17 per cent disliked the ring road. And of 4476 firms questioned, 47 opposed the ring road, while it received the approval of only three.

One Heretaunga St business in the easternmost block of the ring road claimed business had fallen by 15 per cent as a result of the one way traffic system.

In 1988 the council agreed to a scheme for revamping central Hastings which involved developing the malls, new car parks and extensive landscaping. A new roading system was a necessary part of the changes and the initial proposal was for a shortened ring road.

This was eventually changed following consultation with retailers and in 1990 work began to return the former ring road to two way traffic.

Drivers 'must change mentality'

Hastings motorists, who for years decried the ring road, must change their ring road mentality if the new two way system is to work, according to William Gray who was responsible for its design.

"People still tend to think in terms of the ring road and continue to use Eastbourne St and Queen St when they're crossing town and the result is continued holdups. Those streets should be regarded as parking access streets and not as main arterial routes. St Aubyn St and Southampton St were designed for that purpose," he said.

Mr Gray, the Hastings District Council's former traffic engineering manager, was charged with transforming into reality the recommendation of consultants Beca Carter that the Hastings central traffic system be redesigned.

Beginning with the reconstruction of the St Aubyn St-Karamu Rd intersection, Mr Gray worked within the constraints imposed by the sometimes conflicting requirements of pedestrians, motorists, retailers and other property owners to design a system able to cope with traffic densities which he said, rival those of main centres.

"We look at ourselves as a small urban area, but Heretaunga St West carries over 20,000 vehicles a day, St Aubyn St must be close to that, Havelock Rd carries more and Southampton St is probably over 15,000.

"To put that in perspective, the Auckland Harbour Bridge carries 120,000, but that's over six lanes, so when you allow for the fact that Hastings roads are single lane our traffic flows are similar," he said.

The limitation on space

available for roads was one of the major difficulties faced.

It meant for example, inadequate room to provide for specialist right turn lanes in some places.

Meeting the needs of pedestrians had been another important consideration, said Mr Gray and special provision had been made in some places even a the expense of prolonging traffic light cycle time.

"Retailers wanted an exclusive pedestrian phase at the Market St-Queen St intersection. And at the corner of Karamu Rd and Heretaunga St we could have managed with a give way sign as far as traffic volume is concerned, but lights were installed at a cost of about \$50,000, for the sake of pedestrians."

Retailers had also had their requirements and it was in response to their requests, as well as feedback from other areas and changing expectations, that the early plan for retaining a limited one way parking loop around parts of the ring road, had been dropped in favour a completely two way system.

"In a provincial city people like to park as close as possible to where they are going, so there was also pressure from

retailers to retain as many parking spaces as possible," said Mr Gray.

One of his major achievements was obtaining a Transit New Zealand subsidy of 50 per cent for all major road works and the majority of the new traffic signals.

The council had initially planned to entirely fund the project itself. The subsidy allowed the St Aubyn St project, for example, to be completed for \$3-million, well below the \$3.5-million budget.

Work on the former ring road, begun once St Aubyn St had been upgraded, started with Nelson St and Hastings St, moved to Eastbourne St and King St and finally to Queen St.

Roundabouts had been installed where space allowed, to act as traffic control points, especially on Heretaunga St.

"The last thing we wanted to do was create a long ribbon road again," said Mr Gray.

It had been an early policy decision to improve road strength to allow the roads to carry heavy volumes of two way traffic for a number of years, without major maintenance, he said.

A touch of Spain

Major physical changes and the adoption of a theme for the centre of Hastings has created a new public awareness of Hastings architecture.

Hastings has an interesting and varied collection of buildings, however it is the Spanish Mission design which has been adopted by the Hastings District Council as its theme for the Hastings central area. The Spanish Mission style was first introduced to Hawke's Bay in the early twentieth century.

In order to complete the revitalisation of the central area, the Hastings District Council recognised that many of the buildings were in need of repainting. A policy was therefore adopted which provided a monetary incentive to building owners to repaint their building facades. The Facade Enhancement Scheme has now been operating for two years and to date has assisted in the refurbishment and painting of 16 building facades in the Hastings central area.

