JUST ANOTHER LITTLE CHAT ABOUT WORLD
COMMUNITY SERVICE:

Last week we mentioned about the need
for interested persons to help as a team
in the rebuilding of the Technical Block
at Pilelevu College, Pangai, following
the devastation through hurricane Isaac
in Tonga. This college is a secondary
school run by the Free Wesleyan Mission.

This week, we mention that although
Pilelevu College is a big project, there
is another most important part of the
993 WCS programme.

The Home Development and Hygiene program
began three years ago in Ha'aikio is an
ongoing and important development through
the efforts of women's groups throughout
Tonga. The Rotary Clubs of Taumarunui,
Paeroa E., Otorohanga, Otomoetai, Cambridge
Kihikihi, Hamilton, Waipawa, Frankton
and Hamilton E., have all been concerned with
this area of development.

Hurricane re-housing is another possibility.
This committee, with a combined team from
Paeroa, Fairfield, Taumarunui and Te Puke
Clubs, has a team of Tongan blockmakers and
builders in Ha'apai. Homes need to be built.
The Building Team needs work and clubs are
asked if they need a project.

Solomon Islands. Morrinsville Club

awaiting a report from their reconnaissance
team.
