

HISTORY OF ELSTHORPE DISTRICT

EDENHAM

The first land to be taken up in the Elsthorpe District was 25,000 acres acquired by Alfred Chapman in conjunction with W. B. and J. Rhodes in 1851. The block was called Edenham after a hamlet in Lincolnshire where a Chapman family lived. In 1913 the property, now down to 3378 acres, was purchased by Oscar Nilsson and is still farmed as his estate.

ST LAWRENCE

In 1852 Edward Spencer Curling took up 16,500 acres then known as Te Kopanga. By 1887 Robert Curling, a nephew of Edwards, had inherited the property and changed its name to St. Lawrence.

The property was purchased by the Williams family in 1901 and developed as a memorial to Henry Williams and his uncle, Bishop William Williams, later known as the H. and W. Williams Memorial Trust. The income was and still is used for assisting Church of England Missions.

In 1912 the Trustees decided that all but 3,000 acres should be cut up and offered for lease. A mill was built to cut the timber from the 300 acres of bush still standing.

In 1965 the property was divided into 2 farms of 1,500 acres each with a manager on each block, one half being called Paihia. St. Lawrence wool is still branded E.S.C. as it was by its first owner Edward Spencer Curling.

TE APITI

In 1853 a grazing licence was applied for by Alfred Chapman and the Rhodes brothers of Edenham for the 14,500 acre property known as Te Apiti. During the 1860s the property was taken over by Gavin Peacock, who made some of it freehold. In 1916 when Maori Leases expired, Te Apiti was left with 6,000 acres, cutting off Waimoana, Kapiti and Kokatawai. New buildings were completed at Te Apiti and Waipoapoa and they were run as two separate properties of 3,600 acres and 2,400 acres respectively.

MANGAKURI


The 21,000 acre Mangakuri block was taken up in 1853 by W. Frederick Hargrave and Peter Couper. When the property was taken over in the late 1800s by the Rev. Samuel Williams he built a church on the property which is still there today. When he died in 1907 the land was sold mostly to relations, while 5,400 acres went to his son William Temple Williams. It was later divided again between Samuel Roy and Charles Athol Williams, one block being known as Netherton. Mangakuri is now 1,539 acres as S. R. Williams gave 1,152 acres, now known as Okura, to his children.

ELSTHORPE

Dr. George Dalrymple Monteith applied for 10,960 acres of Edenham land in 1857, which he named Elsthorpe. Portions of the station were sold and in March 1862 4,000 acres were auctioned at the Napier Land Office and purchased by Weston and Buchanan. John Buchanan bought his partner out in 1869. By 1876 it was carrying 5,760 sheep. More land was acquired until Elsthorpe eventually reached 10,000 acres. In 1896, upon the death of John Buchanan, Elsthorpe was offered to the Government for closer settlement. It was divided into 28 farms and 22 village sections and balloted for on the 24th June. Mr Buchanan's gardener, Mr Thomas Haycock, drew the old homestead and a few acres. He turned the homestead into a boarding house, store and Post Office, becoming the first Postmaster of Elsthorpe.

ELMSHILL

In 1859 Frederick John Tiffen applied for 950 acres of Edenham and named it Elmshill. By 1874 the station had increased to 7,082 acres. In 1909 Frank Tiffen leased 2,388 acres from his father, and Henry, another son, leased the block now known as Mangarara, which was 2,772 acres. Elmshill is now 1,608 acres and still belongs to the Tiffen family.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION OF SECTIONS IN THE VILLAGE OF ELSTHORPE

Taken from the brochure advertising the lease of the Elsthorpe Station sub-division, 1896.


"The village of Elsthorpe is situated on the main road from Kaikora to the coast, about 14 miles from the former place. It is a very pretty spot, approaching from both sides through clumps of carefully preserved native bush — a somewhat rare sight in that part of the country.

The main portion of the village—that on the north side of the road—is all in good sward. Sections Nos. 16 and upwards are on gradually rising ground, and will make excellent residential sites, with an agreeable outlook. The belt of bush comes to within a few chains of the south side of the road, and is a great feature of the scene.

Section 22 contains the main building of the homestead of earlier days—a seven-roomed house, but not in good repair—also two underground concrete tanks with a capacity of 12,000 gallons. The only other section containing a building is No. 23 with a toolhouse, carpenter's shop, coach-house and stable all under one roof.