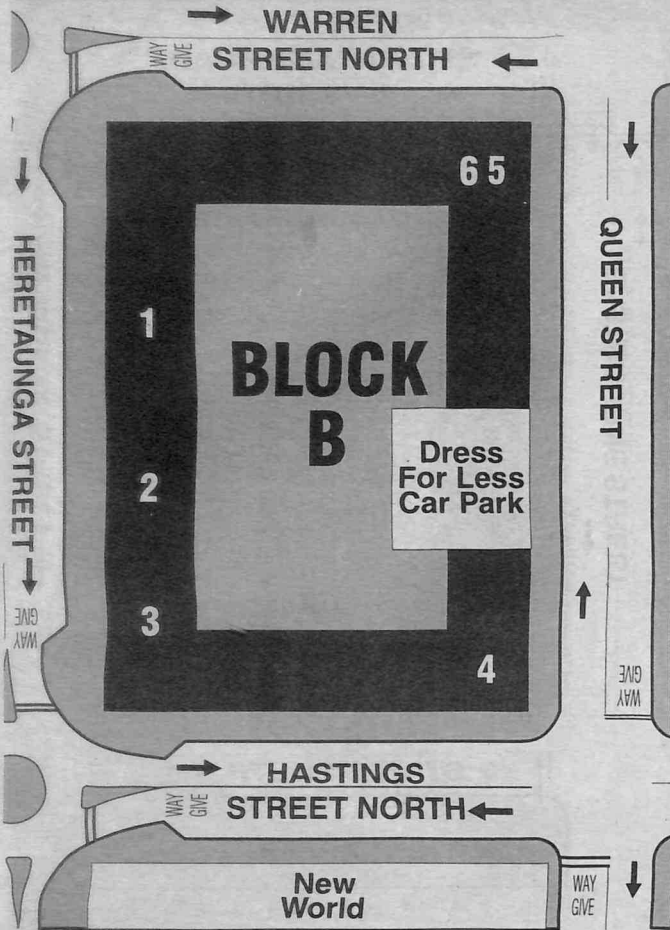

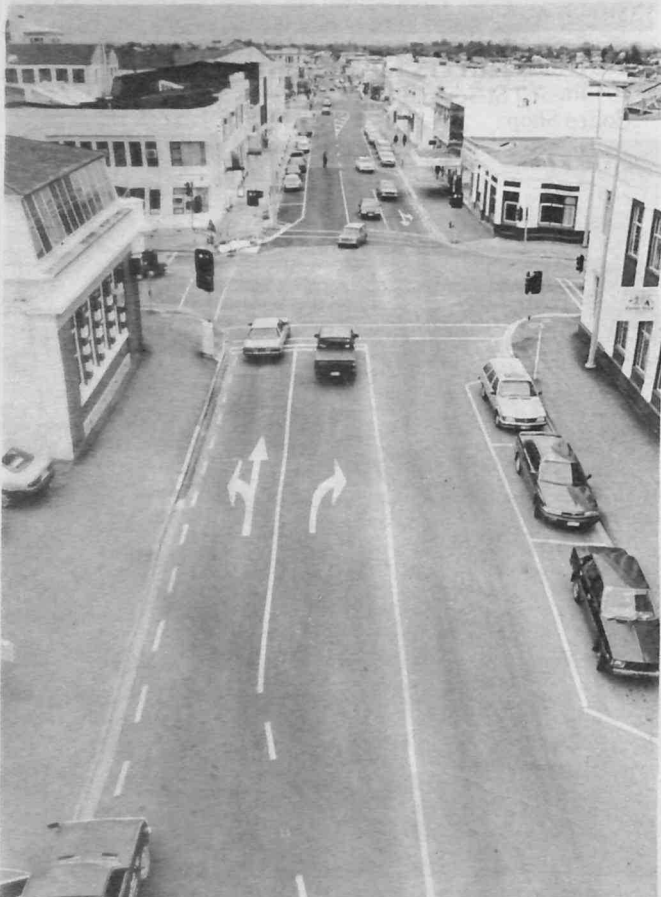
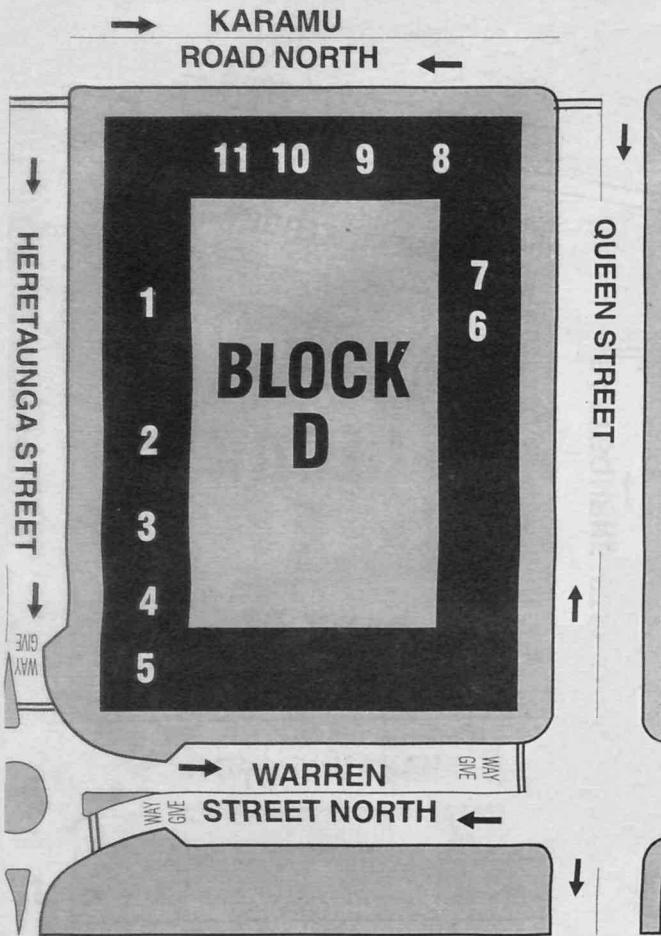


