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1909, Looking south from St. Aubyn St west 1909 down Market St nth lined with an avenue of Plane trees. The new Oddfellow's hall distant removed and opened November 1893 in Market St nth near the new Heretaunga Lodge (No. 78, N.Z.C.) 2nd Masonic Hall forefront built March 1901. The first Oddfellow's Hall was built on King St sth on sections 274 275. Across St. Aubyn St - Market St continued past the Railway Storeman's houses of John Corkery and Allan Dale to the Prep School and Kindergarten of Miss Addey Wilson

1909, Hastings West Settlements - Interesting reports were laid before the Hawke's Bay Land Board to-day by the Crown Lands Ranger on the Mahora, Tomoana and Raureka settlements, which were formerly a part of the Frimley Estate, near Hastings. The Mahora settlement was opened for selection on March 22, 1899, and the area purchased was 1133 acres' 3 roods. The number of selectors is 32 and the total population 170. There are 32 dwelling-houses, valued; at £7,360. The 'improvements erected by selectors are valued at £12,726 5s, as against £3478 18s.10d required, by law. Dairying and fruit-growing are the principal industries and poultry and bee-farming are being taken up to some extent, and have given satisfactory results. One of the settlers, with 50 colonies of bees, netted about 16s a hive for the season. The Tomoana settlement was placed on the market on March 2, 1898. The area purchased was 111 acres 3 roods 38 perches. The number of selectors is 13, and total population 54. There are 12 dwelling-houses in the settlement of a total value of £2510 and 11 selectors are residing on their holdings. The improvements required amount to £310.8s and the value of improvements, effected is placed at £3873. The season, says the ranger, has been very favourable for fruit and root crops generally. The settlers are contented and happy. The Raureka settlement was placed on the market m May 1896, the area purchased being 427 acres 2 roods. The number of selectors is 18 and the total population 96. There are 17 dwelling-houses of a total value of £3015. The value of improvements effected by selections amounts to £5462.5s as against £2374.10s required by law. Dairying and fruit-growing continue to be the principal sources of income and the settlement is prosperous.

1909, **Boyd & Hitchcock** – at the old Heretaunga Bakery, Heretaunga St west at Grays Rd - Charles William Boyd and Harry Hitchcock, later around 1914 just Harry Hitchcock when Charles Boyd left the district.

Henry Hitchcock b:1886, died at Hastings aged 70 and Florence Lilian Hitchcock died at Hastings April 1971 aged 84.

Charles William Boyd a baker b: October 1879 Lower Hutt, Wellington the son of William and Ellen Boyd. In June 1903 he married Sophie Olsen b: July 1875 in Petone Wellington. They had three children - 1904 Moyra Irene Boyd, 1906 Eric Carl Olsen Boyd and 1908 Charles Trevor Boyd. Sophie Boyd nee Olsen died October 1942 at Wellington aged 67 and Charles William Boyd married Kathleen Hannah in December 1943. He died at Palmerston North in January 1953 aged 73. In June 1911, William McCarthy, alias D. McCarthy, alias James Brown aged 29 years, was charged with stealing a cashbox valued at 2/- and containing 31/- the property of Boyd and Co. bakers at Hastings, on June 6th. Accused pleaded not guilty. Mr Charles William Boyd identified the cash-box (produced). James Maddison, cook, said; that he had known accused since Tuesday last. Met him yesterday at Hastings, and went to Stortford Lodge, returning about 3 o'clock. When passing Boyd and Co.'s shop accused said to witness, Wait here a minute; I want to go in here and see this gentleman. I knew him in Dunedin. (where Charles William Boyd had a previous fraud charge) The accused came out with a cash-box in his hand, dropped it over a fence and then went round to the side of the bakehouse. Witness did, not want to be mixed up in the affair, so he reported the matter to the police. Sophia Boyd said she was in a bedroom about three o'clock and saw a man placing a cash-box inside a gate near the house. Constable Brenchly stated Maddison had reported the theft to him.

1909, Laurence Dion Boyd was born at Hastings, the son of Mabel Alice and Stephens Boyd, he married Alma Gwendoline McCardle in September 1936.

1909, Thomas James Dimond b: October 1884 in Clive the son of Mary Ann and Patrick Henry Dimond, married Sarah Elizabeth Spence b: 1883 in Napier.

1909, Herbert Richard Beale b: December 1875 in London the son of Sarah Elizabeth and Alfred Edwin Beale, married in Hastings, Maud Yateman b: 1882 They had one child - November 1909 George Gordon Beale. Herbert Richard Beale died September 1948 in Hastings aged 72 and Maud Beale nee Yateman died November 1953 in Hastings aged 71.

1909, **Sydney Clifford Lowe** b: November 1886 in Tinwald Canterbury the son of Phoebe Emily and Francis Lowe, married Elsie Bertha Sinclair b: January 1888 at Hastings the daughter of Agnes Catherine and William Sinclair, They had five children - 1910 Francis William Lowe he married Elizabeth Wilhelmina Livingstone in 1935, August 1911 Eleanor Lowe she married Wallace Stevenson Hewitt in 1934, September 1913 Clifford Philip Lowe he had one child with Alice Catherine Elizabeth, 1916 John Anthony Lowe and 1918 Sydney Norman Lowe, 1919 Thomas Grant Lowe, 1921 Aileen Jean Lowe, 1921 Geoffrey Ivan Lowe. Sydney Clifford Lowe died January 1961 in Hastings aged 74 and Elsie Bertha Lowe nee Sinclair died February 1966 in Hastings aged 78.

1909, Clarence Edward Cook born at Hastings the son of Ingrid and George Cook. **George Cook** b: June 1886 in Whangare the son of Fanny Jane and John Cook, in 1909 he married Ingrid Hansen b: 1883, the daughter of Hulda and Lars Hansen. They had two children - July 1912 Elsie Cook at Hastings she married John Kitchener Coleman in 1936. Ingrid Cook nee Hansen died June 1969 aged 86 and (Captain) George Cook of 66 Napier Rd Havelock North died June 1977 aged 91.

1909, **(Hans) John Henry Hemmingsen** b: January 1888 in Makaretu Hawke's Bay the son of Mathilde and Lars Peter Hemmingsen married at Hastings Helen Maude Stock b: January 1890 in Dunedin the daughter of Clara and Joseph Stock. They had two children - June 1913 John Henry Hemmingson, June 1913 Archibald Fatima Hemmingsen at Hastings. In 1917 John Henry Hemmingsen married Mrs Jane Catherine Conway nee Farmer. In August 1918 Death - Conway - At Napier Hospital, Margaret Conway, eldest daughter of Mrs Hemmingson, Boundary Rd Mahora and the late John Patrick Conway; aged 16 years. The funeral will leave her mother's residence. In 1922 Jane Catherine Burges John Henry a labourer at Boundary Rd along with his brother Alexander Hemmingsen, In 1931 Jane Catherine Burgess and John Henry Hemmingson. Jane Catherine Conway / Hemmingson nee Farmer of 709 Williams St died 1974 aged 97 and (Hans) John Henry Hemmingson died 1959 aged 72 and Helen Maude Hemmingsen nee Stock died October 1948 in Auckland aged 58.

In 1911, Mathilde and Lars Peter Hemmingson a farmer 213 Southampton St along with John Henry Hemmingson a labourer. In July 1910 Cassidy and Co land agents of Station St Hastings sold Hastings town properties:- Mr L. P. Hemmingson's two sections of 1½ acre each, situated off Karamu Rd to Mr W. J. Willoughby.

1909, Nurse Nairn's Private Hospital, 404 Southampton St west near King St - Miss Flora Elsie Nairn a Registered Nurse from Dannevirke and N. McNeill as Nairn and McNeill private hospital. **Flora Eliza Nairn** b: 1869 in New Zealand the daughter of Sarah and Henry Nairn, 1896 Flora Eliza Nairn at Waipawa, she married Douglas Barrington Kent in 1913. They had one child - December 1913 Flora Holt in Central Hawke's Bay, Douglas Barrington Kent died April 1951 and Flora Eliza Kent nee Nairn died May 1964 in Waihi aged 95.

1909 February, Dr. Macdonnell advertises that he will resume the practice of his profession in Hastings on February 12th

1909 February, Edwin Portlock Cuthbert was born at Hastings the son of Hilda May and William George Cuthbert he married Nancy Heyward Lash in 1937. **William George Cuthbert** b: September 1870 in Invercargill the son of Emily and Edwin Cuthbert in 1908 he married Hilda May East b: November 1882 in Christchurch. They had three children In October 1909 W.G. Cuthbert asked the council to replace culvert at his property Queen's Square – council accepts no responsibility. They went to Gisborne. William George Cuthbert died April 1954 in Hawke's Bay aged 83 and Hilda May Cuthbery nee East died April 1955 in Waipuku, Taranaki aged 72.

1909 February, Raymond Harold Page was born at Hastings the son of Sarah Annie and Horace Nigel Ward Page, he first married Coral May Crook in 1943 in Victoria Aus then Jessie Phyllis Larkins in September 1951. **Horace Nigel Ward Page** b: July 1879 in Tasmania Aus, in February 1905 in NZ he married Sarah Annie Bason b: 1878 in Northwich Cheshire Eng. They had one child. In 1908 Annie and Horace Page a labourer at Queen St, in 1917 WW1 Reserves Horace N. W. Page a fireman c/- freezing works Paki Paki 2nd Division. Sarah Annie Page nee Bason died June 1954 in Victoria Aust aged 76 and Horace Nigel Ward Page died October 1964 in Box Hill Victoria Aus aged 85.

1909 February, Muriel Eileen McKain only was born at Hastings the daughter of Sarah Ann and Henry Joseph McKain, she died a teenager October 1923. Henry Joseph McKain from Waipawa b: June 1856 in Wellington the son of Harriett and John McKain, in 1889 he married Sarah Ann Lozell b: March 1868 the daughter of Mary and Samuel Lozell. They had nine children. Henry Joseph McKain died August 1944 in Auckland aged 88 and Sarah Ann McKain nee Lozell died September 1951 in Auckland aged 83.

1909 February, Frank Charles William Anderson was born at Hastings the son of Maud Eudora and Charles Duncan Anderson, he married Hillier Elizabeth Bunting in 1936. **Charles Duncan Anderson** b: August 1866 the son of Christina and William Anderson, in 1908 he married Maud Eudora Watson b: March 1872 in Birmingham Warwickshire Eng. They had two children - January 1910 Rhoda Deborah Maud Anderson at Fernhill. Maud Eudora Anderson nee Watson died February 1947 in Hastings aged 74 and Charles Duncan Anderson died August 1958 in Hastings aged 92.

1909 February, Death, Curtis - At Waipukurau Hospital, William Curtis (after a short illness) aged 27 years. The Funeral will leave his mother's residence, Avenue Rd, Hastings for the Hastings cemetery.

1909 February, Motor Car Capsize. Yesterday evening at about five o'clock a motor car accident happened on the Tomoana Rd, which fortunately was not attended with serious results. It appears that Mr **Clowe** was driving an **8 horse-power De Dion** car on a trial spin, with a view of selling it to one of the occupants of the car. Coming in the opposite direction were two gigs and three motor cars. The cars were passed safely, and with a view of giving plenty of room, for

the gigs to pass, which were occupied by ladies. Mr Clowe steered his car **on to the grass at the side of the road** with the result that the wheels skidded, causing the car to capsize, throwing out the four occupants. The passengers received a severe shaking, but escaped serious injury. After the overturned car, which was only slightly damaged, had been uprighted, the party proceeded to Hastings, very little the worse for their experience.

1909 February, The Mayor and Mayoress (**Mr and Mrs Thomas John Thompson**) celebrated their silver wedding yesterday. A number of guests were invited to commemorate the occasion at "Rangimarie" the residence of the Mayor and amongst the guests were six persons who were present at Mr and Mrs Thompson's wedding which took place at St. Paul's Church, Napier, 25 years ago, the service being conducted by the late Rev. J. G. Paterson. The persons referred to were Mr and Mrs Charles Hughes (Hastings) Mr and Mrs Alexander (Napier) and Mr and Mrs W. Thompson (Hastings) A very pleasant afternoon and evening was spent with song and story and the recalling of amusing and startling incidents which had occurred during a period of a quarter of a century. Mr and Mrs Thompson were the recipients of a number of valuable silver articles as a memento of the happy occasion.

1909 March, Messrs Hall and Son, G. S. Clapham, Foster Brook and Sharp and Alford, booksellers, of Hastings, petitioned the Minister of Labour, through the Council, for permission to keep their shops open until 10 p.m. on Saturdays. Necessary certificate to be given.

1909 March, Messrs Gallagher, Carr and Co., grocers have secured the lease of those fine brick buildings in Heretaunga St west recently occupied by Messrs **A. Jones & Sons** and will shortly remove to their new premises.



1909 March, John Kerr married Mrs Rosanna Fergusson nee Turner b: December 1858 in Great Sampford, Essex, the daughter of Jane and Hezrai Turner. Rosanna Turner had married James Robert Fergusson in July 1877. Rosanna Fergusson / Kerr nee Turner died August 1929 in Hastings aged 70 and John Kerr died May 1947 in Hastings aged 85.

1909 March, Malcolm McKenzie Duncan was born at Hastings the son of Margaret Agatha and Roderick McKenzie Duncan, he married Molly Jean Wynwood in July 1934 in Tasmania. **Roderick McKenzie Duncan** b: September 1881 in Hobart Tasmania, Aus in 1906 at Nelson he married Margaret Agatha Reilly b: 1881 in Nelson. They had one son. Roderick McKenzie Duncan died April 1952 in Cressy Tasmania, Aus aged 70 and Margaret Agatha Duncan nee Reilly died 1957 in Launceston Tasmania Aus aged 76.

1909 March, Mrs Grace Sowersby snr died at Hastings aged 82. The funeral will leave her late residence Albert St for the Hastings cemetery.

1909 March, Montague Stevens buried at Hastings, the son of Edith Jane and Walter John Stevens.

1909 March, Rangi Koianaki Joll was born in Hastings, he married Jocelyn Ebbett the daughter of Rachel Flora and Sydney Ebbett.

1909 March, Lole Julia Hill was born at Hastings the daughter of Nina Norton and Dudley Bruce Hill. **Dudley Bruce Hill** b: 1869 NZ the son of Elizabeth Anne and Captain Kenrick Hill, in September 1905 he married Nina Norton Tanner b: October 1877 in Norton Durham, Eng the daughter of Julia and Thomas Tanner of Havelock North. They had four children - 1907 Kenrick Rowan Hill he died June 1942 aged 35 buried in Egypt, January 1911 Vivian Dudley Hill at Hastings he married Elizabeth Harvey. In November 1897 The Fernhill Station the property of Captain Hill with his wife and family. Mr Dudley Hill will in future be in charge of the station. 1928 Dudley Bruce Hill a farmer at Fernhill. Nina Norton Hill nee Tanner died August 1934 aged 56 buried at Fernhill, in 1937 Dudley Bruce Hill married Phyllis Mottram Woodward. Dudley Bruce Hill died?

1909 March, Doris Elina Nilsson was born at Hastings the daughter of Florence and George Edwin Nilsson. **George Edwin Nilsson** b:1873 in NZ the son of Elina and Jöns Nilsson in 1908 he married Florence Allan b: 1879 in Melbourne Victoria Aus the daughter of Annie and James Allan. They had two children - July 1914 Allan George Edwin Nilsson at Hastings, he died a teenager in 1932 in Victoria, Aus. George Edwin Nilsson died 1942 in Prahra Victoria Aus aged 69 and Florence Nilsson nee Allan died March 1950 in South Melbourne Victoria Aus aged 71.

1909 March, Raymond Patrick Madden only was born at Hastings the son of Louisa Mary and Patrick Joseph Madden, he married Mavis Agnes Crosbie in 1935. **Patrick Joseph Madden** b: March 1867 in Kilmacduane Clare Ireland in May 1904 in Wellington he married Louisa Mary Hogg b: June 1877 in Stoke Nelson the daughter of Ellen and John Hogg. They had six children. Patrick Joseph Madden died August 1946 in Napier aged 79 and Louisa Mary Madden nee Hogg died May 1959 in Napier aged 81.

1909 March, William Thomas Farrant was born at Hastings the son of Margaret and Thomas Thompson Anderson Farrant, he died same year. **Thomas Thompson Anderson Farrant** b: 1884, in 1907 at Papakura Auckland he married Margaret Entwisle b:1882 the daughter of Phoebe and James Entwisle. They were in Hastings a short while. Thomas Thompson Anderson Farrant died May 1934 in Drury Auckland aged 50 and Margaret Entwisle died January 1965 in Papakura Auckland aged 83.

1909 March, An elderly man stripped and entered the sea on the town beach Napier at about 7 o'clock pm and is believed to have been drowned. His clothing is marked with the name "Spence." It is thought the man was a resident of Hastings. The body of the elderly man drowned in the surf last evening was recovered this morning. It has been identified as that of **Samuel Spence**, a resident of Hastings the husband of Elizabeth Spence who died December 1931.

In March 1909 Charles Stubbs and Robert Beck, Market St nth in the manufacturing portion of the manufacturing portion of the old established firm of A. Jones & Son commenced their business. Robert Beck b:1867 in Christchurch, the son of Jane and Robert Beck Antigua St. He received a liberal education and was afterwards apprenticed to the engineering trade there, subsequently receiving the appointment of chief engineer of the Fairfield (Canterbury) Freezing Works, which he held for several years. In 1901 he married Mary Maud Stewart they had one daughter around 1911 Fanny Horton Beck. About 1909 they arrived in Hastings, in conjunction with Mr C. Stubbs he established the firm of "Stubbs and Beck" Market St. Some two years afterwards the partnership was dissolved and Mr Beck accepted an appointment of chief engineer of the Tokomaru Bay Freezing Works where he personally superintended the installation of the machinery when the works were first opened. Owing to ill-health, however, after two years' residence at Tokomaru Bay, he had to relinquish his position and he returned to Hastings, where he again entered into business in partnership with Mr F. Collinge under the style of "Beck and Collinge" engineers, which was successful. Mr Beck met with an accident about two years ago when a motor car collided with his bicycle on Karamu Rd Hastings whilst he was returning home during the lunch hour and he received internal injuries which incapacitated him ever since. He was operated on at Royston Private Hospital and underwent radium treatment at Dunedin, but without any beneficial result and he never regained his previous robust health. During his business career Mr Beck was noted for his high integrity and affability. He always took a lively interest in education. They lived Wolseley

Rd in 1914 and he died at Napier hospital February 1922 aged 55 buried Hastings and Mary Maud Beck nee Stewart died September 1955 aged 85.



1910, Shows D. E. Davis & S. Boyd's wooden show room & country garage at 128 **Market St** nth and Queen St west where they first operated, they were also listed as 300 Queen St next to Stubbs & Beck Co, roof signage for previous tenant P. W. Sampson – Percy Wallace Sampson a Commercial Traveller from Waipukurau, this building burnt down in January 1929

In June 1913 Robert Beck late of Stubbs and Beck has commenced new business with Fred Collinge in Heretaunga St west, next to J. Adamson, builder. Frederick Tucker Collinge an engineer of Frederick St, the son of John Collinge former Town Clerk.

Opening of the new Free Carnegie Library -

1909 April, About 30 persons assembled at the Library yesterday afternoon for the purpose of celebrating the opening of the new free Library. His Worship the Mayor Mr T. Thompson presided, and in the course of his remarks said that it afforded him very great pleasure to see such a represented gathering small though it was. It was indeed a "red letter day" in the history of the Hastings Library. Between eight and ten years ago it was mooted that the municipality should run a free library, and at that time the building they had was the old Library situated at the rear of the handsome and well-equipped building in which they had assembler that day. It was owing to the generous assistance of Mr Carnegie that they were able to possess this building as a free institution. Of course when he used the words free, it was understood that the ratepayers contributed towards its upkeep. Whether the income would be sufficient to enable the committee to continue on these lines, time alone would tell, he at least hoped so. Mr A. A. George said that there was a diversity of opinion as to whether the institution could be successfully run on free lines, but he was guite of the opinion that it could. The institution had made excellent progress, and there was no reason why it should not continue to do so. His desire was to see Hastings go ahead and ahead. It was about two years ago since the new building was taken over, and the committee, which was composed of members of the Council and the Library committee, worked harmoniously together with good results. As the result of the labours of that committee, it was decided to make the institution free, and by so doing carried into effect the full conditions of Mr Carnegie's gift. The income of the Library totalled £400, the 1d rate providing £360, which was, of course, subsidized by the Government. The committee had in hand a credit balance of nearly £200, which had been placed aside for future requirements. They had formed the nucleus of a reference library, which the committee hoped would be taken full advantage of by the young people to help them in their studies, The committee would be pleased to receive suggestions from those attending the library I concerning new books which they considered should be purchased, or in any direction that would tend to improve the usefulness of the library. His desire was to see Hastings become the most progressive town in the Dominion. Mr W. H. Smith said that he desired to say a fee words on behalf of the ladies present, and congratulated the committee upon the success achieved by them, and he could assure them that they tendered their appreciation and hearty congratulations. The assemblage then adjourned to the lending library to partake of afternoon tea, kindly provided by the Mayoress and her lady friends. The table decorations by Mrs Reynolds were worthy of special mention.



The Andrew Carnegie Hastings Public Library building in Market St sth constructed of brick in Queen Anne style designed by Napier architect Mr C. A. Vautier., on the ¼ acre section of James Boyle's, having frontage of 82½ft and a depth of 132ft and which the Borough Council had taken over for public use in October 1901. The old wooden Athenaeum was removed to the rear taken before driveway gates installed, the adjoining new wooden Hastings Club built 1906 designed by George Sollitt.

In October 1915, Mr Charles Hughes presented to the Hastings Public Library an oak framed copy of the first issue of the 'Melbourne Advertiser," published at Port Phillip in 1838. The paper contains four pages of handwritten matter. The gift will no doubt be appreciated by frequenters of the library and will be a valuable addition to the many valuable curios that already adorn the walls of that building. Poss destroyed in the Quake.

In December 1922, A petition is being signed at the **Hastings Public Library** asking the committee to consider removing the book-room from its present position upstairs to the ground floor. It is pointed out that the climb necessary to reach the lending library is too much for elderly or infirm people.

In March 1923, Crs Clarkson and Perrin have been appointed to obtain information regarding new accommodation for the Hastings public librarian and the extension of the library.

In May 1923, The Carnegie Corporation has at last replied to the Hastings Borough Council's letter of 12th January and intimated that whilst they cannot view with approval any library in a building provided by Mr Carnegie as a free library, having its status changed to that of a library charging fees nevertheless it will take no effective steps to interfere with the carrying out of the wishes of the authorities to make the institution partially a subscription library.

In June 1923, Hastings Borough Council meeting - The public librarian is leaving her quarters in the residence provided for her at the rear of the library and tenders are to be called for the cottage.

In September 1923, **Theft from Hastings public library** the till rifled and its contents about £3 stolen Librarian **Mrs Skipper** would leave the library at 5 and reopen it at 7pm although the reading room was occupied by a number of people except at 6pm when it was tea time.

In April 1925 a children's section of the Hastings Public library was inaugurated and Miss Morgan was assistant librarian, 520 adult subscribers and 296 juvenile subscribers. In September 1925 The subscription to the Hastings Public library now total 614 adults and 290 children.

In May 1926, The frontage to the Hastings Public Library is at present being dug up from the porch towards the Hastings Club for the purpose of establishing a garden plot. It is proposed to protect the area all round with a low wall and garden seats will be placed in suitable positions. The little plantations when completed should form an attractive decoration in connection with the library and will contribute a brilliant dash of colour to the vicinity in the spring and summer.


In July 1946, long after this brick library was destroyed in the quake, the borough council sought to sell the site, but it was not legally possible as the borough council had no original deed of gift from James Boyle as proof, so the borough council had to seek statutory authority for leave from the House of Representatives through the Lands Disposal Bill. The old site was unsuitable for a new library to be built upon and the sale proceeds would go towards a new library at Civic Square.

1909 April, Hastings Fire - A Fire at Phillips, Wright & Co furniture factory Heretaunga St west. At about midnight, Constable O'Grady, who was on night duty, smelt fire in the direction of King St and made his way in that direction. He walked past Messrs Phillips, Wright & Co furniture and joinery factory, but failed to observe any reflection of fire. He proceeded along King St for a short distance and upon returning saw that the factory was on fire. He at once raised the alarm, and the Fire Brigade, under Captain Brausche, and the Fire Police Salvage Corps, under Captain Halse, were quickly on the spot. Steam was raised in a very short time, and three leads of hose were directed on to the fire from the manhole at Roach corner. A strong south-westerly gale was blowing at the time, and the flames had a strong hold at the seat of the fire, which was at the rear of the two-storey portion of the building on the ground floor. Almost adjoining this portion of the building was a four-roomed cottage occupied by Mr H. J. Hallinan's (blacksmith) cottage and owned by Mr A. F. Douglas. In a few seconds the cottage was ablaze, and Constable O'Grady awakened the inmates, Mr and Mrs Hallinan and two children and Mrs Lewis, who were at the time sound asleep. The constable's action was undoubtedly the means of saving their lives, as they only had time to scramble together a few articles of wearing apparel. The factory, which was about 100 feet long by 40 feet wide, was of light structure, and as dry as tinder. The seasoned timber used for cabinetmaking purposes and the piles of shavings fed the flames to such advantage that in spite of the Brigade's efforts the factory and cottage in a short time were a roaring mass of flames which quickly razed the buildings to the ground. The heat was so intense that the large gates at the rear of Mr S. Graham's livery stables were set on fire, but the flames were extinguished before much damage was done. Thompson's boarding-house, situated on the opposite side of the road was in great danger for a time, but two large willow trees growing in front of the building materially assisted in saving it from destruction. Messrs Tombs and Grubbs' large furniture factory, a cottage used by Messrs Manson and Co. as a storeroom, and the same firm's timber yard, all situated in Market St, were set alight by sparks carried by the wind, but willing workers, who formed a bucket brigade, kept vigilant watch, and extinguished the latter fires in their early stages. At this the Brigade's attention was directed to fighting the flames with a view of saving the front offices and show rooms of Messrs Phillips, Wright & Co, which front Heretaunga St. Luckily the high wind was blowing in a direction that assisted their efforts, which were successful. The chances of saving this portion of the building looked so remote at one period that Captain Halse, of the Fire Police, deemed it advisable to instruct his men to salvage the contents, which was expeditiously done. After about three quarters of an hour's hard work it was evident that the fire was beaten, and it was indeed fortunate for while the hoses were playing on the burning ruins the engine broke down and the efforts of the engineers to get it going again were ineffective and it had to be taken to the engineering works of Messrs Stubbs and Beck for repairs. There was then nothing else for it but to bring the antiquated manual engine into use, and the firemen toiled hard pumping water on to the glowing ruins for several hours. The cause of the fire is unknown, but at about twelve o'clock Mr Hallinan, who resided next door to the factory states that he heard someone open the large gates at the back entrance to the factory. There is little doubt that the fire started in the vicinity of the paint -shop. The Brigades good work - Twelve fifteen a.m. is not the best time of the night for a fire to start, for the firemen who have to work hard at their avocations during the day are generally restoring their "worn out energies by indulging in a sound sleep. Nevertheless in a very -short time after the bell called them to duty last night they had the steamer at work pumping through two or three leads of hose. Their promptness in getting to work is very favourably commented upon. The individual members of the Brigade are also commended for the manner they carried out their duties. Shadowy helmeted figures were just discernable moving about in dense clouds of smoke, and the heat they subjected themselves to must have caused them considerable pain. And after an hour or so's work of this description they cheerfully took their turn at the manual when the steamer broke down and the unstinted praise which has been bestowed upon them is deservedly due. Messrs Phillips, Wright and Co. and Mr S. Graham speak in high praise of the excellent work done by this smart little corps. The furniture and other articles which they removed from the shop was done in a manner which plainly bore evidence of care, discipline and despatch, and when their duties ceased after replacing the goods in the shop it was found that neither damage or loss had been sustained in this department. In the face of the terrific heat the

corps removed a number of valuable carriages and buggies from the stables of Mr Graham and placed them in safety. Mr Hallinan had an insurance of £75 on his furniture in the Standard office. He estimates his loss at fully £100 over and above this amount. Mrs Lewis, who was temporarily staying in the house, had with her about £100 worth of goods, upon which she had no insurance. She lost almost everything. The cottage owned by Mr A. F. Douglas was insured for £150 in the Phoenix. Messrs Phillips, Wright and Co. had only yesterday landed in their premises a quantity of new stock, valued at about £300, and in the packing department was a quantity of valuable furniture made to the order of Dr. Nairn for his new residence, which with other orders was to be despatched this morning. A quantity of rosewood imported for the purpose of carrying out a local order, and the tools of some 20 workmen, were also totally destroyed. The contents of the front shop, which were saved, were uninsured. Messrs Phillips, Wright & Co total insurances are: Building, stock, machinery, and contents, inclusive of a nominal amount on furniture in progress of manufacture. £1100 in the North Queensland office. The loss is estimated at £2,000. On arrival at the fire last night Lieut. Keith went to lift the lid of the sewer man-hole at Roach corner but the ring bolt and nut pulled through the rotten wood and he had to go to the Railway crossing to get a crow-bar to force the lid which was jammed firmly in its place. Another delay was caused by the gear attached to the flood gates being in such a rusty and unworkable condition that crow bars had again to be brought into use to force the gate down. It is quite evident that the condition of the sewer traps are bad, as the same state of affairs was discovered at the Heretaunga crossing quite recently. The necessity of an immediate inspection in this direction is apparent.

1909 April, **Mrs G. P. Donnelly** of Crisssoge, Omahu has been seriously ill for some time, she is in almost critical state. She, however, spent a very peaceful, quiet night, but she died aged 55. She was married to George Prior Donnelly for 31 years.

1909 April, Edith Ivy Doris (Doris) Higgs was born in Hastings the daughter of Edith Mary and Charles Frederick Higgs, she married Edward Gordon Sutherland. **Charles Frederick Higgs** b:1884 the son of Eliza Jane and Charles Edward Higgs in April 1907 in Stoke Newington, Middlesex he married Edith Mary Pearce b: April 1887 the daughter of William Pearce. They had three children at Hastings - November 1911 Jessie Rose Higgs she had one son with Ronald Edgar Sutherland in 1939 and April 1915 Charles William Higgs he died February 1941 aged 25. In 1910 they resided at Albert St Hastings, in 1917 WW1 Reserves Charles Frederick Higgs a joiner at Stanley Rd 2nd Division. Edith Mary Higgs nee Pearce died May 1943 in Hastings aged 60. Charles Frederick Higgs a joiner of Stanley St (Grove Rd) Hastings, In 1947 at Hastings he married Mrs Elizabeth Paul nee Smith she had married Robert Paul in 1895. 

1909, Hastings Fire - Garnett's sash & door factory caught fire, but his timber yard in Eastbourne St east between Karamu Rd and the Railway line was saved. James Garnett was elected on to the Borough Council in April.

Ernest Whyte Garnett b: October 1887 in Hastings the son of Hannah and James William Garnett. His parents had arrived in 1884 and removed to Hastings 1886 where his father James operated a cabinetmaking, ironmonger and undertaker business and was also a former mayor Hastings. After receiving his education at Central School Ernest joined his father in the building and contracting business. In 1909 Ernest Whyte Garnett married Emily May McAuslin b: July 1892 in Ashburton Canterbury, the daughter of Mary and William McAuslin. They had ten children - February 1910 Violet Linda Garnett, April 1912 Ivy Garnett, 1914 Ivan Ernest Garnett he died as a child May 1915, August 1915 Jean Garnett, 1921 Phyllis Maude Garnett, 1922 Douglas Keith Garnett, 1924 Shirley Garnett and three others. Ernest Garnett a builder, contractor of Lovedale Rd. Ernest had recently thrashed his daughter where the neighbours called the police. In April 1924, Messrs E. Garnett and E. Stibbitt both of Hastings were admitted to the Dannevirke hospital suffering injuries sustained in a motor accident near Woodville. In March 1926 Ernest now a barman at the Albert Hotel assaulted Horace Ian Simson. Post-quake 1932 Ernest Whyte Garnett of Nelson St now an employee for the Hastings Borough Council designed in the style of art deco many of the small decorative walls, stone seats, bridges and water fountains in Cornwall and Windsor Parks, Queen's Square and Civic Square built by gangs under his charge with nothing more to aid him than an occasional rough pencil sketch, many of which still exist today. These works stand as a memorial to his untiring energy and ability. Ernest Whyte Garnett of 206 Nelson St sth died December 1946 at Hastings aged 59. A son D. Garnett of Wellington and five daughters Mesdames R. Spence and H. Harvey and Misses Ivy and Shirley Garnett all of Hastings, Mrs E. J. Smith of Wellington. There is also one brother Albert Garnett an architect of Hastings. Emily May Garnett nee McAuslin died May 1959 in Hastings aged 66.

Miss Flossie Hobbs officiated at the organ and played the Wedding March. After the ceremony the friends of the bride and bridegroom gathered at the residence of the bride's parents. 

1908 September, Proposed drive in Cornwall Park, recommended that a drive be formed through Cornwall Park in a straight line from the entrance gate in Fitzroy Avenue to Cornwall Park.

1909 September, Hastings Borough Council – Notice is hereby given that **Six Tennis Courts are now ready for use in Cornwall Park** and to be let at £3 per Court for the season. No club to have the use of more than four Courts. Applications for Courts to be made to the Town Clerk. J. Collinge.

1909 October, The newly-formed **Park Lawn Tennis Club** opened their season at Cornwall Park Mr J. A. Miller was the first president, they rented two courts from the Borough Council, then the following year three courts, in 1913 a pavilion was proposed and erected, by 1922 there were 200 members and eight courts.

1910 April, Willow roots, etc. to be removed from the Ruahapia Creek to its junction with the drain now under construction by the Hawke's Bay County Council. That the **Ruahapia Creek drain where it crosses Cornwall Rd be diverted into the Tomoana Drain** at the bend adjacent to Mr Walter Webb's Cornwall Park Nursery, Nelson St nth. That the drain on the west side of Karamu Rd be widened and deepened from its entrance into Ruahapia Creek to Frederick.

1910 September, The Hastings Park Tennis Club – Mr F. J. Read, Hon Sec. Mr John Flynn one of the oldest members, When war broke out every eligible member voluntarily took up service for the Empire, Mr George Poppelwell was one of the fortunate ones to return to his homeland, although wounded. George Poppelwell was a president of the club.

1911 May, The Ruahapia Creek - The following letter was received from Mr G. Merritt of Mahora "I hereby claim from the Hastings Borough Council the sum of £100 for damage caused to my property at Tomoana Settlement and crops thereon by floods during the past seven years, through **the diversion of the Ruahapia Creek** from its proper and natural course to its present position by the Hastings Borough Council."

1911 May, At last night's meeting of the ; Hastings Borough Council, Cr. Hart announced that Messrs. A. Weaver, M. Johnson, Stubbs and Beck and himself had presented **seats** for use at Cornwall Park. A hearty vote of thanks was passed to the donors

1911 May, **William Augustine Shanly** b: August 1837 in London, a past jeweller of Napier and Hasting died at Napier aged 73. In April 1864 at Exeter he married Mary Agnes Bailey b: 1840 in London. They had eight children. Mary Agnes Shanly nee Bailey died in 1900 in Hastings aged 60. In 1901 at Napier William Augustine Shanly then married Ada Elizabeth Gates b: 1864 in New Zealand. We regret to have to record the death of Mr **W. A. Shanly** which occurred at the Napier Hospital this morning, to which institution he was taken yesterday by Mr W. Y. Dennett of Hastings, who on visiting him yesterday in Napier, found his condition such as to warrant his removal to the hospital. The deceased who is well known in Hastings and who was for many years at Hastings a Jeweller and representative of the "Daily Telegraph" has been suffering from an internal complaint for some time, but its serious nature was not recognised until quite recently. He was 74 years of age. The remains of the late Mr W. A. Shanly were interred in the Hastings cemetery on Saturday afternoon. A short service was conducted at the Catholic Church by the Rev. Father Keogh, who also read the burial service at the graveside.

1911 May, Farmers' Union – A meeting of the newly-elected committee of the Hastings branch of the New Zealand Farmers' Union was held in the Carlton Club Hotel on Saturday evening, Mr T. Talbot in the chair. It was decided to ask Mr Mason Chambers to give an address at the next quarterly meeting on the subject of single-tax, the speaker to be allowed fifteen minutes for his address and fifteen minutes for reply: other speakers five minutes each. The resignations of Messrs **H. McKeesick, F. J. Evans and Stewart Miller** were received with regret. Mr W. A. McNaught of Dunedin wrote offering to address the members on wool-classing and it was decided to write for further particulars with the object of accepting the offer. It was decided that members joining after the first three months joining the union after the first of the financial year be asked to pay subscription money in proportion to the unexpired portion of the year only. A hearty vote of thanks was passed to Mr S. Talbot for the use of his room for holding meetings in during the past year. At the conclusion of business at the next committee meeting Mr. A. Masters will give an address on hop culture.

1911 August, Cornwall Park - The caretaker reported having been supplied with **seats** by Messrs. W. Hart, B. C. McCormick, A. Weaver, M. Johnson, and Stubbs and Beck. The seats had been placed in convenient places in the park. Decided to send a letter of thanks to the donors of seats.


1911 June, The Ruahapia Creek - The report of the sub-committee appointed to confer with a committee from the Hawke's Bay County Council in regard to the complaint from Mr G. Merritt was adopted. Robert Sowersby wrote calling attention to the large amount of storm water which flowed through the **creek passing through Cornwall Park**, and owing to there being no adequate outlet at present emptied itself into Pakowhai Rd, and thence on to the adjoining land, causing great damage to feed and fences. The Mayor stated that the case was a similar one to Mr Merritt's. The creek had only recently been cleaned out.




1908, Heretaunga St west from King St looking east, shows the Novelty Depot - A. Youngson 1909, and a hairdresser and old Roach store in next block on right



Boyd's wooden show room & country garage at 128 **Market St** nth and Queen St west where they first operated, they were also listed at 300 Queen St next to Stubbs & Beck Co Coachbuilders, roof signage for previous tenant P. W. Sampson – Percy Wallace Sampson a Commercial Traveller from Waipukurau. By late 1914 Davis & Boyd were mostly advertising Hupmoblies. The Market St building was purchased by HB Farmers' Co around the end of 1914 and Davis & Boyd erected a new brick building on Station St nth opposite the Railway Station. The building above became the H B Farmers' Cooperative Associations first store which burnt down 1929 and a new concrete tree story building was built on the site.

David Edward Davis b:1864 in Napier, the son of Catherine and Edward Davis. In1891 he married Fanny Crosse b: December 1865 in Hawke's Bay the daughter of Elizabeth and Charles Crosse and sister to Thomas Ezekeil Crosse of Woodlands off St. George's Rd. Children - 1892 Robert Edward Davis, September 1893 Llewellyn Thomas Davis, Sergt. 10/1044 died September 1915 in Gelibolu, Canakkale, Turkey aged 21, 1896 Latimer James Davis, 1898 Catherine Elizabeth Davis and 1902 David Grant Davis at Waipukurau. David Edward Davis moved to Hastings from Waipukurau and bought the Stortford Lodge estate of 23 acres in July 1905 – Davis St, till September 1907, then he went into business with Stephens Boyd a motor engineer till 1919, then David Edward Davis of Queen St went on his own accord in Hastings. The family moved to Palmerston North where David Edward Davis died in 1938 aged 74 and Fanny Davis nee Crosse died June 1951 aged 85.

Stephens Boyd b: September 1881 in Canterbury the son of Sara and Thomas Boyd. In June 1905 in Wellington he married Mabel Alice Harrap b: May 1884 in Woolston, Canterbury the daughter of Catherine and Henry Harrap. They had six children – December 1905 Jack Stephens, May 1907 Dion Boyd was born in Hawke's Bay he died within a year of his birth, July 1909 Laurence Dion Boyd at Hastings he married Alma Gwendoline McCardle in September 1936, September 1911 Terrence Laughton Boyd at Hastings, 1911 Lewis Lawlon Boyd, September 1915 Maree Jean Boyd at Hastings and December 1920 Stephanie Mabel Boyd at Waipawa. Stephens Boyd a motor engineer of 309 Grays Rd, around 1919 they moved to Waipawa then to Palmerston North, where Mabel Alice Boyd nee Harrap died January 1963 aged 78 and Stephens Boyd died February 1968 in Wellington aged 86.



- 1910, Phylis Adeline Flowers was born in Hastings, the daughter of Daisy and Charles Percival Flowers, **Charles Percival Flowers** a builder b: October 1879 in Christchurch, Canterbury, the son of Emily and Jonathan Flowers. In 1909 he married Daisy Alexandra Mott b: March 1888 in New Zealand, the daughter of Beatrice. They had two children -1910, Phylis Adeline Flowers and 1912 Charles Percival Flowers was born in Hastings Charles Percival Flowers a builder of Queen St west poss old partner of Grant and Flowers. Charles Percival Flowers died 1967 in Hastings aged 88 and Daisy Alexandra Flowers nee Mott died November 1952 in Hastings aged 64.
- 1910, **Richard Edward Beckett** b: February 1855 in England, the son of Catherine and Edmund Beckett. In 1856 the family immigrated to Canterbury NZ via *Egmont*, Edmund & Catherine Beckett (parents) Catherine (7) Mary (4) Richard (1) In1878 he married Martha Falconer Falkner b:1855 Ballymena County Antrim Ire, she came to NZ in 1876 landing at Lyttelton. They had eight children 1879 Clara Ann Woods / Beckett she married Harry Taylor in May 1920, 1880 Catherine Beckett, 1884 Elizabeth Beckett, 1887 Ernest Edward Beckett, 1889 Constance Emily Beckett, 1892 Robert James Falconer Beckett, 1897 Harold Esmonde Beckett and 1900 Clifford Arnold Beckett. Around 1907 they settled in Hastings. Martha Beckett nee Falkner died in Hastings in 1925 aged 69 She left a widower and family of four sons Ernest, Robert, Harold and Clifford all of Hastings and four daughters Mrs Taylor of Haumoana, Mrs Wardrop, Mrs E. S. Cliff and Mrs J. Davidson of Hastings. Richard Edward Beckett a bootmaker of 709 Queen St west Hastings died 1928 aged 73. In 1928 Harold Edmond Beckett a Labourer at 709 Queen St west Hastings, Helen and Clifford Arnold Beckett a bookbinder of 510 St. Aubyn St west Hastings, Rubena Ivy May and Robert James Beckett a puller of 906 Lawrence St Hastings, Lucy Helen and Ernest Edward Beckett a carter of Omahu Rd.
- 1910, **William Davy Southcott** and family arrived in NZ and settled in Hastings. William Davy Southcott b: April 1874 in Oatlands Park, Surrey Eng, the son of Caroline and James Southcott. In July 1904 at St. Thomas, Devon he married Emma Beatrice Bickley b: March 1879 in Harpford Devon, the daughter of Elizabeth and John Bickley. A son born April 1905 James Bickley Southcott at Gittisham Devon, he married Kathleen Melba Goldfinch in 1930. Another two children were born in Hastings. William began fruit growing subsequently taking over the management of the Hawke's Bay Fruitgrowers Ltd in Hastings a position he held for several years when he resigned to go into business on his own account as a fruit merchant. In August 1922 he was able to get about with a walking stick after 9 weeks resulting in a straining to the knee. He took ill with some inward trouble which needed an operation at the Royston Private Hospital. William Davy Southcott died January 1924, the beloved husband of Emma Beatrice Southcott aged 49. He was a permanent member of the Legion of Frontiersmen. He left a widow and three children two boys aged 18 and 9 and a little girl aged 6. Emma Beatrice Southcott died 1955 aged 76.
- 1910, **Gilbert Heathfield Lloyd** district valuer b: 1871 in Dubbo, New South Wales, the son of Jessie and George Lloyd. In March 1903 at Palmerston North he married Florence Elizabeth Gardner b: December 1868 in Rockhampton, Queensland, the daughter of Kezia and Robert Gardner. They had four children February 1904 Lindsay Heathfield Lloyd, August 1905 Kassie Joyce Heathfield Lloyd, April 1907 in Frances Jessie Bowring Lloyd, July 1909 Gilbert Heathfield Lloyd. In 1921 Charles Henry Bishop married Grizellie Frame b: July 1888 in Napier, in 1931 Charles Henry Bishop married Mabel Keyte married Charles Henry Bishop in 1931 in New Zealand. She died in 1970. Charles Henry Bishop an engineer died July 1910 at Auckland Mental hospital Whau Asylum of epilepsy aged 61.

They had two daughters – August 1896 Kate Franklin in Hawke's Bay she died November 1917 in Petane aged 21 and April 1900 Mercie Franklin in Hawke's Bay she married John Terence Kearins in December 1920. Mary Agnes Franklin married William Boyd they had three children. Mary Agnes Franklin / Boyd nee O'Malley died January 1909 aged 46, 1911 Stephen Franklin a sheep farmer West Clive, Stephen Franklin died March 1912 in Clive aged 55.

1910, Kenneth Thomas Cudby was born at Hastings the son of Sophia and Thomas James Cudby, he married Hazel May Symmans in 1934. **Thomas James Cudby** b: October 1877 in Upper Hutt the son of Elizabeth and Charles Cudby, in June 1904 he married Sophia Elizabeth Barnes b: January 1875 in Wairau Valley, Marlborough the daughter of Ellen and Samuel Barnes. They had three children - August 1905 Clifford Francis Cudby, June 1908 Elsie May Cudby she married Alfred Leonard Rumball in February 1928, July 1909 (Jack) Thomas James Cudby at Hastings he married Thora Ireland. They had five children at Hastings - 1912 Alfred Henry Parkinson he died the same day, March 1914 Florence May Parkinson she married Thomas Angell in 1940, February 1915 Ina Gwendoline Parkinson she married John James McCarthy in August 1944, August 1918 Rita Lois Parkinson she married Arthur Keith Emerson MacEwan and July 1920 Edward Guy Parkinson. 1910 January, Stanley George Winstone was born at Hastings the son of Alice Ellen and William Henry Winstone he married Truda Maude Winstone in 1930. **William Henry Winstone** b: May 1859 in Crickhowell Breconshire Wales the son of Emma and Thomas Winstone. In 1891 he married Alice Ellen Baron. William Henry Winstone died May 1943 in Papakura Auckland aged 83 and Alice Ellen Winstone nee Baron.

They had two children - July 1916 Doris Myra Holland at Wellington. Hannah (Annie) Holland nee Dunstall married Albert Cox they had one daughter. 1910 January, Marriage - At Poukawa Church on Wednesday, Miss Frances Mary Corless eldest daughter of Mr James Corless of Poukawa, to Mr C. H. White second son of Mr Cyril White, of "The Peaks' North Canterbury. The Rev. Father Keogh performed the ceremony. The bride was attended by Miss Boston and Miss Mona Corless and Mr D. White brother to the bridegroom was best man.

1910 January, Oswald Orr b: 1878 in Hawke's Bay the son of Marion and John Orr snr married at Hastings to Susannah Catherine McClone b: July 1889 the daughter of Bridget and Joseph McClone. They had six children – August 1911 Oswald Orr, 1913 John Orr he died a child in 1914, April 1915 Mary Orella Orr, 1916 Marion Orr she married Vincent Patrick McClone in November 1938, July 1918 Susan Orr and 1921 John Orr. Susannah Catherine Orr nee McClone died February 1931 in HB aged 41 and Oswald Orr died June1987 in Queensland Aus aged 75.

1910 January, Death, Cottle - On January 5th 1910 at Nurse Nairn's Private Hospital, Hastings, Lawrence Cottle, beloved husband of Ethel May Cottle; aged 52 years The Funeral will leave his late residence, Maraekakaho Rd, for the Hastings Cemetery, Friends will please accept this intimation. Ethel May Cottle nee Sollitt married William Henry Learmonth in 1913.

1910 January, At about a quarter-past 8 yesterday morning, a lad named William Taylor, when delivering milk in Queen St, saw an old man lying on the footpath. It appears that the man, whose name is **Thos. Reid an old age pensioner and about 80** years of age, went to the Library on Saturday evening and left there about 9 o'clock. Upon arrival at the gate of his home in Queen St, he was seized with paralysis, and laid on the path all night in the rain. He was in a soaking-wet condition when found. After receiving attention he improved slightly, but it was deemed advisable to remove him to the Napier hospital yesterday afternoon, where he was taken by Constable Potter. Before his arrival at the institution Reid had completely recovered consciousness.


1910 January, A motor-car owned by Mr Rangi Kerehoma and driven by Mr H. Byrn collided with Mr W. Kirk's horse and cab in Heretaunga St, The car and cab were travelling in opposite directions and when in the act of passing the driver of the former, in avoiding running over a dog, miscalculated the distance between the vehicles. The glass screen in front of the car was smashed and one shaft of the cab broken. The horse received a gash in the shoulder which necessitated stitching.


Horace Byrn b: July 1881 in Aorere Tasman the son of Emma and Henry Byrn he married Annie Maria Child – September 1913 Douglas Horace Storring Byrn at Hastings the son of Annie Maria and Horace Byrn. 1914 Annie Maria and Horace Byrn a motor mechanic at 706 Warren St Hastings, 1917 WW1 Reserves 2nd Division, Horace Byrn a driver 612 Willowpark Rd Hastings. Horace Byrn died July 1946 in Auckland aged 65, and Annie Maria Byrn nee?

1910 January, **Malcolm Walker Baker** (a minor) six years of age, claimed from **John Edward Butler**, a butcher, £50 as damages on account of injuries alleged to have been caused by defendant's horse. **Charles Henry Victor Baker** father of plaintiff deposed that he and his wife were in their back-yard on the day. The children were playing in an unfenced section about 30 yards away. The boy was about two yards from the road. Witness heard the horses coming along the road and a dog chasing them. They were travelling pretty fast. Witness and his wife warned the children to look out. Those children nearest the fence scrambled back under the fence into the yard. The boy Malcolm, who was kicked, tried to get back, but was struck by a light chestnut horse and knocked down. This was between 8 and 7.30 p.m. Witness ran and picked the boy up. His face was covered with blood. Dr. Barcroft was sent for and stitched the wound. A few days after the child had to undergo an operation at the hospital. Witness informed the defendant the next morning, telling him that one of his horses had injured his child's nose. He asked defendant what he was going to do and witness said he did

not know. They had better let it remain in the meantime. Witness at that time drew defendant's attention to his horses being on the road. Defendant said he would have to see one of his men and have them put in. About a week afterwards witness again saw Butler and asked him what he was going to do. He said he did not know, and then promised to see witness the following evening and settle the matter, he did not want to go to Court about it. Did not put in an appearance, but sent a note to witness denying all liability. Believed there were five horses on the road at the time of the accident, and had often seen them there. The road on which the accident happened is a public road. The boy ran on to the road to avoid the horses, which ran on to the unfenced section. He is six years of age. The place where the accident happened is about half a mile from defendant's shop. To Mr White: The dog which chased the horses did not belong to Butler. The accident happened almost as soon as witness heard the horses coming. The dog flew out from Jones' place. The chestnut horse was known to be a bad horse for kicking. Penrose John Barcroft, medical practitioner, deposed that he was called upon to attend the injuries indicted on the boy Malcolm Baker. He had a wound across the nose and a fractured bone. Not feeling quite satisfied that the bones in the nose were in their right position, he ordered the removal of the boy to Nurse Nairn's private hospital, where an operation was performed. Witness attended the boy for about ten days, and he was a week in the hospital. Witness' and Dr. Tosswill's account would amount to about £5. The charge at the Hospital was about three guineas per week. Alma (Ella) May Baker, mother of the plaintiff, gave corroborative evidence. Arthur Curtis. rider-out for defendant, deposed that, he was told about the accident, but he did not see it. He had known Butler's horses to be on the road two or three nights during a week. On each occasion witness brought the horses in. He had no idea how the horses got out. The night that Baker spoke to witness he said the horses often got out. To Mr White: He had not found the chestnut horse to be vicious or known it try to kick anyone. Evidence was also given by Arthur John White, carpenter and Charles Anderson. Mr White contended that plaintiff should be non-suited because neither the statement of claim nor the evidence showed cause of action. Plaintiff to show that the horse was vicious and that the defendant knew it was a vicious animal. There was no evidence to show that defendant was aware that horses were out. The Magistrate was about to give judgment when Mr White asked that a written judgment be given. The Magistrate said that to do that it would be necessary for evidence to be given for the defence. John Edward Butler (defenders) deposed that on December 11th Baker called on him at about 7 a.m., and told him that his (witness) horses were on the road the previous evening. He knew the horses were out at about 6 a.m. and waited for the boy to come at about 7 a.m to send him for them. He was unaware that his horses were on the road the previous evening. Could not account for the horses getting out as the gate was tied with a bit of rein. The chestnut horse had not proved vicious. He made no admission of liability to plaintiff. To Mr Hallett: His horses had been on the road a few times. The gate had a latch, but it did not act. It never occurred to him that the gate required a new fastening. The rein was sufficient. The Magistrate reserved his decision.

1910 January, Wedding, George – Stanhope - At St. John's Church Roslyn Dunedin, Mr Percy J. S. eldest son of Mr A. A. George of Hastings and Minnie, youngest daughter of Mr J. Stanhope of Rutherglen, Roslyn. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Snow. The bride was given away by her brother Mr S. Stanhope, the bridesmaid was Miss Wini George (sister of the bridegroom) Mr Sydney H. George supported his brother as best man. At the conclusion of the ceremony the guests were entertained at the Waratah Tea Rooms after which the newly wedded couple left en route for Hastings, their future home.






Early section maps at the corner of Heretaunga St west and Pakowhai Rd

A butcher at Stortford Lodge was established in 1908 by John Edward Butler who went bankrupt in February 1910



1910, Lowe Bros, Butchers signage on cart, began business at the Stortford Lodge Butchery 1159 Heretaunga St west opposite the Stortford Lodge Store near James Grant's blacksmith. The section numbers have changed since then. The Lowe Bros poss took over John Edward Butler's business Est 1908? poss shows Arch Lowe and the delivery boy. The Lowe Bros resided at the family Lowecroft farm on Pakowhai Rd. Signage - poss the District Valuer Mr G. H. Lloyd, next to Thomas Earl Lindsay auctioneer

Archibald Ernest Lowe b: April 1893 in Canterbury, the ninth child of Phoebe Emily and Francis Lowe. After a butchery job in Waipawa poss with his older brother George, he moved back to Hastings and lived with his mother at Lowecroft Pakowhai Rd Mahora where and was involved in bee keeping. In 1910 he began a butchery at Stortford Lodge with his older brother George as Lowe Bros and then he obtained Lynch's Stortford Lodge Store across the road. In April 1912 he married Christina Ness Lamberton b: October 1883 the daughter of Elizabeth and Joseph Boyd Lamberton. Children born – 1913 Christine Lowe, 1913 Betty Elizabeth Jean Lowe, 1915 Christine Isabel Lowe, 1916 Eleanor Mabel Lowe. Archibald William Lowe, Wallace George Lowe. Lowe's Limited opened the first cool store for meat and fruit on the Stortford Lodge corner in response to a promising export market for Hastings fruit which became the Elite Bacon factory and service station in 1917. In 1921 a Mr Arch Lowe worked at the parcels office at Hastings Railway Station and had adopted Robin Pearce as his son. In July 1924 Arch Lowe appealed to those who would give help to the Barnardo shop in Hastings. In August 1924 A. E. Lowe chief parcels clerk at Hastings transferred to Te Awamutu as chief clerk. Arch later established the well-known "Sunnybank" orchard on Maraekakaho Rd. One of Arch's sons, (Wallace) George was

of Everest and Antarctic fame. Archibald Ernest Lowe died on July 1959 at Hastings aged 66. Christina Ness Lowe nee Lamberton died August 1975 at Hastings aged 91. His father Francis (Frank) Lowe died at Hastings in May 1903 aged 58 and his mother Phoebe Lowe died July 1927 at Hastings aged 81.


George Scott Lowe b: February 1875 in Rakaia Gorge, Canterbury, the son of Phoebe Emily and Francis Lowe. In July 1904 at St. Peter's Church in Waipawa he married Ada Pellow b: 1879 by the Rev. H. P. 1911 April, Lowe Bros now had two butcher stores - one at Stortford Lodge and one in Hastings - Quality, Care, Cash butchery in Market St for a short while, selling only for cash, Lowe Bros could reduced the cost of meat to a minimum

In 1913 Arch and George Lowe now resided on Pakowhai Rd opposite side to their old family farm Lowecroft, they formed **Lowe's Limited** and built a large brick-fronted coolstore building on the corner of Omahu Rd opposite the Stortford Lodge Hotel, comprising a fruit cool store, a butcher's shop, an ice-making plant, and they delivered ice to homes, in one of the adjoining wooden building was their later Stortford Lodge Bacon Co factory. This wooden building was built of timber from the old Frimley canning factory.

Mr Thomas Henry Stock a cool store worker and use to drive the ice cart for Messrs Lowe Ltd of Hastings, he returned to Cheltenham England with his family where sadly he drowned Cheltenham Lake February 1923 aged 47.

Alexander Barber Marchant b: August 1886 at Waimarama the son of Elizabeth and Francis Septimus Marchant was employed as a butcher by Lowe Bros prior to WW1, being killed in action March 1918.

Another Stortford Lodge Butchery opened in May 1918 by David Hunter (late 16th Reinforcements) for a short while, poss at the old wooden 1908 store, sadly David Hunter died later that year.

1910 February, John O'Reilly had arrived in NZ to met up with his old friend Michael Doherty working at Maraekakaho station.

1910 February, Elizabeth Jessie Woods died at Hastings aged 23, the wife of Thomas Walter Woods he died 1941 aged

1910 February, Edith Sarah McConnell was born at Hastings the daughter of Esther Mary Rose (Elsie) and Robert McConnell, she died a teenager at Hastings in February 1927.



Robert McConnell b: April 1874 in Glasgow, Lanarkshire the son of Rebecca and William McConnell. In 1902 he married Esther Mary Rose (Elsie) McBride b: March 1883 in Invercargill, Southland. They had six children - October 1902 Gladys Muriel McConnell at Christchurch she married Sydney Charles Collinge in April 1925 at Hastings, February 1906 Elsie Margaret McConnell she married Joseph Arthur Lynch in 1931, February 1910 Edith Sarah McConnell at Hastings she died a teenager in February 1927, November 1912 Robert George McConnell he had three sons and one daughter with Norma Bessie Kensington, July 1914 Olive Jean McConnell and May 1919 Noel William James McConnell he died as a child at Omahu Rd in June 1920 in Hastings. In May 1919 Robert McConnell a bacon curer 601 Queen St east and in 1920 a pork butcher store in Heretaunga St east between Warren and Hastings St. In March 1926 Robert McConnell a butcher of Hastings went bankrupt. - He had been trading in Hastings in butcher's small goods or general butchery for the past twelve years, his business successful until May 1924. in that month he took possession of a branch shop at Havelock North and carried on business there as a branch of his Hastings business for twelve months. Despite his efforts the branch business resulted in a heavy loss and he closed it. For six months he had to pay rent for the Havelock shop without being able to sublet it. He sublet it in January but the best rent he could get resulted in a loss of £1 per week. Since about May 1924 the Hastings business showed a severe loss also he attributed to the high price of fat stock he was compelled to pay his buying agent. This turnover was satisfactory but the ruling retail price of meat was not sufficient to pay the cost of live stock and running expenses which continued for two years and brought about the position. Robert and Esther returned to the South Island after their daughter died in 1927 at Hastings. Robert McConnell died April 1957 in Dunedin Otago aged 83 and Esther Mary Rose (Elsie) McConnell nee McBride died July 1957 in Christchurch aged 74.

1910 February, George 'William' Graham was born in Hastings, he married Joyce Clarice Wilson, he died May 1963 in Hastings aged 53.

1910 February, Mrs J. Maroney selling Charles St section 72 with 5 rooms, she is leaving Hastings, Poss Mrs Jane Grant Moroney separated wife of James Moroney now in Wairoa, had a drinking problem?

1910 March, Hasting Court - (Before Mr S. E. McCarthy, S.M.) Jane Maroney (Moroney) who did not appear, was charged with procuring liquor during the currency of a prohibition order. After hearing the evidence of Constable Potter, she was convicted and fined 40s and costs 7s, or in default 14 days' imprisonment. Richard Jeffcoat was charged with procuring liquor for Jane Maroney, a prohibited person. Accused deposed that he resided at Clive, and knew Mrs Maroney. Had not seen her for about three years till the other day. On that occasion there was a birthday party at Mrs Maroney's place. He procured two bottles of beer and took them into Maroney's stable- Mrs Maroney did not come out into the yard. Arthur Maroney and witness had a drink together in the stable and left the other bottle in the cart until the next morning. He took no drink of any description to Mrs Maroney. He found out in December last that Mrs Maroney was prohibited. When witness went to Maroney's there were other women in the house whom he (witness) did not know.

Witness and some children were in the house when the Constable arrived. He did not tell the Constable that he had received 2s from Mrs Maroney to get beer. He denied being under the influence of liquor when the Constable spoke to him. Arthur Maroney went to the social and witness did not see him again that evening. To Sergeant: On the night he took the beer he drove to Mrs Maroney's. Arthur Maroney and witness was drinking beer together Arthur Maroney, son of Jane Maroney, deposed that he was 18 years or age. When Jeffcoat arrived at their place he had two bottles of beer, and at Jeffcoat's invitation witness had some of it. There was no liquor in the house on that evening that he knew of. The social was held in the Oddfellows' Hall. Elizabeth Keith deposed that she lived next door to Mrs Maroney and remembered the night of the 8th February. She saw Jeffcoat going to the house on that evening, and was carrying a sugar - bag containing bottles. Had seen Jeffcoat at Moroneyr 's a week before the 8th of February. The Magistrate said that in cases against persons for procuring liquor for prohibited persons the onus of proof of innocence lay with defendant. The constable in his evidence had stated that accused had told him that Mrs Maroney had given him two shillings to procure liquor with. An attempt had been made to disprove the evidence of Constable Potter, and (the Magistrate) said he was convinced that the constable's story was the true one. This was a case of carrying liquor to a married woman against whom there was a prohibition order, issued at the instance of her friends who were endeavouring to keep her from temptation. Here was a man inducing her to continue her drinking habits. He would be convicted and fined £10, in default two months' imprisonment. One month allowed in which to pay.

William David Heyward b: July 1877 in Christchurch the son of Amelia and Robert Heyward, in 1899 he married Alice Maud Fenner Hawley b: 1878 in Timaru the daughter of Margaret Ross and John Edward Hawley. They had four children - May 1901 Alfred William Netherway Heyward, March 1910 Miriam Fenner Heyward at Hastings, she died as a teenager in May 1923 in Christchurch, July 1913 Margaret Follett Heyward and January 1919 Dawn Heyward at Hastings. 1917 WW1 William David Heyward 2nd Division Hastings. The family returned to Christchurch before returning to Hastings, 1931 Alice Maud Fenner and William David Heyward a motor engineer 811 Karamu Rd Hastings. 1910 March, Elsie Shimmels was born at Hastings the daughter of Rhoda Edith Hannah and Alfred William Henry Jones. **Rhoda Edith Anna Rockliff** b: January 1874 at Port Sorell, Tasmania the daughter of Catherine and Francis Rockliff, she first married George Ingram he died July 1897 Mersey, Tasmania, she then married Arthur Shimmels. Children at Tasmania - April 1901 Evylin Shimmels and February 1904 Clifford Blair Shimmels/Jones. In 1917 in NZ Rhoda Edith Anna Rockliff married **Alfred William Henry Jones**. They had five Shimmels children reg born in NZ in 1914 - Elsie, Evena, Kenneth, Clyde and Gwen. Rhoda Edith Anna Shimmels/Jones nee Rockliff died July 1964 at Te Awamutu aged 90.

1910 March, **Henry Wilson** b: February 1880 London, the son of George and Sarah Wilson married at Hastings Edith Emily James b: November 1889 Melbourne, the daughter of Edwin and Emily Harmen. They had three children. Henry Wilson died April 1954 at Napier aged 74, and Edith Emily Wilson nee Harman died March 1987 in Waikato aged 97.

1910 March, James Gilbert Courtney was born at Hastings the son of Maud Courtney

1910 March, William Montegue Gumbley was born at Hastings the youngest son of Laura Ellen and Charles Henry Gumbley from Napier. **Charles Henry Gumbley** b: May 1858 in Warwickshire Eng the son of Ellen and William Gumbley in 1885 at Napier he married Laura Ellen Watson b: August 1865 in Aston Warwickshire Eng. They had nine children - July 1887 Louis Gumbley at Napier, 1889 Warwick Henry Gumbley he married Hilda Mary Ellen Howarth in 1915, 1895 Charles Roland Gumbley he died October 1917 in Belgium aged 22, May 1897 Iris May Gumbley, January 1900, Baden Powell Gumbley, July 1906 (Gypsy) Rose Ellen Gumbley. Charles Henry Gumbley died September 1943 in Hastings aged 85 and Laura Ellen Gumbley nee Watson died August 1972 aged 86.

1910, Donald Francis McLeod b: 1882 the son of Isabella and Donald McLeod Hastings timber merchant married at Hastings, Edith Mary Horrell b: 1883, two sons – 1911 Donald Frederick McLeod was born at Hastings he married Marie Kathleen Ness in 1937 and 1915 Ian James McLeod. Edith Mary McLeod nee Horrell died February 1931 at Hastings and Donald Francis McLeod died 1964.

Nurse Ellena Bamforth -

1910 March, Hastings Fire - An alarm of fire was sounded at 1.23 p.m. the outbreak being at the residence of Mrs E. Bamforth, who was the owner and occupier situated in King St. The house was a two-storey one and contained 13 rooms. Before the alarm was given many willing hands assisted in saving the furniture and effects, and upon the arrival of the Fire Police and Brigade a considerable amount of furniture had been removed, but the Fire Corps got to work at once and almost all the furniture was taken to a place of safety. By this time the flames had a good hold, and as there was a delay of some 17 minutes before the water could be got to play on the fire the structure was doomed. The cause of delay was due to the fact that the steamer had to wait until the water backed up at the manhole at the corner of Heretaunga St and King St and that in throwing out some 1500 feet of hose, one of the lengths was cut through by coming into contact with a broken bottle. The chemical engine, assisted by bucket brigade, did excellent work in keeping the sheetings clamped which had been fixed on the neighbouring house, belonging to Mr F. Apperley. A steady northeasterly breeze was blowing on to Apperley's house, and at one time, so convinced were the Brigade, that this building was certain to catch fire, that the men were ordered to remove the furniture, a large quantity of which was taken out and placed on the lawn. In the meantime water became available and the efforts of the corps were successful in saving Mr Apperley's house, which escaped with a scorching. The cause of the fire is unknown except that the outbreak occurred in an untenanted bedroom in the upper storey and next to the chimney. Mrs Bamforth was absent in Wellington and the remainder of the family were also absent, so that at the time of the outbreak there was nobody in the house. It is stated that no fire was lit in the house during the day the breakfast being cooked on a gas stove. The building was insured with National for £250, and the furniture and piano in the Alliance for £200. The piano was destroyed.

1910 March, Death, White - At Hastings, Morris Franklin, infant son of Walter James and Ellen White, aged 6 months. Private interment.

1910 March, Field Marshal **Lord Kitchener** was in Aus and NZ to view **ANZAC** military Corps, horses and products in preparation for the impending War in Europe – WW1. From Dunedin – Wellington's official camp parade, Lord Kitchener arrived in Napier by motor car accompanied by Mr and Mrs Parker. It was Mr E. Basil-Jones' intention to invite him to inspect the Frimley canning works at Hastings, then to be entertained at Mr R. D. Douglas MacLean's Maraekakaho station where he rode a very fine horse, then to Sir William Russell's and Mr Hawkins'. While there were many Irish living in Hawke's Bay – no assassin attempt was made, although the Field Marshal may have felt some unease. The party left for Dannevirke per motorcar where the night will be spent. Then the Field Marshal was to leave Wellington for return to Sydney.

1910 March, **Robert Dysart** b: 1886 in Magherafelt Londonderry Northern Ireland, the son of Maria and Henry Dysart married at Havelock North, Margaret Ann Carmichael b: 1884 the daughter of Jane and James Carmichael. They had five children at Hastings - July 1911 Margaret Jane Dysart she married Charles Joseph Brown in 1935, 1913 Elizabeth Julia May Dysart she married Possible Titterton in 1944, October 1915 Kathleen Martha Dysart, January 1918 Molly Edna Dysart she married Henry Donald Hinton in 1949 and December 1927 Robert James Allan Dysart. Robert Dysart died August 1959 in Ngongotaha Rotorua aged 73, and Margaret Ann Dysart nee Carmichael died November 1968 in Ngongotaha aged 84.

1910 April, Kathleen Lydia Whitaker was born in Hastings the daughter of Francis Mary and William Charles Whitaker she married Raymond Stamer Williams in 1930.

1910 April, (Beth) Mary Jane Elizabeth Harris was born at Pakowhai she married George Thomas Long in June 1936 at Hastings. **Hiram Harris** b: March 1871 the son of Elizabeth and John Harris of Clive in February 1909 at Taradale he married Mary Jane Corbin b: May 1867 at Wairoa the daughter of Jane and William Corbin. Hiram Harris died August 1930 at Napier aged 59 and Mary Jane Harris nee Corbin died April 1942 in Waikato, aged 74.

1910 April, Laurence N. Wilson died at Hastings, Pur - Arthur H. Wilson

1910 April, Edgar Prior Alexander Herries was born in Hastings, the son of Martha Annie and Frederick William Herries, he died May 1975 in Greenlane, Auckland aged 65.

1910 April, At the Borough Council Chambers his Worship the Mayor (Mr J. A. Miller) occupied the chair, to thank Sergeant William Wilson Smart upon his retirement from the Police force after 35 years faithful service, eleven years in charge of the Hastings office had earned the esteem and admiration of all classes of the community by his fearless and straightforward administration. Others - David Scannell, D. O'Reilly Mr E. Basil-Jones, Mr W. J. White, solicitor, Mr E-Newbigin (Licensed Victuallers Association) Mr J. Beatson (H-B. A. and P. Society) Mr W. J. Stratton (secretary H.B. Jockey Club) The Rev. J. Hobbs. The company then adjourned to the Carlton Club to drink the health of the Sergeant. At the invitation of the members of the Hastings Police Force, Sergeant Smart met them to say farewell. Sergeant Cruickshank and Detective Hilt (Napier), Constable Wilton (Waipawa). Detective Butler. Ex - Constables Eccleton (Waipawa) and R. Walter and Constables Potter and Dwyer present.

1910 April, **Stephen Henry Avery** b: 1854 the son of Helen and Stephen Avery, in 1888 he married Sarah Matthews 1862 the daughter of Ellen and Robert Matthews. Five Children - 1888 Alice Avery at Sydney NSW Aus she married Thomas Harlen in September 1911, 1898 Sylvanus Avery, 1899 Ivy Gertrude Avery, 1908 Lindsay Gordon Avery. Stephen Henry Avery died January 1919 in Hastings aged 65 and Sarah Avery nee Matthews died March 1939 in Auckland aged 77.

1910 April, Stephen Henry Avery a plasterer of Hastings Bankrupt, personal Statement - In June 1907 at Wellington he entered into partnership with William Cook, plasterer to whom he entrusted the financing. In February 1908 he left without notice taking all the partnership capital, which had been banked in his name. I was left without the means to carry out a contract we had on hand, so I borrowed £30 from J. W. Smiih and finished the job. I lost money on that job. I came to Hastings in June 1908 and for a short time worked for a firm on wages. On June 29th 1909 he entered into an agreement with Mr J. Collis plasterer to do a job for Mr T. Styles, he (Collis) financing. The job gave me a net profit of £30 15s 6d. I then took a plastering contract on Mr Pharazyn's house for Phillips & Wright and commenced work there on 20th July 1908; this job ended 15th December 1908 and gave me a profit of £98 11s 4d. On 16th December 1908, he began a job for Mr Garnett on Land and Heighway's building and finished on 7th February 1909, but out of that he only cleared £14 10s 3d. On 8th February 1909, he began work on Dr. Nairn's house, finishing on 26th April 1909. On this contract he cleared £38 1s 1d. He commenced on the Post Office plastering contract on 6th April 1909 and was compelled to leave there on 30th July 1909, on this contract he received £139 and paid out £143 18s 1d. In stating the above profits he has not allowed himself anything for wages; the profits stated are all the moneys he actually received for himself. On the Post Office contract he received a first instalment from Mr Renouf in the second week, in June and it was not until he had received a further instalment from him that he discovered that in tendering for the job he made a clerical error of £100, thus having tendered at £100 under his own estimate. He had great difficulty in carrying on, and used to get accommodation with short - dated promissory notes. He gave Patterson and Co. a bill-of-sale over his furniture and effects to help me to carry on. Although he still carried on, Mr Renouf only gave him enough to pay wages. This brought about a guarrel between them. At this time he was laid up with rheumatics, and was unable to work. During his absence from the work Mr Renouf assumed charge of the men and paid their wages, promising him he would look after my interests. Mr Amner of Napier called to see me and Mr Renouf told him he had kicked me off the job. He did not attempt to work on that job again. He considered he had about £70 or £80 coming to him and he tried to get an understanding from Mr Renouf, but could not. About this time three creditors got judgments against him and one of them, Messrs Hughes and Benjamin, on the 1st April last obtained an order for my committal to gaol. Richardson and Blair's account which he has put down in my statement was not incurred by me. I ordered the material for Mr Renouf, he refused to pay and I am threatened with proceedings. He has not made £1 per week since he left the Post Office contract. He has had to keep himself, wife and five children, one of whom after has been under a doctor's treatment many times, died at the end of January last- He himself has been sick twice during the past twelve months and am now again ill with severe rheumatics. The liabilities to unsecured creditors were put down at £101 18s 3d and the assets £14 11s 10d. leaving a deficiency of £87 6s 3d. Only one creditor was present and the meeting was adjourned sine die.

1910 April, Dr. Robert Nairn sued the Hastings Brick and Tile Co. Ltd. for £2 11s alleged to be due for medical attendance on a man named Gowan, who had met with an accident at the brick works at Paki Paki. Robert Nairn medical practitioner deposed that in response to a telephone message he went to the Paki brick yards to attend a man who met with an accident through being struck on the head with the driving belt of the engine. He was suffering from a scalp wound and the man was semi-conscious. Witness had a conversation with the manager of the works and Mr Joseph Milburn. The latter gave witness the details of the accident. When witness rendered the account to the company no objection was raised. On 6th December and also on 24th December and 8th January he received letters disclaiming liability. To Mr White: The telephone message which he received was to come as quickly as possible. The account was first sent out to Milburn Bros on July Ist last year. He had made no attempt to collect the money from Gowan, but had asked him about the money to which witness replied that he did not consider himself liable. The company should pay it. Upon the arrival of witness at the brick works Mr Milburn said to witness that he was glad he had arrived so quickly. R. H. Milburn one of the directors in the Company, deposed that it was his brother who was mentioned in the case. He had now severed his connection with the Company. The manager had no authority to employ doctors for injured workmen. First received an account Dr. Nairn for attendance on Mr Gowan early in December 1909 and he then wrote objecting to it. Witness mentioned to Gowan that the firm were not liable for his account with Dr. Nairn and asked him if he were going to pay it. Gowan declined to say what he was going to do. Witness suggested that Gowan should pay the account out of the money due to him by the Company stating that if he did not do so he would not be employed at the works. Gowan was back to work in seven days and the company had no liability. Plaintiff is entitled to judgment, accordingly with costs of court 6s and solicitor £1 6s.

1910 April, John McQuillan was charged with on April 17th stealing a side of bacon valued at 13s 6d, the property of Lundon, Stewart and Co. H. N. Stewart auctioneer disposed that on April 16th he had a consignment of eleven sides of bacon to offer by auction. As they did not arrive until the morning of the sale, there was no time to weigh them. They were auctioned in the afternoon and before putting them up witness stated that purchasers before taking delivery would have to get them weighed. After the sides were sold witness read out the purchaser's names; accused was not amongst them. Accused had not bid or if he did witness did not accept it. One side of bacon was missed. No one had a right to take goods from the auction room until he got a ticket from the office. To Mr Banks: Could not say that accused was at the sale that day. He might have bid without witness knowing it. Never had any reason to think accused dishonest. Constable Dwyer deposed he asked accused if he brought bacon from Mr Stewart on the 16th inst. He I replied "No" but he took a side away. He said he gave it to a Mr Dunn to take away in a cart, and understood it was knocked to him by Mr Stewart. Accused, giving evidence on his; own behalf said that when the bacon was submitted to auction he made a bid. He never heard Mr Stewart say anything about weighing the bacon out. He had never been convicted of any offence. To Detective Butler: Took the bacon off the nail and gave it to Dunn to take it to the house of witness. He had often made purchases by auction without having his name announced by the auctioneer. Andrew B. Greene the next witness called, said that he was a purchaser of bacon on the day in question and he along with the rest, took delivery of his goods. He obtained a delivery note and had his purchase weighed before he took it away. Messrs W. Heslop, T. P. F. Cassin and T. J. Thondon gave evidence regarding the excellent character of accused. The Magisrate in giving judgment said the accused had acted very foolishly in taking the bacon away and he only had himself to blame for the suspicion which had been thrown upon him. The information would be dismissed. Mr D. Banks appeared for accused and Detective Butler conducted the case on behalf of the police.

1910 May, Hastings District Council- From Guy Rochfort stating that when passing the Duke street quarry recently he saw a horse being buried there. Such a practice he considered a menace to health and further, questioned the legality of such an act. - On the motion of Cr Smith a reply is to be sent stating that the Council had buried the horse under proper conditions.

1910 May, John J. Boyd a sheepfarmer of Market St died at Hastings, he was married to Mihi Boyd, she died March 1900 aged 25.

1910 May, John Kennedy Agnew was born in Hastings, the son of , Evelyn and John (Jack) Agnew. He married Catherine Veitch Oliver in 1934. **John (Jack) Agnew** b: October 1882. In 1909 in NZ he married Evelyn Ritchie Hawthorne b: September 1883 in Ireland the daughter of Sarah and James Hawthorne. They had two children in Hastings April 1915 Samuel Douglas Agnew. John Agnew of Mangateretere died April 1962 in Hastings aged 79 and Evelyn Ritchie Agnew nee Hawthorne died October 1961 aged 78 - she was sister to the late William Edwin Hawthorne who died at Hastings February 1917 aged 37.

1910 May, Agnes Maude Turpin was born at Hastings the daughter of Anna and Richard Turpin, she married Ernest William Delahunty in 1928.

1910 May, Agnes Maude Turpin only was born at Hastings the daughter of Anna and Richard Turpin she married Ernest William Delahunty in 1928. **Richard Turpin** b: February 1881 in Christchurch the son of Maria and Robert Turpin on July 1909 in Wellington he married Anna McGill b: May 1883 in NZ the daughter of Agnes and Charles McGill They had four children. Anna Turpin nee McGill died August 1943 in Whakatane aged 60 and Richard Turpin died June 1948 in Whakatane aged 67.

1910 May, William James McKay b:1884 married Alice Maud Hall at Havelock North. William Janes McKay died December 1963 at Hastings aged 79 and Alice Maud McKay nee Hall died September 1969 at Hastings aged 80.

1910 May, Mrs Eleanor Walls nee McCormick b: June 1829 the daughter of Honor and John McCormick died at Hastings aged 80. She had three sons and three daughters with William John Walls, he had died in September 1892 Ireland, also the mother of Mrs Ellen Lynn nee Walls.

1910 May, Wedding. Collins – Harding - Mr Maurice Henry Collins of Hatunia was united in marriage to Miss Beatrice Mabel, third daughter of Mrs T. Harding of Hastings, at St. Matthew's Church. The bridesmaids, were Miss Harding and Miss Bertha Harding, and Mr Percy Amner of Napier acted as best man. Mr and Mrs Collins left by the afternoon train for the south, where the honeymoon will be spent.

Mr Collins who was 57 years of age had not been in good health for some time, having been suffering from heart trouble. He retired to bed last night at about 9 30, when he appeared to be quite well. His wife, Mary upon going into the room at 10.30, found him in a dying condition. Dr Nairn was sent for and upon arrival pronounced life to be extinct. Mary Collins died September 1923 aged 70

Other farms are equally submerged. The cause of the trouble is said to be the Southland drain, which is not of a sufficient capacity to carry off anything like the quantity of water which has fallen during the last week.

She was a member of St. Matthew's choir, the Hastings Amateur Operatic Society and the Harmonic Society. Mr John James Price who was manager of Mr G. Hunter's Porongahau estate for 7 years died about 18 years ago She leaves two sons aged 18 and 21 years, a sister Mrs Locke of Dannevirke and a brother in England.

1910 August, Death of Mr Sid. Charlton killed while playing football. A sad fatality occurred at the Napier Recreation Ground on Saturday during the progress of the match between Clive and Pirates, the victim, being **Sidney Samuel Charlton**, aged about 22 years, a son of Mr S. Charlton, licensee of the Carlton Club Hotel, Hastings. It appears that after some close play, in which Charlton had been taking an active part, the game travelled quickly down the field, but the deceased lay on the ground. Someone shouted out to the players, "There's a man hurt." **Mr G. Plested, a member of the St. John Ambulance Corps,** ran over to where "the injured player was lying, and soon ascertained that something serious was wrong. It was at first thought that Charlton was merely winded, but when asked how he was he said he was very "crook" and that he had received a kick, and he put his hand just under his heart to indicate the spot. He was removed to the pavilion and brandy and water was administered, but he gradually sank and died about twenty minutes after the accident. The deceased remained conscious till about ten minutes before the end. As soon as it was found that a player had been badly hurt the various doctors in town were telephoned for, Dr. T. C. Moore being the first to arrive. After examining the deceased the doctor said the case was hopeless, but ordered the sufferer's removal to the Napier Hospital. On his arrival Dr. Wilson pronounced life extinct. The parents of the deceased have the sympathy of the residents of Hawke's Bay in their bereavement. The deceased was **manager of his father's farm at Farndon,** and was exceedingly popular with his club mates and others who had the pleasure of his acquaintance.

Lee acted as best man. A number of guests were entertained at the residence of the bride's parents.

Thomas Harlen b: June 1890 in Silverstream Wellington the son of Mary Ann and Jesse Harlen in September 1910 he married Alice Avery b: 1888 in NZ eldest daughter of Sarah and Stephen Henry Avery of Hastings. They had two children - February 1911 Leonard Robert George Harlen he married Dorothy Mary Neary in 1934 and 1913 Lawrence Thomas Gordon Harlen at Hastings he married Clarice Zena Christiansen. In August 1913 a four-roomed cottage at the corner of Albert St and Princess St owned by Mr Robert McFarlane, occupied by Mr Thomas Harlen burnt. In September 1916, Out of seventeen applicants Mr T. Harlen of Hastings was at the meeting of the Petone Fire Board, appointed to the position of driver of the new motor fire-cart. Pte. After assisting in the 1918 Influenza epidemic in Hastings. Thomas Waterworth died suddenly at his residence Charlotte Crescent in August 1921 aged 50 and Elspeth Irene Waterworth 302 King St nth died April 1959 aged 80.

In 1911 Thomas Waterworth had started his own dental practice in Heretaunga St west above Joe Bates chemist. In 1912 Herbert Knight was chemist's assistant in the employ of J. W. Bates. In 1912 Joseph was granted a US Patent for apparatus for evaporation and fumigation. He also patented a Stock Lick. Another product was the Bates Sulphur Hair Restorer. Later Joe Bates chemist had four employees, Joseph resided at 'Forfar' 204 King St sth, 2nd house from Eastbourne St next to St. Andrew's Church, after the 1931 quake Joe dispensed from his home until more permanent premises. He was president of the Hastings Photographic Society. In 1941 he suffered a sudden illness from which he never recovered and which caused his retirement.



1910 September, Motor bicycle accident - At about 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon a little boy named **William Porter** 7 years of age, son of Mr W. Porter licensee of the Stortford Lodge Hotel, had his right leg broken between the knee and the ankle, through being knocked over by a motor bicycle. It appears that the little fellow, in company with two other boys was playing in the vicinity of Mr W. H. Plummer's residence in Heretaunga Rd west when a motor cyclist travelling towards Hastings at the rate of about 10 miles an hour collided with him. From enquiries made to the police there does not seem to have been any carelessness on the part of the motorist as the boy ran against the side of the machine

evidently in his attempt to cross the road. Dr. McKibbin attended the sufferer who is progressing as well as can be expected.

Before settling in Napier Mr K. R. O'Halloran 'travelled extensively around the globe nearly three times and was a contributor and correspondent to journals and magazines such as The London Tailor and Cutter, etc. He made his trade his hobby and holds a large number of gold medals and diplomas awarded by academies and at exhibitions. In 1910 he established a high-class ladies and gentleman's tailoring business at Napier and later opened a branch in Hastings in 1915 – poss the site now occupied by Everybody's Picture Theatre. K. R. O'Halloran 'The Suit King'

Kevin Reignier O'Halloran b: July 1880. In 1913 Kevin a tailor of Napier married Ivy Annie Bailey b: June 1888 in Malvern Victoria, the daughter of Elizabeth and Thomas Bailey. They had two children in Napier - February 1918 Cecil Dorothy Mary O'Halloran and 1920 Evelyn Joyce Cecilia O'Halloran. The family settled in Hastings for awhile. Kevin Reignier O'Halloran tailor, died December 1968 in Napier aged 88 and Ivy Annie O'Halloran nee Bailey died August 1973 in Napier aged 85.

1910 October, Death, France - At Hastings, George Erskine, second son of the late John France, Tokomairiro and brother of R. E. France, Benio; in his 52nd year. Deeply regretted and Mary (Marion) French nee Matheson died September 1941 in Hastings aged 78. They had six children - 1912 Frank Colin Richard Manley at Hastings he died August 1912 Waipukurau within a year of his birth, December 1914 Mavis Elizabeth Emily Manley, April 1916 Jean Ellen Manley she died June 1916 within a year of her birth, May 1917 Muriel Kathleen Manley she married Arthur Henry Smith in 1945, April 1919 Ada Florence Manley she married Ivan Thomas Smith in 1945 at Hastings. They had three children - November 1900 Eileen Reynolds Clarkson in Christchurch she married Arthur Frank Ebert in February 1929, October 1906 Thomas Reynolds Clarkson and November 1910 Elspeth Jean Clarkson in Hastings she married Vincent Aspey in January 1939. Thomas worked on the staffs of the Lyttelton Times, the Southland Times and the New Zealand Cyclist. In 1911 Mary Ann Clarkson Eastbourne St Hastings, Mr Clarkson was one of the band who founded the Hastings Orphans' Club in 1913. Clarkson a prominent member of the Hastings Chamber of Commerce 1919 - 1921 was gived a farewell luncheon for at the Grand Hotel Hastings on the eve of his departure for Europe. The family settled in Auckland where Thomas held the position of commercial editor of the Auckland Star for 14 years and during the 2nd war returned from retirement to fill a similar position with the New Zealand Herald in a temporary capacity for three years. On the sale of that property he retired to Havelock where he lived till his death and interested himself in his own property Te Apiti – one of the finest estates in Hawke's Bay. He was a large property owner and had another estate 'Cricklewood' in Waiora. Mr Williams was one of the chief supporters of the A and P Society holding for a considerable period the office of President in which capacity he was highly appreciated. He was did not go into public life and although not a racing man, he took a great interest in that kind of sport. As a judge of stock he had no equal in the colony and was constantly appealed to act as judge at the A. and P. Shows, both in New Zealand and Australia. His own stock on the Te Apiti and Cricklewood estates rank amongst the best in Hawke's Bay and Wairoa County. He was a man who was universally respected by all classes of, people, and as an employer of labour was held in high esteem by his employees. Besides being a first-class Maori linguist, he was trusted and respected by the Maori race for his upright and fair dealings with them. Only last Saturday he was at the Hastings Cub, apparently in good health. Mr Williams was the fourth son of Mr Edward Marsh Williams, once a resident magistrate and judge of the Native Land Court, who died a year or two ago at Te Aute, in his ninetieth year. His brother, Mr Allen Williams resides at the Te Aute Station. Mr Williams, who was born in the Dominion, had never been to the Old Country. He leaves a wife and four daughters, to whom the sympathy of all will be extended in their sudden bereavement. The funeral took place this afternoon at 3.40, at the Havelock Cemetery, and was largely attended. A great number of friends were unable to be present owing to such a short notice having been given.

