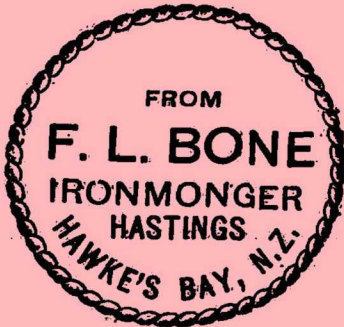

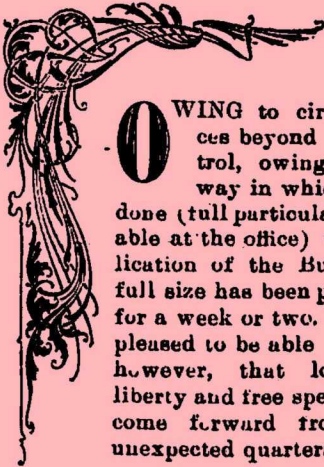
## BY THE NARK

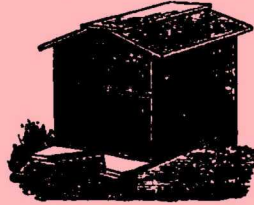

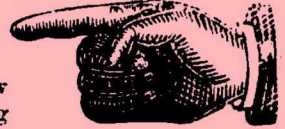