Corner of Market and Heretaunga Street Circa 1913.

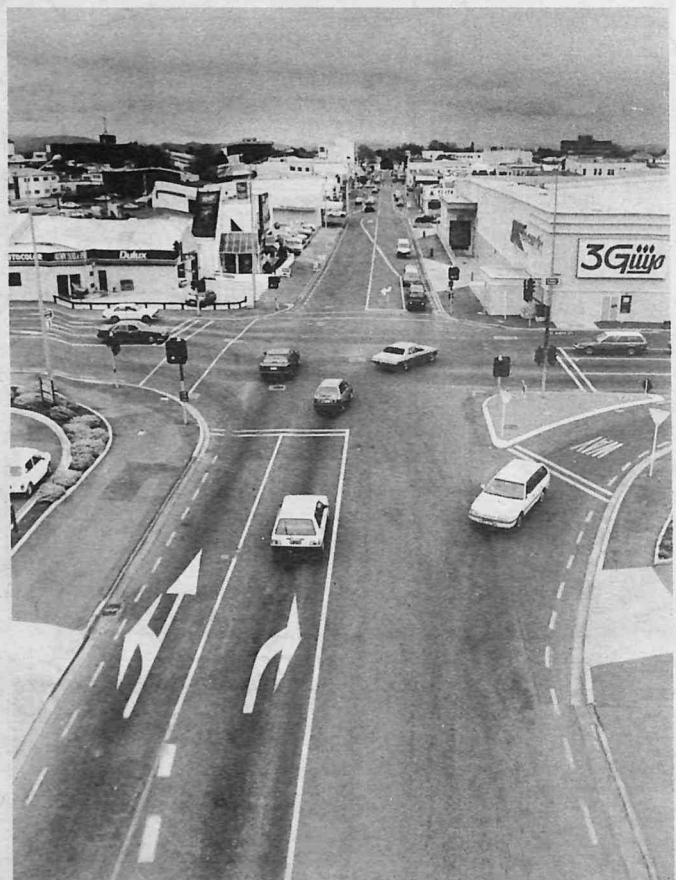
2 State Highway 2 city by-pass

Above left: St Aubyn Street looking west showing the major intersection with Karamu Road, State Highway 2 to Napier.