Brocklehurst united in marriage Mr John Thomas Daly of Hastings (late of Dublin) and Miss Frances Louisa Hastings, youngest daughter of the late Mr W. G. Hastings of Hastings. The bride was given away by her brother Mr Warren Hastings. Miss Bertha Brimer (brides made in chief) Miss Fitzgerald (of Wellington) and Miss Doris Shattky attended as bridesmaids. Mr Arthur Cullen and Mr E. J. W. Haliett acted as best man and groomsman respectively. Mendelssohn's Wedding March was played by Mr P. W. Tombs. The wedding breakfast was held at the residence of the bride's mother Queen St. The teaching staff of the Hastings District High School, the nursing staff of the Napier Hospital. Frances Louise Daly died April 1920, beloved daughter of Mrs J. Hastings.

1910 December, Death, Millward - At his late residence Nelson St. Hastings, Arthur George Milliard, husband of Ann Mary Churchill Millward, aged 41 years. Profound regret was expressed when the news of the death of Mr A. G. Millward at Hastings. Deceased had been ailing since last September with an internal complaint, and although hopes were entertained for his recovery, he gradually became worse and despite the efforts of the best medical skill, he passed away early on Tuesday morning. The late Mr Millward was born in Liverpool 41 years ago and was educated in the college of that city. Arriving with his parents in New Zealand when still a boy, he finished his education at the Wellington College. In the year 1883 he joined the New Zealand Railways Department and quickly rose to the position of stationmaster. He was appointed stationmaster at Hastings in November 1908. Mr Millward married a daughter of the Rev. Frank Churchill Simmons who was first Rector of the Dunedin High School and later on principal of the Nelson College. He leaves a widow and three children (two daughters and a son) to whom the deepest sympathy is extended. Of a courteous and obliging disposition, he made a host of friends during his term at the local office and the large circle of acquaintances with whom his official duties brought, him in contact, received the announcement of his demise with great pain and sorrow. By his death, Hastings has lost one of its noblest citizens and the Railway Department an officer it can ill afford to be deprived of. During his short residence in Hastings he has set an example that most of us would do well to follow. Deceased has four sisters and three brothers - Mr W. H. Millward (managing director of the Gear Meat Company, Wellington) and Messrs. Frederick and Charles Millward of Wanganui. The remains were taken by rail to Wellington this morning and the interment takes place at that, city. The funeral of the late Mr Arthur George Millward of the Railway Department, took place at Wellington on Thursday morning, the interment being in the Bolton St Cemetery. Before the cortege started a short service, conducted by Archdeacon Harper, was held in St. Peter's Church. Mr Millward Anderson, nephew of deceased, played his uncle's favourite hymns prior to the service and the Dead March in "Saul" as the mourners left the Church.

1910, Brunton's Golden Rule Bazaar next to McGlashan's - Lucy Crook b: 1874 had married Robert Brunton in 1896 – A remedy advert mentions Mrs J. Brunton late of Warren St Hastings customer ref. Perhaps her stock was part of the late Herbert E. Brunton's Novelty Depot in Market St and Heretaunga St west?

1910 December, Bankruptcy of Lucy Brunton - A meeting of creditors in the above estate was called for this morning at the Hastings Courthouse, but lapsed for want of a quorum. The liabilities amount to £326. Bankrupt was represented by Mr D. Banks and submitted the following personal statement: - Lucy Brunton - "I am a fancy goods dealer in Hastings. When I came to Hastings in September 1909, I had about £70. This came to me in portions between September 1st and the end of November. It was realised by the sale of my furniture in Palmerston North. I took the shop in which I have since carried on my business. I have just been able to make a living in my shop. I have had to keep my husband as well as myself. He could not get work. I have three children, two boys and one girl. Their ages are as follows, girl nine years, boys, four years and 1 year and five months. I have had illness on and off for about nine months since coming to Hastings. I went into Nurse Bullick's hospital, and there underwent an operation. I was in that he hospital a week, and had to lay up for three weeks after coming out. Mr Brunton and my little girl managed the shop as best they could during that time. I could not afford to pay anyone to look after it for me. I had to pay first orders to merchants in cash, afterwards several of them started accounts with me. Since coming to Hastings I have paid out about £500 for the purchase of goods, and have received about £500 for sales. I could have reduced my present indebtedness to some extent if I had been allowed to carry on the business over Christmas. My stock is largely a Xmas one and I could have made profitable sales during Xmas week. I estimate the stock would, if judiciously sold, bring about £400. If sold by auction. I think the stock would sell much under its value, as buyer would not know the price of which the various articles should bring. The immediate cause of my bankruptcy was the enforcing of warrants by Bing, Harris and Co. and Hayman and Co. If I had been left alone, I think I could have pulled through without lost to any of my creditors. Lucy & Robert Brunton moved to Napier, she died 1944 aged 70 and Robert died 1964 aged 94 in Auckland.

1910, Charles George Fannin b: 1887 Hastings, the son of Annie Sarah and George William Fannin married Amelia Eliza Burtenshaw b: October 1887 in Oxford, Canterbury. They had one child. Charles (Chas) George Fannin died as a young father July 1919 in Hastings aged 32 and Amelia Eliza Fannin nee Burtenshaw died October 1966 in Hastings aged 79.

- 1911, Mr William Albert Tims was appointed manager of the Heretaunga Co-operative Dairy Company Ltd, a position he held till his retirement in 1952.
- 1911, Ellen Ann Carrington and William George Carrington a tinsmith 324 Queen St, 1909, Ellen Carrington at Heretaunga St west, Ellen Mildred Rockell b:1893 she died January 1976 at Napier and William George Carrington b: 1886 he died 1953 at Napier.

1911, James Bell and family took up residence with 1200 acres at Twyford. Messrs Robert and Adam Bell of Hawke's Bay are brothers. James Bell b: October 1855 in Dumfriesshire Scotland went to Queensland with his parents and other members of the family aged 5 in the ship Champion of the Seas in 1860. In 1867 the family came to Nelson NZ in the Kate Waters a cattle barque and after a short residence at Wakapuaka Nelson they settled in Marlborough where his father purchased a sheep run in the Wairau Valley. James was educated in Queensland and at Nelson. Following his father's footsteps he and his brother purchased the North Bank station which they carried on until it was secured by the Government for closer settlement. In 1882 James took the management of Hillersden estate covering some 160,000 acres and cutting some 800 bales of Marino wool. In 1885 he married Miss Alice Wastney b: 1859 in Thurlstone Yorkshire, Eng the daughter of Mary and William Wastney of Nelson. They had four children - 1886 William Irvine Bell he died 1908, 1888 Esther Mary Bell she married MacIntyre, 1892 Jean Dalziell Bell she married William Creed Harrison in November 1913 and October 1893 John Blacklock Bell he married Dorothy Isabelle Lane in March 1917 in Elham Kent, England. They had two children - 1873 in Derbyshire William Frederick Milner Burns he married Edith May Davison in 1899 in NZ and February 1876 Herbert Hugh Burns in Derbyshire he married Mabel Jane Davison in 1905 NZ. Elizabeth Burns nee Miller died October 1925 in Hastings aged 77 and James Milner Burns died March 1926 in Hastings after a fall from a tree aged 76.

1911, James Patrick Moroney a labourer at Paki Paki and Andrew Michael Moroney a shepherd at Paki Paki.

1911 - 1919, Mr Arthur L. Anderson, manager Hastings branch of the Bank of New Zealand. **Arthur Leonard Anderson** b: February 1873 in Wellington the son of Sarah Ellen and David Anderson 1914 A. L. Anderson WW1 at Hastings, in April 1924 he married Minnie McKenzie b: 1893. They had two children. Arthur Leonard Anderson died February 1936 in Whangarei aged 62 and Minnie Anderson nee McKenzie died 1966 in Whangarei aged 73.



1911, chain-driven Triumph Mr J. L. Brathwaite won the Wellington – Napier road record in 6 ½ hours. He was caught speeding twice and prosecuted. Jack Lister Brathwaite b:1890 at Hastings the son of Caroline Agnes and Robert Ashley Warre Braithwaite

In September 1917 Kate Gray died at Hastings ands June 1926 at the Waipukurau Hospital, Gordon Gray of Queen St Hastings aged 72. Interred at Waipukurau.

1911, William Hamilton Maitland b: July 1879 in Dunedin Otago had arrived in Hastings and in 1913 he married Kathleen Agnes Brathwaite b: August 1888 the daughter of Caroline Agnes and Robert Ashley Warre Brathwaite. In 1916 William Hamilton Maitland a Freezing Works manager, York Rd Hastings, In September William Hamilton Maitland secretary for Messrs Borthwick and Sons freezing works at Paki Paki until September 1926 when he and wife left for Johannesburg South Africa where Mr Frank Brathwaite a brother of Mrs Maitland has been residing for several years. They returned to Hastings William Hamilton Maitland died September 1945 at Hastings aged 66 and Kathleen Agnes Maitland nee Brathwaite died September 1959 in Hastings aged 71.

1911, Jack Boyer a labourer / bushman, naturalized resided in Hastings. **John Herman August (Jack) Boyer** b: December 1887 New Orleans, Louisiana the son of Wilhimiena and Gustave Boyer. In 1914 he married Jane Florence (Florrie) Baker b: January 1891 in Central Hawke's Bay the daughter of Kate and John Baker. They had three children - February 1915 Ellen May Boyer she married Harold John Brehaut, April 1921llene Mary Boyer she married Colin Henry Cassin in 1948 and another child. In 1914 they resided in Havelock North John Herman August (Jack) Boyer of Kennelworth Rd Hastings died at the Napier Hospital October 1929 aged 41 the Funeral left the Roman Catholic Church Hastings for the Hastings cemetery and Jane Florence (Florrie) Boyer nee Baker died February 1987 in Hastings aged 96.

(Sadie) then ran a guest house in Hastings and later purchased a small section in Hyla St, Haumoana where a house was built converted from an existing shed, farmed with strawberries and a well was dug with her son Frederick Arthur Tearle who later settled on Beach Rd Haumoana – my old workmate - master painter Lesie A. Tearle's father. Sarah Jane Tearle nee Adams died October 1973 at Auckland aged 98.



1911 January, Shows Francis Hicks standing front of horse with the new brick Bank of New Zealand behind built in 1908. The man standing next to the buggy is a doctor. Hicks was one of the first Europeans to settle in Hastings area and sold his block to established the township of Hastings. He is now a resident of the Waikato district and revisiting Hastings after an absence of 36 years. Hicks was probably amazed at the rapid progress of Hastings - far greater than he had ever imagined.

1911 January, Wedding - St. Matthew's Church Hastings was the scene of a very interesting wedding when Mr A. W. Hamilton of Hastings, eldest son of Mr A. G. Hamilton of Turakina, was united in the bonds of holy matrimony with Miss Maud Beatrice Waters, youngest daughter of Mrs F. J. Watters of Hastings. The ceremony was a full choral one, Rev. J. B. Brocklehurst officiating. The bride, who was given away by her brother Mr H. L. Watters, Miss Matthews (Dunedin) cousin of the bride and Miss Hamilton, sister of the bridegroom attended as bridesmaids, Mr P. S. Atkinson and Mr A. Murley acted as best man and groomsman respectively. Mendelsohn's Wedding March was played by Mr P. W. Tombs. The wedding breakfast was held at the residence of the bride's brother in Grays Rd. Thos. Horton, Limited and (Mr Hamilton's employer)

1911 January, Death, Grant - At Private Hospital Hastings on January 17th, Peter Melville, beloved husband of Coral Grant, and eldest son of James Grant, late of Temuka; aged 32 years. Peter Melville Grant a blacksmith of Quarry Rd b: October 1878 Southland NZ, the son of Nancy and James Alexander Grant had married Coral Annie Pahl in 1906. They had one child. For some time past he has been residing with his father Mr James Grant of Stortford Lodge. About a fortnight ago Mr Grant had an attack of pneumonia from which he recovered, but he suffered a relapse and died.

They had five children at Hastings - January 1911 Alexander Holmes Ross he died within a year of his birth, twin January 1911 Lorna Sophia Ross, December 1911 Leslie Holmes Ross, 1917 Jean Ross she died 1920 a child an 1920 Betty Ross. Alexander David Ross a hairdresser of 317 Southampton St east. Pansy Philadelphia Victoria Ross nee Holmes died in 1961 at Hastings aged 74 and Alexander David Ross died Hastings 1962 aged 78.

1911 January, Mr A. Ellingham underwent a slight surgical operation yesterday. His friends will be pleased to hear that it proved successful.

1911 January, We regret to learn that Mr C. G. Cunnold is at present confined to his bed through blood-poisoning. It appears that about a month ago Mr. Cunnold slipped and fell, and in doing so he bruised the bone in his leg, with the result that he contracted blood-poisoning. We understand that several operations have been performed, and it will be about three weeks before he will be able to leave his bed. The many friends of Mr C. G. Cunnold of Hastings, will be glad to learn that after six and a-half weeks in bed through an accident to his leg, he is able to get up and is well on the way towards recovery.

1911 January, The Maori Pa at Paki Paki has been visited by the hand of death during the past week, when Mrs Hurimate and Reginald Iraia, a lad aged 15 years, were both called home. The funerals took place yesterday. Young Iraia was corporal in the Hastings Catholic school cadets and a contingent of the corps to the number of fifty, under Lieutenants Poppelwell and Hall, attended the burial, as a tribute of respect to their late comrade. The requiem service began at 2.30 p.m., large numbers of pakehas from Hastings going out to show their sympathy with their grief-stricken Maori brethren. They were accompanied by the Rev. Mother and three sisters of St. Joseph's Convent. The scene on the ground was most impressive. In the tent specially erected for the departed, hung the images of their ancestors to the fourth generation and prostrate in heartrending grief round the caskets of the dead, were the immediate relatives of the deceased in the foreground, with the cadets in their pretty uniforms. Outside the circle were groups of Pakeha and Maori visitors to the number of about six hundred. The funeral service was conducted by the Very Rev. Father Keogh and Father de Lach. Father Keogh spoke of the great loss the Catholics of Paki Paki had suffered by the demise of Hurimate, who was ever an army of strength to her people by her edifying life and her highly cultured mind. Speaking of Iraia, Father Keogh said he had left loving memories to the pupils of the school, where he had been noted by all for his quiet and gentle disposition, and his eager anxiety to satisfy the teachers, and his deep religious spirit. The remains of Mrs Hurimate were interred at the Te Hauke cemetery and those of Iraia found a last resting place in the hillside graveyard at Paki Paki. The cadets lined up round the grave, where the last rites were read by Father Keogh, and the last salute given by his comrades in arms. The visitors were hospitably entertained in traditional style by the natives, and were presented with magnificent bouquets on their return from the funeral.

1911 January, "Guilty and will you give me a probation order, Sir" was Fanny Preston's reply when charged at the Hastings Police Court this morning with disorderly behaviour whilst drunk in Karamu Rd, Hastings, last evening. Detective Butler stated that accused was no 'new chum.' She had a long string of previous convictions, and had been twice in the dock daring the last six months. On her last appearance - a week ago, exactly - she had been fined £2 with an alternative of 48 hours, and had been granted a week in which to pay the amount. The week expired to-day. His Worship (Mr G. F. Roach, J.P.) said it was hard to know what to do with the woman, and considered it would be in her own interests to send her to an Inebriates' Home. Detective Butler replied that four convictions for drunkenness in six months would be necessary before such a course could be adopted. Preston was convicted and fined £3. or in default 14 days' imprisonment with hard labour. Asked by the Detective if she had found the money to pay her last fine. Fanny replied that she came into Hastings yesterday to do so, but as she had to go to gaol now, "she might as well take it all out." Accused made another appeal for a prohibition -or "probation" order, as she called it, but His Worship explained to her that it required two Justices of the Peace to issue the desired disqualification. However, it was decided, on the suggestion of the Bench, to procure another Justice and with amendable promptitude Constable McLean returned accompanied by Mr C. Hughes, who took his seat alongside the presiding Justice. With a word of warning from the Bench, the order was issued, and Fanny left the dock to do another "stretch."

It was a wonder that he did not meet with an accident, considering the way he had to dodge in and out to avoid the traffic. James Snoswell deposed that he had to jump aside to avoid a collision. He had a narrow escape from a serious accident. In witness's opinion Pongi was going between 20 and 30 miles an hour. James Snoswell (Clark) died Hastings July 1957

1911 May, Hastings Fire - The tone of the Hastings fire-bell was again tested at about 6.30 yesterday morning, the cause being an incipient fire at the residence of **Mr A. M. Brodie in Tomoana Rd.** At about the hour stated above Mrs Brodie was awakened from her sleep by the smell of smoke, and on going into the dining-room, discovered an easy chair to be smouldering. The Fire Brigade were notified by telephone, and in the meantime a bucket brigade got to work. The brigade were promptly on the scene with the chemical engine. Fireman Donovan entered the room, which was densely packed with smoke, and after grouping about for some time succeeded in locating the chair, and removed it out side, where the smouldering upholstering was drenched with water. It appears that the fire was started by a spark from a log which had been left smouldering in the fireplace all night. The damage done is estimated at about £15. The furniture and effects were insured for £400 in the Ocean Accident Insurance office, I and the house for a like sum in the Liverpool and London and; Globe office.



The Department of Justice has forwarded to the Hastings Borough Council a copy of the following rider to the verdict of the Coroner at the inquest held at Hastings on July 18th on the body of Wong Lee: The desire to call the attention of the Hastings Borough authorities to the urgent need that there is for laying on water to the morgue and erecting a hand-basin therein connected with the water supply of the borough; also, the table is unsuitable. I also direct attention to the untidy state of the morgue. The Department of Justice forwarded a copy of the rider to the verdict of the Coroner at the inquest held at Hastings on the body of Wong Lee, in which the attention of the borough authorities was drawn to the urgent need for laying on water to the morgue, erecting therein a hand basin connected with the borough water supply and a more suitable table - The borough engineer to have the work carried out.

1911 June, Hastings Retailers Association formed - A meeting of Hastings business people was held in Mr R. Warren's tea rooms to consider what steps should be taken to **protect business premises at night time.** Mr G. F. Roach presided, and there was a representative attendance. After some discussion of a conversational nature, it was decided

to form a Retailers' Association and the following officers were elected Chairman, Mr G. F. Roach, committee - Messrs. S. Charlton, M. Johnson, F. Howard, A. R. Rosenberg, J. D. Donovan and C. P. Lindegreen. Mr Lindegreen was appointed secretary. It was decided to write to the Minister for Justice asking that Hastings be provided with **a constable for all-night duty**, it was also decided to recommend the Hastings Holiday Association to observe Coronation Day." June 22nd as a holiday in lieu of Friday, June 23, Prince of Wales' Birthday.

In July 1911, A meeting of the Hastings Retailers Association - First agenda: Target the kids - Mr. G. F. Roach presiding. It was decided to present each child attending the State and Roman Catholic Schools with a **Post Office Savings Bank** account of 1 -. The sum of £19 in was collected in the room towards this object. The amount needed is £70. In discussing this subject it was suggested that the Association should procure one-penny banks issued by the Post Office Savings Banks. These consist of a small money-box capable of holding the sum of 5s and until this amount has been placed inside the box cannot be opened and then only by a key which is kept at the respective Savings Banks. The 5s is placed to the credit of the owner less the 1s deducted for a bank book. It was estimated that this suggestion would entail an outlay of about £350, which was considered prohibitive. It was decided to hold a special meeting shortly to consider what steps should be taken to bring Hastings more prominently before the public of Hawke's Bay as a trading centre, and to consider the question of inviting the school children from the various parts of the district to visit Hastings, where they could be entertained by visiting the large fruit gardens, afternoon picture performances, etc. The proposal to make Show week a carnival week will also be discussed. In July 1912 July Applications for the position of **Nightwatchman for Hastings** will be received up to Tuesday July 30 .Full particulars, apply to G. F. ROACH, Hastings Retailers Association.

1911 July, Charles William Timms b:1881 a bricklayer died in a railway accident at Hastings aged 30, the son of Thomas William and Emma Timms of Tomoana.

1911 July, Mr Charles William Timms was killed at the St. Aubyn St railway crossing, near the Hastings railway station on Saturday night. Sergeant Hogan conducted the enquiry on behalf of the police and Mr A. Polloch station master at Hastings. Arthur Timms carriage painter residing King St Hastings recognised the man as his brother. He was then dead. He had gone to the pictures with a friend and afterwards had supper at Anthony's restaurant, then he went to the late train come in from Napier. The train arrived just before he reached the station and the on the engine said that the engine had hit something at the St. Aubyn St. Witness ran to the crossing and saw a man lying on the road, the light from the lamp at the end of the platform showing on him. Deceased smelt of alcohol. John Henry McKennie, engine driver in the employ of the New Zealand Railway Department and stationed at Hastings, deposed that he was the driver of the engine on the train from Napier. After passing over the St. Aubyn St crossing, Archibald F. MacDonald a fireman employed In the New Zealand s Railway Department informed the driver that a man was lying on the side of the rails. Brought the train to a standstill and went back to inform the guard. The crossing was about fifty yards from the station. Was travelling between 12 and 15 miles per hour. Whilst on the platform looking for the guard he met Constable Brenchley and both went down to the crossing together. James Hodges, Government electrician employed at the Hastings Telephone Exchange, deposed that he was riding a bicycle along Station St about 10.30 on Saturday night. Saw a man on the right hand side of the road going towards the crossing and lurching along apparently under the influence of liquor. The remains of the late Charles William Timms were interred at the Hastings cemetery. The cortege was along one and the members of the Druids Lodge marched on either side of the hearse. The Rev Tavell officiated at the graveside where an impressive service was also conducted by J. P. A. Bro W. Leipst of the Druids Lodge.



George Bogue and Florence Carr sold up and moved to Napier to open a fruit store for a few years, then they moved to Wellington where Florence died 1933 and George died 1945 aged 74.

James Allen Gallagher of Eastbourne St and Heretaunga St was a keen cricket and football and Catholic, he ran for the Borough Council. 1912 Gallagher's & Co Provisional Produce store at old Thompson Broths Butchers building Heretaunga St west. In May 1914 Gallagher and Co built a new two story brick building on the corner of King St and Heretaunga St west as Gallagher & Co. Then he began business as an agent representative for Wholesale Merchandise and Liquor Company when he applied for a wholesale liquor licence but was refused. In 1914 James Allen Gallagher ran for the Borough Council. In September 1924 Gallagher and Co was taken over by W. J. Warwick who was manager of the merchandise department of the Hastings branch of the Hawke's Bay Farmers' Co-operative Association for about 14 years. James Allen Gallagher took over the Grand Hotel in 1933 which he purchased in 1935. He retired in 1945 and bought a small farm at Longlands which he sold before going on an overseas trip to the UK and USA. He also had a racehorse – Epping.

George Gatonby Stead died February 1985 in Turangi Waikato aged 73.

1911 September, Mr Robert M. Gatenby chemist of Heretaunga St Hastings has moved his business into larger premises in Gower's buildings which has been fitted up in such a manner as to enable him to meet the requirement of a large and growing business. The shop is large and lofty and has been fitted in an up-to-date manner. There is quite an array of shelving round the walls with numerous glass cases where the stock of proprietary lines are kept. The counter carries an array of glass cases in which there is a large and well asserted stock of toilet requisites and druggist sundries. The back of the shop is partitioned off and one half comfortably furnished as a consulting room while the other is the dispensary which has been fitted up with every convenience. The dispensary is particularly roomy and is well lighted. The appointments were made and installed by local tradesmen, Messrs Le Quesne and Cowan doing the plumbing and gas fittings, Messrs Phillips, Wright & Co the cabinet and glass work and Messrs Eaton and Rashleigh the decorations and letter writing, the whole being done in a most creditable manner and to the satisfaction of the proprietor. In 1912 Robert M. Gatenby chemist in the old Phillips, Wright & Co store Heretaunga St west before moving east side to the new Union Bank building.

1911 October, Hastings Fire - The persistent clanging of the Hastings fire-bell about 2.45 this .afternoon had the effect of changing the appearance of the town from that of a deserted-looking village into one of great excitement. The cause of the alarm proved to be an outbreak in a five-roomed cottage in Gordon Rd, and owned and occupied by Mr Harry Hickey (horse-trainer). The flames were first noticed by a neighbour who sent word to Mr T. F. Quinlivan and he telephoned to the fire station. The fames had by this time, however, gained a very strong hold, and though the brigade were on the scene in quick time they were unable to render any assistance, and the house was reduced to ashes in a very short space of time. Nothing was saved. Mr and Mrs Hickey were at the time of the outbreak, attending the Napier Park races, and no one was in the house. It is thought that the fire originated through a defect in the chimney caused by the recent earthquake. Much sympathy is felt for Mr Hickey in this his latest misfortune. Quite recently he has been the victim of a number of serious accidents which have kept him confined to his bed. Harry Hickey was the son of Patrick Henry Hickey of Waipukurau. In December 1901 Harry Hickey had married in London Miss Tottie Caulton late of this town, daughter of H. O. Caulton.

1911 October, Mary McLeod nee Sinclair b: March 1839 in Greenock West, Renfrewshire died at Hastings aged 72. In December 1911 all accounts owing to the late William Clark well-sinker of Hastings, deceased. Emma Clark nee Pywell died December 1912 in Hastings aged 77.

They settled in Hastings and had three children at Hastings -1912 October, Jessamine (Jessie) Gigg she married Howard Morton Bewley in 1936, 1915 February Muriel Florence Gigg she married Leslie Arthur Spurdle in 1941. 1917 WW1 William Gigg a clerk Tomoana Rd Hastings, William Gigg died July 1949 at Hastings aged 60 and Florence Gigg nee Curd died June 1958 at Hastings aged 71.

1911 November, Richard H. Goldborough buried at Hastings – pur Lousia Goldsborough she was buried at Hastings May 1922.

1911 November, A little girl named **Maude Victoria Graham**, aged five years, a daughter of Mr Roland Victor Graham, nurseryman of Whitehead Rd Hastings, and formerly of Victoria, met her death under distressful circumstances in Tomoana Rd yesterday afternoon. It appears that a young man named Francis (Frank) Sweeney, a labourer residing at Mahora was driving a horse attached to a dray into Hastings, and when passing along Tomoana Rd a number of school children caught on to the rear of the dray. When nearly opposite Mr Charles Hortop's residence, Sweeney stopped his horse and allowed some of the children to have a lift. Two little girls were on the opposite of the dray to which he was sitting and unnoticed by the driver, one of them had climbed on to the wheel. When the horse moved on the child, according to a statement made by her sister, fell to the ground, and the wheel passed over her head. Dr. Barcroft was summoned but life was extinct when he arrived. An inquest was held at the Hastings - "That those driving drays and other vehicles should be careful not to allow passing children to play about their traps whilst being driven along the roads. That parents and teachers be recommended to warn children under their charge of the danger of accidents arising from interfering with vehicular traffic."

Roland Victor Graham b: June 1878 Victoria, Australia, the son of Louisa and John Graham. In 1904 he married Alice Maude Betts b: 1878 Victoria, Australia the daughter of William and Mary Betts, Children – 1905 Muriel Bell Graham, 1906 Maud Victoria Graham. 1911 December, Joseph William Wells died at Hastings aged 1 wk - poss the new born son of William Joseph Wells.

1911 December, William Allison of Hastings died at the Napier Hospital December 1911 aged 60 and Catherine Allison nee Conway of Charlotte Crescent Hastings died August 1917 aged 68.

1911 December, Jean Josephine Gumbley was born at Hastings the daughter of Margaret and Louis Gumbley she married Charles Harold Jourdain in 1935. **Louis Gumbley** b: July 1887 in Napier the son of Laura and Charles Henry Gumbley, in 1911 he married Margaret Robins b: August 1887 in Masterton, the daughter of Esther and William Robins. They had five children - December 1913 Margaret Laura Gumbley, 1915 Bernard Alexander Gumbley, 1917 Nell Gumbley and July 1919 Larry Watson Gumbley he married Madge Burrows. In 1917 Louis Gumbley a store keeper at Fernhill 2nd Division along with his brother Warwick Henry Gumbley. 1949 Margaret and Louis Gumbley a store keeper at 305 Albert St Hastings along with Margaret Gumbley a spinster, Bernard Alexander Gumbley a picture operator, Larry Watson Gumbley a cabinetmaker. Louis Gumbley died February 1952 in Hastings aged 64 and Margaret Gumbley nee Robins died February 1977 aged 63.

1911 December, Ralph Cecil Mason-Riseborough was born at Hastings the son of Barbara Ellen and Henry Edward Mason-Riseborough, he married Mavis Jean Henry in March 1944. Henry Edward Mason-Riseborough b: December 1873 in Coltishal, Norfolk Eng the son of Anna and Edward Mason-Riseborough, in August 1906 in Norfolk he married Barbara Ellen Shreeve b: January 1886 in Great Yarmouth Norfolk Eng the daughter of Mary and James Shreeve. They immigrated to NZ and settled in HB. They had ten children - October 1906 Henry Edward Mason-Riseborough in Norfolk, he died a child January 1916 buried in Havelock North, July 1909 Ronald James Mason-Riseborough at Napier, he married Alice Rebecca Hope in 1930, April 1914 in Kenrick Mason-Riseborough at Hastings, January 1916 (Ernie) Ernest Mason-Riseborough in Hawke's Bay he had one daughter with Nancy Freda Roberts Mason a painter for Ted Laxon, November 1917, Noeline Maude Mason-Riseborough, November 1919 Claude W. Mason-Riseborough, October 1925 Eric Wallace Mason-Riseborough, March 1928 Cyril Mason-Riseborough and another. Henry Edward Mason-Riseborough died in 1960 in Napier aged 87 and Barbara Ellen Mason-Riseborough nee Shreeve died November 1984 in Napier aged 98.

1911 December, Jocelyn Gertrude Calnan was born at Hastings the daughter of Gertrude Phyllis and Eugene John Calnan. **Eugene John Calnan** b: November 1886 in Sydney NSW Aus the son of Mary and James Calnan, in 1911 NZ he married Gertrude Phyllis Lilian Horner b: May 1889 in Papanui Canterbury the daughter of Bridgette Agnes and James William Horner. Children – October 1912 Jack leuan Calnan at Hastings he married Vera Ethel Black in 1936, 1914 Francis James Calnan, December 1917 Victor William Calnan at Hastings and 1920 Patricia Ellen Calnan. In 1917 WW1 Reserves Eugene John Calnan a storeman at Terrace Rd, 2nd Division, In 1931 Gertrude Phyllis Lillian and Eugene John Calnan a driver ay Haumoana. (Hugh, Snow) Eugene John Calnan died September 1939 aged 52 buried in Hastings, in 1937 Gertrude Phyllis Lillian Calhan nee Hornner married Alfred Samual Harker he died January 1964 aged 61 buried in Havelock North and Gertrude Phyllis Lillian Calhan / Harker nee Horner died July 1977 in Hawke's Bay aged 88.

1911 December Ronald Aubrey Willonghby at Hastings the son of Ida Mary and Frederick Edmund Willonghby he died the following year aged 5/12. **Frederick Edmund Willoughby** b: 1881 in Napier the son of Edith Elizabeth and James William Willoughby, in November 1910 he married Ida Mary Brumby b: August 1889 in Launceston Tasmania, Aus the daughter of Martha and Leonard Brumby. They left the district and later returned. They had nine children - April 1919 Harold Annesley Willoughby at Hastings, he married Nancy Joy Stanway in 1941 and May 1920 Hector Frederick James Willoughby at Hastings. In 1922 Frederick's parents resided in Hastings - Edith Elizabeth and James William Willoughby a taxi proprietor at 106 Victoria St. In 1925 Ida Mary and Frederick Edmond a settler 304 Southampton St west

Ida Mary Willoughby nee Brumby died September 1961 in Manurewa Auckland aged 72 and Frederick Edmund Willoughby died May 1969 in Auckland aged 88. A sister - Zeta L. M. Willoughby married Oliver Arthur Johnstone in Apri 1926 at Hastings.

1911 December, **John William Stack** snr an early settler died in Hastings aged 63, the husband of Catherine (Kate) Stack nee Bowler, she died February 1946 in Hastings aged 87.

1911 December, The death occurred at his residence Railway Rd Hastings this morning of Mr **Joseph Wall** at the age of 65. Mr Wall accompanied by his five brothers, landed in Auckland by the *Black Eagle* on November 1861. He remained in that district for about eight years and then came to Hastings, where he has resided ever since. For over twenty five years he had followed up the dairying industry here. Messrs. Robert and James Wall of Hastings are brothers of the deceased. The deceased leaves six sons and five daughters to mourn their loss and to these and Mrs Wall much sympathy is extended by a large number of friends.

1911 December, **Nicolai (Neil) Bernhard Thodsen** b: March 1869 in Stege, Storstrom, Denmark the son of Caroline Elise and Johann Christian Thodsen. In 1893 he married Mary Smith b: April 1874 in NZ the daughter of Ellen and James Smith. They had four children – 1896 Bernhard Thodsen, 1898 Amelia May Thodsen, 1899 Percy Thodsen he was killed in December 1911 and 1900 Annie Ellen Thodsen. Nicolai (Neil) Bernhard Thodsen a labourer of Boundary Rd, later of 116 Duchess Cres died December 1958 in Hastings aged 89 and Mary Thodsen nee Smith died October 1944 aged 70.

1911 December, A collision between a motor car and a bicycle at Hastings resulting in the death of Percy Thodsen aged 11 years who was riding the bicycle. Richard William Jones chauffeur and the driver of the motor car was charged in the Hastings Court February 1912 before Mr S. E. McCarthy. S.M. that he did commit manslaughter by causing the death of a human being. Detective Butler prosecuted and Mr H. B. Lusk appeared for the defendant. Detective Butler said evidence would be led to show that the collision occurred owing to the car being on the wrong side of the road for which there was no excuse. Secondly, it must have been apparent to the driver of the car that the boy was in difficulties riding against the wind and the car should have been brought to a standstill. William Henry Cook, Town Clerk and Borough Engineer at Hastings produced a certified copy of the Hastings Borough by-laws regulating motor traffic, also a map of the street showing the site of the accident. To Mr Lusk: It was often necessary to take a vehicle to the wrong side of the street. It depended on the position of the vehicle that was approaching. Thomas Henry Stewart, blacksmith, deposed that on the morning of the accident he was working in his shop and heard someone call. Looked out and saw a bicycle ridden by a boy just about colliding with a motor car. The motor struck the boy and the bicycle on their right side. Saw the boy fall and the right hand wheels of the car pass over him. Ran out and picked the boy up and carried him into his (witness's) shop. The boy died a few minutes later. The car was travelling northwards from Heretaunga St to Queen St and the boy was travelling from Queen St to Heretaunga St. Remembered pointing out a spot to the last witness, where the accident occurred. The car was travelling at from four to six miles per hour. Pointed out to Mr Cook where vehicles were standing. Did not notice any others in the street, although they may have been there. Did not see anything on the street to cause the car to go where it did. Did not see a vehicle in front of his shop. Looked up the street about three minutes after the accident and saw no other vehicles. Had a good deal of experience in driving horses. A prudent driver meeting a vehicle coming his way on the wrong side of the road would in his opinion, pull up. The bicycle was on its right side and the car was on its wrong side, After the collision the car travelled about twenty yards before it was pulled up. Saw the bicycle (produced) after the accident. Did not think it had any brakes. To Mr Lusk: Did not see the course followed by either the car or the bicycle prior to the accident. The cyclist was going in a slanting direction towards the gutter when the impact occurred. If he saw a vehicle coming suddenly across the road to its wrong side at a fair pace he would have still pulled up. The rule of the road was to take the course most likely to avoid a collision. It was a common occurrence for vehicles to cross to the wrong side of the road, and for others to go to the side they had left. It was common with- both vehicular and motor traffic. Penrose John Barcroft, duly qualified medical practitioner, practising at Hastings, deposed that he was summoned to the last witness's shop at about 11.20 a.m. on the 11th December 1911. The boy was lying on a bench quite dead. Examined the body and found several ribs broken and contused wounds. There was a deep wound on the right shin about two inches long and there were several contusions on the right side. There were several ribs fractured on the left side and the chest on the left side was full of blood, the lung was lacerated, and the left auricle of the heart was ruptured. The injuries were such as would cause immediate death and would result from the boy being run over by a motor car. Hartley Barrett, a wool-classer residing in Boundary Rd Hastings, deposed to seeing the body of the boy after the accident. He identified the body as that of Percy Thodsen aged about 12 years, son of Nichola Bernard Thodsen, also of Boundary road. Hastings. Last saw him alive the day previous. The boy looked rather delicate if anything. Andrew Guy solicitor of Palmerston North gave evidence that on December 11th 1911 he went for a ride in a motor with a Mr Fannin. Returning to the motor shed Market St they came from Heretaunga St. He and a friend were sitting in the back and had a clear view of the street. The wind was blowing from the west and there was lot of dust. Half way between Heretaunga and Market streets they were in the centre of Market St and slowing down to go to the garage, travelling at about from five to six miles per hour. Saw a boy turn into Market St from Queen St. He was travelling in the centre of the road when he first saw him at the junction of Queen St Market St had a high crown. When the boy was about fifty yards from the car he made towards the left. Jones to avoid him, turned the car to the right. The boy then turned in towards their car. He was then ten or twelve yards away. He was very uncertain of his movements. Jones then turned his car slightly to the left and before they knew where they were the car struck him. There were vehicles on the left hand side of the road going down. Did not know if it would be possible to stop the car in 12 yards. The boy had something in his hand and rifling against the wind. Jones could have avoided the collision. The boy ran into the car and the accident was purely accidental. Thought it was the right hand wheel that hit first. From his own experience he thought it was different to see a lady's bicycle against a strong wind. The boy had not full control of the machine, although he appeared to be able to reach the pedals. Charles Henry Pickering engineer of Palmerston North stated that he was standing in Queen St about five or seven feet from the corner of Market

and Queen St on December 9th at about 11 20 am. a motor car suddenly came around the corner from Heretaunga St to Market St and took the centre of the road. Almost at the same moment a boy passed him on a bicycle, coming from Queen St into Market St. The boy on the bicycle appeared to have made up his mind to go on the middle of the road, and watching the movements of the car it looked to him that the driver of the car anticipated that the boy was going along the centre of the road. He seemed to be going into Mr Stubbs and Beck's factory. The driver of the car then inclined to the right. The boy seemed to be unable to control the bicycle against the wind and struck across to the left and from the position they were in, he did not think it was possible feat anyone in have avoided what happened. If the boy had continued in the direction he was going the accident would not have occurred, and even if the car had remained in the centre of the road it would still have run into him. As an old bicycle rider he would not care to ride a bicycle against a strong wind with one hand on the bar. Did not know whether the driver of a vehicle coming in the opposite direction would be able to see that the boy was in difficulties. Reviewing the facts, his Worship went on to say that iii his opinion it would have been a wiser course for Jones to have at once pulled up. Nevertheless, although it was not for the magistrate to actually try the case, he took upon himself to decide that no jury would convict Jones of manslaughter and by dismissing the charge, gave them no chance to do so and then having whitewashed Jones, most inconsistently added that drivers of motor cars had no right to gamble with human life. In view of his finding, the homily was pointless. Richard William Jones later ran over a pedestrian woman.

1911 -1914 ER, Laura Addey Wilson, a spinster was listed at 501 Nelson St along with her brother Hugh Archibald Wilson a carpenter (he built King's theatre) and Nellie Olivia Wilson wife of H. A. they were listed in Hastings in 1905.

1912 February, The term at Trinton School begins on February 9th and boarders return on February 8th. **Miss Isaacson**, will have charge of the senior school with the assistance of Miss Hayward. Miss Hayward will also have charge of the music and will prepare pupils for Trinity College Examinations. A number of her pupils have passed this examination with honours. 



The two portions of the Pakowhai School taken around 1913






The Borough Council leased small bits of land from the Railways for a **peppercorn rental** - for the Fire Bell, in 1906 a Railway lease 5640 for the artesian water tanks on Railway Rd opposite the Hastings Hotel was granted to the Borough Council for the purpose of erecting artesian water tanks to provide access for the street water carts. When the high pressure water supply was installed (1912) at Hastings, the artesian tanks on the railway land were no longer required. By the 1920's the old **concrete tanks were converted into public conveniences** and the ground was beautified by planting garden plots and providing footpath and seats. A strip along Railway Rd from Heretaunga St to Lyndon Rd for footpath etc, later the Russell St extension to Lyndon Rd in 1922. The Railways still own the land under the Hastings town clock.

1912 August The decision of the Hastings Borough Council some time ago to expend a sum of £20 in **tree planting** and general improvements to the; **eastern side of Railway Rd**, is now being carried out, the work of planting the trees, rubinia acacia and silver birch, having been put in hand by Mr **Walter Webb** this morning-: The trees commence at the fire bell tower and will be continued to a point opposite Dr Nam's residence.







1912 January, Hastings Fire - A cottage was destroyed by fire in Omahu Rd Hastings, in the vicinity of the Frimley Canning Factory, contained three rooms, and was only built some twelve months ago. The fire broke out in the kitchen and had obtained a good hold before it was detected. A bucket brigade endeavoured to subdue the flames, but then efforts were nullified owing to the inadequacy of the water supply and the house was burnt to the ground. Most of the furniture was saved, but many valuable documents were lost in the flames. Mr and Mrs **Neilson** and family owned and occupied the house which was insured for £150 in the Alliance Office. They had three children – 1912 Marjorie Stock she died as a child in 1914 aged 1, 1915 Albert Earnest Stock and 1917 Eunice Jean Stock. Thomas was not related to William Stock. Thomas was a cool store worker and for many years and a driver for Lowes ice cart at Stortford Lodge. 



Alice Kate Coggins nee Ford died August 1936 in Worthing Sussex, Eng aged 57 and Arthur Astell Fletcher Coggins died January 1946 in Durrington Sussex, Eng aged 68.

1912 April, Edgar George Apsey was born at Hastings the son of Annie Leila and Herbert George Apsey, he married Leila Valerie Hawkins. **Herbert George Apsey** b: January 1877 the son of Agnes and Harry Apsey in 1907 he married Annie Leila b: August 1882 in Drury Auckland the daughter of Ellen and John. Children – 1908 Doreen Agnes Apsey, 1918 Joyce Nio Apsey and June 1919 Gwynda Ruth Apsey at Hastings she married Rex McLellan. In 1917 WW1 Reserves Herbert George Apsey fruit merchant St. Aubyn St 2nd Division. In 1917 a fruit packing shed operating on corner St. Aubyn St and Karamu Rd nth by **Apsey & White Co Ltd**, In 1928 Percy Woon began with Apsey and Co Ltd, later became C. H. Slater. In 1946 Herbert George Apsey a manager at Kitchener St. Herbert George Apsey died 1965 in Hastings aged 88 and Annie Leila Apsey died May 1966 in Hastings aged 83.

1912 April, Ruth Mabel Barr was born in Hastings, the daughter of Mabel Alice and Matthew Barr. **Matthew Barr** b: February 1873 in Weehawken New Jersey in 1902 he married Mabel Alice Allen b: February 1877 in Lower Hutt Wellington the daughter of Helen and Thomas Allen. They had five children - January 1903 John Livingstone Barr, April 1904 Mary Pringle Barr she married Arthur Henry Denholm in 1934, December 1906 Cora Agnes Barr she married Mervyn William Yates in 1936 and May 1908 Sheila MacDonald Barr she married Leonard George Burdett Whitehead in 1932. Matthew Barr died April 1949 in Hawke's Bay aged 76 and Mabel Alice Barr nee Allen died September 1950 in Napier aged 73.

1912 April, Sarah Elizabeth Jane Lily Tracey was born at Hastings, the daughter of Esther and William Tracey, she married Alfred Edward Osborne in 1936. **William Tracey** b: February 1876 in Limavady Londonderry Northern Ireland the son of Mary and Daniel Tracey, he married Esther Carroll born in Cavan Ireland. Children - October 1908 Sinclair Dunseith Tracey at Cavan Ireland he married Doris Florence Clarke, June 1914 William Tracey at Hastings. 1917 WW1 Reserves William Tracey a labourer 2nd Division C/- Miss Carroll, Heretaunga St Hastings, In 1925 Ester and William Tracey a sawmiller at 212 Stanley St Hastings. William Tracey died March 1952 in Hastings aged 76 and Esther Tracey nee Carroll died?

1912 April, Hannah Jean Todhunter was born at Hastings the daughter of Marion Patterson and John Todhunter She married Derek Roger Bennett. **John Todhunter** b: 1875 in Bassenthwaite Cumberland Eng the son of Hannah and William Todhunter in 1909 he married Marion Paterson Archibald b: August 1887 in Sea Somerset, Eng the daughter of Isabella and Walter Paterson Archibald. They had two children – 1915 Alison Marion Todhunter. In April 1920 Marion's father Walter Paterson Archibald was accidently killed in Napier, manager for J. D. Ormond, Karamu stables he had been in Hastings since 1889. John Todhunter died August 1935 in Wellington aged 60 and Marion Paterson Todhunter nee Archibald died July 1950 in Palmerston North aged 62.

1912 April, Charles Hollard Robinson died at Hastings aged 53, Anna M. Robinson died June 1949 aged 87 Dau Elfiedia Edith Susan Robinson

1912 April, Edith Florence Kirkcaldie was born at Hastings the daughter of Florence Mary and Ernest Alfred Gardner / Kirkcaldie she married William James Mann.

1912 April, William Jory Reeves b: June 1888 in Cornwall Eng married a Hastings Rose Fergusson b: May 1888 in Whakatu, the daughter of Rosanna and James Robert Fergusson.

1912 April, James King b: November 1882 in Tai Tapu, Canterbury the son of Catherine and Thomas King married Eva Dewstow b: April 1890 in Hastings the daughter of Justine Agnes and William Henry Dewstow. She was married four times. They had one child. James King a shunter died August 1955 in Hastings aged 72. Eva married Joseph Henry Paulger, Harry Spurling Benjamin and William Charles Taylor. Eva King nee Dewstow died July 1986 in Auckland aged 96.

1912 April, **The Hastings Rubbish Pit Nuisance** – Sir, A great writer in describing the city of Cologne remarked that it was the Mecca of architectomes, but was more famous for having within its precincts seventy-two well defined stinks and several smells. This can hardly be applied to Hastings, but there is a similarity, for we have the numerously defined disorqianisers or the olfactory organs concentrated in one, and that one is located in and around **Quarry Rd**, otherwise the debit's hole of the Hastings Borough Council. This has long been a criminal disgrace to our City Fathers. Will the reelected Major justify the Hastings ratepayers' confidence in returning him unopposed by removing for ever this menace to public health and decency? I am, etc. A. Gregory, Hastings. April 25th 1912.

In 1914 complaints were made about the influx of rats in and around the Hastings rubbish dump Joll Rd, access from Quarry Rd and in January at the Duke St gravel pit, a dead horse carcass was partially buried which caused news, there was another gravel pit in Collinge Rd.

In September 1917, Joll Rd Gravel Pit - Sir, Having a little time to spare I made a visit to the gravel pit in Joll Rd, and was surprised to see so **much water in it**; in fact it is higher now than I have ever seen it before. It behoves the council to get to work when the water subsides and add say another two feet of earth to the ground that has been filled in by them. I thought the earth deposited there was well above water level, but the heavy rains during the winter have proved otherwise. The levelling down of Charles St and Henry St to their permanent levels would produce spoil and most sufficient to do the work. I would also suggest that the council should notify the owners of the grounds alongside and opposite their quarry that they must stop taking any more spoil from their land. **One of the sections has fully six feet of water in it**. Trusting the council will see its way to attend to the above matters. - I am, etc., Anxious.

In September 1919, Re: Covering of Refuse - **Joll Rd old quarry**: The Engineer has been instructed to strip off the sides of Henry St and to use the material obtained in **covering the tins**, **rubbish etc.**, **in this old gravel pit**.

The ole Stortford Lodge Hotel -

The Stortford Lodge Hotel proprietors - October 1895 Charles Alfred William Hunt, December 1897 Alfred James Ellingham, September 1910 W. Porter was licensee of the Stortford Lodge Hotel, 1912 Ernold Arthur Grenside, then Mr Frederick King and June 1920 William Edward Grant.

Ernold Arthur Grenside was born at Waipawa, he had been proprietor of the Te Aute Hotel for the past two years and arrived in Hastings February1911. In his younger days he was one of the finest athletes in the district, and was the winner of the Tomoana Cricket Club's trophy for the best all-rounder. In racing circles also he was held in high esteem, and owned some well remembered performers, including Mere Mere, Cousin Jack, Captain Jingle, and Blue Boy. He was a member of the Hawke's Bay and Waipukurau Jockey Clubs. For many years he was a popular member of the St. Leonards Bowling Club. Mr Grenside has three sons have inherited some of their father's sporting instincts, Mr Nuku Grenside having been a Hawke's Bay representative, Mr Bert Grenside a member of the All Blacks Rugby team, and Monty Grenside his third son, having represented Hastings. In addition to his three sons, he has four daughters, Mesdames Copeland and Hooper, and Misses, Jessie and Madge Grenside, all of Auckland. His wife died some years ago. Ernold Arthur Grenside died September 1938.

1912 May, E. Arthur Grenside was licensee of the Stortford Lodge Hotel, and Lily Gell a housemaid and Margaret Ruddick a cook were employed at the Stortford Lodge Hotel.

The Stortford Lodge Hotel - A two-storeyed wooden building with a fine balcony and a verandah. The ground floor contains several sitting rooms, a large commercial room, a billiard room, and a dining room capable of seating about fifty guests. The upper floor includes fifteen bedrooms, a bathroom with hot and cold water laid on, and a convenient lavatory. The house is well furnished throughout, an excellent tables kept, and the bar is stocked with the best brands of liquors. The comfort and convenience of guests and travellers is the proprietor's first consideration. There are good stables in connection with the establishment which contain **fourteen loose boxes**.



Mr Frederick King was the next proprietor of the Stortford Lodge Hotel

Frederick King b: August 1872 in Greytown, Wellington, the son of Catherine and Thomas King. He was educated in Greytown and apprenticed to blacksmith in Masterton, for thirteen years he was engaged in business as a member of the firm of King Brothers. In October 1893 he married Franciszka (Frances) Cecilia Clara Treder b: April 1872 in Gdansk, Pomerania, Poland, the daughter of Barbara and Jacob Treder. They had three children - March 1895 in Frederick Joseph King at Pahiatua, he died motorcycle collision Market St Hastings April 1924, December 1903 Richard John Barnard King and October 1905 George Ormond King was born in Hastings, he died within a year of his birth. Franciszka (Frances) Cecilia Clara King nee Treder died July 1941 at Hastings aged 69. Frederick King was proprietor of the Stortford Lodge Hotel then an agent, he was a member of the Hastings Bowling Club, the Ancient Order of Foresters, and was vice-president and a member of the Hastings Football Club. Frederick King died December 1950 in Hastings aged 78.

1912 May, Charles King aged about 21 years, employed as a porter at the Stortford Lodge Hotel, said to be suffering from insomnia, took a sleeping draught when retiring to bed on Monday night. All efforts to awaken him on Tuesday were futile, and the doctor ordered, his removal to a private hospital, where he died last evening without regaining consciousness.

1921 March, A fire broke out in some of the 14 **loose boxes** at the rear of the Stortford Lodge Hotel Hastings, the flames had a good hold. The fire brigade under Supt Keith were promptly on the scene and quickly got the outbreak under control, but their operations were hindered by the fact that one of the stables was packed with hay, which was alight and which had to be forked out, a process which detained the fireman for three hours, before the premises could be declared safe. The three loose boxes and a storeroom were practically gutted, but little other damage resulted. The outbuildings including the stables were insured in the atlas for £1.500.



The Stortford Lodge Hotel 1930's, no chimneys, added balcony, Bar signage on window, motorcars and E. Newbigin's, Burton Brewery, Purity Waters delivery truck. Edward Newbigin purchased the Hotel and after his death the seventy year old hotel was sold in the 1950's and the frontage was extensively renovated.




1912 May, Dorothy Mary Sinden was born at Hastings the daughter of Dorothy Mary and Joseph Ambrose Matthews Sinden she married Frank Samuel Salamonson in June 1935. **Joseph Ambrose Matthews Sinden** b: September 1879 in Napier the son of Bridget and Joseph Sinden in May 1911 he married Dorothy Mary Evans. They had three children - 1914 Wilfred Joseph Sinden and May 1915 Joseph Leo Sinden at Waipukarau. Joseph Ambrose Matthews Sinden died September 1934 in Napier aged 55 and Dorothy Mary Sinden nee Evans died August 1962 in Hastings aged 77.

1912 May, A disclaimer - J. Craig referred to in the Magistrate's Court is NOT the Jock Craig of Tomoana, nor is he in any way connected or related to him. John Craig, Tomoana. The Jock Craig was an orphan born in Scotland 1876, he was a veteran of two wars first serving with the Imperial forces in the Boer War, coming to NZ at the conclusion of that. He resided at Tomoana and served in the 1914 – 1918 war with the NZ Forces attaining the rank of captain. Jock was a well known resident of Hastings as an enthusiastic member of the Orphans Club and an entertainer at social functions; he won for himself great popularity as a singer of Scotch comic songs, bringing the house down at some events. Jock Craig a telly clerk of Shakespare Rd died September 1945 at Napier aged 69.

John Craig, Tomoana. - In October 1925, Mr Jock Craig for many years connected with Messrs Nelson Bros at the Tomoana Freezing Works and latterly on the clerical staff of Nelsons Ltd has severed his connection with the company and joined Messrs de Pelichet, McLeod and Co, merchants as their travelling representative in Hawke's Bay.

James Henry Patrick Moran died as a young father in February 1917 at Hastings and Bessie Moran nee Elliott died October 1955 at Hastings aged 65.

1912 June, Irene Frances Edith Joblin was born at Hastings the daughter of Eva Maud and Langsford Emanuel Leigh Joblin, she married Ian Halford Jacobsen in October 1933. **Langsford Emanuel Leigh Joblin** b: April 1884 in Christchurch, in December 1908 in Napier he married Eva Maud Kirk b: October 1890 in Hastings the daughter of Frances Alice and Edward James Kirk. They had seven children at Hastings - June 1913 Maurice Joblin, October 1915 Loma Leige Joblin, 1919 Edward Leigh Joblin, Russell Emanuel Joblin, Barry Joblin and Eric Knowles Joblin. Langsford Emanuel Leigh Joblin died February 1962 aged 77 and Eva Maud Joblin nee Kirk died March 1967 aged 77.

1912 June, Lillian Agnes Annie Rawlings was born at Hastings the daughter of Annie and William Rawlings. **Thomas William Rawlings** b:1878 Durham Eng the son of Margaret and William Rawlings in 1906 he married Annie Dinneen b: 1871 in Drummin Wicklow Ireland the daughter of Mary and James Dinneen. Children - October 1907 Mary Evelyn Rawlings at Napier she married James Cornielius Lynch, July 1909 Elsie May Rawlings at Napier. From 1908 – 1911 Annie and William Rawlings a butcher Paki Paki. Thomas William Rawlings died 1943 in Auckland aged 65 and Annie Rawlings nee Dinneen died 1959 in Thames aged 88.

1912 June, Isabella Jessie Snadden was born at Hastings the daughter of Agnes Henderson and Robert Wilson Snadden. Robert Wilson Snadden b: October 1877 in 1907 he married Agnes Henderson Sinclair b: July 1878 in Otago the daughter of Isabella and John Sinclair. Children – 1914 Ian Snadden at Hastings. Agnes Henderson Snadden nee Sinclair died 1958 in Hastings aged 80 and Robert Wilson Snadden died April 1959 in Napier aged 81.

1912 June, William Oscar George Krogh was born in Hastings the son of Alice and Oscar Krogh, he had one sister and died July 1940 aged 28. **Oscar Krogh** b: April 1879 at Napier the son of Helen Susan and Oscar Joachim Krogh, in June 1872 at Wellington he deserted the barque *Thames* was arrested at Masterton and sentenced to 6 weeks hard labour. In April 1910 he married Alice Small b:1882 in NZ the daughter of Margaret and William Small. They had two children - July 1917 Margaret Helen Krogh she died a child August 1920. 1911- 1914 Helen and Oscar Krogh a clerk at Caroline Rd. Oscar Krogh died August 1944 in Hastings aged 65 and Alice Krogh nee Small died November 1949 in Hastings, aged 67.

1912 June, Harald Husheer was born in Hastings the son of Bertha and Gerhard Husheer, he married Margaret Jean Small in February 1939. **Gerhard Husheer** b: July 1864 in Germany he married Bertha Gurrine Patterson b: May 1869 in Bergen Norway. In 1916 Gerhard Husheer at Haumoana. Gerhard Husheer died November 1954 in Napier aged 90 and Bertha Gurrine Husheer nee Patterson died August 1966 in Napier aged 97.

1912 June, Ernest Donald Westerman was born at Hastings the son of Janet and Ernest Alfred Westerman he married Jessie Margaret Gallagher. **Ernest Alfred Westerman** had one son with Janet (known as Jessie) McLean the daughter of John McLean. Ernest Alfred Maxwell Westerman died February 1954, buried Havelock North cemetery.

1912 June, Allan Corelius Thomsen was born at Hastings the son of Agnes Mary and Hans Peter Thomsen.

Hans Peter Thomsen b: June 1879 in Palmerston North the son of Elsie and Hans Thomsen, in 1910 he married Agnes Mary Moss b: April 1880 the daughter of Georgiana and Thomas Moss. They had four children - 1911 Peter Douglas Thomsen he died August 1930 aged 19, January 1917 Nola Kathleen Thomsen at Hastings she married Kenyon Francis Kirk in 1941 and November 1917 Lorna Elsie Thomsen at Hastings. In 1917 WW1 Reserves Hans Peter Thomsen an orchadist 2nd Division Hastings, in 1922 Agnes Mary and Hans Peter Thomsen an orchadist Te Aute Rd. Hans Peter Thomsen died March 1954 in Hastings aged 74 and buried in Havelock North and Agnes Mary Thomsen nee Moss died August 1965 in Hastings aged 85.

1912 June, Two Hastings borough employees, John Walden and John Conway, were driving to work when their horse shied and the driver pulling on reins caused the hit to break. The horse bolted and Conway while trying to dismount from the trap fell under the wheel and was killed almost instantaneously. Walden scrambled out of the roar of the trap and sustained cuts on his knees.

1912 June, John Patrick Conway an old resident of Hastings, a married man aged 44 with four children met his death tragically in Heretaunga St when run over by a trap. John Walden of Boundary Rd Hastings, foreman ganger in the employ of the Hastings Borough Council and engaged on the sewerage excavations in Park Rd, was driving to work in a dog cart and he gave a lift to John Conway who is also a resident of Boundary Rd and is a workman also employed on the sewer works in Park Rd. John Walden said he left home about 6.40 a.m. Conway accompanying him in a dogcart. Drove along Boundary Rd and turned into Nelson St and then into Heretaunga St, in the direction of Havelock. When they reached Messrs. Phillips, Wright & Co shop, he noticed the horse watching something ahead, and saw that it was a case on the right hand side of the road opposite Mr W. G. Jaegar's business. The horse had shied at the same case the previous evening, he was on his guard. Eased the horse's pace, and when he was nearly abreast of the case the horse shied and swerved on to the left hand side of the street. To prevent the trap going over the concrete channelling he pulled heavy on the right hand rein, but the strain broke the ring of the bit and the bit pulled through his mouth and up to the ames. He lost control of the horse and it bolted. He thought he said to Conway, 'We had better get out, I have no control over him." The next thing he saw was that Conway was on the lower step on the left hand side. That was opposite the Pacific Hotel. He got out of the trap near the Council Chambers by jumping out of the back and escaped with an abrasion of the left knee and elbow. Did not know where the horse was caught. It had been broken into harness about two months and was thoroughly quiet. Mr Gavan Allan said the case was on the side of the road, in the water table, he saw the case in the same position the previous evening about 5 o'clock, but did not see it in the morning. Bernard Samuel Story, medical practitioner, said that he was called to see John Patrick Conway at Ellingham's hotel about 7.15 a.m. on Thursday. Conway was lying on a couch and was dead. Made an examination, and found the chest crushed and ribs broken. Some of the latter had punctured the lungs, and that was sufficient to cause death. Thomas Powell carter, said he was in Heretaunga St about 7 a.m. and was passing Messrs. Land and Heighway's premises

when he saw a horse and trap driven by Mr **John Waldon** coming up Heretaunga St near Graham and Gebbie's at full gallop. A man was standing on the step on the near side of the cart, with one hand on the shaft and the other on the side of the cart. The horse made a plunge, and the man appeared to lose his hold. As he fell the horse's hind legs seemed to hit him on the side and knocked him under the wheel, which passed over his chest. Conway was immediately picked up by Messrs T. Powell and **James Lean**, who both witnessed the accident, carried Conway into the Pacific Hotel in an unconscious condition. Conway was not dead, but did not speak and died about two minutes later. **Daniel Wallace**, labourer, residing in Karamu Rd said that John Patrick Conway was his **brother-in-law** he was 44 years of age an old resident of Hastings. He leaves a wife, three children and three sisters residing in Hastings (Mesdames D. Wallace, Allison and J. Hayes) for whom widespread sympathy will be felt.

The funeral for John Patrick Conway will leave Mr Daniel Wallace's house, Karamu Rd for the Catholic Church and Hastings cemetery. The cortege was a very long one, and was headed by the members of St. Joseph's branch of the Hibernan Lodge. In June 1912 Mrs J. Conway wrote claiming compensation for the death of her husband who was killed in a trap accident in Heretaunga street on June 13th whilst proceeding to work for the council. The Northern Insurance Company wrote to the Town Clerk (Mr W. H. Cook) stating that the relatives of the late Mr J. P. Conway a borough employee, who was killed whilst proceeding to work had no claim under the Workers' Compensation Act. Such claims were only allowed when the accident occurred during the actual working hours. The Mayor said he would sooner see the solicitor's fee presented to the widow. He was sure there was no possibility of the claim succeeding.—Cr. Donovan was in favour of some assistance being given to the widow, and suggested that the proprietors of the Hastings picture shows might see their way to give a benefit performance. The council could make a grant from the unauthorised expenditure.-The Mayor re iterated that he would also like to do something, but in view of the letters coming before the council, he did not move in the matter. In August 1912 The fund for the relief of the widow and family of the late Mr John Conway who was accidentally killed in Hastings recently, was substantially added to to-day by an amount of £25 forwarded to us per the Very. Rev. Father Keogh. This welcome addition brings the total of the fund up to £62 .6'-. Subscriptions in hand to date Ate as follows - Amount already acknowledged £37. 6, Forwarded per Very Rev. Father Keogh: Mr S. Tong - £1. 1s, Mr F. King - £1. Mr M. Lane - £1. Yesterday's Church Collection: £4.10s. Sundry small amounts - £17. 9. Total to date - £62 .6s. In September 1912 - The Conway Fund - We have received a cheque for £5 from William Nelson towards the fund for the widow and children of the late John Conway. 1913 January, A arson fire in a cottage in Queen St west occupied by an aged lady named Mrs C. Barry mother of Mrs John Heeney of Mahora. A next door neighbour Mr G. L. Rees detected a smell of fire about 9.30 and on going outside saw smoke issuing from the adjoining house. He immediately gave the alarm and returning to the house, gained entrance by a front window and threw out a box which was burning in a front bedroom. No trace of Mrs Barry could be found and it is thought that she must have been staying with one of her daughters. The Fire Brigade and Fire Police were quickly on the scene and succeeded in quelling the flames before much damage was done. Subsequently a hole was, found to have been burnt through the floor of the room immediately behind that in which the box was burning. Wax matches were also found strewn on the floor and the back door was wide open. The walls of the front bedroom were slightly charred, but the damage was not very great. Mrs Catherine (Kate) Barry died May 1914 aged 85.

Mr Stone went to look for him. He found the deceased lying on his back on a path at the side of the house and life was extinct. A few minutes before the body was discovered. Mrs Stone had heard a noise like something falling at the rear of the house, and looked out the back door, but she did not see anyone. Dr. Story had been attending the deceased for fatty degeneration of the heart, and an inquest will not be necessary. The late Mr Horne was 72 years of age, and had been a **resident of Hastings for over forty years**, during a considerable portion of which he earned on the business of contracting to the Hastings Borough Council. He was very highly respected throughout the district arid his many friends will regret to hear of his death. The deceased is survived by three sons and two daughters, all married, his wife having predeceased him about two years ago. The interment took place this afternoon at the Hastings cemetery, and was largely attended. Rev. T. J. Vallis read the burial service

1913 March, Napier Criminal session Before His Honour the Chief Justice, Sir Robert Stout) Mary Kathleen Doran was charged with concealment of birth at Hastings on October 9th 1912. Mr Dolan appeared for the accused who pleaded "not guilty." Mr H. A. Cornford conducted the case for the Crown and briefly pointed out that the accused was employed at Flynn's Hastings Hotel, and that she had been delivered of a male child which she concealed under the bed in her room. Mrs Flynn, wife of the licensee, Annie Doran, a sister of the accused, Isabella Doran, another sister Mary Kyle, Robert Nairn medical practitioner of Hastings and William John Butler detective stationed at Hastings gave evidence. The detective, in answer to Mr Dolan said he had known the accused for a long period and had always known her to be well behaved. Mr Dolan counsel for the accused said he did not intend to call any evidence. He then addressed the jury at length. His Honour, in summing up, pointed out that it was very difficult to prove what constituted a secret disposition of a dead body of a child. Mr Dolan had cited several English cases to prove that there were wide conceptions on the point, but it had to he remembered that the English Statutes were different from our own and were not applicable in the present case. The jury must not be swayed by the position in which this unfortunate girl found herself, but they, as jurymen, must consider whether she had broken the law or not. The whole question was whether the accused, by not telling of the birth of the child until the Thursday, intended to keep from somebody, at any rate, the fact that a child had been born. On returning to the court the foreman informed his Honour that the jury had agreed upon a verdict of "not guilty." The prisoner was accordingly discharged. The court then adjourned for the day.

Mary Helen (Molly) Alexander supervised the functions held at Waikoko homestead Tomoana and he later married Leslie John Donovan. John William Alexander married Dorothy Mavis O'Neill. William Archibald Alexander died April 1940 and Margaret Alexander nee Hodge of Nelson St died July 1972 aged 85.


1913 April, Margaret Therese Joseph was born at Hastings the daughter of Ruby and Mansoor Joseph she married Louis Victor Peters. **Mansoor Joseph** b: 1880 in Lebanon he married Ruby Coorey b: 1880 in Lebanon Children - September 1909 Mary Teresa Joseph at Wellington she married Anthony George in October 1933 at Hastings, April 1916 Agnes Veronica Joseph she married Patrick Percy Beacham in 1948. In September 1915 M. Joseph has taken over the old establishment restaurant business of Mrs Hekem Lately carried on by Mr J. Sweet. In October 1919 M. Joseph opened a Fish Mart in Warren St next to Watson Butcher, In November 1926 Fish sales M. Joseph Zealandia Café, In October 1931 Joseph's announce they moved into their new restaurant premises Heretaunga St opposite Carlton Club Hotel, In March 1933 owing to the illness M. AD 1912, Laterday Saints Maori Agricultural College at the Bridge pa

1912 October, The long Maori Agricultural College established at Bridge Pa by the Latter Day Saints, an institution which promises to be an important factor in the future of the native race in this Dominion, has now reached completion in the shape of one of the finest buildings of its kind in the Dominion. The college is situated about six miles from Hastings, stands on an area of 130 acres, which has a frontage to the Maraekakaho Rd and gives an uninterrupted view of the whole of the Hawke's Bay plains. A better position would have been hard to choose. The building, across the front of which the name "Latter Day Saints Maori Agricultural College, 1912," stands out in bold letters, is a massive structure of brick, reinforced in steel wire on a six feet reinforced concrete base, the outside being finished in cement plaster. The main entrance opens into a roomy hall with a 27ft by 19ft 6in floor space, where the stairs commence which lead to the second storey. The ground floor plan includes a kitchen 25ft by 15ft, with all the latest conveniences, a scullery with double sinks and other necessary appointments, a bakeroom fitted with one of Alien's patent baking ovens with a capacity for 200 loaves, and a dining room 32ft by 27 ft. The boiler room is also on the ground floor and is encased in reinforced cement for fire preventive purposes. Besides the boiler this room is supplied with a circulating copper cylinder. The lavatory and sanitary conveniences are situated at the rear. On the upper floor there are twenty-six bedrooms ranging in size from 131/2ft by 15ft to 131/2 ft by 91ft. The dormitories are divided into two blocks, both provided with lavatories, bathrooms, etc., whilst intersecting the building are a number of large corridors, the woodwork of which is finished in rimu with "poilite" ceilings. Hudson's patent partition bricks, which are said to combine lightness with durability, comprise the partitions between the rooms. At the rear and attached to the main building by a verandah is a reinforced concrete cool store fitted with Louvre ventilators and on top of which is erected a 1000 gallon tank. A laundry built of brick with solid concrete flooring, and divided into drying and ironing apartments, is situated beyond the cool store. The assembly room stands alongside the college. This buildings, which is also constructed in reinforced brick, on a nine feet reinforced concrete base, is entered by an impressive looking portico, on either side of which stands an octagonal column in reinforced cement. The main hall is of large dimensions, with a stage at the northern end, and will be used for religious .purposes and for lectures. Two compartments, each 20ft by 13ft, are on each side of the principal room, and these will be used as class rooms. Throughout the building special attention has been given to ventilation, and for lighting purposes acetylene gas is generated in a separate building. The water supply is in every way up-to-date, the water being pumped by a windmill into a number of tanks, and supplied, hot and cold, to all parts of the building. The college is also served with a thorough system of drainage and a septic tank and in this as in all other respects no expense has been spared. The building the cost of which was £12,000, is to be opened in February next. It is a decided acquisition to Hawke's Bay, not only from an educational, but also from an architectural standpoint, and the excellent workmanship

displayed throughout the construction reflects the highest credit on the contractors, **Messrs W. M. Hay and Son of Hastings**



1913 April, For the education of Maori boys: The Agricultural College for native youths recently opened at Bridge Pa near Hastings, Hawke's Bay, for the Mormons, by L. E. Harris

In July 1913, A case of smallpox had been detected among the students at the **Mormon Maori Agricultural College at the Bridge pa,** about nine miles from Hastings. At the request if the Health Department, Mr Barcroft left for the College to make an examination and he declares the case to be one of smallpox. The patient, a youth of 17, arrived at the college from the north on July 11th, and has well-marked evidences of recent infection. A number of other students are showing symptoms.

In November 1929, **The Latter Day Saints' cemetrry at Bridge pa,** was the scene of the interment of one of the Maori Agricultural College pupils, David Logi 18 years of age and a native of Tonga. The boy had been in failing health for some time was towards the end, conveyed to the Napier Hospital where he died. The deceased was exceedingly popular with the students and staff of the college and there was a large gathering of mourners at the grave side, where **Mr Bailiff principal of the college**, conducted the harial service. After the interment a number of beautiful wreaths were lain on the grave.

The Maori Agricultural College was destroyed in the 1931 Quake, In March 1932 The principal of the Hastings High School (W. A. G. Penlington) reports – Equipment - A good deal of useful equipment including science apparatus has been received from the now **disestablished Maori Agricultural College**.

1913 May, **Mayor James William Garnett** resident of Market St sth died at Nurse O'Callaghan's Private Hospital in Hastings aged 57. Early on Friday evening April 25th Mr Garnett was taken suddenly ill and was removed to the private hospital, where he underwent an operation for appendicitis and peritonitis. His condition at once became grave, but with medical skill and constant attention he made satisfactory improvement until Sunday when he suffered a severe relapse. He was elected to the Hastings Borough Council and 2 yrs later to the Mayoralty in 1911. The funeral of the late Mr Garnett - The cortege, was headed by the children of the Wesley Methodist Sunday school classes, of which the deceased was superintendent for a period of 23 years, left the late Mayor's residence in Market St at 2.15 p.m. and proceeded via Southampton St and Hastings St to the Wesley Methodist Church, where a service was conducted by the Rev. T. J. Wallis. The funeral of the late Mr **James Garnett. Mayor of Hastings** took place this afternoon. The cortege, headed by the children of the Wesley Methodist Sunday school classes, of which the deceased was superintendent for a period of 23 years, left the late Mayor's residence in Market St at 2.15 p.m. and proceeded via Southampton St and Hastings St to the Wesley Methodist Church, where a service was conducted by the Rev. T. J. Wallis. Hannah Garnett nee Wilson died May 1942 at Hastings aged 85.

1913 May, A Hospital For Hastings extracts – Sir, Hastings tried for a hospital a few years ago and those who were then conversant with the Health Department's centralisation policy were not surprised when Dr. T. H. A. Valentine Inspector General of Health opposed the idea. Hastings was then promised: 1. a motor ambulance; 2. the Hospital Board to arrange with the private hospitals of Hastings to take in needy urgent cases at reduced rates. The former has not yet been provided and the latter, so far as I know, have not yet been made use of. But there is talk of a separate rating area and a public hospital to take in every class of ease. Accommodation available in the Napier Hospital is limited, and the individual who claims that any ratepayer, rich or poor, has an accommodation claim on that hospital is uncharitable. That limited accommodation should provide first for the actually destitute, and next, for the man or woman whose income most nearly approaches that state. It is scarcely in any province to discuss individual instances of medical and nursing bills staggering recipients. There are tricks in all trades and mugs in every clientele. But "staggers" is a malady common to all classes of society. I have seen it produced by all sorts of bills, and, short of actual socialism, I fail to see how the disease is to be completely eradicated. Moreover, the medical bill is not always spelt with a capital B. Confining my argument to the subject under discussion I would point out that the honorary staff of the Napier Hospital, in addition to paying hospital rates, works hours each day in that- institution for the love of the thing. As for our nurses. I claim theirs is the poorest paid skilled labour in our Dominion. T. McKibbin, Hastings.

1913 May, Mr and Mrs Edward Dalby Collison of Claremont, Longlands celebrated their golden wedding. They were married in May 1863 at St. John's Church, Leicester before Mr Collison left for NZ with shipmate Mr William Lilly England, Mrs Collision followed two months later. They have two sons Edward and William both residents of Hastings and four daughters.

1913 May, Hastings resident expires suddenly at Palmerston North - A welldressed man aged about 53 years with auburn hair, whose pockets contained documents bearing the name W. Tiraperley and a railway ticket from Hawera to Hastings, sat in the Westport Coal Company's yard near Palmerston North station this afternoon and died. One of the employees went up and spoke to him and found him to be dead. The cause was apparently heart disease. An inquest will be held. The above message refers to Mr William Timperley of Eastbourne St Hastings. Deceased left on a visit to Hawera a few days ago and apparently was on his way home when he suddenly expired. The late Mr Timperley was a journalist by profession and for some years was proprietor of the Wairoa Guardian. He came to reside at Hastings about twelve months ago and during that period his quiet unassuming disposition gained for him a wide circle of friends He leaves a widow who is sister to Mr John Holden snr of Tikokino and one child, a boy of about 15 years.

1913 May, Emily Maud Whitaker was born in Hastings the daughter of Francis Mary and William Charles Whitaker, she married Alfred Walter Powell in 1934.

1913 May, Marjorie May McGruer was born a Hastings the daughter of Ada Elizabeth and constable William Edward McGruer, she married Reginald Herbert McGreal.

William Edward McGruer b: April 1886 in Karangahake Waikato the son of Mary and George McGruer, in 1910 he married Ada Elizabeth Dowd b: September 1884 in Auckland. 1913 June, Peter Alfred Johnston De Pass was born a Hastings the son of Rachael and Cecil David De Pass. **Cecil David de Pass** b: April 1880 the son of Florence and Alfred De Pass on January1909 he married Rachel Eva Minetta Chapman b: October 1884 in NZ the daughter of Rachel and Robert Chapman. They had two children - October 1909 Roie Rachel de Pass at Papatoetoe Auckland. Cecil David de Pass died June1966 in Christchurch aged 86 and Rachel Eva Minetta De Pass nee Chapman died 1969 in Christchurch aged 85.

1913 June, Frank Henry Sheerin was born at Hastings the son of Eleanor Jane and Denis Henry Sheerin, he died a child September 1920. **Denis Henry Sheerin / Sheeran** b: June 1885 in NZ the son of Katherine and Henry Sheerin, in 1913 he married Eleanor Jane McGonnell b: January 1892 the daughter of Ada and John McGonnell. Deceased underwent an operation a few days ago. She leaves a widower and one son aged 16, for whom much sympathy wilt be felt. 1913 June, Mrs Ada Rose Moran nee Collins relict of Charles Edwin Morgan married John Henry Harrison at Hastings, she died February 1925 at Napier aged 62.

1913 June, Death, Halse - Mr Richard Wood Halse ex-manager of the Bank of New Zealand Hastings branch died at the Napier Hospital after four days illness. He was 47 years of age. In December 1900 **Richard Wood Halse** was appointed manager of the branch at Hastings Bank of NZ, a position he held until 1911 when he resigned to enter into business on his own account. Richard was the first captain of the Hastings Fire Police. He took a keen interest in Rugby football, a member of the Hastings Rugby Sub-Union and was president of the Hastings Bowling Club. Martha Prosser 'Mattie' Halse nee Gibbons died December 1939 in Wellington aged 66.

William Palmer b: September 1866 in Nelson, the son of Mary and William Palmer. In February 1891 he married Mary Ann Grooby b: June 1866. They had four children - February 1892 Reginald Carlton Palmer he married Lavinia Jean Ashman in 1919, May 1893 Gladys Adele Palmer she married Hubert Charles Tucker July 1913, December 1899 Dulcie Merle Palmer she married Harold Howlett in 1923, August 1904 Colin Rainsford Palmer he married Amelia Jane Henry in 1934. William Palmer died August 1918 in Hastings aged 51, and Mary Ann Palmer nee Grooby died August 1951 in Hastings aged 85.

1913 July, **Hubert Charles Tucker** b: October 1891 married at Havelock North, Gladys Adele Palmer b: May 1893 the daughter of Mary and William Palmer. They had five children - January 1914 at Hastings Hubert Clive Nelson Tucker, December 1916 Reginald Nelson Tucker, April 1919 Arthur Laurence Tucker he married Una Meryle Steel, June 1925 Ngaire June Tucker and January 1928 Noeline Ruth Tucker. Hubert Charles Tucker died September 1969 in Hastings aged 77 and Gladys Adele Tucker nee Palmer died September 1987 in Hastings aged 94.

Edmond O'Donoghue snr b: 1857 County Limerick Ireland was a grocer and draper at 1008 Heretaunga St west, he died at Hastings in June 1921 aged 64.

In 1911 Edward O'Donoghue jnr a Labourer c/o E. O'Donoghue Hastings, b:1887 the son of Mr E. O'Donoghue of County Limerick Ireland, he moved up to the Bay of Plenty and married Amy Anne Birchall, daughter of Mr Owen Birchall of Melbourne in October 1913, he died 1952 aged 64. In the 1930's a Miss Mary O'Donoghue was at the store.

In July 1913, The premises of Mr Edmond O'Donoghue, grocer and draper, situated a short distance on the Hastings side of Stortford Lodge, were burglarised yesterday afternoon, and the sum of £2.10 in silver stolen from the till. Mr O'Donoghue closed the shop at 1 p.m. in accordance with the usual Wednesday half-holiday custom and left for Napier by the 1.30 p.m. train. On returning home at 5.30 p.m. he found the kitchen window broken and on making an exanimation discovered that the drawer used as a cash box in the shop had been rifled. The burglar, or burglars, had apparently gained entrance by the kitchen window, the glass in which had been knocked out to enable the latch to be reached. The act was a daring one insomuch as the window stands in full view of houses on the opposite side of the street. The drawer also contained four shillings worth of coppers, but these were left intact. So far as can be ascertained, none of the stock is missing.

Again in March 1914, At the Hastings Court - **Lyle Stanley** aged 19 was charged with breaking and entering the dwelling of Edmond O'Donoghue at Hastings, on Wednesday, March 4th and steeling the sum of 4/-. Detective Butler prosecuted. **Edmond O'Donoghue, storekeeper, Hastings**, stated that on Wednesday the 4th March, he closed his shop at 12 noon and left about half an hour later to go to the showground. The outside doors were locked and the windows latched, but as one of the latter had no fastener it was fixed to the window sill by an awl. This window was in the

bedroom. He left three or four shilling in threepenny pieces in the shop till. Returning to the shop at about 4.30 p.m. he found the kitchen window up and the awl which fastened the bedroom window was on the floor. The front door of the shop had been unlocked from the inside. The money left in the till was missing. **Frank Bentley, carpenter**, residing in Heretaunga St, stated that at about 3.30 p.m. on Wednesday last he went to O'Donoghue's shop to obtain some tobacco. The premises were closed and he went to the back and knocked at the porch door. He heard someone moving inside, but got no answer. He then knocked at the main back door. Heard the kitchen window open; and accursed jumped out. Witness thought accused was the storekeeper's sop and beckoned to him to come back. Accused said. "That's all right" and jumped on his bicycle and rode towards Hastings. **Constable McGruer** stated that he interviewed accused in reference to the offence on the 6th instant. He did not admit the offence at first, but when witness went to get the previous witness to identify him, he admitted his guilt. He made written statement which was read over to him and which he signed. Accused pleaded guilty and was committed to the Supreme Court, Napier for sentence. **Lyle Stanley**, aged 19 charged with breaking and entering the dwelling of Edmond O'Donoghue at Hastings and stealing the sum of four shillings, was remanded until Monday next. Accused did not apply for bail. Detective Butler represented the police.

Frank Bentley 1917 WW1 2nd Division Hastings. 1926 Frank Bentley a builder went bankrupt. 1928 Frank Bentley a builder Excelsior House, King St nth Hastings. Frank Bentley died at Hastings January 1941, buried Napier.

1913 July, Much sympathy will be felt for Mr and Mrs A. Bullen of Hastings in the **death of their daughter Jean, aged twelve years**. The little girl was **vaccinated at the Hastings District School** about ten days ago and the inoculation was certified as having been successful. She was at school as usual on Friday last, but on Sunday afternoon complained of feeling unwell. In the evening her condition became worse and yesterday morning she was overcome by a fit of convulsions in which she remained till about 4.30 when she died. Dr. Story had previously been called in, but deceased never regained consciousness. It was stated in town tins morning that death was due to blood-poisoning setting in after vaccination, but Dr. Story states that the convulsions were brought on by a disordered stomach, and the cause of death was not in any way connected with the vaccination. Mr Bullen has expressed himself as being satisfied that the vaccinations at the school were performed skilfully and that every precaution was taken to protect the children from risks of blood poisoning. An inquest will probably be held to-morrow.

Alfred Edward Bullen b: February 1872 in Clunes, NSW the son of Melinda and William Bullen, In 1895 he married Elizabeth Lamberton b: June 1872 in Kilmarnock, Ayrshire, the daughter of Elizabeth and Joseph Lamberton a farmer Maraekakaho Rd Mahora sth 1911. They resided in Wellington before settling in Hastings. They had eight children - 1896 Elizabeth Bullen, 1898 Alfred William Bullen, 1900 Melinda Elfrida Bullen, 1902 Jeannette (Jean) Katrina Bullen at Wellington, she died as a child July 1913 in Hastings as a result of a dirty vaccination needle, 1904 Bernice Isabel Bullen, 1906 Enid Hannah Bullen, 1909 Allan Richard Bullen and September 1914 Joseph George Bullen at Hastings he married Eileen Ellen Moloney. Alfred Edward Bullen died March 1928 in Hastings aged 56 and Elizabeth Bullen nee Lamberton died Hastings September 1938 aged 66.

1913 July, Douglas Purcell Watt b:1877 in Wanganui the son of Jessie and Andrew Watt aged 36 the well known crosscountry jockey committed suicide at Hastings on Saturday night by shooting himself with a rifle at a whare in which he resided by himself in Lascelles St. Watt was in town on Saturday evening about 8pm in the company of Mr Robert Crerar with who he had a drink before leaving for home. Deceased was in habit of visiting the residence of Mr Harry Hitchcock baker of Omahu Rd every morning for a cup of tea and as he did not put in an appearance Mr George Tucker baker's carter an employee of Mr Hitchcock's went to deceased whare where he found Watt's body lying on a bunk. Life was extinct and a double barrelled gun was lying between the dead man's legs pointing towards his head. A neck tie was fastened to the trigger and the other end attached to deceased's right foot, the muzzle of the gun placed in the mouth. The police were with and an examination of the body was made by Dr. Story. Before leaving for home on Saturday night, Watt asked his friend Crerar who is an employee of Mr Hitchcock's if there was anyone at home, because he wanted to get a gun which he had lent to Hitchcock as he intended going shooting on Sunday. Crerar told Watt that there was no one at home and that the lace was locked up. Watt was perfectly sober and seemed quite rational. Shortly after Crerar saw Tucker and told him that Watt appeared queer in his manner and he (Tucker) had better conceal the gun for which Watt had been enquiring. At about 10pm Tucker returned to Hitchcock's bakery and went to Crerar's room to get the gun. The firearm however was then missing and Watt had apparently gained entrance by a window and taken it with him. A box of cartridges was found on a table in the whare one cartridge having been removed. Mrs Violet Saunders lived opposite deceased's whare heard the report of a gun between 9 and 10 pm on Saturday night. Deceased left a note on his dressing table which read - If anyone thinks or says I am a cur for doing this he is a liar, because I have not had a drink but will have one in a few minutes. Watt was unmarried and about 36 years of age. Up to a few years ago he was one of New Zealand's most successful riders over country, amongst many others he piloted the well known Moifaa in all victories. Lately he had been engaged in horse training. He was regarded as scrupulously honest and straightforward and was very popular with a large section of the community. Deceased's mother Jessie Main Watt nee Lidddell and two brothers reside in Hastings. James Wilkie Liddell Watt, brother of deceased.


Robert Crerer b: May 1863 in Scotland, the son of Catherine and Alexander Crerer. He died September 1927 in Napier aged 64. He was brother to Mrs Catherine Stewart Mackay nee Crerar of York Rd in 1916 and 1928 Mahora South Hastings.



Alexander Morris Robertson b: April 1875, the son of Ellen and Andrew Robertson. In 1902 he married Ellen (Nellie) Baird b: March 1875 in Lancashire the daughter of Mary and George Baird. They had 7 children – 1903 Jessie McNicol Robertson, September 1905 Ellen Phillis Robertson she married Jack Heulan Spence in 1931, 1907 Morris Baird Robertson, 1909 William Ian Robertson, 1911 George Alexander Robertson, 1914 Andrew Douglas Robertson and 1917 Gordon Morris Robertson. Mr A. M. Robertson an orchardist of 'Bute Orchard' Pakowhai Rd near the boundary was the Mahora President of the HB Fruitgrowers Association. In April 1919 during the Spanish Influenza epidemic some schools were closed down, he used his orchard spray unit drawn by horse to fumigate the Mahora School with a solution of formalin and then it was thoroughly cleaned out before reopening. He also donated a number of cases of pears for consumption by the school children. Alexander Morris Robertson died May 1958 in Hastings aged 83 and Ellen Robertson nee Baird died March 1969 in Hastings aged 94.