Half-yearly rent for sections 1-10 is 4/- and for sections 22-29 rent ranges from £1.2.0 to £4.6.0.

Among the many terms of lease No. 12 states—"The lessee must not take more than three crops, one of which must be a root-crop, from the same land in succession; and either with or immediately after a third crop of any kind the land must be sown down with good permanent cultivated grasses and clovers, and be allowed to remain as pasture for at least three years. No. 13. The lessee must not cut the cultivated grass or clover for hay or seed the first year of the course. No. 19 All buildings must be insured in the name of the Queen."

FLAG PRESENTATION

WAIPAWA MAIL, 28th April, 1900.

Wednesday, the 18th inst., was a great day here. Mr Tiffen of Elmshill presented the school with the Union Jack of Old England and the N.Z. flag. The flags are the largest size and of the best material. The people of Elsthorpe and the surrounding district gathered to see and take part in the ceremony. The school was packed.

The ceremony was commenced by Mr Buchanan in a brief but to the point manner, explaining the object of the meeting. Mr Tiffen then addressed the school children and those present. He said it gave him much pleasure in giving the flags, seeing the great interest the inhabitants and children took in the emblem of the Mother Country and then handed the flags to Miss Burdett, the school mistress, amidst great applause.

"God Save the Queen" was sung by all in a very patriotic manner. Then the school children sang "Soldiers of the Queen" and did it very well indeed.

Mr W. Fletcher, on behalf of the School Committee, thanked Mr Tiffen for his generous gift and called for three cheers for Mr Tiffen, which was given most heartily.

Mr Buchanan has a pole 40 feet long on the ground to be erected for the flags to be hoisted on when we hear of the relief of Mafeking, and on the termination of the war. May both events be soon.


RECOLLECTIONS BY MR TOM PRIEST

My parents emigrated from Scotland—actually from Shetland. My father came out in the sailing vessel "The City of Auckland" in 1878. The boat was wrecked between Kapiti and the mainland and the crew and passengers scrambled ashore and made their way overland to Wellington. My mother arrived five years later. After they were married they took up the position of "married couple" on Edenham Station, which was then owned by Mr Williams.

I stayed with my uncle at Woodville and started school there, but when a school was built at Patangata in 1895, I came home and attended there. I was eight at the time and the station provided me with a horse in return for carrying the mail; Elmshill Station paid me £3-18-0 a year for doing this. The road to Patangata was rough and only metalled in places. The bush closed in on both sides for about two miles and was unfenced. Swaggers frequented the area, especially during shearing times. However, with a good horse under me I was never frightened of them.

I finished my schooling at Elsthorpe which had opened in 1898, and I commenced the following year. There were five of us and we walked the $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

One occasion I remember well was when wool was being loaded on a boat at Kairakau. The school was notified when the boat would arrive, the wool was taken out by a wagon team and the children were taken over the steamer. Mrs Minty made a cake for the captain and sailors for giving



Loading Te Apiti and Waimoana wool at Kairakau.


us the chance to see over the steamer. I believe bullocks were used at one time to load the wool in the surf.

In the first, roads were only clay tracks. Gradually they were formed and metalled. A contractor, Mr Ward, lived at Patangata and did this type of work as well as carting wool. At one time he had over 50 horses. I remember once a team of eight horses with a four-wheel wagon hauling a load of 36 bales of Edenham wool. The trip to the rail at Otane, then known as Kaikora North, took two days.

There was a chap on Edenham who used to do odd jobs. He had been a captain in the English Army at one time and was a well read gentleman. He started a library which was well patronised by all the men on the stations. It used to cost 2/6 to join and, I think. 3d a book. When Capt. Smith passed on Mr Williams gave the books to Otane.

The Post Office and store opened in 1899 by Mr Haycock in the old homestead building. I might mention that at about 1901 there were two blacksmiths. Mr Holland and Mr Halpin, and a saddler's shop in the brick building of Mr Wedd's. At first, entertainment was held either in the school or Mr Buchanan's woolshed. This shed had been moved to make way for the school site.

The years have seen many changes and I look back with pride in the achievements of the early settlers.




New Patangata Bridge—1924. Old bridge in background.