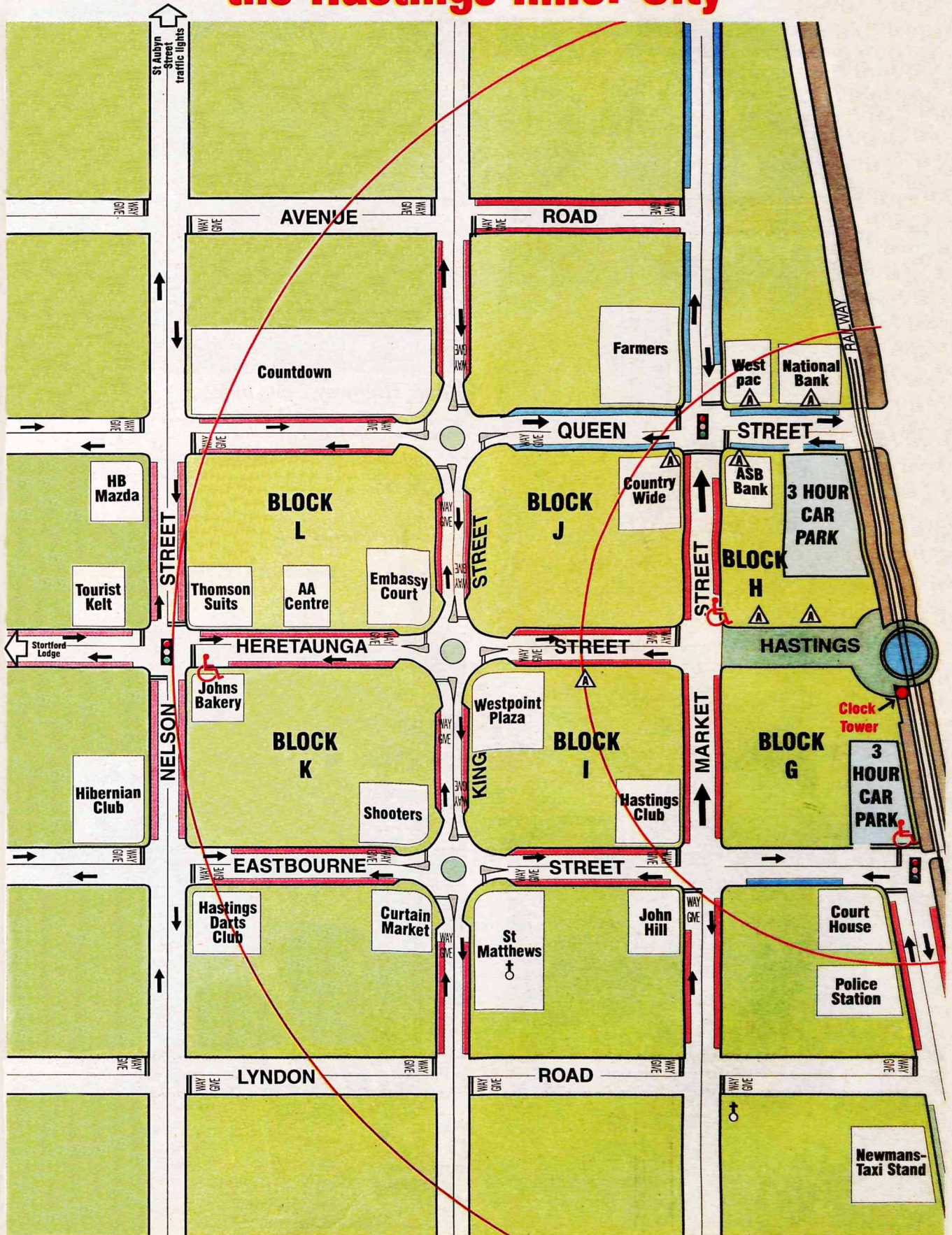

Below left: Hastings Street looking south, this portion of State Highway 2 intersects Queen, Heretaunga and Eastbourne Streets.