Hastings West School -

1913 August, The plans for the **new school to be erected at Mahora South** in **Hastings West** provide for an up-to-date brick building of four class rooms, each 22ft by 33ft, a storeroom, headmaster's room, lady teachers room and a porch at the rear for the infants, the front elevation, which will face Gordon Rd, having a total length of 110 feet. The site of the proposed school, 4½ acres in extent, has also a frontage to Oliphant Rd and there will be entrances from both streets. The grant made for the erection of the school was £2600 and the site cost £1060. A sum of £100 (of which £10 is still outstanding) was collected by Mr G. F. Roach from among the settlers interested and the balance was found by the Department of Education. The list of private subscriptions received will be published as soon as all promises have been redeemed. Tenders for the new building are returnable about the middle of this month, and the work is to be completed for opening at the end of the midsummer holidays. Later named **Raureka School.**



Hastings Mahora South school was built of brick on 4½ acres between Gordon Rd and Oliphant Rd

George Kennedy Sinclair a teacher b:1863. In 1890 in Westland, West Coast he married Jane Gertrude Bertha Hirter b: 1867 in West Coast, the daughter of Bertha and Rudolph Hirter. They had two children – 1891 Bertha Marion Sinclair and 1898 Edna Gertrude Sinclair. The family arrived in Clive 1911 and to Hastings in 1914 and resided at 400 Southampton St west. They moved up to Hamilton in October 1922. George Kennedy Sinclair died June 1942 in Hamilton, Waikato aged 79 and Jane Gertrude Bertha Sinclair nee Hirter died in 1952 aged 85.

In April 1914, Mahora South School. The following is the report to be presented to the annual meeting of householders in the Mahora South School district this evening: Your committee which was elected on January 12th consisted of Messrs. M. Lascelles (chairman), Hay, Chappell, Purvis, Baird, Warren, and R. Wellwood (secretary). Owing to the school buildings not being completed at the beginning of the year, a good deal of business had to be done before the school was under way. Great credit is due to Mr Roach not only for his exertions in getting the school built but also in raising £100 towards purchasing the school site. Four meetings have been held in **Stortford Lodge Hall**, and the thanks of the committee are hereby tendered to **Mr Lascelles for the use of this building.** At our first meeting **Mr G. K. Sinclair** who

was recommended by the Education Board was unanimously appointed headmaster. The headmaster pointed out the necessity of beginning the school year at once, and a marquee was erected on the school grounds; 170 pupils were admitted during the first week. Tins necessitated a further increase in the staff which now consists of five teachers. At the end of three months the roll number had reached 207. After your inspection of the school buildings to-day, it is unnecessary to dilate further on their substantial nature and their up-to-date appointments. There is seating accommodation for nearly 300 pupils, and your committee expect this number to be reached by the end of the next school year, more especially as the adjoining schools are already overcrowded. It is to be honed that the incoming committee will see that the grounds are properly laid out in gardens, orchard, shrubbery and playing grounds.

1913 August, Golden Wedding, Roach — O'Connell. An event in which considerable local interest was manifested took place at Hastings today when two old and very highly esteemed residents in the person of Mr and Mrs G. H. Roach, celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of their wedding. Mr and Mrs Roach were married at St. Paul's Church. Dunedin by the Rev. R. G. Edwards on August 1863 and came to reside in Hastings about thirty years ago. Mr Roach purchased and established the drapery business which he successfully carried on till recent years, when the management was taken over by his sons under the style of Roach' Bros. The family consists of four sons - Messrs George Frederick Roach, Frank Hamilton Roach, Victor Reginald Roach of Hastings and Mr Ernest Oswald Roach of Tikokino and three daughters - Mrs B. L. Knight of Raurimu. Mrs E. V. Hudson and Miss Roach of Hastings, in addition to whom there are thirty grandchildren. At the residence of Mr and Mrs Roach in Southland Rd to-day there was a large gathering or relatives and friends and the jubilarians received many tangible tokens of esteem with hearty congratulations and sincere wishes for many more years of health and happiness. George was a keen member at the Hastings Bowling Club.

1913 August, Elizabeth Symons nee Kitt died at Hastings aged 68, the wife of John Sowden Symons and daughter of Henry and Susanna Kitt. 1913 John Sowden Symons married Sarah Ann Symons. John Sowden Symons died March 1928 in Hastings aged 85 and Sarah Ann Symons died 1929 aged 79.

1913 August, The till in the shop of Messrs **Boyd and Hitchcock**, bakers, at the corner of Heretaunga St, and Grays Rd Hastings, was rifled and the sum of £2 stolen. A man who presumably was the thief, was seen, leaving the premises, but the money was not missed until sometime later.

1913 August, Tenders – Heretaunga Co-Operative Dairy company Ltd – For printing, carting and supply of butter boxes F. C. Hartshorn, Station St.

1913 August, Tenders - For the erection of residence at Mahora, Mr A. Garnett architect, Queen St.

1913 August, Tenders - For the erection of residence in Duke St, Grant and Ball architects Hastings

1913, Stanley Bros have secured the contract for Henry Williams and Sons a fine building to be erected next to Gallagher and Co in Heretaunga St west.

1913 August, Hastings Fire - The inquiry into the circumstance connected with the fire which occurred in a four-roomed cottage in Treacle Lane Hastings. Detective Butler conducted the proceedings on behalf of the police, and Mr D. Scanne appeared on behalf of Patrick MacNamara by whom the house was tenanted. The court was crowded when the hearing commenced. Nellie Wells, wife of Charles Wells deposed that since July 22nd last she occupied the two front rooms of a house in Treacle Lane also having the use of the kitchen. The house was rented by a Mr P. MacNamara. Witness' mother also lived in the house and for a week prior to August 7th, Jessie Pilcher also lived there. On Saturday August 9th all left the house, witness going first, about 3 p.m. Before she left a Mr Stead carted some luggage away, two boxes, one tin and one wooden, a hamper, sewing machine. The machine belonged to witness and was going to be repaired by the Singer Sewing Machine Company. Mr Stead was to have taken it to the Singer Co. shop. It has not been examined before it was taken away. It would not work. She was quite sure about that and if the superintendent of the company swore it was in perfect order, he was wrong, unless it had been repaired wince it left the house. The wooden box belonged to Mrs Pilcher (witness' mother) If Mrs Pilcher said it was not hers, she was wrong. Could not say who owned the contents, some may have belonged to her and some to her mother. The tin box. belonged to witness' mother and the dress basket also. After leaving the house on Saturday August 9th witness went to Napier, taking a change of clothes. Went by the 3 o'clock train. Stayed at the Shakespeare boarding-house on Saturday night. On Sunday and Monday she stayed at McGrath's boarding-house. When she left the house in Treacle lane. Jessie Pilcher. Mrs Pilcher and MacNamara were at home. Jessie and her mother also went to Napier on Saturday night and stayed at the Royal Hotel.

MacNamara also went to town that night. Witness saw him. Thought he stayed at the Shakespeare boarding-house, but did not see him.

1913 September, Alleged Arson. The hearing was concluded at the court to-day before Mr S. E. McCarthy, S.M., of a case in which **Patrick MacNamara** was charged and remand (1) with committing arson by setting fire to a dwelling-house situated in **Treacle Lane**, Hastings, on August 11; and (2) with making a false declaration relating to certain goods, the, property of himself and insured in the New Zealand State Fire Insurance Office for £100, and partly damaged by fire, by declaring (a) that there was no other insurance on or extending to the property or any part of it at the time of the fire; (b) that certain furniture and personal effects set out in the schedule .were destroyed and damaged by fire; (c) that the value of the goods destroyed and damaged was £143 .12s, immediately before the fire, knowing, the same to be false, in conjunction with **Nellie Wells MacNarmara** was also charged with, on or about August 5, at Hastings, conspiring to defraud the Guardian Insurance Company in effecting an insurance against loss by fire in respect of certain household goods, furniture, personal effects and other goods, alleged to be the property of Nellie Wells. Twenty-one witnesses were called for the prosecution. The charge of conspiring was dismissed. On the other charges MacNarmara was committed for trial at the Supreme Court, Napier. Bail was allowed. In 1913, Patrick MacNamara aged 50 years at Hastings is alleged to have attempted to commit suicide this afternoon by drinking poison. He now lies in a private hospital, but his condition is not serious. On Saturday MacNamara was committed for trial on charges of arson and making a false declaration in connection with goods destroyed in a recent fire.

1913 September, A contract has been let to Messrs. Duncan and Abbott, of Hastings, for the erection of buildings for the recently-formed Commercial and Farmers' Club. The club's rooms will he an extension of the building which is at present being erected for **Mr E. Newbigin adjoining Thomas Henry Stewart's blacksmith's shop in Market St**, with the use of the second storey of that building also. The contract price is between £l300 and £1400, and the work is to be completed by December 10th. Mr. J. J. Morley is the architect.

1913 September, Jean Bell Neilson was born in Hastings the daughter of Agnes Maggie Mounice and John Lawerence Neilson. She married Kenneth Benniwith Foster in January 1939 in Christchurch. **John Lawerence Neilson** b: July 1884 in Montrose Angus, the son of Margaret, and Lawrence Neilson. In December 1903 in NZ he married Agnes Maggie Mounice Carnegy b: July 1882 in NZ the daughter of Jessie and James Carnegy. They had four children and soon returned to Christchurch. Agnes Maggie Mounice Neilson nee Carnegy died July 1961 in Christchurch aged 78 and John Lawerence Neilson died October 1964 in Christchurch aged 80.

1913 September, Alan Elliot Winchcomb was born at Hastings – poss the son of Margaret Isabella and Walter Clifford Winchcomb. **Walter Clifford Winchcomb** b: January 1887 in NZ the son of Margaret and Walter Winchcomb, in 1910 he married Margaret Isabella Elliot, in 1916 Wltr Clifford Winchcomb at Hastings, they settled in Wellington.

1913 September, Clement Devenport was born at Hastings the son of Alice Jane and Herbert William Devenport. Herbert William Devenport b: June 1883 in Masterton the son of Jane and George Devenport in April 1909 he married Alice Jane Lyttle b: February 1893 at Waimarama the daughter of Emily and Thomas Lyttle. They had five children. In 1905 Herbert William Devenport a ploughman at Hatuma. Herbert William Devenport died January 1943 in Featherston aged 59 and Alice Jane Devenport nee Lyttle died January 1987 in Christchurch aged 93.

1913 September, Eric Thomas Chamberlain was born a Hastings the son of Robert Arthur Chamberlain. **Robert Arthur Chamberlain** b:1872 in Nelson the son of Elizabeth and Thomas Chamberlain, in December 1912 in Ashburton he married Daisy Thomas b: November 1891 in Ashburton. They had two children – January 1917 Maurice Austin Chamberlain at Wellington. In 1917 WW1 Reserves Robert Arthur Chamberlain 2nd Division a dairy farmer at Longburn. Robert Arthur Chamberlain died April 1957 in Wanganui aged 85 and Daisy Chamberlain nee Thomas died April 1969 in Wanganui aged 77.

1913 September, Maxwell Bernard Wylie was born at Hastings the son of Myrtle Mary and Arthur Edward Anthony Mills. Arthur Edward Anthony Mills b: 1895 in Onehunga Auckland the son of Margaret and Augustus Mills, in 1919 he married Myrtle Mary Wylie b: January 1895 in Wellington. They had two children - October 1920 Arthur David Mills he married Maureen Freda Smith in 1942. Myrtle Mary Mills nee Wylie died November 1947 aged 52, Arthur Edward Anthony Mills then married Elizabeth Burmester in 1951.

1913 September, Gwendoline Ethel Waffin / Wiffin was born at Hastings? poss the twin daughter of Ellen Grace and Harry Edward Cason Wiffin of Napier. **Edward Cason Wiffin** b: October 1882 in Wellington the son of Sarah and Arthur Wiffin, in 1910 he married Ellen Grace Lynam b: April 1888 in Napier the daughter of Martha and Robert Lynam. They had two children - 1913 Thelma Grace Wiffin she married James Cecil Burrell in 1935 and June 1917 Stanley Horace Edward Wiffin. Edward Cason Wiffin a buttermaker died October 1944 in Wellington aged 62 and Ellen Grace Wiffin nee Lynam died October 1949 in Wellington aged 61.

1913 September, Marie Theresa Buck was born at Hastings the daughter of Harriet Matilda and Martin Vaughan Buck, she died in the February 1931 Quake at Hastings age of 21.

Southland Rd for the Hastings cemetery. **John Currie** b: May 1838 in Dunbartonshire, the son of Margaret and John Curry. In January 1862 he married Mary Hartley b:January 1840, the daughter of Ann and John Hartley. They had three children - 1863 Margaret Currie was born in Otago, August 1866 Martha Ann Curry she married William Hart in August 1884 and July 1868 John Thomas Currie he married Elizabeth Collict in 1903. Mary Curry nee Hartley died in Hastings October 1920 aged 80.

1913 September, Emma Leyland nee Hughes b:1829 Cheswardine, Shropshire Eng the daughter of Ann and William Hughes died at Clive aged 84 in December 1855 in Scarborough, Yorkshire she married Edward Leyland b: February 1829 in Halifax Yorkshire, Eng the son of Susanna and Francis Leyland. Children - John Edward Leyland; Wilfred Godwin Leyland. Edward Leyland died August 1891 aged 62.

1913 September, Marriage, Crawford – Boyle - At 'Panoni' Lyndon Rd Hastings by the Rev. P. C. Ramsay, Thomas Muirhead third son of Robert Muirhead Crawford of Wellington to Kathleen Hannah youngest daughter of Mrs J. Boyle "Panoni" and the late James Boyle of 'Oatlands' Havelock North. Thomas Muirhead Crawford b: July 1883 in Hokitika West Coast, the son of Susan and Robert Crawford married Kathleen Hannah Boyle b: October 1887 in Hastings the daughter of Elizabeth Ann and James Boyle. They had two children - April 1915 Margaret Muirhead Crawford. Kathleen Hannah Crawford nee Boyle died in 1962 in Havelock North aged 75 and Thomas Muirhead Crawford died in 1973 in Hawke's Bay aged 90.

1913 October, The Hastings Borough Council the Parks Committee recommended that a pavilion be erected on the tennis courts at Cornwall Park, provided the Park Tennis Club contributed £80 towards the cost, the building to have a shelter and two dressing rooms with a lavatory and washbasin on each side, veranda along the whole front, partitions to be of etermite and the roof of Marseilles tiles; the necessary water and sewer to be provided. Cr. Styles stated that the estimated cost of the pavilion was about £240. The committee considered that the council should erect a decent building while they were at it and the proposed pavilion could be turned into a cottage if such a step was considered desirable at any future date. He moved that the recommendation be adopted. Cr. King seconded the motion pro forma, but asked if the Park Tennis Club were to have the exclusive use of the pavilion. If that were the case, then the other sports clubs by nettled for roads and footpaths. The Mayor said the pavilion would be the property of the council and it could make its own conditions with reference to its use. Cr. McKibbin said he had previously supported the proposal because he understood that the cost was to be £100, half of which was to be borne by the club. The other sports clubs should also be considered. Cr. Donovan said he considered the ratepayers would not approve of the expenditure, and he moved that the matter be deferred. Cr. Wade strongly supported the committee's recommendation. A building costing £100 would be a disgrace to the park. Cr. McCormick opposed the motion, and said much as he would like to see the building erected, he thought the money was more urgently needed for fads and footpaths. Cr. Wade said he felt sure the hockey and other clubs would join with the tennis club in assisting toward the cost, so that they might use the building in their season. Cr. McKibbin and Cr. Blake supported the motion, Cr. King asked the Mayor what I was the amount of the council's overdraft. The Mayor said it was £15,000, plus the new loan of £10,000 at 3% per cent. CV. Donovan said he in the face of the Mayor's reply, was going to record his vote against the proposal. In reply to a question, the Mayor said it was to be understood that the tennis club were to have the use of the pavilion during their season, and the hockey clubs in their season. Cr. Blake thought the building should be erected. Cr. King suggested that the matter should be deferred to allow the other sports bodies an opportunity of making an offer to help to defray the cost. In replying, Cr. Styles commended the generous offer of the Park Club to provide £80 towards the expenditure. After further discussion the recommendation that the pavilion be erected was adopted.

1913 October, Hazel Frances Munro Fyfe was born at Hastings the daughter of Catherine Lily and Thomas Munro Fyfe **Thomas Munro Fyfe** b: July 1889 in Dundee Angus, Scot the son of Jemima and James Fyfe in 1913 he married Catherine Lily Watts b: April 1892 in Hawke's Bay the daughter of Mary Eliza and Charles William Watts. They had three children – October 1912 Jean Bryden in Wellington and March1916 Jean Isabel Fyfe at Hastings, she married Ernest Leslie Dobson in 1939. In 1914 Thomas Munro Fyfe a pastry cook 106 Queen St east, 1917 WW1 Reserves Thomas Munro Fyfe a cook of Makaraka 2nd Division, 1938 a pastry cook of 810 Nelson Rd, 1946 a pastry cook of 205 Lascelles St and 1954 a pastry cook of 209 Avenue Rd west. Catherine Lily Fyfe nee Watts died June 1971 in Hastings aged 79 and Thomas Munro Fyfe died February 1973 in Hawke's Bay aged 83.

They had six children at Hastings - February 1914 Frank Kenny Holmes, April 1915 in Maud Arabella Holmes, April 1915 Henry Reuben (Harry) Holmes, September 1916 Kenneth Randall Holmes, May 1918 Betsy Beris Holmes and December 1920 Ance Beryl Holmes. In 1917 WW1 Resrves Frank Holmes a courier Queen St Hastings 2nd Division. Frank Holmes died October 1940 in Hastings aged 57 and Arabella Holmes nee Scott of 704 Queen St east Hastings died February 1972 in Hastings aged 92.

1913 October, Gordon Beattie was born in Hastings, the son of Beatrice and James Beattie, he married Kathleen Myra Hansen in February 1938.

Children born Hastings - 1916, Laurence Beattie, he died October 1929 aged 13, 1917 November Stuart Beattie. 1911 James Beattie a ploughman. 1913 October, **Mrs Annie Webb** died as the result of injuries sustained through being thrown from a spring trap on the corner of Heretaunga St west and Nelson St, when approaching the intersection her horse took fright at a traction engine


which was standing opposite Eli Ralph Dodge's coach factory in Nelson St and bolted in the direction of Nelson St north. In negotiating the corner, the near wheel struck a telegraph pole, capsizing the vehicle and precipitating Mrs Webb on to the road. Richard Webb, storekeeper Mahora and husband of the deceased, stated that his wife left home about 9 a.m. on the 8th instant to drive one of her daughters to school. The horse was usually quiet, but sometimes a little fresh. He next saw his wife at Dr. Macdonnell's surgery. Mr J. E. McIvor stated he was proceeding along Nelson St in the direction of Heretaunga St and passed a traction engine which was standing near Clarkson's store, about thirty yards from the corner. Saw the deceased driving along Heretaunga St in the direction of Stortford Lodge. He looked behind and then heard a crash, and on looking round saw the trap on its side and the deceased lying on the road. The trap struck an electric light pole on the corner. He considered these poles made every corner in Hastings a death trap. He assisted to carry deceased into Dr. Macdonnell's surgery. William Edward Farrington, railway porter, stated he was riding in the direction of Havelock when the accident occurred. A traction engine was standing near the opposite corner to where the accident occurred. Anyone driving from Hastings would have a full view of the traction engine after passing the Princess Theatre. Mrs Annie Webb had been a resident of this district for many years and was highly respected by a wide circle of friends. She was about fifty four years of age and leaves a widower and two daughters aged 19 and 17 years respectively, for whom much sympathy will be felt. The remains of the late Mrs Annie Webb of Mahora were interred at the Hastings cemetery yesterday afternoon. The cortege comprised some twenty-six vehicles and the large attendance at the graveside bore testimony to the high esteem in which she was held. Rev. J. B. Brocklehurst.

1913 October, At the Hastings Court - Mr S. E. McCarthy, S.M., Hone Te Whakapai was charged (1) with, driving a motor car at a speed dangerous to the public in Heretaunga St on June 26th and (2) with failing to keep to this correct side of the street when passing a vehicle driven by W. A. Alexander. On 26th of June last a collision occurred at the western end of Heretaunga St between a motor car driven by a native and a vehicle occupied by Mr and Mrs W. Alexander of Tomoana. As the outcome of the accident. Hone Te Whakapai was charged with driving a motor car at a dangerous speed in Heretaunga St on 26th June and (2) with failing to keep to the left side when passing a trap driven by William Alexander. Defendant was represented by Mr D. Scannell and pleaded not guilty. Margaret Alexander, wife of W. A. Alexander, gave evidence that at about 5.30 on the evening of 26th June last, she left Neagle's stables in a gig accompanied by her husband, who was driving. They proceeded in the direction of Stortford Lodge, and when near Quarry Rd saw a motor car approaching at a fast pace. It was travelling so fast that it seemed to be upon them before they knew where they were. The car had lights and was in the middle of the road. The gig was on the left side and was struck on the off wheel which was knocked off. Both witness and her husband were thrown out. To Mr Scannell: Before going to Neagle's stables, witness and Mr Alexander had been in town. Mr Alexander arrived about 2 p.m. and witness at 3.30 p.m. The Park races were on that day and there was a good deal of traffic on the road where the accident happened. Most of it was coming towards Hastings. Mr Alexander was driving a high-stepping horse. He usually occupied about ten minutes in going from Hastings to Tomoana. At the time of the accident, the horse was travelling at an ordinary pace. They had just previously pulled up to pass a trap without lights and had not "got going" properly again. They had to avoid the trap on its wrong side. Robert Griffiths, farmer Twyford stated that after the collision the horse was drawn round to the right. Only Alexander's trap and the motor car were in that part of the road. After the collision, the car was swung round the corner into Quarry Rd. Sergeant Hogan, Constable McLean deposes as follows: "I spoke to defendant. I could not get an intelligible statement from him. He was under the influence of liquor, but not drunk enough to lock up." Three and a half miles before he had, without warning, overtaken another vehicle on the Pakowhai Rd at a speed of forty miles, Moreover the evidence of Robertson who' deposed to the Pakowhai Rd incident is that defendant was sitting well under the wheel lying well back whilst defendant's passenger, who by the way was not called, had his feet on top of the glass wind frame. This evidence indicates two young Maori bloods running their motor full steam ahead regardless of the consequences, the while placidly enjoying the swift motion. Hone Te Whakapai was fined with costs.

Smith Bros carriers stables partnership of Lambert Daniel Smith and Thomas Henry Stewart situated on Queen St west between King St and Market St opposite HB Farmers' implement works for a few years.

Lambert Daniel Smith b: May 1880 in NZ the son of Mary and Frederick Smith. In 1915 he married Mrs Esther Nelson nee Maxwell b: March 1883 in Prebbleton, Canterbury, the daughter of Barbara and James Maxwell. Esther had seven young children and they had two daughters - April 1916 Margaret Louisa Smith and November 1924 Catherine Rose Smith. Lambert Daniel Smith died August 1949 in Hastings aged 69 and Esther Nelson nee Maxwell died June 1927 in Hastings aged 44.

1913 November, New building - Smith Bros and Co. carriers. Further indication of the development of Hastings is a commercial centre and the prospects of the future which lies in it from a business point of view is furnished by the large number of commodious premises which have recently been erected in various parts of the town. Conspicuous among these is the fine building which is just nearing completion for Messrs Smith and Co., carriers and forwarding agents. This firm was established some three years ago, and their business has shown a rapid growth that brandies have been opened at Napier and Havelock and demanded more up-to-date premises at headquarters at Hastings. The new building, which is situated opposite the Hawke's Bay Farmers' Association's foundry in Queen St, has a frontage of 66ft and a depth of 105ft. Immediately inside the main entrance a stage, 15ft by 27ft is provided for the landing of goods the remainder of the ground space being available for storage. On either side of the main building there are twelve horse stalls which are convertible into loose-boxes, on the roof of which additional storage room can be added when the business demands it. The office and men's sleeping compartments are partitioned off on the right hand side of the main building, and on the opposite corner, there is an up-to-date blacksmith's shop which is to be occupied by Mr T. H. Crawford. The front surface is finished in rough cast and the building which is lit with electricity throughout besides being one of the best equipped in the district, is an acquisition to the architectural appearance of the block. Messrs Smith Bros and Co are to be complimented on their enterprise and with the better facilities now at their disposal, the reputation which they have gained in the past for promptness and reliability will be fully sustained. Messrs Smith and Co were livery and stable keepers in Railway St (Station St nth) June 1890 and started operations as well-sinkers in June 1898.

1913 November, A runaway which created something in the nature of a sensation occurred at Hastings at about 9.30 this morning. During the absence of the driver, a team of three horses attached to a lorry owned by Messrs **Smith Bros. carriers,** bolted from opposite McKenzie's fruit shop near the Council Chambers, and turned into Queen St via Hastings St. The horses steered a safe course till they reached a point near McCormick's stables, where, in attempting to

cross the kerbing on to the footpath, the near side animal stumbled on its nose, receiving severe injuries to its head and a gash about ten inches long and six inches deep in the near hindquarter from which blood flowed copiously. The unfortunate beast was held to the ground by the weight of the lorry and after being released, it made an attempt to retrain its feet, but staggered and fell again to the ground. It was apparent that he animal was injured beyond recovery and it only remained for a friendly bullet to end its sufferings. The other horses in the team were uninjured. A gig containing a woman and child which was being driven in Karamu Rd narrowly missed colliding with the runaway at the Queen St intersection.

1913 November, William Creed Harrison of 'Manga Tapiri' in Otane b: January 1884 in Shifnal Shropshire the son of Rebekah and John Harrison married Jean Dalziel Bell b: November 1891 in Blenheim, Marlborough, the second daughter of Alice and James Bell of Twyford Hastings. They had three children at Hastings - September 1914 James Arnold Harrison he married Margaret Fanny Pattison in 1940, October 1915 Joan Harrison she married Hugh Tempello Grigg in October 1940 and May 1921 in John Richard Harrison. In 1914 Jean and William Creed Harrison a sheepfarmer resided at 'Twyford House in 1928 at 1928 at 'Turamore' and at 'Stoneycroft' Omahu Rd from 1935 -1938, he apparently





1913 December, A collision in which two motor cars and a man on horseback occurred in Railway Rd Hastings on Saturday night. One of the Hastings Motor Transport Company's cars was returning from Paki Paki when it met a native named George Price riding a horse and keeping to the centre of the road. Simultaneously the horse and car were pulled off to the side of the road nearest the railway line, with the result that they collided. The horse was carried off its feet in the front of the motor smashing the mudguard and the wind-screen and damaging the radiator and bonnet. The horse was badly cut and the native sustained a gash on the head. He however, declined medical assistance and rode off to Paki Paki. It happened that one of Messrs Graham and Gebbie's cars was travelling along immediately behind the other car and followed in to the right hand side of the road. When the Transport Cos car struck the horse, the other car a Sunbeam, cannoned into it and received a severe knocking about. Both mudguards were stripped on one side and one of the front wheels was buckled. Neither of the drivers were hurt.



1913 December, **Francis William Fergusson** b: January 1891 in Hastings the son of Rosannah and James Robert Fergusson married Ada Florence Morgan b: January 1889 in Hastings the daughter of Ada and Charles Morgan. They had five children. Ada Florence (Poppy) Morgan died May 1955 in Havelock North aged 66 and Francis William Fergusson died June 1973 in Havelock North aged 82.

1913 December, A man named Josh O'Connor, employed at the Hon. J. D. Ormond s Karamu station, was kicked on the head by a horse at Messrs Graham and Gebbie's stables Hastings on Saturday night, and sustained two deep wounds about three inches long. He was attended by Dr. Wilson who ordered his removal to the Napier Hospital. This morning O'Connor was reported to much better. O'Connor fell out the horse's heels, causing it to !ash out violently and had it not been for the prompt action of Mr Charles Golding he would probably have been kicked to death.

1914 January, Mr Frank Kelly, solicitor, of Wellington, son of Mr John Kelly formerly of Hastings, was in Hastings to-day.



In March 1946 A fire destroyed McLeod and Gardiner's sawmill on the Napier-Taupo Rd seven miles north of the Tarawera Hotel. The outbreak occurred in the roof. 20 – 30 men employed at the mill. Mr C. Gardiner managing director of the company said a logging truck parked close by was also damaged. The mill being 73 miles from Hastings the distance being too great for carting logs then.

D. J. McLeod, the son of an Onga Onga sheepfarmer and Charles Gardiner who emigrated from Hull in 1884 purchased another business in 1913 after it went into voluntary liquidation. Later Mr D. J. McLeod operated a Timber yard on the corner of Avenue Rd west and King St nth.

Joseph Daniel Rivers snr b: January 1831 in Battersea, Surrey, the son of Hannah and William Rivers. In November 1851 he married Eleanor (Ellen) Wassell. They had eight children. Eleanor (Ellen) Rivers nee Wassell died June 1908 aged 76 and Joseph Daniel Rivers snr moved to Hastings where he died February 1914 aged 83.

1914 February, Death, Gallien. At his residence Omahu Rd, Hastings, Henry Louis, the beloved husband of Catherine Pauline Gallien, aged 79 years. The funeral will leave his late residence for the Hastings Cemetery on Friday at 3 p.m. By request - No Flowers. Mr Henry Louis Gallien, an old and popular Hastings pioneer, passed away last evening at his residence in Omahu Rd. Mr Gallien, who had exceeded the allotted "three score years and ten" by nearly ten years, he had been failing for some little time, and a week or so ago suffered a paralytic stroke, under which he gradually sank and passed away at eleven o'clock last evening. Mr Gallien, who was born in Germany, served his time in the building trade in London and on the completion of his apprenticeship, and when only 18 years of age, he came to New Zealand. This was in the early fifties. He first went to the Wellington, Nelson and Wairarapa districts, and came to Hastings about 40 years ago, 1874 when the town was a scattered hamlet, then consisted of some half dozen houses and it was Mr Gallien who carried out the work of erecting many of the homesteads and residences of the district. Several of these buildings still stand as monuments to the excellence of the workmanship. He was married nearly fifty years ago and leaves his widow and a large family to mourn their loss. Among the sons still living are Messrs. Roy of Hastings, Arthur and Otto of Te Pohue. Ronald of Wellington. Norman of Otane and Louis of Winton. There are two married daughters. Mrs Harfitt at present visiting South America and Mrs Withcrow of Otane. Another daughter, Miss Gertrude Gallien is at present studying in England. Mr Gallien's demise will be greatly regretted among the many old residents of Hastings, and general sympathy is extended to Mrs Gallien and other members of the family. Catherine Pauline Gallien died November 1924 at Hastings aged 75. Four daughters - Mrs Owen and Mrs T. Witherow of Auckland, Mrs Eddy of North Auckland and Mrs W. A. Whitlock of Christchurch as well as six sons – Mr Lewis Gallien of Dunedin, Messrs Norman, Arthur and Roy Gallien of Hastings and Russell Gallien of Egypt and Otto Gallien of Te Pohue.

1914 March, The **pavilion being erected at the tennis courts on Cornwall Park**, is now almost completed. The building, which consists - ladies and men's dressing rooms, shelter shed, with conveniences at the rear, is built of timber with eternt lining and finished in rough caste. The contract price was £248 towards which the **Park Tennis Club**, contributed £80, the balance of the cost being borne by the Borough Council. The new pavilion on the tennis courts at Cornwall Park will be officially opened by the Mayor (Mr W. Hart) tomorrow afternoon.



Mr Hurley has spent 40 years in the service of the bank having joined at Whanganui in 1871. He has also been stationed at Dunedin, Nelson, Christchurch and Wellington and spent ten years in the inspector's office as auditor. Mr Hurley will continue to reside in Hastings at his well known property 'Dynevor' residence in Grove Rd.

1914 March, Gladys Mabel Symes was born in Hastings, the daughter of Edith Rachel and Solomon Richards Symes.





The principal streets of Hastings were laid over with Union bitumen asphalt from 1915 and the maintenance cost has since been negligible.

Post note - In April 1947 it was required to fill about 30 yards of cavity that formed in Heretaunga St under the thick road crust foundation the cavity caused by a leaking sewer (poss a crack caused in the 1931 quake) The road foundation laid down around 1914 – 1915 between Hastings St and Nelson St, and in Station St nth (Russel St) was so well made that no further attention had been necessary. A solid thick crust was formed using limestone spalls 10 – 12 inches in diameter laid down first and smaller spalls on top. This thick layer was then covered by a mixture of tar and bitumen – the mixing of which was all done in the borough yard and transported to the site.

CRIFFITHS AND COFFEY,

1914, Messrs. **Griffiths & Coffey** have opened a new boot establishment The Footfit Shop in Heretaunga St (between Banks of N.Z. and N.S.W) Hastings, where they are introducing that famous brand of Boots and Shoes, Charles Griffiths and Isaac Coffey.

Charles Griffiths b: 1880 in Wales, he arrived at Wellington in May 1909 on the *Athentic*, accompanied by his wife Bessie b: 1882 and infant son Rhys Griffiths. They first settled in Westport where he opened a business as boot importer and moved to Hastings in February 1914 where he opened a business in Heretaunga St with Mr Isaac Coffey a bootmaker. Together they bought a house at 607 Hastings St in which both families lived for a short while. In 1916 Charlie bought out the Coffey's share of both the house and the store which then became Griffiths Footwear. Mrs Bessie Griffiths also worked at the shop, later it was Charles Griffith Boot Importers store. Charles Griffiths was a bowler and involved in church and in many local interests and they visited Wales around 1939. Charles Griffiths died suddenly at Hastings August 1953 aged 73 and Bessie Griffiths died December 1954.

Isaac Coffey a bootmaker married Sarah Jane Crutchley in 1910, in 1916 they sold out and moved to Wellington.

1914 April, Mr F. Wallace, about 60 years of age, was knocked down by a motor car in Heretaunga St Hastings, yesterday afternoon and broke a small bone in his leg. He was conveyed to his home in an ambulance attended by Dr. Barcroft. The car which was being driven by a native was travelling slowly at the time of the accident. Mr Wallace, who was in the art of crossing the road, walked in front of the car and hesitated.

1914 April, Hastings Fire - A fire occurred in the centre of the town Heretaunga St west at an early hour this morning resulting in a shop occupied by Mr L. G. Forster (fruiterer) and **Mr John Fells London Pie Shop** being gutted. The buildings were owned by Mr G. F. Roach and were insured for £375. Mr Forster's stock was insured for £250 and Mr Fells had no insurance.

1914 April, Frederick Charles Griffith was a plumber in Market St Hastings

Frederick Charles Griffith b: July 1871 the son of Martha and William Matthew Griffith. In 1899 in Victoria Aus he married Eleanor Maria Kenney b: April 1887 in Prahran Victoria, the daughter of Johanna and Richard Kenney. They had two children - April 1901 Leslie Richard Fredrick Griffith, December 1903 Reginald Selwyn Griffith. Frederick Charles Griffith later moved to Taranaki where he died July 1928 in New Plymouth aged 57 and Eleanor Maria Griffith nee Kenney died 1964 aged 77.

1914 April, **Peter McGregor** b: August 1884 in Dunedin, the son of Margaret and Duncan McGregor married in Hastings Glory Viola Elsie McKay. They had eight children. December 1916 Ellison Marguerite McGregor she married Ernest Goodall in 1937. Peter McGregor died June 1957 in Hastings aged 72 and Glory Viola Elsie McGregor nee McKay died December 1973 in Hastings aged 77.

1914 May, A sequel to the **recent burglaries** which took place at Hastings in February last occurred at the Hastings Court this morning, when a well dressed young man, 24 years of age, named Joseph Charles Talke, alias George Watson, was charged (1) with that on the 13th February. 1914 at Hastings, he did break and enter the dwelling house of

George Frederick Roach by night and steal 11 keys, 1 coin, about 12/- in money, of the total value of £2.2 - and (2) that on 13th February 1914, he did break and enter the shop of George Frederick Roach and steal there from about £24 15. 6 in money, the property of the said George Frederick Roach. Detective Butler conducted the prosecution. George Frederick Roach, store keeper, gave evidence that on the evening of February 12th witness and his wife went out for a walk returning about 10.20 p.m. Retired to bed about 10 minutes later, leading everything safe. Hung his clothes at the foot of his bed. There was 12/- in one pocket of his trousers and in the ether the key of the shop and two keys for Yale locks. In his coat pocket there was a bunch of keys, including the key of his strong room in his shop and two keys of safe in the strongroom. The three keys and the Ceylon coin (produced were in his pocket. Witness arose at about 7.45 the following morning and found the side door of the house was open. He subsequently missed the money from his pocket, then the keys. Went to his shop and found that the strongroom door had been opened, also the two safes which were in the strongroom. All the money, amounting to about £124 had been removed. Coppers, cheques and postal notes were left. The key of the front door was still in the lock. The shop was closed at 6 p.m. on the previous day, and the sales and strongroom were then locked as far as he knew and the front door was also locked. His clerk, Mr. Masters, was in charge of the office and strongroom. Clarence Masters, accountant in the employ of the previous witness, stated that he locked the strongroom on the evening of February 12th. Left the cash in the safe. There was £124 in notes, silver and gold. Next morning he found the strongroom open, both safes unlocked and the money gone. To the Bench: Witness did not open the safe during the night and did not take any of the money. James Sweeney, detective stationed at Palmerston North, stated that at 11.55 on the 25th April last at Palmerston North, he arrested accused on another charge. On being searched at the police station, he had a number of keys in his possession. including the three keys produced. On the 4th May at the Masterton police station accused was shown a suit case. He said it was his, also the contents. The small coin produced was in the case with a number of others. William J. Butler, detective, stationed at Hastings, stated that he interviewed accused at Napier on the 19th instant and charged him with the two offences. He admitted both and said he got into Roach's house through the side door, and most of the keys were in Masterton. He described the place where he had planted them. In reply to the second charge, he said the amount stated was wrong. It should have been £110. 7.5. He said he also took a ring out of the strongroom which was not included in the charge and which he gave away in Sydney, where he went immediately after the burglary was committed. Accused pleaded guilty to both charges and was committed to the Supreme Court at Napier for sentence. Accused was further charged with that on 12th February, 1914, at Hastings, he did break and enter the dwelling of Frederick Charles Griffiths and steal therefrom 1 revolver, 40 cartridges, 1 pencil case, and 9 in money, of the total value of £2. 1/-. William Griffiths, engineer, residing in Hastings, stated that F. C. Griffiths was his son and in February last he and his family went away for a holiday. Witness visited his son's house night and morning, but did not sleep there. He called at the house at about 5 p.m. on February 12th and left it secure, with windows and doors fastened. On the morning of February 13th he visited the house at 7.30, and found the back door ajar. In the front bedroom he found a portmanteau, which on the previous day was in his own room. His room was upset, the chest of drawers had been ransacked, and the boxes burst open. In examining the front bedroom he lifted a curtain one side from a wardrobe and a man was behind it. The accused was that man. He struck witness between the eves with his closed fist and tried to force his hand over witness' mouth. They wrestled for some time and accused eventually got away through the front door. Witness was 70 years of age and suffered from asthma. After accused bolted, witness found the portmanteau filled with clothes out of his room. The bed in the front room appeared to have been occupied during the night. Witness missed a waistcoat from his room. F. C. Griffiths, plumber, residing in Market St Hastings, stated that he left the previous witness in charge while on a holiday last February. He went away on the 9th February and returned on 11th March. He missed a revolver, a box of cartridges, a pencil case, and about 9 - in money. Detective J. Sweeney, of Palmerston North, stated that on the 4th inst., at the Masterton police station, accused was shown a suit case which he said was his property; also the contents. The pencil case produced was in the case. Detective Butler stated that he charged accused with the offence at the Napier police station on 19th May. He admitted the charge, but not that he took a vest. He said he threw the revolver in a river near Clive. Accused pleaded guilty and was committed for sentence. Accused was also charged with that on February 11th at Hastings, he did enter the dwelling of Herbert Leonard Waiters and steal therefrom 1stud box, 5 shirts, 1 tie,1 key, 2 silk handkerchiefs and 10/- in money of a total value of £2 .13. 6d. Evelena Florence Waters, wife of H. L. Waters, residing corner of Nelson St and Avenue Rd, gave evidence that during February last her husband was absent from home and she lived with her mother in Grays Rd. She visited her house daily and on the 11th February. About 7.30 p.m. everything was secure and doors and windows were still locked. On going inside she found that someone had been in. She communicated with Detective Butler, and with him made an inspection of the premises. All the rooms had been ransacked and her bed had been slept in. Five shirts, one key, a stud box. one tie, two silk hanky chiefs, a vest and a pair of trousers were missing, also 10/from a money-box which she found in the dining room. The lock of the box had been forced. She identified the articles produced as those the missed from her house. Constable J. Sweeney stated that the articles produced were amongst the content of a suit ease which accused claimed as his property. Detective Butler gave evidence that accused admitted the offence to him. Accused pleaded guilty and was committed for sentence. Accused was also charged with that on 10th February 1914, he did enter the dwelling house of Henry Otto Shattky by night, and steal therefrom 1 vase. 1 Kruger half-sovereign (mounted) 1 flask. 3 sleeve links and about 5/- in money, of the total value of £1.17s the property of the said Henry Otto Schattky. William M. Hay, builder stated that H. O. Shattky was his son-in-law and in February last went with his wife for a holiday, locking the house and leaving the key with witness. The doors were locked and windows closed on the February 12th and at 3pm on the following day witness found the doors open. Henry Otto Shattky hairdresser residing in Fitzroy Avenue. The house of Henry Robert Russell Douglas was entered and money box 2/- and £1.15s in money taken. Eva Douglas wife of H. R. R. Douglas residing in Nelson St and money box containing 35/- taken. Henry Thomson lost money Johanna Maria Thomson wife of Henry Thomson residing at the corner of Nelson St and Frederick St lost £2.10/- William Hamilton Maitland secretary for Thos Borthwick and Sons Ltd Paki Paki residing York Rd was entered money box taken and 25 cigars.

1914 May, Joseph Charles Talke, alias George Watson was also charged with that on the 5th of February 1914 at Hastings he did break and enter the dwelling house of Henry Thomson, by day and steal therefrom one money box value 2/- and about £3 15/- in money, the property of the said Henry Thomson. Johanna Maria Thomson, wife of Henry

Thomson residing at the corner of Nelson and Frederick streets, stated that she left her house at about 12.30 p.m. on 5th Februrary last to go to town, leaving her house locked and the key of the back door in a meat safe. She returned home about 5 p.m. Went to go to bed about 10 p.m. and missed the key of a drawer. The handle of the drawer was broken off. She subsequently found the key under a cloth, but not where she left it. On opening the drawer she found her purse turned upside down and papers scattered. About £2 10/- was missing from the purse. A money-box containing 25/ was also missing. The moneybox was found later in a paddock near the house. A strange pocketknife was found in the house. Detective Butler stated on oath that accused was charged with the offence at the Napier Police Station on May 9th and he confessed to committing it. In answer to the usual question, accused said he was guilty. He was committed to the Supreme Court for sentence.

1914 May, A man named **William James Patrick Bryne** aged 31 years died suddenly at his residence in Queen St, Hastings, this morning. Deceased arose at 4.30 this mowing and asked his wife for some milk. He was told where to find it and he returned to bed about half an hour later. Shortly afterwards his breathing became heavy and Dr. Storey was sent for, but Bryne died before the doctor arrived. Deceased was the subject of a prohibition order, and it is understood that since the order was taken out he had been a victim to drugs, which he used to counteract the craving for liquor. An inquest was held at the Hastings Courthouse this afternoon before Mr. S. E. McCarthy, Coroner. Sergeant Hogan represented the police. Mr B. J. Dolan was present on behalf of the next of kin. **William Francis Byrne, builder** residing in Napier, deposed that the deceased was his son and was 30 years of age. He was a married and a carpenter by occupation. Recently his health had been fair, but he had been complaining of pain in his side for some time. Last saw deceased alive on Friday morning at about 10 o'clock, he was then going to work at **Dr. Story's house** – the old Union bank moved to Willowpark Rd. He had complained about his throat and also of being unable to sleep. If he took one drink he could not stop. He started taking drugs about last New Year. Deceased had not been drinking much lately. He was the subject of a prohibition order, (Proceeding.)

1914 May, A meeting of the Hastings Cottage Hospital Association was held in the Council Chambers last evening.

May 1914, Malcolm Bethune b: 1833 of Gnirloch, Scot died at Methven St Hastings aged 81, buried Havelock North.

1914 May, Maxwell Harley Bates was born in Hastings, she married Owen George Ebbett in January 1941


1914 May, Janet Johnston died at Hastings, pur E. J. Murray

Carl Frederick Sass b: December 1881, he resided at the Ranfurly Private Hotel, Warren St Hastings. He had served his Cabinetmaker apprenticeship in Gisborne, he later moved to Hawera and died November 1945 Wellington.

1914 June, A Hastings woman gave a beggar a sixpence and said she was giving it to him for her own pleasure – the Beggar replied - Oh Madam, make it a shilling and thoroughly enjoy yourself!

1914 June, Another of the fast disappearing band of Hawke's Bay pioneers passed away yesterday in the person of Mr Robert Wall of Queen St Hastings. Deceased, who was 72 years of age, for some days prior to his death was in a state of coma, so that his end was not unexpected. The late Mr Wall was a native of Durgannan Tyrone Ireland and arrived in Auckland accompanied by his mother and six brothers in the ship Black Eagle in 1861. The following year he joined the Third Waikato Regiment and subsequently served on the Commissariat Military Train until 1866. In that year he moved to Hawke's Bay and settled down in Hastings where he was appointed works manager of Mr J. N. Williams' Frimley estate. This position he held for about thirty years, and when the estate was subdivided he engaged in dairy farming on his own account. Deceased was widely known and highly respected throughout the district and the news of his demise was received with regret by a large section of the community. He was predeceased by one son 13 years of age and leaves a widow and grown-up family of six sons namely. Mr Sam Wall, farmer of Tokomaru Mr Robert Wall farmer of Manawatu; Mr Andrew Wall, of Hastings; Mr W. J. Wall of the Native Affairs Department Auckland; Mr Edwin Wall of Hastings and Mr Leslie Wall of Wellington; and five daughters Mrs J. Scoon of Waverley; and Misses Annie, Edith, Maud and Elsie Wall of Hastings. The funeral will take place at 2.30 p.m. tomorrow. Members of the court Heretaunga. A.O.F. are requested to meet at deceased's late residence to attend the funeral. Mary Wall nee Hanney died in Hastings September 1935 aged 86.

Daughters Mrs A. Helm and Alice (Nan) Bissell wife of Dr. William Philip Johnston.

1914 June Wedding, Powdrell – Watkins – At St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, by Rev. P. Rainsay Miss Christabel Evelyn (Chrissie) youngest daughter of Mr E. A. Watkins, was married to Mr Herbert Dutton Powdrell of 'Awanui' Hastings. The bride was given away by her father and attended by Miss Ivy Thompson, two little nieces of the bride, Dorothy Powdrell and Lucy White acted as flower girls, Mr Alf. Watkins was best man. After the ceremony an adjournment was made to the Wesley Hall. A gift from the Y.M.C.A. Ladies' Physical Culture Club.

1914 June, The death occurred at her residence Heathcote Rd Raureka Hastings this morning of Mrs Jane Wall, wife of Mr James Wall. She had been suffering with an internal complaint for about a month. Deceased was 65 years of age and was highly respected. She leaves a widower, nine sons and three daughters.

1914 June, Marriage, Wall – Baker. Horace Edwin, youngest son of James Wall, Heathcote Rd, Raureka Hastings to Edna, eldest daughter of Mr Joseph Baker, Bushey Park, Herts, England.

1914 June, A sensational bolt took place along Pakowhai Rd about six o'clock last evening, when two horses attached to an express without headlights got loose somewhere in Omahu Rd and made off in the direction of Stortford Lodge. The corner opposite the hotel was negotiated safely and the runaway continued their escapade towards Pakowhai. At the approach to the first bridge the express met a cab driven by **Mr W. Kirk of Hastings**, who was returning with passengers from the Park races. The express collided with one of the hind wheels of the cab and inflicted slight damage, but no one was injured and Mr Kirk was able to bring his passengers on to their destination. A more serious collision, however,

occurred in the centre of the bridge, where the express ran into a gig occupied by a man and a woman. Both were thrown out, but fortunately escaped without injury. The gig was smashed to matchwood. Several other collisions were only avoided on the Pakowhai Rd through the presence of mind of a man on horseback, who seeing the express had no lights and knowing that there would be a lot of traffic returning from the races, galloped ahead of the bolting horses and warned drivers of approaching vehicles of the danger.

1914 June, The employees of the Hawke's Bay Farmers' Cooperative Association, Hastings, assembled and offered their congratulations to Mr **Robert McMillan** one of the staff, on the occasion of his silver wedding. On behalf of the staff Mr W. J. Warwick presented Mr. McMillan wished him and Mrs McMillan many more years of happiness and prosperity.

1914 July, Mr W. J. Warwick of the staff of the Hawke's Bay Farmers' Cooperative Association, left Hastings this morning for Christchurch, where he is to be married. He was presented by the members of the staff with two handsome chairs as a token of esteem, accompanied by their best wishes for his future happiness and prosperity.

1914 July, **William James Warwick** b: 1882 in Belfast Ireland a clerk at 507 Avenue Rd Hastings married at St. Mary's Church, Merivale Christchurch by the Rev C. H. Cosset, Mabel Bell b: 1888 youngest daughter of J. H. Bell, Ulverstone, Tasmania. They had three children – 1916 Richard David Semple Warwick he served in WW2, 1918 William Henry Warwick he married Valentine Maxwell Gunn 1941 and 1920 Joan Warwick. From 1911, William James Warwick was manager of the merchandise department of the Hastings branch of the Hawke's Bay Farmers' Co-operative Association In September 1924 William James Warwick after 14 years manager of the merchandise department of the Hastings branch of the Hawke's Bay Farmers' Co-operative Association severed his connection with the company in order to go into business for himself in Hastings where he took over Gallagher and Co's grocery establishment. Mabel Warwick nee Bell a devoted member of the congregation of St. Matthew's Church died January 1935 aged 48 she is survived by two young sons and a daughter. William James Warwick a grocer of 703 Charles St died July 1959 aged 77.

1914 July, Charles Winston Netterville Barron was born in Hastings the son of Louise and Albert Henry Darbey Barron. **Albert Henry Darbey Barron** b: January 1888 in Calcutta West Bengal, India the son of Georgina and Albert Barron, in August 1914 in Lucknow Uttar Pradesh, India he married Louise Eugenie Marie Laboreau b: July 1889 in Armancourt Oise, France. They had four children - May 1916 Harry Charles Netterville Barron. Louise Eugenie Marie Barron nee Laboreau died May 1925 aged 35. In January 1927 in Maymyo Mandalay, Myanmar Albert Henry Darbey Barron married Olive Marie Bashford b: August 1889 the daughter of Augusta and George, was 40, and her mother, Augusta,

The Sacred Heart Church Hastings was the scene of an interesting and stylish wedding this afternoon, the bridegroom being Mr W. J. (Ken) Quinlivan, third son of Mr and Mrs T. Quinlivan of 'Shortlands' Hastings and the bride Miss Margaret Eileen, daughter of Mr and Mrs R. E. Hay of Waipawa and formerly of Hastings. The Very Rev. Father Keogh was the officiating priest, and the ceremony was witnessed by a large number of friends and relatives of the parties. In August 1908 at Woodville he married Emma Johanna (Dolly) Eggers b: May 1879 in Dunedin, the second daughter of Johanna and Friederick W. Eggers. In May 1902 a clerk in the railway station named William Cracknell received a bullet in the hip from a Remington rifle held by a companion. In July 1915 Mr W. H. Cracknell of the Hastings Railway Station staff, who has been laid up there with a threatened return of the trouble that necessitated some weeks in the hospital a few months back. His friends will be pleased to hear that he is making good progress towards recovery. In November 1915 Mrs Jane Harker married twice died at Waipawa, mother of W.

H. Cracknell chief clerk in the Hastings railway office. William Henry (Willie) Cracknell died July 1921 in Hastings aged 42 and Emma Johanna (Dolly) Eggers died October 1928 at Dunedin aged 49.

1914 August, Death, Roach - At Laloma, Southland Rd, Hastings, George Hamilton, beloved husband of Hannah Roach, in his 74th year. The funeral will leave his late residence for the Hastings cemetery. **George Hamilton Roach** died at Southland Rd Hastings of heart trouble aged 74. His firm became Roach Brothers. Four sons - George Frederick Roach, Frank Hamilton Roach, Ernest Oswald Roach and Victor Reginald Roach and three daughters – Mrs B. L. Knight of Raurimu, Mrs E. V. Hudson of Napier and Miss Roach of Hastings. His wife Hannah Roach nee O'Connell died in 1923 Southland Rd aged 83.

1914 August, Deaths, Lane - At McLean St, Hastings, William Henry Lane, aged 76 years. The Funeral will leave his late residence for the Havelock Cemetery.

1914 August, Mr William Henry Lane and a well-known and respected citizen and one term Hastings Mayor died at his son's residence in McLean St Hastings aged 76, He Leaves one son married Cecil S. E. Lane, taxi-driver, residing in McLean St with his wife Martha Lane, and one daughter. Sadly Mr Lane a widower had taken to drinking and had an emotional distressing conflict with his daughter-in-law Martha Lane which resulted in him firing a shotgun and then shooting himself. He was a native of Devonshire and had formerly served in the British Navy as a marine he arrived in this district in the early days and took up road contracting, carting in which he was engaged until a few years ago when he retired. He was Mayor of Hastings for one term and previously served as a councillor. He was also a member of the Hawke's Bay Licensing Bench. The late Mr Lane was of a very generous disposition and gave, liberally to many local institutions. He took a keen interest in various branches of sport and all matters in connection with the Friendly Societies and kindred bodies had his practical and wholehearted support.

1914 August, Deaths, McIlroy - At his late residence. Southland Rd, Hastings, **John Lawrence McIlroy**, early Hastings blacksmith, beloved husband of Katharine McIlroy, aged 69 years. Private interment. The mortal remains of the late Mr J. L. McIlroy were interred privately at the Hastings cemetery this morning. The funeral service was conducted by Very Rev. Father Keogh. John's wife Katharine McIlroy nee Hill died in April 1949

1914 August, Mr H. Latham has been transferred from the Napier to the Hastings branch of the Bank of New Zealand.

1914 August, Mark Andrew Peters, a labourer of Heretaunga St died in Hastings aged 51 and Isabella Gertrude Peters nee Finlayson died August 1934 in Manawatu-Wanganui aged 68.

1914 August, Henry Richmond Climie civil engineer at Hastings. **Henry Richmond Climie** b: August 1884 in New Plymouth the son of Margaret and Henry Westcott Climie, in 1916 he married Hilda Mary Badger b: December 1884 in Eden Terrace, Auckland. In 1919 Hilda Mary and Henry Richmond Climie an engineer at Gordon Rd Hastings, a sister Mary Elizabeth Climie a spinster at King St. Hilda Mary Climie nee Badger died November 1956 aged 71. In 1960 Henry Richmond Climie then married Nellie Scott b: August 1897 in Paeroa the daughter of Harriet and William Scott, she had married Henry Donaldson in 1936. Henry Richmond Climie died September 1961 in Auckland aged 77.

A younger sister Mary Elizabeth Climie b: July 1888 died September 1926 at Hastings aged 38.

His parents - Henry Westcott Climie b: March 1857 in Shrewsbury, Shropshire, Eng the son of Jane and Daniel Climie, in 1879 he married Margaret (Maggie) Richmond b: 1855 in Galston Ayrshire, Scot. They had five children. Henry Westcott Climie came to New Zealand with his father Daniel Climie (under whom he received his engineering training) in the year 1875. He assisted his father in the reconnaissance survey of the railway route from Wellington to Tawa Flat. This survey did not lead to actual work, but before very long the Government made use of the work done and actually started construction. This was discontinued and eventually the Manawatu Railway Company took up the work, adhering closely to Climie's projected line. Henry Climie then joined the Lands and Survey Department as an Assistant Surveyor in April, 1878, and was engaged in the major triangulation survey in the Wellington District. He later went to Taranaki and endeavoured to carry out surveys in the Waimate Plains, but the hostile Maoris effectively prevented the work from proceeding by ordering their womenfolk to stand in front of the theodolite telescope, whichever way it was turned. The party was transferred to Inland Taranaki, and between 1880 and 1890 Climie located the roading system and subdivided a large portion of that very precipitous area. He then left the Government Service and commenced private practice, carrying out road and bridge work in the Stratford County. He located, designed and superintended the piercing of the first papa rock road tunnel (on Mangahu Road) suitable for coach traffic, In 1897. He designed the dam and head-works of the Stratford hydro-electric scheme (one of the first In New Zealand) which operated from 1901. He also carried out a water supply and sewerage service for Stratford in 1903, and for Eltham shortly afterwards, and then for Kaponga and Patea also. Charles Henry Lawn was resident engineer for the Climie firm at Stratford, 1902-05 (C. A. L.) Climie's practice covered a wide field and he brought a water supply to Levin. He moved to Hawkes Bay and carried out similar works at Hastings. Margaret (Maggie) Climie nee Richmond died May 1920 in Hastings aged 65 and Henry Westcott Climie died January 1929 in Hastings aged 71.

1914 August, Thomas Henry Kelly died at Hastings aged 75, pur Mary Kelly

1914 September, Margery Winifred Ward was born in Hastings, the daughter of Arthur Ward b:June 1869 and Eliza Christina Ruth McLennan b: July 1877. She married Eric Whitley Boyle December 1940 in Hastings. They had four children. Margery Winifred Ward nee Boyle died February 1993 in Hastings aged 78.

Arthur Ward of Frederick St and later Kaiapo Rd Hastings died December 1946 aged 77 and Eliza Christina Ruth Ward nee McLennan died July 1959 in Hastings aged 82.

1914 September, Birth, Harrison - At Hastings, the wife of W, C. Harrison, a son.

1914 September, David Ross died at Hastings aged 68. David Ross b:1846 Rosshire Scot the son of Malcolm and Margaret Ross. He had three sons and two daughters with Sophia Osborne, she then married Robert Hall. Sophia Ross / Hall nee Osborne died at Hastings April 1931 aged 79.







The First World War memorial cairn in the grounds of St. Matthew's Anglican Church Hastings was unveiled on Armistice Day 11 November 1922. It incorporated a granite tablet inscribed with the names of 44 former parishioners who had given their lives during the war. After the Second World War a second tablet with a further 55 names was added.





In 1926 when the Rev Hobbs returned to Hastings where he was instrumental in getting a new Anglican Church Mission Hall built at Parkvale called St Barnabus which was used for services and Sunday school. In May 1935 they planted trees and shrubs around the Mission Hall boundary to mark Royal Jubilee. In 1965 St Barnabus was moved to Ada St and St Peter's.

Sidenote – large shading trees grew along this Lyndon Rd west boundary fence in the late 1950's and possible another wooden lych-gate was erected with concrete path to the side entrance, the lych-gate may have been removed in the late 1960's due to the dark, damp and moss laden causing wet rot or a storm tree branch falling causing damage. There was also St. Matthew's Sunday School Hall behind on Eastbourne St west.

Arthur John Reece/Evans was born in April 1891 in New Zealand, the son of Mary and John Evans. In October 1913 Arthur John Reece/Evans married Rosanna/Rose Anna Elizabeth Olsen b: April 1891 in Wellington, the daughter of Eliza and Lawrence Olsen, they had five children and moved to the Waikato.

1914 November, A wedding of considerable interest to Pakowhai people took place in St. Luke's Church. Havelock North, when Mr Henry Fourneau, second son of Mr P. W. Fourneau of Pakowhai and Miss J. Lansdown, youngest daughter of Mr R. Lansdown late of Hastings, were united in the bonds of matrimony. The Rev. A. P. Clarke of Taradale was the officiating clergyman. The bride as given away by her brother. Mr Fred Lansdown. Mr A. E. Fourneau acted as best man. A reception was afterwards held in Warren's tearooms. The happy couple left by the afternoon train en route for Auckland.

1914 November, Charles Wells was charged with committing an aggravated assault on a female. Mr Humphreys who appeared for accused stated that Wells had been under the influence of liquor and had kissed Mrs Heren. Accused had gone to both Mr and Mrs Heren afterwards and had apologised. If the case was changed to one of common assault, the accused would plead guilty. Mr Lusk who appeared for Mr Heren said he was willing that the charge be changed from aggravated to common assault. Accused was convicted and fined £10 in default two months' imprisonment.

1914 December, Arthur Sykes b: July 1890 in Batley Yorkshire the son of Charlotte Ann and David Bradley Sykes married at Hastings Veronica Doris May Thompson. Arthur Sykes a dairy farmer at Pakowhai died April 1939 in Hastings aged 48.

David Bradley Sykes b: October 1864 in Batley Carr, Yorkshire, the son of Elizabeth and Tom Sykes. In April 1886 he married Charlotte Ann Kaye Boothroyd b: February 1864 the daughter of Hannah and Charles Boothroyd. They had five children - October 1886 John William Sykes he died 18 October 1918 in France aged 32 and was buried in Wimille, Pasde-Calais France, July 1888 Allan Sykes he first married Mina Wilkie Watson in July 1921 at Hastings then married Pauline Maria, July 1890 Arthur Sykes he married Veronica Doris May Thompson in December 1914 at Hastings, October 1895 Walter Sykes he married Gladys Muriel Mitchell in March 1928 and 1902 Elizabeth Hannah Sykes she died July 1927 in Hastings aged 25. In March 1923 Mr and Mrs D. Sykes and Miss E. H. Sykes of Hastings left for Wellington en route for England on an extended holiday. Charlotte Ann Kaye Sykes nee Boothroyd died March 1944 in Hastings aged 80 and David Bradley Sykes died February 1958 in Hastings aged 93.

1914 December, Death, Heeney Mrs Rose Heeney nee Donnelly aged 25 the wife of Hugh Heeney of Hastings. The funeral of the late Mrs Rose Heeney, the remains being interred in the Hastings cemetery. There was a large number of mourners present, the last rites of the Catholic Church being performed by the Rev Father Keogh. Hugh Heeney a farmer of 606 Beech Rd Hastings died September 1964 aged 82.

Grove George Vowless b:1859 Sydney, NSW, Aus, the son of Teresa and Grove Vowless, in 1883 in NZ he was charged with cattle steeling. In July 1887 he first married (Annie) Hansine Kristine Christensen b: June 1864 in Ansager Ribe, Denmark the daughter of Mary and Neil Christensen. They had eight children in Auckland. (Annie) Hansine Kristine Vowless nee Christensen died January 1910 in Auckland aged 45. In December 1914 Grove George Vowless then married at Hastings Jessie Amelia Santos nee Johnson b:1868 in Cambridge England the daughter of Mary and Frank Johnson, she had previously married Manuel Santos in 1905 in NZ, he died April 1913 in Auckland aged 37. In 1914 they resided at Paki Paki where George was a Railway Platelayer. Grove George Vowless died September 1927 in Napier aged 68 and Jessie Amelia Santos / Vowless nee Johnson died 1942 aged 74.

1914 December, Patrick John McCormack b: March 1876 in Fethard Tipperary the son of Johanna and Daniel McCormick married at the Sacred Heart Church Hastings Mary Jane McErlane b: November 1887 the daughter of Mary and William McErlane. They had six children – 1915 Daniel Augustian McCormack, May 1917 John Patrick McCormack, 1919 Margaret Mary McCormack, May 1920 Mary 'Molly' Catherine Elizabeth McCormack, 1921 Charles James McCormack and May 1926 Teresa Mary McCormack. Bridget, Richard, Thomas and Patrick McCormack emigrated to Cairns Queensland, Australia. Thomas and Patrick McCormack later crossed the Tasman to eventually settle in Hawke's Bay. Patrick John McCormack died at Hastings January 1961 aged 84 and Mary Jane McCormack nee McErlane died March 1969 in Pakowhai aged 81.

1914 December, Death, Kirk - At the Napier Hospital, William Kirk late of Hastings aged 65 years. The funeral will leave his late residence. Charles St, for the Hastings cemetery. William Kirk, better known in Hastings as 'Scotty Kirk' the cabdriver, who was injured in a collision with a motor car on Thursday night, died at the Napier Hospital. The late Mr Kirk has had an eventful career. About 19 years ago while driving the old 'Caledonian' express he had his leg badly fractured by a kick from a horse, the leg having to be amputated above the knee. Last June he met with another accident, being run into on the Pakowhai bridge, but on this occasion no serious injury resulted. 'Scotty' was a well known figure in Hastings and his death will come as a shock to many friends. Deceased, who was a native of Aberdeen, Scotland was 65 years of age and leaves a widow and grown up family, Mrs R. Kessell of Charles St, being his daughter. William Kirk the Hastings cab-driver who sustained fatal injuries in a collision with a motor car at Napier. Frederick Hubert Robjohns, engineer of Napier, deposed that on December 17th at about 8 p.m., he was driving a motor car along the Parade in the direction of Awatoto. He was driving in the middle of the road and when near the end of the parade met a cab coming towards Napier. It was a two-horse cab and was also in the middle of the road. Had two good lights on the car. Did not see the cab until it was within 8 or 9 yards of the car. It was a dark night and the houses shaded the light of the sky. When witness first saw the cab, the driver was pulling his right rein to get on to the side of the road. Witness swerved to his wrong side and then collided with the cab. Did not see the driver thrown, had thought he fell. The near Horse was thrown on to the bonnet of the car. Subsequently the animal died. Witness asked the driver of the cab where his lights were. He either replied that he had run out of candles, or he did not have any with him. Witness was travelling at 5 or 6 miles per hour at the time of the accident. Miss Codd was with him in the car at the time of the accident. Did not smell drink on the cab driver. He attributed the accident to not seeing the cab until it was close up. Olive Codd of Puketapu, corroborated the previous witness' evidence. She also stated that the cab was going slightly faster than the car. James Howard Sheath farmer of Napier stated that on Thursday night he was on the parade and saw a cab coming from Hastings. It was going at a jog trot. There were no lights on the cab. The night was fairly dark. He looked back at the cab after it had passed and saw a motor car coming from Napier. It had two good lights. The car was not travelling fast. After witness had gone a few paces he heard a crash and on turning round saw that there had been a collision. On going back witness found the driver of the cab laying on his back on the road. The cab was on the left side of the road and the car was abreast of it. A lady passenger fainted when she got out of the cab. Robert Kessell of Hastings, son-in-law of the deceased, saw the body. He was about 65 years of age. Deceased had a leg removed about 20 years ago. Dr. T. C. Moore deposed that he had held a post mortem. The heart and liver were fatty and there were indications of longstanding kidney disease. All the intestines were very much distended. The injuries received through the collision were not sufficient to cause the death of a healthy man. Death was due to stasis of the intestines, caused by shock. The intestines, owing to their condition, would press against the heart, causing failure thereof. Dr. Faris, senior medical assistant at the hospital, who was present at the post mortem, agreed with what Dr. Moore had said. Deceased was all right when admitted, but gradually sank and died about 2.30 p.m., on Monday. Annie Elliott who was in the cab when the accident occurred, said the vehicle was travelling slowly. The motor car appeared to her to be travelling at a terrific speed and appeared to swerve into the cab. The coroner returned a verdict of accidental death and found that the accident was the joint results of the cab driven by the deceased having no lights attached and of Robjohns turning his motor to the wrong side under the mistaken impression that deceased had pulled his off rein. It could not reasonably be found that Robjohns was guilty of negligent driving.

Around 1884 they arrived at Dunedin settling at Roslyn where he held the position of a foreman at Ross and Glendinnings woollen mills, Five children born in NZ – 1885 Minnie Stanhope she married Percy James Simpson George in January 1910 and settled in Hastings, June 1892 Duncan Stanhope was born in Dunedin Otago he resided in Hastings 1916 and married Irene Maud Slater in 1918 and Eileen Veronica Hunt in 1932. The Stanhope's continued to reside Rutherglen in Dunedin until Joseph retired around 1915 when they came up to live in Hastings. Joseph Stanhope died October 1923 at 1000 Pakowhai Rd aged 81 and Margaret Stanhope nee Duncan died 1928 in Hastings aged 76.

1915, Brian Henry Herrick was born in Hastings, the son of Ethne and Edward Jasper Herrick of Lindisfarne Hastings.

1915, Robert Catherall was born in Hastings, the son of Ms Leitch and John Robert Catherall b: 1875 NZ, the son of Mary Ann McGraw and James Catherall.

1915, Robert Edward Davis b: 1892 married Cecelia Elizabeth Florence Margaret Smith b: 1892 Hastings the daughter of Mary and John Thomas Smith. 1916 Robert Edward Davis a car salesman of Charles St. Cecelia Elizabeth Florence Margaret Davis nee Smith died at Hastings August 1951 aged 59 and Robert Edward Davis a sheep farmer of 601 Massey St Hastings died May 1981 aged 89.

1915, **Warwick Henry Gumbley snr** b:1889 in NZ the son of Laura and Charles Henry Gumbley married Hilda Mary Ellen Howarth b: January 1890 in Hastings the daughter of Louisa and George Howarth. They had two children — March 1916 Warrick Henry Howarth (Wock) Gumbley jnr was born at Fernhill and September 1918 Phyllis Gumbley at Hastings she married Deryck Paul Motley. 1917 Warwick Gumbley a storekeeper at Waima Fernhill with his older brother Louis Gumbley Hilda Mary Ellen Gumbley nee Howarth died May 1958 aged 68 and Warwick Henry Gumbley snr died December 1969 at Hastings aged 80.

1915, James Henry Palmer died at Hastings aged 65 he was born 1850 Cornwall, Eng the son of James and Elisabeth Palmer. In 1875 New Zealand he married Harriett Head b: 1857 the daughter of William Head. They had one child – 1880 Mabel Palmer. Harriett Palmer nee Head died 1939 at Hastings aged 82.

1915, Robert Benjamin Foote b: January 1886 Marlborough the son of Alice Mary and Robert Benjamin (Bob) Foote, married in Hastings Sarah Fraser Dunlop b: February 1893 in Gisborne, the daughter of Mary and James Dunlop. They had two children. Robert Benjamin Foote jnr died August 1968 in Hasting aged 82 and Sarah Fraser Foote nee Dunlop died December 1973 in Hastings aged 80.

1915 February, Wedding, McCarthy – Warren - At St. Matthew's Church by the Rev Robjohn's, Mr Reginald McCarthy son of Mr McCarthy of Port Ahuriri and Miss Catharine (Cassie) Warren, youngest daughter of Mr E. J. Warren of Hastings. The bride was given away by her father and attended to by Miss Ethel Warren (sister of the bride) and Miss Irene Clarke (cousin of the bride) Mr D. McCrae acted as best man. A sumptuously wedding-breakfast at the residence of the bride's parents Pepper St, which was ably presided over by Mrs Warren and Mr J. P. Smith (uncle of the bride)



His death was not unexpected as he had been ill for the past year. He was a cousin of the late Mr T. C. Williams of Wellington and both were married to daughter's of the late Mr Wm. Beetham. His wife died some years ago and he has left a family of four sons (Messes Arnold and Heathcote Williams of Gisborne and Messrs. Cyril and Eric Williams of Hawke's Bay) and three daughters (Mrs Guy Russell, Mrs Frank Nelson and Miss Elsie Williams) Mr Algar Williams of Wellington is a nephew of the deceased gentleman. He will be remembered for the valuable services he rendered to the Napier Harbour Board, H. B. Land Board. Education Board, County Council (of which he was chairman - 1881 - 1882; 1896 - 1900) and Hawke's Bay A. and P. Society (of which he was at one time president). He was a great churchman, the Church of England in the Hawke's Bay district owes much to his beneficence. A short service will be held at St. Matthew's church after which the cortege will proceed to the Havelock Cemetery. His daughter Miss Elsie Williams inherited the Frimley estate.

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

In 1924 James Gaston born Scotland a butcher was charged with theft at Hastings. James Gaston died at Hastings July 1926 aged 36. In 1930 widow Alice Gaston nee Anderson married widower Percy George Inge b:1885. Percy George Inge died at Hastings in February 1959 and Alice Gaston / Inge nee Anderson died at Hastings March 1972 aged 80.

Mr. Seaton thought the veterans should he allowed the use of the Hawke's Bay Soldiers' Club. Air. Neale said the Mayor had refused the veterans permission to parade on the railway platform to welcome returned troopers, an action which was belittling the veterans. The secretary was instructed to interview the Mayor re the veterans participating in the Hastings celebration of Anzac Day. **Fourteen ordinary and one honorary member were enrolled**. All desirous of joining the branch are requested to communicate with the hon. secretary, Mr Gore-Martin.



Other new Hastings buildings have been improved – the Tourist Motor Company, Messrs Davis & Boyd new building Station St, the New Zealand Loan and mercantile, Dalgety and Company, HB Produce and Cool Storage Company, HB Fruit Canning Company, the Amalgamated Bakery. Also the new St. Matthew's Church and at the east side the new Municipal Theatre with the Municipal Buildings foundation stone laid.



1916, de Pelichet McLeod and Co new building on Market St sth opposite the library, it was first established in 1906 with Head Office at Hastings and branches at Napier and Port Ahuriri. This building later became James W. Shaw and the Hawke's Bay Jockey Club office upstairs, next to the Morris Cars and Trucks sales

In October 1924 Mr L. A. Goldfinch left the firm after four years service, the merchandise manager was Mr W. W. Wood.

William Allan Carter, After severing his connection with the Farmers' Co-operative Society he took control of the seeds department of Messrs de Pelichet McLeod's business for about the same period of 13 years.

1916, Joseph Craig b: 1876 a stock agent of Seddon St, Hastings. In his early years he was employed at Te Aute Station, Later he took up farming in the Ruataniwhai district. He joined the staff of de Pelichet, McLeod and Company Ltd in Waipawa as resident agent. His first wife formerly Miss Pillow of Waipawa they had five children, she died. In 1912 he married Linda Kent b: 1890 in Sandown Hampshire, the daughter of Ellen and George Kent. They had one son at Waipawa - June 1915 Frederick Henry Craig he married Kathleen Glavey in October 1939. A daughter Evelyn Craig she married Eric Dudley Anderson in April 1926. Ivy Craig, Irene Craig and Jessie Craig sisters. Joseph was transferred to Hastings with the firm de Pelichet, McLeod in 1916 a stock agent of Seddon St Hastings. For some time Mr Craig also interested himself in the hotel business managing the Pacific Hotel and had interest in the Sunshine Brewery. He was an enthusiastic member of the Hastings Orphan's Club and won for himself great popularity as a singer of Scotch comic songs. He was well known in Hastings some years ago as an entertainer at social functions. He retired some years ago, but retained his farming property in Middle Rd. Mr Craig took a keen interest in National Party affairs in Hastings for many years and was the executive of the Hastings branch. He was also a member of the Country Club. 1938 Joseph Craig a stock agent of 700 Henry St. Joseph died June 1946 aged 70 buried Hastings cemetery. He had resided in Hawke's Bay 55 years. He was survived by his wife and Mesdames E. D. Anderson of Hastings, G. A. Blennerhasset and G. McCarty of Auckland, D. F. C. Saxton of New Plymouth and Mr Noel Craig of Sydney children of his first marriage and Miss Joan Craig of Hastings a daughter of the second marriage. Flight Lieutenant F. H. Craig a son of the second marriage lost his life in 1941 while serving with the RAF. Linda Craig nee Kent died February 1962 in Wellington aged

1916 June, Death, Dickson - At Nelson St, Hastings, **James Dickson**, eldest son of Charles Dickson, farmer, Burmarrow, Gatehouse of Fleet Kirkcudbrightshire, Scotland. Dickson (husband of Nurse Dickson, Charles St, Hastings) They were married in NZ in 1888 Eliza Williams to James Dickson and no children born. 1913 listed James Dickson a fencer and nurse Eliza Luke Dickson at 309 Nelson St at the corner of Southampton St. There passed away this morning a very old identity of Hawke's Bay in the person of Mr James Dickson (husband of **Nurse Eliza Luke Dickson**, Charles St, Hastings). Deceased, who was 69 years of age, was the eldest son of the late Charles Dickson, fanner, of Burnarrow, Gatehouse, of Fleet, Kirkcudbrightshire, Scotland. The late Mr Dickson resided for many years at Maraekakaho and was held in the highest esteem by all when knew him. The bride was given away by her father, the wedding veil, embroidered by the Sisters of St. Joseph's Convent. Bridesmaids were Miss Chapman of Wanganui and Miss Mona Grey (sister of the bridegroom) Mr F. M. Quigley very ably discharged the duties of best man, whilst Mr T. Quinlivan acted as groomsman. After the ceremony at the church a large number of friends were entertained at a wedding breakfast at the pretty residence of the bride's parents, where the health and happiness of the happy couple was drank in brimming goblets. Douglas sold his sites in Heretaunga St between Nelson St and King St with a right-of-way from Queen St, purchased by Mr A. F. Redgrave of Hastings for £52.10/- a foot. Boyd.

Mrs Hickling landed in Melbourne in 1860 and resided there until 1909 when she came over to New Zealand and made her home with her son who was then farming in the Pahiatua district, removing to Hastings with him some four years ago. The deceased lady took an active part in the Baptist Church, led a most kindly and unselfish life, her chief pleasure being the doing of things for others and helping those who were in trouble. 


1916 November, Manufacture of Rennet. Those interested in the cheese-making industry in New Zealand will be pleased to learn that relief is likely to come locally as a **Hastings firm, The Vello Company, has commenced the manufacture of Rennet**, the quality of which is equal to the imported article, the company having received the New Zealand Government certificate to that effect. The Vello Company have rennet now ready for market and they anticipate next season being in a position to supply the needs of the whole of the Dominion.



The Vello Co Ltd. Situated off Pakowhai Rd on the banks of the old Ngaruroro River on 1½ acres is assured of a good supply of water for working the plant, whilst close to the railway line. Mr J. E. Smith the Company's manager is now making rennet and margarine, which is so largely used in the bakery trade and owing to the difficulties of importation due to the war, supplies of rennet are scarce and in great demand. Many of the cheese factories in both islands are purchasing the rennet made here. An up-to-date plant has been installed and everything done to facilitate the manufacture. The Vello factory was for sale in October 1919. Concrete rubble from the old Vello factory was still visible there in the 1960's.

Clarkson and retired to the Maraekakaho district where he was for a time at Olrig station and subsequently was employed by Mr R. D. D. 

1909, Mr **John Paynter** had arrived in Hastings, he was born at New Plymouth in October 1844, the second son of William and Sarah Paynter, being one of the oldest surviving settlers born in New Zealand. He spent his early days in the Taranaki district and fought throughout the Maori wars which were waged in that province. When only 16 years of age he was in charge of ammunition wagons which were drawn by bullocks. While a comparatively young man he moved to the Nelson district, where he took up farming, which he relinquished on coming to Hastings. Mr Paynter was a keen supporter of the volunteer movement and for many years was a crack rifle shot. He had the honour of being the champion shot of New Zealand and twice won the Ballinger Belt, which is still competed for annually. He was married three times and had seven sons and eight daughters. Wives – 1865 Mary Anne Burlace she died May 1867, 1871 Ellen Withers, she died June 1908 and he moved up to Hastings where he married Mary Jane Maultsaid in 1910, she died in 1929 aged 66. From three marriages he produced 14 children. John Paynter died May1935 at the advanced age of 91 years.

1909 January, Helen McLellan Dykes was born at Hastings, the daughter of Isabel and Andrew Dykes. **Andrew Dykes snr** b: January 20, 1876, in June 1904 he married Isabel Catherine McLean b: December 1873 the daughter of Isabella and Robert McLean. They had five children - June 1905 Isabella Sterling MacLean Dykes at Manawatu she married James Henry Johnston in 1930, December 1906 Andrew Dykes jnr in Manawatu he married Agnes Louisa Ferris in January 1931, April 1912 Robert MacLean Dykes he married Lois Isabel Whiting in July 1940 and March 1915 John McLean Dykes at Napier. 1908 – 1910 Andrew Dykes a coachbuilder at Outram Rd. 



In 1903 **Peter Bowker** married Mrs Malachi (Maggy) Faddool Joseph nee Naimie b: 1868 in Lebanon, the daughter of Phoetima and Fadool Naimie. She had one daughter with Hanna Joseph. In July 1907 a warrant was issued against Peter Bowker, restaurant keeper, late of Hastings, on a charge of theft of household goods to the value of £16 the property of Messrs Paterson, Mossman and Co. Bowker had be arrested at Wellington and would was brought before the Court and remanded to Hastings. Peter Bowker obtained the Trocadero dining rooms on Station St for a few years before moving to Timaru where he sued the newspaper for liable, Peter Bowker died July 1926 at Greymouth and Malachi (Maggy) Faddool Joseph nee Naimie died July 1950 aged 82.

1909 January, The death of Mr **James Collins** aged seventy-three, owner of the 'Homewood station' at Kaikora. The deceased was a well-known breeder of Romney sheep. He arrived in Hawke's Bay forty years ago and in the early days was a teamster. **His was the first plough used in the province**. He recently gave £100 towards a shield for rifle shooting.



1909 January, **Thomas John Peddie** b: November 1838 in North Leith Midlothian, Scot the son of Mary and William Peddie died at Nurse Bethune's Private Hospital Hastings aged 70. A very old Hawke's Bay identity, he leaves a widow and family of three daughters (one married Mrs J. A. Miller) and two sons to mourn their loss. In 1838 he went to sea aged 17 for several years and then settled in Napier in 1867 and worked as a storeman for Messrs Kinross & Co for three years then he purchased the Taradale Hotel. In September 1870 at the residence of the Rev. G. Morice, Napier he married Catherine (Kate) Dunbar b:1840 in Forres Moray the daughter of Agnes and John Dunbar of Scot. They had four children - May 1874 Thomas Peddie at Napier he died March 1875, January 1878 Edith Agnes Peddie at Napier she married John Anderson Miller in November 1894 he was Hastings Mayor 1911, November 1879 Alexander Dunbar Peddie at Taradale he served wounded South Africa Boer War 1900 he married Myrtle Gladys Louise Prosser in 1910 they later ran The Piccadilly Tearooms in Hastings, November 1879 Thomas Bertram Peddie at Napier. Thomas John Peddie later purchased the Claredon Hotel in Napier then he went sheep farming at Wairarapa, retiring to Hastings. Catherine Peddie nee Dunbar died September 1931 in Napier aged 91.

1909 January, Charles Herbert Renata Peel-Walker was born in Hastings the son of Olive, Oriwia Pipi and Leonard Tordoff Peel-Walker. Leonard Tordoff Peel-Walker b: October 1884 in Horsforth Yorkshire Eng the son of Rachel and Walter Peel-Walker, in April 1908 he married Olive, Oriwia Pipi Broughton b: 1884 in Gisborne the daughter of Atiria and Wiremu Broughton. They had six children - 1910 Edward Raumoa Peel-Walker, 1912 Desmond Rawiri Peel-Walker, 1915 William Broughton Peel-Walker, 1916 Joan Atiria Peel-Walker and December 1917 Rachael Peggy Peel-Walker. In 1911 Olive and Leonard Peel-Walker a clerk at Whakatane. Olive, Oriwia Pipi Peel-Walker nee Broughton died June 1950 in Auckland aged 66 and Leonard Tordoff Peel-Walker died August 1956 in Melbourne Vic, Aus aged 71.

1909 January, Doris Muriel Phelps Hopkins was born at Hastings, the daughter of Mabel Doris and Leonard Seymour Phelps Hopkins, she married Harry George Levett in 1930. **Leonard Seymour Phelps Hopkins** b: May 1884 in Christchurch the son of Mary and Arthur Hopkins, in June 1908 he married Mabel Doris Laing b: June 1888 in NZ the daughter of Mary and Henry Laing. Children – June 1910 Arthur Henry Phelps Hopkins at Hastings he married Mavis Ena Evelyn Irving. Leonard Seymour Phelps Hopkins died November 1960 aged 76 and Mabel Doris Hopkins nee Laing died January 1974 aged 85.

1909 January, A peculiar accident befell **Mr Thomas Brinson snr** this morning. Mr Brinson left his home in Avenue Rd and when turning into the Tomoana Rd saw a cow charging towards him. He leant against a fence to allow the infuriated animal to pass, but she charged at him and tossed him over the fence, in doing so one of her horns struck him on the forehead inflicting a nasty gash. Mr **Charles Brausche** who was proceeding along the road on his bicycle noticed the animal making its way towards a child which had wandered on to the road. He immediately made off towards the little one and luckily was in time to place it inside a fence for safety. He then mounted his machine and with the cow in hot pursuit, put sufficient distance between them to make matters safe for him. Mr Brinson, who fortunately escaped serious injury, was attended by **Dr. Copland.**

1909 January, An inquest was held at O'Reilly's Hotel before the Coroner, Mr Brabant touching upon the circumstances surrounding the death by drowning of Patrick O'Brien snr of Paki Paki. Martha Carton deposed that she resided at Paki Paki and recognised the body as that of Patrick O'Brien. She had lived with deceased for three years. She was at her home last night and retired to bed at a little before seven o'clock. The deceased told her to go to bed and he would look, after the calves and poultry; It was necessary for him to cross a creek about 12ft wide and the water was about 3 feet deep; O'Brien did: not come back, and within half an hour she went to look for him. She found his body in the-water. She held up his head and tried respiration methods but he was dead. She tried to lift the body out, but could not. She went for help to Swan Bros. Hubert Crow and others came. O'Brien was in his usual state of health and was aged about 75 years. He was quite sober. He had no drink. He had been in the habit of crossing the plank, over the creek for 30 years. He must have struck himself and got stunned. Witness believed the death to be accidental. There was no reason to suppose he would drown himself. Hubert Crow, labourer, disposed that he proceeded to the creek, where he saw deceased lying completely under the water. Four others who were with witness lifted the body out of the water, O'Brien appearing to be quite dead. The creek was about six feet deep. There was a wire from the plank to the bank and in all probability deceased tripped over the wire. Dr Tosswill deposed that he made an external examination of the body, but did not find any marks of violence. He was of the opinion that death was due to drowning. Witness attended deceased about three years ago, when he was suffering from pneumonia. He was very feeble then. George Edmond Swan also gave evidence. A verdict of found drowned was returned, there being no evidence to show how deceased got into the water.

1909 January, Instruction in rescue work - Sir - Seeing the sad drowning fatality in your last issue, I thought I should like to write and see if some steps could not be taken in connection with our baths in Hastings, that is for the caretaker to have instruction on Dr Sylvester's system of respiration. Many lives could be saved if one only knew what is to be done at the lime. I also think that competitions should be held at the baths in rescuing and restoring, in teams of four, and I should only be too pleased to give my little towards prizes. I was once in a team which won two years in succession under Constable Pyne and Dr. Lamb, late of Dunedin. There is a lot to be learnt, and we never know the day we shall need this knowledge. A doctor cannot always be on the scene when a mishap occurs, and anyone knowing what is to be done would greatly help the doctor when he came. I have saved four lives myself on the river Murray, South Australia, one being an old man 60 years of age, and witnessed by about 280 people. There is also a lot to be learnt in rescuing a person from drowning, for a man may be a strong swimmer and yet be drowned m trying to rescue his friend, just through not knowing how to go about it, and children at school should be taught how to rescue from drowning. Thanking you for giving publicity to this,—I am, &c, Joseph Larritt. Hastings, Jan 27th, 1909.

1909 January, Annie Margaret Reece Elliott Marshall was born in Hastings the daughter of Eva May and Harold William Marshall, she married Schofield.

