

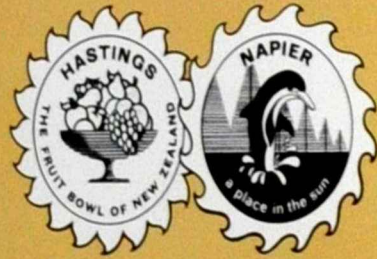

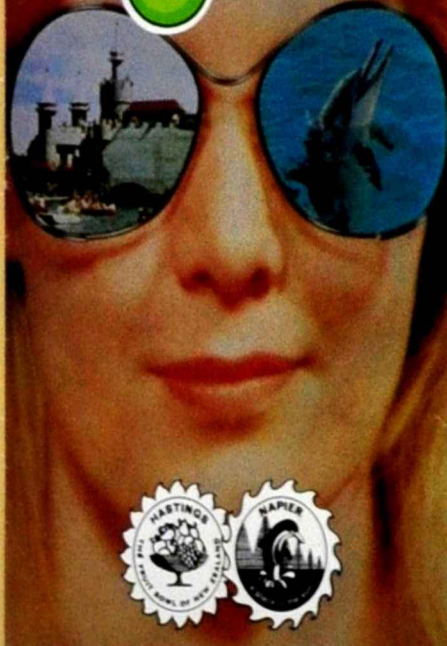

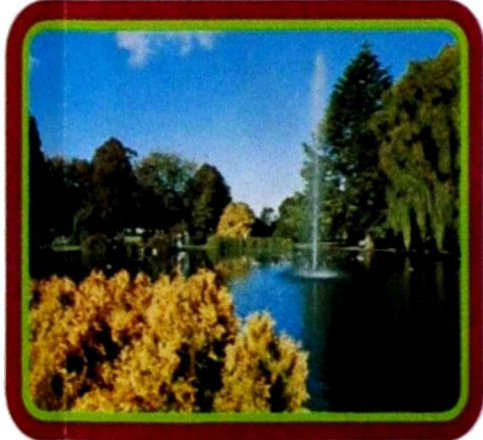
MEET THE TWIN CITIES people

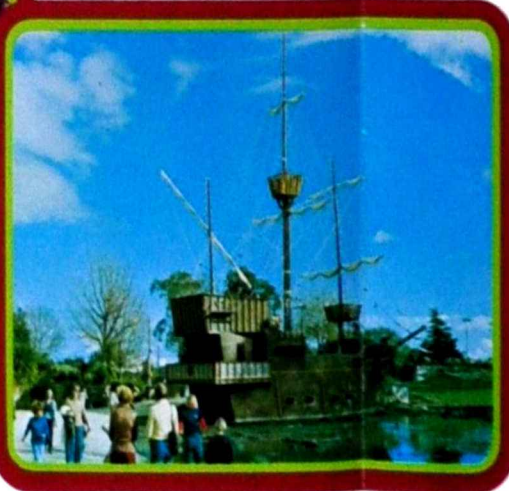
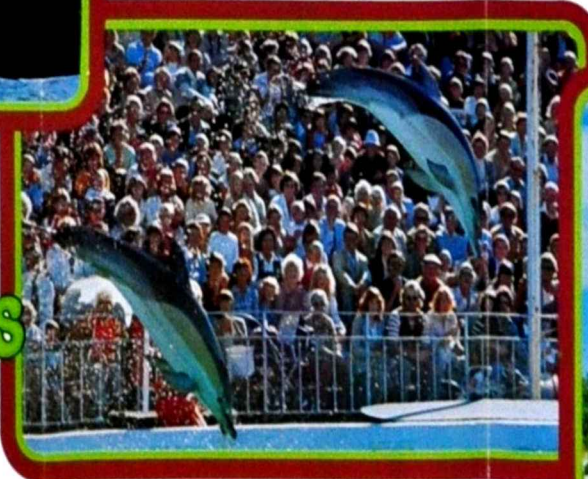
HAVE A TWIN CITIES picnic