SAW MILLING

(As recalled by Mr J. A. Kenderdine)

Generally Elsthorpe was fairly clear of bush except for odd patches and along the flats on both sides of the existing road. There was a 300 acre block on St. Lawrence known as the Rangiora paddock, where Mr Burgess commenced operations in 1912. Unfortunately the mill was burnt out in 1917 and the equipment was moved nearer the Elsthorpe village on the boundary of R. M. Kenderdine and N. A. Thomsen. The article which appeared in the H.B. Herald 12/6/17 reads: "The floods experienced here

in the early part of the week are the highest in the memory of the earliest settlers. The skids at Mr Burgess's mill were swept bare of timber by the flood waters, while heavy wagons were carried several yards away and tossed about and broken by the force of the water. The inhabitants of the mill whares were in a sorry plight, one family being encamped on the boiler in the mill for several hours. An attempt was made by swimming to carry a rope, but it was futile. Finally, a line was made fast and by means of a rope

a rescue was effected. Owing to the main road being flooded to a depth of eight feet the mail coach was delayed for over 24 hours."

Again the persistent Mr Burgess set up business in a

site somewhat nearer to Mr R. M. Kenderdine's present house. This venture went into receivership and was sold up in 1925. A partly submerged black tank marks the spot where the mill existed.

The first two mills used bullock teams to bring the logs to the bush skids and then by four horses in tandem.

Mr Orbell purchased much of the mill plant and commenced business in Waipawa. When cutting was finished there, the plant was moved to Scannell's bush. This mill owned its own log hauler, which brought the logs to the bush skids. Timber was also brought from the Omakere district.

Orbell's mill closed down in the early 1930s. He then moved to Parkvale, Hastings.

ELSTHORPE PUBLIC HALL

H.B.H. 2nd October, 1907.

"Last night saw the fulfilment of the hopes and expectations of the settlers of the district—the occasion being the opening, with a dance, of the newly built Public Hall. Mr Michael Ryan, as Chairman of the Building Committee, opened the proceedings with a neat speech, in which he explained the difficulties the settlers had to overcome before they succeeded in making the hall an assured fact, especially eulogised the ladies of the district for the time and trouble they had taken in raising the necessary money. He called upon Mr F. L. Tiffen, who had so generously supported them, formally to open the hall.

Mr Tiffen, in a few well chosen words, said he wished to identify himself with Elsthorpe and felt great pleasure in seeing such a hall, which he considered was a credit to the district. He felt that the settlers and ladies were deserving every praise and especially the chairman, whose exertions he was pleased to see had met with so much success—a sentiment which was applauded. He appreciated the honour shown him and declared the hall open.

About sixty couples took part in the dance, and there were many spectators. Visitors came from all parts, but the boisterous weather kept many away. Owing to the strong wind, the supper marquee suffered considerably, but a pleasant evening was spent.

Mrs Moroney provide the music, and extras were played by Miss Hannon, Miss L. Haycock and Mr E. Williams. The songs of Miss Beachen and Miss Prewett were much appreciated."

The hall and church were both built at the same time. Mr Mansfield was the contractor. For sixty-six years they have been at the centre of community affairs.

St. Stephen's, built by the Anglican Church serves also the Presbyterian and Catholic communities. Services are still regularly held and a well established Sunday School continues to flourish. Like other churches of the parish the Williams family have donated many of the interior furnishings.

The hall has been the scene of many happy and nostalgic occasions. Dances, weddings, farewells and money raising functions have featured regularly. During both World Wars a tremendous amount of patriotism was evident and considerable funds were collected at these gatherings.

The hall was administered by a Committee but in recent years was taken over by the Patangata County. At this time it was extensively renovated.

Through the initiative of those early settlers we enjoy the facilities today.

OUTLINE OF THE GROWTH OF THE SCHOOL

The school opened on the 4th July, 1898, with a roll of 29 children, a sole teacher, a Miss Burdett. In 1916 the first assistant teacher was appointed, both teachers working in the one room with a partition part way. This continued to serve as the school until 1923 when the 'lean to' was extended to allow one teacher to use this as a classroom.

In 1936 the roll dropped and the school reverted to a sole-charge and remained as such until 1946 when the roll had climbed to 48. A second classroom was commenced in July, 1949, and in use in mid-September.

School baths were built in 1951 and a filtration plant was added in 1962.

In February 1954 a third classroom and staffroom was begun, the grading of the school having reached 3 teachers for the first time. 1958 saw the staffroom used for the first time as a sub-base for the dental nurse and this was used twice yearly for this purpose until a permanent clinic was built in 1966.