1909 January, Gilbert John Gair was born at Hastings the son of Euphemia and Gilbert Gair he married Muriel Ellen Tomson in 1953. **Gilbert Hempseed Gair** b: August 1882 in Makirikiri Manawatu the son of Marion and Pearce Gair in 1908 inQueensland he married Euphemia Wilkinson MacPhee b: 1883 in Walkerston Queensland Aus the daughter of Margaret and Malcolm MacPhee. They had three children - November 1910 Malcolm Gair at Hastings he married Maureen Irving in 1934 and November 1919 (Jim) James Gair in Hawke's Bay he married Maria Louisa Denei in 1946. 1905 - 1908 Gilbert Gair a station hand at Maraekakaho, in 1914 Gilbert Gair a station hand at Waipukurau. Gilbert Hempseed Gair died August 1940 aged 58, buried in Waipuku Taranaki and Euphemia Wilkinson Gair nee MacPhee died January 1968 aged 85.



Harold William Marshall b: March 1882 the son of William Gray Marshall, he married Eva May Merritt b: January 1883 in Napier the daughter of Jane and George John Merritt a settler of Tomoana. They had three children at Hastings — January 1909 Annie Margaret Reece Elliott Marshall, April 1914 Nola Jane Merritt Marshall she married Cullen and April 1913 Eric William Elliott Marshall he died May 1944 in Dortmund, North Rhine-Westphalia, Germany aged 31. 1917 - 1919 private Harold William Marshall served NZEF British War Medal, Victory Medal. In July 1920 Eva May Marshall divorced Harold William Marshall at Wellington, he married Mary Alice O'Leary in August 1927 in Auckland. Harold William Marshall died September 1965 in Henderson Auckland aged 83 and Eva May Marshall nee Merritt a widow 204 Lascelles St Hastings died August 1962 in Porirua Wellington aged 79.

1909 January, Timothy Donovan won the Hastings Borough Election

Timothy Donovan b: 1855 Kent Eng, the son of a soldier who served in the Crimean war. He arrived in NZ 1870 with his parents through his father's regiment, the "Royal Irish" having been brought here for service in the second Maori War, 1865 -1870. As a young man Timothy Donovan worked on the Thames goldfields. In 1876 he married Miss Rebecca Gillham, no children of the marriage. After brief residence in Wellington and Christchurch Mr and Mrs Donovan went to Hawke's Bay where they had a hardware and furnishing business at Otane, then moved to Hastings. Timothy Donovan was to serve 20 years as a member of the Hastings Borough Council, one of its best known and most generous citizens. They moved to the Bay of Plenty. Timothy Donovan died July 1935 aged 79 and Rebecca Donovan nee Gillham died at May 1936 aged 80, both were buried in Hastings.

1909 February, Hastings Fire - A fire last night, destroyed a six roomed house owned by J. G. Hill and occupied by Mrs H. Christian. The insurance on the building amounts to £300 and on the furniture to £100. It is stated that the furniture was removed from the house yesterday. The origin of the fire is a mystery. No one was in the house when the fire started.

1909 February, Very reluctantly, yet one by one are the campers returning from their holiday at **Waimarama**. Mr and Mrs Victor Roach returned on Thursday last, and Mr W. J. Butler on Saturday. He speaks very highly of the way they were treated by **Mr John Hart, manager for Mr G. P. Donnelly** and by the natives, who speared themselves no trouble in making the campers comfortable. Mr Hart had the water laid on to the camp, bringing it some distance through rubber hose. The Maoris entertained their visitors at a ball and provided an excellent supper under the management of Mr Tom Grey, the station cook. An excellent pianist from Hastings supplied the best of music. Mr Joe Karetu took advantage of the occasion to welcome the guests on behalf of the natives. He said he was pleased to see them enjoying their holiday, and that he hoped many more Hastings people would take advantage of Waimarama as a holiday resort next year. Mr Mat Johnson returned thanks on behalf of the campers. There are a large number of Hastings families still under canvas at Waimarama.

1909 March, Hastings Fire - A fire last night started in the remaining old **Beecroft's stables** at the rear of and adjoining a block of shops fronting Station St. The back portions of the shops ignited, R. W. Jones, but the brigade succeeded in beating back the flames. The fire spread from shed to shed and cleared a lot of old buildings which were a menace to the town. The stables were owned by a syndicate and insured for £400 in the Commercial Union. **Fitzpatrick's billiard saloon** building (damage, £90 only) was insured for £400 in the London and Lancashire.

Note - In April 1907 a request from R. Stead was granted by the Borough Council to remove part of Beecroft's stables by traction and trolly.

1909 March Death, McKeown - At Napier Hospital, Alice Ruth eldest daughter of John and Lucy McKeown of Park Rd Hastings aged 32 years. The funeral will leave her parents residence for the Hastings cemetery.

1909 March, Montague Stevens, buried at Hastings, purchaser W. J. Stevens

1909 March, Hastings Fire - A menance removed old wooden building destroyed - At 10.25 last night a fire broke out in old stables known as Beecroft's, situated at the back of the Grand hotel. The buildings in which the fire started were very old and burnt like match wood, thus the fire got a good hold before the arrival of the brigade. A fairly strong wind was blowing from the north, which caused the occupiers of the block of shops in Station St, some anxiety. The stock in Mr Martin's piano depot was removed, likewise some of the books and papers from Messrs Hartshorn and Wellwood's office. The fire spread towards Station St, and for a time the new buildings, which was burnt out a short time ago, appeared to be doomed. The flames caught the back wall of Mr Fitzpatrick's billiard room, and the fight for supremacy between fire and water raged fiercely for several minutes. Fortunately the firemen, through dogged perseverance, got the fire under control as far as the safety of the Station St block was concerned. But the work of the Brigade was not over, for the outbuildings belonging to the Grand Hotel, and which were practically attached to the burning stables, were threatened. Two leads of hose, with, an excellent water pressure, were brought to play on the flames, and the good work of the Brigade is evidenced by the fact that a considerable portion of the wooden buildings were saved. By midnight the fire was practically extinguished. The stables, which are owned by a syndicate, are insured in the Commercial Union for £400. Mr Fitzpatrick's building and billiard tables are insured in the London and Lancashire office for £400. The damage to the tables and fittings is estimated at about £90. Proof, if such were necessary, was given that it is absolutely essential that the sewer trap should be lowered every evening. Immediately the bell rang a fireman was sent to lower the trap, and several minutes elapsed after the arrival of the brigade before a satisfactory flow of water was available. The Fire Police and Salvage Corps were on duty and confined their attention to guarding property, as no salvaging work was necessary. Captain Brausche and his men deserve credit for their good work, as the ruins bear evidence of the fire being skilfully cut out. An annoying delay was caused to the Brigade before leaving the station last night. It is the custom to place a bottle of kerosene near the engine furnace for the purpose of throwing over the kindling wood to hasten the raising of steam. Last night it was found that the kerosene had been replaced by a bottle of water, which was thrown over the wood before the mistake was discovered. This necessitated the relaying of the fire before it could be lit. The members of the Fire Brigade heartily appreciated the kindness of Mr P. Bowker of the Trocadero restaurant, who provided all the firemen with hot coffee and bread and butter, at the conclusion of their labours at the fire last night. A fairly sharp shock of earthquake was experienced in Hastings at 8.35 o'clock last night. It was also felt Napier and Waipawa. A Taihape telegram states that a shock lasting nearly half a minute was felt at one o'clock yesterday. There was another slight shock at 8.40 o'clock last night. The firemen when opening the manhole of the sewer last night received a surprise, by way of an explosion of sewer gas which came in contact with a lighted torch. A volume of blue flame shot up, but no damage was done. This is the first occasion upon which an accident of this kind has been known to occur in Hastings.

Jones returns thanks to those who assisted in saving their property at last night's fire. - Thanks I beg to tender my most hearty thanks to citizens who were instrumental in saving my own and customers' cars at last night's fire. Many names I have been unable to obtain, but I wish specially to mention Messrs Briggs, Thorley, C. O'Donoghue, R. Warren and Davis. R. W. Jones. Thanks to all those who rendered such valuable assistance last night in preventing the fire from spreading in my premises. F. W. Fitzpatrick.

They had three children. Edgar George Thomas died October 1944 in Hastings aged 71 and Emily Jane Fiord Thomas nee Mildenhall died May 1954 in Hastings aged 75.

Williams' Edenham station Waipiro Bay near Gisborne. He had resided in Hastings since May last. The deceased leaves a widow to mourn her loss.

1909 June, A large number of persons attended the funerai of Mrs Sinclair, wife of Mr W. M. Sinclair. The service was conducted by the Rev. J, Hobbs who referred to the Christian fortitide and patience with which the deceased had borne her illness, wreaths and other floral emblems were placed upon the grave.

1909 June, A sad fatality occurred near the Heretaunga School in Karamu Rd nth whereby Miss Isabel Harding aged about 22 only daughter of Mr Arthur Harding of the 'Siberia' Estate at Ashhurst, lost her life. Mr Stewart of Lundon, Stewart and Co., Ltd., who 'witnessed the accident, says the horse she was riding had become unmanageable and in bolting with her she appeared to lose all control, for he could see no apparent cause for her to be thrown, Had she been able to retain her seat for a few seconds longer he would have been able to stop the horse and the accident would have been averted. Dr. Tosswill who fortunately was at Mr Grey's house, was quickly in attendance, but from the first he held out no hope of her recovery, the skull being badly fractured. The injured girl was at once taken to 'Miss Nairn's private hospital, where, attended by Drs. Tosswill and Nairn, everything possible was done for her, but she passed away at two o'clock this morning. Miss Harding was a cousin of Mr Harding of Mt. Vernon, H.B. Her father Arthur formerly owned Kereru where the family resided for many years. Deceased was extremely popular and a great favourite everywhere where she was known. Only a few weeks ago she was belle of the Bachelors' Ball in Napier. At about ten o'clock last night, when it was certain that there was no hope of her recovery, a motor car was despatched from Hastings with the object of bringing the parents of Miss Harding from Ashhurst, but by the time Waipawa was reached the machinery broke down. Mr C. L. Mackersey then kindly placed his motor and chauffeur at their disposal and the journey was undertaken. Miss Harding was on a visit to Mr Macfarlane of Clive Grange and was accompanied by Miss Macfarlane at the time the sad accident occurred. In July 1911 Arthur Harding disposed of the 'Siberia' Estate at Ashhurst he died in a boating accident September 1913 in Kaipara Northland aged 65 and Isabella Edmondson Harding nee Whiters died January 1915 aged 56, both buried in Central HB.

A large number of friends were entertained at afternoon tea by the bride's mother, in a large marquee erected on the lawn.

All accounts owing by and all accounts due to the above firm will be paid and received by Albert Edward Curd whose receipt will be a sufficient discharge.

1909 July, **Mr F. Butcher coachbuilder of St. Aubyn St** has just completed to the order of Messrs Douglas Bros, and Lean, fishmongers, a fish cart which possesses several features distinctly advantageous for the purpose for which it is to be used. The cart is set low upon a patent crank axle, and the body is fitted up inside with three sliding ice trays, which during hot weather will keep the fish fresh and cool. The vehicle is covered with a canvas top with roll sides and front.

The body is painted white, with gold lettering shaded in black, and the wheels carmine, and lined with black and yellow. The contrast of colour results in a pleasing blend, and is strikingly attractive. The work throughout bears evidence of first-class craftsmanship. The vehicle is the first of its kind in Hawke's Bay and it should be the means of securing orders from other fish dealers in this district.

1909 July, **Alfred Amory George**, printer, charged with breach of award – he did employ a journeyman compositor named **H. Goldsborough** from the 30th April. 1909 until 10th day of July, 1909, and paid him £l. 2s 6d per week instead of £2.12s.6d as required by the award. Defendant was further charged with failing to keep a proper time and wages book. The Inspector said that he visited the premises of defendant, who informed him that he did not keep a wages book, saying that he did not think it necessary, only **employing one hand**, apart from members of his family who have an interest in the business, and the one employee, H. Goldsborough he employed at the time of his father's death, the widow being left with a large family. Witness never obtained a permit to employ the man at a lower wage than the award provided. Gave employment to the lad out of charity and had treated him well. The young fellow was not a competent hand, indeed far from it, and £l. 2s 6d per week would be a fair wage for him. Was **unable to read "manuscript"** and therefore was of very little use as a compositor. His family had a common interest in the business for about 22 years. If his business was sold his family would share in the proceeds. On the charge of failing to keep a proper wages and time book defendant was convicted and discharged and on the second judgment was given for plaintiff for £2.

1909 July, Accidental Death. A native named Ruru aged about 30 years was accidentally killed at Taurapa yesterday afternoon. Deceased was driving a four-horse team carting gravel from the Tuki Tuki river to **Mr C. L. T. Gordon's residence.** The man was seen by a native, Akonga Mohi, when within half a mile of Mr Gordon's residence and near a gate which he had to pass through. About two hours afterwards Mrs Gordon discovered the man pinned against the gate post by the wheel of the dray. He was standing erect with the whip in his hand. She informed a shepherd named David Knight who with his mate backed the dray and released the man, but he was quite dead. An inquest was held before Mr McCarthy, S.M., this morning, when a verdict of "accidental death" was returned.



He developed an illness about 18 months and at that time, with the view of consulting specialists, Mr and Mrs Charles Hughes made a trip to the Old Country with him. On returning to New Zealand deceased resumed his vocation. Four weeks ago his health completely broke down and he was forced to relinquish work and confined to his bed . The seriousness of his condition was worsened and he slowly sank and died. Great sympathy is expressed towards Mr and Mrs Charles Hughes in their bereavement. The cortege leaving his parents residence Heretaunga St for the Catholic Church and the Hastings cemetery where the graveside service was conducted by the Rev Father Keogh. There was a large attendance of friends and among those present were the Rev Dean Smyth and Father Tymons of Meeanee.

1909 September, Frank Graham b: April 1876 Ashley Canterbury the son of Mary and George Graham married Henrietta Edwards Epplett b: March 1879 at Pukahu. They had five children at Hastings – February 1910 in George William Graham, November 1911 Eva Marian Graham she married Edward Horace Sharpe in 1935, December 1912 Thomas Edward Graham and July 1918, Madeline Graham. Frank Graham died July 1922 at Hastings aged 46 and Henrietta Edwards Graham nee Epplett died July 1930 in Napier aged 51.

1909 September, James Flynn was born at Hastings the son of Mary Catherine and John Flynn. In 1908 John Flynn b: 1879 in Cork Ire married Mary Catherine McCarthy b: July 1895 the daughter of Catherine Mary and John McCarthy. Children - John Joseph Flynn, December 1912 Monica Catherine Flynn at Hastings she married Leslie Wilson in 1939. Mary Catherine Flynn nee McCarthy died February 1940 at Hastings and John Flynn died May 1940 at Hastings also Pte J. J. Flynn 46043, 2nd NZEF buried in same plot at Hastings.

1909 October, Deaths, O'Brien - At her parents' residence, Hastings, Eillen Margaret, infant daughter of Mary and Patrick Joseph O'Brien; aged 6 months.


1909 October, Deaths, McBurnie - At the residence of Mr Dillon, Willowpark Rd, Hastings on October 15th 1909, John, the beloved husband of Margaret McBurnie, late of the Whana Whana; aged 62 years. The funeral will leave Willowpark Rd for the Hastings cemetery. **John McBurnie** b: 1847 in Dumfries Scotland, in 1874 in NZ he married Margaret Wallace b: February 1854 in Lanarkshire Scot the daughter of Margaret and James Wallace. They had four children at Napier – 1875 Archibald McBurnie he married Annie Whittle in 1906, October 1877 Elizabeth Anne Anderson McBurnie she married Hugh Dillon in 1896, July 1879 Margaret Catherine McBurnie she had one son with John William Herbert Epps and July 1882 John McBurnie he married Henrietta Nellie Kelsall in 1907. John McBurnie died October 1909 at Hastings aged 62 and Margaret McBurnie nee Wallace died August 1943 in Hastings aged 89. In 1896 **Hugh Dillon** b: July 1868 in Hawke's Bay the son of Rebecca and Alfred Dillon married Elizabeth Anne Anderson McBurnie b: October 1877 in Hastings. They had one child. Hugh Dillon died July 1935 in Hastings and Elizabeth Anne Anderson Dillon nee McBurnie died August 1962 in Hastings aged 84.

1909 October, Roger William Borrett was born at Hastings the son of Alice and Roger Fleming Borrett he died a child in February 1914 in Assiniboia Manitoba, Canada. Roger Fleming Borrett b: July 1889 in Great Yarmouth Norfolk, Eng the son of Augusta and Arthur Borrett in September 1909 he married Alice Louise Tamlin b: July 1886 in Devon Eng the daughter of Alice and Alfred Tamlin. They had two children - December 1915 William Fleming Borrett at Winnipeg Canada. In July 1920 Alice Louise Borrett nee Tamlin married Max Foerster and 1928 Roger Fleming Borrett married Louise Ellen (Nellie) Dallas in 1928 in Saskatchewan, Canada. Alice Louise Borrett / Foerster nee Tamlin married Max Foerster died May 1978 in Long Beac California aged 91 and Roger Fleming Borrett died October 1985 aged 96.

1909 October, Another link connecting the present with the past disappeared this morning when **Mrs Mary Ann Clifton** nee Foster aged 77 years, wife of Mr George Clifton of Havelock Rd, died this morning. She was of a kind, homely and benevolent disposition and her many unostentatious acts of kindness won for her a large circle of friends. She leaves a husband, who is in his 85th year and a family of four daughters and three sons - Mesdames E. Hartshorn, T. Garrod, R. Gooseman (Hastings) A. P. Martin (Napier) and Messrs George a blacksmith and Richard Clifton (Hastings) and William Clifton (Stratford) to all of whom the sympathy of a large circle of friends is extended. The funeral will leave the residence Havelock Rd. George Clifton snr died at Hastings in May 1918 aged 90.

1909 October, Drainage -. Mr John Collinge continued his evidence. To Mr Scannell: There had already been two severances from the Borough. The number of petitioners exceeded the number of land holders. Before the Council deepened the Southland drain portions of this area were frequently under water which remained on it for three weeks at a stretch. The Council was continually being pestered to drain this land, and on that account they enlarged the drain. Although the owners could sell out for a good price, the petitioners had been working the land. The area would be useful for residential sites for a man keeping a couple of cows or horses, in spite of the fact that it could not be served by the sewer. The area could be subdivided into lots of five acres for residential sites, and as such would be worth .more than as farming land. When he said yesterday that the land was worth £60 per acre he calculated on an annual rental of £3 an acre (5% on £6O). Three years ago he thought that was as much as a farmer could afford to pay but if £l an acre Borough rates were added he would say the land was not worth so much. Mason Chambers, Chairman of the H.B. County Council, did not consider it part of the County Council's duties to drain private lands. The Council was not anxious for annexation of the petitioning areas. They were indifferent. A petition was coming from part of Napier South to join the County. They would maintain the drains as far as they affected the roads if the petitions were granted. If pressure was brought to bear upon them they would do as in other cases, that was to maintain private drains, charging owners a certain amount and contributing a subsidy according to the benefit derived by the County. The Hastings land was worth from £50 to £60 per acre for dairying purposes. T. J. Thompson, ex-Mayor of Hastings, deposed that he considered this portion of the Borough remarkably well served by the Borough Council. Did not approve of this 'petition being granted. The greater part of the land was suitable for residential sites. If he were owning land in this district, he would not sign a petition to be cat out of the Borough To Mr Scannell: If the land was I subdivided it would be of more value ' in the Borough than in the County. Frederick Cook (formerly Borough Road Overseer for years) had known this area since 1875, it was then very swampy. In 1881 he built a house for Mr H. Williams, and the roads were so bad that they could not cart the timber. The Southland drain was deepened mainly for the benefit of this area. A fair expenditure had been made on the roads. Farming land was not worth more than £40 an acre. Some of the land in this area was sold the other day for £80 an acre. This area could be served by a sewerage scheme. The Borough roads compared very favourably with the County roads. It was hardly necessary yet for sanitary arrangements to be carried out in this I area. Satisfied that the land in this portion was the best in the Borough. It was a strong loamy soil. There was no system of removal of nightsoil in the County. To Mr Scannell: For fruit growing purposes the land would give a fair return at £BO an acre. Enoch Hallett, Borough road overseer, had known the area for about 30 years. At one time a great deal of it was very swampy, and not fit for residential sites. In dry seasons the land was fit for grazing purposes. To Mr Scannell: Ultimately the area would be connected with the proposed sewerage scheme. No. 2 Area Mudgway and others - Mr Scannell in opening said that in this petition there was no question of sentiment. When narrowed down it was purely a question of pounds, shillings and pence. It must be admitted that the larger the Borough the less the integral parts paid in rates. The system of rating was a debateable question. The Borough of Hastings was of enormous area. The town proper had a number of substantial and valuable buildings - banks, hotels and merchants' shops, as were to be found in all towns of any pretension. Where such buildings were all the improvements were to be found. No doubt it was very gratifying to those persons who were fortunate enough to get these advantages, but those not so fortunately situated were not benefited to any great extent. Still, they were called upon to pay their quota of the cost. It was not through any particular love for the petitioners that the Council endeavoured to keep the outsiders within the Borough area. It was simply because those in the centre would be called upon to pay less rates. Already over 1000 acres had been lost to the Borough by severance, and a dire loss it had proved. A certain amount of rates had to be raised, and they (the Council) had over 1000 acres less to collect it from. The people in Mahora were practically in the same position. They received no benefit from the improvements in the centre of the Borough. Community of interests between those persons who lived in


the outskirts and those in the centre of the Borough was impossible. In 1885 a land boom set in Hastings and people paid more for their land at that time than they did on the occasion of another boom in 1889 - four years later. How could it be suggested that this land is part of the Borough when there had for so many years.' been practically no subdivision. The drainage which had been carried out in this area was just as much benefit to other parts of the Borough. The ratepayers had reason to be terrified at the raising of a loan of £85,000, when it was remembered that the existing loan of £25,000 had cost them £l per acre in rates. Naturally, those outside the town area would vote against further loans for improvements as they recognised that their rates would go up. James Barry, the holder of 7 acres in this, area still desired severance. Had known the area intimately for 30 years. The first land sale in this locality was in 1885 and the second in 1889. Only knew of one change of ownership during that time, that was Tait to Mudgway. They h.id plenty of artesian water and did not want the high pressure supply, nor yet electric light. Norton road was in a better condition 20 years ago than it was to-day. Part of Copeland Rd was not yet formed. There were only about II houses in the whole area. To Mr White: The largest holding would be about 17 acres. He purchased his land in 1885. Did not think more than 20 acres were lowlying. He paid 75 per acre for two acres, and for the balance he paid £40. He considered the present value £80 and £100 per acre. He did not wish to sell even at those prices. His only reason for getting out of the Borough was that he felt that the Council had neglected that portion. His land was situated in the highest part of the area. Edmund Mudgway, holder of 16 ¾ acres, deposed that his rates for this year amounted to £12.15s. During; his residence of three years the water-tables had seldom been cleaned out. His land was his main means of livelihood. His holding was about the lowest portion in the Borough. He considered the rates were excessive. To Mr White: Purchased his land about three years ago. Personally he could do without footpaths or channelling. Would have been better off under the old system of rating. The fear of a further increase in rates was his reason for getting out of the Borough. Mr White, in opening for the defence, said that the area which they were now dealing with was much smaller than No. I. He referred to the system of disposing of the nightsoil in No. 2 area - that of burying. Such a practice must in the near future prove a menace to the health of the whole population of the town. It had been stated in evidence that there was a good supply of artesian water in that area and that it was obtained at no great depth. That being so it was obvious that as the area became more closely populated the water would become contaminated, and probably result in an outbreak of fever. It did not necessarily mean that the raising of a further loan would mean increased taxation. At the present time the Council were employing 16 men to carry out permanent works in the shape of kerbing, channelling and asphalting. The result of this would be that considerable expense would be saved, as the cost of cleaning out the channels and the weeding of the footpaths would be saved. Mr White emphasised the need of an up-to-date sewage scheme, pointing out that a few years ago a portion of Hastings became a veritable fever bed owing to insanitary conditions That portion of the town had not recovered from the effects 'up to the present day, inasmuch that the land in the vicinity had decreased in value. Mr Scannell: Why the sewer line J runs along the very portion of the Borough you refer to, and when the river rises "the sewer is backed up and actually flows into the street at certain parts. Mr White: That may be so, but it only goes to show the need for the carrying out of an up-to-date sewerage system. That is what the Council is endeavouring to do. John Collinge, assisted in framing the objection to petition in Area 2. The value of the land varied from £100 to £200 per acre. There had not been many sales. For farming purposes the land was worth £60 per acre. The present value was due to the rapid growth of Hastings. The holdings, with the exception of two, were suitable for further subdivision. The Commission adjourned at this stage. Thomas John Thompson considered the value of the land for farming purposes to be £60 per acre. The present market value was about £80. Being adjacent to the town was the principal cause of its increase in value. The land was suitable for subdivision. The Riverslea drain was for the main benefit of this district. To Mr Scannell: The sewer would be extended to this area as soon as the money was available. Then the holdings would be subdivided. People were not such fools as to hold land for farming purposes that was worth £80 to £100 per acre. Dr. de Lisle, recently Health Inspector for Hawke's Bay, deposed that his duties had taken him all over the Borough. There were no public sanitary arrangements in the area and he considered that the time had arrived when there should be a complete sanitary scheme for the Borough, including this part. Even admitting that there were only eleven houses in the district there should some system of sewering and the fact of its being low lying was only an additional argument in favour of such a system. The County had no sanitary by-laws and he found that although the County Council backed witness up, they could not instil proper systems and an incomplete system was worse than none at all. If, as had been said, typhoid followed the sewer, the connections had been badly made. To Mr Scannell: When the river rose the sewer hacked up and overflowed. The backing up of the sewer could be checked by proper appliances by pumping. but he had not heard that the Council intended to install a pumping plant. If the water rose above the outlet of the sewer it must back up. The 'ate Council were not as active in carrying out his instructions as he desired. They did not prosecute when he desired, and he (witness) had to do it at their expense. In some cases they actually encouraged the perpetration of nuisances. Owners of the Dairy Factory made application for connection with the sewer, but the Council refused. A day of reckoning would come. The area should have a night service. The dry earth system was very satisfactory where there was a large area. To Mr White: Had no difficulty in getting his recommendations attended to by the present Council As a matter of fact he had not had any occasion to "bump up against them." Further evidence was given by Frederick Cook. Enoch Hallett said that the whole of this area could be served by a sewerage system. Twenty-five years ago this part was practically a swamp and was useless until drained by the Council.

In February 1910, Hastings Loan Proposals. The following is Mr Hallett's amended scheme for disposing of the sewage of Hastings: To the Mayor and Councillors of the Borough of Hastings. Gentlemen, my second, report on the drainage of your Borough, I beg to point out that, instead of making a deviation along Pakowhai road to the junction! of the old and new Ngaruroro River beds at a cost of £4000, it would be advisable to put in a duplicate pumping plant at the northern end of Nelson street, capable of dealing with the whole of the sewage for 20,000 people. Pumping the sewage from the town end of the present sewer during flood time, and, running constantly, pumping sewage from the proposed extension at a level of 4ft below the present sewer. 1. This latter point is important, as it will permit of the whole of the Borough lying to the eastward of the railway line being drained and delivered into a septic tank when it becomes necessary to treat our sewage in that way, and at the same time effect a saving of £2300 on first cost. 2. The part of the borough which cannot be drained by gravitation into the present sewer and proposed extension is that lying to the southward of Gordon road. However, this part can be gravitated to the Southland road and treated separately by pumping into the old sewer. 3 The system therefore which I propose would drain all the borough excepting that part lying southward of Gordon road and lying in a J straight line from the end of Gordon road to Copeland Rd - an area of 271 acres. 4. The other portions of Borough which it is not proposed to serve under the present system are: 191 acres at N.E. corner and 144 acres at S.E. corner, of Borough. 5. The scheme will consist of a deviation of present sewer (10 chains) near its present outfall discharging sewage direct into the Ngaruroro river, about 30 chains above the Pakowhai Bridge; utilising the present sewer from point of deviation to site of pumping station, thence by an 18 inch by 27inch concrete pipe sewer across private property to junction of Karamu Rd and Stanley St; along Stanley St and Grove Rd to Sylvan Rd; along Sylvan road and across private property to Copeland Rd. Lateral sewers will be run along every street in that part of the Borough S.E. of Railway line, excepting about 24 chains in Grove Rd, thus serving every house. The main sewer above mentioned will be run at a level 4ft below present fewer and at its junction therewith a duplicate pumping plant will be put in to lift sewage 20ft, an elevation of at least 3ft above highest known flood level, and deliver into present sewer without exposure. The present sewer having been constructed to carry the sewage of 25,000 people will readily convey the sewage running in both old and new sewers to the outfall. 6. The present sewer with branches will provide an effective service for all streets and roads northward of the railway line excepting the part mentioned in paragraph 2 of this report. 7. The pumping plant provided for lifting sewage from the proposed extension will be so arranged, and will be of sufficient capacity to deal with the total discharge from both sewers when running full, and will be used in time of flood, to ensure a clear run of sewage from the town, completely doing away with the backing up by floods which has caused so much trouble and annoyance in the past. 8. If the Health Department in the future require the septic treatment of our sewerage the pumping station now proposed would become an absolute necessity. 9. The difference in cost of installing a pumping plant and making a mile deviation is £2300 in favour of pumping which amount can be expended in the extension of the system. 16. The working expenses, not including interest and provided we have our own electric power, would not be more than £100 per annum if the full capacity of the pump is worked continuously. I am, etc., Enoch Hallett.

1909 November, William Hart of Hastings - **Population of Hastings exceeds 5000**. Is it entitled to be a registering authority under "The Motor Regulation Act 1908"

1909 November, At Hastings 21st ultimo, from Karamu Rd the property of William Robert Wilson, a roan pony gelding, four years old about 14 hands high, rope-mark round neck, fresh scars round both hind fetlocks caused by tether-rope; value, £10. Also a saddle with new patch on pommel and a bridle, the property of Harry Limmer; value, £1 15s.

1909 November, **New sale yards** - The section at the corner of Queen St east and Karamu Rd nth has been purchased as a site on which to erect sale yards. It is reported that the business of a local auctioneering firm will be purchased by the new company.

1909 November, Death, Mr **Joseph Gigg** b:1882 at Hastings the son of Annie and William Gigg died at the Napier Hospital aged 27. During the past two years Mr Gigg has worked as carter for **Messrs Milburn Bros** and while he was unloading timber at the railway yards he strained his heart. A week later he took to his bed and it was not until the first of this month that it was found necessary to have him removed to the Napier Hospital where he died. A post mortem was held yesterday afternoon medical evidence from Dr. McKibbin, it was discovered that the strain had caused a rapidly swelling cancer, which ultimately caused death. He had married Lily Taylor in Napier six years ago and leaves a wife to mourn his untimely death.



Ernest Alfred Love b: February 1884 in Hastings, the son of Emma and George Love married Mrs Lily Gigg nee Taylor she had married Joseph Gigg in 1903. They had one child together. In 1928 Ernest Alfred Love married Edith Elizabeth Evans b: in January 1881 in Auckland she had married Charles Robert Stuart Pyne in 1903. In 1911 Ernest a butcher, Heretaunga St and Lilly at Lyndon Rd. Ernest Alfred Love died November 1937 in Hastings aged 53 and Edith Elizabeth Love nee Evans died February 1944 in Hawke's Bay aged 63.

1909 November, Mr Thomas William Broadfield b:1832 died at Hastings aged 77 a Crimean and Maori war Veteran and an old and respected resident of Hastings, died suddenly. Following his usual custom he rose from his bed at about 6.15 and left the home of his son-in-law, Mr Arthur Wilson of Avenue Rd, for the purpose of taking his usual morning walk. At about 7.30 he was observed by Mr William Graham of Clive and Mr Alex. James Marshall of Avenue Rd lying in a semi-conscious state at the roadside, about 50 yards from his home. He endeavoured to inform them where he resided, but as he was in a state of collapse, was unable to make himself understood. He expired a few minutes afterwards and the body was removed to the residence of Mr A. Wilson, Deceased arrived in Hawke's Bay about 23 years ago and has resided here ever since. Deceased was possessed of a quiet and kindly disposition and an extremely upright character - in short, he was a soldier and a man. In March 1883 at Napier Private Thomas William Broadfield married Mrs Elizabeth / Collins / Toop nee Willis b: October 1845 in Kent. the daughter of Robert and Sarah Willis. They were married at St. John's Church, Napier by the Rev. C. L. Tuke. Elizabeth had first married Thomas Collins in 1863 in New Zealand, a son Frederick Charles Collins b:1868 at Napier and a daughter in October 1870. Thomas Collins late of Essex England died in May 1870 at the Provincial Hospital in Napier aged 40. Mrs Elizabeth Collins nee Willis then married George Edward Toop at Napier, he died in October 1880 at his residence Milton Rd Napier after a long and painful illness aged 34. Elizabeth and Thomas Broadfield first settled in Taradale where he went bankrupt in December 1883, Children - 1884 Ellen Louisa Sarah Broadfield and 1886 Robert Henry Broadfield were born before moving to Hastings. Thomas applied for a Military Settlers land claim in September 1890 and a Pension at Hastings in June 1899. In September 1900 Mr Thomas Broadfield of Hastings who served with the 70th Regiment in the Crimea, was amongst those invited to the Veterans' dinner given at Government House Wellington. In August 1901 Mr Broadfield was appointed caretaker at the railway crossing in Heretaunga St, to watch the principal crossing from 7.15 am to 6.45 p.m. His wife predeceased him some 13 months ago - Elizabeth Broadfield / Collins / Toop nee Willis had died August 1908 at Avenue Rd Hastings aged 63.

Private Thomas William Broadfield was accorded a military funeral. Laid to Rest according to Military Honours. Flags were flying at half mast on many of the buildings in Hastings to mark the laying to rest of the mortal remains of a Crimean veteran For 12 years Broadfield fought for the Mother Country and upon his arrival in New Zealand, took up arms for the Colony at the time of the Maori war in the Waikato. Throughout his lengthy military career his record was a brave and honourable one To-day he was accorded a military funeral by a younger generation who are preparing themselves to follow, if the occasion arises, in the footsteps of the hero over whom they heard the "Last Post" sounded. The Rev. J. Hobbs met the cortege at the church gate and led the pallbearers, carrying the body of the deceased to the alter, where he held the usual burial service. As the cortege moved out of the church the band played the "Dead March." The Hastings Town Band, under Conductor Berryman marched in front of the hearse and played the "Dead March, in Saul." The following veterans acted as pall bearers; Joseph Thompson (57th foot, Crimea), Thomas Simpson (70th regiment, Maori war, Waikato, N.Z.). A. B. Campbell. (Indian Mutiny and Maori war, N.Z.), W. Heslop (Maori war, N.Z.). The firing party, at the graveside, comprised the following members of the H.B. Mounted Rifles:- Sergt Major Hyde (in command), Reg Bugler Grubb, Reg Q-M Sergt. Frtore. Q-M. Sergr. Heighway, Troopers Hinde. Long. J. McCormick, W. Farrelly and M.J. Tickner.

1909 November, A builders workshop at Havelock owned by Mr R. B. Holmes and occupied by Mr T. Glenwright was destroyed by fire between two and three o'clock on Sunday morning. Mr Glenwright and his workmen lost all their tools. Mr Glenwright had his plant covred in the Australian Alliance for £100 but the workmen's were not insured. The origin of the fire is a mystery and as far as can be ascertained no one was on premises after 4 o'clock on Saturday. The building, which was uninsured, was practically demolished when Mr Davis, who lives next to the workshop, discovered the fire.

1909 November, Thomas Cooper Williams was born in Hastings, the son of Elizabeth and William Henry Williams, he married Helen McGregor in December 1936

1909 November, Eva E. Copland died at Hastings, G. A. Copland, poss daughter of Dr. George Anderson Copland.

1909 December, An inquest was held at Waimarama on the body of **John Donald** aged 75 who was found dead in his bed at Mr G. P. Donnelly's station quarters. Mr Charles Hughes was Coroner and Mr John Hart (station manager) was foreman of the jury. Dr. Tosswill who made a post mortem examination of the body said that death was due to sudden failure of the heart and a verdict in accordance with his evidence was given.





Ernest Albert Shattky was educated at Hastings, began his apprenticeship with Herbert James Webber Chemist in 1906, he qualified and became a partner, In November 1920, they sold Lot 5 of section 142, Napier, 8.01 perches, Herbert James Webber and Ernest Albert Shattky to Francis Henry Lockyer. 1930 he went to London for further studies and was in Melbourne when the 1931 Quake struck, he returned to rebuild the business and was joined by two of his sons, he died 1962. Ernest Albert Shattky died July 1962 in Hastings aged 69, and Janet Bell Shattky nee Tinline died September 1973 in Hastings aged 82.




1909, Heretaunga St east looking east from Railway line, before Westerman's, shows H. Webber (optician and chemist)

















Margaret Rose Moran nee Ireland died September 1924 at Hastings aged 35 and Dominic Moran died October 1940 Auckland aged 74. Dominic's father - Joseph Moran b: 1833 Middlesex Eng, the son of Michael and Bridget Moran. In April 1856 he married Julia Kelly b: June 1837 Middlesex, Eng, the daughter of Mary and John Kelly. They had 11 children - one child born in New Zealand 1875. Joseph Moran died March 1902 Waipawa aged 63 and Julia Moran nee Kelly died January 1915 in Hawke's Bay aged 80.

1910 January, George and Angus George had the private hotel at the corner of Queen St east and Warren St nth, then Robert Arthur Jamieson in 1912


In April 1910, George George was charged with riding a motor bicycle within the Borough of Hastings at an excessive speed. In April 1910, Wanted - Young man as yard-man; also smart boy to peel potatoes. George Private Hotel. Hastings. In December 1911, A fire occurred at the George Private Hotel, Hastings, which fortunately was extinguished before any damage was done. The window curtains in one of the rooms became ignited as a result of a lighted candle bring left too near them. Mr George happened to come into the room and promptly pulled the curtains down and put the flames out. Later became Jamieson's.

They had five sons and five daughters - August 1910 Melva Alexandra Hemmingson born at Havelock she married Abner Ivan Sherwood, 1911 George Henry Hemmingson, June 1913 Archibald Ratima Hemmingsen at Hastings. In 1911 Annie Amelia and Alexander Hemmingsen at 120 Selwood Rd Hastings, his father Lars Peter Hemmingsen a farmer at Southampton St and brother John Henry Hemmingsen a labourer at 213 Southampton St. In 1922 Annie Amelia and Alexander Hemmingsen a labourer at Boundary Rd along with Jane Catherine Burgers Hemmingsen and John Henry a labourer, in 1931 Annie Amelia and Alexander Hemmingsen a labourer at 816 Caroline Rd. The family moved to Central HB. Alexander Hemmingson died August 1949 aged 63 and Annie Amelia Hemmingson nee Hamblyn died July 1973 in Hastings aged 83.

1910, Herbert Pullen was born in Hastings the son of Eileen and Herbert William Pullen. Herbert William Pullen b: 1885 in Dunedin the son of Margaret and Joseph Pullen. In August 1909 at Hastings he married Eileen Imelda Jane Shaw b:1887 in Wellington, the daughter of Mary and Robert Shaw. They had three children at Hastings - August 1912 Maxwell Robert Desmond Pullen he married Joyce Muriel, December 1914 Maurice Francis Pullen he married Joyce Roselin Lynch in May 1946. Herbert William Pullen died November 1929 in Sydney NSW aged 44 and Eileen Imelda Jane Pullen nee Shaw died November 1953 in Hastings aged 66.

1910, **Charles Samuel Palmer** b:1879 Middlesex Eng the son of Thomas and Eliza Palmer married Henrietta Marian Marbrook b: July 1886 in New Zealand the daughter of Frederick Richard and Amelia Marbrook of Hastings. They had two children. Charles Samuel Palmer died October 1953 aged 74, Henrietta Marian Palmer also had a son with John Albert Bush, she died January 1971 aged 84.



1910, John Patrick Lorigan a blacksmith from Tipperary lived at the top of **Lumsden Rd** for awhile. Other early residents listed in Lumsden Rd 1911 Directory, right side from Havelock Rd were - 211 John & Matilda Brien settlers, 311 Henry George & Maggie Hollis also Abigail Hollis a widow, left side - 301 Alexander & Margaret Brook-Taylor settlers, 600 James Hamilton Taylor a farmer and road contractor, 800 Alfred Edward & Caroline Beatrice Clarke, farmers – they later moved to Norton Rd. Alexander & Margaret Brook-Taylor later moved up to 114.

1910, **Jonathon Packer** a labourer of 115 Fenwick St till 1920 then 1923 at 310 Albert St. Jonathan Packer b:1859 in Minety Wiltshire the son of Jane and William Packer, he had six brothers. Jonathon Packer died April 1926 at the residence of William Langley jnr 305 Karamu Rd Hastings aged 67.

William Langley jnr b:1880 in England, the son of William Langley he came out to NZ with his father in January 1895. Around 1909 William Langley jnr married Jessie Elizabeth b:1882. They had one son - 1910 Eldon William Langley he married Doris Evelyn Perfect in 1934. 1914 Jessie Langley c/- Plunket Nurse Hastings and William Langley c/- Plunket Nurse Hastings, 1919 Jessie and William Langley a teamster of Fitzroy Ave Hastings, 1928 Jessie Langley at 302 Fitzroy Ave and William Langley a teamster at 503 Karamu Rd Hastings. William Langley jnr died March 1957 in Hawke's Bay aged 77 and Jessie Elizabeth Langley died July 1952 in Hawke's Bay aged 70.

1910 January, A motor car driven by Mr Alex. Tawse and occupied by Mr F. Gillander, Master Howard Glazebrook, Miss Glazebrook and Miss L. Glazebrook met with a serious accident when reaching a sharp bend in the road at the Waimarama side of the Maraetotara bridge. The car was only travelling at a moderate pace, when rounding the turn, but the steering gear failed to act and the car rolled over a steep siding. After turning over two or three times the car caught up before reaching the bottom of the gully. Master Glazebrook and Mr Gillander were thrown clear of the car. Miss Glazebrook received a terrible shaking and was considerably bruised, white her sister Lilian was pinned beneath the car. The driver (Mr Tawse) got entangled with one of the front wheels, and was unable to extricate himself. Two men who happened to be passing along the road at the time rendered all the assistance they could and afterwards one of them rode to Motopeka and telephoned for Dr. Tosswill who motored to the scene of the accident and attended to the sufferers. Mr John Chambers conveyed the victims to their home at Clive in his motor-car. The Misses Glazebrook are suffering from severe shock, but it is not thought that any bones are broken. The occupants of the car had a miraculous escape from a serious and perhaps fatal accident.

1910 January, Wedding, Douglas – Manson - On New Year's Day a wedding was solemnized at the residence of Mrs H. Pownall, Karamu Rd, the contracting parties being Mr James Forman Douglas of Hastings and Miss Minnie Manson of Lyttelton. The Rev P. Ramsay was the officiating clergyman. The bride was given away by her brother Mr George Manson. Mr Harry Douglas acted as best man. A number of friends were entertained at Mrs Pownall's residence in the evening.



William Dance b: December 1838 in Newbury Berkshire, the son of Elizabeth and Thomas Dance, in July 1862 he married Mary Moss b: June 1843 in Froxfield Wiltshire, the daughter of Hannah and John Moss. They had five children. In 1875 they immigrated to NZ, Mrs Mary Dance nee Moss died as a young mother in November 1875 on board the sailing ship *Hudson.* In 1879 William Dance married Esse Jane Morris. In February 1882 W. Dance of Napier. In February 1904 at St. Saviour's Church, Makotuku by the Rev. W. Lambert, Mr Isaac Dance, son of Mr William Dance of Umutaoroa married Miss Bessie Ormond, third daughter of the late Mr William Ormond of Makotuku. In January 1910 a large number of settlers in the Umutaoroa block met to bid farewell to Mr and Mrs W. Dance who have lately disposed of their property and are leaving the district for Hastings, presenting Mr Dance with a silver watch and gold chain, inscribed 'Presented to William Dance by his friends of Umutaoroa' and a silver teapot for Mrs Dance. William Dance of Jervois St died suddenly aged about 70 years. At about eleven o'clock in the morning Mr Dance left home to gather onions in a garden situate a few chains from his house and it was here that his body was subsequently found, death presumably

being due to heart failure. He leaves a widow. In December 1919 Esse Jane Dance nee Morris died at the residence of her daughter Mrs Peck Ohakune, Jane relict of the late William Dance late of Hastings aged 74 years.

1910 January, Laurence Arthur Meads was born at Hastings the son of Ettie Louisa and William Arthur Meads.

William Arthur Meads b: November 1881 in Leicester England the son of Annie and William Meads in 1907 in 1907 in NZ he married Ettie Louisa Hunt b: April 1882 in Leicester England. They had three children - September 1913 William Stuart Meads at Hastings and January 1922 Dorothea Flora Meads at Havelock North she married Ernest Ross Jensen. In 1914 Ettie Louisa and William Arthur Meads a painter at Havelock North also his brother Charles Henry Meads a painter. William Arthur Meads died September 1971 in Havelock North aged 89 and Ettie Louisa Hunt died August 1972, in Havelock North aged 90.

Charles Henry Meads b; January 1886 in Leicester England the son of Annie and William Meads, In 1914 Charles Henry Meads a painter at Havelock North also his brother William Arthur Meads. In 1915 Charles Henry Meads married Nellie Mitchell b: April 1892 in Balclutha Otago. Nellie Meads nee Mitchell died December 1951 in Havelock North aged 59 and Charles Henry Meads died February 1964 in Havelock North aged 78.

1910 January, Mr McCarthy, S.M, granted old age pensions of £26 to the following:- James Gavin, Ann Gardiner, Catherine Connery, and George W. Setchfield. A pension or £16 was granted to Soren Neilsen.

1910 January, Sydney Liley b: May 1885 the son of Mary and Henry Eli Liley, married Maria MacDonald b: April 1886 in Hastings, the daughter of Cecilia and Donald MacDonald. They had three children - October 1911 Donald Sydney Liley he married Gertrude Evelyn Hall 1938 in Hastings, July 1912 Cyril Charles Liley he married June Marion Paton 1945 in Hastings and August 1916 Cecilia Mary Liley. Sydney Liley a carpenter died September 1958 in Havelock North aged 73 and Maria Liley nee MacDonald died December 1960 in Havelock North aged 74.

1910, Frederick George Liley b: February 1883 in Havelock North the son of Mary and Henry Eli Liley married Winifred Anderson b: April 1885 the daughter of Thomas Anderson. They had one son. Frederick George Liley died June 1923 aged 40 and Winifred Liley nee Anderson died January 1963 aged 77.

1910 January, Valedictory presentation to **Mr Charles Edward Torlesse**. One of those little incidents which occasionally occur to relieve the heavy seriousness of commercial life happened at the **Heretaunga Club** this morning when the clients of the Hastings branch of the Union Bank of Australia met its popular manager Mr C. E. Torlesse and presented to him an illuminated address and a purse of Sovereigns as a slight token of their appreciation of him as a citizen and to express their regret at his departure from the office he has so capably filled since his advent here three or **four years** ago. Mr Torlesse introduced **Mr Kiely** his successor at the bank, and after spending a social half-hour the function was brought to a close by toasting the health of the departing guest and his family.

1910 January, **The staff of the Carlton Club Hotel**, taking advantage of **Mr R. J. Nightingale's** visit to Hastings on Wednesday last, assembled for the purpose of making him a presentation, in token of the high esteem in which they held him. Apologies were received from those whose duties prevented them from attending. The speakers who represented the various departments unanimously expressed their admiration of Mr Nightingale, who had proved himself a conscientious and agreeable fellow-worker. He had come among them practically a stranger, and by his attention to business, straightforward and unassuming manner, had earned the respect of those with whom he came in contact. They expressed their regret that he was leaving the service of the Carlton Club On behalf of the Carlton Club staff, they presented him with a gold sovereign case, suitably inscribed. In responding, Mr Nightingale feelingly referred to his associations with them. It pleased him to know that their best wishes were with him for his future success, wishes which he heartily reciprocated. Mr Nightingale was accorded a hearty farewell at the Railway Station.

The Baptist Church services were first held in a Hall on Market St nth from 1909

The Baptist Church members of the Hastings congregation have purchased a site on the Karamu Rd sth upon which the new church is to be erected and plans for the building are now being prepared by Messrs Rush and James.



The first Baptist Church, Karamu Rd sth at Lyndon Rd, Mr H. B. Hughes delivered his first sermon in Hastings on the first Sunday in February 1910 when the new building was completed, this was replaced by new brick and concrete church around 1917 and the wooden church became a Sunday school hall moved to the rear

1910 February, **New Public streets** - A special meeting of the Borough Council will be held to consider the following resolution: - " That in exercise of the powers conferred on it by Section 175 of The Municipal Corporation Act, the Hastings Borough Council hereby resolves by way of special order that **the following streets be and the same hereby are declared to be public streets of the Borough of Hastings**: Boundary Rd, from Tomoana Rd to Nelson St. Prospect Rd, Stortford St, Davis St, Plunket Rd, Joll Rd, Cook St. Pepper St, Seddon St, Lascelles St, York Rd, Henry St, Southampton St from Charles St to Lascelles St, Eaton Rd, Barden St. Fenwick Rd, Stanley Rd, Arvedsen St, Pattison Rd, Louie St from Park Terrace to South East Boundary of the Borough.

1910 February, Death, McKeown - At Palmerston North Public Hospital Ada Ellen (Nellie) fourth daughter of John and Lucy McKeown, Park Rd, Hastings aged 23 years.

1910 February, Eric Gerald Craw was born at Hastings the son of Bridget Ann and Albert William Craw, he married Gladys Kennedy in 1938. Albert William Craw b: May 1878 in Christchurch the son of Elizabeth and David Craw in 1906 he married Bridget Ann Fitzgerald b:1879. They had three children – August 1911 Cecil Albert Halwyn Craw at Havelock North he married Verna Pepper and 1918 Desmond Clement Craw he died July 1944 in Wellington aged 26. In 1907 Wm Craw at Havelock North, 1917 WW1 Reserves Albert William Craw a fruit grower at Havelock North 2nd Division, 1922 Annie and Albert William Craw a fruiterer Napier Rd Havelock North. (Bert) Albert William Craw died July 1942 in Havelock North aged 64 and (Annie) Bridget Ann Craw nee Fitzgerald died 1958 in Havelock North aged 79, buried in Hastings.

1910 March, Accident - Mr Griffiths snr met with an accident on Saturday evening whilst driving along Southampton St. He was turning the corner into Nelson St when his gig collided with one driven by a Native. Mr Griffiths was thrown on to the road and rendered unconscious. Dr. Barcroft was quickly in attendance and ordered his removal to Nurse Nairn's private hospital after remaining there for a few hours. Mr Griffiths had sufficiently recovered to be taken to his home.

1910 March, Accident - A narrow escape from a big smash occurred in the Railway station yard this morning. Two three-horse teams, which were unloading chaff, became startled at the train and made an attempt to bolt. The animals were secured by the drivers just in time to have them from going over the edge of the loading embankment.

Dr. Bernard Samuel Story b: January 1872 born in Manchester and educated at Edinburgh University, where in addition to qualifying in medicine he took the degrees of M.A. and LL.D. Arriving in New Zealand about 1901, he practised at first at Kaikoura and then for a long period at Hastings. He married Winifredae Pascalinae Pedrazzini b: 1867 in Gloucestershire. They had one son Bernard Ambrose Story he married Tui Parker, in June 1924 and two daughters. Mary Story. 1911 resided in Karamu Rd, 1919 at **Manitoba House** Heretaunga St Hastings. Winifredae Pascalinae Pedrazzini nee Story died November 1923 in Hastings aged 56 and Dr. Story lived with a son-in-law and daughter, Mr and Mrs L. Maher of Pokeno. Dr. Bernard Samuel Story died September 1937 aged 65 and was buried in Hastings.

1910 March, Wedding - John Joseph Cassin third son of Mr John T. Cassin of Hastings and Miss Miriam C. Poppelwell fourth daughter of Mr John Poppelwell of Hastings at the Catholic Church yesterday by the Very Rev Father Keogh.



1910 March, **John Joseph Cassin** b: February 1881 in Napier the son of Jane Reid and John Thomas Cassin at the Catholic Church Hastings he married Miriam Catherine Poppelwell b: August 1889 in Ravensbourne, Otago the daughter of Margaret and John (Jack) Poppelwell. They had six children - 1912 Miriam Grace Cassin, May 1913 Richard John Cassin, August 1914 Allan Joseph Cassin in Hastings married Leonarda (Dina) Nadina Pepe, 1916 Frances Jean Cassin, 1918 Moira Elizabeth Cassin, December 1919 Noel Cassin, June 1925 Leonard Francis Cassin. In August 1908 Mr J. J. Cassin submitted by auction a four-roomed cottage in Lascelles street, the property of Mr L. Taylor. After spirited bidding the property was passed in at £400, but was subsequently sold to Mr G. Carr at a satisfactory figure. In September 1922 September John Joseph Cassin furniture dealer of Station St had a narrow escape from serious injury when riding his bicycle slowly on his proper side along Heretaunga St from the direction of the railway crossing at the Union Bank corner carrying a small parcel of crockery when a motor car driven by Mr Burt was coming at quite a reasonable speed along Heretaunga St from the opposite direction. Passing the Albert Hotel the car made the necessary sweep to enter into Karamu Rd so as to continue on its proper side when by some means the collision occurred on the Union Bank corner. Mr Cassin was knocked down and getting caught with his axel he was dragged some distance. John Joseph Cassin a furniture dealer of 711 Clive St died September 1926 in Hastings aged 45 and Miriam Catherine Cassin nee Poppelwell died September 1961 in Hastings aged 72.








Te Aute College taken in the late John Thornton's time, shows from left the main schoolrooms, dining room, dormitories and headmasters' house

1910 May, Gladys May Brausche was born in Hastings, the daughter of Edith and Charles G. Z. Brausche, she married Raymond Thomas in June 1966 at Hastings, she died in 1986 aged 76.

1910 May, Mrs Beckman's Death. Mr S. E. McCarthy, coroner, held an inquest into the cause of death of Mrs Julia Beckman aged about 33 years, who was found in a weak state in her bed on the night of the 14th inst, at her residence in Heretaunga St when she was removed to **Nurse Nairn's hospital**, where she died the following day of typhoid fever, the doctors being unable to give a certificate of death. Mr W. J. White appeared on behalf of the husband of deceased. J. C. Tosswill, medical practitioner deposed he knew deceased and died of Typhoid. Robert Frank Ballinger a grocer, deposed that his shop was close to that of deceased. Had known her for about three years, and had frequently been in her shop. During the past three weeks he had noticed that she was in ill-health and appeared to be gradually getting worse. Francis B. Moore, furniture dealer, deposed that he had known her for about three years. Frank Walter Tokely, commission agent, deposed he had known deceased about 18 months. Charles Beckman a carpenter and husband of the deceased, who was 33 years of age. Deceased told him not to worry as she was all right. She remained sitting by the fireside nearly all day Saturday. In the afternoon he tried to get someone to serve in the shop and he got Mrs Tokeley and told her his wife was too ill to attend to the shop and was very bad. Ellen May Hughes wife of Charles Hughes had noticed when she was in her shop she was getting very thin and very ill. Mrs Hughes came to see deceased and he told, his wife that two ladies were there and she told him not to allow anyone inside at all. Told Mrs Hughes his wife did not want to see anyone and they went away. Could not say if Mrs Tokeley was present when he gave his wife's to Miss Hughes. Mrs Beckman appeared to be delirious. She made a lot of rambling statements and mumbled. She asked what they were doing there. She said she was afraid there was going to be an operation. She walked out with the help of Mr Beckmen. Mr Beckman said that she did not want to go, that she would rather be attended to at her own house. Mrs Beckman to dress prior to going to the hospital. Witness accompanied her and on the way deceased said; "Poor Charlie will be lonely without me." She told witness she had no relatives here. Mrs Beckman was a Roman Catholic and witness was not satisfied until she saw a priest so that deceased could receive spiritual attention. Constable Dwyer, Frank Walter Tokeley commission agent had known her 18 mths. Francis R. Moore fruit dealer had known her for three years, she had managed the fruit business he saw a great change in her during the last three weeks. The verdict was returned (a) That deceased died from a perforated ulcer brought on by typhoid fever. (b) That, although deceased had been ailing to the knowledge of her husband for about a month before her death, and had been particularly ill during the last fortnight, no doctor had been called in until the police called in Dr Tosswill. (c) This failure to rail in a doc or at an earlier stage of the deceased's ailment considerably lessen her chance of recovery. (d) Deceased had ample opportunity and means of consulting a doctor from her husband, but failed to do so. Though on several occasions she was advised to do

so, by persons other than her husband. (e) Deceased was confined to her bed and entirely under the care of her husband, who in not calling in a doctor was overpersuaded by the deceased.

The bride was attended by Miss Flanders sister of the bridegroom as chief bridesmaid and Miss Elder Shaw, and little Miss Nellie Bennett niece of the bride. The bridegroom was attended by Mr H. Franklin brother of the bride, as best man, and Mr John Fickling as groomsman. 

In 1878 at Napier he married Fanny Pond b: 1849 USA. They had three children. Fanny Plowman nee Pond died April 1920 aged 71 and William Plowman died May 1929 in Napier aged 78. William Plowman of Napier had bought the Hastings a section in 1906. The Hastings Plowman's cordial factory at 509 Heretaunga St east near Willowpark Rd adjoining the Catholic school grounds and Zealandia fish shop, it was the under the supervision of James Napier Plowman b: May 1879 in New Zealand, the son of William and Fanny Plowman. In 1915 he married Phoebe Lydia Brown. They had two children. James Napier Plowman died June 1959 aged 80.



William Plowman & Sons of Napier Aerated Water and Cordial factory was first listed at 500 Heretaunga St east corner of Miller St opp the Catholic church, then at 509 Heretaunga St east – the former old wooden plumbing workshop, which became Clifford John Wilson's panel beater's workshop adjoining the Catholic school grounds, next to Kelly's old narrow wooden Bootmaker's shop – the later the Zealandia fish & chip shop. It poss had rear access off Willowpark Rd

In August 1915, To Let a 5 roomed house in Albert St. Electric light, Apply, Mr A. La Broome, c/o Plowman and Co. Hastings.

In August 1915 Mr A. La Broome, employed at Plowman and Co.'s cordial factory Hastings, met with a painful accident. He was taking two horses to a paddock and one of the animals shying at some object, broke the young man's left arm, around which the leading rope was twisted. He was attended to by Dr. Barcroft and Dr. Robertson, and is progressing as satisfactorily as can be expected. Albert Louis La Broome b: January 1891 NZ the son of Ellen and Louis La Broome. In 1919 he married Mildred Curtis b: June 1895 the daughter of Elizabeth and John Curtis.

In May 1918 Mr Herbert Gregory Plowman an employee bottler of the firm of Messrs Plowman and Co Hastings left for camp, he was farewelled by his fellow employees and presented with a handsome shaving outfit. Mr Geo. Wilson, foreman made the presentation - later manager.

Herbert Gregory Plowman of 610 Oak St Hastings b:1886 the son James and Alice Plowman. In 1916 he married Sarah Jane O'Connor. They had three children. Herbert Gregory Plowman died March 1942 aged 56.



In January 1925, Plowman and Co aerated water manufacturer in Heretaunga St east Hastings was burgled, The safe was lifted and wheeled on a hand trolley to a paddock opposite the Parkvale school where it was broken into, cash and cheques taken valued between £20 and £30. Mr A. W. N. Symons land agent who resides in the vicinity was awakened by the noise of chopping and with his son they investigated the noise but could see anything, at daylight he went to explore and found the safe in the paddock broken open. Messrs Plowman's premises were broken into 18 mths ago.






Ritchie & Co, Thomas Ritchie & Co Heretaunga St, east



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The ole King's Theatre -

1910, The Princes theatre built in1881 held moving pictures by the Star Picture Co to over flowing crowds, but the building was now deemed unsafe by the inspectors due to insufficient fire escape exits and sanitary connivances, so the Hastings Permanent Picture Company was formed as the company considered there was enough room for a picture show at each end of the town and a new King's theatre was constructed in Karamu Rd sth.

1910 May, Mr J. D. Rivers left for Wellington this morning to make arrangements for the purchase of the inside fittings and decorations for the new King's Theatre which is being erected for the Hastings Permanent Picture Company Ltd.



1910 July, The new wooden King's Theatre built on Karamu Rd sth (Civic Square) shows signage - This building being erected for the Hastings Permanent Picture Coy Ltd. R. Sorenson Manager, H. A. Wilson, builder with signage - front and back stalls. The King's Theatre could seat 900, and seats cost - 1/6d, 1/- or 6d, and had the original equipment, the theatre was also used as a land and estate sales venue by C. B. Hoadley and Son Ltd.

Hugh Archibald Wilson b:1868 in New Zealand, the son of Mr Wilson. In 1892 he married Eleanor Olivia Guinea. They had five children during their marriage. Hugh Archibald Wilson a carpenter and Nellie Olivia Wilson of 501 Nelson St, in December 1903 he had built the Farndon Dairy Factory, in September 1906 a motor garage in Station St opposite the Railway Station and April 1907 a large shop building in Karamu Rd, opposite the Gospel Hall for Mr A. Heatley and 1911 the Ballinger Bros building corner Warren and Heretaunga St east.

The Princess theatre on Heretaunga St west was renovated and in 1911 leased to the West Hayward Picture Co and the Princes Permanent Picture Company was formed to install new equipment.

1911 January, The proprietors of the King's Theatre have received advice that their 4 foot fan and motor, which they have imported from England, has arrived in Wellington. It will be installed in the King's Theatre in a few days. This fan is the first of its kind to be erected here. It is guaranteed to take all hot and impure air out of the theatre in five minutes.

In October 1911, The relationship of the partners in the Hastings picture theatre and skating rink was the subject of litigation before the Chief Justice (Sir Robert Stout) yesterday, the parties being **Frederick Charles Hartshorn** and **Joseph Daniel Rivers**, plaintiffs v. **Richard Sorenson** defendant, all of Hastings.



1913, Crystal Pictures, King's Theatre Karamu Rd sth

In February 1913, After three months connected to the main electrical supply it was found cheaper to run their own generator, so the mains were disconnected when some carpenters were making some alterations, the wires were thrown on to the roof of a lean-to shed at the rear of the theatre. A fire later occurred when the live electric mains fused. Constable McLean going off duty noticed the glow before the fire took hold.

In August 1913, Mr Walter Everett the newly appointed manager of the King's Picture Theatre Co, Hastings, assumed his duties yesterday. Later he took over the Fernhill Hotel, Walter Everett died August 1922 aged 51 and Ada Everett died in Hastings August 1930 aged 53.

In July 1915, King's Theatre proprietors: Messrs. J. D. Rivers, F. C. Hartshorn and R. F. Sorenson. Director - W. Everett, Manager.

The King's Theatre closed

In November 1922, Negotiations are a foot for the reopening of the **old Kings Picture theatre** in Karamu Rd depending on the Borough Council issuing the necessary licence and if so, the Kings structure will be completely renovated and brought up to date as a moving picture house.

In November 1922, Messrs **Taggart and Hayden** applied for a public hall licence for the old King's Theatre Karamu Rd to seat **700** people. Superintendant Keith of the Fire Brigade said that subject to the fire escapes being overhauled and an extra escape established by the balcony the condition at King's Theatre met with his approval and the licence was granted.

In September 1923, Tenders for purchase of the King's Theatre picture theatre fittings, equipment, etc, R. D. Brown

In August 1925, The old King's Theatre, Karamu Rd Hastings will be used for drilling purposes until such time as the Drill Hall is restored after the damages caused by the recent fire. 1926 July, Mr Hickson was later in charge of the Drill Hall until July 1926 where they returned to England after twelve years spent in Hastings.

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1910 June, **James Clarke** b: June 1886 at Longlands the son of Isabella and Thomas Clarke married Alice Robbins b: 1880 in Abergavenny Monmouthshire, the daughter of Isabella and John Robbins. They had five children – 1911 Margaret Isabel Clarke, 1913 John Robbins (Rob) Clarke, 1914 Eric James (Dick) Clarke, 1916 William Thomas Clarke and child 1923. Alice Clarke nee Robbins died August 1961 in Hastings aged 81 and James Clarke died August 1968 in Havelock North aged 82.

1910 June, A young man named Schofield, an employee of Messrs Phillips, Wright and Co, was knocked down by a motor car whilst cycling along the Karamu Rd at about 5 o'clock last evening. The car was occupied by Mr Geo-Rowe, draper of Wellington, and was driven by Mr W. Russell of Wanganui. It was proceeding from Napier to Hastings and was met by a dray going in the opposite direction. Schofield and another young fellow were behind the dray. Schofield came out from behind to pass the dray, and through his bike skidding in a rut he collided with the car. The occupants of the car at once pulled up, and sent for Dr. Macdonnell. They then took him to Nurse Nairn's private hospital. Upon inquiry to-day we were informed that his condition was much improved.

1910 June, Another of the old and highly respected early settlers of Hastings passed away this morning in the person of Mr **Theodore Jackson Stanley** aged 72. In 1880 he came to Hastings, and for a number of years followed up the building trade. Before leaving the Old Country, Mr Stanley, as a ship's carpenter, assisted in the building of the historical steamer, the *Great Eastern*. He was a passenger in the first train that ran from Napier to Hastings. At that time Heretaunga St was practically a swamp, and only about a dozen houses marked the township of Hastings. Until 12 months ago he enjoyed perfect health and was always of a jovial and kindly disposition. He leaves a widow, four sons and one daughter, thirty-one grandchildren and 10 great grandchildren. The interment at the Hastings cemetery. Helen Tremlett Stanley nee Jennings died November 1924 at Hastings aged 87.


1911, W. A. Beecroft's old horse paddock sale yards forefront on corner of Queen St east and **Karamu Rd** nth which previously went as far as Hicks Store before the Chinese Laundry was built, later the site of the National Bank. This was

also where the four tall **sentinel Bluegum trees** grew and a Maori whare further along. Across the road a small shack where the Hastings Standard Newspaper office on Station St was removed too and turned into a two story building. Taken before the new brick Tribune building 1911, but shows a corner portion of a wooden building at right edge, later the HB Tribune site, F. C. Tipping & Son General Merchants Insurance Agents on Queen St east left edge, and Williams & Kettles Horse sale rostrum yards diagonal later Public Trust Office site, in 1895 Williams & Kettle advertised their horse sale auctions at Beecroft's Repository, taken from the Grand Hotel 1905c

First Hastings Municipal theatre site offer -

Following the removal of Beecroft's two story residence in 1905 and the partial removal of Beecroft stables in 1907 and then the recent fire in 1909 to the remaining old Beecroft stables – apart from McCormick's stables former Beecroft's Repository on Queen St east, there was now a large portion of empty land behind the Grand Hotel belonging to Messrs E. J. Watt and others -

1910 July, Borough Council. From D. Scannell on behalf of Messrs E. J. Watt and others, owners of the land formerly owned by Mr Beecroft confirming their offer to **present the Council that piece of land** in the centre of their property, measuring 104 by 108 feet, with right-of-way of 33 feet from **Karamu Rd**. The offer was conditional on a **Municipal theatre** of approved design being erected by the Council on the property within a period to be arranged. Should the Council desire it, his clients were prepared to sell to the Council at a price to be arranges that strip of land 32 feet wide adjoining the right-of-way, The Mayor said that the offer was a generous and valuable one and he thought a committee should be set up to go into the matter. – This offer did not evolve.

1910 July, Hastings Fire - The efficacy of the chemical fire engine was fully demonstrated last, night. An outbreak occurred in an old **two-storey block of buildings next to the Grand Hotel**. The fire had burned through from the ground to the upstairs rooms. The doors and windows were kept closed, and chemicals quickly extinguished the flames. Had it failed, the whole block must have gone.

1910 July, William George Archer was born at Waimarama the son of Charlotte and William Archer. (Bill) William George Archer died April 1988 in Hastings aged 77. In 1906 **William Archer** married Charlotte Cartwright in NZ. William Archer died in NZ and Charlotte Archer nee Cartwright died January 1964 in Hastings aged 84.

1910 July, William Hamilton Speer b: January 1885 in Clive the son of Sarah and Samuel Speer married at Presbyterian Manse, Market St Hastings, Ivy Beatrice Harmer b: November 1886 the daughter of Mary and Charles Harmer of Wairoa. She had a son - 1909 John Harmer at Hastings, July 1910 Beatrice Harmer Hastings. Children - May 1911 Mearl Teresa (Merle) Speer she married Eric John Collins in 1951, 1913 a baby Speer and April 1914 Kathleen May Speer. William Hamilton Speer died in September 1939 in Hastings aged 54 and Ivy Beatrice Speer nee Harmer died July 1962 aged 75.

Charles Albert Harmer b:1835 in Middlesex, Eng the son of Marian and James Harmer in May 1875 at Wairoa he married Mary Puti (Manapouri) Lewis b: 1855 the daughter of Koko and William Lewis. They had nine children at Wairoa - January 1876 Edwin James Harmer he first married Ellen Lily McKennie at Hastings, October 1878 Alice Mary Harmer she married Thomas Alexander Pearse in July 1897, November 1880 Arthur James Harmer he had two sons and four daughters with Nori Tamihana, November 1886 Ivy Beatrice Harmer she married William Hamilton Speer in July 1910 at Hastings. Charles Albert Harmer died July 1894, in Wairoa aged 59 Mary Harmer moved to Hastings, 1922 Mary Harmer a widow at 503 Park Rd, Mary Puti (Manapouri) Harmer nee Lewis of 501 Eastbourne St Hastings died November 1930 aged 75.

1910 July, Charles Wells of Hastings notified he would not be responsible for any debts contracted by his wife. **Charles Thomas Wells** a butcher b:June 1879 in Clive, the son of Elizabeth Anne and George Wells. In May 1901 at Gisborne he married Eva Langley b: April 1878 in Launceston, Tasmania. They had five children – February 1902 Charles Thomas Wells, September 1904 Constance Marion Wells she married Sedgwick Stancer Alexander Forbes in

June 1926, October 1907 Archibald Angus Wells he had four children with Daphne Isobel Pursell and January 1915 John William Langley Wells. In October 1914 Charles Wells of Clive filed a petition in bankruptcy attributed his position to illness in his family. Two of his children have been in the hospital for weeks, and one, a little girl eight years of age was constantly under the care of the doctors, examined under X Rays and operated on, finally having her leg amputated at the hip. The war had interfered with his employment and on being pressed by some of his creditors, he had to borrow the money to file. In November 1914 Charles Wells was charged with committing an assault on a female, he had been under the influence of liquor and had kissed Mrs Heren. In 1915 charged with default of maintenance. Eva Wells nee Langley died October 1929 aged 51. Charles Thomas Wells married Alice May Middleton, they had two children. Charles Thomas Wells died June 1957 in Auckland aged 78.

1910 July, Kathleen Jean (Tupp) Richdale was born at Hastings the daughter of Eliza and James Richdale of Napier, she married Bradley Lovel Bliss in April 1935 at Napier. **James Richdale** b: June 1870, in Kihikihi Waikato, in June 1910 he married Eva Blanche Bayliss b: November 1876 in Otago the daughter of Harriet and John Bayliss of Hastings. Eva Blanche Richdale nee Bayliss died September 1939 in Waimarama aged 62 and James Richdale

1910 July, Edward Patrick Reilly was born at Hastings the son of Nora Nita and Edward Patrick Reilly, he had one son with Lorna Mary Reilly in 1931. **Edward Patrick Reilly** b: 1880 in Dunedin, Otago the son of Mary and Peter Reilly, he had one son with Nora Nita MaGrath b: 1881 the daughter of Caroline and John MaGrath. Nora Nita Reilly nee MaGrath died in 1938 aged 57 and (Ted) Edward Patrick Reilly died December 1958 aged 78.

Arthur William Wade b: August 1870 at Gisborne the son of Mary Jane and John William Wade. 1910 August, John Duncan Matthews died at Station St, Hastings aged 3, the youngest and dearly loved son of Joseph and Julia Matthews.

1910 August, Resident District Health Officer. A deputation comprising Dr. Macdonnell, Dr. McKibbin and Dr. Wilson waited on the Council for the purpose of urging upon the Council the necessity of the appointment by the Government of a resident medical health officer, at least; during the carrying out of the sewer extension works in Hastings and asked the Council's assistance in the matter.

1910, The Union Bank of Australia - Mr Charles Edward Torlease manager and Mr Frederick L. Columb accounts manager.

1910 September, Hastings Borough Council - Complaint from John Hayes a settler of Warwick Rd asking the council to take steps to prevent the flooding of his property which he alleged was caused by water flowing from the drain on the west side of the railway line through 18 inch pipes. Cr Styles, Smith and McCormick were appointed to inspect and report to the Council.


1910 September, Hastings Fire - A fire occurred at Pukahu at about 9.30 on Saturday evening, which resulted in the total destruction of a five-roomed house belonging to and occupied by **Mr W. Lane.** It appears that a child had been put to bed in the early part of the evening and a light left burning in the room. Mrs Lane was afterwards engaged baking and Mr Lane was chopping wood at the back of the house. A crackling noise was heard in the bedroom and Mrs Lane called her husband, who upon entering the bedroom found the room in flames. He rescued the child and removed it to a place of safety and he and his wife had only time to save a few personal effects and a few articles of furniture before the building suffered total destruction. The house was insured in the South British office for £90, and the furniture in the same office for £30. Mr Lane is a considerable loser.

1910 September, A well known Maori Chief - Paramena Onezone died at Paki Paki aged 90 – A large number of Maori visited Hastings to attend the tangi, top removing the coffin, bottom the funeral service. Poss taken at Waipatu Pa

In June 1910, I - W. Karaitiana of Hastings, have been appointed by Paramena Tamakorako also of Hastings to be his Lawful Attorney as from the 31st day of May 1910. The deed delegating the Power of Attorney is open for inspection at the office of Messrs Arrowsmith and Black, Taihape; or upon application to myself at Waimarie, Hastings.

1910 October, Norman Edward Beck was born in Hastings the son of Anna and Henry John Beck, he married Alice Harbinson in 1935. **Henry John Beck** b: May 1878 in NZ the son of Amanda Eliza and Rev William Henry Beck, in 1906 he married Anna Brown b: July 1880 in NZ. They had three children. Henry John Beck died November 1940 aged 62 and Anna Beck nee Brown died NZ.

The horse was stopped in King St opposite the Vicarage. Both the vehicles had their splash boards broken, but otherwise were not very badly damaged. The horse attached to the gig was cut about the back legs. The boy escaped with a severe shaking and a fright.

As before stated Chief Judge Jackson Palmer and Judges Rawson and Wilson, of the Native Appellate Court, visited the locality on Tuesday to inspect a block of 50 acres fronting the seaside, which it is proposed to convert

into a watering place, and over which a dispute between the executors of the late Mrs Donnelly and Miss Meinertzhagen is being heard by the Court at Wellington. Messrs A. L. D. Fraser and T. W. Lewis are appearing in the case for the executors of the late Mrs. Donnelly.





In August 1917, The well-known plumbing business of John Fear 'The People's Plumber' Karamu Rd, Hastings has changed hands. For the future it will be under the proprietorship and control of Mr R. S. Carty, manager. John Fear will still have charge of the practical and outside work. - 1911 February, Mr David Scannell has received a cable from Mr Ernest Beecroft dated Buluwayo, stating that his father, Mr W. A. Beecroft died on the 12th inst.
- 1911 February, **William Arthur Beecroft** died in Norfolk England The many friends of Mr W. A. Beecroft will regret to hear the news of his death, advice having been received in Hastings by cablegram this morning. Mr Beecroft was a resident of Hastings for over a quarter of a century, during which time, he owned the well-known stables in Queen St, known as Beecroft's Repository, the Hastings-Havelock 'bus service, and the Lucknow stables at Havelock. For a number of years Mr Beecroft was a member of the Hastings Borough Council and he was also an enthusiastic member of the Hastings Bowling Club. Some four or five years ago, Mr Beecroft disposed of his business and went to reside in Sussex, England, still retaining considerable business interests in Hastings. Mr Beecroft was predeceased by his wife by a number of years, and leaves two daughters and three sons, including Mr Webb Beecroft of Napier.
- 1911 February, Mr F. W. Fitzpatrick, J. D. Donovan, A. Hyde, and D. Donovan, **proprietors of billiard saloons** in Hastings, again drew the attention of the Council to the injustice of closing billiard saloons at 10 o'clock, and applied for a reduction in the license fee to £2/9/-. In reply to the Mayor the Town Clerk said that the best course for the Council to take would be to frame a resolution embodying all the proposed amendments to the new by-laws, and include the am ended by-law allowing the billiard; rooms to remain open till 10.30. The Mayor said that in the meantime the saloons could **keep open till 11 p.m**. Cr. McCormick said that there was necessity to interfere with the existing by-law dealing with billiard saloons. As far as he was aware no one had asked for it. The next thing would be the introduction of a curfew bell telling people what hour to go to bed. It was decided, on the motion of Cr. McCormick, to grant permission to the billiard saloon keepers to keep open till 11 p.m., the police, to be asked not to take action.
- 1911 February, Death Cosmos Michael Lee Ryan, died at Lyttelton (the result of an accident slipped, fell on Steamer hitting head) The youngest son of Martin and Katherine Ryan of Heretaunga St, Hastings.
- 1911 February, Enterprising Hastings businessmen Messrs. **R. H. and H. G. Milburn** have recently purchased over 2000 acres of Kawau Island, the lovely island home of the late Sir George Grey. They intend farming at the island includes about 16 miles of coast line containing some of the finest oyster beds of the district.
- 1911 February, A load of timber weighing about two tons and drawn by Newrick's traction engine, left Messrs. Holt and Sons' yards for Waimarama. When opposite the Fire Station in Eastbourne St east the engine driver took his load to one side of the road to allow a vehicle to pass. The result was that the front wheel of the lorry crashed through a boarded-in hole about two feet deep, covering a fire plug used by the Fire Brigade for practising purposes. Before the engine could be brought to a standstill the body of the lorry was completely torn away from the axle and the conveyance collapsed. The timber was subsequently transferred to another vehicle and after a delay of some hours the journey was resumed.
- 1911 February, This morning a saddle horse bolted from the direction of the railway crossing in St. Aubyn St and collided with a butcher's cart opposite the corner of St. Aubyn St and Warren St. The force of the impact snapped the point of one shaft of the cart and broke the belly-band. Mr Dillon, who was driving the cart, was thrown heavily to the ground and stunned. Dr. Storey attended the sufferer, who was conveyed home in a dazed condition. Mr Dillon, who is only just recovering from an illness, received some very nasty bruises and suffers from severe shock. The full extent of his injuries were not ascertainable this morning, but no serious results are anticipated. The butcher's horse received some ugly gashes on the fore-feet, and the saddle horse had to be taken to a veterinary surgeon to have some gaping wounds stitched.
- 1911 February, Mr Frank Percy, who has been three years with Messrs. H. Williams and Sons, the well-known ironmongers, is leaving the Hastings branch to take up duties, after a holiday, with the firm's Napier branch.
- 1911 February, A private wire was received in Hastings to-day stating that **Mr Francis Hicks** died suddenly at Cambridge on Monday from heart failure. Mr Hicks was very well known in Hastings, in fact it was claimed that he was the **"father of Hastings."** Though this title was disputed, he certainly was one of the first Europeans to settle in this town. It is only three weeks ago since Mr Hicks was in Hastings visiting old friends after an absence of thirty-six years.
- 1911 February, Mr Peterson, representing Messrs. Wirth's Circus, writes asking us to let the public know how the Hastings Borough Council is going to treat his circus when it visits the town. "They want to charge us £7/10/- license for one night, while the theatre license for one year is only £10. The Hastings Council is the only one in the whole of Australasia to charge such a price. Last time Wirth's visited Hastings, the license was only £5. The Wirth Brothers are at a tremendous expense in bringing such a big show and when it is considered that the menagerie, which includes the

living hippopotamus Lizzie, will afford the children of Hastings a splendid object lesson, the local Council might give us a little more encouragement." At the railway shunting yards provided a large field of pleasure for the ubiquitous small boy during the unloading of Wirth's circus this morning, and the fact that the school holidays had been extended a week allowed the youngsters to assemble en masse. The animals comprising Wirth's menagerie, and particularly the largest of all quadrupeds -the elephant caused an unusual commotion among equines at Hastings this morning. In one instance, a team of seven horses attached to a station wagon and driven by a native had just entered the railway yards by the Heretaunga St entrance, when one of the monsters unobediently appeared from behind a truck. The horses immediately swerved round, and it looked a guinea to a gooseberry that the paling fence would have to go but with the lock jammed and the body of the wagon tilting sideways, the native, balancing himself on one leg stuck manfully to his guns, and by a skilful handling of the ribbons, succeeded in negotiating the gate by the closest of shaves. The frightened steeds were under control opposite Roach Bros establishment. Passers-by who witnessed the incident, consider that the manner in which the native engineered his team was little short of marvellous.

1911 February, Eliza Horne nee Stone died at Hastings aged 62 the wife of Thomas Horne. At the residence of her daughter, Mrs W. Stone, Avenue Rd Hastings, Eliza, beloved wife of Thomas Home; aged 62 years. The funeral will leave Avenue Rd for the Hastings cemetery.

1911 February, Death, Wilkins - At his residence, Avenue Rd, after a long illness, James Edwin, dearly beloved husband of Alice Wilkins, aged 43 years. The funeral will leave his late residence for the Hastings cemetery.

1911 March, The death occurred at the Carlton Club Hotel, Hastings yesterday of Mrs Coulson, who arrived here about a fortnight ago on a visit to her son, an employee of Mr A. H. Russell at Twyford. Deceased had arranged to take a house in Pepper St with her daughter and son and her furniture arrived from the South on Saturday. The cause of death was cancer, for which the deceased went under an operation at Wellington some months ago. The funeral took place this afternoon.

1911 March, We regret to chronicle the death of Mrs Emily Bridgman, wife of Mr William Bridgman, the well-known sheep farmer, which took place at Longlands yesterday, as the result of a premature confinement. Deceased was the daughter of Mr R. Meredith of Waimate, late M.P. for Ashley, and her death at the early age of 36 years is extremely regretted. The funeral will take place at Hastings. Mr and Mrs Meredith will reach Hastings to-morrow evening. **William Bridgman** died at Hastings August 1942.

The Ballinger Brothers -



1911 March, Ballinger Brothers - Among the many signs of the rapid advancement of Hastings is the latest enterprise of Messrs. Ballinger Bros., grocers and provision merchants, whose business has increased with such magnitude during the past few years as to now necessitate their removing into more commodious and up-to-date premises. The firm has been fortunate in securing the handsome, new building recently erected by Mr H. A. Wilson builder, at the corner of Heretaunga St and Warren St adjoining the old John Farrelly building, and the staff has been busily engaged for several days in making preparations for the opening of the shop. Messrs. Ballinger Bros. method of conducting their business is on the cash basis and it is owing to this fact that they have met with such success since starting in Hastings four years ago, and are now enabled to offer to the public groceries and provisions at prices unequalled in Hawke's Bay. They were the pioneers of the reformed cash system in this province, and how far their efforts have been crowned j with success is to be found in the enormous volume of trade they transact, and from the fact that their method is thoroughly appreciated by public. We congratulate Messrs. Ballinger Bros, on their enterprise, and trust it will result in a still further enhanced support and the reaping of a golden harvest. The building, which has a 33ft frontage with a depth of 70ft, is mainly composed of ferro-concrete and steel throughout, and has been built on the most up-to-date lines. The steel construction work and designing was entrusted to Mr G. W. Bertinshaw engineer of Wellington. The front portion of the building consists of 12 rods manufactured into three beams, there being a single span of 32ft between the piers and also an extra-large one, which Mr. Bertinshaw says is; the largest one he had ever designed. The reinforcement in the span is composed or 12 full-length 1/4 in indented steel bars manufactured into three separate beams placed side by side 12in wide and 12in deep, surrounded by concrete making it altogether 16in by 48in which is considered strong enough to carry two storeys. The front entrance to the shop, is from Heretaunga St, and another means of ingress and egress can be obtained from Warren St. The main entrance is beautifully tiled with 4000 white hexagon-shaped pattern tiles, having an exquisite border round, the name "Ballinger's" being artistically worked in the centre of the slab. These had to be procured by Mr Wilson in Sydney. On entering the shop the first thing that strikes the eye is the massive pillar (composed of six 1½ inch steel bars encased in concrete and finished to a very fine surface with Keene's cement, which supports the concrete ceiling. The ceiling itself shows the heavy reinforced beams which carry the top floor, which is a solid mass of concrete 9in thick. The shop is 32ft by 40ft, inside measurement, and has counters on each side, with in office at the left-hand side and sky light in centre of ceiling. In the office is an upraised desk, on which is the cash register, which a works in conjunction with the patent cash railway. The latter has three stations, one at the provision counter and the other two at the grocery counter. In the centre of the shop, around the huge pillar, are nicely-arranged goods of every description. The shop is very commodious, and is eminently suited for Messrs Ballinger's grocery business. Every appliance necessary for their trade has been installed by the proprietors. The interior is lighted by gas-inverted Earlswood lamps of 300 candle-power each - and the exterior by four Lux lamps of 1000 candle-power each. The whole frontage to both streets is of plate-glass, with the exception of the pillars dividing the plates. The measurement of glass is 585 ft. top portion of the show windows is composed of imperial glass, and underneath the window are 6 inch majolica tiles with a light green ground and coloured pattern. Each window is replete, with a magnificent display of the firm's goods for sale, and these have very arranged by Mr Fred Snelling, a member of the staff. Window dressing is an art and Mr Snelling has plainly demonstrated that he has acquired this art to perfection. The roof of the building, which acts as a balcony, is composed of steel reinforced concrete, having a floor space of 93ft by 12ft. On the roof, in the vacant spaces by the hood of the stairway are lavatories, etc. The verandah, which goes right round the building, is also of imposing appearance. The ceiling of the verandah which goes right round the building is also of imposing appearance. The design is by Mr Wilson and is moulded in steel pattern, which leaves an imprint as natural as steel itself. The builder, Mr H. A. Wilson has added further lustre to his high reputation for first-class workmanship, of which the handsome structure stands out prominently as at splendid monument, while also acting as a handsome ornament to the town. Mr Larcombe a

well-known Wellington architect has expressed a high opinion of the work, informing Mr Wilson that it is better than any in Wellington. This opinion has also been expressed by numerous travellers, who go so far as to say that the building is the best of its kind in New Zealand. Unfortunately, this business did not last long.

In August 1912, a special auction sale by Messrs. C. R. Wilson and Co are holding tomorrow on behalf of Ballinger Bros, Ltd. (in liquidation). Everything must be sold, including the lease, horse, carts, fittings, etc.

In June 1912, Charles Begg and Co Ltd., the piano people, opened a branch in Heretaunga St Hastings.

In October 1912, Kinsler and Sons, Hastings Lace curtains, bedspreads, etc, at (late Ballinger Bros. shop)

In November 1912, Chas Begg and Co Ltd opened an agency in the premises previously occupied by Ballinger Bros. Ltd.

In 1916 the Ballinger building was occupied by A1 Stores, George Hilliker, manager

In January 1919, Mrs Ballinger Dressmaker, Station St Hastings, begs to notify her customers that she has moved to No. 411 Nelson St (opposite Ford Motor Garage)

In February 1919, In Memoriam. Ballinger - In loving memory of Private A. P Ballinger died at Leura, N.S.W. February 28th 1918, as a result of wounds received at Lone Pine. In-law, Olive Ballinger and family.