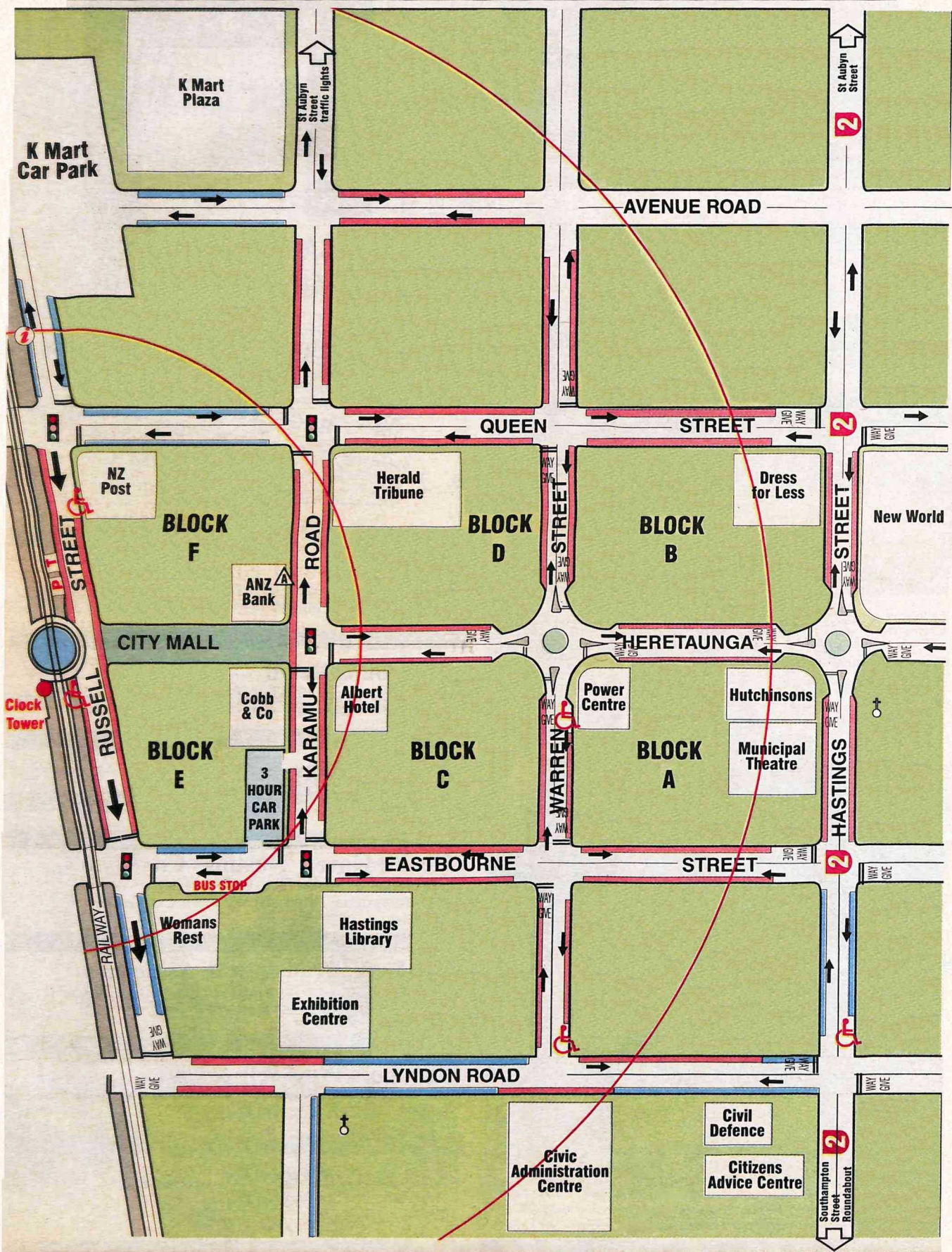

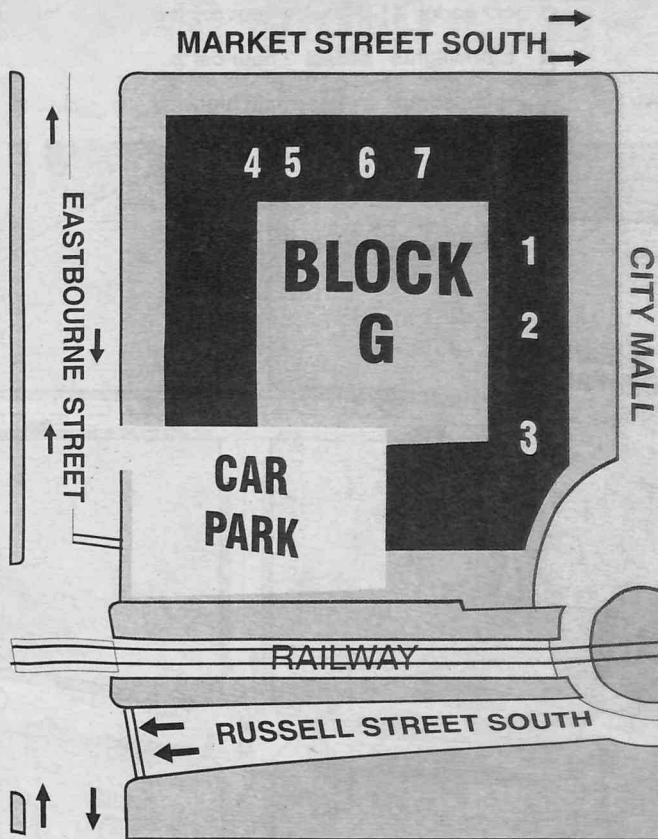

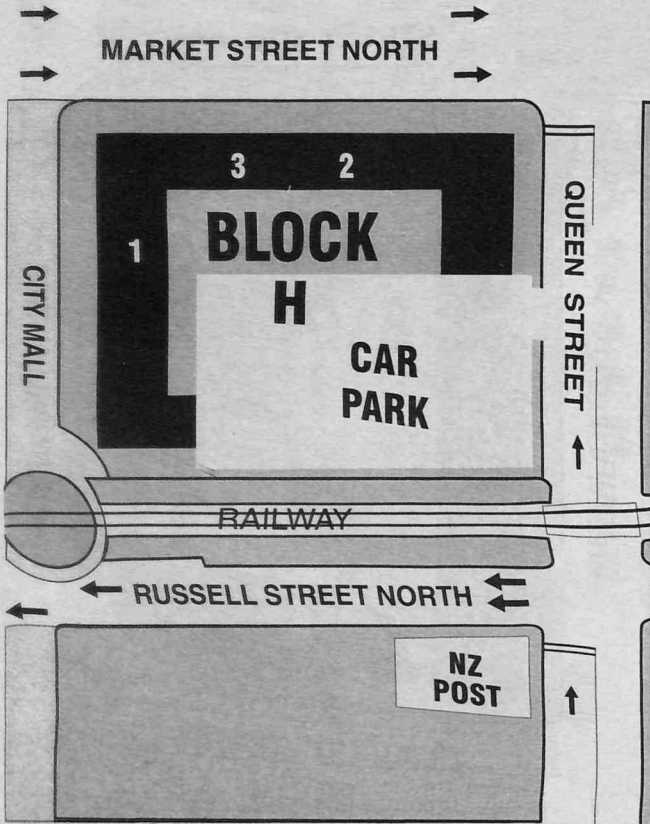

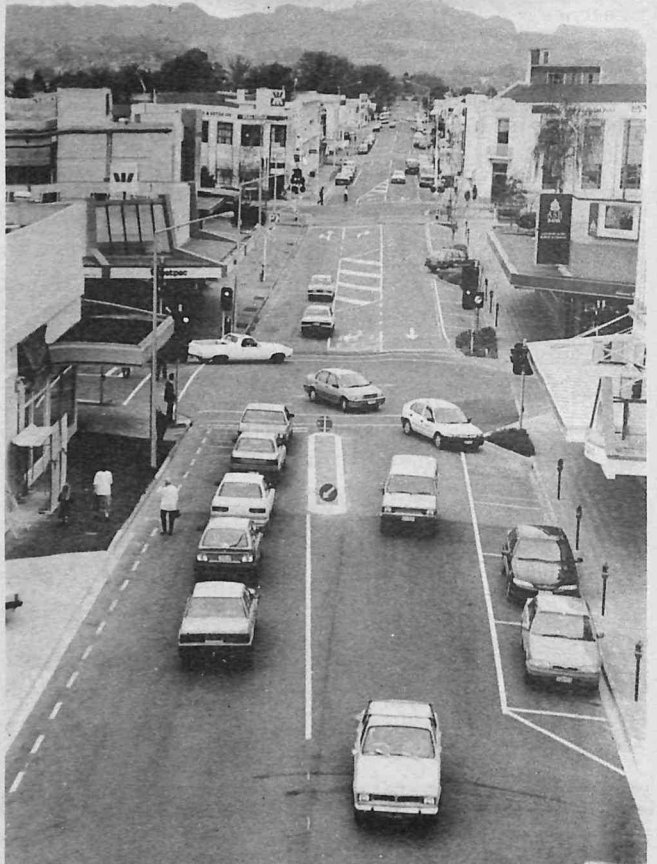

Pipes laid for next 20 years

Unless there are serious mishaps, there should be no more large disruptions from road works in central Hastings for the next 20 years.

Hastings District Council environmental engineering manager Rob Green said that improvements to water and sewerage systems carried out progressively as the ring road had been removed had been designed to match the expected 20-year lifespan of the new road.

"There's no point in rebuilding the road and then soon afterward digging it up again to re-lay water pipes, so for the last three or four years each October we have been looking forward at the roading programme throughout the district to try to co-ordinate underground work with roading."

The council had a policy of replacing water mains which had more than four leaks a year, and had spent \$750,000 on main replacement for each of the last three years, he said.

However, higher criteria were set for the central business area where mains suffering two leaks a year and those within 20 years of the end of their expected lifespan, had been replaced.

In addition all mains which were less than 750mm below the road surface had also been replaced to minimise damage caused by traffic vibration.