The concrete tennis court was laid in 1959 with the cyclone fence being added by voluntary labour in 1964.

During the December holidays 1963 the original class-room was extensively renovated and modern windows added. A staff cloakroom and toilet was added to the new block in 1964.


In addition to the 3 teachers a Teaching Aide was first appointed for 3 hours daily in 1966, this being extended to 5 hours daily in 1973.

Toilets had been the subject of repeated visits to the Education Board and a new block was added in 1967. (So strongly was the feeling on the poor toilet facilities one teacher recorded a Board Official actually being shut in an outhouse around 1916!)

A new schoolhouse was commenced in March 1969—the old house being retained by the school committee as a flat for assistant teachers.

New storage sheds at the school and small fuel shed at the new house were built late 1972 along with new fences around the swimming pool.

March 1973 a fourth teacher was appointed when the roll reached 108. A new room is to be built early in the second term and in the meantime two teachers will again use the original building—without the partition!

Unfortunately, records before 1913 do not exist, therefore the graph above begins at this year. With the advent of milling at St. Lawrence the roll showed an appreciable increase. However, this fluctuated somewhat with the opening and closing of the Patangata school.

The influx shown in 1931 was partly due to numbers of refugee children from more stricken earthquake areas being "imported".

The Depression years show a fairly marked decline in roll due mainly to the closing down of Orbell's mill after the bush was largely milled out. At one time during the Second World War only twenty children attended.

The first bus service was commenced in 1945. Shortly after, this was extended and the Atua and St. Lawrence services began. A dramatic increase in roll numbers resulted. This increase has been maintained as mileage has been increased.

A projection into the immediate future indicates that record numbers will shortly be attending. This is somewhat surprising in view of the rapid decline in rural population in many surrounding districts. However, the Elsthorpe school serves an extremely large area and future growth would seem assured.



MAIL SERVICES

In 1896 a Mail stage coach service from Otane (Kai-koura) to Elsthorpe was started by Jim Grant with his brother Jack as coach driver. This run was later extended to the coastal stations.

In 1897, when the Elsthorpe settlers were taking up their land, Mr T. Haycock opened a Post Office and store at his home. During the early stages of this Mail service a three-horse coach was used.

The mail came to Mangakuri on Monday, calling at Patangata and Elsthorpe en route, went back to Otane next day, calling at the same places. On Thursday the same practise was followed, only this time the night was spent at Te Apiti and back Friday, and only coming as far as Elsthorpe on Saturday. Mr Haycock delivered mail and groceries up to Atua and down to the Hawea Stream. Bill Porter took over from Jim Grant and introduced a closed-in coach drawn by four horses. Later owner-drivers were Tom Sinclair, Bill McQuilkan, Sam Linton, Jack Halpin, Claude Nelson, Norman Gallien and Jack Stevens—the latter selling out to Rene Grant, who soon replaced the stage coach with a Model T Ford covered-in lorry, although a buggy and pair were kept at Kairakau for the run to Mangakuri and Te Apiti, owing to the state of the roads.

Frank Limbrick drove a Federal bus, selling out to Rumbals—Mrs Rumbal driving a car on this mail run for years before selling out to Sealy Irwin. After this, the service was taken over by the Otane Store.

HEAD - SOLE TEACHERS CONTRIBUTIONS

Mrs W. N. Taylor

(1930-1936)

As the years pass memory dims and only highlights peep through. Well I remember Elsthorpe. I never taught a finer bunch of children. They were a credit to their parents and their district. But in the beginning I had my moments of trepidation. Rumour had preceded me and much indignation was apparent when it became known that the school was to have a woman Head Teacher. However, my husband and I soon settled in after I had denied swimming in the water hole several times as a means of enforcing discipline. Some of the older boys soon realised I meant what I had said.

Probably my most vivid memory of my stay was of the shattering experience during the 1931 Earthquake. Normally the children would have been in the playground but because of misdemeanours I had called them indoors. The horror of the morning and the days that followed ring clearly. The evacuation was orderly despite falling bricks, tanks and a large cupboard. Parents began arriving in gigs and cars and it wasn't long before most had been taken home. When I surveyed the damage in the schoolhouse I was dismayed. To add to the mess of bricks was the milk which had swilled from the pans in which my husband had put the morning's milking. We lived very restlessly for many days.

It was a sad day when our turn came to leave. We have many memories and friendships to remind us of our time at Elsthorpe.