In 1920's the Ballinger building was occupied by their old partner Yates & Co, grocery - called Yates corner Yates & McPhail

And in 1930 prior to the quake it was Lockers Music store, for pianos



1912 November, Tourist Motor Co. Ltd., are moving to their new garage at the corner of Queen and Market Sts. Hastings. The new garage is the finest appointed in Nev. Zealand and is capable of accommodating over 80 cars.

1916, WW1 - William Vickery Blake b: March 1895 the son of John Thomas Blake was a machinist at Tourist Motors Co, Market St Hastings, he was married to Enid Merle Castle of 502 Alexandra St.

1916 August, Mr. W. E. Hyslop, managing director of the Tourist Motor Co. Ltd., Hastings. Hawke's Bay Gift of a Tank accepted by War Office. Supplied from Tourist Motor Co Ltd. Landed one of the famous machines, complete with three trailers for transport purposes and intimated that the "tank" would be more useful at the front than in New Zealand at the present time. He said that his firm would be prepared to allow it to be sent to France. The tank (which is now the nickname of the 75h.p. Holt caterpillar tractor) was doing such fine work on the Western front.

1918 October, Mr J. Johnston of the Tourist Motor Co., Hastings, received advice from the Defence Department this morning, that his brother. Private T. Johnston has been missing since September 30th.

1922 March, Miss Rackley who for the past five years has been associated with clerical staff of the Tourist Motor Company Ltd Hastings is leaving for Picton. Mr W. E. Hyslop managing director of the company. Miss Rackley is moving to Picton with her parents – Mr Evan Rackley was station master at Hastings was transferred to Picton.

1922 September, Hastings Fire - The Tourist Motor Company Hastings who had three cars and a number of cases of accessories as well as other property badly damaged as the result of the late fire on their premises in Market St estimate their loss at £3,000 the Insurance on the entire stock was £29,000. A large crowd attended the auction sale at Tourist Motor Company's garage auctioned by Messrs Gill Bros on behalf of the insurance Company for the salvage stock of fire damaged cars, motorcycles and hundreds of sundry motoring items.

In July 1924, Mr H. G. Davies architect has accepted the tender of Mr J. W. C. Monk for additions to the Tourist Motor Company's garage in Hastings. The new building extension will exceed 24,000ft.

In October 1926, Mr Jas Rule formerly on the staff of Messrs Adams Ltd Christchurch accepted an appointment as works manager for the Tourist Motor Co Ltd Hastings. Mr Rule is an automobile genius who has played a conspicuous part in the early history of NZ motoring, being personally responsible for the running and adjusting of the Humber, Talbot and Minerva cars when they literally swept the board in the South Island reliability hill climbing and petrol consumption trials of 1905 and 1907. Mr Rule has been connected closely with the workshop end of the business ever since.

In November 1934, Mr W. Hyslop of the Tourist Motors Co Ltd has just imported a handsome Pierce- Arrow, 7 passenger Custom Sedan with a twelve cylinder engine at one hundred and seventy five horse power especially ordered for a wealthy Napier man. The car is capable of 100mph.

PS - I recall seeing a feature article on a twelve cylinder car and around 1972 at Havelock North seeing the car - Toogood's new apple cider factory called the Big Apple Production Ltd. It was a smooth sounding big old car in mint condition - poss the same one.

1911 April, Wedding – Beatson – Gaisford, **George Duncan Beatson** the son of John Beatson an early settler with a wool business and a farm, Mr & Mrs John Beatson of Riverslea Hastings to Muriel Mary Helen Gaisford only daughter of Mr Henry Gaisford of Oringi Dannevirke b:1884. They had three sons - Henry & George Gaisford. George Duncan Beatson died 1956 aged 77 at Dannevirke, he was a leading amateur rider and one of New Zealand's leading horsemen, successful owner and trainer of racehorses, Master of the Hawke's Bay Hunt (1925-35), President of Hawke's Bay Jockey Club (1931-41), executive member of the New Zealand Racing Conference (1933-41), farmer on his property "Riverslea" and subsequently (from 1945) on his property Ohukia Station, Dannevirke, which was originally part of the Gaisford holding "Oringi", his wife Muriel Mary Helen Beatson nee Gaisford died February 1978. Survived by wife and 2 sons, brothers John and Norman, a sister Mary Grier Rainbow.

1911 April, The wedding of Miss Ida Jane Glazebrook and Mr A. J. Tawes is announced to take place at Easter. **Alexander James Tawse** b: December 1879 in Wanganui the son of Laura and Alexander Tawse. In April 1911 in Clive he married Ida Jane Glazebrook b: August 1885 the daughter of Emma Jane and Henry James Howard Glazebrook. They had two children and resided at Waimarama In 1919. Alexander James Tawse died January 1942 aged 62, and Ida Jane Tawse nee Glazebrook died November 1960 in Central Hawke's Bay aged 75.

1911 April, Death, Begley - At Napier Hospital, Michael James dearly beloved son of Michael Begley of Hastings, aged 24 years. The Funeral will leave his parents' residence. Riverslea Rd Hastings for the Catholic Church and Hastings cemetery.

1911, The HB A & P Society purchased the Nelsons land at **Tomoana**.

- 1911, **Francis Bethell** b:1848 Wiltshire the saddler was last listed at Hastings between the Carlton Club Hotel and Matthew Johnsons. Motorcars were now beginning to replace saddle makers. He went up to Avondale to his brother John Bethell. He visited Hastings in 1915 and in 1926 he owned the large house and property on the southern corner of Karamu Rd sth at Pattison Rd, opposite Mr A. G. Hullett's large house, he died at his brother's residence at 2154 Great North Rd in June 1936 at Avondale aged 88.
- 1911 May, **Arthur Thomas** aged about 35 years, employed at the Tomoana Freezing Works, attempted suicide at his residence in Karamu Rd, Hastings. Thomas was seen about 10 p.m. going in the direction of Hastings, calling for someone to go for a doctor and was subsequently found on the veranda of Dr. Story's house with an ugly gash across the throat, from four to five inches long, which barely missed the jugular vein. Dr. Story put nine stitches in the wound, and about midnight the man was sent to the Napier Hospital. It is stated that Mrs. Thomas was away from home when her husband committed the rash act, and that a bottle containing liquor was found on a table at the house. It is further conjectured that Thomas repented after inflicting the wound and set out to go for medical aid, and on reaching Dr. Story's veranda, collapsed from loss of blood. He was formally charged at the Hastings Police Court this morning with attempting to take his life, and on the application of Sergeant Hogan was remanded to appear on Friday May 19. Thomas is still an inmate of the Hospital and did not appear at the Court.
- 1911 May, Police Sergeant **John James Hogan** was stationed at Hastings for 18 years. Born April 1867 at Emerald Hills, Melbourne Vic, he went to Ireland where he was educated and then came with his parents to New Zealand. He joined the Permanent Artillery in New; Zealand and transferred to the Police Force in July 1893. In 1900 in NZ he married Alice Elizabeth Cox b: April 1876 Courtenay, Canterbury the daughter of Dinah and John George Cox. Children 1905 John George Hogan, and November 1906 Garrett Hogan. In March 1907 he was promoted to the rank of sergeant and then transferred to Auckland. After a short period there he went to Hastings. He was extremely popular officer and when he was transferred to Rotorua in 1928 he was given a public farewell. He was a member of the Hastings Bowling Club while in that district. He died July 1940 in Wellington after a short illness aged 73 and Alice Elizabeth Hogan nee Cox died August 1945 in Wellington aged 68.
- 1911 May, 21 years from 1890 The Railway Reserve business lease sites along Station St, later named Russell St were originally for a term of seven years, but were auctioned off 1911 for a term of 21 years with an expiry date for April 1932 and 21 years continued right of renewal for 21 years, but no compensation for improvements under the Government Railways Amendment Act 1910, No 2.
- 1911 May, Mr Harry Golding, a very old resident of Havelock North, met with a serious accident in Hastings about midday to-day. It appears that he was stepping over the channelling opposite **Mr Morrison's fruit shop**, when he dropped his tobacco pipe, which rolled near the feet of a horse attached to a trap standing close by. In stooping to pick up his pipe Mr Golding lost his balance, and rolled over between the horse's feet. This caused the animal to take fright, and being tethered to a post, it mounted the footpath, dragging the wheel of the vehicle over Mr Golding's head. The unfortunate man was carried into Messrs **Blomfield and Co.'s pharmacy** in an unconscious condition, and was promptly attended to by Dr. Wilson. The extent of the injuries are not yet ascertainable.
- 1911 May, Mr Edgar Lys of Hastings who was operated on in Napier Hospital for appendicitis, is in rather a critical condition, but he recovered.
- 1911 May, Mearl Teresa (Merle) Speer was born in Hastings the daughter of Ivy Beatrice and William Hamilton Speer, she married Eric John Collins in 1951. **William Hamilton Speer** was born January 1885 at Clive the son of Sarah and Samuel Speer. In July 1910 he married Ivy Beatrice Harmer b: November 1886 in Wairoa the daughter of Mary and Charles Albert Harmer. Rounding the corner mentioned above, the horses made for different sides of a telegraph pole and a lamp post and when the halter gave way under the heavy strain upon it, both equines were thrown heavily on to the road. One escaped injury, but the other was unable to stand up, having ricked its back. After being attended to by Mr A. M. Brodie it was removed to a paddock and in all probability it will have to be destroyed. It is valued at about £30.





1911 August, The committee appointed to consider the question of narrow streets and the Karamu Rd extension reported as follows - Karamu Rd Extension - **Mr J. Harris**, the owner of the land through which it is proposed to **extend Karamu Rd to Murdoch Rd** was in attendance at the meeting. He stated that he did not wish to subdivide his property, neither did he want the proposed extension carried out, but if the council wanted the land he was prepared to sell at the

rate of £200 per acre, the council to fence off and construct the road. In regard to this matter, your committee has no recommendation to make.

1911 August, Town Clerk John Collinge Retires - After a quarter of a century spent in public service, Mr John Collinge, Town Clerk of Hastings, yesterday relinquished the position which he has so faithfully and honourably filled. When the late Mr McLeod resigned the position of clerk, Mr Collinge was appointed in his place, and held the position till the formation of the Town Board, a period of two years under the Mayoral regime of Mr Robert Wellwood being the first Mayor of the town for two years in succession when Hastings was first designated a borough, it being recorded in the minutes of the meeting of the first council, that his appointment, which dates from October 20th 1886, was confirmed on the motion of Crs. Tanner and Ellis. Mr T. Tanner of Havelock North and Mr George Ellis now a resident of Auckland. Since then Mr Collinge has served under no less than nine different Mayors - Messrs. R. Wellwood, G. Ellis, H. Burnett, C. A. Fitzroy from 1894 to 1899, W. Y. Dennett, W. Lane, T. J. Thompson, J. A. Miller and the present Mayor, Mr James Garnett. The Borough Solicitors Mr. E. H. Williams and W. J. White. Lawyers in Hastings said whenever they were in doubt regarding municipal law they went to Mr Collinge for advice. Mr E. H. Williams, Borough Solicitor, had known Mr. Collinge officially since 1894. He has seen Hastings grow from an insignificant country village to one of the most prosperous inland towns in the Dominion. Mr Collinge possessed a knowledge of municipal matters and by-law intricacies that would be hard to equal and impossible to excel, a fact which prompted ex Mayor Dennett to remark on one occasion that he (Mr Collinge) was a "walking encyclopaedia" He has always been courteous and obliging in. the discharge of his duties, and in this respect the press reporters owe to him a deep debt of gratitude. Although relinquishing the office of Town Clerk, Mr Collinge will not altogether sever his connection with municipal work for several months, his services having been retained as assistant-Town Clerk. In this position his knowledge will be of great value to the Hastings Borough Council, as well as to his successor - Mr Cook. His Worship concluded by asking Mr Collinge's acceptance of a gold watch and chain, his (Mr Collinge's) portrait in oils to be hung in a prominent position in the Council Chambers, and a travelling rug, and wished him many years of happy retirement. The watch was inscribed as follows: "Presented to Mr John Collinge by the citizens of Hastings on the occasion of his retirement from the position of Town Clerk."

VALEDICTORY - PRESENTATION TO Mr John Collinge, who retires from the position of Assistant Town Clerk and Receiver of Rates at Hastings at the end of the present month, was met by the members of the borough outside staff at the Council Chambers last evening, and presented by the Mayor (Mr J. Garnett) on their behalf, with a handsome eight day hall clock. In making the presentation, His Worship said the men desired to show in a small way their appreciation of Mr Collinge's kindness and courtesy to them, and of his kindness to assist them when the occasion arose, at the same time performing his duty to the ratepayers. These things the men did not overlook, and felt that they could not let the opportunity pass without showing in a small way their appreciation. Personally he (the Mayor) thought the town was losing a very valuable servant and one who would be hard to replace. In concluding he said the staff desired to express the wish that Mr Collinge's retirement would be a long and happy one. Mr Collinge who was suffering from hearing loss feelingly replied. He thanked the donors very sincerely for their handsome gift, and said he felt proud of the occasion and the expression of good feeling towards him. The relations between the office staff arid the outside staff had always been of the most cordial nature and all worked together for the common welfare. There was no petty jealousy between them as was often the case, and the result was that everything ran smoothly. The Mayor had been good enough to refer to his kindness to the outside staff, but he (Mr Collinge) thought the boot was on the other foot, and he could assure them that he was very grateful for their thoughtfulness and consideration for him when at times his health was not as good as it might have been. He was not vacating his position without regret, a position which he had occupied for 28 years - two years as secretary to the Hastings Town Board and 25 years as Town Clerk and twelve months as Assistant Town Clerk, and one thing that pleased him and of which he would have the pleasantest recollections was the good feeling expressed towards him. He again thanked the outside staff very heartily and wished them long life and prosperity. Mr Collinge then took the opportunity of saying an official "good bye" to the men.





1911 October, An old age pensioner named **William Jones**, aged 76 years, residing in **Selwood Rd** Hastings was found dead in a **water-race** at the back of his house at about 7 o'clock last evening with a bucket on his arm when he went to fetch water. Deceased was a resident of Hastings of many years' standing and leaves a widow and grown-up family. A daughter Mary. An inquest will be held at the morque at 9 a.m. to-morrow.

1911 October, Hastings Fire - A five-roomed cottage on the **Karamu Rd** was destroyed by fire at 11 o'clock this morning. The owner, Mr **Thomas Ryan** who was smoking in bed set fire to the bedclothes and he had a narrow escape. Only a little clothing was saved. The house and contents were insured in the Standard office for £390.

1911 October, A horse belonging to Charles Hughes bolted from Heretaunga St Hastings and turning into Karamu Rd collided with a cart standing opposite Tipping and Son's store. One shaft penetrated the horse's left shoulder, inflicting a nasty gash. Mr A. T. Danvers who was in the vicinity at the time of the accident attended to the horse's wound. The trap suffered to the extent of a broken shaft.

1911 October, Hastings Fire - An incipient fire at the residence of Mr **Charles Cress** in **Arvedsen St** was responsible for the alarm given by the Hastings fire bell at 8.15 this morning. The fire occurred in a petition between a kitchen and a washhouse and is said to have been caused through a defect in the chimney. The Fire Brigade and Fire Police were quickly on the spot, but the outbreak had been subdued before they arrived. Slight damage was done by water.

1911 October, Death, Clark - At his residence Willowpark Rd Hastings, William Richard, the beloved husband of Emma Clark, aged 80 years. -The funeral will leave his late residence for the Hastings cemetery. W. Clark the Well Sinker

1911 October, Death. Jocobi - At Avenue Rd, Hastings, Henrietta Jacobi, aged 67 years. Henrietta Jacobi nee Johnson b: 1847, she had married William Jacobi in November 1865 at Cambridgeshire. They had five children. William Jacobi b: May 1841 in Suffolk Eng, his mother was Elizabeth.

1911 October, Birth, Croutis - At Nurse Bullick's, Hastings St, Hastings, to Mr and Mrs Croutis, a son.

1911 October, The **earthquake at Hastings** was most severe, and were generally considered worse than the one on August 7, 1904. The motion was vertical more than undulating. This probably accounts for the fewer reports of broken crockery than usual, although the damage in this respect has been considerable. Several **plate-glass windows were broken**, and the concrete parapet of **Land and Heighway's** building was dislodged. In one place 12ft. gave way, and in another 10ft. Both fell inwards on the roof below, smashing the roofing iron and the stout timber beams. The **Post Office tower swayed** like a sapling in a gale, and appeared to wrench itself away from the main building. The foundations, however, are undisturbed. Mr Bayland, district overseer of the Public Works Department, who examined the building, reports: "Shake opened up all the old settlements, and the main cornices of the building are separated about three-quarters of an inch from the tower, as are also the inside partitions of the first floor. The cement facings on the first floor, and the windows on each side of the tower, are affected, but the whole damage is not great." The damage elsewhere reported is mostly confined .to chimneys, either shaken down or badly cracked. There is' no doubt about the earthquake's power to create a panic. Men and women lost their heads, and the people in the streets started running aimlessly in all directions. Had the picture theatres been open it is difficult to say what casualties would have resulted from the effects of the panic. **The shock brought down heavy slips on the sea cliffs between Clifton and the Kidnappers**, creating a deafening roar and sending dense clouds of dust over the sea.

About 2 p.m., however, she was found to be sinking fast, and the end came about 7 p.m. Mr Marbrook was to have left on a visit to Auckland yesterday, but fortunately postponed his trip to make arrangements for Mrs Marbrook's admission to a private hospital. Subsequently she was found to be too weak for removal from home and death intervened as above stated. Mrs C. Palmer, eldest daughter of the deceased, left for Auckland yesterday accompanied by Mr Palmer. The late Mrs Marbrook was of a very retiring and kindly disposition and her demise at the comparatively early age of 47 years caused widespread regret. She leaves besides a widow three girls and two boys, including Mr Harry Marbrook of the Government Audit Department, Wellington.

1911 December, An old resident of Hastings **William James Scullin**, Scullen died at his residence in Norton Rd, a native of Northern Ireland, he landed in Hawke's Bay over 30 years ago. He was successfully engaged in a contracting business in partnership and then went farming. He leaves a wife to mourn her loss, he was a widely known and highly esteemed citizen.

William Manion b:1849 married 1893 Katherine McNaughton, children - 1894 Barbara Allan Manion, 1895 John Joseph Manion and 1897 Mary Ann Manion. William Manion a labourer HBC of Ellison Rd died aged 62 and Catherine Manion died 1942 aged 85

1911 December, Mr William Manion an old and respected resident of Hastings, died rather suddenly at his residence in Ellison Rd. Deceased was attending to his cows as usual about 10.30 when he was taken suddenly ill and seized with vomiting. He returned to his house and Dr. Story was summoned, but death ensued shortly after his arrival. Dr. Story had previously attended deceased for a disordered stomach, so that an inquest was not deemed necessary. Mr Manion was 62 years of age and was recently in the employ of the Hastings Borough Council. He leaves a widow and two girls and a boy of tender years for whom much sympathy will be felt.

1911 December, Mr **Cornelius O'Donoghue** proprietor of the Albert Hotel is at present lying in a serious condition. Mr O'Donoghue has been in indifferent health for the past week and took a sudden turn for the worse and became unconscious Dr. Story was at once summoned and is showing signs of regaining consciousness.

- 1911 December, Fire The homestead at Te Mahanga station owned by Douglas Brothers was totally destroyed by fire this afternoon.
- 1911 December, The death occurred at an early hour this morning of a very old resident of Hastings in the person of **Mrs Catherine Doran** at her residence in Hastings St aged 53. Deceased had been ailing for some considerable time, and the end was not altogether unexpected. She leaves a widower James Doran and a grown up family of sons and daughters Annie Stacia Doran, Isabella Doran, Mary Kathleen Doran. The funeral will leave for the Catholic Church and Hastings cemetery. James Doran died November 1914 aged 68.
- 1912, **Francis Ellis Nutter** b: May 1882 Lancashire Eng, the son of William and Elizabeth Nutter, married Eileen Teresa O'Donovan b: August 1887, in Havelock the daughter of father, Florence and Julia O'Donovan They had three children 1914 Eileen Frances Nutter, 1917 Margaret Nutter and 1917 Noeline Nutter. Eileen Teresa O'Donovan died August 1944 at Wellington aged 56 and Francis Ellis Nutter died January 1947at Hastings aged 64.
- 1912, Henry Norford Whitehead a jeweller at Station St married Fanny Major
- 1912, Harold Lambert married Lilian Remington. They had two children. He died on October 1959 aged 71.

1912, Misses Hay, Fruit and Confectionary were advertised at formerly carried on by Seymour Bone, Heretaunga St east.

1912, Clem Victor Thow was born in Hastings the son of Mary Anne Margaret and George William Thow. **George William Thow** b: May 1885 in Balclutha Otago the son of Williamina and Andrew Thow, in 1911 at Hastings he married Mary Anne Margaret McLeod b: 1884 the daughter of Marion and Donald McLeod. They had five children - April 1913 in Harold Malcolm Thow at Hastings he married Edna Valerie, October 1914 George Lewis Thow, April 1916 Elsie Annie Mary Thow and 1916 Gladys Thow. In 1917 WW1 Reserves George William Thow a farm manager care of Goulter and Colly, Ngatarawa, 2nd Division. Mary Anne Margaret Thow nee McLeod died April 1962 aged 78 and George William Thow died October 1970 in Orewa Auckland aged 85.

George's parents - **Andrew Thow** b: October 1838 in Tannadice Angus Scot the son of Ann and David Thow, in February 1875 at Arbroath Angus he married Williamina Glenn b: November 1847 in Kilmarnock Ayrshire Scot. 1912, William Morrow Hawthorne was born in Hastings, the son of Sarah and William Hawthorne, he married Rowena Ellen Sutton.



Hall of Niho King Country (Late of Hastings) was married to Mr Arthur R. Cullen of Hastings. The bride, who was given away by her cousin Mr P. Ayson, and was attended by four bridesmaids, Misses M. Millar and B. Ayson, and two little dots, Misses Belle Ayson and Rua Hall. Mr W. H. Wilson, B.A., L.L.M. of Auckland acted as best man, and Mr J. T. Daly of Hastings as groomsman. Presents received from the staff and pupils of the Hastings District High School. After the ceremony the large number of guests were entertained at Mr **Youngson's tearooms**, the happy couple left by the 3.5 p.m. train for an extended tour of the North Island.

1912 January, Guy Eldon Milne was born at Hastings the son of Winifred Louisa and Leonard Andrew Milne. **Leonard Andrew Milne** b: April 1886 in Invercargill in 1910 he married Winifred Louisa Boielle b: August 1888 in NZ. They had three children - Beryl Milne she died March 1918, November 1920 Edgar Milne, In 1911 Winifred Louisa and Leonard Andrew Milne a carpenter at 723 Avenue Rd, in 1914 Winifred Louisa and Leonard Andrew Milne a carpenter at Karamu Rd, 1917 WW1 Reserves Leonard Andrew Milne a farmer at Pakowhai ,2nd Division, in 1922 Winifred Louisa and Leonard Andrew Milne a carpenter at Mangateretere. John Thomas Henry Davis was born October 1854 at a settlement between Pakowhai and Farndon the son of Annie Doris and William Davis. His father died when he was 5. John went up to Gisborne where in December 1879 at Makaraka he married Maude Cumming Clarke b: December 1856 in New Brunswick Canada, the daughter of Lucretia and Major John Clarke of the 13th Light infantry (an Imperial Regiment on service in NZ) They had five children - October 1881 Kathleen Eleanor Street Davis at Gisborne she married John Scarrott in May 1910 at Hastings she died September 1921 in Hastings aged 41, July 1884 Harley Henry Woodthorpe Davis at Gisborne, he married Esther Rewiti in 1916 at Bulls he died as a young father October 1917 in France aged 33 buried in Zonnebeke, West-Vlaanderen, Belgium, April 1886 Beatrice Maude Davis she married Samuel John Arthur Newbury in February 1912 at Hastings, February 1893 Irvin Clarke Davis at Gisborne he married Eileen Edith Stone in August 1927 at Auckland and 1896 Leslie Cumming Clarke Davis at Havelock North he married Hannah in 1967 at Hastings. For 18 years they lived in Poverty Bay and Whangarei. John was a competitor at sheep dog trials, a successful exhibitor and an accomplished amateur rider and won many medals at A and P Shows. They returned Hawke's Bay where he was manager of W. R. Rathbone station at Dannevirke till around 1912. 1914 Maude Cumming and John Henry a drover of Fitzroy Ave Hastings, Irvin Clarke Davis a clerk of Fitzroy Ave, Leslie Cumming Clarke Davis of 102 Gallien St, a foreman HBCC, In July 1918 J. H. Davis of Fitzroy Avenue Hastings has taken over the management of the late J. D. Ormond's Karamu estate. In April 1919 Mr J. H. Davis of Hastings has received word that his son Leslie is returning from the front, due in Wellington about April 15th. 1928 Maude Cumming and John Henry David a manager at Karamu Station. John was a foundation member of the Hastings Old Folks Association. He claimed to the oldest living male resident born of European parents in Hawke's Bay. Maude Cumming Davis nee Clarke of 102 Gallien St Hastings died May 1945 at Sister Daniel's Private Hospital in Hastings aged 88 and John Henry Davis died at a private hospital in Hastings aged 91. He was survived by one daughter Mrs A. Newbery of Hamilton and two sons Mr I. C. Davis of Gisborne and Mr L. C. C. Davis of Hastings.

1912 February, **Samuel John Arthur Newbury** married Beatrice Maude Davis the daughter of Maude Cumming and John Henry Davis. They had three children in 12 years. Samuel John Arthur Newbury died August 1957 in Hastings aged 70 and Beatrice Maude Newbury nee Davis died March 1968 in Hastings age of 81.

The new Hastings Wesley Methodist Church -


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1912 February, Laying the foundation stone for the new Wesley Methodist Church in Hastings St sth. The Rev. G W. J Spence, president New Zealand Wesley Methodist Conference is addressing the audience. Mr James Garnett, Mayor, performed the ceremony of laying the stone. The pastor of the church is Rev. T. J. 1912 February, A young man named **Jack Willis** employed as bricklayers' labourer by Messrs. **Duncan and Abbott**, fell from a scaffolding at the new Wesley Methodist, Church a few minutes before the ceremony of laying the foundation stone. The scaffolding, which was about six feet from the ground, collapsed under the weight of a pile of bricks, and in falling, Willis was struck by a brick, inflicting a nasty scalp wound. He also sustained several bruises on his body. Dr. Bernard Storey attended to his injuries and states that Willis will be able to resume work in a couple of days. Another man named **George Crisp** was also on the scaffolding when it gave way, but he escaped with a cut on the leg.

A new Gothic style Wesley Methodist Church was built on Hastings St sth designed by Albert Garnett (1878-1956) architect of Hastings who won a competition for a Gothic Revival design, it reflects great credit on his professional ability. The new structure displays first class workmanship throughout and the contractor, Mr Thomas Styles has been highly complimented on this fact. The whole of the joinery work was carried out in Mr Style's shop, the brick and plaster work being sub-let to Messrs. Duncan and Abbott. Mr J. Fear carried out the plumbing work and Messrs. T. R. Burden and Sons the painting. The contract price was £3078.

1912 September, The new Wesley Methodist Church at Hastings is to be dedicated by the Rev. W. Ready, president of the New Zealand Conference, is decidedly an architectural acquisition to the town. The building, which is well proportioned and designed on Gothic lines, is constructed of brick, with the exterior rendered in cement plaster and top finishing of buff coloured rough cast. The tower at the northern end adds dignity and charm to the building. There are two double entrance doors to the main body of the church - one in the tower, and one in the centre of the front elevation. whilst separate doors lead to the vestries and transept. The whole of the roofs are covered with Marseilles roofing tiles, and ornamental ridge cresting's. The inside is well lighted with five large and seven smaller windows, the tracery work in the large windows being a special feature. All the windows are glazed with beautifully designed leaded lights. In the large window at the east end of the church is seen a beautiful pictorial stained glass window, the centre panel being taken from Holman Hunt's famous picture, entitled 'The Light of the World' The window is a gift from one of the members of the church. The whole of the leaded light work throughout was executed by Mr R. Martin of Wellington. The interior of the building is finished in Keen's cement plaster, the openings relieved with Gothic moulded arches, producing a very pleasing effect. The ceiling is covered with 4in. lining, the centre portion being diagonally strapped with 4in. by 4in. dark stained beams, and an advantage has been gained by sloping the floor 2ft. from back of church to rostrum. The inside measurements of the building are - The main body 72ft. by 39ft., vestibule 6ft. wide and full width of building, tower 12ft. by 12ft. A transept if seen at the southern end, which add to the size of the building by 26ft. by 10ft. The choir is well arranged at the end of church, on raised gallery is semicircular form and the rostrum is placed to the left front of choir. A chamber has been provided at rear of choir for a pipe organ, the space for this being 18ft. by 12ft. The choir and ministers vestries are placed conveniently on side of church, having easy access to both the rostrum and choir. The seating accommodation is for 400, including choir seats which will accommodate 34. The building is supplied with rice the light, the work of installing the light being done by the Hastings Borough Council, at a cost of £70. The present electric fittings are temporary, the proper fittings, which have been specially ordered from England, being due to arrive in about four weeks' time. The building is well ventilated with patent wall ventilators, the ceiling being pierced with ornamental scrolls whilst in the main roof are placed four ventilating dormers. George Frost of Wall Rd was a Wesley Methodist minister, June 1914 Rev. T. J. Wallis, October 1915 Rev. M. A. Rugby Pratt and November 1919 Rev. Angus McBean.

1916 August, THE "VAL TRIGGE" MISSION - Despite cold and rain a large number of elderly people attended the "Old Folks at Home" at the Hastings Methodist Church. Motor cars brought those attending and conveyed them home after the function. A census taken by Mr Trigge showed that the oldest person present was Mr Charles Baker (84 years) the person who had resided longest in the vicinity of Hastings, Mr L. Joll (53 years); the person longest resident in the Dominion, Mrs Haines, who was born in Auckland 76 years ago; the person who had been longest a Christian, Mrs Clapham (61 years); the person who had been longest a member of the Hastings Methodist Church, Mrs Catherall who joined at its inception in 1874. To each of these a bouquet was presented and a bunch of flowers, provided by the Young Women's Bible Class, was given to all who attended. Several church ladies provided refreshments, and Mr Trigge delighted the old folk with a happy speech. The torchlight procession attended by some 50 persons, headed by the Salvation Army Band, paraded the main street in drenching rain last night. The church was well attended and after an address from Mr Trigge on "The Appeal of Conscience," several persons rose in token of re-consecration to Christ. The mission will be continued this evening.



1912, T. H. Gill and Harry Gill of Gill Bros, and C. R. Wilson & Co on Station St - Christopher Richard Wilson

Harry Gill was born at Oamaru and was the second son Sarah and John Henry Gill of that town. He made rapid advancement in his scholastic career, having been dux in each class at school and it was hoped he would adopt a profession of a literary nature. He, however, decided on entering commercial pursuits and with his brother came to Hastings about 1911 and purchased the auctioneering and land agency business of C. R. Wilson & Co on Station St, now known as Gill Bros acting as auctioneer for that firm in which capacity, especially in regard to his description of land, he was very successful. Harry Gill took a keen interest in sport, and was at one time a prominent footballer in Oamaru and an amateur harrier and cross-country athlete in Dunedin. He also acted as referee in several of the Hastings football matches. He was a member of the Hastings Orphans' Club, and was a keen worker in church work, having been a prominent member of St. Matthews' Anglican Church and a teacher of the Sunday school. Rifleman Harry Gill of the 3rd New Zealand Rifle Brigade, who enlisted in the Hind Reinforcements was killed in action on April 3 1918. Besides his brother Mr T. H. Gill there are two sisters - Misses Evelyn b: 1884 she married Charles Traill and Beatrice Ellen Gill b: 1879 who reside in Hastings. Rifleman Harry Gill of the 3rd New Zealand Rifle Brigade was killed in action on April 1918.

Thomas Henry Gill b:1881 Oamaru the son of Sarah and John Henry Gill. In 1923 he married Marjorie Mary Butler b: September 1898 in London, the daughter of Alice and William Butler. After his brother died Thomas Henry Gill carried on with the business at Hastings, he died in the Quake February 1931 aged 50 and Marjorie Mary Gill nee Butler died November 2000 in Massachusetts USA aged 102.

1912 February, The half-acre section at the corner of Heretaunga and Nelson Sts, Hastings (adjoining the Princess Theatre) has been sold by Mr John Beatson. The section has a frontage to Heretaunga St of 132 feet and to Nelson St of 156 feet. The price paid was in the vicinity at £4000, which works out at about £30. 5s per foot on the Heretaunga St frontage.

1912 February, Raukura Tunui buried at Pakowhai cemetery aged14.

1912 March, Death, Styles - At Karamu Rd Hastings, Cecilia, beloved wife of Edward G. Styles, aged 66 years. Private interment and Edward George Styles died September 1921 aged 87 - brother of Tom Styles.

1912 March, Edna May Williams was born in Hastings, the daughter of Elizabeth and William Henry Williams

1912 March, Hastings Fire - A five-roomed house owned by Mr J. Hill and occupied by Mr Gavin Allan (union secretary) was destroyed by fire last evening. Owing to the absence of water everything was destroyed. Mr Allan's sons aged five and eight years, were the only occupants at the time and had a narrow escape, being rescued just in time by a passerby. Mr Allan was away at a meeting and Mrs Allan was nursing in the country.


1912 March, There were about 300 people present at St. Andrew's Church garden fete, held this week on **Mrs**Newrick's property in **Havelock Rd**, Hastings. The grounds were brilliantly illuminated, and the function, in spite of uncertain weather, was a pronounced success. At the conclusion Mr T. B. Lindsay auctioned the residue of the stalls, realising good prices. It is estimated that the church will clear £6O net as a result of the fete.

1912 March, A property in Hastings known as **Beecroft's Block**, sub-divided into twenty-three business sites with frontages to Queen St and Karamu Rd, was offered at auction. Twelve sites sold at £60 per-foot; two at £50 per- foot; and one at £52 .12s per-foot.

Peter Matthews b: 1842 Wicklow and came to NZ in the sixties where he landed at Greymouth, attracted to the West Coast by the gold rush. In 1882 he married Mary Clarke. Children - 1883 Peter Matthews he married Margaret McKie in 1911, 1885 John James Matthews, October 1888 Edward Matthews was born Clive, he married Louisa Catherine Green in 1920 1886 Mary Jane Matthews, Florence Matthews, 1890 Thomas Patrick and 1893 George Matthews. Around 1887 they left the Coast and settled in Clive then Hastings where they have resided ever since. Peter Matthews of 910 Duke St died August 1922 aged 80.

1912 March, An accident happened in front of Messrs. Ballinger Bros. Hastings, whereby a young man named George Henry Mathews, received rather serious injuries. Mathews, who is employed at Mr Geo. Roach's store, was cycling along his right side of the street towards Havelock, when he collided with a gig occupied by a man and woman. The shaft of the gig struck the cyclist on the chest and threw him violently to the ground. Several onlookers carried him to Messrs. Ballinger's shop. Dr. Wilson was summoned and ordered his removal to Nurse Jeffard's Private Hospital. A strong wind was blowing and it is thought that Matthews had his head down and did not see the gig until the driver called out to him. On enquiry at Nurse Jeffard's this morning it was ascertained that Matthews is slightly better, though it will be some time before he can resume work. General regret is expressed in Hastings at the death of Mr George Mathews, who succumbed at Nurse Jeffard's private hospital at a late hour on Saturday evening as the result of injuries sustained in a collision with a trap. It will be remembered that Matthews, who was a grocer's assistant in the employ of Mr G. F. Roach, was cycling along Heretaunga St against a headwind on the evening of Saturday March 9th, and having his head bent over the handles of his machine, apparently did not notice the approach of a gig occupied by Mr Harry Taylor, a wheel of which struck his chest when opposite Messrs. Ballinger Bros. grocery shop. No bones were broken, but Dr. Wilson ordered the removal of Mathews to Nurse Jeffard's private hospital, where he was reported to be making good progress. On Friday it was found necessary to operate, and this was successfully performed. On Saturday, however, the sufferer took a turn for the worse, and he gradually became weaker and George Henry Mathews died aged only 19 years, the fifth son of Mr and Mrs P. Mathews of Duke St Hastings, and was well liked by all who knew him. In hockey circles he was very well known, and was considered to be one of the best goal-keepers in the district. He made his first appearance in representative hockey in the last shield match.

1912 March, **The electric power house** - The following tenders have been accepted by the Hastings Borough Council for the supply of material for the electric power house now in course of erection in Eastbourne St: - Hawke's Bay Timber and Joinery Company (joinery) £91.1/-, Stubbs and Beck (ironwork) £85 . 5/-, T. Ritchie (pipes) £22. 8/- 10d.



1912 March, Yee, Ching and Co - A first class restaurant opening in those premises next Little and Fairey, butchers, Heretaunga St, which will be under the management of Willey Wong late of Gisborne

1912 March, An exciting bolt occurred in Southampton St Hastings. Mr **Arthur Wade** plumber, was driving along Knight St in the direction of the town and when turning into Market St something went amiss with the harness. The horse at once commenced kicking violently and at the corner of Southampton St broke into a gallop in the direction of the gasworks. Mr Wade maintained his hold of the reins till about opposite the **residence of Mr D. O'Reilly.** At this point he

saw a special train approaching in the distance and being unable to bring the horse to a standstill, he jumped out of the back of the trap. The animal continued its mad career and dashed into the train, striking a horse-box head foremost. The horse sustained terrible injuries and had to be destroyed and both shafts of the trap were broken. The special train was conveying horses to the Dannevirke races.

1912 May, Strained relations between two Hastings land agents were revealed at the Magistrate's Court this morning, when Miles Joseph Cassidy was charged on the information of Charles Hughes with using threatening behaviour in Station St Hastings on May 10th, within the hearing of passers-by, whereby a breach of the peace was occasioned. Charles Hughes, commission agent and Justice of the Peace, deposed that on May 8th he telephoned to a Mr Urwin regarding a property he owned in Dufferin street, for which he had a prospective buyer. 1912 May, D'arcy Cheer was born at Hastings the son of Amelia Alice Mary and William Bartholemew Cheer, he married Ellen Laura Cheer. **William Bartholemew Cheer** b: February 1880 in Hawke's Bay, the son of Sarah and William Thomas Cheer, in 1912 he married Amelia Alice Mary Turner b: November 1891 in Ormondville. They had five children at Hastings - 1914 Alan Bartholomew Cheer he died a teenager in September 1928, 1916 William Cheer, October 1917 Leonie Mavis Cheer and 1921 Cecil Cheer. 1912 May, Traction engine collapsed through a bridge near Havelock North killing the driver, shows two children and a man below the bridge

1912 May, Death, Turpen / Turpin - Accidentally killed at Havelock, Ernest Turpin aged 36 years. The funeral will leave the Council Chambers Hastings for the Hastings cemetery. Ernest Turpin / Turpen 'Dick' being his nick-name aged 36 died instantly when driving a traction engine owned by the Hawke's Bay (Napier) Timber Company when he was contracted to metal the Mangateretere-Havelock Rd for the Hawke's Bay County Council and with their the first loads of metal they crashed through the bridge over the Waparata creek in Havelock North. Lawrence Roland Williams aged about 26 years, a resident of Rissington was in charge of the wheel and he had a miraculous escape. Mrs Schaeffer of Hastings having allowed her to pass the traction engine, then with its two trollies loaded with gravel proceeded to cross the bridge. The quarry was near Te Mata and was the property of the County Council. Deceased filled two trucks. The weight of the engine was about 12 tons and the trucks when all of metal, would weigh between 10 and 11 tons. The engine had nearly crossed the second span, its front wheels being on the roadway on the other side, and the two front wheels of the first trolley fair in the centre of the long span, when without warning, the stringers snapped under the weight, and the engine dived backwards into the creek below Hearing the crash, Mr Weyergang, who lives alongside the bridge, ran out with his brother, but could render no assistance owing to the scalding steam from the boilers. They immediately rang up Hastings for doctors, ambulance, and the police. They then called up Mr Mason Chambers chairman of the County Council, and he was the first to arrive. Mr M. C. Taylor, county overseer, was present at the time of the accident. He warned Turpin that his load was excessive for the bridge, but Turpin replied it was all right, he had examined it that morning. Dr. H. M. Wilson was the first medical man to arrive. He was quickly followed by Dr. Tosswill, and the injured man Williams received their immediate attention. Turpin's body was extricated with considerable difficulty by Mr Chambers and a number of willing helpers, and placed in the ambulance. Mr Taylor the county overseer, states that he advised Turpin at the pit to take the trucks over the bridge with a cable. In this way only one of the vehicles would have been on the bridge at one time. Had Turpin followed this advice there would have been no fatality. This bridge was erected as a temporary bridge in 1897. Powdrell's engine went through a county bridge at the Waitangi about three years ago and that was erected as a temporary bridge in 1893. Turpin leaves a widow and four children. Minnie Turpin died November 1928 aged 53.

Dr. Harry Mountefiore Wilson b:1876 in Napier the son of Rosa and Henry Charles Wilson a dentist of Napier who bought early town sections in Hastings. In 1913 Dr. Harry Mountefiore Wilson married Winifred Gertrude Waterhouse b:1883 in NZ, the daughter of Gertrude and Frank Waterhouse. Dr. Harry Mountefiore Wilson was one of the founders of the Soldiers Memorial Hospital Hastings in April 1946 retired as chairman of the Memorial Hospital Visiting Medical Committee which he has held since its inception. Dr. Harry Mountefiore Wilson died at Hastings November 1958 aged 83 and Winifred Gertrude Wilson nee Waterhouse died at Hastings 1943 aged 60. His father Henry Charles Wilson died at Fitzroy Ave Hastings in December 1924 aged 85.

1912 May, Death, Watkins - At her residence Southampton St Hastings, Lucy the beloved wife of E. A. Watkins, in her 58th year. The funeral will leave her late residence for the Hastings cemetery. Lucy Watkins nee Bartlett b: July 1853 in Geelong Victoria, the daughter of Elizabeth and Henry Bartlett died May 1912 in Hastings aged 58. In October 1875 in Kew Victoria she married Edwin Alfred Watkins snr a saddler. They had eight children. Edwin Alfred Watkins snr of Karamu Rd died November 1941 in Hastings aged 86.

1912 May, Messrs. R. Brathwaite and Son land agents Hastings, report that among other properties, they have disposed of that very valuable block of land known as Williams and Kettle's saleyards, opposite the HB Tribune buildings at the corner of Queen St and Karamu Rd. This property has a large frontage to two important streets and is eminently suited for business premises. The site for the new Public Trust Building.

1912 May, The need of a **new railway station and goods-shed at Hastings** was referred to at last night's meeting of the Hastings Borough Council by Cr. T. Styles, who said that another town not far away got everything it asked for from the Government, who were even going to send up their biologist to report on a blight which had affected the Norfolk Island Pines on the Marine Parade. During the past 25 years all that Hastings had got was a new post office and it was time to bustle. He moved: That the attention of the Minister for Railways be drawn to the poor accommodation for the travelling public at the Hastings railway station and goods shed which are far too small to meet their requirements. The Hastings Borough Council would on behalf of the burgesses and travelling public earnestly ask that some attempt be made to erect a suitable station and goods shed on the ground acquired by the Government for the purpose some time ago. Cr. Donovan seconded. In supporting the resolution Cr. Hart pointed out that the Government derived a revenue of something like £1000 annually from the railway reserve leases in Station St and it was only right that some of the money received from people in the town should be spent there. The sum mentioned would pay interest on the cost of two or three new railway stations. The motion was carried unanimously. In connection with the above it will be remembered that some two and a-half years ago, a deputation which waited on the heads of the Railway Department were informed that the plans for a new station had been prepared, and the necessary land had been purchased to erect the new buildings on a site near the engine shed north of St. Aubyn St crossing.

The burial service was conducted by the Rev. J. B. Brocklehurst.

1912 June, Mr W. H. Cook of Petene was appointed Hastings Town Clerk and Engineer.



1912 June, **Henry Cook** b: March 1854 in Waltham Abbey, Essex, the son of Susannah and William Cook a carpenter died at Hastings aged 58 and Eliza Ellen Cook nee Horsnel died August 1930 at Rodney St Hastings aged 76.

1912 June, Catherine Barry died at Hastings aged 78, poss the wife of Daniel Barry died 1893 at Hastings aged 61

1912 June, As Mr A. H. Lys tailor, son of the late C. F. Lys near Union Bank Hastings is retiring from business, he is offering the whole of his well-assorted suit and costume length at low prices. Arthur Herbert Lys of 404 Charles St.

1912 June, Messrs. W. M. Hay and Sons of Hastings have just completed the erection of an up-to-date residence of twelve rooms for Mrs J. W. Stack at the corner of Railway Rd and Station St. The house is exceptionally well finished off and the workmanship reflects great credit on the contractors. Mr J. J. Morley was the architect and Messrs. Le Quesne and Cowan carried out the plumbing work and the installation of the gas fittings.

1912 June, Raymond John Cummings was born at Hastings the son of Mary and Denis Joseph Cummings, he married Claire Selby. **Denis Joseph Cummings** b: July 1878 in Tuapeka Mouth, Otago the son of Mary and Patrick, he married Catherine Quigley b: 1874 in Adelaide, South Australia. They had three children - December 1895 Mary Eileen Cummings at Wellington she married Cyril Arthur Tindall in 1919, May 1909 Kathleen May Cummings at Napier she married Patrick David Parker in April 1938. By 1913 they moved to Napier. Denis Joseph Cummings died April 1943 in Karori Wellington aged 64 and Catherine Cummings nee Quigley died April 1943 in Kelburn Wellington aged 69,



In June 1901 **John Beatson** had bought a large block of land from Tanner situated between Grove Rd to St. George's Rd, known as "**The Park**" containing about 44 acres and also the balance of section No. 29, block 12, containing about

32 acres. There was some kind of gentleman's agreement with this sale that he would have to retain the area included that Tanner had set-aside as a The Park / Queen's Park for the Hastings Borough citizens.



1912 September, **Beatson's Park** - The Borough of Hastings purchase from **John Beatson** Riverslea land containing thirty-eight acres three roods thirty-four perches more or less, comprising part of Lot 176 of Block IX for a total amount of £4.560. The **Te Mangapouri creek** still flowing through the lot to a large Makirikiri lagoon with a pine plantation planted by Thomas Tanner's men. It was referred to as **Beatson's Park** from 1912 open for the public at a cost of £300 per annum. Mr & Mrs Beatson remained at their St. George's Rd homestead until the mid1920's when their married son took over residence.

There were several drains and creeks entering the park – the old Makirikiri creek course, a drain from Alexandra St, the drainage from behind St. John's Collage second site on Jervois Rd and the Te Mangapouri creek from between Grove Rd and Collinge Rd all contributing to the lagoon and subsequent creek, **later named the Awahou stream.**

- 1912 September, Mr J. V. McDonald (son of Mr Thos. McDonald, Balclutha) has purchased from Mr A. Armstrong, his business of watchmaker and jeweller in Heretaunga St, Hastings. Mr "Vic." McDonald, who has for the last two years acted as manager for Mr Armstrong, takes immediate possession.
- 1912 September, Death At Hastings, **Daniel Tobin** a Settler of Hastings aged 54 years. The Funeral will leave the Catholic Church for the Hastings cemetery.
- 1912 September Henry Hodson was born at Hastings the son of Mary Anne and Henry Hodson.
- 1912 September, Olive Mabel Ballinger was born at Hastings the daughter of Olive and Allen Edwin Ballinger, she married Garnet Peters in 1938 in Aus. Mrs Olive Ballinger went to Aus where she had a son 1914 Arthur Allen (Mick) Ballinger at NSW. In 1935 she married John Joseph Wiblin at Orange, NSW Australia. Olive Cleveland Ballinger died January 1978 in Blayney, NSW aged 86.
- 1912 September, Maria Ina Banks was born in Hastings, the daughter of Margaret Theresa and George William Banks.
- 1912 September, Wedding, Dwyer Neilson. An interesting wedding was solemnised at the Roman Catholic Church, Hastings. The contracting parties were Miss Hilda Neilson, only daughter of Mr and Mrs Neilson of Tomoana, and Mr Edward Dwyer, sixth son of the late Edward Dwyer of Whangarei. The Very Rev. Father Keogh, SM, performed the ceremony. The bride was given away by her father and was attended by Miss Agnes Farrelly as bridesmaid. The duties of best man were performed by Mr Claude Bishop. After the ceremony a large number of guests were entertained at the residence of the bride's aunt, Mrs Henderson, where the health of the newly married couple was drunk. 1912 September, Napier Civil Court - Paul Murphy sued William Richmond and Christopher Richard Wilson for specific performance of an agreement and £350 damages for withholding possession, in the alternative £350 damages and a further sum of £150 the difference in the price of land subject to the agreement and that of the land which the plaintiff had afterwards to buy: also interest on £100 deposit. The plaintiff came to Hastings saw Wilson a land agent, who took him out to Twyford to look at two sections, the property of Richmond. Murphy bought one section. Later Richmond's attorney withdrew Wilson's power to sell. Wilson cabled to Richmond that he had sold the section and a reply was received confirming the sale. Wilson left for Queensland and took the £100 deposit. They therefore held Wilson liable for the £100 and Richmond for specific performance. Paul Murphy said he had bought the land at £-1-2 per acre through Wilson, who told him he had power to sell. Paid a deposit of £100 about the 23rd April 191 and on April 27th received an acknowledgment for that amount. Wilson left for Queensland on September 4th and witness wrote asking for a return of his deposit. The present proceedings were subsequent y instituted. Witness waited for ten months before purchasing another property and was now claiming in respect of rents and profits which would have accrued to him if the Twyford property had been transferred to him, and he was basing his claim on the profits he had made on a property at Mahora. Plaintiff interviewed Richmond at Tomoana and asked him what course he intended to take. Richmond replied

that he could not say for a few days. Plaintiff's solicitors then wrote to Richmond, whose solicitor's replied refusing to transfer the Twyford property. Plaintiff was also claiming the amount of the difference in the price of the Twyford property and the land he ultimately bought at Pakowhai. Witness did not want specific performance now, but wanted his £100 deposit. Witness received a letter from Wilson in April stating that Richmond had withdrawn the property from sale, but he would ask **Fearnie** to cable Richmond asking him to accept plaintiff as a purchaser. Wilson also asked for a deposit as something to work on. **Miles Joseph Cassidy** gave evidence that the market value of Richmond's Twyford property was from £55 to £57 per acre. He had recently sold the adjoining property with improvements at about £62 per acre. Judgment was entered up for the defendant Richmond, with costs as on a claim for £755 and disbursements on the Court of Commission at Brisbane where the evidence of Wilson was taken. In the claim against Wilson, **judgment was given for plaintiff (Murphy) for £100 with costs**. Mr Lusk submitted that plaintiff was not entitled to costs against Wilson, who was entitled to hold the deposit until the transfer was completed. Mr Dolan contended that the deposit should have been returned when asked for by Murphy. Wilson knew that Richmond would not complete the transfer. His Honour upheld Mr Dolan's contention and allowed costs as according to scale.

1912 October, A motor bicycle ridden by Mr **Charles Bone**, plumber when rounding the corner of Railway Rd, ran into a horse and phaeton driven by Miss Collison of Longlands on the Heretaunga St railway crossing, Hastings. Fortunately the horse was a guiet one and nothing serious happened.

1912 October, Death, Kessell - At Devonport, Auckland. **Walter Robert Kessell**, the beloved husband of Emma Kessell aged 68 years, late of Hastings and Napier.

1912 October, Birth Styles - At Karamu Rd Hastings, the wife of Thomas Styles - of a son. Both doing well.

1912, George Edward Lancaster Hicks Styles.

1912 October, Garry Ryan was born in Hastings, the son of Susan and Thomas Jacob Ryan.

1912 October, Birth, Ribbands - At Hastings, the wife of H. S. B. Ribbands, of a son. 1912 October Henry Huia Craven Ribbands was born at Hastings, he died 1945 aged 28. Henry Sydney Buttle Ribbands b: October 1872 Bonchurch. Isle of Wight, Hampshire, Eng the son of Mary and Henry Ribbands. As a young man he was Continental representative of the large stationary firm of Castells Ltd and travelled the Continent of Europe for some years becoming an accomplished linguist. He was a proficient swimmer and diver and entered into aquatic activities. Coming to NZ he settled in Hastings and quickly made his presence felt in theatrical and sporting circles. He was present at the opening of the Maddison swimming baths in 1907 and gave an excellent exhibition of diving. 1908 he was Hon. Sec. of the Pioneer Amateur Swimming Club and was for several years before WW1 tutor to junior members of the Hastings Swimming Club and Parkvale Swimming Club. In 1912 Henry Sydney Buttle Ribbands married Mary Agnes Craven. 1914 Mary Agnes and Henry Sydney Buttle Ribbands an Insurance agent at 212 Willowpark Rd sth. During WW1 in France aged around 40 he wrote a musical comedy score 'Marama' that was later produced throughout NZ and successfully revived for a season as a patriotic fund raiser during WW2. After WW1 he returned and opened music and stationary store H. S. B. Ribbands Music store in Hastings. Mr Ribbands had a flare for stage work and organised and produced various amateur theatrical shows in Hastings he was a founding member of the Hastings Operatic society and played a leading role in many productions and he was a good dancer. Mr Ribbands was also an enthusiastic tennis player and golfer and honorary member of the Parkvale Tennis Club and was interested in the affairs of the Parkvale School committee from its inception. From 1927 Henry Sydney Buttle Ribbands was for a decade the infamous camp warden at Beatson's Park motor camp which became recognised as the best in the country. His son Huia Ribbands was lost while serving with the merchant navy 1945 aged 28 during WW2. Henry Sydney Buttle Ribbands died January 1946 at Hastings aged 73 and Mary Agnes Ribbands nee Craven died March 1954 aged 72.



1912 December, Marie Ridgway nee Dolbel b:1829 the daughter of John and Ann Dolbel died at Hastings aged 83, the wife of Henry Ridgway b:1834, they had married in 1863. She leaves a grown-up family of three: Mrs F. W. Corbin, Grove Rd Hastings; Mrs A. C. Norris Lascelles St and Mrs D. J. Bayliss Hatuma. Henry Ridgway died August 1920 at Hastings aged 86. Later Ridgway Circus clan, Grove Rd.

1912 December, Hastings Fire - Racehorse Burned. The training stables and whare occupied by Mr Leslie Carrick trainer for Rangi Kerehoma, were destroyed by fire last evening. Four horses which were in the loose-boxes, were let out, but the two year-old Bungebah, by Stronghold - The Brat, ran back into the burning building and was burnt to death. The contents of the whare and considerable feed were lost. There was no insurance on the horse or building. The cause of the fire is unknown. 1911, Amelia and Walter Leslie Carrick a trainer of Lascelles St Hastings.

1912 December, Hastings Fire - An outbreak of fire in a gorse hedge opposite the Hastings Bacon Factory in Victoria St was the cause of the ringing of the Hastings firebell about five minutes pass midnight. The Fire Brigade proceeded to the scene of the blaze with a hose reel, but their services were not required. This the first occasion on which the firebell has been rung since it was **removed to the rear of the fire station** and statements having been made that the bell would not be heard from its new position, it is worthy to note that **the alarm was heard all over the borough.**

1912 December, The dead body of a child was found on the bank of the Awanui stream near Pukahu by **Mr B. Brittin** a settler residing in **St. George's Rd** he was driving a cow which had strayed, back to his paddock and was crossing a fence which divides his property from an adjacent paddock when he noticed a human skull and small pair of boots protruding from some weeds and rubbish. He immediately phoned the Hastings police station and Sergeant Hogan despatched constable McGruer and Hefferman to bring the remains into Hastings. The constables identified the body as that of - **Donald McGillivray** who disappeared from his parents' residence on August 7th last, and who had not since been heard of. The pot where the body was discovered is about a quarter of a mile from the Pukahu school and about three miles from where the boy was supposed to have fallen into the creek at the rear of his parents' home. The body apparently been washed up during the September floods, and was in a badly decomposed state, the only means of identification being the red jersey, blue trousers, and tan boots. The remains were brought into the Hastings morgue, where an inquest was held at 2.30 this afternoon. The deceased was the two and a half year old son of **Mr and Mrs Louis McGillivray of Paki Paki** and was last seen alive about 11 a.m. on the 7th of August last by his mother. His hat was subsequently found on the bank of the creek, but notwithstanding that a diligent search was prosecuted for several days by the police and residents of Paki Paki, no trace could be found of the child's fate. Mr and Mrs McGillivray left Paki Paki some time ago and went to reside at Wellington.



1910 October, The Board of Directors of the newly formed **Hastings Y.M.C.A.** met last night in the Council Chambers. The sympathy and financial support offered to the Association is most encouraging, the project being taken up heartily. After dealing with the usual business connected with the starting of a new Y.M.C.A. it was decided that an organised campaign for members should be commenced. A full meeting will be held at an early date.

1911 June, A Magnificent Gift To the Y.M.C.A - Mr James Reynolds of Napier, formerly of Hastings, has generously offered the trustees of the Hastings Y.M.C.A. a site in Eastbourne St for the erection of the necessary buildings. The section is immediately opposite St. Matthew's Hall, and has a frontage of 54ft and a depth of about 140 feet. The handsome gift has been gratefully accepted. The site, valued at £1000, is an ideal one for the purpose, being situated practically in the centre of the town. The philanthropic spirit which prompted Mr Reynolds' noble gift stimulates those conducting the campaign to greater efforts in the direction of securing the necessary £8000. Subscriptions are now coming in more freely, and many people will be interviewed in the specified time. The committee appeal to a generous public to assist in this great enterprise for the building of a perfect manhood. The Y.M.C.A. fund has gone up with a bump since yesterday, the total at one o'clock to-day being £3757.1.16. as against £2370 .6 .6 .yesterday.

1911 June, At the mass meeting for men held in the King's Theatre yesterday, Mr. E. T. James, chairman of the Board of Directors of the Hastings Young Men's Christian Association, stated that a campaign would be opened on Wednesday next, whereby it was hoped that £8000 would be raised to build and equip a modern Y.M.C.A. building in Hastings.

The object of the meeting is to fix a date for opening the new rooms and to make the necessary arrangements. Mr. E. T. James, the chairman, of directors, will briefly explain the work that has been done and the present position. This is a very important meeting, and all members are urged to make a special effort to be present

1912 April, Pending the erection of their own buildings, the Hastings Y.M.C.A. have secured commodious rooms above the Tourist Motor Company's garage in Station St. These will be furnished and thrown open at an early date.

1912 April, The temporary quarters of the Hastings Y.M.C.A. above the Tourist Motor Company's garage in Station St will be formally opened in about a month's time. The flat is divided into a gymnasium of large dimensions and it is to be equipped at an expense of about £100. The rooms will include a billiard room aid down in cork matting. Two small rooms at the front of the premises will be used, one as a reading and writing room and the other as a meeting room for members at night time, and by the secretary in been paid to lighting and ventilation the day time. Special attention has and when ready for occupation the rooms will present a very cosy and comfortable appearance. The gymnasium will also be a lecture hall.

In January 1914, New Y.M.C.A. Building to be erected. The monthly meeting of the Hastings Y.M.C.A. Board of Directors was held last evening when it was decided to erect a new building on the site in **Eastbourne St west (nearly opposite St. Matthew's schoolroom) presented by Mr Reynolds**. Mr E. T. James submitted a plan which includes a secretary's office, reading room, boys' room, billiard room to accommodate two tables, cafe and gymnasium on the ground floor. The latter is 50 by 40 feet. The second storey will include a social hall 50ft by 20 feet, which will be used for socials, meetings, etc. and not in use for these purposes, will be divided by folding doors and used as a recreation room and a music room. It will also include two small rooms for classes and committees. The total cost of the building is estimated at £3000. The board, on the motion of Messrs. E. C. Woodward and F. E. Barley, unanimously decided to adopt the plans. It was also decided that £4000 should be the amount aimed at; the additional £1000 to be used for furnishing the building and the establishing of a guarantee fund for its successful working." The **general secretary is to be provided with a motor cycle** and will commence forthwith to collect this amount.

1914, due to WW1 the Hastings Y.M.C.A. was deferred for several years until they were eventually provided with a Hut on the corner of Market St nth and Avenue Rd Hastings in 1918.

1915 September, Moving picture entertainment was the "bill of fare" for the boy department of the Y.M.C.A.. There was a large number present. The machine kindly lent by Mr W. Jones of J. E. Jones' cycle shop, is an Edison's home entertainment machine. Although small as compared with an ordinary machine it gives excellent results. The pictures were good and well shown. Messrs W. and A. Mouldey operated with great results.

1918 July, The secretary of the Y.M.C.A. Hastings, writes, "We are at present engaged in the furnishing and equipping of the hut which has been provided by the Red Cross Society and the Y.M.C.A. for the use of the convalescent men at the Napier Hospital. We are in need of a billiard table. I am giving publicity to this fact, for the reason that it has occurred to me that perhaps one of your readers might posses a table which is not used much, and which he would be willing to either donate or loan to us for this purpose. If such is the case, I shall be exceedingly grateful if they will communicate with me. A full size table is required.

1918, The annual meeting of the Y.M.C.A., Hastings, postponed on account of the **epidemic**, will be held in the Y.M.C.A. Hut, Market St on Friday next. The business includes the election of 11 directors, and the receiving of the annual report and balance sheet. Nomination papers are obtainable at, the office.

1919 February, Y.M.C.A. Hastings - The Hut which stands at the corner of Market St nth and Avenue Rd west, Hastings, is now completed and ready for use and on Wednesday next, February 19th, the opening ceremony will take place. Mr P. S. McLean, chairman of the District Committee, will preside, the dedication service being conducted by the Revs. M. A. Rugby Pratt, P. Ramsay and H. E. Edridge. The official opening ceremony will be performed by Mr T. E. Crosse, chairman of the H.B. County Council, followed by short addresses given by the Mayor of Hastings. Mr H. Ian Simson and Mr A. Varney, the national secretary. The Red Triangle Garden Fete which commences at 3 o'clock and continues all afternoon and again at night has been organised by the Y.M.C.A. Ladies' Committee. They have secured a first class programme. It includes a continuous half-hour concert, exhibition of war curios, cake stall, sweet stall, ice cream stall and produce stall, and a number of games and competitions organised by the Y.M.C.A. members. The entrance to the ground is free. The Ladies' Committee has undertaken to furnish the building and to raise as much as possible towards the general funds of the association. A number of circulars have been issued by the president of the Ladies' Committee, Miss Elsie Williams, appealing for funds. The object is a worthy one and we have no doubt that it will receive the

support it deserves. The general secretary has asked us to state that he will be glad if any of the Returned Soldiers would assist in connection with the War Curios Exhibition. **The Ziess telescope, donated by the late Mr T. Tanner to the Hastings Y.M.C.A, will be on exhibition.** Those interested in astronomy or any other persons will be able to test the power of this magnificent instrument. The War Curio Exhibition promises to be quite unique and will doubtless prove one of the special features of the event. The Y.M.C.A. members are introducing one or two novelties, one of which is a surprise packet wheel.

1919 July, Hastings Y.M.C.A. Building scheme, signed by the late Thomas Tanner as President of the Association.

1921 December, Frank Percy Memorial Library for the Hastings Y.M.C.A. – The Late Frank Percy b: 1893 in Hastings the son of Isabella and Andrew Percy killed in the War left a legacy of £50 to the Hastings YMCA for a boy's library. Mr H. E. Grainger occupied the chair Mr F. A. Garry and Mr L. G. Harvey who was franks employer. Mr Grainger handed Mrs Percy a suitable inscribed presentation key. There are 170 books for the boys and still a balance of £35.

1924 September, A large number of members and friends gathered at the Hastings Y.M.C.A. to farewell **Edward Colechin** who has resigned his position and is leaving Hastings. Mr J. Lindsay, Mr C. Duff ex-president of the Y.M.C.A.
Mr Duke Maddox is taking up the secretaryship. Miss Forde secretary of the ladies auxiliary and Mrs G. A. Maddison president ladies auxiliary. Deputy mayor F. W. Cook, Mr French chairman of the board of directors











1912, The Edwardian Neo-Classic Municipal Electricity Power & Pumping Station building on **Eastbourne St** east built on the old Fire Station site behind the Borough Council Chambers, Electricity was now being generated by diesel oil engines and the Council had established a water reservoir on Mr Chambers site in Havelock and pumped reticulated artesian water through to most of the Hastings Borough which proved more satisfactory for fire fighting supply than the previously used drainage water, especially during the later 1931 earthquake, fluoride was added from 1954 at the new pump station on the corner of Havelock Rd and St. George's Rd. 1924 it was renamed the HB Electric Power Board and started supplying electricity in 1925

William Alfred Weaver was an engineer at the Municipal power house, in 1920 he died at his residence in Warren St aged 47.

Mr George Wood, born in Berwick in 1873 and came to New Zealand with his wife in 1910. He first worked for J. J. Niven and Company, Limited, Napier for four years, then removed to Hastings where he was in charge of the power house for the Borough Council, later being appointed electrical engineer. He retired on the death of his wife and he died September 1935 September, while on holiday in Scotland.

In December 1920, The preliminary work in connection with the Maraetotara hydro-electric scheme for the supply of light and power to Havelock North is making good progress. The tender of Messrs. Redpath of Christchurch for the supply of ironbark poles has been accepted and it is expected that delivery will be made before very long, when the work of constructing the main line will be immediately put in hand. This, when completed will enable a connection to be made with the **Hastings mains** for the utilization of electric power for pumping and other work required in the construction of the head works at Maraetotara. The tenders for the supply of wire and generating plant close on the 17th January and it is expected that the successful contractors will be able to land the plant on the site about three months later. The engineers anticipate having the power station and reticulation completed for the supply of power and light to consumers within eighteen months from now.

In September 1923 – **The Maraetotara power house** supplied Havelock north households - Owing to a break in the long span of the transmission line at the Maraetotara power house to the first pole on the hill, the householders at Havelock North were without their electric light last night. Early in the evening the circuit was linked up with the Hastings power house but for some reason that too failed to supply sufficient current. One or two residents with initiative born of necessity turned their car spot lights on through the windows of the rooms they were using, and supplied themselves with quite a good light for reading. the Town Board inspector left at daylight with ample assistance to repair the break and it is hoped that supply of current will be restored this evening.








1912, Heretaunga St east looking west opposite the Salvation Army Barracks towards Warren St now with a new Ballinger Bros building beside Farrelly's left side.











A considerable amount of new machinery has been installed in place of that damaged by the flames, including a labour-saving device in 4.ht shape of a chain mortise. The use of the endless chain cutter for mortising purposes has long been known, but it is only within recent years that its use has been extended, and it is now recognised as the most expeditious and economical method of performing one of the commonest operations of the carpenter's art. The machine can be readily operated by the unskilled, and as it is not en cumbered by delicate automatic feeding devices, there is nothing to get out of order. 

In July 1913, The fortnightly social of the Hastings Orphans' Club was held in the Venetian Tea Rooms, the Chief Orphan Mr A. L. D. Fraser presiding. About sixty members were present and spent a pleasant evening in listening to musical items, flashes of clever wit and merry jest, the programme being contributed to by the Chief Orphan, Orphans - J. McGuirk. J. B. O'Sullivan. N. Bealson. H. Sinclair, Shortt. Williams. J. Craig, Avery, C. Croker, F. Byrne and F. Vickers. The accompaniments were played by Mr G. Brownhill. The club's orchestra under the conductorship of Orphan A. R. Don also rendered a number of enjoyable selections and after light refreshments had been partaken of the proceedings concluded. It is proposed to hold a ladies' night shortly and suggestions as to what form the function shall take are invited at the next social. In August 1913 Hastings Orphans Club Ladies night - St. Matthew's Hall - hereinafter referred to as

the "Orphanotrophy" was scarcely large enough to accommodate the gathering which assembled there last evening for the Hastings Orphans' Club's first ladies' night, the attendance comprising about 200 ladies and gentlemen. The former of course, largely preponderating. The **Hastings Motor Transport Company Ltd** was formed in May 1912 by Thos. Tanner. The following directors were appointed Messrs. F. King. G. F. Roach. D. E. Davis. F. Howard, E. Newbigin and A. Maddison. A hearty vote of thanks was accorded Mr. Tanner for his services since the formation of the company and at a subsequent meeting of the directors he was appointed chairman. In September 1914, The Hastings Motor Transport Company Ltd, the Company's office were on Karamu Rd nth (opposite Nelson Cricket Ground)

John Giles Nimon had bought out W. A. Beecroft's Havelock to Hastings Bus company in September 1905, Nimon and Co were the only service advertising the Havelock to Hastings run for seven years, but something must have irked Tanner to suddenly decide to form his own Hastings & Havelock service — maybe Nimon did not dub his hat to him - nothing worse than having poor coach driver monopolising a service getting rich when the wealthy Hastings businessmen could compete and control it themselves with a service from Frimley to Havelock. Nimon died 3 years later, his son took over and their motor buses business survived and prospered.

This Hastings Motor Transport Company did not last and it is not to be confused with the later Hawke's Bay Transport or the 1933 Hastings Transport business Kenneth Stirling of Fitzroy Ave began with his wife Ella Dawson Stirling along with John Morven Angus.

In July 1913, **The first of the Hastings Motor Transport Company's motor Lories** emerged from **Pothan's coach factory** this morning and initiated a curving service in and around Hastings. The chassis of the lorry is on the same principle, as the company's buses; and the body has been so built as to enable it to be transformed into a passenger vehicle at very short notice. The engine is of 30 horse power, and the whole construction of the conveyance is in solid lines, giving it a carrying capacity of about three tons. A second lorry will be put into commission in about a fortnight's time.

1913 September, The Hastings Motor Transport Co Ltd held a preliminary run over the proposed route yesterday afternoon, the bus taking a full load of passengers, including the directors of the company, the Mayor, Town Clerk, members of the Hastings Borough Council, Mr T. E. Crosse representative of the Heretaunga Riding on the Hawke's Bay County Council and others. The motor bus started from Messrs **Davis and Boyd's** motor garage and proceeded via Havelock to Te Mata, where the party were welcomed by the manager of the vineyards, Mr J. O. Craike. On the return journey, the motor bus was taken over the route proposed to be adopted at Havelock and a halt was made at the suburb, where the company partook of afternoon tea. In the absence of the chairman of directors Mr T. Tanner, Mr G. Roach, in a short speech thanked the Mayor and councillors for their presence and said he trusted that the service about to be initiated would be of benefit to the people as well as a sound business under taking to the shareholders. The company hoped to have **two buses and two lorries** on the road within a few weeks. The Mayor briefly replied and congratulated the company on their enterprise, which he felt sure would be very successful. Mr Crosse also congratulated the company on the progressive time which had been made and said the service was going to be a great benefit to the residents of Hastings and Havelock. The journey to Hastings was then resumed and the party arrived home after a very pleasant outing. The run was in every way successful and those who made the journey loud in their praise of the smooth travelling

of the bus and the total absence of anything in the nature of jolting. The excellent comfort provided by the upholstering of the seats was also favourably commented on. The time occupied on the various stages of the journey was as follows: Heretaunga St railway crossing to Havelock Hotel. 10½ minutes; Havelock Hotel to Te Mata 10 minutes; railway crossing to Frimley 3½ minutes. The regular service of the bus was commenced to-day and freely patronized by the public.

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In December 1913, Some excitement was caused in Heretaunga St Hastings, this afternoon by a **collision between one of the Hastings Motor Transport Company's motor buses and a motor lorry owned by the same company.** The bus was coming from Havelock North and the lorry was approaching from the direction of the railway crossing. The two conveyances met at the intersection of Karamu Rd, and the lorry, in attempting to turn the Carlton Club corner to go to the company's depot, struck the bus near the hind axle and dragged it for several yards. The main shaft of the bus chassis was broken and other parts were also considerably damaged, with the result that the lorry had to couple on and haul it to the depot where it was docked for repairs. When the impact occurred, the bus was carrying a fair number of passengers, one of whom a boy of about 12 years was thrown out of the door on to the road, but escaped injury.

In November 1866 in Lambeth Surrey Eng Benjamin married Mary Ann Capel b: May 1838 in London, the daughter of Mary and Edward Capel, they had seven children. Mary Ann Marsh nee Capel died March 1916 in Sanson Manawatu aged 77.

1913 August, Hastings Fire - Shortly after nine o'clock on Saturday night a fire was discovered in a four-roomed cottage situated at the corner of Albert St and Princess St Hastings, owned by Mr Robert McFarlane and occupied by Mr Thomas Harlen. The alarm was given by a passerby, and although the members of both fire corps were promptly on the scene in response to the ringing of the firebell, they were unable, owing to the borough water service not extending to the locality and to the absence of any other water supply, to offer any resistance to the flames. In a very short time the house and the whole of the contents were reduced to ashes. There was no one in the house when the outbreak started. Mrs Harlen left home about 6.45 p.m. leaving a small fire in the kitchen and a bracket oil lamp hanging on the wall in the same room. When first noticed the flames were coming from the vicinity of where the light was left burning, and it is conjectured that the wall was ignited by the lamp. The house was insured in the London, Liverpool and Globe office for £140 and the furniture was covered by a policy of £110 in the State Insurance office. There was also an insurance on a shed situate at the rear of the dwelling, but this building escaped damage. Subsequent to the fire, a rumour was current that a child had perished in the flames, but happily this proved to be incorrect, Mrs Harlen having taken her daughter with her

They had two children 1916 Alma Isabel Jordan. They were in Hastings only a short while. Frederick Gilbert Jordan died February 1966 aged 83 and Isa Arabella Jordan nee Manktelow died August 1989 aged 75.

1913 September, Marjorie Jean Tennant was born a Hastings the daughter of Eliza and David Tennant, she married Robin Spencer Chrystall in December 1934.


1913 September, Mr Arthur Hatherell of Hastings, who sustained rather serious injuries through his motor bicycle colliding with a dray at Havelock on Monday, is making a rapid recovery and is now out of danger.

1913 September, Mr **William Ethelbert Beck** drowned while with his little daughter on the Ngaruroro river Clive when standing on a small landing stage projecting from the bank of the river apparently to reach out and draw his boat nearer, he overbalanced and fell forward striking his head against the gunwale of the boat. His little girl ran home to tell her

mother and when Mrs Beck arrived at the scene of the accident her husband was hanging by one foot from the landing with his head below water deceased. Mr Beck suffered heart disease and inflamed liver and was aged 49. He had came out to NZ with his uncle the late Eldred Beck of Clive and was widely popularly known throughout the district. For many years he carried on business in Hastings as a draper and was subsequently manager of the Carlton Club Hotel and chief steward at the Hastings Club. Some three or four years ago took up farming pursuits at Berrisford farm Mahora south and from there moved to Clive to assume control of a business formerly conducted by his late uncle. In the early days Mr Beck was a leading volunteer enthusiast and for some time held the post of captain of the Hastings riffles and a founding member of the Hastings fire brigade. He leaves a widow, three sons and two daughters, a lengthy cortege, he was buried at Hastings. A younger brother of the deceased's was drowned in the same locality many years ago.

In April 1913, Master Eric Battershill, son of Mr. H. Battershill of Hastings, was third on the list of candidates who obtained Education Board senior scholarships at last year's examinations.

1913 September, A youth 17 years of age Eric H. Battershill was living in Hastings. Eric got into trouble with the authorities. He was endeavouring to become a wireless expert and had erected a plant at his home. It was a most elaborate affair, capable of sending and receiving long distance messages, but he made the mistake of not registering it. The authorities located the plant, and young Battershill was subsequently charged at the court in Hastings with having established a plant for the purpose of receiving communications by wireless telegraphy without having obtained the consent of the Postmaster General of New Zealand. He promised not to use the apparatus again, and was convicted and ordered to come up for sentence when called upon. In January 1914 Eric H. Battershill (16) granted a Bronze Medal for rescuing Norman Ryan (14) from drowning at Waipawa on September 13th 1913. Since that time Battershill's experiences have been of a thrilling and varied nature in many parts of the world and for the first time in many years he trod the soil of his native land when he stepped ashore from the Aorangi this morning. He has changed his name to Eric Dare for a reason which he gave when he told of his exploits, which seem like a romance. "Dead Keen to Enlist." "When the war broke out I was dead keen to enlist somewhere in the electrical branch of the Expeditionary Forces, but they told me I was too young," said the adventurer. "I made repeated application without result, and there was considerable difficulty with the Internal Affairs Department too, over that wireless stunt of mine. I think they thought I was endeavouring to communicate with the enemy or something. But I was not. Anyway, my chance came to get away. The hospital ship Maheno was about to leave New Zealand, so I went aboard and joined as a coal-trimmer. "When the ship arrived at Albany I deserted. I had a pretty thin time of it, but managed to get along by taking odd jobs at motor work. The Australians were mobilising their motor transport for the front and they took me with them. I studied hard at electricity and wireless and was fourteen months in France altogether without getting a scratch. Australian flying men were needed, and I was lucky enough to get into the Australian Flying Squadron, and had nine months off and on over the German lines, and some of my experiences were most thrilling. He Changes His Name. "When we landed in England I took the opportunity of going to work in the big electrical works which were turning out jobs for the War Office." the adventurer continued. "By this means experience which could not have been got otherwise was gained. In 1920 I came back to Australia and on the boat a brother flying officer and I used to play in the jazz band and do theatrical stunts. When we arrived in Australia we found that the electrical business was not too good, so we both decided to make a living if we could, in the theatrical line. My name Battershill was not a suitable one for the purpose in view, so I went under the stage business name of **Dare**, and my pal took the stage name of **Leslie**. We did well. Our first engagement was at the Wentworth in Sydney and next our band appeared at Dixieland. We also played and acted on the beaches. This was only a means to an end, however, so I turned it in. Takes Up Radio Work. "Just about this time radio broadcasting was becoming a popular institution. I was interested of course and took up the editorship of the "Wireless Daily," the first paper of its kind in Australia. There came a slump in the radio business, so I hopped off to Queensland and joined up with a motor firm there. Things improved and I married a Queensland girl. "Two and a half years ago I came down from the north to Sydney, where I got a job with the electrical and radio firm of Philips Lamps, where I am manager of the sales promotion department and I'm still known as Eric Dare. You see, I had to stick to the name because I was so well known by it," the visitor added. Mr Dare went on to say that he was also in charge of the technical research branch of his company's radio department. Their station is known as PCJ-T, and the company was the first in Australia to relay on a short wave, a London programme. It was again relayed through 2BL, Sydney, to New Zealand and elsewhere in the

Southern Pacific. "Well, it's good to be back," he said in answer to a question, "and it's better to come back after having made a success of things. It will be fine going home to Hastings to see old pals." Mr Dare, who is at the Grand Hotel, will leave for Hastings to-morrow evening. He will return to Australia in a few weeks' time.

1913 October, Charles Barnard Richard Maltby moved from Queen St to new premises in Station St including English paper and printing products.

1913 October, A serious Taxicab motor accident occurred near the intersection of Karamu Rd and Southampton St this morning. A taxi, driven by **Thomas Connelly** in endeavouring to avoid collision with another car approaching at right angles, crashed into a telegraph pole. The taxi was completely wrecked, and Connelly sustained serious internal injuries.

1913 November, A six-wagon owned by **Mr J. Mills, carrier of Hastings**, which was bringing a load of wool from Mokopeka station to Hastings, met with serious trouble on the Waimarama Rd. It appears that when the wagon reached the top of the first hill on tire Waimarama side of the Tuki Tuki bridge, it met a mob of cattle Two of the latter commenced to fight in front of the horses and one was knocked over. This caused the leaders to take fright, and swerving to one side, they capsized the wagon over a steep bank. The conveyance crashed through the wire fence on the roadside and roiled to the bottom of the gully some considerable distance below dragging the horses with it, the bales of wool scattering in all directions. When the vehicle came to a standstill, the horses in the shafts were tangled in the harness, and held to the ground by the weight of the load, and it was with some difficulty that they were extricated. A number of Maoris who happened to be passing at the time of the accident gave valuable assistance and eventually the horses were freed, little the worse for the experience. The wagon also escaped serious damage. The driver **Mr James Foreman** jumped clear as soon as the wagon began to tilt, and was not in any way injured. A lorry was sent out this morning for the purpose of hauling the wool and damaged wagon on to the read. Another wagon laden with wool got into difficulties on the Havelock - Hastings road on the same day. One of the wheels sank in some soft ground and the horses came to a sudden halt. The services of another team were requisitioned and the branded load was restored to the more solid part of the road.

1913 November (Joe) Joseph James Heffernan was born in Havelock North the son of Louisa and James Heffernan. James Heffernan b: May 1872 in Auckland the son of Bridget and William Heffernan in May 1903 in Masterton, he married Louisa Person b: February 1881 in NZ the daughter of Christina and Nils Person. In August 1934 N.Z.'s Oldest Constable - During the course of various speeches made in connection with the farewell ceremony at Hastings to two officers Senior-Sergeant D. J. O'Neill and Sergeant G. F. Boniseh. of the Hastings Police Force, the interesting fact was mentioned that Constable J. Heffernan, who is stationed at. Havelock North was the oldest constable in the New Zealand Police Force. Constable Heffernan joined the force in 1887. Constable James Heffernan died June 1954 in Havelock North aged 82 and Louisa Heffernan nee Person died June 1954 aged 73.

Emily Holden nee Elbourne died March 1943 aged 69.

In 1900 in NZ he married Kate Elizabeth Hobbs b: 1869 in Yackandandah Victoria Aus the daughter of Mary and Alfred Hobbs. They had four children. Kate Elizabeth Babbage nee Hobbs died July 1931 in Howick, Auckland aged 62 and Alfred Whitmore Babbage died June 1957 Waipa Waikato aged

1913 November, Death, Bainton - At private hospital Hastings, Mary Ann, the beloved wife of George Bainton: aged 59 years. The Funeral will leave the residence of her daughter, Mrs Elston, Riverslea Rd for the Hastings cemetery.

1913 November, Death - At Nurse O'Callaghan's private hospital Hastings Ellen Mary Hughes beloved husband of Charles Hughes aged 56. Deceased had been ailing from an internal complaint at different periods for some considerable time, but her condition yesterday was not considered to be very serious, so that the announcement of her demise came somewhat as a shock to her friends. The late Mrs Hughes came to reside in Hastings about thirty-three years ago and with the exception of a short period spent at Havelock North and Masterton, had lived here during the intervening years. In her association with her husband in business for many years, she was regarded as a woman of shrewd commercial ability. She was an ardent worker on behalf of the Roman Catholic Church and in the social adjunct as an organiser she was considered to have few equals. The Rev Dean Smyth and Father Tymons of Meeanee had both attended the funeral of her son in September 1909. Of charitable disposition, the decease extended an unostentatious but open hearted benevolence to many deserving objects and her kindly nature made her many firm friends. The late Mrs Hughes said leaves a widower for whom great sympathy will be felt. The funeral will leave the Roman Catholic Church where a Requiem Service will be held, the funeral will leave the Church for the Hastings cemetery. They had five children - 1914, Francis William Fergusson jnr, 1916 Ada Rose Fergusson, 1921 Charles Douglas Fergusson, 1924 John Henry Fergusson and 1927 Stanley James Fergusson. WW1 Francis William Fergusson snr a plumber at Lomas Settlement Hastings. Ada Florence Fergusson nee Morgan died May 1955 in Havelock North aged 66 and Francis William Fergusson snr died June 1973 in Havelock North aged 82.



1913 December, Constable William James (Dick) Connor b: June 1882 in Hamilton the son of Mary and Robert Connor. In January 1902 William a stock drover had volunteered for the 6th Contingent for service in South Africa. In 1905 he married Charlotte Krogmann b: January 1884 in Hamilton. They had one daughter - April 1906 Gwendoline Hazel Connor. 1914 Charlotte and William James Connor a police constable of 512 Whitehead Rd Hastings. In October 1923 Constable W. J. Connor of Hastings left for Hobart. He was for 13 years a police constable at Hastings, transferred to Frankton Junction in June 1926. Constable W. J. Connor was fare welled at the Grand Hotel by the members of Hastings legal profession. Connor was at one time a member of the Rugby Sub Union and the referees Association. William James (Dick) Connor died January 1933 in Waikato aged 50 and Charlotte Connor nee Krogmann died October 1947 in Palmerston North aged 63.

1913 December, Molly Elwyn Croudis was born a Hastings the daughter of Irene Elizabeth and Cecil George Lindhurst. **Cecil George Lyndhurst Croudis** b: February 1881 in Nelson the son of Annie and Robert Croudis in 1911 he married Irene Elizabeth Goslin b: April 1889 in Waiau Canterbury. They had two children - 1910 Keith Lyndhurst Croudis. 1911 - 1914 Irene Elizabeth and Cecil George Lyndhurst Croudis a carpenter of 307 Arvedsen St. Irene Elizabeth Croudis nee Goslin died 1931 aged 42 and Cecil George Lyndhurst Croudis died July 1944 aged 63.

1913 December, Hastings Fire – Constable Saves Four Lives. A fire at 2.30 o'clock this morning, starting in a Chinese restaurant in the main street, spread to the adjoining premise of Messrs Little and Fairey (butchers) William Kirchner (confectioner) and Mrs Ingrain (draper) The flames had a good hold when the fire was discovered and the shops were gutted, nothing being saved. The insurances are not available. The prompt action of **Constable Connor** saved the lives of Mr and Mrs Kirchner and two children who were sleeping in the upstairs portion of the premises.

1913 December, At Hastings the employees of Messrs Le Quesne and Cowan made a presentation of a handsome clock and afternoon lea set to Mr Frank Ferguson on the eve of his marriage. Mr Ferguson also received a silver coffee service from the members of the firm.

1913 December, The wedding at St. Patrick's Church Napier of Mr John James Mullany to Miss Annie Stacia Doran, third daughter of Mr James Doran of Hastings. The bride was given away by her brother Mr M. Doran and Mr F. Mahoney was best man. The Rev. Father O'Connor officiated.

1913 December, Samuel James Brooking b:1888 in Tomoana, the son of Elizabeth and Samuel Brooking married Ethel Charlotte Zachan b: July 1889 in Ahuriri the daughter of Ovidia and Ernest Zachan. They had one child – March 1918 Reginald Samuel Brooking at Hastings, he had four children with Eline Alice Gabrielsen. Samuel James Brooking died a young father at Hastings November 1918 aged 31 and Ethel Charlotte Brooking nee Zachan died September 1976 in Taupo aged 87.

1913 December, On Saturday night a pedestrian James Burnside was knocked down at the Carlton Hotel corner by a motor car driven by Rangi Otene. The car travelling was tempting to pass Burnside when he suddenly stepped back in front of it. Beyond a bruised leg, he suffered no ill effects.

1913 December, The death occurred at the Napier Hospital on Thursday morning of Mr **Owen Alman**, a very old resident of Hastings. The deceased, who had been in the employ of Messrs. **Robert Holt and Sons as a driver** since their Hastings branch was first opened many years ago, was at his work as usual on Wednesday, but in the afternoon complained to a fellow employee of a swelling in his mouth. Later he saw a doctor, by whom he was immediately ordered to the Napier Hospital. He was taken to that institution, where he was operated upon, but he died without regaining consciousness. Death was due to septic poisoning. The deceased, who was familiarly known as "Owen." was 60 years of age. His straight forward manner and genially made him extremely popular with a very large section of the community, and the announcement of his demise was received with sincere regret. The funeral took place at Napier yesterday. Deceased's fellow employees from Hastings acted as pall bearers.