"That's become necessary as trucks and loads have become heavier and traffic volumes have increased. And some of the old pipe trenches were dug by hand and perhaps the workmen hadn't bothered to go very deep. Over the years too the road surface changes."

The upgrading over the last few years had involved the replacement of most of the water mains and a large proportion of the sewer mains in the central area, said Mr Green.

Work on the sewer lines had been done using a no-dig method which involved relining existing pipes with a flexible polyethylene tube.

In a technique Mr Green said was little-used in New Zealand holes were dug at approximately 80-

metre intervals along the sewer to allow sections of the new tube to be inserted.

While the practice had the drawback of reducing the sewer capacity and was more expensive than conventional trenching methods, Mr Green said its advantage of minimising traffic disruption meant that it was often cost-effective for use in places like the CBD.

Work on both the water and sewerage mains was carried out by a mix of council staff and contractors with only a few problems encountered in the process.

"With the usual method for laying sewers there's a very obvious trench for drivers to avoid, but with the method we used there's only about a three metre hole, so in spite of barricades we sometimes had people driving into them. And then at night people would sometimes remove the barricades. We did try to cover the holes with steel plates," said Mr Green.

On one occasion a heavy road-building machine broke a water main causing a shower of stones which broke a newly-installed plate glass window in a business premises before the glazier had even had time to get back to return to his depot.

Mr Green said that throughout the project council staff had worked closely with retailers to ensure minimal disruption to trade.

Over the Christmas/New Year shopping period last year work had been carried out on Saturday and Sunday nights on four consecutive weekends rather than in normal business hours.

"Cost in overtime wages were high, but we were happy to work that way to keep faith with the retailers," said Mr Green.

'Hit it hard' approach

Beginning with the first stage of the St Aubyn St project, Higgins Contractors HB Ltd have been responsible for the majority of the road reconstruction involved in the redesign of Hastings central traffic system.

Construction estimator Andrew McCrae, who with construction manager Gordon Tripp, oversaw the numerous contracts for which the firm successfully tendered from the Hastings District Council, said that the challenge of working in a high-traffic area like the CBD had resulted in changes to the firm's work schedules.

"We learnt a lot in two or three years. We now have the attitude that we get in and hit the work hard, put in a lot of resources and try to reduce the amount of time the pain of disruption lasts."

"On some contracts we worked well into the night, especially when there were unforeseen problems. We've been out there at three o'clock in the morning to fix a burst water main."