NOTE: Mrs Taylor taught for nearly seven years in the school. She could be best remembered for the enormous plantings of trees which was carried out. In 1936 she states in the Log Book having planted 130 Flowering Gums and 70 Lawsonianas. She also planted numerous pines and pussy willows. Many of these trees are still in evidence today.

She left the school when it reverted to a sole-teacher school.

Mr A. Thompson

(1936-42)

In September, 1936, I transferred to Elsthorpe as Sole-Teacher. I came from Omakere and knew many of the parents and pupils through previous inter-school visits.

I found the old-type school well laid out in lawns and shrubs with asphalt playing area. During my six and a half years the Committee comprised Mr A. McGaffin (Chairman), Mr J. McAulay (Secretary) and Messrs T. B. H. Priest, J. Kenderdine and J. Sutherland. I remember that the Annual Meeting of parents would be chaired by Mr M. Ryan, a service he did for many years, and the Committee would be present but no parents. In due course the Committee would re-elect themselves.

The provision of a battery radio widened our curriculum. We also developed our musical ability mainly using homemade instruments.

We did not possess a swimming bath but all hands trundled down to a pool by the bridge near Mr Joe Cook's residence.

Our annual School Fancy Dress Ball was the highlight of the year. The hall was decorated with greenery and balloons and everyone turned out to enjoy the evening. Also the Kairakau Beach picnics were happy affairs.

War years brought shortages and gloom. A small dance band was formed with the help of Mrs Thompson, Miss Lois Nelson, Mr Alan Scott (piano), Mr H. Smith and Mr P. Beachen (piano accordian), J. Macaulay junior (drums), Mr J. Macaulay senior, Mr C. Prentice and myself (violin). In the early war years we were instrumental in raising over £300.

In March 1942 I entered the Armed Forces to go overseas.

In 1940 Mrs Thompson and I took a party of pupils from Elsthorpe and Omakere to the Wellington Centennial. We travelled by train and were billeted at the old Newtown School. It was a tremendous experience.

I remember the pupils compiling their own magazine "Cheerio". We used a primitive hand stencil set. I hope the budding poets have continued their efforts.

My days at Elsthorpe were happy ones. My wife and I made many life-long friends and have many nostalgic memories. May this 75th Reunion be as successful as the 50th.

Mr H. J. Winter

(1945-51)

A spell of 27 years certainly smoothes the rougher sides and gives a more polished look to past happenings, and I'm sure that a balance sheet would show the pleasing ones out-weighing the rest not so interesting, less appealing, and less enjoyable. One of those "less" ones was our arrival in Elsthorpe, rather late in the day having come up from the Wairarapa. The carrier had unloaded the furniture and was gone about an hour by the time we arrived. It was almost dark, overcast and showery, and we literally broke into the house as the carrier had unloaded everything into three front rooms and finally the passage-way. No power of course so no light, and no heating except by stove.

To cancel out that sort of thing there were plenty of brighter moments. One was the fun of a heavy snowfall and the inevitable snowballing and snow-man. There were the trips to Waipukurau for football and athletic tournaments, even reaching the finals on an odd occasion not so much by skill as by the very unorthodox play and capitalis-

ing on the surprise created.

The girls' sporting life was more confined to taking part in athletics—numbers and sizes made serious basketball out of the question. However, they more than held their own in the playground games and activities in competition with the boys. It was my good fortune to have at that time a number of girls who were so reliable and responsible in so many ways.

I well remember one school howler in particular offered by a rather shy and serious girl. Her answer to a question about the masculine form of the word "duchess" was an inspirational "tallboy". This brought an end to any further

work and we all went outside to play a game.

The introduction of a school bus service brought new growth to the roll. The school was fortunate in having such conscientious and reliable operators as Bill and Gladys Pepper. After a time the service was extended to Atua Road bringing to the school a number of children who previously relied on the Correspondence School for their primary education. This in turn introduced extra families to the school life to the advantage of all concerned, and in later school committee elections members were chosen from further afield than the usual confines of the village. Mr L. E. Hardy from Motonui became chairman of the new committee elected a few days before the Golden Jubilee in 1948, and with the other members comprising E. Bibby, R. Kenderdine, R. Tinning and R. Fannin, had the distinction of leading the school into the second half century of its progress.