1913 December, Geoffrey Morris Cartwright was born in Hastings, the son of Lizzie Maggie and Walter Cooper Cartwright, he married Blanche Cecilia Bellini in May 1938 in Auckland. **Walter Cooper Cartwright** b: May 1872 in Sleaford, Lincolnshire, the son of Jane and Thomas Cartwright. In May 1901 in Rotherham Yorkshire he married Lizzie Maggie Kesteven b: July 1875 in Rotherham Yorkshire, the daughter of Eliza and James Kesteven. They had three children - January 1903 Thomas Elliott Cartwright he married Florence May Stone in November 1927 and February 1910 John Walter Cartwright he married Bessie Lee King in June 1938. 1914 Walter Cooper Cartwright a linotypist of Havelock Rd Hastings and 1917 Walter Cooper Cartwright a linotypist. of Louie St. Walter Cooper Cartwright died January 1925 in the Bay of Plenty aged 52. Lizzie Maggie Cartwright nee Kesteven married Charles Clement Charles in 1929 in Hastings. Charles Clement Charles died December 1945 in Hastings aged 76 and Lizzie Maggie Cartwright / Charles nee Kesteven died November 1958 in Hastings aged 83.





Sutherland (draper) Reardon and Wright (mercer) and Clapham (stationer) has been sold from the estate of the late W. A. Beecroft **to Mr (Jack) John William Holden jnr.** The price paid was £7000 cash, which works out at about £100 per foot on the main street frontage. Later became site of the Holden Building.



J. Perritt in October 1923 when Messrs Wm Haughton and Co of Australia acquired the interest of Mr Wilson who was forced to retire owing to ill health.







1913, Sullivan, Ross and Co, successors to R. Sorenson, Karamu Rd sth



1914, Yates & McPhail, Grocers, Gisborne and Hastings, returned to Hastings to open a new grocery and provision shop in Farrelly's buildings. Mr Yates having previously been in business with Ballinger in Hastings in 1907

In May 1917, the business known as Yates and McPhail grocers, Hastings will in future be carried on as Yates and Co Frank Yates having bought out J. A. McPhail's interest. But remained Yates and McPhail.

1908 Frank Yates married Annie Woods. Daughter - 1908 Kathleen Comfort Yates, Frank Yates resided in Hastings 1914, Annie and Frank Yates a grocer at Heretaunga St in 1919 Annie and Frank Yates at 604 Ellison Rd. Frank was still listed at Hastings from 1920 – 1933, they moved to Palmerston North then to Wellington, where Francis Yates a grocer died in October 1934 aged 52 and Annie Yates widow died April 1965 aged 84.

In 1920 they moved into the old Ballinger Bros building. In April 1924 Yates and Co changed hands to Mr T. W. Tate manager of Roach's Ltd, grocery department. Annie and Frank Yates left the district.

John Archibald McPhail b: October 1875 in Torosay Argyll Scot, the son of Catherine and Hugh McPhail. In 1911 in NZ he married Margaret Jane Florence Kilpatrick b: October 1883 in Waitati Otago the daughter of Agnes and Alexander Kilpatrick. They had one daughter in Gisborne - February 1916 Mary Winifred McPhail she had one child with John Duncan Brown. In June 1925 John Archibald McPhail a grocer 204 Southampton St east who had been suffering ill health for some time was found dead in one of the hot salt water baths at the Municipal Baths in Napier aged 48 and Margaret Jane Florence McPhail nee Kilpatrick died April 1960 in Otago aged 76.



1914, Hargreaves Boarding House, Queen St east, the former Zealandia, George and Jamieson, later named the Windsor private hotel July 1920.

James Smith Hargreaves b: 1872 in New Zealand, the son of Ellen and William Hargreaves. In 1905 he married Ivy Gertrude McGrane b: December 1881 in Nelson, the daughter of Emma and Francis McGrane. No children. From 1914 – 1920 James was proprietor of Hargreaves boarding house at the corner of Queen St east and Warren St nth. Ivy Gertrude Hargreaves nee McGrane died July 1921 at Clive Grange aged 39, James Smith Hargreaves returned to Dunedin where he died November 1935 aged 63.



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1914, Samuel Kearney, Hairdresser & Tobacconist, Central Buildings, Heretaunga St east in 1923 next to the Carlton Hotel

Samuel Maxwell Kearney b: July 1878 in Auckland, the son of Mary and John Kearney he married Hannah b: May 1889. Children - Verna Joan Kearney b:1917 and Ronald Kearney b:1920 he died July 1944. They lived at 501 Avenue Rd, their daughter Verna Kearney died at her parents residence 411 Park Rd Hastings aged 7. Samuel Maxwell Kearney died July 1971 in Hastings aged 92 and Hannah Kearney September 1974 aged 85.

1914, Richard Goggin, a farmer at 210 Caroline Rd Gove Rd Hastings. **Richard Goggin** b:1847 the son of Ann and James Goggin. In1870 in Cork, Ireland he married Julia Cotter b: 1845, the daughter of Johanna and James Cotter She had seven brothers and two sisters. Julia Goggin nee Cotter died October 1911 in New Zealand aged 66 and Richard Goggin died May 1921 at Hastings aged 74.

1914, Bernard John Last-Harris b: July 1884 in New Zealand, the son of Martha and George Harris, he had four brothers and seven sisters. In March 1908 Bernard John Last-Harris married Maude Rose Allan. In 1914 Maud Rose and Bernard John Last-Harris a railway servant resided at 511 Avenue Rd west. A Leo Harris also a railway worker resided there. Bernard John Last-Harris died March 1963 in Auckland aged 78.

1914, Arthur Dawson Stewart b: April 1889 in Napier the son of Helen (Ellen) Sarah and John Stewart of Hastings married Myrtle Lilian Baker b: December 1892 in Rotorua the daughter of Kate and John Baker. They had three children – January 1915 Arthur Douglas (Doug) Stewart, September 1916 Jack Cartwright Stewart, 1919 Lorna Helen Stewart. Myrtle Lilian Stewart nee Baker died June 1921 in Hawke's Bay aged 28 and Arthur Dawson Stewart died February 1937 in Hastings aged 47.

1914, Laura Emily and Alfred Joseph Rushton a traveller at 600 Alexandra St. **Alfred Joseph Rushton** b:1868, in 1904 he married Laura Emily Smith, in 1922 they resided at Beatty St. Alfred Joseph Rushton died at Hastings November 1938 aged 70 and Laura Emily Rushton nee Smith died at Hastings November 1943.

1914, **Edward Ware** b: March 1881, Woodville the son of Elizabeth and Henry Ware. In March 1907 he married Ada Edith Marriott b: August 1888 in Masterton, the daughter of Emily and John Thomas Marriott. They had two children - August 1909 Frederick George Ware and December 1913 Irma Elizabeth Ware she married Raymond Masters Timms in November 1937. Edward Ware a farmer and sawmiller resided at 310 Riverslea Rd sth where he had a sawmill at the rear of his property and manufactured boxes, he suffered two fires within a few years. Edward Ware died at Hastings February 1943 aged 61 and Ada Edith Ware nee Marriott died July 1982 aged 93.

1914, William Frederick Hicks b: 1909 a shorthand writer at corner Eastborne St and Hastings St, he died at Rotorua May 1977.

1914, John Patrick Maggin b: May 1885 in Hastings the son of Norah and Patrick Maggin married Nora Magdalen Fogarty. John Patrick Maggin died October 1916 in Hastings aged 31.

1914, William Henry Coombe a gardener 'Swathmoor' Te Mata Rd. In 1916 WW1 Reserves William Henry Coombe of Hastings 1st Division. **William Henry Coombe** b:1897 the son of Mr. Coombe in December 1917 he married Bessie Curtis b: May 1897 the daughter of Johanna and John Curtis. They had one daughter - 1923 Valariemary Coombe she married David William James Laing. In March 1923 Death - At the Napier Hospital, Bessie Coombe nee Curtis the beloved wife of William Henry Coombe aged 26. William Henry Coombe had one son with Margaret, he died in Palmerston North.

1914, Robert John Catherall b: July 1874 in Napier, the son of Mary Ann and James Catherall married Josephine Thomson Leitch. They had one son. Robert John Catherall a compositor was for many years on the staff of the HB Tribune, HB Newspapers Ltd. The South African War Veterans Association and the Eureka Lodge of Druids. Josephine Thomson Catherall nee Leitch of 804 Cook St Hastings died at the Hastings Memorial Hospital in October 1934 aged 60 and Robert John Catherall died January 1950 in Hastings aged 75.

1914, Miss Mary Ellen Hannah of Hastings and her sisters Barbara and Annie Hannah and Mr Thomas Hannah conducted the restaurant in Karamu Rd nth (near the Bank of Australasia) known as 'The Trocadero' - poss a new venue relocated from Station St after another fire. In 1922 Mary Ellen Hannah a spinster, Mary Katherine Hannah spinster, Thomas Hannah a restaurant proprietor all listed at the Trocadero Restaurant, Karamu Rd. In May 1923 they went to Sydney where Mary Ellen Hannah died in February 1925 aged 27 daughter of Mrs M. Hannah of Hastings. poss the children of Martha and Mansoor Hannah a farmer of Park Rd sth.


1914 – 1919, **George Victor Percy** a clerk of Alexander St Hastings. He went to Wellington. George Victor Percy b: July 1891 in Hastings the son of Isabella and Andrew Percy married Margaret Mary Hill b: November 1894 in Port Chalmers Otago. One son – 1920 William Percy. George Victor Percy died September 1954 in Karori Wellington aged 63, and Margaret Mary Percy nee Hill died July 1967 in Karori Wellington aged 72.

1914 – 1919, Alice Mary and James Brown Percy custodian at the Hastings racecourse cottage. **James Brown Percy** the son Janet and the late Richard Sleep Percy of Hororata Christchurch and brother of Charles Howard Percy the well known in Hastings as the proprietor of the Central billiard room opposite the Grand Hotel. who died at Hastings April 1925 aged 47. Alice Mary and James Brown Percy at 507 Burnett St in 1925.

1914 -1919 Annie and Jesse Pointon a storeman of 410 Terrance Rd Hastings. **Jesse Pointon** b: 1855 at St. Helen's, Lancashire Eng. He arrived in New Zealand in 1881 by the sailing ship *Weathersfield*. Setting up home in Christchurch he carried on his occupation as a moulder with the firm of Cooper and Duncan. In 1882 he moved up to Napier and was in the employ of the Vulcan Foundry there for a period. He first married Agnes Neill b: 1855 they had five sons and one daughter at Napier - January 1883 Edwin Arthur Pointon he married Maud Amelia Busley in 1911, July 1884 Charlotte Yates Pointon she married Hatton, September 1885 Jesse Pointon he married Hilda Meredith Garner in April 1915, October 1888 Samuel John Pointon he married Florence Maud Potton in 1918, July 1890 Theophilus Pointon he married Violet May Benney in 1911 and July 1895 David John Pointon. Jesse Pointon joined the staff of the New Zealand Loan and Mercantile Agency Co Ltd 1887 as one of its storemen at Port Ahuriri. He was later transferred to the Hastings branch. Agnes Pointon nee Neill died August 1907 in New Zealand aged 52. In 1909 Jesse Pointon married Annie Carberry they had one son April 1911 Charles Ernest Pointon. Jesse Pointon was well known chiefly in his interest in sport. For many years he was on the Hawke's Bay Rugby Union management. He retired from work in 1926 after having served the company for 40 years. Mr Pointon was predeceased by his first wife several years ago and married again. Jesse Pointon died at Hastings in November 1926 aged 71 and Annie Pointon nee Carberry died at Hastings in 1928.


1914 January, **Frank Stephen Byrne** b: June 1885 local manager NZ Clothing Factory married in Hastings Jane Hunt b: May 1892 the daughter of Jane Barnes and John Hunt. They had three children - January 1917 at Lascelles St, Mary Barbara (Mollie) Byrne. Frank Stephen Byrne died May 1954 in Napier aged 68 and Jane Byrne nee Hunt died December 1958 in Waikato aged 66.

1914 January, Hastings Fire – Cottage Destroyed, No Water. The Hastings fire brigade received a call at about 3 o'clock this morning to an outbreak of fire in a five roomed dwelling in **Terrace Rd, near Beatson's Park**, owned by Mr George Tucker (an employee of **Mr H. Hitchcock, baker**) and occupied by Mr George Davidson, carrier. Mr Davidson retired to bed at about 11 p.m., and about 3 a.m. was awakened by a crackling noise in the room opposite to the one in which he was sleeping. On opening his bedroom door the flames rushed in and he barely had time to seize his clothes and escape through a window. He communicated with the fire station from a neighbour's telephone and the brigade were quickly on the scene with the chemical engine, the hose reel not being taken owing to the absence of water. The house was doomed when the firemen arrived, but with the aid of the chemical engine they did excellent service in preventing the flames spreading to a shed at the rear and the adjoining residence. Mr Tucker's house was burned to the ground and Mr Davidson lost the whole of his furniture and effects and £10 in notes. The building was insured in the State office for £250 and the contents for £75 in the South British. Mr Davidson estimates his loss at about £80 above the insurance.

1914 January, The second wooden Union Bank being moved in sections to another site on the corner of Willowpark Rd and Heretaunga St east, one section got stuck on **Queen St east** when a water main collapsed just past the H B Tribune office and McCormick's left with Simpson & Bate Barristers & Solicitors on Karamu Rd nth on right, by S. Clapham

1914 January 20, The actual removal of the building, which for many years has been the premises of the Hastings branch of the Union Bank, from the corner of Heretaunga St and Karamu Rd to the vacant site at the **corner of Havelock Rd and Willowpark Rd for Dr. Story**, was commenced with a traction engine this morning by W. J. Byrne. Being too wide for the roadways the structure was divided into two sections. The first half of the building got into difficulties opposite the "Tribune" office corner where the near wheels of the trolley became bogged in a subsidence above the borough water main. With the aid of jacks the building was raised to the level of the road and the corner was negotiated without further trouble. Very little of Queen St had been covered, however, before the wheels again sank and the same thing happened a few yards further on.

1914 January, The first section of the old Union Bank building has covered another stage of its journey. Hauling was resumed about 7.30 last evening, with a 10-12h.p. engine, but a long delay was occasioned at the Warren St intersection of Queen St before the electric light cables could be lowered. Another start was made after midnight, and everything went fairly smoothly until midway between Warren St and Hastings St, where the trolley wheels sank through the crust of the road. Several hours then elapsed before another pull was made. By 6 o'clock this morning the building had passed over the intersection of Queen St and Hastings St, where it now stands. Poss named by Dr. Story – as Manitoba House? Later a boarding house on Willowpark Rd nth and The Villa apartments.

1914 January, Harold William Tickner joined the Union Bank at Hastings, the son of Agnes and the late Arthur Tickner.

1914 February, Cecil Lane, taxi proprietor, Hastings, has been ill for the past three weeks, will be on the road again in a few days. Cecil Samuel Lane son of Thomazine and William Lane.

1914 February, Messrs C. R. Wilson and Co. give a final reminder of the auction sale they are holding on account **Mr Phillips, Norton Rd.** As Mr Phillips' is leaving Hastings everything must be sold and great bargains will be the rule of the day.

1914 February, The tenders of Messrs Bealey and Angus of Napier, has been accepted for the erection of the **new**Union Bank brick building at the corner of Heretaunga St and Karamu Rd Hastings. The contract price is in the vicinity of £7000


1914 February, Mr **Edward Dalby Collison** died at Hastings following being thrown from his horse, and although he sustained a sever shacking, no serious consequences were anticipated and his recovery was considered only a matter of

a few weeks rest. However, his condition became grave and despite the aid of the best medical skill he passed away at his residence in this district. He was engaged in sheepfarming at which he was largely successful. He was nominated by J. Garnett for the Mayoralty. He leaves a widow, two sons - Messrs. William and Edward Collison, and three daughters - Mrs B. Proctor (Hastings) Mrs T. Holden (Gisborne and Miss R. Collison (Hastings) besides eighteen grandchildren. Mr and Mrs Collison celebrated their golden wedding on May 6th of last year. Mrs Sarah Collison died in June 1915 at Quon Lodge, Marine Parade, Napier aged 73, relict of the late E. D. Collison of Hastings.


1914 February, The **Hawke's Bay Fruit Canning Company**, which was formed at Hastings recently to take up the industry of jam-making and fruit-canning, which seem likely to go out of existence owing to the Frimley works having closed down, is now an established fact (says the Tribune), and operations are in full swing. A satisfactory lease has been acquired of premises in **Karamu Rd**, and preserving is being carried on with despatch. It is hoped that the efforts to conserve this important industry will meet with success.

1914 February, **Generous gift** - As the result of representations made by the Mayor of Hastings, Mr Nelson of Waikoko, has presented the borough with a strip of land which will enable the southern end of **Caroline Rd** to be connected with the approaches of the proposed new railway platform. This will save a great deal of inconvenience to residents in this locality when the **new railway station** is built.


Altered Caroline Rd - named after George IV wife, ran from Frederick St east alongside the Heretaunga School grounds on the J. N. Williams block and over Hicks boundary to St Aubyn St east. In June 1900 Caroline Rd still had fences crossing the road, erected by the owners who had adjoining sections on both sides of the road.



Heretaunga School grounds became Nelson Park in 1921 - a remaining portion of Caroline Rd was retained to provide southern access off St. Aubyn St east to Nelson Park and the caretakers cottage opposite the first State School site, was named Williams St named after Mrs Wm. Nelson nee Williams, then changed to Holt Pl



Caroline Rd narrowed at St. Aubyn St entrance, later named Williams St, Caroline Rd veered into Railway St to join the new proposed Railway Station

In February 1921, The widening of Caroline Rd – The undesirable narrow and dangerous entrance from St Aubyn St east alongside Holt's timber yard. Officially the narrow portion named Williams St after Mrs Wm. Nelson. Mr Holt who agreed to relinquish the land (which was part of his timber yard) necessary to widen Caroline Rd provided he receives equal area on the northern side of his mill and adjoining his yard.

1921 February, Widening of Caroline Rd to Williams St - There are not many residents in Hastings who have failed to notice the undesirable narrow and dangerous entrance to Caroline Rd, from St. Aubyn St alongside Holt's timber yard. Officially the narrow portion called Williams St and the remainder of the highway is known as Caroline Rd. When the railway station is built on the new site, provision has been made for a new street, leading from the back of the railway station and running into Caroline Rd, almost opposite the Nelson cricket ground gates. The responsibility for the foundation of this street has always been on the council, it is apparent that, as soon as the station occupies its new site, and this new street is opened, the narrow entrance to Caroline Rd could no longer be allowed to remain at any cost, and would have to be remedied. Some six months ago the Mayor Mr G. Ebbett brought up the question at a council meeting and the matter was left in his hands. He has discussed it with the council, in committee, several times since, with relevance to obstacles which had arisen but, at a committee meeting of the council on Thursday evening, he reported that an arrangement had been made finally, subject to the council's approval. He stated that he had been in correspondence with Mr F. W. Williams and he and Crs. Davis and White have had various interviews with Mr Holt who agreed to give the land (which was part of his timber yard) necessary to widen Caroline Rd, provided he received an equal area on the northern side of his mill and adjoining his yard. The owners of the whole of the land between Holt's yard and the proposed new street are represented by Mr F. W. Williams of Napier who had been more than generous in his effort to assist the council to get the street widened. He agreed to sell to the council the piece of land Mr Holt required at a very reasonable price but. as his principals also owned the land on the other side of the new street such a sale would cause the depth of land on the two sides of the street to be unequal and he asked that, in such case, the council should shift the street further north, so as to divide the balance of his land equally. As an alternative, Mr Williams offered to sell the whole of the land between Holt's and the new street, for £700 and he would donate to the council £100 towards the cost of forming the street, provided the council undertook to construct it as soon as the railway station was shifted or within five years. Mr Holt agreed to buy the balance of the land, about half, over and above that which the council had to give him for his land for £450, leaving the cost to the council £250 or less Mr Williams's donation £150. There was some difficulty about pos session because the piece of land which Mr. Holt has to transfer to the council is practically all occupied with Permanent scaffolding and timber which lie will have to remove, and the Mayor said he wished to make it clear that while the widening of the street would be assured it could not be done immediately. There is a hollow in the land Air. Holt is taking from the council and this extends also into that which he was buying and he pointed out be could not move until that was filled up. Finally it was agreed that the council would fill up the hollow in the land Mr Holt was taking in exchange, Mr Holt to pay the cost but not to be charged a royalty. The council would also fill up the remaining portion of the hollow at Mr Holt's expense, Mr Holt to pay the cost, plus 1/- a load royalty. Immediately the hollow is filled to the average level, Mr Holt undertakes to remove his scaffolding and timber with all reasonable speed, and to give possession to the council. He gets possession of the piece he is to take in exchange from the council immediately and is to pay a rental of £15 a year, to commence six months from now and until such time as he gives possession of the other piece to the council. The council unanimously agreed to confirm the arrangement made and a letter is to be sent to Mr Williams thanking him for his generosity and assistance in the matter. The Mayor pointed out that it would be necessary to rename the street as the same street could not well have two names. He mentioned that there was nothing in the town except this small narrow piece of street called after the late Mr J. N. Williams, who had been one of the oldest residents and greatest benefactors. He had donated Cornwall Park to the borough and the Mayor suggested that the whole street, when widened, be called Williams St. The matter of renaming this and Several other will be brought up at the next meeting of the council, on the motion of Cr. O'Neill.

1921 March, At the Hastings Borough Council, when the renaming of certain streets was under discussion, the Mayor asked if the name Caroline Rd had any personal significance and he was assured that it had not. It now appears that it was called after Mrs Wm. Nelson and the Mayor is of opinion that under those circumstances, the name should be allowed to stand, but that some other street should be called after the late Mr J. N Williams. He has therefore given

notice of the following motion - That the resolution of the council dated September 14th 1916 renaming of Caroline Rd to Williams St be rescinded and that the name Caroline Rd be retained and also that the resolution to the council of the same date, renaming Quarry Rd, Townshend St, he rescinded and that Quarry Rd be renamed Williams St. But Boundary Rd near Tomoana was later named Williams St after Mr J. N. Williams.

1914 February, **William Alfred Smith** b: January 1890 in Hastings the son of Mary and John Thomas Smith married Mary Smith b: August 1893 in NZ, the daughter of Frances and James Smith. They had seven children. William Alfred Smith a groceries assistant for Gallagher & Co.


1914 February, An old man named William Dance aged about 70 years, a resident of Jervois St Hastings was found dead at about eleven o'clock this morning. Dance left home to gather onions in a garden situate a few chains from his house and it was here that his body was subsequently found, death presumably being due to heart failure. He leaves a widow. In December 1919 Esse Jane Dance nee Morris died at the residence of her daughter Mrs Peck Ohakune, Jane relict of the late William Dance late of Hastings aged 74 years.

1914 February, Death, Breuer - At Riverside Clive Mary Lucy the beloved wife of Charles Joseph Breuer aged 35. Mrs Bluer was in very good health up to yesterday when she suddenly took bad with a heart affliction and died shortly afterwards. She leaves a large family of young children. The funeral leaves Riverside for the Hastings cemetery.

1914 February, Hannah Hunt nee Bayley b:1837 in Walsall Staffordshire, the daughter of Mary and Clark Bayley died at Hastings aged 77 and was buried in Pigeon Bay, Canterbury. In 1858 in Norton Canes, Staffordshire she married Jeremiah Hunt and had 15 children.

1914 February, John Johnston McNab b: October 1880 in Otago, the son of Catherine and Alexander McNab married Frances Caroline Westall b: 1894 in Ramsbury, Wiltshire. They had one child - March 1916 Muriel McNab at Hastings. John Johnston McNab died April 1965 in Hastings aged 84 and Frances Caroline McNab nee Westall died July 1980 in Hastings aged 86.

1914 February, Mr George Redmond who is assistant advance agent for Wirths' Circus," while riding a bicycle along Karamu Rd yesterday afternoon was **struck by a taxi car belonging to Mr Wilkins**. He was thrown heavily to the ground with the result that he sustained a nasty cut under the knee, one of the tendons being severed. Dr. Tosswill attended Mr Redmond who was later removed to the Napier Hospital.



1914 March, Mrs A. T. Ebbett announces that she will carry on the business of her late husband J. B. Ebbett, of Miller St, with the assistance of a thoroughly efficient staff and D. S. Shaw. As was the practice of the late Mr Ebbett, all drains will be guaranteed for six months


1914 March, A very pleasant little ceremony took place yesterday afternoon at Messrs Booth, Macdonald and Co, Market St sth Hastings office, when the members of the local staff assembled to say "good-bye" to their late colleague. Mr W. Hector Jones, and to make him a presentation as a memento of their three and half years' association with him in the company s employ. Mr. W. H. Jones has resigned his position with Messrs. Booth. Macdonald and Co. Ltd to take up an appointment on the local powerhouse staff.

1914 April, Birth, Doleman - At Longlands, Hastings, H.B, to Mr and Mrs G. S. Doleman, a son.





Moore's. He had the Rogers Paint agency and Mr C. W. Hallworth has charge of the sign-writing and window ticket branch, also a leadlight window and artist supplies. Later moved his business to Quarry Rd



1914 May, **Adolphus Frederick Douglas** b: 1882 the son of Janet and William Douglas died suddenly at his residence in Nelson St Hastings. Educated at the Napier High School with brother William John Douglas. Douglas Bros owners of Te Mahanga station well-known sheepfarmers and was well and popularly known in racing circles as the owner of several horses, in fact all branches of sport he supported liberally. In 1910 he married Emily (Poppy) Freeman. The deceased had been suffering from heart trouble which presumably was the cause of death. He was seen by the housemaid going from the billiard room to his bedroom. Lascelles is held by the settlers of Mahora South and the surrounding neighbourhood, and the manner in which his efforts on behalf of the children of that district nave been appreciated, was demonstrated at the Stortford Lodge Mission Hall last evening, when a social was held for the purpose of bidding Mr and Mrs Lascelles- Good Bye. Mr Lascelles having offered his services to the Baptist Union for Home Mission work. The hall was crowded, about 200 adults and children being present. Songs, recitations and instrumental items made up a very entertaining programme, and during the evening, Mr G. Wilson Warren on behalf of the resident's of the district presented Mr Lascelles with an illuminated address which bore tribute to the recipient's good work in various ways for the advancement of the district and expressed regret at his departure. 

1914 June, **The Steam Straker wagon**, purchased by the Hastings Borough Council May 1908 at a cost of about £899 and which was shortly after relegated to the scrap heap, has been put into commission again and is giving every satisfaction. The engine was recently overhauled by the driver of the new steam roller Mr A. E. Spooner and on being put to a test, the machine hauled a four ton load of metal from the bottom of the pit in Quarry Rd without any difficulty. In July 1914 The Hastings Borough Councils Straker wagon loaded with metal, broke through a culvert opposite the Council

Chambers. Some damage was done to the asphalt and kerbing and the metal had to be unloaded before the wagon could be shifted.

Arthur Edward Spooner snr b: October 1860 in Sculthorpe Norfolk the son of Eliza and Joseph Spooner. They had three children – August 1926 To Mr and Mrs Harold Row of Longlands a son. August 1926 James Donald Row at Longlands he married Irene Mabel Covic in 1950. Winifred Daisy Row nee Bowen died April 1950 in Napier aged 60 and Harold Row died in 1973 in Napier aged 85.

Martin of Canterbury and Miss Hilda Kathleen Apperley daughter of Mr and Mrs Apperley of Havelock Rd Hastings. Rev. T. J. Wallis officiated. The bride was given away by her father. The bridesmaids were Miss Molly Patton of Gisborne, Miss May E. Stone and Miss Mary Apperley sister of the bride. Mr Alfred Chudleigh of Christchurch was bestman and Mr Guy Struthers also of Christchurch, acted as groomsman. After the ceremony a reception was held at Mafeking Villa, the residence of the bride's parents. Mr and Mrs Martin subsequently left for Wanganui where the honeymoon will be spent prior to taking up their residence in Christchurch.

1914 June, PROPOSED PARKVALE SCHOOL. Settlers residing east of Riverslea and Havelock Roads Hastings who are interested in the erection of a **school on the Parkvale estate** are requested to attend a meeting to be held at Mr T. Miller's residence, St. George's Rd.

1914 June, About twenty householders attended a meeting for the **erection of a side school on the Parkvale** Estate, Riverslea, Mr Miller was voted to the chair. The secretary of the Hawke's Bay Education Board (Mr G. Crawshaw) was also in attendance and an apology was received from Mr G. H. Roach. The chairman explained that **an acre** of land for a school site had been presented by **Mr Fred Howard, but an additional two acres would be required** before a school could be erected. After some discussion, Messrs J. Beatson jnr and T. Miller were appointed a committee to wait upon the owner of the sections adjoining the area given by **Mr Fred Howard** to ascertain the terms on which these could be acquired. When this information is forthcoming, it is understood the Education Board will place the matter before the Government for favourable consideration. A canvass which was recently made of the area which the proposed new school would serve shows that there are 163 children of school age and 115 under that age and the house holders therefore consider t hey have a strong case to lay before the Department.

1914 June, A man named **Andrew Tomb**, about 50 years of age was found dead near the Havelock bridge about 7 o'clock yesterday morning by Mr **Arthur Woon**, who lives close by. The body was in a stooping position with the left hand gripping the top rail of the left wing of the bridge on the Hastings side, and the head facing the road. From this it is conjectured that deceased went to sleep while sitting on the rail, and fell off being asphyxiated by the collar of his coat, which was buttoned tightly at the neck. Constable Heffernan was communicated with, and Dr. McKibbin was called to the scene, but he could only pronounce life extinct. The body was subsequently removed to the Hastings morgue. Deceased was a very old resident of Hastings and lived in a whare on a small farm in Ada St. He was known for drunkenness and was unmarried and as far as is known had no relatives in the Dominion. His mother and sister reside in England. Tomb also owned a property in Havelock North, and is said to have had a considerable sum of money in the Savings Bank.

1914 June, The purpose of establishing direct road of communication between Hastings and Elsthorpe was advanced a further stage this morning when a conference was held at the Council Chambers, Hastings of delegates representing the local bodies interested and settlers residing in the locality. The Hastings Borough Council was represented by the Mayor (Mr W. Hart) and Crs Styles and Wade and the Hawke's Bay County Council by Crs F. L. Gordon (chairman) T. E.

Crosse and Cr. T. M. Chambers. The settlers of the Kauranaki block were represented by Messrs **Guy Rochfort, W. Couper,** and H. Campbell and the Elsthorne settlers by Messrs. M. Ryan and H. Tiffin. The Mayor, who was voted to the chair, said that the movement was originally initiated by the Hastings Borough Council five years ago, but the council was prevented by law from spending money on the proposal. The council was, however, in thorough sympathy with the scheme and the townspeople would give it their hearty support. Mr T. M. Chambers said that some six or seven years ago the Hastings Borough Council approached the Hawke's Bay County Council in reference to the road and bridge now proposed and made an offer of £1000 towards the cost. A few days ago a meeting had been held at Elsthorpe, when the cost of the scheme was apportioned. The idea of erecting a bridge had been abandoned in favour of a road joining the present Tuki Tuki bridge. This would make the distance 11 miles longer, but would save the cost of the bridge.



The principal streets of Hastings were laid over using Union bitumen asphalt from 1915 and the maintenance cost has since been negligible.

Post note - In April 1947 it was required to fill about 30 yards of cavity that formed in Heretaunga St under the thick road crust foundation the cavity caused by a leaking sewer (poss a crack caused in the 1931 quake) The road foundation laid down around 1914 – 1915 between Hastings St and Nelson St, and in Station St nth (Russel St) was so well made that no further attention had been necessary. A solid thick crust was formed using limestone spalls 10 – 12 inches in diameter laid down first and smaller spalls on top. This thick layer was then covered by a mixture of tar and bitumen – the mixing of which was all done in the borough yard and transported to the site.

1914 August, The council is doing another five chain section of roading in Heretaunga St, the previous section was a failure, botched by amateur road workers. Carting metal from Fernhill at about 25s a yard. There is much better limestone at Paki Paki close to the railway line and thousands of yards of blue rock metal at the Councils twenty acre quarry at Bridge pa. The Fernhill experiment blocked the traffic for months

1914 August, Allan Joseph Cassin was born in Hastings the son of Miriam Catherine and John Joseph a fruitgrower. Allan Joseph Cassin a school teacher of Riverslea Rd sth married Leonarda (Dina) Nadina Pepe.


1914 August, Thomas Roy Anthony Banks was born in Hastings, the son of Margaret Theresa and George William Banks.

1914 August, Klara EvyElna Seastrand - Ivy Anna Elsa Sjöstrand was born at Hastings the daughter of Elna Gustav Edwin Seastrand, she married Albert Edward Chapman in 1937. **Gustav Edvin Sjöstrand** b: April1885 the son of Elna and Nils Sjöstrand, in March 1908 he married Elna Svensson b: July 1887 in Anderslöv Skåne Sweden the daughter of Kersti and Anders Svensson. They had seven children. Elna Sjöstrand nee Svensson died October 1934 in Napier aged 47, Gustav Edvin Sjöstrand married Agnes Andrews in March 1936 in Napier. Gustav Edvin Sjöstrand died July 1971 in Napier aged 86, buried Hastings cemetery.


1914 August, Alfred Waugh b: December 1879 the son of Eliza and Robert Waugh of Wellington married Mrs Sarah Jane McClellan she had two children with her previous late husband Robert William McClellan – 1893 Gladys Maud McClellan she married R. L. Lawrence and 1897 Robert (Roy) William McClellan. In 1911 Alfred Waugh a slaughterman at 515 Avenue Rd and 1917 a slaughterman at Lascelles St. Alfred Waugh died 1945 at Hastings aged 65 and Sarah Jane McClellan, Waugh nee Bayliss of 208 Lascelles St Hastings died June 1961 aged 84. In January 1914, **Alfred Waugh** appeared on remand at the Napier Court charged with having stolen a pair of opera glasses. Sergt. Cummings said the accused had admitted taking the glasses. His father was a very respectable man, though the report obtained from Wellington was unfavourable, he recommended that the accused, who had received very little schooling and was somewhat dull, should be leniently dealt with. The bench administered a warning to the accused and fined him 30s in default 14 days' imprisonment.

1914 August, At the Carlton Club Hotel, Hastings last evening, a presentation was made to Mr H. Wilson, who for several years has been foreman of the joinery department of the Hastings Timber and Joinery Co. Mr Joseph Hiron, manager, made the presentation on behalf of the employees, and in doing so expressed the keen regret of the company at losing a valued servant, and of his 'fellow employees, with whom he was most popular. 








1914 August, The staff of the Hawke's Bay Tribune gathered at the Grand hotel for the purpose of bidding good-bye to their popular reporter, Mr F. L. Vickers, who left this morning to enter the camp at Palmerston North, preparatory to proceeding to the front. The editor, who spoke in his terms of praise of Mr Vicker's sterling character and his earnest devotion to duty, presented to him, on behalf of the staff, a purse of sovereigns, us a mark of the esteem in winch they held him. The "Tribune" Company's contribution to Mr Vickers takes the form of a weekly payment, extending over six months if he is absent of service for that period. The local "Press" and a number of other friends met last night at the Grand Hotel to bid farewell to Mr F. L. Vickers, reporter of the "Tribune," on his departure for the front. Mr Whitlock occupied the chair and dealt at some length on the sterling merits of the departing soldier, and was loud in his praise of the good work done by Mr Vickers in literary matters. Mr Ryan of the Napier "Telegraph," Mr Galbraith of the 'Herald' Napier, and Messrs. H. Stratton, Le Quesne, L. W. Fowler, D. McCorkindale, and others spoke in laudatory terms of Mr Vickers in his journalistic, capacity and socially. Mr Vickers very feelingly responded and said a full heart prevented her lips from saying words he would like to say his thanks for the gathering to the fullest extent for the many kind expressions of goodwill, and the generosity of the "Tribune" Company for their valuable assistance, also to the staff, who had helped him considerably, which had made it possible for him to get away. The proceedings terminated with the singing of "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow" and "Auld Lang Syne." Among the names of those contributing to the war fund which was published in yesterday's issue were several Assyrians. The Assyrians of Hastings collected £23.10s among themselves.

Major Holderness, officer commanding B company (Hastings) recognition of the troops leaving Hastings this morning and will remain in charge of the Hastings infantry section of the Expeditionary force until it is despatched to the front. Prior in leaving the Drill Hall this morning the men of the Hastings contingent were addressed by the Mayor, Mrs Hart, president of the Liverpool fund, Miss Luckie secretary, and several of the ladies were present to see that the men received their equipments. When leaving the hall, the boys gave three cheers for the Major and also the ladies for providing the necessary articles. A specimen parcel of the equipment which is being issued to the Expeditionary Force will be in view at Messrs. Land and Highway's tomorrow morning. The parcel is a very compact one and does infinite credit to the ladies who are responsible.

Later in October Private F. L. Vickers of the main Expeditionary Force Wellington had leave for Hastings see his ailing father William.

1914 August, Prior to his departure with the Hastings contingent, Private C. T. Brimer was presented by the employees of Mr S. T. Tong with a wristlet watch suitably engraved.

1914 August, Despite the fact that the elements were not too kindly disposed this morning, the patriotism of the people was not in any way damped, a very large crowd gathered at the station to bid "Au revoir" to the second Hawke's Bay draft of the Expeditionary party to go into training at Palmerston North. As the express left the station, there were loud and enthusiastic outbursts of cheering. The men were in fine spirits and looked fit and determined to do justice to the cause they are enlisted in.




1914 August, Hastings was nil agog from 9.30 to 10.30 this morning- business was practically at a standstill and the populace turned out on masse to give a hearty send off to the contingent leaving to join the expeditionary force at Palmerston North. It was generally understood that the men were leaving by the mail train at 9.20 and long before that time a large crowd had gathered in the main street and the vicinity of the railway station. The troops did not leave, however, until 10.10, when they departed by a special train, which also conveyed the men from Napier. At 8.30 the contingent paraded at the Drill Hall, where their equipment was completed and an hour later they marched to the railway station, escorted by the Town Band, Sergt. O. Tong marching in front with the New Zealand ensign and a squad from B Company of the Territorials forming a guard of honour. The railway platform was crowded with people and onlookers were perched on veranda's, window sills, railway trucks, and every possible coign of vantage, making a concourse of about 3000 people. The troops were lined up on the platform and the police made an endeavour to cordon the public off, but the crowd wanted to get amongst the men off to the front and they did so. Pending the arrival of the train, the Town Band and the Salvation Army Band alternately played appropriate airs, and the soldiers were waylaid by relatives and friends wishing to say "Good-bye." The train arrived from Napier punctually at 10 o'clock, and left ten minutes later, amidst wild cheering, the waving of hats and handkerchiefs and general enthusiasm, the bands playing "God Be With You, Till We Meet Again." The scene was a happy one on the platform, but here and there could be seen women with tear stained cheeks and not a few men were also visibly affected.

1915 August, Men are still volunteering in large numbers and there are several hundred on the books of the Napier Defence Office. A week ago Staff Sergeant-Major Bell was appointed resident recruiting officer at Hastings and by the number of volunteers mentioned hereunder it will be seen that he has already justified his appointment. The sergeantmajor's headquarters at the Hastings Drill Hall are right out of the run of traffic and quite removed from public notice. The recruiting officer and his office is needed in Hastings. A splendid site for such a building offers itself at the railway crossing in Heretaunga St and it only wants someone to energetically take the matter in hand and the flag will be flying on the building before the week is out. The following men have registered with Sergeant-Major Bell during the last week for service overseas: Whiri Tangatake Hastings. Robert Wilson farrier Hastings. Chas F. Buckeridge carpenter Hastings. M. Schaffer. Post Office, Havelock North, G. P. Long, Tomoana. A special word of commendation is appropriate in the case of at least one of the above mentioned volunteers. Mr. Leon Fail was in Gisborne when the first call came for recruits for overseas service and he at once offered his services. He was then kept waiting about in a state of uncertainty and after considerable delay he was told that if he wanted to get away with the troops he would have to pay his own fare flown to Palmerston North. This treatment he naturally resented and resumed his civil life. His action in again offering himself for the service of his country is very praiseworthy in view of the discouragement previously accorded to him.

1915 December, The Hastings branch of the National Reserve paraded, 125 members being present under Captain Pegler. The men were marched to the Nelson Cricket grounds where they were put through outpost work under instructions given by Sergt-Major Hawthorne. All further parades have been cancelled until the 13th of January.

1916 April, Privates P. C. Howard, Stanley Boyd, and T. J. P. Burton left Hastings by mail train this morning for Trentham to join the 15th Reinforcements.

1914 August, Carl Vogtherr, The Elite Ham and Bacon Factory and Small Goods Store, Heretaunga St, late W. Kessell business - Dainticure Bacon Co of Walter Henry Kessell

1914, Carl Vogtherr, recently of Palmerston North also opened an Elite Ham Delicatessen shop at 134 Heretaunga St east next to the State Theatre, opposite Millar & Giorgi's. Mrs Sophia Vogtherr ran shop with her daughter Winifred. Carl and Sophia lived above the store. The property was owned by Harry M. Wilson, a Hastings medical practitioner. Carl Vogtherr was curing his bacon and ham in a rented chiller at the Hawke's Bay Fruit Company in King St.

Carl William Frederic Vogtherr b: August 1873 in Blaufelden near Stuttgart, the son of Babette Martin, he went to England and lived with his uncle Mr Vok in Kendall Westmorland and was apprenticed to him as a pork butcher. In January 1897 in Kendal he married Sophia Vogt b: May 1874 in Barrow-In-Furness, Lancashire. They had four children -

March 1898 Ernest George Frederick Vogtherr he married Doris Ridgway Corban in November 1923, June 1899 Winifred Lena Vogtherr, August 1905 Leonard Vogtherr he married Florence Rose Wilton in October 1929 and September 1907 Carl (Mick) Leslie Vogtherr. The family left London on the *'Ruapehu'* in March 1913 and went to Palmerston North to work for Fred Martin an uncle before moving to Hastings the following year. In May 1926 C. Vogtherr proprietor of the Elite Bacon Factory in Hastings whilst engaged in his factory at Stortford lodge, was working at the machinery when by some means he got caught by his clothes in the belting with the result he was severely cut about the lower part of the body and on the face. He was at the end of the shaft when the accident occurred, so he was fortunately able to prevent himself being dragged in and succeeded in releasing himself. The revolving belting catching the steel that he carried at his waist, flung the instrument several times into his face. He never lost consciousness and when he got free from his perilous position, telephoned for clothes and medical assistance, he was conveyed to the Royston Private Hospital where his injuries were dressed. Carl William Frederic Vogtherr of 106 Park Rd Sth died July 1944 in Hastings aged 70 and Sophia Vogt died October 1945 in Hastings aged 71.

The bride, who was given away by Mr G. McDonald, Miss Stanley and Miss Long, cousin and sister respectively of the bridegroom, were bridesmaids and Mr Arthur Stanley acted as best man. A reception was afterwards held at **Admore's tea rooms**.

William Lory b: April 1886 the son of Maria and Richard Lory, in August 1914 he married Lilian Theresa Myers b: 1888 They had one child – April 1919 Frank Richard Lory. William Lory died May 1971 in New Zealand aged 85 and Lilian Theresa Lory nee Myers died October 1971 in New Zealand aged 83.

1914 August, Death, Cheer - At Hastings, Caroline, relict of the late Bartholomew Cheer, aged 78 years. The funeral will leave her son's residence, corner Willow Park Rd and Avenue Rd, Hastings, for the Havelock Cemetery.

1914 October, Hastings Fire - A six roomed house at the corner of Miller St and Ellison Rd, occupied by Mr Guy Nelson King was badly damaged by fire. Mr King who was awakened by a crackling noise, found the back part of the house in flames and the smoke was so dense that Mr King and family had to make a hurried escape through the bedroom window. He tried twice to ring the exchange, but could get no response. However a few minutes later Mr Brathwaite residing opposite saw flames issuing from the house and immediately rang the exchange and in fifteen minutes the Fire Brigade were on the scene and soon had the outbreak subdued. Mr King saved most of his furniture and effects which were insured in the Royal for £200. 

Up to the present about100 birds have assembled. Mary Duff nee Hood died September 1946 in Hastings aged 71 and Allan Cameron Duff a company secretary of 215 Park Rd nth died October 1959 in Hastings aged 91.

Mrs Mary Duff nee Hood was associated with the Hastings Orchestra Society and at the opening of the Municipal Theatre she was engaged as first violinist. Mrs Mary Duff toured with the Marama Opera Company as solo violinist under the conductorship of the late Mrs Archie Don. Mary later played at many choral society opera dance orchestra and Scots' Society functions. She was regarded as one of the finest exponents of the playing of Scottish music in Australia and New Zealand. Mary Duff nee Hood was regarded as one of New Zealand's outstanding musicians in her younger days and in recent years was a prominent member of musical circles in Hawke's Bay. Mary Hood was in Dunedin the daughter of the late William Hood an old identity of Dunedin and a fist-class musician who commenced teaching his daughter when she was about six years of age. Shortly after she left her parents for Melbourne where she became a member of the Melbourne Symphony Orchestra being placed in the first-violin section by the conductor Dr. Marshall Hall. Subsequently she joined the Martin Simonsen Melbourne orchestra and furthered her knowledge of music by associating herself with numerous orchestral Liedertafels and choral societies. After her marriage in Melbourne Mrs Duff continued her musical career on her return to Dunedin where she joined the orchestral society and on moving to Christchurch She joined the orchestral society there. She also played under the conductorship of Dr. Bradshaw of the Christchurch Cathedral. later she left for Invercargill and joined the orchestral society in that centre before settling in Hastings.

1915 January, NEW NATIONAL BANK. This new building, which is to be erected at the corner of Karamu Rd and Queen St east, will be started practically at once and is to cost £6000. The plans are completed and are awaiting final approval. OTHER BUILDINGS. With the early start of the theatre and municipal buildings the building trade in Hastings for the next six months or so will be a busy one, and shows the great confidence investors have in the town.

1915 February 18, UNION BANK OF AUSTRALIA. The handsome new banking premises at Hastings for the Union Bank of Australia., situated at the corner of Heretaunga St and Karamu Rd, is now practically out of the hands of the contractor. It is an imposing addition to the many buildings in Hastings now and gives a clear indication of the soundness and prosperity of the district. The new building has a frontage to Heretaunga St of 54ft and to Karamu Rd of 94ft. It is built in red brick with Flemish arches, and the top is relieved with composite columns and massive, facings, with a large stone hood over the main entrance. The banking chamber measures 44ft x 31ft 6in, with 6ft ceilings, which are panelled in carrara, and finished in pure, white. The public office is on the; left and the ledger-keepers' and tellers' boxes face the vestibule. All the fittings are in mahogany with brass railings and standard electric lights. The floor is tiled. The manager's office is 14ft square, the; walls being finished in mahogany, with a pretty and unique tiled fireplace. Adjoining the manager's office is a large strong room, and on the left of this room are the office lavatories, which are tiled throughout. There is also a bicycle room. The custodian's apartments are on the second floor, access to which is from the Karamu Rd entrance and contains three rooms and bathroom, finished in the best possible style and commodious. The front offices on the second floor are reached by a marble staircase from Heretaunga St, the first of its kind in Hastings, of King Edward treads and Brocatelle rises, with cedar railings on either side. There are eight offices, four of which are occupied by Mr H. E. Andrews dentist. Each office contains a gas stove, set in neat little alcoves. There are also lavatories for each office. The building is lighted throughout by electricity. All the various apartments are spacious, with plenty of ventilation and light. The building also includes two spacious shops, one in Heretaunga St and the other in Karamu Rd. The work has been carried out in a thorough manner, and reflects great credit on the contractor, Mr Begley of Napier. The architects were Messrs Penty and Lawrence, whilst Mr Crabbe was foreman and Mr Gebrgeson was general supervisor of the whole work. The electrical installation work was carried out by Messrs Tolley and Son of Wellington. The new bank will be open for business on Monday morning next. Union Bank shops - Mr Robert M. Gatenby chemist, who has been established in Hastings for a number of years, has, in order to keep pace with the growing demands of his increasing business, recently removed to new and more up-to date premises in the new Union Bank of Australia building, Heretaunga St. Messrs. Phillips, Wright & Co were engaged to install entirely new fittings, which include a very handsome counter 20ft long, with a plate glass show front, and show cases to match. These are all filled with the necessary articles that make up modern druggist's business. Mr Gatenby, who holds New Zealand and New South Wales qualification as a chemist, will personally supervise all dispensing work. The most important adjunct to the business in the dispensing room, which contains all the latest appliances of a first class pharmacy. An innovation which the proprietor has installed is Berkfield germ-proof high pressure filter, through which all water is passed, even for the bottle cleaning. Another novel feature is a baby weighing machine. At the rear of the shop is a bottle store with concrete floor. There is also a specially fitted consulting room. The sundry department is in charge of Mr Maher. A special line, in which Mr Gatenby excels in, is his own preparations, the best known of which is the famous malt cough cure, which has earned reputation in this district. The shop is lighted throughout with electricity and is certainly an attractive addition to that part of Heretaunga St. In June 1926, Mr G. McLeod manager of the Gisborne branch of the Union Bank of Australia was promoted manager of the Hastings branch of the bank.

1915 April, The death occurred after a short illness of Mrs Collison, wife of Mr A. W. Collison, Willowpark Rd. Hastings.

1915 April, Eric Ernest Heney born at Hastings the son of Henrietta Mary and Herbert Hugh Heney. He had one daughter with Patricia Bridget Downing in 1955. **Herbert Hugh Heney** b: 1883 in NZ, he had married Henrietta Mary. Herbert Hugh Heney died February 1953 in Hastings aged 70 and Henrietta Mary died August 1957 in Hastings aged 65

1915 April, Death, Harding - At Willowpark Rd Hastings, Herbert Evelyn, the beloved husband of Polly Harding, aged 31 years. The funeral will leave the Baptist Church for the Hastings cemetery. **Evelyn Herbert Harding** b: January 1883 Hampshire married Pollie Eliza East 1913 in New Zealand died at Willowpark Rd Hastings, aged 32. Pollie Eliza East b: January 1889 in Napier, the daughter of John and Fanny East.

1915 April, Percy James Leonard Wilkins b: March 1895 in Hastings the son of James and Alice Wilkins married at Pukahu, Ellen Nellie Golding b: August 1898 in Havelock North. They went to Vic, Aus.

1915 April, Mr Robert Trimble was seized with a paralytic stroke on Saturday evening. Mr Trimble was on the Hastings bowling green on Saturday just before play commenced and complained of feeling unwell. He immediately returned home and was shortly after stricken down. We learn this morning that Mr Trimble's condition is somewhat serious.

1915 April, Wedding, Beatson – Newbigin - At St. Matthew's Church Hastings by Rev J. B. Brocklehurst, Mr Norman H. Beatson youngest son of Mr & Mrs J. Heeney snr of Mahora**. The bride was given away by her father and attended by her sister (Miss Winne Hart) Mr T. Heeney (brother of the bridegroom) acted as best man. The Rev. Father MacDonnell tied the nuptial knot. The happy couple left Hastings by mail train this morning for Rotorua where the honeymoon will be spent.

1915, **John Heeney jnr** b: October 1886 NZ the son of Margaret and John Heeney snr a settler of Mahora married Agnes Lily Hart b:1891 the daughter of Martha and William Hart of Southland Rd. In October 1910 John was bestman at his elder brother Hugh's wedding in Hastings In September 1913 John Heeney jnr of the Hastings Post and Telegraph Office had transferred to Waihi. John Heeney jnr died in Hastings March 1943 aged 56 and Agnes Lily Hart died in Hastings January 1960 aged 68. John's brother Thomas Heeney died June 1901 on the Pakowhai Rd.

1915 April, Marriage, Masters – MacLean. A wedding of considerable local interest was celebrated at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church Hastings, the contracting parties being Mr Clarence Masters oldest son of Mr and Mrs A. Masters of Selwood Rd Hastings and Miss Jean MacLean, daughter of Mr and Mrs John MacLean of Allen Square Cromarty. Scotland. The Rev. P. Ramsay was the celebrant. The bridesmaid's (Miss Bella Mitchell) and Mr Sidney Masters filled the position of groomsman. The bride was given away by her cousin Mr Jock McRae. The honeymoon will be spent on the West Coast. The bridegroom was presented by the staff of G. F. Roach with a handsome dinner set of 60 pieces and the bride with a salad bowl and spoons to match. Mr D. Robertson (foreman) in the absence of Mr Roach made the presentations, and Mr D. Tanish on behalf of the staff, wished the young couple every happiness and prosperity in their new sphere of life.

1915 April, Marriage, Dudfield – Chapman. At St. Matthew's Church to-day, the contracting parties being Mr H. W. Dudfield and Miss C. D. Chapman, the officiating clergyman being the Rev. J. B. Brocklehurst. The bride was given away by **Mr John Currie**, the bridesmaid **Miss Hancock** and **Mr Les Liley** carried out the duties of bestman. The guests were afterwards entertained at the **Savoy**. The happy couple left by the afternoon train en route to Dunedin.

1915 April, Station St Fatality - An inquest was held at the residence of the parents, Havelock Rd, Hastings before Mr H. Brathwaite, deputy coroner concerning the death of the late **George John MeKeesick**, who met his death in Station St, Hastings by coming into collision with an express driven by Mr **Joseph McIntyre**. After evidence had been heard a verdict of "Accidental Death" was returned, no blame being attachable to the driver of the express.

1915 April, One of the latest developments in building construction in Hastings, shortly to be entered upon, is a fine office building to the order of Messrs Cotterill and Humphries, the well-known firm of barristers and solicitors. The building will be erected in Queen St, Hastings, close to the G.P.O., in a locality which seems to be particularly favoured by the professional community. It will cover an area of about 60 feet in depth by 30 feet frontage, will be of two storeys. There are to be twelve roomy apartments, those on the ground floor being for the use of the principals, for general offices, nil for the use of the staff and clients. There will also be a large strong room fitted with interior sates and every appliance for the safe custody of securities. The first floor is to be utilised as suites of offices, which will be occupied by approved tenants. These offices will also contain several strong rooms and all the usual appurtenances and most modern fittings. All the interior walls will be finished in granite plaster and the ceilings in the lower floor will be in embossed steel. On the

upper floor the ceilings are to be panelled, plain white panels being relieved with beams. The entrance to the upstairs suites of offices will be on the opposite side of the building from that of the ground floor. The matter of ventilation is a burning one in most offices, when the "dog days" come along and we pant and perspire at about 90deg. in the shade. This phase of possible abnormal temperature has led the architect to carefully consider effectual means of regulating the inequalities in this direction. The result will be apparent in the steady intermittent supply of pure fresh air to all parts of the building. The question of lighting has been carefully studied, and office and room will have a goodly share of the natural light of day, this being contrived by the application of roomy light, areas. Artificial light and heat are to be by electricity, ample current being provided for. There will also be coke stores in some of the main rooms, for the convenience and comfort of those who like to see, as well as feel, the source of heat. The **architect Mr Hay** of Napier, produced a pleasing design, the elevation of which shows beautifully proportioned columns running up the whole height, with ornate originally designed capitals, surmounted by a pediment that is remarkable for its clever adaptation to the purpose in view. The successful contractors are Messrs. **Duncan and Abbott** of Hastings, who signed the contract yesterday, and with commendable celerity got away with a start on the foundations this morning. After all, it is works .such as these which show most clearly the solid progress being made by our town and district, and it is by the continual addition of substantial buildings that our true growth can be measured.



Cotterill and Humphries, barristers and solicitors, Queen St east

The old established legal firm of "Cotterill and Humphries" the oldest in Napier, having been established by the late Hon. John Nathaniel Wilson L.M.C. on the site of the present premises in 1859. In 1874 the late Mr Arthur James Cotterill joined Mr Wilson under firm name of Wilson and Cotterill. In 1881 Mr Herbert Humphries joined the firm and in 1889, the firm name was changed to its present title of "Cotterill and Humphries"

Arthur James Cotterill b:January 1848 in Colony Norfolk, the son of Letitia and George Cotterill. He married Julia Moore Stuart in May 1877 at Napier. They had four children. Arthur James Cotterill died September 1902 in Napier aged 54.

Herbert Humphries b: October 1856 in Kidderminster, Worcestershire, the son of Hannah and John Humphries. In 1878 at Gisborne he married Frances Fernandez They had nine children. Herbert Humphries died June 1953 in Napier aged 96.


John and Walter Humphries continued to practise in the business.

Walter Humphries b:1886 the son of Frances and Herbert Humphries, he married Olive Isobel Seale in 1915.



An empty bucket which was being lowered from the top of the building broke away and falling on the left side of the man's head caused a nasty scalp wound. The injury, which was not of a serious nature, was dressed by Dr. Wilson.

Mr T. S. Roulston was manager for Cotterill and Humphries, Queens St east Hastings went on his own in May 1919, then Cotterill and Humphries dissolved the business in September 1920 and Kelly & McNiel took over the Hastings premises. Thomas Sinclair Roulston.

1915, Interior workshop of D. E. Davis & S. Boyd's new brick with concrete floor country garage 60 x 121 with a drive on turntable. In January 1915 Stanley Boyd's wide Ada died and the partnership of Davis & Boyd dissolved, David E. Davis continued on his accord

1915, William McCullock and Cyril H. Crocker a solicitor occupied the Dominion Buildings on Queen St east opposite A. B. Hansen's Stables.

1915, F. J. Tonkin now had a cycle store on Station St

1915 May, Andrew Wall b:1883 in Hastings the son of Mary and Robert Wall married Margaret Ann Fox b: July 1895 in Hawke's Bay the daughter of Elizabeth and George Fox. They had one son. Margaret Ann wall nee Fox then married Francis George Lilliquist in 1934.

1915 May, **Tomoana Works smokestack demolished** to its foundations – The prominent monumental smokestack of the pioneer industry a land mark sentinel guarding over the Plains for quarter of a century –trees had grown around it – the old builder recalled 365.000 bricks went into it. It had stood the test of time and some severe earthquakes.

1915 May, Death, Garnett - At Hastings, Ivan Ernest, only son of Mr and Mrs E. Garnett, aged 15 months. Private interment.

1915 May, **Joshua Bennett**, builder late of Hastings died at the residence of his brother-in-law, Rev. H. H. Robjohns, Patauga Crescent Wellington aged 76. Joshua Bennett of Milton Rd Napier and formerly of Hastings. The Funeral will leave the Presbyterian Church, Hastings. In November 1918 at her residence, Milton Rd Napier, **Alice Jane** nee Grey, relict of the late Joshua Bennett and daughter of the late John Garry of Napier, they were married in 1911. The funeral will leave her late residence for interment at Hastings cemetery. Margaret Bennett died September 1904 also buried at Hastings.

1915 May, PROPOSED PARKVALE SCHOOL. Mr Roach On Warpath. At the H. B. Education Board meeting, Mr G. F. Roach asked the chairman what had been done in regard to the Parkvale School since the Minister's visit. The Chairman: We have sent in an application. Mr Roach said that when the Minister was here he was satisfied with the situation of the site, but the size was wanting. He (Mr Roach) had made inquiries and had found a neighbour who was prepared to allow the board to have almost an acre of land for £l60. Like most Hastings people, said Mr Roach, he is quite prepared to assist in any educational matters. Land in that locality was worth about £300 an acre. Several members of the board expressed the opinion that the offer was a very reasonable one and it was decided to forward the information to the department.

1915 May, **The Bakery Business of Hastings will be amalgamated** as from the 1st and will trade under the name of The Hastings Bakery Ltd – T. Cullen, Geo Findlay, H. Hitchcock and R. Warren.

1915 August, Tenders for the Brick Amalgamated Bakers of Hastings

This amalgamation of Hastings bakers did not last and Mr George Findlay later bought the others out.

George Findlay b: April 1883 Aberdeenshire Scot. In April 1911 he married Annie Doig b: December 1881 the daughter of William and Elizabeth Doig. They had four children - 1912 May George Maitland Doig Findlay at Hastings, 1913 George Robert Findlay, 1914 August Rita Findlay and 1917 June Nola Freda Findlay.

George Findlay had immigrated to New Zealand arriving in Timaru in 1903 and ran a bakery business in Dunedin with his younger brother - **Frank Finlay** a pastrycook b: May 1884 who had moved to Hastings by 1909. George Findlay persuaded other members of the Findlay family to move to New Zealand from Scotland. **Walter Findlay** settled in Gisborne and ran a well established bakery businesses which later enabled him to purchase his brother Georges Hastings bakery around 1928. George then moved his family to Auckland where they opened a bakery selling Vienna Bread. Walter Findlay aged 51 another passenger and the pilot were all killed in the air craft accident in February 1931. George Findlay died October 1957 in Auckland aged 74 and Annie Findlay nee Doig died June 1967 in Auckland aged

1915 June, Mr Geo Ebbett has let a contract to Duncan & Abbott to erect a two story brick building on Queen St east next to A. B. Hansen's stables.

1915 June, J. B. Tustin now in Quarry Rd and had painted the Carlton Club Hotel with proprietor Joseph Truman

1915 June, At Hastings, Marton Hullett a draper's assistant, twenty years of age, while motor cycling on the Railway Rd collided with a trap and sustained injuries which resulted in his death an hour later.

1915 June Wedding - At the Methodist Church Hastings by Rev M. A. Rugby Pratt. George H. McKeown son of Mr John McKeown of Park Rd Hastings and Miss Editn Emily Harris, daughter of Mr Robert Harris of Waipukurau. The bride was given away by her father and attended to by Miss A. E. McKeown and Mr W. C. Taylor was bestman. Mr H. Young presided at the organ. A breakfast was held at the Ngaturi Tea rooms.

1915 June, An inquest was held yesterday afternoon at Nurse O'Callighan's private hospital concerning the death of Marton Hullett, who was killed by colliding with a trap driven by John Dale in Railway Rd on Sunday, whilst riding a motor cycle. Mr W. Smart, J.P. deputy coroner, presided, with the following jury :- Messrs. L. W. Fowler (foreman), A. Hyde, T. A. Smith, S. Bass, H. Smith and R. W. Jones. Mr E. H. Williams was present on behalf of Mr Dale. Allan George Hullett, father of deceased, deposed that he was a coach painter and resided in Hastings. Deceased was a native of New Zealand and his age was 19. Last saw him at lunch time on Sunday. Deceased had been riding a motor cycle for the last three or four months. Witness helped to lift deceased out of the ambulance and he appeared to be in an unconscious condition. Dr H. M. Wilson, medical practitioner, deposed that he was called to Mr Doleman's in Railway Rd about 5 p.m. found deceased deeply unconscious, obviously suffering from a severe inner-cranial injury, a broken collarbone and ribs; the neck injury demanded an immediate operation. Deceased expired before being put into the hospital. The post mortem disclosed internal cranial, injuries, causing death. To Mr E. H. Williams: The injuries would be consistent with deceased falling off the motorcycle and striking his head on the ground. John Dale, cook, deposed that on Sunday evening he was returning home from Tollemache Rd, Hastings, about 5 o'clock. He saw a person or a motor coming towards him on the Tollemache side of the Paki Paki Rd. Deceased was from 50 to 100 yards away when witness first saw him. Deceased was coming towards witness fairly fast, about 20 miles an hour, and was in the centre of the road. As deceased came nearer, witness was drawing to the left side of the road. By this time deceased seemed to cross over the road about 15 yards away. Deceased then crossed to witness' side of the road. Witness thought then an accident might happen and pulled his right-hand rein, which turned the horse's head a little to the right. Just about then the collision happened. Deceased's shoulder struck witness' left wheel as he was passing, and was thrown, heavily to the ground on his back away from the machine. Deceased never moved after. Witness was travelling at about four or five miles an hour. At the time it was fairly light and I neither witness nor deceased carried lights. It did not occur to witness to sing out. There was room on both sides of the road to pass and deceased could have passed easy enough on his rightside. To a juror: When witness first saw him deceased appeared to be in centre of the road. To Mr Williams: Witness could see about 100 yards ahead of hint when he first saw deceased coming towards him. F. W. Barley deposed he was a slaughterman residing at Hastings, and was riding a bicycle to Paki Paki on Sunday evening, and passed Flynn's Hotel at 10 minutes past five. Witness rode along Railway Rd and when he readied Mr Doleman's house he heard a man shout, to him to stop. Dale asked him to bring a light as an accident had happened. Deceased was lying on the grass just off the road. It was fairly dark when witness reached the scene of the accident and could only see a few a yards ahead of him. It was about a quarter past five when he reached there. The jury brought in the following verdict :-That deceased caused his death by coming into collision with a trap driven by John Dale and it was accidental.

1915 August, Terry Alexander Walsh was born in Hastings, the son of Jane Ann (Jean) and Patrick Martin Walsh a labourer, farmer of Louie St.



Patrick Martin Walsh b: December 1874 in Smeaton Victoria, the son of Julia and Patrick Walsh. In 1909 in Ballarat, Victoria he married Jane Ann (Jean) Anderson b: November 1878 in Rupanyup Victoria the daughter of Margaret and Alexander Anderson. They had six children - November 1909 Patrick Leonard Walsh, 1911 John Phillip (Jack) Walsh, February 1913 Jean Margaret Walsh, August 1915 Terry Alexander Walsh at Hastings, November 1916 Kevin James Walsh at Hastings and February 1925 Mary Julia Walsh at Hastings. By 1915 the family moved over to NZ and settled in Hastings. Jane Ann (Jean) Anderson died July 1926 in Hastings aged 47 Patrick Martin Walsh and family returned to NSW Australia. Patrick Martin Walsh died July 1957 in Young, NSW aged 82.

1915 August, A very old resident of Hastings in the person of Mr **John Bee**, second-hand dealer, passed away at Nurse English's private hospital on Saturday. Deceased, who had reached the ripe old age of 71, had only been ailing a week. The late Mr Bee, who had resided in this district for many years, was a man of a kindly and charitable disposition, and his loss will be regretted by a large circle of friends. As far as is known, deceased has no relatives in New Zealand. The funeral took place this afternoon and was largely intended. An Ellen Bee previously resided at Clive.

1915 August, A man named Robert Herbert, who had been carrying on the business of a dyer and cleaner in the Piccadilly buildings Hastings, died suddenly yesterday from heart failure.

1915 August, At St. Matthew's Church, Hastings by the Rev. J. B. Brocklehurst, Mr George McDonald of Wellington was married to Miss Annie Stanley, fourth daughter of Mr and Mrs A. A. Stanley of Hastings. The bride was attended by her sisters, Misses Gladys and Gertie Stanley, and the bridgeroom's sister Miss Olive McDonald, while Mr A. Taylor of Feilding was the best man. The happy couple left for the south on their honeymoon.

Dr. Walter Sneddon Robertson b: June 1889 in Dunedin the son of Wilhelmina and William Robertson. In February 1915 at Timaru, he married Marie Antoinette Sarginson b: May 1889 in Brisbane, Queensland. They had two children. Dr. Robertson had travelled to the British Isles, Australia and most of the other British dominions. In September 1910 he gave an address on India to the upper standard scholars of Mahora School before leaving for India. In March 1916 Dr. Robertson was involved in a serious motorcar accident on the Te Mata Rd which killed Reginald Joblin of Havelock North. Marie Antoinette Robertson nee Sarginson died as a young mother August 1920 aged 31 and Dr. Walter Sneddon Robertson died July 1968 Wellington aged 79.

1915 September, **Mr J. Harris** of Hastings, whilst chopping wood at his home yesterday, met with a painful accident, having the fleshy part of his left thumb nearly severed. He was attended by Dr. Wilson, who is in hopes of saving the injured thumb.

1915 September, **Stanley Robert Pitt** had been found dead in the Maraetotara stream about mid-day. As far as it can be gathered it appears that the unfortunate young fellow was riding a motor cycle along the Ocean Beach Rd yesterday morning and it is surmised that the cycle ran down a bank, and striking a willow tree, he was precipitated into the stream, which runs parallel with the road at the spot where the mishap occurred. As there were several abrasions on deceased's head, it is assumed he must have been stunned before falling into the stream. The deceased, who was a son of Mr and Mrs Thomas Pitt of Havelock Rd Hastings, was 20 years of age. Great sympathy is felt for his parents, who only recently lost another son killed in action at the Dardanelles. Their youngest son died suddenly two or three years ago, and this latest fatality fills the cup of sorrow to the brim. An inquest held at the residence of the boy's parents Havelock Rd Hastings - Bernard S. Story, medical practitioner deposed that he examined the body and found a bruise on the side of

the head, which must have been caused by a severe blow. There were no broken bones and no signs of death from drowning. Death was instantaneous on the reception of the blow, which was sufficient to cause death. The blow was such as would be caused by being thrown against a tree. Eric Salmon (clerk) deposed that he met deceased on Sunday for the first time on the Tuki Tuki bridge about 10.10 a.m. and his motor cycle was broke down. He gave deceased a hand to fix it up and then deceased started off for the zig-zag. Deceased was a very inexperienced rider. Edmund W. Bennett a carrier of Havelock North deposed he was looking for his horses in the Waimarama road and when near Tattrapa station he noticed a motor cycle near a willow tree down a bank on the edge of Maraetotara stream, a drop of about 15ft. from the road. Witness noticed a hat in the stream and on investigation discovered the body suspended by brambles in the stream. As soon as the body was touched it fell into the water. Deceased was then dead. He got assistance from the station and the body was brought to the parents' residence. He considered that deceased had been thrown against one of the willow trees in his descent. The stream at that point was about deep. The body, though perpendicular, was completely covered by water. Thomas Pitt father said deceased would be 21 years of age in October. He was employed at Woodford House School (Havelock North). He rode a motor cycle lately, but was an inexperienced rider. He had only had the cycle about three weeks. Deceased did not inform him that he was going to Waimarama as he would be opposed to him going, as the road was dangerous and deceased was an inexperienced rider. Returned verdict of accidental death. The late Mr Stanley Pitt was member of the local Salvation Army corps.




1915 September, New Hastings drapery Kitchen & Starkey Ltd, this business stock was bought out by Roach in May

The brickwork in connection with the building of the **Hastings Municipal Theatre** is about completed and preparations are now in hand for the putting on of the roof July 1915. Four tenders were received for the supply of new carpets for the theatre and Messrs Roaches' Ltd tender was accepted, price £200.

Both vehicles were going in the same direction when one of the horses became frightened at the Borough council's steam roller, which was coming up Queen St. The horse swerved and backed into the other trap, became locked and overturned, the driver and a lady being thrown clear, without sustaining any injury whatever. Very little damage was done to either vehicle.

1916 March, A motor car accident on the Te Mata Rd, Havelock North with fatal results, the victim being Mr Reginald Joblin, son of Mr and Mrs Joblin of Havelock North. It appears that Mr Joblin, with two other persons, was walking along the Te Mata Rd towards Havelock when a motor car proceeding in the same direction and driven by Dr. Robertson of Hastings, struck him with some considerable force. **Dr. Robertson** pulled up immediately and attended to the unfortunate young man, and subsequently conveyed him to Nurse O'Callaghan's private hospital, but notwithstanding that, everything possible was done for the injured man, he passed away shortly before 11 o'clock. Deceased, who was well known throughout Hawke's Bay, was only 28 years of age and the deepest sympathy will be felt for the bereaved parents. An inquest will be held at the Courthouse, Hastings before Mr. S. E. McCarthy, Coroner.

It is with extreme regret we have to record the death of Mrs W. J. Butler, wife of Detective Butler of Southampton St Hastings, which sad event occurred at 6 o'clock last evening. Deceased had been ill for over 12 months and although her death was not unexpected, her passing will be keenly felt by her very many friends in Hastings and throughout Hawke's Bay. The bride's attendants were Miss Dorothy Ward niece of the bride and Miss Alma Masters sister of the bridegroom. The bride was given away by Mr W. A. Meads whilst Mr A. J. Burge officiated as best man. The wedding breakfast was afterwards held at the residence of the bride's sister Mrs Ward.

1916 June, **Thomas Sands** snr died aged 91 at the residence of his daughter (Mrs Joseph Siddle, Fenwick St, Hastings, one of the oldest citizens of Hastings and the beloved husband of the late Hannah Sands. Thomas was born at Somercotes, Lincolnshire in July 1825. Two of his children having preceded him in coming to New Zealand, Mr Sands, with his late wife (who predeceased him sixteen years) and the remaining members of the family, arrived in this country by the ship *Crusader* which landed at Lyttelton in 1882. They came on at once to Hastings, where the family has ever since resided. Mr Sands was a devoted worker in the local Wesley Methodist Church of which he was one of the oldest members. He leaves a family of five sons and four daughters. They are Messrs Robert, Thomas. George, William and Private Fred Sands (who has only recently returned from active service) and Mesdames J. Paterson (Napier) C. Farmery, Joseph Siddle (Hastings) and Mrs J. Scott (formerly Mrs Pepper) of Twyford.

He was only 19 years of age. 1916 July, Death, McClellan - Killed in action July 3rd 1916, Robert William (Roy) McClellan, dearly beloved and only son of Mrs Sarah Waugh and brother of Mrs R. L. Lawrence, Fitzroy Avenue, Hastings. Aged 19 years.

1916 August, Death. McDonald - At her residence, Murdoch Rd, Hastings, Barbara, the beloved wife of Archibald McDonald, aged 48 years.

1916 August, Death, Stewart - At Napier Hospital, John Stewart of Hastings, beloved husband of Helen Sarah Stewart, aged 82 years. The funeral will leave his late residence, Southampton St, Hastings for the Hastings cemetery. Helen (Ellen) Sarah Stewart nee Horne died January 1925 in Hastings aged 79.

1916 August, **Arthur Wellwood** b:1838 Kilkenny, Ireland the son of Ambrose Wellwood and Anne Proctor and younger brother of Robert, died in Hastings aged 78 years and Mary Wellwood nee Thompson died 1927 aged 78.

1916 August, A very old and well known resident of this district, in the person of Mr **Arthur Wellwood**, died at Southland Rd, Hastings. Deceased, who was born in Kilkenny, Ireland in 1835, his brother Robert, out to New Zealand, and arrived in Hawke's Bay on October 21 1883. He took up his residence in Hastings, where he has lived ever since, and followed the profession of farming. He leaves five sons, Messrs. Robert A. Wellwood, James T. Wellwood, Joseph Wellwood. William Francis Wellwood and A. O. Wellwood, three daughters, Annie, Susan and Polly and ten grand-children. His death will be heard of with regret among a large circle of friends and the deepest sympathy is extended to his relatives. 1916 September, Edward Alfred White was born, in Hastings, the son of Annie Gertrude and Arthur John White. He had seven children with Marjorie Sybil Crook.

1916 September, Kenneth Ross b: October 1891 in Hastings the son of Mary Elizabeth and Charles William Ross he married Helen Bruce McDonald b: July 1892 in Wanganui. They had one child - July 1927 James Dingwall Ross at Manawatu he married Penelope Clabburn in 1956. Kenneth Ross died June 1972 in Victoria aged 80 and Helen Bruce Ross nee McDonald died October 1952 aged 60.

1916 September, John Cullen jnr b:July 1874 a baker died in Hastings aged 42, the husband of Jane Cullen. They had four children, Jane Cullen nee Flanagan died March 1948 in Hastings aged 71.

1916 September, Hastings Fire - A fire at 4 o'clock this morning, in Avenue Rd, Hastings, and fronting Messrs. **Dalgety and Co.'s new premises**, **destroyed a wooden building belonging to Mrs J. T. Blake**, containing a **bake-house**, occupied by Mr **C. H. Pearson**, & boot shop, occupied by Mr **R. S. Pepper**, an unoccupied shop, a dwelling of 6 or 7 rooms partly destroyed, and a store room. The buildings were all attached. There was a strong wind blowing at the time, but despite the efforts of the fire brigade, the buildings were soon reduced to ruins. Had the wind been blowing in an opposite direction further damage might have resulted. The fire **originated in the bake house**, although no fire had been lit in the oven since the previous morning. The fire was first discovered by Mr **Thos. E. Roberts, baker** for Mr Pearson, who was going to work. Mr Pearson, who estimates his loss at £100, had no insurance on his stock and utensils. Mr Pepper estimates his loss at £200, but he had a policy of £160 in the National office. The building was overrun with rats and these are supposed to be the cause of the outbreak.

1916 September, **John Sharp** of Tomoana Works died at the Napier Hospital – a well known old identity who was better known by the name of "Charlie" was one of the strongest personalities in Hastings and Tomoana where he had worked for over 34 years. A Londoner by birth, he was full of those stories which pass many an hour in conversation. Not as polished perhaps, as some of the rising generation, he was as true as steel, both as a friend, husband and father, and the memory of his name will live long. He leaves two daughters to mourn their loss.

1916 September, **Re-naming** of some Hastings streets – Quarry Rd to Townsend St, Arvedsen St to French St, Station St to Russell St (named after Brigadier-General Russell) Gascoigne and Agnew St to Gascoigne St, Park Terrace Rd from its junction with Park Rd at the entrance to Beatson's Park to Heretaunga St (or Havelock Rd) to Terrace Rd, Terrace Rd leading off Park Terrace Rd on the southern side of Beatson's Park to Lake Rd, Caroline Rd for its whole length to the 1st Williams St. **Caroline Rd being named after George IV wife.**

William (Bill) McMillan b:January 1891 in Dunedin, the son of Mary Macmillan. In November 1915 he married Ruby Adeline Rooney b: September 1885, the daughter of Catherine and James Rooney. They had one child - September 1916 Irvine Harold McMillan was born at Hastings, he died a teenager in February 1931 at Napier. Bill McMillan a railway porter lived at 911 Ferguson St all their lives. William (Bill) McMillan died December 1982 in Hastings aged 91 and Ruby Adeline McMillan nee Rooney died September 1985 aged 100.



Ruby and Bill McMillan's home - 911 Ferguson St. The house had numerous add-ons at the back. The backdoor went straight into the kitchen add-on which was ever-warm from the cooking range. The drive at the side now goes to a new property at the rear. The backyard had a large aviary on a stand in which there were always some canaries. A gate led to a neat veggie garden, at the end of which was the large and exciting chook house. Around the edge of the garden, were lengths of left-over timber (which were too good to waste) stacked against fences - just in case another add-on was needed. The original house shown here has had the front veranda restored. Bill had covered the right side of the veranda to make a sunporch with a single bed. The kitchen connected to the garage where Bill was very proud of his cars and the walls were 'decorated' by older number plates.

1916 October, Mr Jas. A. Gallagher, Hastings, has received from his brother, Chas. who is in the Transmission Service at the front, war souvenirs, in the shape of German paper money (5 and 1 marks). The notes are slightly larger than ordinary playing cards. The sender says they were taken from a dead German on the Somme.

1916 October, John Maggin, killed while shunting at Hastings. John, dearly beloved husband of Nora Margin and eldest son of Mr and Mrs P. Maggin, Ellison Rd Hastings aged 31 years. R.I.P. The Funeral will leave his parents' residence for the Catholic Church and then to the Hastings cemetery.


1916 October, Sydney Morrison b: December 1892 in Napier the son of Agnes and James Morrison of Hastings married at Hastings Olive Isabel Parker. They had one child.

1916 October Death, Masters - At Napier Hospital, Alfred Edward, dearly beloved youngest son of Alice and Alfred Masters of Selwood Rd, Hastings; aged 14 years. The Funeral will leave St. Matthew's Church for the Hastings cemetery.

1916 October, Mr S. H. Knight of Hastings who is interested in a patent for dealing with seedy wool, submitted samples of blankets treated by the new process to M R. Dalton, H.M. Trade Commissioner at the Chamber of Commerce rooms. The patent is a very valuable one, simple and economical and Mr Knight's object is to induce the New Zealand Government to take over the patent rights, so that all wool growers will have the benefit of the new process, which will tend to enhance the value of this class of wool. Mr Dalton was greatly interested in the patent and promised to bring the matter before the New Zealand Board of Trade.

1916 October, Mr and Mrs **William Phillip Bowden** of Nuhaka have decided to take up their permanent residence in Hastings, Mr Bowden having purchased Mr Wake's dairy farm, Norton Rd sth, they both made themselves extremely popular at Nuhaka by their genial disposition and high integrity and will be acquisitions to Hastings. A suspicious fire in 1919.


The New Municipal Buildings -



1916 February 10, The foundation stone was laid for the Hastings Municipal Buildings plan

1916, The old wooden Borough Chambers Building from 1888 was transported to the council's property in Southampton St, in September1920 the question of dismantling the old Borough Council office building or turning it into housing was once again considered at a meeting of the Hastings Borough Council, but it was dismantled in December 1920 for the council sheds to be built in the yard.

In April 1916, Messrs. Stanley Bros, builders are making good progress with the erection of the new Municipal buildings, Hastings.




1917 April, The Modern Renaissance Hastings Municipal Buildings were officially opened, the new Hastings Borough Council Chambers, by Barcham Studios

In October 1922, Mrs Ritchie, wife of Mr Thos. Ritchie, Hastings formerly of Gisborne met with a nasty as she was descending the stairs in the Assembly Hall Hastings.

In February 1923, It has been decided to place the sign Assembly Hall in silver lettering on a blue background above the main entrance to the Hastings Municipal Assembly Hall. A similar sign painted in white letters on a red ground on two pieces of glass fixed on the veranda and running at right angles to the footpath will be placed opposite the Assembly Hall entrance. A mahogany stained and varnished board is to be erected outside the council's offices, the printed matter to be in silver letters. In connection with the Hastings Municipal Theatre an artistic iron bracket and sign of old English design will be erected on the corner of Heretaunga St and Hastings St.


In March 1923, It is proposed to place 190 on the next year's estimates to roof the Hastings Assembly Hall with iron, as the present roof is in a constant state of disrepair and very subject to leaks. A cork mat is to be placed on the landing at the Assembly Hall stairs, which has become very slippery in consequence of which accidents have occurred. It is also proposed to purchase crockery and cutlery for use in the supper-room.

In May 1923, The Hastings Borough Council offices and the Assembly Hall are now being thoroughly cleaned and painted throughout. This is not before its time, for it is the first general cleaning since the buildings were erected.

In May 1923, In completing the appointments of the Hastings Borough Council Chambers, the Chamber was strung with wires overhead near the ceiling with the object of regulating the sound and the distributing it, so that speakers could be heard distinctly when addressing meetings. It has never been found satisfactory and the windows were hung with heavy curtains to assist the acoustic properties of the building. It has recently, however been discovered that the wires stretched across the hall were unsuited for the purpose and that the vibrating of the wires so far from clarifying sounds, only confused them. Now the question of replacing them with the wire necessary to meet the position is being considered.

In November 1924, The new supper room at the Hastings Municipal Assembly Hall is nearing completion and will be used by the Okawa Rifle Club ball committee at their annual dance although the furnishing will not be quite complete. The Municipal Supper Room or perhaps banqueting hall, built of brick and concrete covers 70ft long by 30ft across providing for 180 guests at a time access from the main hall. At the eastern end the kitchen partitioned off from the tables

with porter windows, thoroughly ventilated with electric lighting, windows curtained in drapes and flooring designed for dancing. Mr G. Davies architect Hastings erected by Mr H. Abbott for £1500 and should return a handsome revenue.

1916 November, SOLDIER'S LETTER. HASTINGS BOYS AT FLERS The following are extracts from a very interesting letter describing the fighting on the Somme, which Mrs. T. Honnor has received from her son Reg, who at the time of writing was in hospital at Rouen France. September 25th, 1916. I have been through a place that I never want to go through again. Those of us who were in it and came through were very lucky. It was in this inferno that a great number of our brave lads fell never to rise again, and poor old Bert (his brother) and Sid Brimer were two of them, and also Jaspar Greene, a man, every inch of him, who fought like a lion, but was mown down by a machine gun with a good many more. It was on September 15th that our brigade got orders to move up from a place called Metz Wood to the support trenches, which were behind where our 2nd and 3rd Brigades had attacked that morning and had been very successful, as they held their gains very easily. We next got orders to move up to the new front, line on the night of September 16th, and to be ready to attack at any hour next day. Up we went that night, got to our positions about midnight, and were ready for the attack then if they had liked, but anyhow we were kept waiting until late next morning, mind you under a pretty heavy shell fire all the time, and this was when a lot of the damage was done. It was about a quarter of an hour before "going over" time, when Sid Brimer, Bert, and a little chap named Aston were talking in the trench, a shell landed close handy and the three of them fell. Less than half an hour after poor Jaspar was hit by a machine gun bullet. He dropped into a shell-hole for cover for a minute, then got up and went on further until he was again hit when he fell and died like a man. Everyone who saw him said the same thing. It was in this action that Horace Reydon Brooke-Taylor was killed, and poor old Jack Clay was missing last time I heard. It is unlikely that anyone who is missing is a prisoner, as the Germans had neither time nor chance to take prisoners on that front. They had more than they could do trying to get back themselves, and our boys did make slaughter on them with the bayonet. We were all told that the Germans will not fight at close quarters, but we did not believe it until we saw for ourselves. The German will fire on you with a machine-gun from behind cover until you get to him, and then he will come out, put his hands up and say "Mercy, comrade," and will want to be taken prisoner. I was with the infantry as messenger, unfortunately. When I was told off for/this all the boys said to me, "You have a decent job," but they soon saw what a decent job it was" when we got going. It was nearly as bad as stretcher-bearing, and that is considered the worst job in the army, and so it is without a doubt. The country over which the fighting took place was hilly - not large hills, just rises. Before the attack we held a rise, and the Germans were on the other side, just over it. Our objective lay about 1000 yards away; it was a village called Flers. At the time appointed, over our men went, all as cool as if nothing was happening, with shells flying in all directions. Still going at a walk they came to the front German line. Most of the chaps that got to it were disappointed, for the Huns would not show fight - it was "Mercy, comrade!" and all this sort of business. Then the order came to take cover in shell holes, which the ground was covered in. While we waited there, up came our landships, the greatest invention in the world, and used for the first time in this advance. They frightened the Huns all right. Some rushed out and threw hand-grenades at one of them, others fired at it with rifles and machine guns, but it was useless. They were only mown down by the machine-guns which it carries as well as two 6-pounder guns for blowing a machine gun out of position when it is located. These caterpillars, as they are called, will go practically anywhere, across trenches that it would take a man all his time to run and jump. They are marvellous things and did splendid work. We got up again led by the caterpillars, and went right- through our objective by about 500 yards, then started to dig ourselves in ready for a counter-attack, which was very feeble. We lost heavily, but the Huns lost treble our number of losses both in men and equipment. That was the first day's work; the second day passed off with nothing very notable, just heavy artillery work on both sides. It was on the morning of September 17th, that Bert fell in action with others that you know from good old Hastings. The next day it started to rain and you never saw such a miserable lot in your life mud and slush up to the knees, nowhere to lie down, and as cold as charity. I tell you it was nice! This continued until the 21st, and then it cleared up a bit and the boys cheered up. That night I was standing in the trench when a shell landed just in front and blew the

trench in on top of me. That is how I am in the hospital at the present time. I am getting on all right now, although my back is pretty sore yet; but don't worry about me, I'm lucky to get away at all, and I have a good chance of being in England in a few days.

In December 1916 - Concerning the late **Sergt. Cyril Brimer**, who lost his life whilst leading his platoon in the great Somme offensive, **Mr Thos. Brimer of Karamu Rd, Hastings**, has received the following letter from the Hon. Then. Mackenzie (High Commissioner) - "It was with much regret that I learned of your great sorrow, and I wish I could tell you personally how I share your bereavement. Your loss is also our Dominion's loss. It is men like C. Brimer who make our country great. He has made for others the great sacrifice, and his accord is immortal. After all, it is not the length of life that counts, but the cause for which he lived and died, and what he put into life. Were you here, you would lie moved to see how splendidly our troops have carried all before them, not only in the field, where they hold their own with the best, but on thin wide of the Channel winning all hearts by their honourable bearing and loveableitess and because they are such splendid young fellows! Every day I find the reasons to be proud of New Zealand's bravesons." Capt F. K. Turnbull of the late soldier's Company, he writes in a similar strain to the parents.