Burst mains had been a frequently recurring problem during the first stage of work on Heretaunga St,

from Hastings St to Karamu Rd. Mr McCrae said that although the mains were never actually hit with excavation equipment, the vibration from heavy machinery was sufficient to break rivets in the old steel mains.

"In Heretaunga St most of the work had to be done at the weekends. We'd start at 1pm on a Saturday, work through to 7-8pm and then start again at 5am on Sunday."

The effort had been well-rewarded when retailers in the King St-Nelson St area of Heretaunga St thanked workers with a special shout.

In that area Higgins had rebuilt the actual road, while Tuck Contractors were responsible for kerb and channelling and council staff for laying footpath cobblestones.

Another highlight had been the completion of King St between St Aubyn St to Eastbourne St well ahead of schedule in spite of the short time frame allowed and the fact that it involved laying huge new stormwater pipes.

The latter task was undertaken by East Coast Contractors whom Higgins subcontracted for much of the work they undertook in the CBD.

Machine cuts down waste

Tuck Contractors have the distinction of being responsible for handling the contract for the final stage of the revamping of the former ring road, that for Queen St from Railway Rd to Karamu Rd.

However, they also did several other contracts throughout the whole project, both for roading and kerb and channelling and managing director Tony Tuck said Hastings District Council contracts account for about 40 per cent of the firm's business on a regular basis.

A newly-acquired mobile screening plant is expected to assist in

meeting the council's standards for road chip size more economically.

Contracts manager Joe Coombe said the plant saves on chip grading costs both by cutting down the amount of waste material produced and by reducing the number of

passes that must be made by road graders to produce a satisfactory surface.

By allowing a contractor to have material screened and on site before work starts, it also reduces truck-waiting time which at about \$65 an hour is an expensive component of any job.

"It means too that we can recycle material that's really marginal, such as that from quarry pits away from rivers or from farmers' paddocks, which often has a lot of clay in it. Unless that's removed you get a road that's too muddy in the winter and too dusty in summer," said Mr Coombe.

'Potholers' did manholes

One of the more delicate jobs involved in the redevelopment of the Hastings central roading network was the building of protective coverings over Telecom's manholes.

Mackersey Construction Ltd, Hawke's Bay's largest construction firm, was contracted to do the work, which project manager John Sarten said was made necessary by road widening.

"Most of the manholes were built years ago in the footpath and when the road was widened they became part of the road so they had to be

strengthened to 50-tonne loading," he said.

About 13 manholes were affected, the majority of them in St Aubyn St.

Working to designs produced by Peter McCarter of Works Consultancy in Napier, the inside of the manholes were strengthened to a 50-tonne loading and new steel reinforced top slabs poured.

Working around the delicate fibre-optic cables required special care on the part of the two-man team (nicknamed by their work mates as "the potholers") who undertook the majority of the work, said Mr Sarten.

Traffic lights a challenge

The peculiarities of Hastings physical layout together with the high traffic volumes in the central city presented difficulties for the designers of the traffic light systems for the new two-way streets.

Traffic engineer John Price said that the variety of traffic movement options which had to be provided for when traffic could move in two directions, both north-south and east-west, meant that some intersections, such as those between Karamu Rd and both Eastbourne St and Queen St, were operating to near capacity.

Hastings' grid pattern street layout which allowed only short

spaces for traffic to stack up between intersections also caused problems, said Mr Price.

A further difficulty resulted from the fact that most central Hastings roads were only wide enough for a single lane of traffic in each direction.

To deal with such complexities, Hastings now has some of the most up to date computer-controlled traffic lights systems available, but even so in some cases the technology was being pushed to its limit, said Mr Price.

The intersections of Eastbourne St with Karamu Rd and Russell St had been two of the most complicated to design.

Here the two controllers were continually "talking to each other" exchanging information about the number of cars waiting and making adjustments to ensure optimum traffic flow. They were also linked into the railway crossing signals.

All systems were designed by council traffic engineers before being fine tuned by experts in Wellington and Australia. A further week of on-site checking had followed their installation.

"We'll leave them now until people get used to driving on two way streets and then we'll reassess them after about six or eight months, said Mr Price.

Our staff take immense pride in having been of service.