Mr W. J. Scott

(1954-1961)

An anniversary is a time when we look back and attempt to recapture the happenings, the emotions and behaviour of people in the setting of a time that has gone for ever.

In my time as a teacher at Elsthorpe it was a very close community cut off to a degree from the rest of the Bay by corrugated roads and the Patangata Hill.

In 44 years of teaching I give the children top place for manners and co-operation and when required tons of grit and determination.

An Elsthorpe School Committee Meeting was the highlight of the month. If something was required it was acquired with astonishing despatch. If money in kitty was low, a stock drive would be held. Truck owners were given a day and area, the auctioneer given a hint of what was expected, and kitty was buoyant again.

I wanted a rugby ground and gave the Committee a suggestion. The central driveway was eliminated, a roadway around the area bulldozed, fences erected and then tractors, discs, graders, etc., swung into action. It was a marvellous community effort. Of course then I just had to produce a rugby team. I have many nostalgic memories of the rugby games played and could fill a book with the pranks of some "lads".

I have many memories of the late Mr and Mrs Pepper and the school buses. Despite Bill's emotionalism, what a wonderful record of safe driving they made.

Of the many memories of humorous incidents one stands out very clearly. A parson newly arrived from England was visiting the school-house one evening and was taking a short cut to Lansdowns and Kenderdines. Below Lansdowns was a dam and he stepped out onto the beautifully smooth carpet of weeds and was soon well and truly stuck. Mrs Lansdown answered his calls for help and rescued him.

My family and I owe much to the kindness and generosity of the folk of Elsthorpe. My two eldest sons were indeed fortunate to start their working careers with Elsthorpe farmers.

Many fine people have passed away in the last thirteen years and I feel very sad when I remember that fine young man Willie Waterhouse, a product of the school and district.

I am thankful that my own children had the benefit of a country upbringing and education.

To all Elsthorpians, many happy meetings and memories.

Mr B. J. Hennessy

(1961-1965)

Congratulations to Elsthorpe School on the occasion of its 75th anniversary. I was fortunate indeed to have been associated with the school for four of these years and have many happy memories.

I well remember the friendliness of the district and the

wonderful support given the school.

Who could possibly forget the School Committee and the untiring efforts of its members to improve the school environment and facilities. And those Committee meetings that continued on into the late hours of the night long after school business had been completed. Elsthorpe School owes much to these men.

Mothers were most active in the P.T.A. and attendances would shame the majority of city schools today. I don't

remember having played Beetle since.

The annual School Concert packed the Elsthorpe Hall to the doors. No matter how hard teachers tried, the school could never produce the star item. The annual star performance was given by a large black opossum that scurried across the stage pursued by children, parents and teachers.

The visit to Christchurch with the senior pupils was a memorable occasion as was the fantastic bottle drive which

paid for the chartered bus to Wellington and return.

Sporting activities were always well supported by parents and many were the rugby, netball and athletic visits to Argyle, Pukehou, Omakere, Otane, Waipawa and Waipukurau.

Agriculture Day always began well with classroom displays and the parade of pets. However, by the end of the afternoon nerves were strained—particularly those of the pets.

Mention must be made of those staff members who gave such valuable assistance to me during my years in Elsthorpe.

No article would be complete without reference to the children who attended the Elsthorpe School and in particular those whom I taught. I can say in all sincerity that I have as yet to meet more conscientious, reliable and better mannered children than those I had the privilege to teach in Elsthorpe.

Elsthorpe School, I am sure, can be proud of its pupils and the contribution they made to New Zealand sport, industry, farming and the professions. It is my confident hope that they will continue to serve the community throughout the next seventy-five years as well as they have for the past three-quarters of a century.

Mr L. L. Brown

(1965-)

It is eight years since I arrived as Head Teacher. The following year my wife was appointed as Teachers' Aide—one of the first in Hawke's Bay, and together we have experienced tremendous school interest and support from the people of this district. Our three boys have had the major portion of their schooling here and we have made many valued friendships and enjoyed a full and stimulating life.

I feel privileged to have taught many children who have had all their schooling here and I am continually impressed by the manners, sense of responsibility and sensitivity towards others shown by the children here—in all very teachable children. It is with pleasure that I follow their later lives and careers.

I have endeavoured to ensure all children have the opportunity to participate in a wide field of activities and I appreciate the willingness of parents to assist with providing transport. We have had numerous sporting contacts, had our share of winning and enjoyed wild enthusiasm at such events as swimming sports, D.A. days, rugby and netball.