Deceased, who had been ailing for some time, was seventy four years of age. He was a native of Dublin, and came to New Zealand fifty six years ago, settling in the Auckland province. Two years later he went to Canterbury, and followed farming pursuits then for thirty years. The late Mr Tipping subsequently came to Hawke s Bay and was appointed manager of Messrs Nelson Bros business at Waipukurau, and later managed Messrs Williams and Kettle's business in Hastings. He gave this up to go into business with Mr R. Brathwaite, subsequently going into partnership with his son Mr C. Tipping, a business he successfully carried on up to the time of his death. During his twenty four years' residence in Hawke's Bay, the late Mr Tipping had identified himself in all matters appertaining to the general welfare and progress of the district. He was a man of sterling integrity, and was held in high esteem by all classes of the community. Deceased leaves one daughter (Mrs A. C. Lean) and two sons (Mr C. Tipping) and another son who is now in Australia. His wife predeceased him some years ago.





About 12 years ago he entered into the wholesale business, which he conducted up to the time of his death. Before coming to Hastings he carried on a successful jewellery business at Oamaru, and also took a prominent part in volunteering. He was captain of the citizens' cadets in Oamaru from 1877 and in 1887 won the New Zealand carbine championship at Christchurch. During his residence in Hastings he identified himself with sport and always took a keen interest in public affairs. He was a man of a quiet and unassuming disposition and his death will be keenly regretted by a large circle of friends. 1917 February, Widow Mrs Georgina Flora McCorkindale has instructed Beard, Bullen and Co. to offer a valuable ¼ acre section at corner of Alexandra St and Miller St, Hastings, at public auction to-morrow at 2 p.m. The sections will be put up on the property, and, as advertised a low price will be accepted to ensure a quick sale.

1917 February, **Duncan and Abbott** went bankrupt, Alexander Scott Duncan left the district while H. W. Abbott remained a contractor at Hastings.

1917 February, The shop on Karamu Rd nth lately occupied by Mr E. A. Watkins snr saddler has now opened as Fresh Food and Ice Supply, where butter, eggs and cream can be obtained daily and also children's new school books and all school requisites, and confectionery, soft drinks and ice cream.

1917 February, At Waimarama the scene of a sad drowning accident when Frank Adam Hamilton Watson who left with a party from Hastings in the morning to spend the day at the seaside, was with several others, indulging in surf-bathing near the mouth of the Pouhokio stream, when he was suddenly caught in a current and called out for assistance. Mr H. W. Waters, manager of the Hastings Club, and Mr I). A. Graham, Government Stock Inspector, who were also bathing at the time at once proceeded to render what help they could, but although they made plucky efforts to extricate Mr Watson from his difficult position, they were obliged to abandon the attempt and return to shore owing to the strong current, both being very much exhausted on reaching land. Mr Watson's body was washed ashore some time later, when every effort was made to restore animation, but without success. His wife was a witness of the accident. Mr Watson who lived in Karamu Rd Hastings, was a well-known farmer and dealer in land and was exceedingly popular with all those with whom he came in contact. Frank Watson who was 50 years of age leaves a widow and two children (a son aged 15 and a daughter aged 12), to mourn their loss, also a brother (Mr W. M. Watson) and a sister (Mrs S. H. Knight) both of Hastings. An inquest was held at the Hastings Courthouse before Mr. H. W. Brabant, Coroner. Sergeant J. J. Hogan represented the police. The evidence adduced showed that deceased in company with 25 others left Hastings at 8.30 a.m., on Sunday morning, and arrived at Waimarama at 10.30 a.m., when the party went in for a bathe. They afterwards had lunch and about 3 p.m., went in for another swim. They had been in the water for about an hour when Mr Graham and Mr Waters, who were about two chains away heard Mr Watson crying out for help. They at once went to his assistance and got hold of him, but finding they were also being carried out to sea they had to release their hold and make for the shore. Graham narrowly escaping with his life. The body was afterwards washed ashore and the police communicated with. The body was brought into Hastings on Sunday night and Dr. Boxer made an examination pronouncing that death was caused through drowning. The Coroner returned a verdict that deceased met his death by drowning while bathing at Waimarama.

We regret to have to record the death of Mr **William Edwin Hawthorne** contractor b:1879 in Drumcar, Louth, the son of Sarah and James Hawthorne, has passed peacefully away at Nurse Englishes private hospital on Sunday. Deceased had been ailing for some time from an abscess on the brain, but it was little thought by his friends that his end was so

near. The late Mr Hawthorne was the eldest son of Mr James Hawthorne of Te Aroha and a nephew of Mr Robert Hawthorne of Southampton St Hastings, served through the South African War and had intended to enlist again for active service. 



1917 May, Paperboy Killed by Car - Shortly before five o'clock last evening a fatal accident Occurred in Railway Rd, near Tollemache Rd, Hastings, the victim being a "Tribune" runner boy named Rupert Maney 14 years of age, the son of Mr and Mrs R. D. Maney of Alexandra St, Hastings; The poor little victim, who was riding a push bike, was run into by a motor car driven by W. Wilson, a Maori. The lad's death was instantaneous, the top of his head being badly crushed. How the fatality actually happened is not quite clear. Deceased and the car were travelling in the same direction, towards Paki Paki, and according to the statements of two cyclists, who were on the road at the time and proceeding to Hastings, it appears that deceased and the motor car were both on their right side of the road, cyclists had hardly passed the car when they heard its wheels skid, and looking round saw the car, after proceeding about 40 or 50 yards, pull up. They then got off their machines and walked back, only to find that a serious fatality had occurred. The driver of the car states that when quite close to the lad the latter cut across in front of the car on to his wrong side, and the car, which it is alleged was going at a fair speed, ran into him. The road where the accident took place is wide with plenty of room for several cars to pass. Sergeant Hogan. Detective Butler and Constable McGruer were soon on the scene, but the unfortunate lad was beyond all help. Herbert James King, who came along a few seconds after the accident, conveyed the body in his car to Hastings, and subsequently to the morgue. Noel Oswald Hewitt, grocer Hastings, deposed that deceased was his cousin. Great sympathy is felt for the parents and family of the deceased. Mr Maney, who is in the employ of the County Council, is working at Kereru and consequently Mrs Maney was alone in when the sad news was taken to her. She is having a run of bad luck, her eldest son having been killed at the front recently. The sad tidings of the death of little Rupert was conveyed to Mr Maney by telephone message to Mr Anderson at Kereru last night, and Mr Anderson motored him into Hastings this morning.

Rupert William Maney b: 1903 in Wairoa the son of Catherine and Richard David Maney, he died a teenager May 1917 in Hastings aged 14.



Defendant disturbed the meeting by asking questions re matters that had already been dealt with. Defendant was certainly under the influence of liquor. When asked to sit down defendant refused and was eventually removed from the room by a constable. In witness' opinion defendant was drunk. To Mr Dolan: It was essential that the boundaries of the school district should be defined. Had heard that the legality of the meeting had been challenged Defendant's manner was not disrespectful. Mr W. Adams, chairman of the O.H.S. Committee, sworn, stated that he remembered a meeting held so elect a new committee. Defendant disturbed the meeting and refused to obey the ruling of the chairman. Defendant held up the meeting for an hour. Witness asked the meeting if they were prepared to submit to defendant's behaviour, and those present said in chorus: 'Put him out." Defendant said he would hold up the meeting until his questions were answered. In witness' opinion defendant was drunk. If defendant had been in his proper senses he would not have behaved as he did. To Mr Dolan: Witness did not read any notice calling the meeting. It was an oversight on his part. Did not know the meeting was illegally convened. Defendant did not use any insulting language at the meeting. Constable McLean gave evidence is to removing defendant from the meeting and subsequently arresting him on a charge of drunkenness. Defendant's behaviour during the night was the behaviour of a drunken man. Constable Connor also gave evidence and stated that in his opinion defendant was drunk. H. M. Wilson, medical practitioner, deposed to examining defendant as to his sobriety, and found that Re was under the iirflu3nce of drink. In his opinion defendant was drunk. For the defence it was contended that defendant as not drunk, and that he was perfectly justified in asking the questions he did at the meeting. J. A. Forbes, defendant, deposed that he has four children attending the school. The meeting had started when he arrived at the school. The secretary was reading the report. He had four medium shandles between 4.30 and 6 o'clock. The first question he asked at the meeting, after the report had been read, was: Was there no balance sheet. He then asked if there was a resolution before the meeting, and he was told if he listened he would understand. Before nominations were asked for witness asked for the boundaries to be defined, and when he persisted in his endeavour to have the boundaries defined he was told if he did not desist a constable would be called to remove him. The constable removed him and he wanted to go back, and the constable then arrested him and took him to the station. To Sergeant Hogan: His conduct in the lock-up was a protest- against being illegally arrested John Hackett, carpenter, deposed that he was with witness between five and six p.m., when defendant appeared to him to be sober. William Stafford deposed he saw defendant about seven p.m. and he would not say that defendant was drunk, he appeared to be quite rational. He would not swear he was sober. Robert Henderson deposed that as far as he could see defendant was sober at the meeting. J. Poynton deposed that some of the questions asked by defendant at the meeting were reasonable and proper. To Sergeant Hogan: If witness had been chairman of the meeting he would not have put up with defendant. A. Menzies deposed that he know defendant for 30 years, and found him a respectable citizen. Defendant was not drunk at the meeting. He had all his faculties about him. David J. Cooper deposed that defendant was sober at the meeting. On the charge of drunkenness defendant, was convicted and discharged. His Worship stating that he had been sufficiently punished by being locked up all night. Defendant was ordered to pay doctor's fees £1.1 s. On the charge of disturbing the meeting defendant was convicted and fined 10/- and costs 15/-



1918 September, Hastings Fire - The fire-bell rang at 1.28 this afternoon and the volumes of dense smoke driven by a south-east wind, showed that the outbreak was in the centre of Hastings. The scene of the occurrence proved to be at the rear of Mr S. T. Tongs furnishing establishment Karamu Rd nth, the fire starting in a shed, used as a storehouse for broad timber, some drums of paint and flax. There had been no one in the shed, as far as is known, for about three hours before the flames were discovered by Mr Bert Tong, who was assisting the workmen in the cabinet making factory, another wooden structure on the right immediately adjoining. He happened to look out and, seeing the store shed well in the grip of the fire, raised the alarm at, he says, about 1. 2 pm, but if that is so, the bell did not so for some eight minutes after, which requires an explanation. Within four minutes of the bell the brigade with the motor machine were on the ground and one lead was promptly in operation on the place where the fire started. At time the store shed was in full blaze and the two-story cabinet factory was alight, whilst the flames had spread to Mr Tong's lean-to shed running along the side wall of the Tribune office building. The direction of the wind rendered Mr Tong's furnishing establishment, a wooden building, just in front as the burning structures, which were merely shells, comparatively safe. The brigade, under Superintendent W. Keith, got quickly to work at 1.33 p.m. with a lead up the right-of-way by the shop and, soon after, when another lead was laid on it was evident that the principal damage would be confined to the area of origin. Mr J. Morrison, who was working at the factory, came out with the rest, but he returned to save some tools and pictures belonging to customers, and he was missed. A rescue party broke in the window of the workshop and pulled him out half dazed with smoke, and a few cuts about the face, but otherwise unharmed. The store house was gutted and the buildings at either side damaged but the shop escaped the flames. The cause of the fire is unknown. The insurances were not available at 3 p.m., but it is understood that Mr Tong is a heavy loser.

The forested Beatson's Park -

1918 September , Beatson's Park, Sir - East Hastings is fortunate in one respect in that it adjoins Beatson's Park, the most charming piece of picnic ground to be found near the town. But why is the entrance gate kept padlocked, making it an impossibility to elderly persons and others to enter? When I mentioned the matter to one of the Councillors a short time ago I was told that it was necessary as otherwise the **firewood was stolen**, but surely it is not beyond our engineer to devise an entrance that would cope with that difficulty. To-day being a school holiday, there were a number of parties of young children picnicking under the trees. If the Councillors had been there and seen little girls of 7 and 10 years trying to lift go-carts and babies over the fence without any adult assistance, they would not have taken five minutes to make up their minds that a more convenient access was urgently necessary- I am etc. **H. 
1918 October, The case in which **Harry Limmer, cab proprietor sued Henry Thomas Wright** for £14.17/6, damages to plaintiff, his horse and his cab, due to a collision caused by defendants alleged negligence in driving his motor car was concluded. There was a counter-claim for £18 to damage due to the plaintiff's alleged negligence. The defence was that Wright was coming along on his proper side, towards the centre of the road with his lamps focussed on the centre and he could not see what was on the side of the road. When he heard a cry he yelled further to his proper side and the collision occurred it was argued that Limmer's horse was not stationary, but had finished drinking from the trough and was travelling towards Ellison Rd on the wrong side. Limmer had a right to go over to the trough to give his horse a drink, but as he was on the wrong side of the road, he should have kept a vigilant look-out and he would have seen defendant's car coming yards off. His Worship said he was satisfied Wright was not to blame and he reserved judgment on the point;

1918 November, Hastings Fire - Given a high wind and the grip the blaze had on the building when the alarm was given at 12.55 this morning, the Fire Brigade would have found it very hard to prevent the fire, which started in the wooden premises occupied by Mr Hyde and Mr Hinde opposite the Grand Hotel, from spreading and becoming a serious outbreak, instead of being confined within the area of its origin. As it was the Brigade handled the fire very effectively with three leads and notwithstanding that Hyde's hair-dressing saloon and Hinde's Oriental Confectionary shop, as well as Wolf's tailoring shop upstairs, all under one roof were gutted. Upstairs was an old wooden structure and burnt like tinder, In a few minutes the next building belonging to the same owners, and occupied by Armstrong (jeweller) and the Wilson Shoe Company was ablaze. Mr Armstrong's jewellery establishment adjoining though badly damaged at the rear and somewhat so on the front, was not so badly affected as one would anticipate from the volume of fire which confronted the brigade when they first arrived on the scene. The men did good work and it was due to their endeavours that Wilson's shoe Co's shop, on the one side escaped without injury and that Armstrong's shop on the other was not totally destroyed. The flames also invaded the roof of the rear of Hannah's boot shop, next to Armstrong's, the stock being injured by heat and fire. Westerman and Co's., drapery, further towards the railway crossing, and Johnson's drapery, next to Wilson's were each protected by brick walls, but it is problematical in the protection would prove effective if a strong wind played with the burning embers and sent them over the ramparts on to the wooden structures. 

1918 Influenza Emergency Hospitals, Hastings –

An emergency hospital was erected at the **Hastings racecourse grandstand** during the terrible Spanish influenza epidemic of 1918.

Women volunteers under the direction of hospital board members and local doctors were organised and a wonderful self-sacrificing service was given.

Dr. Thomas Waterworth the son of the late Tom Waterworth snr and an early Hastings setter was a well known Hastings dentist of Charlotte Crescent, along with other brave men and women threw themselves into the work of fighting the epidemic in the duties of orderly and general nursing work at the Hastings Emergency Hospital at the Hastings Racecourse.

Nurse L. J. Wellwood, daughter of Mr and Mrs Robert Wellwood was one of the brave band of women and young girls who cheerfully tossed their lives into the balance in the war against the terrible influenza scourge of 1918 when she volunteered as a nurse in the emergency hospital on the Hastings Race Course where several of the nurses and orderlies were carried off by the disease, which more or less affected nearly all of them. She married Mr Edmondson in February 1925 and they settled in Sydney.

Mrs Anne Amelia Coulson of Dufferin St gave practical demonstration in the care of the sick during the great influenza epidemic of 1918 and in her tender solitude and actual nursing in invalided soldiers after the war.

In November 1918, **Francis Arnold Stone**, at the Hastings Influenza Hospital aged 17 a cadet telegraph operator at the Hastings Post and Telegraph Office was an early victim who died at the Hastings Influenza Hospital. He had been ill about a week, developed serious symptoms yesterday and last night no hopes were entertained of his recovery. He had been in Hastings about three months. He was born November 1903 the son of Annie and Joseph William Stone of Palmerston North. He had three brothers and five sisters.

1918 November, Death, Petersen - At Hastings Emergency Hospital, Peter the beloved husband of Elaine Petersen and eldest son of Capt. P. A. Petersen of Wellington; aged 39 years. The funeral will take place tomorrow morning.

1918 November, Death, At Hastings, Michael Dunn of Flaxmere b: 1864 Co Limerick Ireland died aged 54.

1918 November, Robert Gilmour died at Hastings aged 28, husband of Hazel M. Gilmour. **Robert Gilmour** b: 1891 in Waitangirua Wellington the son of Rachel and Robert Gilmour, in July 1914 he married Hazel May Brown b: April 1893 in Auckland the daughter of Mary and Henry Brown. They had one daughter. (Roddie) Robert Gilmour died at Hastings a young father in November 1918 aged 27, Hazel May Gilmour nee Brown married Oscar James aka Robert Hodder in 1922 Hazel May Gilmour / Hodder nee Brown died April 1988, in Rotorua aged 94.

1918 November, Norman Westbrook an agent died at Hastings November 1918 aged 41, husband of Annie Westbrook.

1918 November, Returned soldier Arnold John Kitt b: 1891 the son of Mary Jane and John Kitt of Maraekakaho Rd died at the Hastings Emergency Hospital aged 27, **Arnold John Kitt** b:1891 the son of Mary Jane and John Kitt of Wall Rd Hastings, Gnr Arnold John Kitt 2/516 Field Artillery left for the war with the Main Body, 1914 – 1916 Gallipoli and Western Front 1917. The funeral took place this morning with Semi-military honours.

Since the Hastings emergency hospital opened thirteen days ago 172 cases have been admitted, 52 discharged and 33 died, leaving 77 in the hospital to-day. Fifty-four deaths have been registered in Hastings during the epidemic. Mrs

Tanner has lent the late Mr Tanner's residence at Havelock as an influenza convalescent home. By the end of December 1918, 222 patients had been treated at the racecourse hospital with 48 deaths.

Staff of the Hastings Emergency Hospital at the racecourse grandstand who died -

Nurse Ina Geraldine Leech was born February 1892, the daughter of Everina Ellen Augusta and George John Leech. She had five brothers and two sisters. She died November 1918 at the Hastings Emergency Hospital at the Hastings racecourse aged 26. The funeral of Nurse Leech of the nursing staff of the Hastings Emergency Hospital, late of Rangiora who died of influenza at that institution, took place on Thursday afternoon, when a large and representative gathering, including members of the Hospital staff, followed the remains to the graveside, where the Anglican service was conducted by the Rev. Canon Culwick of Puketapu. The Mayor said a few words in eulogy of the nurse's devotion to duty. The pall-bearers were the Mayor Mr H. Ian Simson, Lt. Cavell, 'Gunner Leech (brother of deceased) Messrs E. T. Herrick, W. Raymond, and F. McLeod, and the coffin was covered with wreaths, including those of the Mayor and Mayoress, the Hospital Medical Superintendent Dr. Boxer and the Hospital staff.

The Hastings Emergency Hospital Orderlies who died from the epidemic while on duty at the hospital were -

Walter Mason Pte. Reg No 1098 of 2nd Australian Pioneers was born 1885 in Wanganui, the son of Florence Nina and Robert Henry Mason. In August 1911 he married Alice Avalon Austin at Lara Victoria. They had one child – 1912 Pauline Alice Austin Mason at Hastings. Walter Mason a motor engineer died as a young father November 1918 at the Hastings Emergency Hospital at the Hastings racecourse aged 33. Mrs Alice Avalon Mason nee Austin married William Frederick Turner in 1921 in Queensland. She died in 1956 in Victoria at the age of 68 and Pauline Alice Austin Mason married John Charles Davis in 1932 at Victoria and she died 1968 in Victoria at the age of 56.

George Thomas Blake Mason b: July 1882 in Hawke's Bay the son of Frances Ellen and George Morris Mason died at Hastings December 1918 aged 36. Lce Cpl. Blake Mason 24/511 Rifle Brigade was born Waipawa he served in Egypt 1915 – 1916 and on the Western Front 1916. In 1918 he married Dorothy Gregory b: January 1896 in Waikato. They had one son - February 1919 Hugh Blake (Blake) Mason at Hastings. Dorothy Mason nee Gregory died April 1986 in Havelock North aged 90.

Edward James Jerry Gigg was born 1885 in Hastings, the son of Annie and William Gigg. He had ten brothers and six sisters. He died November 1918 at the Hastings Emergency Hospital at the Hastings racecourse aged 33.

Peter William Francis Atkinson was born in April 1893 in Wanganui, the son of Catherine and William Atkinson. He had three brothers and three sisters. Peter William Francis Atkinson died December 1918 in Hastings aged 24.

1918 December, A meeting of business men and 3 employees was held in the Hastings Borough Council Chambers, to form committees to assist in fighting the influenza epidemic. The Hastings hotels were re-opened after being closed down during the epidemic, the same hours as previously, 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. being observed. The influenza main news the war news has taken a secondary place. A good few families have been affected but they have all recovered.

In December 1918, **Hastings Emergency Hospital** - The patients in the **Stewards' Stand building** have been removed to the ward upstairs at the **rear of the Grand stand**, which now houses all the patients. Since yesterday eight patients have been discharged, three of whom were sent to the Endsleigh House, the Havelock Convalescent Home, and four have been admitted to the hospital. There were no deaths. There are now **37 patients** in the hospital, two cases classed "ill," but none are serious. The conditions are eminently satisfactory.'

1918 December, **Convent Crèche** - At the Convent Crèche two children were taken out, leaving 19 children still under the care of the nuns.

1918 December, Hastings - The Food Collecting and Distributing Depot at Hastings t which has been kept very busy up to the present in supplying invalid food to families stricken down with influenza, is able to report a much improved condition of affairs. Many patients are now convalescent and are able to help themselves, so that it is considered advisable to make a reorganisation after Sunday next. **The shop** will be open from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. for the purpose of collecting and distributing the food, but it is not considered necessary to send cars out as formerly, though one or two **emergency cars** will be in readiness to deal with urgent or really necessitous cases. The committee in charge of the depot cannot speak too highly of the generosity of those ladies who, day after day, hate cooked food in order to help the suffering, but they trust that the work may be continued a little longer until the epidemic has passed. Will those ladies who so far have not been able to help, render some assistance by supplying beef tea, mutton broth, jellies, custards, milk shakes, or any food suitable for invalids or convalescents. Some relief might also be afforded those gentlemen who have so kindly placed their cars and time at the committee's disposal, but who find it necessary to resume their ordinary callings on Monday next. The following donations are hereby acknowledged: Mrs Newbegin £3.3 / - Mr J. A. Hennah £2. 2 /- Mrs. N. Fowler £1.

The Hastings Emergency Hospital at the Hastings racecourse closed down for the H.B. Jockey Club's New Year race meeting 1919.

Many other Hastings residents never really fully recovered and later died of subsequent complications from the initial Influenza and were not listed in the death toll.



In April 1919 during the Spanish Influenza epidemic some schools were closed, Mr Alexander Morris Robertson of 'Bute Orchard' Pakowhai Rd standing by his horse with some of his younger children. The orchard spray unit used to fumigate the Mahora School with a solution of formalin, then it was thoroughly cleaned out before reopening. Mr Robertson also donated a number of cases of pears for consumption by the school children

In July 1919, A meeting of the Trustees of the Hastings Influenza Fund was held last evening. Present, the Mayor Mr Geo. Ebbett in the chair and Messrs. E. H. Williams, Thos. Styles, H. I. Simson and the hon. secretary Mr L. F. Pegler. A statement in connection with the **Nurse Leech and Orderlies Fund**, with a cheque for the amount subscribed, was submitted by the ex-Mayor Mr Simson and the Mayor Mr Ebbett and Messrs. E. H. Williams and T. Styles were appointed trustees of the fund.

The Nurse Leech Memorial - In May 1922 the mayor of Hastings W. Hart has announced that Mr George Ebbett late mayor was trustee in the Nurse Leech memorial fund has transferred the moneys to the credit of the account at the bank apox £58. The Nurse Leech Memorial Committee was set up – Following motion by Cr. Baker a memorial over the entrance to the Hastings cemetery in memory of Nurse Leech and three Orderlies who died during the influenza epidemic 1918.

In January 1923, The long-delayed monument to the memory of Nurse Leech, one of the brave band of devoted volunteers who faced death in the service of their stricken fellow citizens at the racecourse emergency hospital in Hastings during the influenza scourge of 1918 and who herself amongst others lost her life in the discharge of her self-imposed labour has been decided upon and may be seen at Messrs Tong and Hoare's monumental works in Hastings. The tribute takes the form of simple **marble cross** standing some **six feet** high from its base into which will be set the inscription already placed on the grave by the deceased nurse's mother. Above that words somewhat in the following form will be chiselled "**Erected by the people of Hastings for duty nobly done**"

1918 November, A **Maori Hospital** was also set up in **Drill Hall** Hastings for the Returned Maori Soldiers and their effected families with Nurse Colnett in charge, **Dr. R. Nairn**, Medics' Superintendent. Twenty-nine cases were admitted, some seriously ill, but there have been no deaths yet.



1918 December, The Maori Hospital - The Drill Hall Hospital report is also very satisfactory. there were two admissions yesterday and one patient was discharged. Two deaths occurred, viz: Miss Peka Dinsdaie from Pakowhai (a visitor from Rotorua) aged 15 and Mrs. Materita Rerei, Bridge Pa. There are 50 cases under treatment in the hospital now, but none is considered serious.

1918 December, Ephia Hone b: November 1892 died at Paki Paki aged 26.

1918 December, **Maori Hospital** – Influenza - The **Drill Hall** Southampton St east has been closed down, as the wards have been cleared of patients. The convalescent tent is also vacated and operations have ceased, 87 Maori had been admitted with 11 deaths. **Nurse G. Colnett (matron)** and **Sister M. Batty** of the Maori Hospital left Hastings this morning, on then return to Auckland, their work in connection with the epidemic having been concluded. **Nurse G. T. Wells** of the nursing staff of the Hastings Emergency Hospital 'will return to Napier in a couple of days, to resume her duties on the staff of the Napier Hospital. As the train steamed out the nursing and orderly staffs (Maori and Pakeha) of the hospital, as well as the manfriends the nurses made during their sojourn in Hastings, cheered loudly and expressed their wishes for good luck.

Graham of Hastings; aged 42 years. The funeral will leave her late residence for the Hastings cemetery. "Willing rather to be absent from the body and to be present with the Lord." Her daughters Ruth Evelyn died in March 1939 aged 33 and Mavis Eileen died in November 1942 aged 30.

- 1918 December, **Captain Allen Owen Bishop** died at Hastings aged 38. Military Transport Officer on the Wellington Staff Deceased, who was the eldest son of Mrs E. and the late Thomas Bishop of Hastings arrived home from Wellington about a week ago. He developed a chill and took to his room last Thursday night, gradually becoming worse until pneumonia, set in and despite every care he passed away at two-o'clock this morning. Captain Bishop took an absorbing interest in soldiering and, when nineteen years' old was Captain of the Hastings volunteers. Early in the war he was appointed Railway Transport Officer at Wellington carrying out his duties systematically and efficiently and to the entire satisfaction of the Defence Department. Parkvale Temporary Hop Kiln School opened -

1919 February, After a year of almost continuous effort on the part of the committee, elected by the residents of Hastings East, to further the interests of a school for that district, a side-school was opened temporarily in **Mr Master's hop kiln Hall last Tuesday.**

The old hop drying kiln building was a large two storied building on Selwood Rd.




Mr Master's old hop drying kiln Temporary Parkvale School on Selwood Rd

The Parkvale Hop Kiln school was a temporary side school for overcrowded Central School, under the headmastership of Mr Peglar.

Parkvale primers were taught under Miss Annie Anderson with Miss V. May Castle as assistant.

Thirty-nine children were enrolled the first morning and the attendance is creeping up day by day, though only children up to Standard I. are being admitted.

There were two classes both occupying the upper floor of the building, one at each end with no partition, long desks and a tiny stove for heat.




Mr Master's old hop drying kiln Hall on Selwood Rd – later named Windsor Ave

It was a day of glorious sunshine, and general rejoicing that the school was actually an accomplished fact and parents and children vied with each other in extracting the last atom of fun out of the proceedings. Friends and sympathisers were most generous and though the notice was so short, gifts of all kinds were placed at the disposal of the committee to add to the happiness of the children. The Mayor of Hastings and the chairman of the District High School Committee had lunch with the children and in a short speech, the Mayor expressed his pleasure at being present. During the afternoon Mr Pegler, headmaster of the school, and Mr Hall, helped to organise the races. Prizes for these were donated by the Mayor, Messrs Miller, Hall, Finlay, E. Pratt and Hay. A beautiful tea concluded a thoroughly enjoyable function.

In July 1919 a social and dance were held in the old Master's Hop Kiln Hall to raise funds to purchase suitable flags for peace celebrations. The Hop Kiln building was later occupied by St Barnabas' Mission Hall Church in 1930 The two brick kilns were destroyed in the quake, but the main building stood for another 21 years until 1952

1919, Fred Sands b: 1876 Lincolnshire, the son of Hannah Crow and Thomas Sands married Mary Elizabeth Evelyn Russell

1919, Aileen Wilkins was born in Hastings, the daughter of Ethel and Daniel Wilkins.



Albert Leslie Holland b: January 1892 in Timaru Canterbury, the son of Mary Elizabeth and James Holland. In 1911 he married Katie Harris b: 1889 in Canterbury the daughter of Catherine and James Harris. They moved to Hastings. In June 1916 Mrs A. Holland Avenue Rd Hastings advertised first-class accommodation and good meals at Gloucester House. In 1919 Katie and Albert Leslie Holland a builder at Avenue Rd east Hastings, In April 1927 Albert Leslie Holland a builder of Hastings bankrupt, he began business in Hastings about eight years ago. In 1928 Katie and Albert Leslie

Holland a builder at 511 Burnett St Hastings and 703 Henry St Hastings, in 1928. Katie Holland nee Harris died in 1930 aged 41. In December 1938 at Christchurch Albert married Ellen Miranda Fletcher b: November 1886 in Canterbury the daughter of Elizabeth and John Fletcher. Albert Leslie Holland died in July 1955 in Wellington aged 63 and Ellen Miranda Holland nee Fletcher died January 1976 in Christchurch aged 89.

1919, Rose and Henry Hooper an upholsterer resided in Hastings St Hastings. Henry George Hooper b: 1864 in Cheltenham Gloucestershire Eng. He first came to NZ in 1876 and after ten years in this country he went to Australia. In February 1890 in Victoria Aus he married Rosetta Hartmann b: 1866 in Beechworth Victoria, the daughter of Emily and August Hartmann. They returned to NZ about 1919. Henry George Hooper died suddenly in February 1926 in Heretaunga St aged 62 when he was assisting a carrier in shifting his household belongings into a cart. The carrier took some things from the house to the cart and on his return almost immediately he found the deceased lying on the ground apparently dead. James Harmer builder of Hastings identified the deceased he had known him for 18 years. Rosetta Hooper nee Hartmann died July 1947 in Hastings aged 81.

1919, Gerald Preston De Coudray Tronson moved to Hastings to reside with his married daughter Mrs Evans.

1919, Michael Ahern married Jessie Beamont in NZ. Michael Ahern died March 1926 buried Taradale cemetery, Jessie Ahearn of Tomoana Rd Hastings, she died May 1933 also buried Taradale cemetery

1919, Sarah Ann and Samuel Burbury Stretton a land sales at 404 Victoria St Hastings and Frank Hollis Stretton a clerk at 504 Victoria St Hastings.

1919, **Harry Petch** b: 1886 the son of Ruth and Martin Petch married Bretta May Leeves b: December 1895 Hastings the daughter of Elizabeth and Luther Leeves. They had two daughters – 1929 at Hastings. Harry Petch died May 1959 aged 73 and Bretta May Petch nee Leeves died November 1979 aged 83 both buried in Havelock North.

1919, **William Charles Taylor** b: May 1893 at Hastings the son of Agnes Jane and William Taylor married Gwendoline Annie Robinson b: 1897 in NZ. In February 1916 William Charles Taylor enlisted WW1 Reserves. Gwendoline Annie Taylor nee Robinson died January 1962 at Hastings aged 65. In 1965 at Hastings William Charles Taylor married Eva Dewstow b: April 1890 in Hastings the daughter of Justine Agnes and William Henry Dewstow. William Charles Taylor died January 1972 aged 78 and Eva Taylor nee Dewstow died July 1986 in Auckland aged 96.



Samuel Burbury Stretton b: 1859 in Uttoxeter, Staffordshire, the son of Frances and Charles Stretton In February 1895 in Camberwell Victoria Aus he married Sarah Ann (Dolly) Maltby b: 1871 in Carisbrook, Victoria the daughter of Mary and Thomas Maltby. They had two children - May 1897 Frank Hollis Stretton in Hawthorn Victoria and December 1898 Edna Muriel Stretton in Dandenong, Victoria she died as a teenager in February 1917 in Nelson NZ. Samuel Burbury Stretton died July 1935 in Havelock North aged 76 and Sarah Ann (Dolly) Stretton nee Maltby died February 1941 in Hamilton aged 70.

Gerald Preston De Coudray Tronson b: November 1848 in Bath Somerset, the son of Emma and the late Lieutenant - Colonel Tronson of Prince Albert's Own. He came to NZ in 1866 landing Lyttelton and spent some time in the southern gold fields in Otago. He was a Maori War. He went to Napier and subsequently joined the police force and was stationed at Waipawa for some time. In August 1878 he married Lucy Sarah Collins b: August 1858 in Hawke's Bay the daughter of Sarah and Edward Collins. They had 13 children. Later he returned to Napier and subsequently retiring from the force. 1890 he was an Insurance Agent, He then took up farming in the Meeanee district from 1904 - 1908. Lucy Sarah Tronson nee Collins died May 1908 in Napier aged 49 after his wife passed away he returned to Napier where he engaged in duties at the local defence office as caretaker and custodian and remained there from 1909 until 1918. He was a resident of Hastings for seven years at his daughters Mrs Evans wife of the Hastings borough engineer. Gerald Preston De Coudray Tronson died October 1925 in the Napier Hospital aged 76. He leaves a family of six sons and seven daughters - Mabel Jesse Tronson b: June 1882 had one daughter from one relationship - December 1897 Dora Eileen Tronson, then she married Charles Edward Evans in April 1909, a borough engineer of Hastings, formerly

engineer to the Masterton Borough Council who sued him for damages for alleged neglect and unskilful supervision while in the employ of the Council.

1919, **Robert Nigel Warren** commenced business as a baker and pastrycook. in Hastings through his father's estate and mother finance. He married Flossie Moss in February 1921 and purchased a house in Hastings in 1921 and sold it in 1923, he leased a bakehouse in Havelock North from his mother, his brother purchased a delivery van and made arrangements to sell cakes for him on commission, the economic slump caused him to file for bankruptcy in October 1926.

1919 - 1922 **Elizabeth Mary Phillips** married to Frank Herbert Phillips she was owner of the Grand Hotel, Hastings while in December 1919 Frank Herbert Phillips was licensee of the New Zealander Hotel Manners St Wellington he was fined 20s. Frank Herbert Phillips b:1877 Hokianga an interpreter and skilled bushman, in 1903 aged 21 he was appointed Native interpreter on the Parliamentary Legislative Council staff. Mr Phillips was a Taranaki representative rugby footballer. In 1916 Frank Herbert Phillips married at the St. Mary of the Angels Roman Catholic Church by Rev Father O'Connell, Elizabeth Mary Davey, licensee of the New Zealander Hotel Manners St Wellington. Miss P. Burke bridesmaid and Mr J. B. Lynch bestman with Mr Robert Allison groomsman. Frank Herbert Phillips worked with Esther Mary North in the 1930s, creating Ecclesfield Reserve in Silverstream. Lived in a cottage on the reserve land. A track in the reserve is named after him. Elizabeth Mary Phillips nee Davey poss died 1934 aged 75 and Frank Herbert Phillips died 1959 aged 83.

1919, Mr John Joseph Pickett a former Chief Postmaster and Mrs Anne Filbey Pickett retired to Southampton St Hastings, he was on the Hawke's Bay Tribune.

John Joseph Pickett b: October 1853 London Middlesex Eng. In July 1874 he married At Bromley-by-Bow London John Joseph Pickett to Ann Filbey Brown b: 1853 the daughter of Charlotte and Robert Brown, Stanstead near Ware, Herts, Eng. Mr Pickett was chief postmaster at Timaru when he retired, prior to that at Gisborne, and postmaster at Tauranga, Thames, Stratford and other places he came out to NZ 72 years ago in the sailing vessel *Jessie Redmond* arriving at Dunedin. Shortly afterwards he joined the Post and Telegraph Dept and after six years in Dunedin was appointed postmaster at Charlston on the West Coast. He had similar appointments later at Carterton, Foxton, Waipawa, Statford and Tauranga. Later he was appointed postmaster at Thames holding similar positions at Gisborne and Timaru from where he retired in 1919 and came to Hastings. In July 1924 Mr and Mrs J. J. Pickett of Southampton St Hastings celebrated their golden wedding. Anne Filbey Pickett nee Brown died at Hastings June 1928 aged 75. A married son Thomas Fraser Pickett of NZ Clothing Factory Ltd and a daughter Miss Ethel Pickett resided at Hastings. John Joseph Pickett died at his Southampton St home November 1945 aged 92.



1919, Sydney Martell, Station St

1919 January, J. A. Miller is selling 'Dynevor' Grove Rd Hastings instructed by Mr Sydney Martell (who is leaving Hastings) will sell the contents of his residence, together with live stock, motor cars and numerous sundries. This 'Dynevor' on Grove Rd was the residence of Ms Jeannie Shaw, her widowed mother Marion and Ms Jessie Catherine Shaw who sold her brothers orchard in November 1945 for the Windsor Park extension.



1919 February, Andrew Hamilton Lockie, motor engineer in Heretaunga St east for a very short time

1919, A very useful invention has been placed on the market in the shape of a Ford Tractor which is brought into use by a very simple transforming of a Ford car. Mr **Allan** Lockie of Heretaunga St Hastings, is the sole agent.

In May 1919, Gill Bros will start on Mr Lockie's unreserved sale of all his engineer's tools and stock in trade. Everything is almost new. There are several Mak-a-Tractors to be sold, and to the farmer owning a Ford car this sale should not he missed, every line to the highest bidder are our instructions. A rare chance for the trade.

Andrew Hamilton Lockie b: April 1891 in Maraekakaho, the son of Allan and Mary Lockie. In 1918 he married Violet Castle b: November 1896 the daughter of Arthur and Laura Castle. They had one son. Residence in 1919m at 713 Southland Rd. Andrew Hamilton Lockie died November 1962 Wellington aged 71 and Violet Lockie nee Castle died1983 in Wellington aged 87.

1919 February Hastings Fire - An inquiry was held at the Hastings Court House, this morning, before Mr R. W. Dyer, S.M., Coroner as to the circumstances attending a fire which on the afternoon, of Saturday August 24th, 1919 destroyed the four-roomed house, in Norton Rd sth, owned by William Taylor of Riverslea Rd and Agnes Taylor wife of owner, and occupied by William Phillip Bowden a milkman from Nuhaka since December 1916 lease to a week after the fire, it was previously leased to Mr A. E. Wake in 1913. Detective Butler conducted the enquiry on behalf of the police, and Mr C. Dunn watched the proceedings on behalf of Wm. P. Bowden. Mr C. Prime. Fire Loss Adjuster and Mr Frederick Cray, manager of the Guardian Office, were also present. Ethel Bowden wife of W. P. Bowden, deposed that she and her husband occupied the cottage up to August 24th last. The furniture was insured in the Guardian office in her name, for £225. She was the person at the house prior to fire. She left a little after 2 p.m. to visit a neighbour nearby and her husband was up town. The children went to the pictures and there was no one in the house. She locked the front door, but the back door could not be locked. It was just closed. There was a fire in the range and a fire in the dining room, the latter having an open fire place. The fires were practically out when she left. When she got to O'Neills place on the corner of Park Rd she spoke for a few minutes to Martin L. O'Neill in Algernon Rd halfway between Park Rd and Norton Rd, and went on. She gave him a cage with a canary in it. After she had gone a little way she heard him call out. She did not know he was calling her, but the second time he called "fire" but she thought he was joking. She went on to the corner of Riverslea Rd, when she turned and saw the smoke. She ran back but she fainted after going a short distance. She did not get back to the house. It took her about half an hour to go from the house to the corner of Riverslea Rd. She estimated her loss at £275 15/4. There was nothing of value moved from the house previous to the fire. Bowden. George Goodall, farmer with Mr O'Neill and his father went to the burning house and found the doors locked. The list which Detective Butler put in (exhibit as was a correct list of these articles. She packed these on her husband's instructions, as they were going to move. A box belonging to her husband's brother was also removed. She said to Constable McGruer that she had lost everything and saved nothing; she did not think the articles saved- worth mentioning. She told Constable McGruer that all of her brother-in-law's things were destroyed. Her brother-in-law's were in a room by themselves. She could not remember telling Detective Butler and Constable McGruer that her brother-inlaw's things were all that were saved. She thought the articles in the detective's list were not of any value. There was very little in the dining-room before the fire - a table, a hearth rug, six chairs. There were four chairs in the kitchen. She could not remember all that was in the dining-room, the detective had better ask Mr Bowden. Detective Butler: I'm asking you: it is you who is claiming. Witness: I don't feel well, I think I'm fainting. The witness fainted immediately afterwards and had to be removed from the Court and, as she did not improve, Dr. Story was sent for. He ordered her home to bed, and her husband had to go with her to care for her. The inquiry was then continued Walter Cecil Prime, Fire Loss Adjuster, Napier, deposed he was called in to adjust the loss. He obtained a list of what was said to be the contents of the house before the fire from Mr and Mrs Bowden. When they brought the list the articles had no figures against them. He asked them to fill the values in and they sat in Mr Lanauze's office and filled the values in. He handed in the list (exhibit b). On the 26th August he examined the bed-room, and he did not find what he expected to see if the furniture claimed for had been in the house. Constable McGruer deposed to interviewing Mr and Mrs Bowden on August 27th. He interviewed them separately. Witness handed in each of the Bowdens' statements signed. (exhibit C). Bowden's statements said that he heard of the fire when he was in Hastings, and he took a motor car, but the house was destroyed when he arrived. There were 84 bank notes in the house and they were burnt. He did not know the cause of the fire. He had intended shifting to Longlands on August 30th. He had not removed anything to Longlands. He visited the house they removed to in Longlands, on August 27th and in a shed, there were a large wooden box, a portmanteau, a gladstone bag, a band-bag, and a dress basket. There was no one at home. On August 30th, he visited the place again, with Detective Butler. He saw Mr and Mrs Bowden at the house. In reply to Detective Butler, they were conducted to a room and there shown a black box and the portmanteau. Mr and Mrs Bowden said that these were the brother's things, and were all that was saved, and that they had forgotten to tell about it when giving their previous statement. Afterwards, witness and the detective discovered, in the kitchen cupboard, the articles mentioned in Exhibit A. The Bowden's said these articles were not claimed in the list given the Insurance Co. Witness examined the debris of the bedroom in Norton Rd, on August 27th, and found the remains of an iron bedstead, the wire .portion of two stretchers, portion of a lamp and various pieces of crockery and spoons. He did not find the remains of a clock or jewellery. David A. Wilkie, labourer, deposed that, at the time of the fire, he was employed by Bowden. Remembered Bowden taking some bags of his brothers' things and some tools to Longlands before the fire. Mrs Bowden packed them up. The morning of the fire witness took a brief bag down on a bike, but did not know what was in it. It was fairly heavy. He put it in the shed. A cooler was taken down by Mr Bowden the same morning. In one of the back rooms there were no chairs, and, if they wanted to sit down, they had to get chairs from the kitchen. There was only a small table in the room. There was only a table, couch, dresser, and 4 or 5 chairs in the kitchen. There were three or four oil paintings on the wall. The crockery was of a mixed pattern. They hadn't a dinner or tea set. There was enough crockery for seven or eight people. Did not know anything about the front bedrooms. To Mr Dunn: The Bowden's were getting ready to shift to Murton's place at Longlands, at the time. The tease of the house they were in expired at the end of August. They were having a clearing sale about a week after the fire occurred. The first things taken to Longlands were farm implements - outside articles. The property were taken to Longlands quite openly. Emma Jane Remnant deposed that she new Mrs Bowden on

August 24th between 1 and 2 p.m., in **Algernon Rd, about to chains from Park Rd, on the Riverslea Rd** side. She halted about two minutes at Park Rd corner, and then she came on. "Witness turned into Park Rd and saw smoke from Bowden's house. It would take about ten minutes to walk from Bowden's house to where she met Mr Bowden. Not sufficient evidence for conviction.

In March 1919, William Taylor, owner of a farm in Norton Rd, Hastings, leased the property to Ernest Victor Yanke, W. W. Green a farmer at Hastings and Charles Schlitzus a fruit merchant

In August 1919, Mr and Mrs W. P. Bowden family of Longlands, intend leaving for England by the *Athenic* which is due to sail about the end of September.

1919 February, Hon Alfred Levavasour Durell Fraser of Hastings died at Auckland aged 57, the wife of Emily Teresa Dennett and son of Lousie Fraser

1919 February, Reg Pearce, Regina cycle Works Hastings - Reginald Charles Warrington Pearce.

1919 February, An old resident of Hastings passed away suddenly this morning at his residence Park Rd in the person of **George Moulton** b:1840 in Cheshire was in his 80th year and had been for many years suffering from heart trouble, for which he was being medically treated, so an inquest will not be necessary. His wife Selina had died 1887 in Stockport Cheshire aged 43. He leaves a grown up family of two daughters and a son who is on active service to mourn their loss. The funeral will leave the residence for the Hastings cemetery. His son and daughter Alicia Moulton spinster and James Moulton a carpenter both moved to the Wellington region where Alicia Moulton died 1961 aged 84 and James Moulton died 1950 aged 64.

1919 March, Wedding, Waterworth – Innes - At St. Matthew's Church Hastings by the Rev. Simpkins, Thomas, younger son of the late Mr T. Waterworth of Hastings and Napier to Elspeth Irene, younger daughter of the late Mr John Innes, surveyor, Invercargill.

1919 March, Charles John Augustus Manley b: March 1892 in Hastings the son of Margaret Anastasia and Thomas William Manley married Ellen Dinah Fergusson b: October 1893 at Clive the daughter of Rosanna and James Fergusson. They had two children - May 1916 Ellen Sarah Jean Manley at Hastings she married Robert John McKay in March 1938 and January 1920 Thomas Charles Manley at Havelock North he married Joan Eleanor Fordam in October 1950.

1919 March, Kenneth George Compton b: October 1894 in Hastings the son of Harriett and William Henry Compton jnr married Elsie Gordon Reid McLeod b: May 1897 at Ballance the daughter of Euphemia and Henry McLeod. They had three children at Hastings - 1920 Ivan Banks Compton, April 1921 Malca Patricia Compton and 1924 David Gordon Reid Compton. Kenneth George Compton died March 1930 in Hastings aged 35 and Elsie Gordon Reid Compton nee McLeod died June 1984 in Hastings aged 87.

1919 March, Holland child born at Hastings, but died the same day. **Edmund (Edward) Albert Holland** a blacksmith of Gisborne. Edmund Alfred Holland b: June 1894 in Patangata the son of Flora Alice and Henry Edmund Holland. In July 1918 at Palmerston North he married Violet May Adams b: October 1900 in Blenheim the daughter of Eveline and George Adams. They moved to Hastings and had one child - March 1919 in Hastings but died the same day. 1919 May, At Hawke's Bay County Council, Mr H. J. H. Glazebrook brought attention to the dangerous condition of the **Karamu Bridge** and suggested to widen the bridge about six feet and the other to deviate the road on the Hastings side so as to bring the approaches into line with the bridge. Whichever work is decided upon, it will be of immense advantage to traffic and thus tend to prevent accidents. But there were several fatal deaths before anything was done.

1919 May, Marriage, Thompson – Bullen. At St. Andrew's Church by the Rev. P. Ramsey, Hugh A. Thompson, eldest son of Mr and Mrs T. J. Thompson, to Elizabeth Bullen, eldest daughter of Mr and Mrs A. E. Bullen, both of Hastings. Hugh Anderson Thompson died in December 1973 at Hastings age 88.

1919 May, The staff of the Hastings Borough Council gathered to farewell Miss A. A. Harper senior typist in the municipal service who resigned to take a position at Messrs Carlile, McLean, Scannell and Wood solicitors Hastings. Mr P. Purser Town Clerk and Mr A. C. Fawcett thanked and wished her prosperity and happiness.

1919 April, Private Albyn Vincent Collins Newrick who left with the 20th Reinforcements and was severely gassed in France, returned to Hastings on Anzac Day. His father and mother Mr and Mrs Malcolm Newrick of Ellison Rd met him at Palmerston North and brought him home by motor car. He is looking remarkably well, but will have to undergo further medical treatment at the Napier Hospital. His brother Sergeant Frank Newrick was awarded the Military Medal for bravery in the field, will arrive home shortly.

1919 May, Returned Maori Soldiers - It is proposed, if a sufficient number can parade, to form one platoon of returned Maori troops at the reception to General Russell. All returned officers and men of the Native Race who can do so are requested to fall in at the Hastings Railway Station. Geo Ebbett, Mayor, Officer in Charge of Native Troops.

1919 May, The Mayor (Mr G. Ebbett) Mayor. General Sir Andrew H. Russell and Lady Russell will arrive in Hastings on Monday by special train at 12.40 p.m. There will probably be no separate parade of Native troops as the Maori Pioneer Battalion, of whom about 30 should have paraded, are due to leave by the express on Monday morning, but all returned Maori soldiers are asked to parade with the pakeha troops. At the request of the Mayor the Holiday Association has agreed to a half holiday from 12 noon and any employee who wishes to parade will be allowed to go at 11.30 a.m. The speaking will be done from the balcony of the Municipal Buildings on the Heretaunga St front. The troops will be paraded in Heretaunga St in 16 ranks, so as to occupy the least possible space. The Mayor desires to impress on the public the futility of crowding to the railway station. The General will land on the platform and will pass through the station building but the space behind the station must necessarily be roped off. The procession will proceed Station St and Heretaunga St to the Municipal Buildings, and if the public line both sides of the route they will get an excellent view without overcrowding or inconvenience. The members of the Old Squadron, Hawke's Bay Mounted Rifles are notified to parade on the day at twelve o'clock at the Hasting Railway Station. Badge must be worn. It has been arranged that a moving picture of the proceedings will be taken and will be shown throughout New Zealand. Tickets of admission to the balcony have been issued to General Russell's party and friends, members of the Borough Council and their wives, members of the Executive Committee and their wives, Borough, officials, soldiers from the hospital and the chairmen and officials of local bodies. All ticket holders are requested to present them at the Hastings St entrance. There will be no admission at the main entrance. At Hastings Municipal Buildings, General Russell made a special tribute to the Maori Pioneer Battalion for their gallant fighting August 1915 at Chunak Bair, Gallipoli and at Hill 60, and later at Somme in France in 1916 at Messines and at Ypres to 1918. An afternoon tea was provided in the Marbel Bay by the mayor and mayoress.

1919 May, Mr Fred Howard has disposed of his boot and shoe business in Hastings and Mr F. Thorp of Napier will take the establishment over. Mr Howard intends taking an extended trip to Sydney. Frederick Thorp.

1919 May, After four and a-half years' Active Service - Major-General Sir Andrew Russell, K.C.M.G., K.C.S., Commander of the New Zealand Division in France, who left New Zealand in command of the Mounted Division of the Main Body of the New Zealand Expeditionary Force on October 16th 1914, returned to Hastings. The people of his home town gave him a most enthusiastic welcome and a civic reception at the Municipal Chambers.



1919 May, T. S. Roulston late manager for Cotterill & Humphries has commenced on his own in Hastings as land, commisson agent

1919 June, Death, Gilhooly - At her residence, Catherine dearly beloved wife of Michael Gilhooly; in her 50th year. The funeral will leave her late residence, Norton Rd, for the Catholic Church. An old resident of Hastings in the person of Mrs **Catherine** wife of Mr **Michael Gilhooly of Norton Rd**, passed peacefully away at the age of 50 years. The deceased lady, who had been suffering from heart complaint for the past six months, arrived at Napier 30 years ago in the sailing ship *Rangitikei*, and has resided in Hastings ever since. She was married to Mr M. Gilhooly about 5 years later. She was of an amiable, charming and unassuming disposition and in a quiet way, rendered assistance and contributions to all charitable objects. She leaves a husband (Mr M. Gilhooly) three sons (Andrew, John and Hugh), and four daughters (Hannah, Mary, Lizzie and Kathleen), all of Hastings to mourn their loss. The funeral took place yesterday afternoon and was largely attended. Many beautiful wreaths, including one from the staff of the Hastings Hotel, adorned the coffin. The Rev. Father Fraher conducted a most impressive service at the graveside. Daughter's – Kathleen and Mrs H. and B. Brooker. Michael Gilhooly of Norton Rd died November 1924 aged 67.

1919 June, James S. Annand of Warren St died at Hastings

1919 June, The annual meeting of the H.B. A. and P. Society held in Napier, new member elected - J. W. McLauchlan of Waimarama, 1922 James Alexander McLachlan a fencer at Pacific Hotel Hastings, 1931 Helena Marie McLachlan and James Alexander McLachlan a labourer at 104 Stortford St Hastings, 1935 Helena Marie McLachlan and James Alexander McLachlan a labourer at 106 Davis St Hastings.

1919 June, Percy Martin died at Hastings aged 67 - Alexander Percy Martin b:1852 married Emma Clifton in 1884, they had 4 children. Percy a trainer was in partnership training horses with his brother-in-law Robert Harrison Gooseman and established the stables Martindale, 1896 Percy Martin had his own stables at Hastings (Gollan's stable) he was proprietor of the Railway Hotel 1903 until it lost its licence and was demolished, then became licensee of the Criterion Hotel.

1919 June, Bridget O'Neill nee Twoomey died a Hastings aged 55 wife of **Cornelius O'Neill**, they married 1889 in Hastings and had one son – 1880 Cornelius William O'Neill was born in Hastings, he married Nora Agnes Keane in 1926. Cornelius O'Neill of Park Rd sth died May 1943 aged 90.

1919 June, Wedding. Choate – Barry. At the Sacred Heart Church, Hastings, the contracting parties being Miss Kathleen Barry, third daughter of Mr and Mrs M. Barry, Jervois St Hastings and Mr Arthur Harold Choate, eldest son of Mr and Mrs J. A. Choate, Wellington. The bride, who was given away by her father and was attended by her sister Miss B. Barry. The bridegroom was supported by Mr Frank Boyle of Waipukurau. The Rev. Father Mahoney celebrated a nuptial mass and subsequently the guests were entertained at the residence of the bride's parents, where the usual toasts were honoured. The happy couple afterwards left by car en route for Wellington.

1919 June, Wedding, Harris – Speers – A wedding of considerable local interest was celebrated on Wednesday at St. Andrew's Church Hastings, when Miss Violet Martha, eldest daughter of Mr and Mrs H. Speers of Longlands was married to Thomas James Harris, eldest son of Mr D. Harris of Waihi. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. P. Ramsay. The bride was given away by her father, and attended by her sisters Misses Edith and Maggie Speers. Mr Percy Joll was the. bestman. A reception was held at the residence of the bride's parents "Rawhti" where afternoon tea was seized and the usual toasts honoured. The bride's cake, which was admired by all, was beautifully decorated and was made by Mr W. Sturrock of Hastings. Mr and Mrs Harris left by car for Auckland where the honeymoon is being spent.

Archibald Joseph Aydon b: July 1883 in Nelson. In 1911 he married Gertrude May Woodward b: December 1887 the daughter of Thomas and Mary Woodward. They had two children. Archibald Joseph Woodward Aydon a motor mechanic of 804 Sylvan Rd died March 1958 in Hastings aged 74 and Gertrude May Aydon nee Woodward died July 1960 in Hastings aged 72.

1919 June, A collision between a motor car and a motor cycle occurred in Karamu Rd Hastings at about noon to-day, the consequences being, fortunately, not of a very serious character. **Mr Robert Beck of the firm of Messrs. and Beck and F. Collinge engineers**, was riding a bicycle on his way to lunch and after passing **Harper's store**, it is said that he was in the act of turning into Wolseley Rd, where he resides, when he was caught sideways by a motor car, travelling in the same direction, driven by **Mr David Lumsden**, farmer of Mangateretere, who was on his way home. Mr Beck was pitched forward on his shoulder, in some loose shingle and he sustained a cut on the side of his head and face, as well as injuring his shoulder and receiving several bruises and shock. He, however, did not lose consciousness and an examination by **Dr. Boxer**, disclosed that the injuries were not of a serious character. Mr Lumsden's car continued on and ran into the kerbing and a telegraph post, about 50 yards further on, the left wheel of the car being smashed and considerable other damage being done to the vehicle by the impact. Mr Beck was conveyed to his home close by.

At the sittings of the Hastings Magistrate's Court yesterday, before Mr R. W. Dyer, S.M., **David Lumsden** was charged with (1), on June 18th, being drunk whilst in charge of a motor car; (2), driving a motor car in Karamu Rd, at a speed dangerous to the public; (3), driving a motor car in Karamu Rd at a greater speed than 12 miles an hour. **Sergeant Hogan** conducted the prosecution and Mr T. B. McNeil appeared for accused and Mr K. J. W. Hallett watched the case on behalf of Mr Beck. **Robert Beck, engineer**, deposed that he was riding his cycle to his lunch on the date in question, on his proper side of Karamu Rd, when he was knocked insensible and was confined to his bed for three months. **J. W. J. C. Monk,** builder, deposed that Lumsden's car was travelling at over 20 miles an hour. It crashed into Mr Beck. There

was ample room for the car to pass Beck's bicycle without a collision. Frank Berry, telegraph linesman, deposed that Lumsden was not sober by any means. He was in the condition that, if there was any excitement, he would lose his head. He was not fit to be in charge of a motor car. The car collided with a telegraph post and shifted it about half an inch in the ground. To Mr McNeil: Would expect to see a man in Lumsden's position a bit shaken, but not dazed. The man who was with the driver went through the wind-screen. John Keyvar, telegraph linesman, also deposed to Lumsden being under the influence of liquor. The man in the car with Lumsden was slightly under the influence. The car was travelling between 30 and 35 miles an hour. J. D. Beaumont, telegraph linesman, gave similar evidence. Mary Beck, wife of Robert Beck, deposed that, three quarters of an hour after the accident, Lumsden called at her house He was then intoxicated. She could smell the drink from him. Constable McGruer deposed that he interviewed accused at 1.30 p.m., after the accident. He was muddled and smelt of dank. Witness would not have allowed him to drive a car, if he wanted to do so. The other man seemed all right. Speaking for the defence Mr McNeil said the accident was one which was liable to occur to anyone. Defendant would not deny that he had come to town and he had three or four small glasses of stout, but was quite sober. Defendant saw a man (Mr Beck) on a bicycle on the road. The man was wobbling on his proper side and he turned to cross the road to the opposite side. As Beck turned, Lumsden shifted his car to give him room, when Beck hesitated and Lumsden swung round. In order to pull up he put his foot down on what he thought was the break, but instead of the brake he pushed the accelerator, with the result that the car bounded out and struck Beck and continuing, hit the telegraph post. It was a perfectly, feasible explanation. After colliding with Beck and running into the telegraph post with such force, he naturally sustained a great shock. It was natural that he was dazed when questioned and acted in the manner of a drunken man. David Lumsden in his evidence said he was dazed for some time after he collided with the post and did not remember what happened for some time after. He did not remember what he said or what was said to him. He remembered constable McGruer asking him questions. The accident was caused by the bicycle turning in front of the car and by the fact that he thought he must have used the accelerator instead of the brake. Alexander W. McDonald, sheepfarmer. Kurnpapar ga, deposed that he and Lumsden had three or four drinks on the morning of the accident, witness taking ginger wine and Lumsden taking glasses of stout. Witness was a teetotaller. In Karamu Rd, Beck turned and Lumsden turned one way and then the other to avoid him. Then he struck Beck and ran into the post. To Mr McNeill - It was not in the least surprising to him that those who were speaking to them afterwards thought they were more or less drunk. They were travelling about 20 miles an hour. Thomas Clarkson, motor importer, deposed he saw defendant on the day in question. He was a trifle agitated but did not impress witness as being intoxicated. He was intelligent and spoke clearly. Archibald J. Aydon also evidence. Mr McNeill pleaded guilty to the charge of exceeding the limit. His Worship reviewed the evidence and said that, although accused was not drunk in such a way as that a policeman would lock him up, yet he was affected by liquor in so far as that he had no right to be in charge of a motor car. For exceeding the speed limit, he would be fined and costs 17 /- for driving at a dangerous speed, he would be fined £3 and costs £3.12/2d and for being drunk whilst in charge of a motor car, he would be fined £3 and costs 7/- Total £15. 16/3. Robert Beck died a few years later after surgery for the injuries.

David Lumsden b: 1865 Aberdeen died June 1928 he had married Marion (May) Marguerite Francesca Bailey Olsen in 1908.

Evan Rackley b: May 1871 in Nelson, in June 1897 he married Ellen Ophelia Harding b: 1867 in England. They had two children – January 1899, Dora Gwendoline Bowsher Rackley and December 1901 Lillian Ann Harding Aroha Rackley, she married Frederick Henry Corbin in December 1939 at Hastings. Evan Rackley of 503 Nelson St was stationmaster at Hastings till 1922. Ellen Ophelia Rackley nee Harding died December 1934 in Dunedin aged 67 and Evan Rackley returned to Hastings to live in Nelson St, he died in June 1956 in Dunedin aged 85.

1919 July, An inquest was held in Hastings, this morning, regarding the death of John Power, a ganger employed by N.Z. Railways, and stationed at Paki Paki, who was killed on the line near Longlands, on Saturday night whilst returning home from Hastings on his trolley. Deceased was about 65 years old. He was a single man and was a native of County Waterford, Ireland. Mr B. Brathwaite presided as deputy-coroner, and the following jury were sworn:-Messrs, L. W. Fowler (foreman) S. O. Stokes, E. W. Watson, H. Henderson, C. S. Dnnningham and Arthur Boom. Sqt. J. Hogan conducted the proceedings for the Crown. Mr E. Rackley, stationmaster, Hastings, was present representing the Railway Department. Dictan F. Honayne, labourer, N.Z. Government Railways, residing at Paki Paki, deposed he had known deceased for about four weeks. Deceased and witness came into Hastings last Saturday night, on deceased's railway "jigger" Left Paki Paki about 4 p.m. and arrived in Hastings about 5. They left the jigger at the Heretaunga St Railway Crossing, beside the track. Witness and deceased went into the Albert Hotel, where witness left him after being with him about five minutes. Witness had a soft drink and deceased had a shandy gaff and that was all the drink he saw deceased have. Next time he saw deceased he was dead in the morgue. As far as witness knew, deceased was a very temperate man. Bernard S. Story, medical practitioner, deposed that he examined the body and found severe injuries to the body, chiefly to the head and right thigh. The skull was badly fractured, the bone being driven right into the brain, which was all mashed up and flattened from the front backwards. The scalp was all torn and death must have been instantaneous, because the injuries were frightful. The injuries were consistent with deceased being ran into by an engine. There was no appearance of liquor on deceased. John Joseph Clarke, engine driver, N.Z. Railways, stationed at Napier, deposed that he was the driver of the train from Palmerston North to Napier, on Saturday evening last, arriving in Hastings at 9.15 o'clock. She was due at 8.38. After leaving Paki Paki station, witness blew his whistle at the public railway crossing and was keeping a vigilant look out. Nearing the Longlands station, at the bend, he blew an extra long whistle, to draw the attention of the guard for his signal as to whether he was to stop. Just then he felt a grating of the shingle off the track, like as if he had run over a small animal. The train went on and he saw nothing of the jigger or of anything. The engine would be about 60 or 70 tons and the train was about 260 tons. He had a good headlight and it was a moonlight night. He should have seen a Jigger about 50 yards ahead, but he did not see it and neither did his fireman. On arrival in Hastings he made an examination off the engine, which was customary and he found the body of deceased on the running board, with the legs hanging over the cowcatcher, with a sack between them. He informed the police and the body was removed to the side of the track. When he felt the grinding noise, the train was

travelling at about 25 or 30 miles an hour. He could not say why he did not see, the trolly, unless it came into collision during the few moments he was looking round to get the signal from the guard. To the foreman: There was no other point on the line, between Hastings and Paki Paki, where he could not get a good view. To a Juror: Witness was not quite sure if he had rounded the bend when the collision occurred, but thought it was just round the bend. Even if he had seen the trolly, he could not have pulled up. The light on the engine was a stationary lamp. Some engines had pivot lamps which swung the light on the centre of the track, after rounding curves. William J. Gebbie, livery stable proprietor, Hastings, deposed that he had known deceased for five or six years. Saw deceased at his stables between 7.30 and 8.30 p.m. on Saturday last. Deceased had a drink or two, but he was not drunk and was quite capable of looking after himself. Witness left about 8.30 p.m., saying he was going to get his "jigger" and go home. He never saw deceased the worse for liquor. Constable W. J. Connor sworn, said that on Saturday night he was on duty at the Railway Station when the Palmerston train came in. He was told by a railway official that something was wrong on St. Aubyn St crossing. Saw a man lying on the front of the engine, with a sack across him. Went afterwards to the scene of the accident, with two railway employees. At the other side of Longlands, about three miles from Hastings. Found the "jigger" lying on the left side of the railway line from Hastings. The "jigger" was smashed, but not, badly and he roughly calculated that it had been carried about 30 yards from the accident to where it was thrown. The sack contained food and tobacco, but no liquor and there was no sign of bottles at the scene of the accident. To the Foreman: From where they found the trolly they could see the light of an approaching trolly five minutes before it reached them. A verdict of accidental death was returned.

1919 July, The social and **dance** to be held in **Master's Hop Kiln** on Friday evening is for the purpose of raising sufficient funds to purchase suitable flags for peace celebrations. The committee hope to see a good attendance.

1919 July, The A very large and enthusiastic **meeting** of householders attended the **Hop Kiln** on Monday evening, to elect a committee for the school, to be erected at Parkvale.

1919 July, Arthur Ellery Curtis b: June 1893 in Hastings the son of Elizabeth and John Curtis married Ethel May Peters. They had two sons - May 1920, Ivor Ellery Curtis and February 1923 Neville William Curtis, Arthur Ellery Curtis died August 1952 in Hastings aged 59.

1919 July, George Fearn b: 1836 in Cromford Derbyshire the son of Ellen and Lawrence Fearn died at Hastings aged 83 and Sarah Fearn nee Drabble died at Hastings October 1929 aged 90.

1919 July, Death, Fannin - At the Napier Hospital, Charles, beloved husband of Amelia Fannin aged 32 years. The funeral will leave the residence of Mr. W. Burtenshaw, 208 Avenue Rd east, Hastings. Charles George Fannin was born Hastings 1887, the eldest son of Annie Sarah and George William Fannin. Amelia Eliza Fannin nee Burtenshaw died October 1966 in Hastings aged 79.

War Memorial -

At the Hastings Borough Council meeting Cr Styles moved that the council take steps to erect a monument to the memory of **both European and Maori soldiers who fell during the war.** The monument to be a combined one.

1919 July, **2500 Maori soldiers who left New Zealand everyone was a volunteer**. They knew that the King required more men and they gladly went to do their bit. Of our platoon of 100 who participated in the Gallipoli campaign, 56 made the supreme sacrifice. Of the seven million British soldiers, 2500 were Maori, but though insignificant they carried out their duties with credit. To those who had lost relatives in the war, he wished to extend a message of sympathy and comfort. 'The Maori custom in the case of death was to always place a wreath or porri-porri on the head. This little wreath was without an end, which indicates that there is no end in this life, the leaves were bitter, signifying the bitterness of death, and were evergreen, which meant that though parted they were ever with us. As the sun rose in the east and sunk in the west, so our boys, who had gone West would rise again in the East. Speaking to the children, he said there may be future Mayors and Sir Andrew Russell's amongst them, and he asked them to always give sympathy and a helping hand to the Maori race in New Zealand. Mr. N. Beamish proposed: "That, as the names of Maori soldiers will be honoured in the same way as Europeans, the Mayor be requested to interview Rev. F. A. Bennett seconded Mr. E. H. Williams. pro forma, and carried.

1919 July, Hastings Fire - A fire broke out at 2.30 o'clock this morning in a wash-house adjoining the residence, owned by Mr McGaffin of Mangatahi and occupied by Mr E. Love on the corner of Avenue Rd and Sylvan Rd Hastings. The fire alarm was sounded and the Hastings Fire Brigade were promptly on the scene and, by their efforts, succeeded in saving the house, which was threatened. The rain was falling in torrents and that also helped in confining the blaze to its place of origin. A youth was working in the shed up to about 10.30, but he says that he had no fire there and the cause of the outbreak is unknown. The damage is estimated at about £25.

1919 August, Arthur Edward Jones was born at Nurse Smiths Home Hastings the son of Grace and Albert Arthur Jones. **Albert Arthur Jones** b: April 1880 in Dunedin the son of Elizabeth and Edward James Jones, in April 1919 he married Grace Watson Riddell b: July 1884 in Glasgow, Lanarkshire the daughter of Elizabeth and John Riddell. They had two

sons - 1922 William John Riddell Jones at Hastings he died as a child in September 1925. Arthur Edward Jones was educated at Mahora School Hastings aged 11 in February 1931 Quake. Albert Arthur Jones a labourer of 704 Albert St Hastings. Albert Arthur Jones died March 1951 in Hastings aged 70 and Grace Watson Jones nee Riddell died October 1962 in Hastings aged 78.

Edward James Jones b: 1849 in NSW Aus the son of Mrs and George Jones. In 1875 he married Elizabeth Brown b: 1859 in Australia. They had six children - April 1880 Albert Arthur Jones in Dunedin he married Grace Watson Riddell in April 1919, December 1882 Minnie Jones she married Phillip Charles Bourgeois in 1912, February 1884 William Edward Jones, May 1887 Alfred Reuben Jones he married Ella Margaret Goldfinch in 1925, November 1889 Ernest Cecil Jones he died February 1931 in Hastings aged 41. The family moved up to Hastings. Edward James Jones snr died June 1916 in Hastings aged 67 and Elizabeth Jones nee Brown died January 1943 in Hastings aged 84.

1919 August, William O'Donoghue died at Hastings aged 62, buried with Michael O'Donoghue

1919 August, The late William O'Donoghue aged 62 who was killed by a fall from his horse near Porangahati last Tuesday was well known in Hastings many years ago. He arrived in this town thirty eight years ago and worked for the late Sir Wm. Russell in Flaxmere for several years. He was a brother of Mr Edward O'Donoghue of Hastings.

Mr Holden fractured both his legs, besides breaking some of his ribs. A Mr Matthews, who was also in the car appears to have escaped with a shaking. The car suffered considerably in the smash, wind-screen, driving wheel, and body being badly knocked about. Mr Holden's condition is such as to cause his relatives grave anxiety when gangrene set in. The advisableness of performing an operation for the removal of the patient's legs was considered, but after consultation it was decided that Mr Holden's condition was so low that it was impossible for the system to withstand the shock. John Holden jnr died at Waipawa in October 27th as the result of an accident, John Holden jnr beloved only son of Mr John Holden snr of Tikokino, aged 39, burial at Omahu. He enlisted for service with the Maori contingent and had not long returned from active service when he met his death. Daughter - Dorothy Violet Holden Elbourne b: November 1913 and Emily Holden nee Elbourne died March 1943 aged 69.

1919 October, Deaths – Martin - At the Napier Hospital. **Fraser Martin** aged 69 years. The former Hastings fire station keeper. The funeral will leave the Hastings Fire Brigade Station for the Hastings cemetery.

1919 October, Death, Epps - At Hastings, John Baker, dearly beloved husband of Mary Ellen Epps, in his 61st year. The funeral will leave his late residence, 807 Hastings St, Hastings for the Hastings cemetery.

1919 October, Deaths – Horne - At his residence Jervois St, Hastings, William Horne, the beloved husband of Susan Horne; aged 72 years. Grandchildren – Mona, Tony and Fay.

William Horne a labourer b: 1846 the son of Thomas and Eliza Horne, in 1873 he married Susan Ann Barclay Lozell b: April 1858 the daughter of Samuel and Mary Lozell. They had six children. They resided in Warren St in 1911, Susan Ann Barclay Horne nee Lozell died February 1943 in Hastings aged 84.

Deceased lady, who was generally esteemed, landed in the Dominion in 1866. Much sympathy is felt for the widower of Joseph McCoy, who is also one of Hastings oldest personalities, in his bereavement. Sadie Louisa Carroll poss b: 1832 the daughter of Joseph Carroll?

1919 October, An old resident of Hastings died on Friday last, in the person of Mr **James Campbell**, at the age of 71. Deceased, who came to New Zealand 40 years ago, went back Home, but he returned to the Dominion about 20 years since, setting up as a farmer in Mangateretere and with the exception of some four years at Palmerston North, he resided in the district ever since. He was **married three times**, leaving families of nine daughters and three sons - three daughters and two sons by his first, one son by his second, and six girls, two of whom are by his last marriage. The remains were laid to rest in the Hastings cemetery when a large number of friends followed in the procession to the graveside, where Rev. J. B. Brocklehurst conducted the last rites. In April 1923, Matilda (Tilie) daughter of the late James Campbell of Hastings died aged 25. The funeral left the residence of her aunt Mrs A. Dysart.

1919 October, HB Bee Keepers Association - About 60 beekeepers, both ladies and gentlemen, gathered at Mr Shepherd's Apiary in Riverslea Rd Hastings to witness the demonstration conducted by Mr F. A. Jacobsen, the Government Instructor. Mr Jacobsen who before opening the hive spoke of the object of looking through the colonies, and described the tools necessary and explained their use. Upon uncovering, he showed how a good hive should look, with the bees clustering on the combs and then went through the box frame by frame. The queen was found and larvae in different stages pointed out. Onlookers asked questions about the handling of bees and received very satisfactory answers. Later a hive was examined for foul brood, and the treatment of the disease was fully described and discussed. Mr Jacobsen, after the practical handling of bees, discussed further questions asked by the beekeepers. Those interested in frame making were shewn the way this was done, as well as the wiring, the putting in of foundation and embedding. Afternoon tea served by the hostess was an incentive to further informal discussion. Votes of thanks were carried in favour of Mr Jacobsen and of Mrs Shepherd and her willing band of helpers. At the Old Library Hastings Mr F. A. Jacobsen, Government Apiary Instructor and Honey Grader, delivered a lecture on 'Bees' Position in the Animai Kingdom and the Commercial Value of Bees," under the auspices of the Hawke's Bay Beekeepers' Association. Mr Arch Lowe president, occupied the chair and there was an attendance of twenty persons, including some ladies. The lecturer, in a most interesting address, dwelt on the various species of bees and their subdivisions. The ideal bee of the future must have untiring industry, great energy and unlimited endurance, and, by careful selection and breeding, it should evolve into a species which, while possessing a sting, would not use it to inflict injury. The ApisYullifica, known as the English bee and almost black, have been domesticated for many years because they kept the comb white and attractive for table use. The Italian bees were however fast taking their place, owing to their untiring industry and their faculty for resisting disease. East Indian bees were twice as large as either of the two mentioned and should be useful as wax producers and for pollenizing flowers, whose nectaries were too deep for the ordinary bees. He had suggested the introduction of these bees for the qualities mentioned although they were not, great honey producers. He spoke of the history of bees and the study of their habits by naturalists and pointed out that bees were not "royalists" and that the term "queen" was misleading. In her maiden days she was unnoticed by the working bees, but when she undertook the exhausting duties of maternity, they were most soheitoua and saw to her every want. But these attentions were not

those of courtiers to royalty, but were duties carried out for purely economic reasons. A "queen" provided that her colony was strong, produced from 2000 to 3000 eggs a day. Bees were not even "Republicans" as the "queen" was not chosen by the citizens. "Mother Bee" was a far more expressive term than queen as she was destined for the duties of "Mother Bee" from the laying of the egg. At the conclusion of his address. Mr Jacobsen answered many questions. He said one thing was essential - that was the must be upmost careful not to introduce further diseases into the Dominion. For instance, the "Isle of Wight Disease had spread to Australia where it was called the "Disappearing Disease." because the winter and early spring the bees were attacked and in a week's time, whole colonies' disappeared. The disease went away in warm weather. He had been drafting regulations to safeguard the importation of bees, which he hoped to see adopted. A vote of thanks to the speaker concluded the meeting.

His Honour, before passing sentence, said that the prisoner had attempted a barefaced perjury to save himself. He would be sentenced to two years' imprisonment with hard labour.

1919 November, Death, Arvedsen - An old resident of Hawke's Bay passed away at his residence Grove Rd Hastings. Mr **Carl Hans Heinrich Arvedsen** aged 75 years. Deceased, who was a native of Holstein Germany, settled in Hawke's Bay some 35 years ago, working for many years in the bush country. He came to Hastings about 25 years ago and practically resided here ever since. **Arvedsen St** was called after the family. He leaves a widow and a grown up family to mourn his decease. Kathleen (Katrine) Arvedsen of 803 Ellison Rd died August 1925 aged 77.

1919 November, Andrew Bruce Sharp was born in Hastings, the son of Edith and James Sharp. He had one child with Margaret Mary Taylor.

Knight: Bros.' offer are complied with.

1919 November, The funeral of Mr A. F. Parkinson took place this afternoon when a large gathering, including many representative citizens, followed in the melancholy procession to the graveside where the burial service, according to the Anglican rites, was conducted by Rev. J. B. Brocklehurst prior to the body being laid to rest. 1919 December, George William Driller was born in Hastings the son of May and William Driller. He had one son and three daughters with Annie Lindsay Moore b: 1917 in Northern Ireland, the daughter of Jane and Thomas Moore b: Northern Ireland and died in Hastings. He had two sons and three daughters with Jane Lindsey.

1919 December, Wedding, Sullivan – Barry - At the Sacred Heart Church Hastings, when Rev. Father Mahoney united in matrimony Miss Dolly Barry, fifth daughter of Mr and Mrs N. Barry of Hastings, to Mr John Sullivan, fourth son of Mr and Mrs N. Sullivan also of Hastings. The bride, who was given away by her father and attended by her sister Miss B. Barry. The bouquets were gifts from Mrs and Dr. Barcroft. Mr J. Sullivan brother of the bridegroom carried out the duties of best man. At the conclusion of the ceremony, the guests were entertained at the residence of the bride's parents, where the usual toasts were duly honoured.

1919, Alexander Runciman Tait b: March 1897 in Hastings the son of Mary Ellen and Thomas Tait, he was a shepherd at Twyford for Nichol and Co of Eskdale married Winifred Margaret Hickey b: July 1895 the daughter of Margaret and Cornelius Hickey. They had five children - October 1921 Janet Margaret Sangster Tait in Hastings she had two children with Albert Ivan Charles Duff. The family left the district. Winifred Margaret Tait nee Hickey died June 1973 in Hastings aged 77 and Alexander Runciman Tait died January 1976 aged 78.

The new Parkvale School -

Mr **Fred Howard** a widow had gifted in 1913 from his Parkvale property 1 acre from his Parkvale estate property for a Parkvale School to be built, the HBEB purchased additional land at a later sale. Section 33 Selwood Rd was made access for Howard St entrance. Mr and his new wife visited Hastings many times between 1924 and 1929.

1920 February, The new Parkvale School of 4 class rooms was opened with 204 pupils, Mr F. A. Garry headmaster.



1920 February, PARKVALE SCHOOL. This school is the outcome of an agitation organized to relieve the over - crowding of the Main school of Hastings and it is hoped that the roll on the first day will be a long one. The appointment of Mr F. A. Garry as headmaster is a popular one among the parents. Though a young man, Mr Garry has had experience of teaching in both primary and secondary schools in the town and country, and a man with the high educational ideals that he is possessed of cannot fail to impress his pupils, both intellectually and spiritually. Parkvale, or Hastings East, the name by which an unromantic and practical Education Board has decreed the school is to be henceforth known, will open its doors. Few schools in the Dominion have begun their careers under more auspicious circumstances. The building, which stands in a large five-acre playground, part of which is fenced for a horse paddock, is able to accommodate two hundred and fifty pupils. The four class rooms are large, lofty and airy, and equipped with the latest methods of ventilation. Though outside the borough boundary, the Hastings Council has connected the school, with its lighting and drainage system, and electricity will be available for heating the school in the winter. Concreted shelter sheds have been built for both boys and girls. A number of drinking taps, apart from the washing conveniences, are supplied. The lavatory arrangements are in every detail sanitary and in line with the latest hygienic methods.


The staff will, of course, depend on the attendance, but at present the teachers will consist of the headmaster and two lady assistants, of whom **Miss E. Sinclair** has been appointed to the charge of the infant department. The appointment of the other teacher has not yet been made. There is no doubt that pupils starting or continuing their schooling at this school will work under the most modern conditions, both physically and mentally, and parents can send their children with confidence and feel assured that they will have the best opportunities.

Francis Albert Garry b; May 1880 in Napier the son of Helen and William Garry. In January 1906 he married Elizabeth Margaret Scheele b: July 1876 in Napier the daughter of Ursula and Arie Scheele. They had two children - March 1907 Josina Muriel Garry she married Norman Charles Jenkin in October 1937 and January 1912 Francis Keith Garry. Elizabeth Margaret Garry nee Scheele died May 1963 in Auckland aged 86 and Francis Albert Garry died September 1965 aged 85. He was related to Mrs Rosa May Bone wife of Charles Sydney Bone of Hastings.

In March 1920, A public meeting of parents and relatives of Hastings east district will be held in the Parkvale School to discuss details in connection with opening a 'school shop' and to raise funds for asphalting part of the playground. PS - Mrs Betty Bell ran the shop opposite the school gate in the 1960's.

In March 1920, A plan of, the proposed beautifying and asphalting of the Parkvale School grounds is now on view at the school, and is the design of Mr F. A. Garry headmaster. The area of the playground is about 1½ acres, and the intention is to plant shrubs and flowers and lay down lawns in portions and asphalt the playing areas and pathways. At the entrance to the grounds from Howard St there will be a lawn on each side, bordered with shrubs and flowers. In the left hand corner is the garden and orchard reserve and all round the school will be asphalted and gardens laid out. When completed, the improvements will, while considerably adding to the attractiveness of the school, at the same, time serve as a splendid example of the progressive spirit of the residents of the Parkvale district.

1920, a request for an additional ¼ acre land purchase to give the school access from the Main Road – this was possibly the original Hop Garden entrance from the Havelock Rd opposite Norton Rd, fencing the school grounds boundary and the front entrance gateway on Howard St



The official opening ceremony was carried out in April 1920 by Hon Sir C. James Parr Minister of Education, with Hastings Mayor George Ebbett, H. M. Campbell MP, G. F. Roach, W. Dunn, T. Miller, Gilbert McKay, G. Venables and A. W. Hamilton, Inspectors Bird, Strachen and Wheeler. The School Committee had raised £300 for grounds improvement


In April 1920, Hastings District High School. - The school thus being very much over-crowded, the Education Board was approached and after a deal of trouble, the **King's Theatre** and **Masters Hop Kiln Hall** were hired in which to accommodate the sixth standard and the junior scholars in the Parkvale district. These buildings have since **been given up**, as the Parkvale (Hastings east) school has been opened, and the curtailment of the school boundaries in other directions has had the effect of still further reducing our roll, with the pleasing result that we now have ample.

Headmaster Mr F. A. Garry was replaced by Mr A. E. Day in 1924 and Mr W. B. Roe in 1933.

In May 1920, At St. Andrew's Church by Rev P. Ramsey, Thomas Ferguson son of John Ferguson Perth Scot to Jessie Sutherland daughter of David Sutherland, Ross Scot.

In August 1922, Parkvale footpath - The tender of H. W. Abbott at £5 12s 6d per chain has been accepted for concreting the footpath on the east side of Selwood Rd Hastings a distance of 30 chains 4½ft wide and this work together with three chains in Louie St full width will be paid for out of the grant from the electrical account.

In August 1922, Arbour Day – For the past three years extensive planting of trees in the school grounds a total of one hundred trees and shrubs.

In June 1923, Parkvale School - The headmaster Mr Garry reported a slight increase in the number of scholars attending the school since his last report. Miss Sollitt was leaving shortly to take up a higher position at Havelock North. It was decided to purchase a football for the senior boys and a basket ball for the senior girls. a subcommittee was set up to obtain information with reference to the acquisition of a heater and an urn and other requisites to supply hot cocoa to the children lunching at the school. It was observed that in the Auckland public schools where the practice of supplying hot cocoa has been adopted the cocoa and sugar were donated by business firms in the city. It is hoped that some of the local business men will emulate their northern confreres commendable action in this respect. Progress towards the holding of a very successful shop in Hannah's Trocadero shop in Karamu Rd were received and further details considered and discussed.

In June 1923, A shop in aid of the funds of the Parkvale School will be held next to the premises in Karamu Rd (near the Bank of Australasia) lately vacated by Hannah's Trocadero when meat (including poultry) fruit, cakes, jams, flowers, sweets, vegetables, clothing etc will be obtainable at prices that will please even the most economical housekeeper. There will also be innumerable guessing competitions a bran tub and many more.

In June 1923 The shop held by the Parkvale School Committee was very successful resulting in the sum of 80 being added to the funds for improvement to the grounds etc. The committee desire to thank all who in any way contributed towards the success of the shop by personal effort or donation in cash or kind. The above sum carries with it a subsidy from the Government, the following were the winners of the various prizes for the different competitions held during the day - camera Margaret Sutherland, doll Eunice Reid, dolls bath Catherine Pickering, muffler Mr Wyatt, cake Miss Grey, cake Lindsay Lloyd, boudoir cap Miss G. Simpson, weight of pumpkin A. Giorgi.

In March 1924, The over 300 children of the Parkvale School to hold their picnic at Beatson's Park playing games, running races and swimming in the new pool which measures 45ft by 25ft with a depth from 4ft to 6 ft, but when pupils learning to swim, the depth is two to three feet, by arrangement of pipes the depth can be regulated, the sides are reinforced concrete. The water always fresh being a continuous flow from an artesian well. It is intended to construct a concrete platform and sloping grass bank round the pool. The excavation work was done by volunteer members of the Parkvale Progressive Society, whilst the building of the baths was done by tender. The total cost including the sheds will be about £200 of which the society have about £60 raised by the society and £40 subsidy from the Hastings Borough Council in hand leaving a balance of £100 still to be procured.

In March 1924, The Parkvale School was filled with the pupils of the school their parents and guardians as well as by the residents of the district to farewell Mr and Mrs F. A. Garry on the eve of their departure for Auckland where he has been appointed in charge of Mount Roskill School. The gathering took the form of an entertainment followed by a dance. Mr S. Vyner chairman of the school committee read letters of apology from Mr Gilbert McKay MP, Rev T. Keith Ewen and Rev A, McBean. The Parkvale Progressive Society. **Mr Garry took over the school in a hare paddock** and four years later there was not perhaps a school in NZ with better laid-out grounds. Little Nola Marshall presented a bouquet to Mrs Garry. Mr Stevenson. Mr R. Paynter. Mr W. T. Chaplin headmaster of Mahora School.

In January 1925, Fred Howard who was prominent in Hastings business circles for many years and who is now a resident of Auckland, left for Christchurch after a short visit to Hastings.

In February 1925, Mr H. L. Wimsett, first assistant at Parkvale School for two years has been appointed headmaster at Balcairn School North Canterbury.