Library development and reading has been one of my greatest interests and I have been fortunate in working with School Committees and P.T.As. who share this interest and have provided funds annually for books. I feel this school can be justifiably proud of its library.

There have been many highlights — the Christchurch trip with 32 children, Mrs E. Bibby and my wife; 2 very active trips to Kaitawa with enthusiastic parents and first class cooks; preparing and taking part in annual music festivals, concerts, balls. excursions, and individual swimming progress from the 5-year-olds to competent swimmers.

I am indebted to the assistance given to me by the Staff and in particular, my wife, who has worked with me. We have had very stable years of staffing and have always had very willing and conscientious assistants who have played an active part in the life of the school.

The Education Board have improved conditions greatly by building a dental clinic, a new toilet block, new schoolhouse and storage sheds. These improvements, together with the added amenities contributed by the efforts of School Committees, P.T.A., galas, and sheep funds, have given me the benefit of teaching in a school which is well equipped in all ways.

We are now staffed with 3 assistants and 1 teaching aide and a further room is in the foreseeable future. With the many pre-schoolers in the district, this school is assured of years of service to the community.

I look back with pride in the achievements of this district for their school and look forward to the continued support and development of Elsthorpe School. When the time comes for us to leave it will be with a feeling of sadness. However, we will have a store of satisfying memories and enriched lives to look back on.

I welcome all past teachers and pupils and look forward to meeting many of you here during the celebrations.


DR. DERRICK BREACH, B.A., M.A., M.Sc., Ph.D.—1942-43

SCHOOL BUS SERVICES

From 1945 school buses became an integral part of school life. Mrs W. Pepper began the first service on the Valley and Beach roads. The latter went as far as Waipuna, while the Valley bus catered for children as far as Forrests.

Shortly after this Mr J. Macaulay began a run on the Atua and to the St Lawrence station. Later this service was obtained by Mr Pepper. Between them the Peppers maintained a bus schedule which became renowned for punctuality and reliability. In the twenty years they covered 700,000 miles, accident free.

In 1965, the business was purchased by Mr Ken Blakie, who with his wife continued to provide a reliable and efficient service. In 1967, a new house was built and vested in the County.

Mr Blackie replaced the old vehicles with modern buses.

The present operators, Mr and Mrs D. F. Richards, took over in 1970. Mr Richards purchased a further vehicle and now has a stand-by bus. Today's run involves 180 miles and is one of the largest to serve a rural school.

We are fortunate indeed to have had such a stable and efficient bus service right from its very inception through to today.



train to see the Dreadnought.

1/5/13 The new members of the School Committee are Messrs J. McNeill (Chairman), H. Haycock (Secretary), H. Stephenson, G. Beachen, R. McAulay, A. Kenderdine and M. Priest.

18/ 7/13 Drs. Decke and South visited school today at two o'clock and vaccinated the school children and

adults to the number of 72.

26/11/13 A start was made today on the new piece of asphalt. The ground in front of the school is hardly sufficient for the doubling exercises, etc., in physical culture so we are having the area extended over to the fence between the school and house.

31/ 7/14 School closed Wednesday at 1.55 to enable pupils to go to wedding.

11/12/14 £32 donated by children for Belgian Relief.



- 15/10/41 A school tennis tournament was held on the local courts. Sixteen pupils took part.

The Kairakau picnics appear to feature regularly. Most appear to have been enjoyed in wonderful conditions. However, records show one was held in the hall because of rain and another at the domain because of petrol restrictions during the war.

Ploughing matches must have been popular. The school was closed many times for this event.

Scarlet fever and polio were obviously real threats. Many times reference is made to the closing of the school or the exclusion of contact children.

It is amazing the number of times the weather affected school rolls. Hardly a year went by without reference to some flood when roads were impassable.

The staffing of Head and Sole Teachers has always been very stable and the tendency was for these teachers to have a fairly lengthy stay. However, a large number of relieving assistants attended the school, especially during the "middle years".

One cannot help but be impressed by the plantings of trees. Every teacher and committee appear to have made massive plantings. Fortunately some of these are still evident.

The School Ball was a real event of note. It was a real money-spinner as well.

Various references to the Patangata School suggest that it was the first school in the area but closed several times. Children from St Lawrence attended there when it was open. This caused the Elsthorpe roll to fluctuate a little.