In August 1926, Miss Vera Flamank who a short while ago was on the teaching staff of the Hastings Parkvale School was married at Timaru.

In November 1934 The late Mr Vivan B. Baton beloved husband of Florence Barton at the Hamilton Hospital. He was recently a member of the teaching staff of the Parkvale School Hastings. The **headmaster Mr W. B. Roe** assembled the children and the flag was hoisted to half mast as a mark of sympathy from the school


1938, Miss Lucy Wyatt left the staff of the Parkvale School to get married. The headmaster was W. B. Rae

In June1946, Post WW2 - Concern was raised that the new Windsor Park Municipal Transit Camp will further tax Parkvale School accommodation. The urgent need of an additional classroom headmaster Mr W. B. Roe stated there was a steady increase in the enrolment of infants. At present 116 infant pupils were accommodated in two normal sized classrooms and a small detached shelter which was most unsatisfactory in bad weather. By the end of this year it was expected that the Municipal Transit camp would mean additional enrolments to the school next year. Appreciation of past committee members was recorded Messrs V. C. Petersen, G. Black, N. H. Wilson and H. W. Toothill being mentioned.



1920 June, William Henry Walker's Nurseries - The generous flat lands of this district and the beautiful climate of Hawke's Bay combine to make Hastings the centre of a teeming country, such is especially suitable to the establishment of nurseries for the propagation of fruit and shelter trees, shrubs and flowers throughout the Dominion and overseas. In this regard Mr W. H. Walker a nurseryman of over 30 years' experience, who has been in charge of the propagation department in T. Horton's Ltd. Well-known nurseries for the past five years, is to be congratulated on launching into business on his own account and starting operations in a compact nursery of three acres, situate in Omahu Rd, just beyond Frimley. A reporter visited the property and, although this is probably the worst time of the year to put a nursery on show, the owner conducted the pressman over the premises, including six spacious glass houses, Amongst the shelter trees which Mr Walker has in preparation for the present season are no less than 40,000 eucalyptus gums, which are in wide demand and for which he has extensive orders. Tomatoes also claim close attention and last year, he had early tomatoes from his hot houses on the market as early as November, whilst, he forces that palatable tuber, the kumara, in hotbeds to supply the public, requirements in this regard. In No. 1 glass house was a fine show of bedding plants, including 500 cactus and in the adjoining house were early tomatoes and a fine lot of bulbs for floral work, whilst a third structure was taken up with hardy annuals, such as aquilegia,. delphinium etc, In the fourth glass house were over a thousand beautiful cyclamen. The propagating house held daphne and lemons, as well as spring flowers and in this department the management is forcing blooms for winter. Mr Walker informed the visitor that he had been importing a number of novelties in begonias, to cross with our, own New Zealand varieties, for the purpose of improving the strain, with excellent results. In the potting shed the seeds are sown and potted, then sent to the greenhouse, after which they are pricked out into boxes, being subsequently hardened off in frames for the market. The orangery, with its heavy laden trees, is a most promising department and although the fruit will not be fully ready until July, such is the demand that the management have had to pick off the ripest products to supply an order for marmalade making. The lemons are still green but the harvest appears to be abundant. The nursery also grows the variegated Lisbon lemon a handsome fruit bearing shrub, in much popular favour. The processes of the nursery further embraces floral work, the management having constant orders for bouquets, wreaths and for decorations. Violets were in much evidence and in reply to a question, Mr Walker said violets are in great request and I cannot raise enough to supply the local demand. Reference to the nursery would be incomplete without a word about the fernery which contains a really fine display of maiden hairs and asparagus, as well as palms (Kentias) and about a thousand begonias which were, it was explained, "resting" Mr Walker, who is an enthusiast in his profession, has a thorough knowledge of his work, having passed examinations for the certificates of the Royal Horticultural Society and of the Surrey County Council (Horticultural Division) both of which

are very searching tests, besides which he has had three years' experience with Messrs J. Veitch and Son, the Royal Exotic Nursery, Chelsea, all of which must assure patrons that orders placed by them with him will receive careful and expert attention.

1920 April, The Horticultural Society's Autumn Show was held in the Town Hall on Saturday, and was an unqualified success. The fruit display was particularly (rood, as was also that of the vegetables. Messrs Peters, Barr and H. M. Thompson donated their exhibits to the Society for sale, and Mr T. Horton present the whole his exhibit or apples, which realised up to 3d each. All the local exhibitors also donated their produce, the sale of the whole resulting in a gain of over £5 to the .Society's funds. Mr J. D. Conlin donated his first prize field marrow, which was made the medium of a guessing competition, under the supervision of Miss R. Nolan. The sum of 22/6 was realised. The correct weight was 48lbs, which was guessed by Mrs Malenoir and Mr Spargo, Mr Wilson being second with 47¾. Messrs T. Horton and W. H. Walker of Hastings, each made a fine display. Mr Horton's fine exhibition of apples was greatly admired, while Mr Walker's display of ferns, pot Plants etc including an assortment of all the leading varieties of gums (of which he carries a stock of over 40,000 plants at his nursery, Omahu Rd) was one that could not be excelled. The judges were as follows: J Irun and vegetables, Mr. T. Horton; pot plants and flowers, Mr W. H Walker; cooking and home industries, Miss Dillon; needlework, Mrs J. Tod; Children's classes, Mr Smith, of Waipawa. Miss L. Clark won the Decorators' Challenge Cup for the second time.

The bride, whose uncle is widely known in Hastings and district, has lived here for several years and is very popular, whilst her husband and his family are also highly esteemed.

1920 March, Obituary - Hugh Campbell, a pioneer settler, died this morning at Breadalbane Havelock North aged 67. He was born in 1853, in Scotland and arrived in N. Z. twenty years later. He was employed near Timaru and later removed to Hawke's Bay, where he became a landowner and took in active part in local affairs. The news of the death of Mr Hugh Campbell of Havelock North this morning came as a shock even to some of his most intimate friends. For a few weeks he has been under medical treatment, but no one anticipated it was the coming of the end and has thus reached the age of 67—three years from the allotted span, but he was of that type that years cannot measure. It was characteristic of the man that whatever he put his hand to he did thoroughly. In dress, habits and life all round he was simple and unostentatious to a degree, but he was never one of a mere crowd, there was that in the man which made him stand out. His character, knowledge, judgment and probity compelled men to take him into account. He was a man who always had to be taken seriously. He was thoroughly Scottish in his cast of mind and habits of life, "pawky" as the word goes, but with a large sense of humour. He was, hard hit in the war when his two sons; Clarence and Norman were killed and the writer of this article remembers the day when in a side street the sorrow and loss were discussed, and how tears rained down this rugged man's cheeks. It only happened once, then he stood his full height again braced himself to his work and did it; but his soul was furrowed from that time on, and only those who knew him below the surface realised it, but he never wore his heart oil his coat sleeve. As a valuer of land and stock he had perhaps no superior and was frequently pressed into the service of the Government. During the last few years he was the moving spirit in developing certain portions of the difficult and apparently hopeless back country of the Waikato and here again his hard work and sound judgment won a remarkable success. This notice cannot be concluded without a generous reference to the splendid and unstinted service he gave to the founding and development of lona College. When the idea was suggested he seemed by an instinct to see all the latent possibilities in such a college and at once donated eight acres of an ideal site, Mr Mason Chambers generously supplementing the gift by a further four acres. Later on Mr Campbell added about seven more acres for the purposes of playing fields. He became treasurer to the institution and toiled night and day to make it a success and he had the unspeakable joy of seeing it grow and enlarge its boarders beyond the dreams of its committee and staff. From the school's inception its success became a passion with him. He personally superintended the laying out of the beautiful grounds, and in many other ways gave himself to the work, so much so, that the soul of the man seemed to be woven into the very fabric. He was a loyal and devoted attendant at the Havelock Presbyterian Church and along with all his family was rarely absent from the morning service. He leaves behind a widow, five sons and two daughters. New Zealand and Hawke s Bay in particular has lost a great asset in this man, but his works will follow him. He practically died in harness and he has achieved a good day's work. To Mrs Campbell and his surviving children we tender our fullest sympathy and respect. Hugh Campbell was worth knowing, worth having as a friend. His passing makes a big gap at a time when New Zealand needs such men. The interment will take place tomorrow leaving Breadalbane at 2.30, p.m. for the Havelock cemetery.

1920 March, The annual meeting of the Hastings Band was held in the Band Room on Monday night, Mr Ferbrache in the chair. The report stated that the band had had a very successful year and in the near future hoped to be up to contest form. The band had been fortunate in securing the services of Mr C. F. Ferbrache as their conductor, so with the energy of the members the public of Hastings will again have the pleasure of listening to a first-class band. The following officers were elected: Patron, Mr A. J. Ellingham; president, Mr H. H. Campbell, M.P.; vice presidents, the Mayor (Mr G. Ebbett), Messrs Don, F. L. Bone, P. W. Tombs, W. Hart, E. Odium, J. D. Rivers, W. W. Nelson, J. Hargreaves, and Cato; trustees, Messrs. M. Johnson, G. F. Roach, and W. Hart; secretary, Mr W. Bennison; treasurer, Mr L. Mosen; conductor, Mr C. F. Ferbrache; bandmaster, Mr H. McKennie; sergeant, Mr W. McKennie; corporal, Mr R. Orchard; lance-corporal, Mr A. Wiggins; committee, Messrs, L. Field, W. Dow, and T. Aldridge. In August 1920 Mr M. Johnson (one of the trustees) presided at a meeting of the Hastings Band held when the resignation of the conductor (Mr C. F. Ferbrache) was accepted with regret. It was decided to call applications for the position which must be in the hands of the secretary by next Wednesday. Mr H. McKennie bandmaster, will assume the duties of conductor, pending the appointment of Mr Ferbrache's successor.

Clifford Thomas Ferbrache b: March 1896 in Castel Guernsey the son of Selina Jane and Thomas John Ferbrache, In May 1921 at St. Mathew's Church Hastings by Rev R. T. Hall he married Alice Dymoc b: July 1893 in Stockport Cheshire, the daughter of Fanny and John Dymoc. In March 1920 Mr C. F. Ferbrache conductor of the Hastings Band. In 1949, Alice and Clifford Thomas Ferbrache a musician cnr Guthrie and Lower Te Mata Rd along with Marjorie Dymoc Ferbrache a spinster. Clifford Thomas Ferbrache died November 1963 in Havelock North aged 67 and Alice Ferbrache nee Dymoc died in 1981 in Tauranga aged 88.

Thomas John Ferbrache b: December 1871 in Guernsey in 1895 he married Selina Jane Chutter b: December 1873 in Guernsey. They had one son - March 1896 Clifford Thomas Ferbrache. Thomas and Selina visited their son and resided in Hastings in1920 - In August 1920 Mr Percy Tombs away on a visit to his brother in Hamilton for two weeks. Mr T. J. Ferbrache is acting organist and choirmaster during his absence at St. Matthew's Church. In March 1922 T. J. Ferbrache, proprietor of the Kosy tea rooms on Heretaunga St, in March 1924 Mrs Rowell of Wellington assume control. In April 1923 T. J. Ferbrache organist and choirmaster at St. Matthew's Church was replaced by Mr Cecil B. Spinney. They returned to Guernsey. Thomas John Ferbrache died March 1941 in St. Sampson Guernsey aged 69 and Selina Jane Chutter died January 1937 in St. Peter, Port Guernsey aged 63.

1920 March, The body found in the Manawatu river, on Friday afternoon last, between Woodville and Ashhurst, was identified as that of Mr **Adam Mundell of Caroline Rd Hastings**, who left Hastings about three weeks ago for Woodville, where relatives of his reside and as he took his belongings with him, it was thought he was going to stay there for some time. He was last recognised at Woodville on March 3rd and was not seen afterwards until his dead body was found floating on the river. Deceased, who was 65 years of age, was a native of Derry, Ireland, and he came to new Zealand some 10 years ago, establishing himself in Canterbury, where he remained for five years. Leaving there, he came to Hawke s Bay, taking up his residence in Hastings, where he lived for the past 35 years. He was always

connected with stock and he was well known throughout Hawke's Bay as a horse-breaker and trainer. He leaves a widow and a grown up family of two daughters to mourn their loss. The funeral took place at Ashhurst last Sunday. His daughter Mrs Mary Turcich nee Mundell died at the Napier Hospital in June 1917 aged 29 wife of John William Turcich of Hastings.

While in conversation witness got the revolver (produced) from accused to see if he could get any bullets to fit it at his shop. Accused said it had been given to him by a soldier who went to the war, to keep for him until he came. The soldier had stopped a bullet. Witness could not get any cartridges for it and before he could hand it back to accused Constable Brenchley got the revolver from him Detective-Sergeant Butler in his evidence, said Constable Brenchley and witness interviewed accused on March 30th last, in reference to this offence. He admitted committing it and wrote and signed an admission to that effect. Accused resorted his defence and pleaded not guilty. He was committed for trial, on both charges at the next sitting of the Supreme Court at Napier. At the Hastings Magistrate's Court before Mr R. W. Dyer, S.M., John Ellis, aged 17 years, who was arrested by Constable Brenchley, appeared charged with on March 22 at Hastings, breaking and entering the premises of Herbert Lambert and taking a Browning revolver, value £3 10/- the property of David O'Donnell, and (2) on February 17, at Hastings, stealing £45 .18/6, from the warehouse of Thomas Clarkson, Ltd., motor importer Hastings. On the application of Detective-Sergeant Butler, accused was remanded until April 7, bail being allowed, accused in £100 and two sureties of £50 each.

The ceremony was conducted by the Rev. Canon Lusk. The bride was given away by her father. She was attended by her two sisters as bridesmaids Miss Edna Graves and Miss Luilene Graves. Mr Hansen of Napier was best man. After the service, the guests were entertained by Mr and Mrs Graves at their residence. Mr and Mrs Coker left for the south for their honeymoon by motor car.

1920 April, Wedding, Hope – Speers - At St. Andrew's Church, Hastings, the contracting parties being Edith Daisy, second daughter of Mr and Mrs Alex Speers of Longlands, Hastings, and James Hope son of Mr and Mrs Hope of Maraekakaho. The Rev. P. Ramsay was the officiating minister. The bride, who was given away by her father, and was attended by her sister Miss Doris Speers and Miss Eva Page as bridesmaids. The duties of best man were carried out by Mr P. Long of Napier and that of groomsman by Mr Geo. Speers. After the wedding ceremony, the guests were entertained at the bride's parent's residence at Longlands where the happy couple received congratulations for their future happiness from a large number of friends. Later the happy couple left by car for Auckland, where the honeymoon will be spent.

1920 April, Wedding, Carrol - Fearn - At the Sacred Heart Church Hastings on Easter Monday by Rev. Father Mahoney, Miss Ivy Fearn eldest daughter of Mr and Mrs J. W. Fearn, 'Eastella' Hastings to Patrick Carroll also of Hastings. The bride was given away by her father and attended by Miss May Fearn sister as bridesmaid and Mr J. Carroll was best man. A reception at the Marble Bar tea-rooms

1920 April, Another collision with cabbie Henry Limmer - A motor car driven by Mr J. Newrick collided with a one-horse cab driven by Mr H. Limmer at the Southampton St and Railway Rd intersection about 6 o'clock pm. In 1894 he first married Alice Mary Kavanagh b: December 1875 in Clutha Otago, the daughter of Mary and William Kavanagh. They had two sons - April 1898 Hugh McDonald Bower he was a tailor for T. Honner in Hastings WW1 and July 1899 William Francis Bower. Alice Mary Bower nee Kavanagh died a young mother in May 1901 in Dunedin aged 25. Mathew Marshall Bower then married Margaret Anderson Swann b: January 1880 in Dunedin, the daughter of Janet and David Swan. 



1920 December, A youth named Gigg was assisting in the delivery of milk made a gruesome find in Hastings on the vacant section overgrown with silver poplar scrub situated nearly opposite the Catholic Church. The lad often took a shortcut through the section and at around 5 o'clock he saw a woman lying on the ground, but thought she was resting, but when cutting through in next morning he saw she was still there, and found the woman aged about 40 was dead. He at once informed the police who with Dr Story went promptly to the scene. Beside the remains was a bottle containing some beer and a bank book bearing the name of Ada Alice Coats, some money, a railway luggage ticket and a reference dated 1916 from the Grand National Hotel Petone. Dr Story found no sign of violence. It was reported on Saturday she was enquiring for rooms saying she could not get accommodation and the woman who worked temporarily at a hotel in Hastings under the name of Harris, supposed to be the name of her second husband.

1920 December, L. Rose, Lyndon Rd, Louisa Catharine Whitley died at Christchurch

1920 December, Marriage. Land – Cunningham - At the Wesley Methodist Church Hastings, by Rev. Angus McBean, Mona Winifred, second daughter of the late Mr and Mrs Cunningham of Auckland, to Simeon Johnston Land, youngest son of Mr George Land, J.P., and Mrs Land of Hastings.

1920 December, Betty Theodora Bader was born in Hastings, the daughter of Margaret Andrews and Theodore Bader. **Theodore Meiar Bader** b:1888 the son of Mary Elizabeth and Robert Steven Bader, Corporal T. Bader returned on *Hororata* in March 1919 and married Margaret Andrews Burge b: January 1893 in Waipara Canterbury. They had three children - Nancy Bader, Earl Robert Ernest Bader. Theodore Bader died August 1952 in Hastings aged 64 and Margaret Andrews Bader nee Burge. Margaret Andrews Burge died October 2005 in Durham, North Carolina, USA aged 84.

1920 December, Hastings Fire - A Six Roomed House Destroyed in Karamu Rd. At 5am this morning the Hastings fire alarm sounded and the Fire Brigade, under Superintendent **W. Keith**, got promptly on the scene, only to find that the six-roomed house on the corner of Karamu Rd and Alexandra St, owned and occupied by **Mrs H. M. Jones**, was in full blaze. No time was lost in getting to business, but practically only the framework of the building was saved, whilst the furniture, and nearly all the personal effects were destroyed, with the exception of a few books and some unimportant articles. It appears that Mrs Jones got up, between 4 and 5, and she lit the fire in the washhouse, which is close to the residence, returning to the house shortly afterwards. Mrs Jones, who is deaf, heard nothing, and the first indication she got of the fire was smoke in the house, whereupon she immediately raised the alarm. Her son and daughter, as well as

her father (Mr John Collinge) who also occupied the house, were aroused, and Mr J. Jones, in getting his grandfather out of the burning building, got somewhat singed, as did also Mrs Jones. Some money, in notes, which in one of the rooms, was saved. The only explanation regarding the cause of the outbreak is that the washhouse by some means got alight and that the flames were communicated to the main building, about four feet away. The house is insured for £550 and the furniture and effects for £200, both in the New Zealand office, but it need hardly be said that the loss is heavily in excess of the protection.

1920 December, There passed away in a private hospital in Hastings on December 31st 1920 another old colonist in the person of Mr **Duncan Sinclair**. Born in Olian, Argyllshire Scotland 92 years ago. Mr Sinclair came out to New Zealand at the age of 34. he landed in the south island and worked for some years in the Marlborough district. He left there over 40 ago and came to Hawke's Bay, where he was employed for over 30 years by the Mackenzie family as shepherd. Since his retirement from active life, he has lived with Mr and Mrs J. Romeroy of Havelock North for the last fourteen years. Of a kindly quiet disposition, he was liked by everyone who came into contact with him. He was a regular attendant at St. Columba's Presbyterian Church to the last. His health began to fail him last August and his end was hastened by bronchitis and other complications which carried him off while in a private hospital in Hastings. He was buried in the Hastings cemetery on New Year's Day by the Rev R. Waugh. The deceased was never married and had no relatives in this country.

The Nelson Park -



Heretaunga School cricket 1903, with Karamu Rd behind line of willow trees


The Heretaunga School was established by the late W. Rainbow on very modest lines. Year by year it increased and prospered and the present building with its magnificent grounds and playing fields marks the growth of some twenty years

The Hastings Lawn Tennis Club occupied an area of over two acres for ten years (later Nelson Cricket Grounds 1910)

The Heretaunga School Hastings had closed, in December 1912 the school buildings were moved to Havelock North which later merged with the Hurworth School in Whanganui to form the new Hereworth School in 1927 The old school grounds became the Nelson Cricket Ground and had fences and gates erected.



Heretaunga School grounds became Nelson Park in 1921 - a remaining portion of Caroline Rd was retained to provide southern access off St. Aubyn St east to Nelson Park and the caretakers cottage opposite the first State School site, was named Williams St named after J. N. Williams, then changed to Holt Pl

William Nelson took over the **Nelson Cricket Ground** (Heretaunga Schoolgrounds) from the trust in 1920 and in 1921 he sold it to the Council and it became Nelson Park

1920 November, The Nelson Cricket Grounds purchased by the Borough - Lease in Washing up bill. Mr E. H. Williams who accompanied the witnesses from this district, who went to Wellington, in order to give evidence before the Parliamentary Committee, regarding the Howard bequest, left last Thursday for where he presided at the annual meeting of the N.Z. Cricket Association. He returned to Wellington last Monday morning, when he was occupied all day with Hastings affairs at the Parliamentary Buildings. He saw the Minister for Internal Affairs (Hon. G. J. Anderson) and arranged for a clause being included in the Washing-up Bill, giving power to the Hastings Borough Council to purchase the Nelson Cricket Grounds, for the purposes of a public recreation ground, and open space, for the sum of £5,800, payable by the issue of one debenture for the full sum, or several debentures having a currency of 20 years, at 4 per cent. The clause states that, as the lands exceed in value the price asked, it was desirable that they should be acquired for the use of the Hastings public Power is given for the Borough Council to charge for admission to the grounds, for so long as there shall be any moneys owing, on the purchase, and the purchase is subject to the special loan of £5,800 being authorised by the ratepayers. The council is authorised to take a poll of the ratepayers on the matter of acquiring the grounds on the terms offered. The clause gives the council power, in lieu of issuing the debenture or debentures, to execute a first mortgage over the grounds, or any part of them, for a term not exceeding 33½ years, to secure the purchase money, at a rate of interest not exceeding 5½ per cent. If the ratepayers authorise the purchase of the grounds, the council can, so long as any moneys are owing, under the debentures or on the mortgage, to let or lease the grounds, or any part of them, for the purpose of sport, such as cricket, hockey or sport of a like nature, at such rent, and for such term, not exceeding 331/2 years, and subject to such conditions, as the council may require, with power to the lessee to charge the public for admission on the grounds to witness the sports held thereon; or the council may itself, so long as there is money owing, occupy the grounds for the purpose of sport, and may charge sport bodies for the use of the grounds and the public for admission thereto, on the occasion of sports meetings. After all moneys in respect of the purchase have been paid, the grounds shall be held by the council, subject to the provisions of the Public Reserves and Domains Act, 1908, or any amending Act or Act passed in substitution therefore.

1920 December, Up to 2 p.m, to-day, only about **150** ratepayers voted at the two polling booths (Old Library and the Salvation Army Citadel) in Hastings on the question of acquiring the Nelson Cricket Grounds, as a public reserve. There are over 2000 ratepayers on the roll, so that this cannot be described as indicating a healthy interest in the matter submitted to the vote. The booths, however don't close until 7 o clock so that the total may yet prove representative, but the general feeling is that the votes cast will be few, but that **they will favour the loan for purchasing the property.**

1920 December, **Hastings Recreation Grounds** - The ratepayers of Hastings are asked to cast their votes on the question as to whether the Borough Council will accept or reject the exceptionally favourable opportunity now offered of securing a central breathing space for the people of the town. The conditions under which this can be done have already been pretty thoroughly discussed in our columns, and are so fully set out in a letter published over the signature of His Worship the Mayor that but brief further reference need be made to it here. The area proposed to be acquired, including what is known to most residents of the borough as the **Nelson Cricket Ground**, is situated within but a few minutes' walking distance of the business centre of the town, and only those who have lived in a big city such as Hastings must eventually become - and that at no very distant date - can know how inestimable an advantage such a central lung is to an industrial and business community. Within so ready reach, it is available for daily resort by those whose work is brightened and whose health is preserved by the little respite in attractive surroundings and the inhalation of fresh air that are thus provided for them. Hastings is for the lime being a town of so many open spaces that it is difficult to think of it


as being ultimately a closely built area for at least some considerable distance from its main street. But that such is its fairly well assumed destiny none need I doubt. Neither need there be any doubt that now is the time when, in the interests of the health and enjoyment of future generations, as well as of the recreation of those of the present day, such an eminently suitable area 83 that now made available should be secured. More especially is this to be said in relation to the specific proposal now before the ratepayers because it can be safely stated that the land can now be acquired at something very, appreciably under its present selling value in the open market. It is only on account of the trustees who, some good few years ago, secured it as a cricket and football ground finding themselves unable to finance, the original scheme that the borough is given the chance to take it up at the very reasonable then placed upon it, with the addition merely of a fair allowance to the trustees for the improvements effected by them. That its intrinsic value has very largely appreciated since then is evidenced by comparatively recent sales effected in the neighbourhood, while the relatively low valuation for rating purposes may readily be assumed to have represented a concession to the public purpose for which the ground was being used, the taxation based upon it falling entirely upon the trustees; There need, therefore, be no hesitation whatever on the, part of any burgess on the ground that I the purchase at the price fixed is anything but a first-rate bargain. Beyond this there is the fact that no cash has to be found, the vendor being prepared himself to pay the trustees in cash for their improvements, and then leave the whole purchase-money to be paid to him by instalments spread over twenty years and bearing interest in the meantime at 4 per cent. When we note the rates at which local bodies, and even Governments, are now borrowing some idea may be formed of the easiness of the terms which Mr William Nelson has submitted for acceptance. It is to be hoped that the ratepayers will not be so remiss in fulfilling their duty to themselves and the people of the town as to admit of there being any chance of the proposal being defeated by any small catch vote registered by an otherwise negligible handful of opponents to it. It is surely not too much to ask of each ratepayer to show, his or her appreciation of so public-spirited an offer by at least taking the very little trouble involved in casting a vote for its acceptance.

In February 1921, When the railway station is built on the new site, provision has been made for a new street leading from the back of the railway station and running into Caroline Rd, almost opposite the **Nelson Cricket Ground gates.** The widening of Caroline Rd – The undesirable narrow and dangerous entrance from St Aubyn St east alongside Holt's timber yard. Officially the narrow portion is called Williams St after the late Mr J. N. Williams and the remainder Caroline Rd. Mayor G. Ebbett had been in correspondence with the land owner Mr F. W. Williams of Napier and interviews with Mr Holt who agreed to relinquish the land (which was part of his timber yard) necessary to widen Caroline Rd provided he receives equal area on the northern side of his mill and adjoining his yard.

In August 1921, The Nelson Park Hastings Dressing Shed committee met the secretary reported the voluntary assistance was coming forward, but more required. Eight carpenters were available, but six more were necessary. Thanks of the committee were due to Mr A. Garnett (architect) Mr R. M. Hewitt (builder) who is acting as supervisor and Mr McLean (McLean and Pickles) plumbing department. These three enthusiasts had taken on their shoulders practically the whole responsibility of carrying out the work. Donation in kind and cash were gratefully acknowledged from the Hastings Borough Council, Messrs Holt and sons and McLeod and Gardiner. Operation commence next Saturday at 10am.




John Henry Colebourne b: 1861 in Herefordshire, the son of John and Sarah Colebourne, he arrived in NZ via *Jessie Osborne* in September 1876 with his family to Auckland. In 1887 he married Mrs Kate Matilda Milligan nee Ambridge b: July 1859 the daughter of Mary and Thomas Ambridge, she first married Allan Milligan in December 1878 Eng, he died March 1884 in Devonport Auckland aged 27. 1911, John a mercantile manager for Williams & Kettle resided in King St, 1919 Kate Matilda and John Henry Colebourne a mercantile manager at 604 Lyndon Rd. John Henry Colebourne died Februar 1931 at Hastings aged 70 and Kate Matilda Colebourne nee Milligan died September 1932 in Gisborne aged 72.



Mr Albert George Nicholson b: September 1863 Portsmouth Eng the son of Elizabeth and William Nicholson, was for some years engaged in the boot trade in London, in July 1887 married Emily Pascoe b: July 1864 in Portsea Island, Hampshire. Shortly after arrival in NZ, he was appointed manager of the boot department of the Hawke's Bay Farmers' Cooperative Association, he went in business on his own accord, but suffered severe loss in 1931 earthquake. 1931 Emily and Albert George a boot importer of 313 Lyndon Rd east and 1935 405 Knight St Hastings. Emily Nicholson nee Pascoe died July 1939 at Hastings and Albert George Nicholson died 1945 December aged 82.

Mr W. J. Warwick manager of the merchandise department of the Hastings branch of the Hawke's Bay Farmers' Cooperative Association for about 14 years. In September 1924 William James Warwick severed his connection with the company in order to go into business for himself in Hastings where he took over Gallagher and Co's grocery establishment.

William Allan Carter conducted a boot shop next to the Hastings Hotel after which he took over the management of the HB Farmers' Co-operative Society a position he held for 13 years. After severing his connection with the HB Farmers' he took control of the seeds department of Messrs de Pelichet McLeod's business for about the same period of 13 years. In October 1901, Whilst superintending the unloading of a reaper and binder Mr W. Carter manager of the Hastings branch of the Hawke's Bay Farmers' Association met with a nasty accident which was within an inch of involving the loss of his eye. 

This they were successful in doing, and the brigade left after everything appeared safe, but unfortunately at 6 o'clock this morning the brigade received a second call the remaining portion of the building having caught fire again, and was destroyed, together with the billiard room and contents. Mr and Mrs Mackersey and family were away at the time, the only occupants of the house being Mrs Morshead and family. Mrs Morshead saved most of her belongings, which amounted to about £150. A piano was practically all that was saved of Mr Mackersey's furniture. Mr Mackersey had a risk of £100 in the Standard Office on the billiard table, but the other insurances are not yet available. The fire is supposed to have originated in the roof of the rear portion of the house, and was presumably caused by the electric wires fusing, as when Mrs Morshead attempted to switch on the light there was no current.



In January 1921, Practically everyone in Hastings, except of course recent arrivals, will remember the **two Russians** named **Nevezie** (**Adler**) who earned their living by hawking, principally wool skins. These two Russians came to New Zealand some time ago and were almost as well-known in Hastings as the proverbial town clock, their horse and cart and themselves being a very familiar party. Several months ago, they received a call back to Russia and as far as can be ascertained, went back to the army. Their experiences in Russia read almost like but what befell them is recorded in a communication to a friend in Hastings and gives a good idea of the state of affairs existing in Russia. When the brothers got back to Russia, one of them, **Harry**, found that his wife and two children had died of starvation. They evidently then went to live with two other brothers and according to the information received, these two brothers owned a cow, which one day was asked for by a party of Poles. The brothers asked what the cow was wanted for and the answer came from two rifles and two dead men resulted. After this the two brothers who left Hastings evidently separated, for one of them has not been heard of since and the other is on his way back to New Zealand.

In January 1921, **Mr L. Cooper**, a wool buyer of Hastings has received a letter from his brother-in-law who left Hastings some time ago to see his wife he left in **Russia Poland** his native country. The writer, who is returning to New Zealand describes the condition of Russia Poland as very bad and says he was very lucky to escape with his life. When he arrived in the country he found that his wife had died of starvation a month previously. He spoke guardedly regarding the fate of Mr Cooper's uncle (who was well known in Hastings as (**Adler**) but the letter inferred that the unfortunate man had been done to death. Both these men were familiar personalities in the streets of Hastings where they were known as **Adler Bros.** one being a big bulky man and the other much smaller. The smaller of the two is Mr Cooper's brother-in-law who is returning to this country and the taller is Mr Cooper's uncle who it is hinted has been murdered. **Mr G. Woolf**, tailor of Hastings has also received word that two of his brothers had been shot dead in the same country.

Quite a gloom was cast over the community this morning, when it became known that Mrs Horton, wife of Mr Thos. Horton, Pakowhai Rd Hastings, had passed The sad event took place at Nurse O'Callaghan's private hospital at 8 O'clock this morning. Three weeks ago she entered that institution to undergo an operation. Apparently all was successful, and she gave evidence of being well on towards a complete recovery. Yesterday, and even up to a late hour last night she was particularly bright, but at 8 a.m. the heart failed and she passed away very suddenly. The late Mrs Horton was well-known throughout the whole district for her charitable and generous disposition. She took a kindly interest in all movements for the uplifting of her fellow beings, and her home was always open to visitors. Deceased was a prominent member of the Wesley Methodist Church and was always foremost in any special Church work patriotic movements, etc. In every respect she was a woman of a most kindly nature, and loved by everybody. Deceased, who was 48 years of age, leaves a family of nine, six boys and three girls. The second son is serving his King and country in France, and left New Zealand with the Main Body. The husband and family wall have the sincere sympathy in the great loss that has befallen them.

A tangi at Omahu pah - Mr G. P. Donnelly's remains were conveyed yesterday from his late residence at Otatara, Taradale, to the native village at Omahu and placed in the porch of the Meeting House there which had been lavishly adorned with rare and beautiful mats and hung round with portraits of his deceased wife and mother and many distinguished members of Mr Donnelly's family. After the usual mournful tangi had concluded, the representative chiefs, in very touching language, expressed their thanks to Mrs Perry for bringing her late father to them that they might show their respect and affection. They eloquently referred to the great solicitude the deceased had always evinced toward the Maori people: how he had striven through many years to protect their ancestral lands, and had endeavoured to encourage them to make the best use of their heritage. A very warm welcome was accorded to Mr Donnelly's old friends; a number of natives are expected today. The funeral will take place at the Omahu Cemetery on Sunday afternoon at two o'clock. The remains of the late Mr G. P. Donnelly were interred yesterday afternoon in the Omahu cemetery, fully two thousand people being present. From an early hour in the day, there was a continual stream of motor cars motor buses, motor cycles, push bikes and other conveyances on the roads from Hastings and Napier, the scene at the pah, when the appointed time came, being one that will be long remembered. Friends of the deceased gentleman came from all parts of the country to pay their last respects, and it was probably the most representative gathering that has been seen in Hastings for many year.

Mr Donnelly, always a strong supporter of the Hawke's Bay Agricultural Society and exhibitor of sheep, cattle and horses, won the special prize for heavy-weight carry in if hacks given by Mr Coleman six years in succession with his horse "The Master," which was never beaten in the colony. When Colonel Wvndham came to New Zealand with the Imperial troops, Mr and Mrs Donnelly mounted the four officers. "The Master," on that occasion ridden by Colonel Wyndham, was presented to him by Mr and Mrs Donnelly. He also took a first prize in Ireland, and was much admired by everybody as a weight-carrying hunter when ridden to hounds by Colonel Wvndham. It is however perhaps as a breeder of horses that the late Mr Donnelly was best known.. "Following up the turf" was a hobby with Mr Donnelly, and he spared neither trouble nor expense to keep himself in the front rank as a breeder. He was a member of the Hawke's Bay Jockey Club for over 40 years and in 1868 won his first race in Hawke's Bay, riding his own horse "Bob," beating a field of 12. Though at the time of his death Mr Donnelly had no horses in he still took as much interest in racing as ever. He started hunting in Auckland in 1864 and was a strong supporter of the Hawke's Bay Hunt. Both Mr and Mrs Donnelly, and their daughter, Mrs Perry, were consistently riding with the hounds, negotiating many seven wire fences (the top being barbed wire) during the day. Mr Donnelly had only one daughter, Mrs Perry.

A touching little story illustrative of the generous disposition of the Mr G. P. Donnelly, was told to a "Tribune" reporter this morning. "I arrived in Napier about ten years ago said the narrator and though a New Zealanders could not get anything but casual work for about twelve months. One day, having nothing to do, I stood talking to a man in Hastings St, Napier, and asked him if he knew of a job. 'There's Mr Donnelly the squatter over there,' he said, pointing to the opposite side of

the road, "ask him for a job.' I crossed over, introduced myself and explained my position. The same day Mr Donnelly found four positions, including an offer as bookkeeper on his Patea station. He had never seen me before and the facts which I have given you show that he must have done a great deal of good in a quiet way."

In September 1917, The Probate of the last will (and two codicils) of the late George Prior Donnelly of 'Otatara' Taradale sheep farmer was granted by the Chief Justice to three of the executors, Messrs Henry Valentine Hoadley, Alexander Bulwer Campbell and Hutton Ewan Troutbeck, leave being reserved to grant a like probate to James Hugh Buchanan Coates, the remaining executor, if he should apply for it. By the combined operation of the will and codicils the following dispositions were made of the property of the testator:- To his daughter Maud Airini Tiakitai La Morte the "Otatara" freehold estate situate in Taradale (being the property purchased from the late Mr Henry Williams); To a sister Marie Hoadley, £10,000. To a sister Hannah Donnelly an annuity of £250, To a sister Nannie Shaw an annuity of £250. To a niece Maud Mary Lansdown Shaw an annuity of £250. To a nephew, Henry Valentine Hoadley £15,000. To a nephew Guy Lansdown Shaw, £10,000; to be applied in reduction of testator's guarantee for "Ngatmatea Estate. To a nephew, Frank Beresford Donnelly, £8000. To a nephew Claude Donnelly, £8000. To Dr. Ross formerly of Waipawa, £2000. To an old and valued friend James Hugh Buchanan Coates an annuity of £800 and after his death the same annuity to his sister Lavinia Coates. To Patrick Donnelly son of the said Frank Beresford Donnelly on his attaining 20 years, £1000. To his brother Harry Langley Donnelly an annuity of £300. To a friend James McPherson McLean, £8000. To a friend Wilhelm John Stratton, £6000 and an annuity of £250. To a friend Alexander Bulwer Campbell, £1000 and 1 per cent on the net value of the estate for death duty purposes. To a friend Thomas Victor Mornn, £8000. To his daughter Maud Airini Tiakitai La Morte testator's stud thoroughbred horse business and horses and other properties and appurtenances thereof. All the above gifts are free of duty. All the residue of the estate is given to three grandchildren, Derek Churchill Prior Perry, Nellie Airini Elizabeth Perry and Moori Frances Churchill Perry in equal shares as a class if and when they respectively attain 21 years, or being female marry subject to the payment of an income of one-fourth part to Maud Airini Tiukitea La Morte during her life. There is a large number of bequests and annuities to domestic servants and station employees.

The Hastings Fire Brigade, under Deputy-Superintendent R. Henderson, promptly turned out, but only went as far as the borough boundary, when they returned back, the fire not being within the prescribed area limits. The house, which was a five roomed one and furniture were totally destroyed. The house was one of the row known, as the "Frimley Cottages" Fortunately no wind was blowing at the time, otherwise the fire would have spread to the adjoining buildings. As it was, one had a narrow escape, and was only saved through the efforts of a bucket brigade. The cause of the fire is unknown. The house was insured for £350 in the New Zealand office and the furniture for £100 in the State Fire Insurance office.

1918 March, Alice Bell nee Wastney died at Twyford after a long illness, the wife of James Bell aged 57, she leaves two married daughters, Mrs A. McIntyre of 'Turamoe' and Mrs W. C. Harrison York Rd Hastings. The interment will be at Wairau Valley Blenheim. James Bell died at his residence 'Turamoe' Hastings November 1925 aged 70 interment at Wairau Valley Blenheim.

1918 April, Richard Stephens Chilton arrived in Hastings from Fielding and started a private hotel in King St. It had been closed for some years and was in a bad way and took a good deal of money to get it going. He had lost his wife in May 1921 after a long illness and was left with a baby. He then purchased a second-hand business. In October 1923 he remarried, she had been ill for 17 mths and the doctor is still attending her when he filed for bankruptcy in April 1925.

1918 May, (Late of 16th Reinforcements) opened his Stortford Lodge Butcher, and solids the patronage of the public. His price list is advertised. Mr Hunter desires to emphasise the fact that the business is entirely his and that no one is in partnership in any way whatever. Sadly David Hunter died in December 1918 aged 23 and Gill Bros held a clearing auction.

1918 May, The death occurred at Tomoana yesterday of a very old resident of the district in the person of Mr Alfred Apperley. Deceased, who was 63 years of age, was a carpenter by trade, and was very highly respected. He leaves a widow and grown up family to mourn their loss.

1918 May, A serious motorcycle sidecar accident occurred at Ngapuki, near Fernhill Hastings, about 6 o'clock last night, when a motor cycle and side car driven by Mr C. Stubbs of the Hawke's Bay Farmers' who had with him in the side car Mr R. B. Langworthy of the Hutt, Wellington, representing the Lister Shearing Machine Company, collided with a light gig driven by Mr D. Keefe, a Native. Exactly how the accident occurred is not known, but it appears that Messrs Stubbs and Langworthy were returning to Hastings from Sherenden, and before they knew what had happened, ran into a horse and trap. Both were thrown violently to the ground, and as Mr Keefe found that both men were injured he conveyed them in his trap to Fernhill. Mr Langworthy was found to be very seriously injured, being considerably knocked about on the head and body. Mr Stubbs was also in a dazed condition, and was not coherent enough to relate what had happened. Messrs Graham and Gebbie were communicated with and both sufferers were conveyed to Nurse O'Callaghan's private hospital. An operation was performed on Mr Langworthy and to-day his condition is such as to cause the gravest anxiety for his recovery. Mr Stubbs is not seriously injured. The driver of the trap was not injured in any way. Later at the Hastings Magistrate's Court before Mr E. Page S.M., Charles Stubbs was charged with manslaughter in connection with the death of Robert Bignall Lang-worthy, who died from injuries received in a motor cycle accident near Fernhill. Hastings, on May 20th. The ease for the police was concluded yesterday, the evidence being practically on the same lines as that given at the inquest. At the time of going to press today the case for accused was not concluded.

Andrew Hart, licensed taxi driver, Hastings, employed by Graham and Gebbie, deposed that on Tuesday at 10.30 a.m. he was driving in Railway Rd, Hastings, in the direction of Paki Paki. As he was approaching Lyndon Rd he passed a cart, first sounding his horn. As he parsed he noticed the deceased lad walking in front - there was another cart coming towards witness. As he got to the corner he sounded his horn again as he did not know which way the approaching cart was going. The boy crossed diagonally over the corner and had got clear of witness' car when he sounded the horn a second time. The boy was looking away from witness towards De Pelichet McLeod's Ltd. He was walking slowly and looking all round. As the last horn was sounded witness was within a few feet of deceased who looked round, doubled back, and fell in front of the car. He was practically underneath the wheels when he fell, and witness applied the footbrake, immediately stopped the car and jumped out. The left front wheel of the car was across

the boy's body, and it just rolled off across him when witness got down to pull it off. Witness immediately pulled the boy clear of the car. He was on his back and his head was under the car. Accounting for the boy's turning' back witness said the boy was not looking where he was going and must have thought witness was going round the corner as he was on his extreme left. "Witness' car was parallel with the roadside and was within a foot of the grass on the roadside. The road was a fair width. If witness had not sounded his horn and the boy had not doubled back witness would have passed him clear by two yards. He did not think that boy saw him before turning round. Witness at the time was travelling very slowly—his car was a 6-cylinder Buick and he was going on high gear He had been travelling at about ten miles an hour but had slowed down till his engine began to knock. He could not have been doing more than four or five miles an hour because his car stopped within 9 feet. He was travelling slowly on account of the traffic. The approaching cart was about 20 feet distant. The tooting of the horn must have startled the boy and made him lose his head. If he had not fallen he would have struck the mudguard. As he went down he put up his hands if to reach for the mudguard. Witness had been driving as a taxi driver for 7 years. He had never had any previous accidents. This was not a very busy corner but on account of the two high corner fences was dangerous. Dr. T. Gilray, resident medical officer, stated that deceased was admitted to the hospital at 3.30 on Wednesday afternoon. He was suffering from severe abdominal pains caused by a motor car. There was evidence that he was suffering from severe internal injury. It was necessary to perform an operation this was done at 5.30 p.m. by Dr. Wilson. On opening the abdomen there was found a large quantity of blood and it was; discovered that the right kidney had been cut in half, and the blood vessels were torn. The kidney was removed, the bleeding vessels clamped and the operation completed at 7.15. About three quarters of an hour after being taken back to the ward he died. Witness considered that death was due to the accident, owing to the severity of the injuries, and the great loss of blood, probably slight accelerated by the necessary 'operation performed. Walter Chapman, grocer, Hastings who was in Heretaunga St at 10.40 on Tuesday morning, said he was driving along Lyndon Rd towards the railway crossing when he saw Hart approaching in his car. The boy was ahead of witness and had crossed the line. Hart pulled off to let another cart pass. The boy walked deliberately in front of the car. He was in the middle of Lyndon Rd and was looking around him. He stepped right in front of the car, turned and faced it, then seemed to collapse and the car was on him. The boy was going along the middle of Lyndon Rd towards his home. Witness pulled to the left hand side of the road to let the car pass. The car was coming slowly and the boy seemed to get flustered and stepped right in front of it. He had been walking along slowly all the time. If he had kept a proper look out he must have seen the ear coming. The butter cart, which had just passed the taxi driver, may have interfered with the taxi drivers view, but- witness was sure the boy was going straight along. The taxi was travelling at about o or 6 miles an hour because it pulled up immediately. Witness saw no indication whatever in the happening of carelessness on the driver's part. He attributed the accident to the lad's own in not looking where he was going. The Coroner in his verdict, found that deceased died as the result of injuries received by him on the 30th July, through being ram over by a taxi car driven by Andrew Hart, but there was nothing to indicate that there had been neglect of duty or carelessness on the part of the car driver.

1919 March, Hastings Fire - The Elms, a 12 roomed two-storey residence, owned and occupied by Mr Joseph Truman was reduced to ashes at 3 o'clock this morning. The building was 30 years old and the flames spread with alarming rapidity, barely affording time for Mr Truman and his wife and two children, who were in their night attire, to escape from an upstairs bedroom. The fire is supposed to have been started by a spark from the sitting room grate. The furniture and contents are a total loss. Joseph Truman was previously a proprietor at the Carlton Hotel he was married to Nellie Truman, he died in February 1928 aged 56.

1919 March, Death, Sutherland – At 810 Edgeley Rd Hastings on March 23rd 1919, Jemima Sutherland; aged 76 years. The funeral will leave her late residence, Edgeley Rd, for the Hastings cemetery.

1919 March, Mr N. E. Beamish who died at his residence Stoneycroft, in his 93rd year. He arrived at Lyttelton in 1850 by the sailing vessel, *Lady Nugent* from Cork and after spending two years at Lyttelton (at which time there was not a house where Christchurch now stands) he took the management of the Hon. W. B. Rhodes' Heaton Park estate, which he held for 18years, when at the request of his brother-in-law, Mr Thoams. Lowry, he came to Hawke's Bay and took over the management of the Okawa estate where he remained for twenty years, afterwards coming to "Stoneycroft" where he resided until the time of his death. Mr Beamish married Elizabeth Couper and had three daughters, Mrs. A. H. Wallis, Gisborne, the late Mrs John Jamieson, Glenross, Mrs. Dr. Barcroft 'Stoneycroft' Hastings; also four sons, William, George, Nat, and Henry. Mr Beamish who was born in 1827 has lived under five Sovereigns, George IV., William IV., Victoria, Edward VII., and George V. Forty years ago he purchased the Whana Whana run of 10,000 acres, which has subsequently been divided up amongst his seven children. He was a man of a quiet and retiring disposition, and therefore not much in the public eye, but he was highly esteemed by those who knew him. He has lived out all his days and dies surrounded by the affection of his children and the respect of all men. The funeral will leave "Stoneycroft" tomorrow, Wednesday, at 2.30 p.m. for the Hastings cemetery.

1919 April, Gordon Livingstone Potts was born in Hastings the son of Mary Ellen (Nel) and Arthur Charles Potts

1919 April, John Cowie, Fitzroy Avenue Hastings has received advice from Base Records that his cousin, Private John Morrison is returning with Draft 235 on H.M.T. *Raranga* which is due to arrive at Wellington about April 23rd. He has been a prisoner of war in Germany since 4th July 1916. **John Cowie** b: 1864 poss married December 1903 in Gloucestershire Eng to Annie. Annie Cowie of 701 Fitzroy Ave died March 1927 aged 63 and John Cowie of died June 1927 aged 63.

1919 April, Birth, Garnett - To Mr and Mrs H. W. Garnett of Omahu Rd Hastings, a daughter.

1919 April, Mr **Eli Ralph Dodge**, coach builder Hastings, died suddenly at his residence, Nelson St, Hastings this morning. Deceased, who was 42 years of age, leaves a wife and young family with whom sincere sympathy is expressed. Interment will be private.

1919 April, Death, Neilsen - At the Napier Hospital, **Rose**, the beloved wife of Jens Jensen Neilsen, aged 49 years. The funeral will leave their late residence, Frederick St and Tomoana Rd Hastings on Sunday, at 2 p.m., for the Hastings cemetery.

1919 April, Cyril Gigg, aged 9, son of Mr and Mrs Geo Gigg of Dufferin St Hastings met with a painful accident this morning. It appears the lad was handling a. detonator (usually used for blasting purpose) which he is supposed to have struck with an axe causing it to explode. The result was that the thumb, first, and second fingers of the left hand were blown off, and the thumb and first finger of the right hand and his face and right leg badly injured. The explosion was heard all round the neighbourhood, and Mrs Gigg rushed out and found her son covered in blood. **Dr. Boxer** was immediately sent for and on arrival he ordered the boy's removal to Nurse O'Callaghan's private hospital, where he was to undergo an operation.

1919 May, The death is announced of Mr **Michael McHugh of Gascoigne St** Hastings at the age of 52 years. Deceased took suddenly ill with meningitis on Saturday evening and was at once taken to the Napier Hospital where he succumbed on Sunday morning. He was an old resident of Hawke's Bay and was employed by the **late Hon. J. D. Ormond for 22 years.** He was highly respected and his death will be greatly regretted. He leaves a widow and five young children to

mourn their loss. The funeral took place this afternoon, the Rev. Father Mahoney officiating at the grave. Jessie McHugh nee Carrington died July 1955 in Hastings aged 85.

1919 May, Mrs W. Caulton of Dunedin, an old resident of Hastings, is at present on a month's visit with her sister Mrs Peebles of Hastings.

1919 May, Marriage, McCormick – Wilson - At St. Matthew's Church by Rev. Broeklehurst, Arthur Norman, seventh son of Mr and Mrs A. McCormick, Southland Rd Hastings, to Ethel Amelia Wilson, only daughter of Mr A. Wilson, Blenheim.

1919 May, Noel William James McConnell was born in Hastings the son of Esther Mary Rose (Elsie) and Robert McConnell. He died a child in June 1920 in Hastings.

1919 June, Death, O'Neill - At the Napier Hospital, Cecila, relict of James Smith O'Neill, Pakowhai Rd Hastings; aged 39 years. The funeral will arrive at the Hastings cemetery.


1919 June, Alfred Edwards Hunter b: February 1873, died at Hastings

1919 June, Mr **Percy Martin**, an old and highly esteemed resident of Hastings died suddenly at his residence aged 67 he was exceptionally well-known throughout the Hawke's Bay district, in which he had resided for forty years. He was a horse trainer for many years, and 14 years ago took over the **Hastings Railway Hotel** to 1904. Later he became licensee of the Criterion Hotel, Napier and then went farming in the Wairoa. Two years ago he returned to Hastings, where he continued to reside until his death.

1919 June, Loach Bros of Heretaunga St west had joined with Horace John Price a plumber of 807 Dufferin St as **Loach and Price.** In April 1926 Trevor Merveyn Minnis was an electrician for Loach and Price and died from injuries from a motor collision aged 24.

1919 July, Mr **Frank Burge**, builder of Hastings, fell from a roof whilst engaged in dismantling the buildings in Station St, Hastings recently sold for removal. He was on the roof in the act of removing the iron, when he slipped on the steeply inclined and frosty surface and. having nothing to lay hold of, fell to the ground, some fifteen feet below. He was conveyed to **Nurse O'Callaghan's Hospital** and although it is feared that one of his legs was fractured. It is hoped that his injuries are not as serious as first anticipated.

1919 July, The **Railway Rd** Reserve -The council have a lease from year to year at a **peppercorn rental** of the strip of land **between the tank site and Lyndon Rd**, and the committee, in conjunction with Cr. Beamish, viewed the ground and make the following recommendations to beautifying same:—(1) That the portion between Heretaunga St and the present railway fence deviation be commenced first, and laid out on a design which will ultimately take in the strip to Lyndon Rd. (2) That proper and suitable conveniences be provided separately for ladies and gentlemen on a site about a chain from the present water tanks. (3) That the walls of the water tanks be demolished and filled into the tanks such demolition to be at least to 2½ to 3 feet below the level of the ground. The tanks to be filled up further with the rubbish, and grass off the section above mentioned, with a final top-dressing of soil to the present ground level. (4) That a low growing hedge be planted along the railway fence, a **limestone sand pathway** put down, and the remainder laid down in grass with flower beds. (5) That the engineer be instructed to commence the preparatory work at once, and within a week to submit a design of the proposed work for the approval of the Reserves Committee.

Joll (Taihape) and Trooper E. Joll who is at present on his way home from the front.



On Saturday 19 July 1919 Saturday, at noon the Church bells will be tolled and bugles sounded on the Racecourse for the purpose of paying a solemn tribute to the dead. All proceedings will cease for five minutes and the public are particularly requested to recognize this solemn event. The hotels will be closed from 11am to 3pm.

1919 July 22, Three days have been set aside by the Government for the celebrations, viz., Sunday, Monday and Tuesday after the signing of the treaty. The Mayor Mr George H. Ebbett. Fireworks displays on the Monday and Tuesday nights under the direction of Supt. Keith and the Hastings Fire Brigade will be of a character to excel anything of the kind ever held in Hastings. The Hastings Band will be engaged throughout the whole celebrations and this should add considerably to the success of this historic event.

The succession of decorated cars, equestrians and equestriennes, cycles and vehicles of every description. The band headed the procession after which two dainty little maids on horseback attired as heralds and carrying silver trumpets, led the march, applauded by the eager crowds as the show passed through the street. The procession left Victoria Square for the Racecourse at 10am, sharp. Queen St - Hastings Band and military section, Borough Councillors and Fire Brigade. East side. The various Patriotic Committees and Friendly Societies and Maoris.

The Children's Peace Day Celebrations

1919 July 21 Monday, HASTINGS. Tuesday was "The Children's Day" and the proceedings arranged for this particular day were the most important part of the celebrations. The school teachers have been busy engaged arranging a programme of very high merit, in the procession the gaily decorated lorries representing the Allies will be a conspicuous feature. Woodford House School will represent Britannia. Hastings West School will represent Italy. District High School will represent United States. Hastings North School will represent France. Havelock North School will represent Belgium.

After the herald - the schools, under the control of their teachers, defiled in the following order :- Woodford House Lorry and pupils: Iona College "France Lorry": Hastings N. (4 - 6) Belgium: Havelock N. (4 - 6) Italy: Hastings W. (4 - 6) United States: H.D.H.S. (4 - 6): Maori Lorry (Opapa School): Convent (4 - 6): Twyford School: M.A.C. Band: D.H.S. (1 - 3): Fernhill Lorry: Hastings N. (1 - 3): St. Patrick's Schools (1 - 3): Hastings W. (1 - 3): Havelock N. (1 - 3): other schools: infants in lorries and cars and innumerable decorated vehicles of every kind.

Assemble 11.30 a.m. at Municipal Corner. Procession—Moves off at 12 noon for Racecourse, via Heretaunga and Market Sts. Arriving at Racecourse, the pupils will be marshalled on the course proper in front of the stand erected by the Saturday Committee. The decorated lorries will form the outer arc while infants will dismount from their cars at the head of the "straight" land walk to the parade ground. The public will be excluded from the course-proper. The concourse assembled there will follow the National Anthem (2 verses) short speeches (to be arranged for by Mr G. F. Roach) and Rule Britannia" (2 verses) Then follows the dissembling. Each division under its teacher will march off to a depot where every child will receive a small packet of lollies and biscuits.

St Patrick's catholic girls & boys school before St Josephs was established

1919 August, Death Franklin - At the residence of her daughter Mrs J. Flanders, Riverslea, Elizabeth, dearly beloved wife of Joseph Franklin, Mangateretere; aged 63 years. No flowers by request. The funeral will leave the residence of Mr John Williams Flanders at 10.30 a.m. Saturday, for -the Havelock Cemetery.

1919 August, Pilcher - At her parent's residence Karamu Hastings, Frances, third beloved daughter of Fred and Annie Pilcher; aged 21 years. Deeply regretted. By request no mourning. The funeral will leave Karamu for the Havelock Cemetery.

1919 October, James Richard Talbot died, beloved husband of A. M. Talbot of Twyford.

1919 October, Miss Dorothy Hastings - Principal Boy in "Goody Two Shoes" pantomime. Miss Hastings is a New Zealander, and hails from Hastings, Hawke's Bay.

1919 October, Wedding Freeman – Miller - In glorious sunshine Miss Winnie Miller and Lieut. S. Freeman were united in the bonds of holy matrimony at St. Matthew's Church, Hastings. The head groomsman was Lieut, L. H. Brown, M.C., the other groomsmen being Messrs C. Brook and F. J. Hodgson, M.M., all being in uniform. The bridesmaids were three in number - Miss Richmond, Miss Doreen Newbigin and Miss Grace Lubbock's (Feilding) After the ceremony, the guests, to the number of close on 300, were lavishly entertained at the residence of the bride's parents. A large marquee was erected on the lawn, where the toasts to the newly-married couple were duly honoured.

1919 October, Wedding, Tod – Short. A quiet, but very pretty and popular wedding took place in Hastings when Pastor Edridge performed the ceremony of marriage between Miss Jeannie Short, the third daughter of Mr and Mrs Thomas Short of Hastings and Mr George Tod, eldest son of the late James Tod of Otane. The bride was given away by her brother Mr T. Short and was attended by Nurse A. Percy, and her niece little Molly Short, as bridesmaids. Mr Alic Lockie discharged the duties of best man. At the conclusion of the service in the Baptist Church the wedding party was

hospitably entertained at the residence of the bride's parents, where the newly wedded pair received the hearty congratulations of their many friends.

1919 October, Herbert Roger Bisley returned from the war and began business as motor importer of Hastings, opposite Everybody's Theatre. In July 1920 Mr H. R. Bisley motor garage proprietor of Heretaunga St west Hastings has now a model of a new service car, similar to that which the Hawke's Bay Motor Co. are going in for which he is demonstrating in this district. The car, which is handsomely turned out and comfortably upholstered, is a 16-passenger, 50 h.p. 8 cylinder machine with a 145-inch wheel base, the body being made by May Eros of Sydney. It is exceptionally well suited for passenger traffic in this district and recently covered the distance between Wellington and Palmerston North in three and a half hours. Inspection is invited and the vehicle will be on view this evening in the window of Mr Bisley's establishment. Heretaunga St Hastings.



1919 November, Roulston and Stanton of Hastings have on the ground an enquiry bureau in connection with their land, commission and financial agency business. The firm have an extensive list of properties for sale and are prepared to treat with both buyers and sellers.

1919 November, The extension of Station St to Lyndon Rd and the acquisition of Mrs Garnett's property for a Mothers Rest. The necessity for opening of the new street to Eastbourne St crossing to relieve the congestion of traffic which already exists at Heretaunga St and to assure the public safety at that crossing in the future. Knight Bros - the owners of the block fronting Heretaunga St and abutting on the railway line have agreed to convey to the municipality, without any money consideration, the land that is required for carrying Station St through as far as Eastbourne St. Beyond this, an arrangement has been reached with Mrs Garnett the owner of the block which lies between Eastbourne St and Lyndon St. and which also abuts on the railway line, to sell the same to the Council outright. The site for the erection of a "Mothers' Rest Rooms" and perhaps also of a memorial to the soldiers who have so gallantly fought and died for their country. The Railway Department has consented to permit a crossing of the railway line to be made so that Eastbourne St may run continuously over it, thus affording relief to the congested traffic- that is now crowded onto the Heretaunga St crossing. The present blind section of Eastbourne St lying between Karamu Rd and this new crossing is to be properly formed and provided with the customary footpaths. A. H. Wilson & Harvey and Westerman's are to remove their buildings. Many of the main street buildings were seen as a blot on Hastings. They were a huge series of ugly wooden shacks, and the last thing to regret would be a big fire on a roaring windy night which would leave them a heap of blackened ruins. When this Station St extension is carried through, the improvement will surely stand in amazement at the beauty of it.

They had two children - April 1911 Hugh Alton Aitken Baird in Hastings, he had two sons and one daughter with Phyllis Eleanor Bateman and April 1913 Jeanie Alton Aitken Baird. They lived at 'Rossdhu' in 1911 in April 1923 Birth, Baird - At 'Rossdhu' Hastings to Mr and Mrs Hugh W. C. Baird - twins, son and daughter, then they resided at 207 Nelson St sth, they went overseas. In November 1926 a five-roomed house situated just over the town Havelock North boundary owned by Mr H. W. C. Baird draper of Hastings, occupied by Mr and Mrs G. Newman and their little girl was completely destroyed by fire. 1928, Jeanie Alton and Hugh William Charles Baird a draper at York St Hastings. Hugh William Charles Baird died August 1959 in Hastings aged 78 and Jeanie Alton Baird nee Aitken died June 1971 in Hawke's Bay aged 82.



1919 December, Mr Wesley Stanley, son of Mr Richard Stanley builder of Hastings, met with a serious accident in Hastings, whereby he suffered a rather bad break of his left forearm. He was working on the reconstruction of Herbert Roger Bisley's motor garage, opposite Everybody's Theatre, and in removing the corrugated iron roofing from the verandah, he stepped on a loose sheet and fell a distance of some ten feet to the footpath, sustaining a fracture of his left arm just above the wrist. He was attended by Dr. Boxer, who took an X-Ray photograph of the injuries and treated the sufferer's immediate requirements.

1919 December, Hastings Fire – A fire started in Garnett's timber yards at 1.30 this morning. The factory, contents and machinery completely destroyed, and the offices were practically gutted. The origin of the outbreak is unknown. The insurance on the buildings arid machinery was £500.

1919 December, Richard George Hartshorn was born in Hastings the son of Kathleen Elizabeth and George Hartshorn, he married Rose Beryl Baker in 1972.

1919 December, William Charles Growcott, butcher of Hastings bought out the business of Boyd and Co and commenced business as Growcott and Co with a partner. After the slump effects he went bankrupt in February 1925. William Charles Growcott b: October 1891, the son of Ada Langley and Charles Growcott of Havelock North. In 1915 he married Ruth Elizabeth Eldershan b: April 1894.

1919 December, Wedding – Williams – Furniss - At St. Luke's Church Wadestown, Lance-Corporal J. Gordon Williams of the 8th Infantry Reinforcements and third son of J. Williams, Wanganui, was married by Rev. C. H. Harvey to Ethel Winifred Furniss, sixth daughter of E. W. Furniss, Hastings.

1919 December, A new firm opened in Hastings - **Motorist and Farmers Engineers Supply Co.** Nelson St, close to Heretaunga St recently used by the late Eli Ralph Dodge coachbuilder and renovated into an up to date garage. Mr Arthur Land previously employed an engineer in Hawke's Bay and recently returned from England after four years at the Wolseley Motor works. The sales and business will be attended to by J. R. Foot who was for the past ten year's manager for Messrs Land and Heighway and prior at Mr G. F. Roach's shop to 1908, Mr W. In June 1922, a DH6 aeroplane with wings removed which landed in the Hastings Showgrounds, Arthur George Land - Motorist and Farmers Engineers Supply Co. Nelson St, repaired it at his garage which took several months.

In December 1923 Capt. L. H. Brake arrived at Gisborne from Hastings in an Avro-Mono machine. Capt. Brake was accompanied by Mr Cruickshanks of Hastings and carried greetings from the Mayor of Hastings, Mr G. Maddison to the Mayor of Gisborne.

1920, Edward/Edwin Arthur Pointon b: January 1883 in Napier the son of Annie and Jesse Pointon married Maud Amelia Busby b:1883, the third daughter of A. N. and Mrs M. Busby, East St, Newton. They had one son - April 1915 William Malloch Pointon at Napier. Maud Amelia and Edwin Arthur Pointon a clerk at Nelson St Hastings. Maud Amelia Pointon nee Busby died March 1928 at Napier aged 45 and Edward Arthur Pointon of Hastings died February 1931 at Napier aged 48.

1920, Edward Matthews b: October 1888 at Clive, the son of Mary and Peter Matthews married Louisa Catherine Green b: 1889 in Totara Flat, West Coast, the daughter of Margaret and William Green.

1920 – 1923, Mrs Harriett Myers 310 Lyndon Rd Hastings. **Thomas Myers** b: December 1842 in Sheffield Yorkshire, Eng the son of Annie and Thomas Myers, in January 1866 he married Harriet Styles b: December 1839 in Guildford Surrey, Eng the daughter of Mary and George Styles. They had three children – 1867 Anne Myers, 1869 Ernest Myers and 1880 Ada Beatrice Myers she married Charles George Trimmer in December 1897. The family arrived in June 1874 via *Warrington* with two children. In October 1891 an accident occurred to a child of Mrs Myers; who has gone to

Melbourne after a long residence here. The poor girl fell down the companion way just as she boarded the steamer at Napier and broke her shoulder. After consultation with local doctors either here or at Wellington, it was decided to take her on to the Melbourne Hospital. In August 1894, Mrs Myers, ladies' nurse Hastings advertisement in wanted column. 1923 T. Myers in Jubliee photo. Thomas Myers a carpenter, a carver, gilder, picture frame manufacturer from Wellington died October 1924 in Napier aged 81 and Harriet Myers nee Styles died at the Napier Hospital March 1927 aged 87.

1920, Joseph Fenton Andrew Lamberton b: April 1899 in Nelson, the son of Alfreda and James Lamberton married Gertrude Amelia Deborah Smith b: December 1897 in Waratah Tasmania. They had two sons — Fenton Lamberton and 1930 Ivan Joseph Lamberton. Joseph was one of the founders of the Nash service which inaugurated the service between Hastings and Napier that was later taken over by the NZ Railways Dept. Mr Lamberton then went into business as a taxi proprietor on his own account and carried on for several years before linking up with the Blue Band service where he was popularly known. Joseph Fenton Andrew Lamberton June 1946 in Hastings aged 47 and Gertrude Amelia Deborah Lamberton nee Smith died August 1966 in Hastings aged 68.

1920, Richard (Dick) Mason Hewitt had arrived in Hastings where he engaged in his trade as a cottage builder. **Richard Mason Hewitt** b: July 1875 in Invercargill the son of Frances and Joseph Hewitt, he established himself at an early age in business on his own account in the building trade. When business interests allowed he took an active part in sport, particularly rugby in which he was regarded as a front-row forward above the average. In 1899 he married Violet Verona (Kate) Sherwood b: 1880. They had four children – October 1899, Ada June Hewitt, February 1901, Annie Francis Hewitt, 1903, Richard Mason Hewitt jnr, September 1910 Wallace Stevenson Hewitt he married Eleanor Lowe in 1934. Richard snr was a prominent administrator in rugby and amateur athletics in Hawke's Bay. He continued his interest in sport and was president of the Hastings Rugby Sub-Union as well as an executive member for a number of years. He was also president of the Hawke's Bay Rugby Union. He held executive office in the administration of amateur athletics in Hastings and Hawke's Bay. Mr Hewitt was a member of Karamu Lodge No 47, IOOF and of the Masonic Order. Violet Verona (Kate) Sherwood died December 1936 in Hastings aged 56 and Richard Mason Hewitt died November 1945 in Hastings aged 70. Two sons Messrs Wallace and Richard Hewitt jnr both of Hastings and two daughters Mesdames A. Dillon and H. Steele also both of Hastings. Richard (Dick) Mason Hewitt of Charles St died November 1945, the funeral took place at the Hastings cemetery.

1920, Edgar Buckley Worsnop married Margaret Letitia Cooper b: January 1893 Havelock North the daughter of Margarette Loughlin and James Cooper. They had three children - September 1921 at Nurse Bamforth's Reg Maternity Home, King St Hastings to Mr and Mrs Edgar Worsnop (nee Cooper) Teohu South Norswood, a son. Margaret Letitia Worsnop nee Cooper died November 1983 in Hawke's Bay aged 90.

1920, **William James White** b:1868 the son of Ellen and John White, in October 1897 in Napier he married Rebecca Burns b:1872 in Essex England the daughter of Rebecca and William Burns. They had seven children in Napier and Pakowhai - August 1899, Violet Daphne White, 1901 Charlotte Eva White married Franklin,1903 William Douglas Harold White he married Mary Richardson Moore in 1926, September 25, 1905, Margaret Emma White, September 1907 Mary Helen White, April 1910 Lorna White and January 1913 Doris Rebecca White. William James White a farmer of Pakowhai died on November 1940 in Hastings aged 72 and Rebecca White nee Burns died May 1942, in Hastings aged 70.

1920 January, Sister Bawhiti de Lisle, daughter of Mrs F. S. De Lisle, and the late Dr. De Lisle of Hastings, engaged to Lieut. C. A. Le Lievre of Akaroa. Nurse sister De Lisle returned from active service during last year.

1920 January, Marriage, Eglinton – Fallaize - At St. Matthew's Church, Hastings by the Rev. Brocklehurst, rector, Susanne, second daughter of the late Mr John Fallaize of St. Martin's, Guernsey Channel Isles, to Henry B. Eglinton of Pakowhai Rd Hastings.

Henry Benjamin Eglinton b: 1860 in Lower Hutt, the eldest son of Mary and Henry (Harry) Eglington of Oriental Bay. When 20 years of age Henry first took up a tract of land in Taranaki and converted it into a productive farm. Seven years later he took up farms in the Pahiatua district and in 1910 retired to Pakowhai Rd Hastings where he has since resided. In June 1917 he first married Jessica Donald b: 1884 in Hastings. He is survived by his two daughters the Misses Grace Eliza Mary Eglinton and Alice Edna Minnie Eglinton; a brother A. D. Eglinton of Eastbourne and two sisters Mesdames C. M. Wallis of Wellington and C. Buscke of Remuera. In 1946 Mrs Susanne Eglinton a widow at Longlands Hastings in 1949 she travelled to London and return aged 76, Susanne Eglinton nee Fallaize died unknown.

Both bride and bridegroom are widely known and highly esteemed in Hastings.

1920 January, A single man, named David (Barrett) Coker a returned soldier, aged 25 and single, whose people are said to reside in Christchurch, met his death as the result of a collision: with a motor car, driven by Mr. E. J. Odium, licensee of the Albert Hotel, Hastings, near Waipatu Pa, Karamu Rd, Hastings on Saturday night. 1920 September, Tenders sought for the Hastings Tennis Courts and Club Pavilion, Whitehead Rd

1920 September, New Zealand Railways, Re beautifying that portion of the railway reserve between Lyndon Rd and Heretaunga St held by the council under lease, advised that the department is prepared to shift back the railway fence on the west side of the line for about 7½ chains from Lyndon Rd, to be in line with the fence on lease already set back - the work to be done at the council's cost and the fence to be placed back on its true boundary on termination of the lease and at the council's' cost. - Reserves Committee to be instructed to deal with the strip as was done with the beautification of the first portion.

1920 September, At a meeting of the Hastings Borough Council, once again the question of dismantling the **old Borough Council office building** or turning it into housing, it had been removed from Heretaunga St east and placed on the council's property in Southampton St.

He had been suffering from heart failure for which he was attended by **Dr. Macdonnell** and, as a certificate of death was given, no inquest was necessary. He leaves a widow and two small children, with whom deep sympathy is expressed. The funeral will leave the residence of Mr **T. W. Timms, Tomoana**, for the Hastings cemetery. A brother George and sister-in-law Rose.

1920 September, A married man, an employee of the Hastings Borough Council, named **J. E. Beaumont**, residing in Copeland Rd Hastings, sustained injuries to his head and left foot, owing to a fall of stone at the **Fernhill Quarry** yesterday. He was taken to the Napier hospital last evening. On enquiry at the hospital this afternoon the injured man was reported to be progressing very satisfactorily.

1920 September, **Thomas Elijah Penny** died at his residence in Fitzroy Avenue after a rather long illness. He was a gardener by occupation, an old identity of Hastings for some 40 years and deeply respected. He leaves a widow to mourn him, but he had no family.

1920 September, Death, Brenchley - At the Napier Hospital, after a long and painful illness, Constance Lilian, the beloved wife of C. E. Brenchley, late of Southland Rd Hastings; aged 28 years. Private Interment.



As the guests mounted the steps they each received a sprig of holly, the badge of the McLean's from the hands of a Highlander while the pipers played the Wedding March on the bagpipes. Mrs O. 1920 October, The Hastings Lawn Tennis Club, the members of which have been sedulously preparing their grounds during the winter months for the 1920-21 season, have achieved wonders and, although the crowning operations have yet to be completed, the conclusion of their endeavour is within sight and everything will be in readiness for the opening day on 23rd inst., when the pavilion, courts, and croquet lawns will challenge comparison with those of the best clubs in the Dominion. This club, which started on the old Heretaunga (Nelson Cricket) grounds many years ago, has been established in its present location for some ten years and, from modest beginnings, it has, from time to time, added to its grounds, until to-day they occupy an area of over two acres. Quite recently management acquired some 23 perches, adjoining the courts, which has enabled the executive to remove the pavilion from its old position to the north-westboundary, thus giving room for three ranks of tennis courts, each rank accommodating five courts. One of these ranks, however, will be used for croquet lawns (two full sized and one small) so that the number of courts available for tennis will be ten. The ranks are, therefore, interchangeable and the croquet ground will be altered every year, thus giving the tennis courts periodical rests. The committee have purchased an up-to-date motor driven lawn mower and in a week or so, the grounds will be in perfect playing condition. Ample seating is being placed in position for the convenience of spectators and the pavilion, which has undergone several alterations in the interior, is being repainted, whilst its immediate surroundings are being laid out in flower beds by working bees of enthusiastic members. At the side of the pavilion a board has been fixed and a lawn is being laid down, for volleying practice and in fact, nothing has been neglected to secure the satisfaction of a layers and the comfort of visitors. Arrangements have been made for dispensing

tea every afternoon, where a small charge will be export on Saturday afternoons, when the ladies will act as hostesses. The club's efforts must have the effect of attracting many new members whose activities will serve to increase the popularity of the game and carry it forward to still further successes in the future.

Tried artificial respiration, but without success. Mrs Donovan and **Constable Henry** found that **James William Baddeley** a labourer of Warren St Hastings had removed the deceased to outside the w.c. **Sergeant Hogan** conducted the case for the police. **Thomas Coughlan**, carrier Hastings deposed to identifying the body. **Bernard Storey** a medical practitioner said he examined deceased in the Hastings morgue, knew him to be mentally unbalanced.

They had two children. William Colin Simmons died July 1934 in Napier aged 46, and Beatrice Evelyne Simmons nee Bluck died on August 1981 aged 87.

1920 October, Death, O'Connor - At the parents' residence Frederick St Hastings, Morris the beloved child of Annie Margaret and Patrick O'Connor aged 5. The Funeral will leave Frederick St for the Hastings cemetery.

Hastings Air Flights -

1920 October, The airman Captain Russell, commenced the first non-stop flight from **Whanganui to Hastings** this morning in an Avro aeroplane, the machine passing over the post office at 10.24. There are two passengers aboard, Mrs Simmons and W. Ross (mechanical assistant) The weather was fine with a slight breeze. The route taken was via Marton, Palmerston North, Woodville and Dannevirke. Marton was passed at 10.42 and at 1.20 the machine was reported over Dannevirke where it landed. The Avro aeroplane arrived there from Whangnui noon and stayed an hour. It left for Hastings at 1.10 p.m. Just past 2 o'clock, the drone of the engines was heard in Hastings, announcing the arrival of the machine after its long flight. Captain Russell circled overhead for a few moments and then made for the landing place on **Mr Lockie's property at Longlands**.

Mr Andrew Hamilton Lockie's residence at 713 Southland Rd.

In September 1920, **Mr L. E. Tatton** intends establishing a flying centre in Hawke's Bay, with grounds at Longlands. A letter from him was read at this morning's meeting of the A. and P. Society asking permission to give exhibitions over the Show Grounds on the Spring Show days, and asking for the use of a corner of the grounds for landing purposes. It was decided that owing to the danger involved to the public and the fear of frightening stock, the application be declined.

In June 1920, Messrs. Walsh Bros announce in another column that they will make passenger flights daily during their stay in Hastings, starting each day at 10 a.m. from Mr Lockie's farm, Longlands. The machine will be piloted by Captain R. Russell. The fee is five guineas for each flight and no doubt a large number of Hawke's Bay residents will avail them-

selves of this opportunity to gain an insight into the wonderful invention of the age. Long country trips can be arranged for, and all flights booked on the ground.

In June 1920, Aerial Joy Ride. A "Tribune" representative took an aerial flight from Hastings to Mr John Chambers' station at Mokopeka and summing up his impressions he emphatically asserts that of all forms of journeying the one; through the air is the most enjoyable of any he has yet experienced. The flight was taken in the eight-cylinder De Havilland machine now visiting Hastings, on the kind invitation or Mr Walsh of the Auckland Aviation School, who wished a press man to experience the joys of aviation and give his readers his impressions. The ascent was made from a paddock at Waipatu. . At iu.35 o'clock the representative, in leather coat and fur-lined headgear, which camouflaged him so thoroughly that his most intimate friends could, not know him, climbed into the observer's seat, in front of the pilot, Captain A. Russell late of the luoui. squadron Royal Air Force, and immediately afterwards the engine was started, and alter a run up and down the paddock, the machine left the ground. Expecting all sorts of weird sensations, the pressman was astonished to find that nothing of that sort materialised. The smooth gliding movement of the machine, travelling at the speed of about 60 miles an hour, was exhilarating in the extreme, and a novice airman, instead of experiencing anything in the nature of alarm or anxiety regarding his own safety, found himself enjoying immensely the splendid view which rapidly extended and unfolded itself before his eyes. To attain a height sufficient to cross the Te Mata range the pilot circled two or three times over Hastings, and the work of spiralling up to 2000 feet above sea level occupied fully 10 minutes. When this altitude was attained the machine headed straight for the Te Mata gap in the range and in two minutes or less it was well over Havelock. Nearing the hills a few small wind pockets were met with, in which the machine rose and fell slightly as does a ship in a light swell at sea. Even this motion was pleasant, and instead of feeling the least discomfort the pressman felt as safe as he would in a gently swinging hammock. To avoid these air currents about the hills, Captain Russell swung round and spiralled a few hundred feet higher. In doing this the machine hovered between Havelock and Hastings, one moment appearing to be over the town and the next over the village. This "going further upstairs" occupied several minutes. . Having reached the requisite height Captain Russell headed direct east and in very quick time the Tuki Tuki valley opened out directly underneath. Only seconds seemed all the time needed to cross the valley and reach the hills on the other side. By this time Mr Chambers' house, on the banks of the Maraetotara, was plainly in view, and the pilot could see the landing place which Mr Hugh Chambers had marked out in the paddock south of the shearing shed, by spreading four shafts, one at each corner of a level stretch of ground suitable for the gradual descent was made from a height of about 2000 feet by a gradual spiral, and in almost less time than it takes to write it the machine landed as gracefully and smoothly as a bird, completing the outward trip in less than 25 minutes, the straight flying having occupied not more than 10 minutes, the "going upstairs" accounting for the remainder of the time. The aerial visitors were hospitably entertained by Mr and Mrs Chambers at morning tea, during which Mr Hugh Chambers who in the war, was night flying in France, talked with Capt. Russell about machines and aviation in general. Wishing Miss Chambers to enjoy the pleasure of an aerial flight the pressman persuaded her to take his place for the return trip. With Miss Chambers in the observer's seat the engine was re-started at 11.55 and in a very few minutes the onlookers at Mokopeka saw the machine disappearing over the hills well on its way back to Hastings. At 12.20 Miss Chambers rang up from the Tribune office saying that she had arrived safely and that she had enjoyed the flight immensely. She experienced nothing but pleasure from the time she left the ground until she landed at Waipatu.

1921 June, Referring to the aeroplane accident at Hastings on Sunday last, a local paper says it will be remembered that the New Zealand Aerial Transport Company's Avro aeroplane at Longlands has not been in flight for some time, owing to the likelihood of a Court case in Australia concerning the engine, which was bought as a new one and was afterwards found to be a second-hand one. Acting on instructions from the Air Board, no passenger flights were made and only short flights were carried out so that the engine might be kept in good order. Shortly after mid-day Lieutenant L. E. Tatton the pilot, took the machine out for one of these short trial flights. When the flight started everything was all right, and after getting up to 200 ft. the pilot decided to descend. When about 80ft. from the ground the plane got into a wind pocket and despite his efforts, Lieutenant Tatton was unable to get out of it before the machine made a nose-dive and crashed. The wind pocket was responsible for the engine making the strange noise heard by spectators on the golf links. The crash of the plane was very heavy and was heard at the golf links over a mile away. The luck of the pilot may be gauged from the fact that it was only after a quarter of an hour's hard work that the wreckage was cleared sufficiently for him to be removed. A strange incident concerning the accident is the fact that the pilot strapped himself in before commencing the flight, this being the first time he had used the strap for this purpose since he had been flying at Longlands. Those who witnessed the accident are of opinion that had the pilot not strapped himself in, he would' surely have been killed in the fall. As it was, the strap kept him from crashing forward on to the front portion of the 'plane. It is understood that the pilot strapped himself in as he intended to do one or two "stunts" Motor-cars conveyed a crowd of helpers to the scene of the accident. When rescued the pilot was very badly shaken and had sustained a double fracture of the left arm below the elbow. He was immediately conveyed to the Royston Private Hospital. He sustained a doublefracture of the left arm, together with considerable bruises and shock with no internal injury, he is making a good recovery. The machine itself was a complete wreck. Lieutenant Tatton is recognised as an exceptionally careful pilot and had taken many people of the district up for flights.

1922 January, Messrs. Walsh Bros.' aeroplane, belonging to the **Longlands aerodrome**, arrived at Hastings from Wairoa on Wednesday afternoon, accomplishing the flight in 40 minutes. The people of Gisborne are very enthusiastic about starting a service, coupling up with Hawke's Bay and providing **Captain Fowler and Mr Tatton** can secure suitable seaplanes from Auckland, they will start a passenger service early next month.

1922 January, Messrs Walsh Bros aeroplane made several circling flights with passengers from the aerodrome at Longlands.

1922 February, Two aeroplanes of the Canterbury Aviation Co.'s fleet are expected to arrive in Gisborne to-day or over the week-end. One is the Avro piloted by **Capt. L. H. Brake**, who left on Tuesday with a passenger for Hastings, and was


expected back during the week with some race visitors. He was delayed, however, by unfavourable weather and yesterday he was advised that **Capt. Buckley, in the company's latest D.H.9 limousine, was on his way to Gisborne, via Hastings.** Capt. Brake decided to wait at Hastings for Capt. Buckley as there were several probable passengers for Gisborne. The latter machine arrived there yesterday, after a non-stop flight from Blenheim in 2 hours 20 minutes. It was intended that the two machines should come on to Gisborne this morning. The D.H.9 limousine is all that its name implies as regards comfort and is the most modern aeroplane in New Zealand. It is fitted with a 240 h.p. engine and has accommodation for three passengers in addition to the pilot, the passengers being comfortably enclosed in a well appointed upholstered cabin. This is the machine which the company proposes to use in the carriage of passengers and mails between Hastings and Gisborne.

1922 February, After several unavoidable delays, the large DH9 limousine of the Canterbury Aviation Company arrived in Gisborne this morning, piloted by Captain W. Buckley. The Avro machine in charge of Captain L. H. Brake, also returned about the same time from Hastings, where the two machines have been for the past few days. Both aeroplanes will remain in Gisborne, and the intention now is to inaugurate the mail and passenger service previously outlined by Captain Blake, as soon as possible, with the large machine. The .trip up this morning was uneventful. Captain Brake left first in the Avro about 8 o'clock, and reached here after a good flight in an hour and a half. Captain Buckley left about 2 0 minutes later and arrived here shortly after Captain Brake, both machines landing on the Waikanae beach. The new machine was at once the centre of attraction for a quickly-assembled and interested crowd. Gisborne people have up to the present been acquainted with only the smaller types of aeroplane such as the Avro, and the older type of DH9 (one passenger) which came from Auckland about two years ago. Therefore their interest in the latest limousine type in New Zealand was naturally keen. This machine is one of the Canterbury Aviation Co.'s latest acquisitions and on its trip up to Hastings from Blenheim, piloted by Captain Buckley, it accomplished the distance of 320 miles in a non-stop flight of 2 hours 20 minutes. It is equipped with a 240-h.p. Siddeley-Puma engine and is capable of a speed of 120 miles an hour. Three passengers can be carried in a comfortable compartment not unlike the body of a miniature railway carriage. The passenger seats are arranged in tandem, and each passenger has a window at each side, being thus able to see comfortably all quarters of the landscape over which he is flying. At the same time, as the compartment is completely enclosed, the passengers are protected from the rush of wind and the noise of the engine. The compartment is also fitted with an altimeter, which for the passengers' information records the heights which the machine reaches. Mr W. Harrington came up with Captain Buckley as mechanic. On the flight up this morning the machines reached good altitudes. Captain Brake getting up to 13,000 feet and Captain Buckley to 10,000. Coming over Wairoa, however, the clouds were heavy and low down, and it was necessary to get down under them in order to obtain the proper directions. During the next few days arrangements for the inauguration of the Hastings-Gisborne service will be vigorously carried out, as the company is anxious to make a start as early as possible. A business representative is to be appointed in Hastings, and arrangements have to be made for housing the machine at this end. The timetable has not yet been decided upon, but this matter is already in hand. Meanwhile the two machines are being kept in the Vacuum Oil Company's yard in Grey St.



On Tuesday at Auckland he was the recipient of a presentation from Messrs Walsh bros the works manager and staff. After his marriage Mr Bolt will reside in Kohimarama.

1923 December, After a period of nearly two years Gisborne was re-awakened this afternoon by the once familiar drone of an aeroplane engine overhead, Capt. L. H. Brake arriving over the town from Hastings shortly after 2 p.m., travelling in an Avro-Mono machine. Capt. Brake was accompanied by Mr Cruickshanks of Hastings and carried greetings from the Mayor of Hastings, Mr G. Maddison to the Mayor of Gisborne. The machine is not a stranger to Gisborne, it being the same as was here two years ago, being then owned by Messrs' Walsh Bros. of Auckland and piloted by Capt. Fowler. It was one of those belonging to the Government, but some time ago was recalled and now after being thoroughly overhauled and renovated, has been loaned to Capt. Brake, and will be used during the slimmer in making passenger flights from the Waikanae beach, a percentage of the proceeds being allocated for further bench improvements. Accommodation is provided for two passengers in addition to the pilot, the seals being placed one behind the other. On arrival, Captain Brake expressed complete satisfaction with the condition of the machine, stating that during the journey from Hastings it had behaved splendidly, despite very adverse weather conditions over the latter part of the journey. The trip had occupied exactly an hour and a half, slow progress being made after passing over Wairoa. The journey was commenced in good weather and good time was made to Mahia, the section between Wairoa and the peninsula being traversed in ten minutes. Subsequently however, a strong head wind was to countered, while the visibility was particularly bad on account of the haze created by the extensive bush fires in the locality. Even whentravelling at a height of 7000 feet, which was maintained over the whole journey, the boat of the fires was noticeable, and the condition of the atmosphere affected the stability of the machine. Despite the fact that there has been an aerodrome in Hastings for some time past, Capt. Brake stated that there was a general rush yesterday for passengers anxious to make flights, and during the afternoon no less than 35 passengers were carried. The people were most anxious that the machine should be kept there over the holidays, but knowing that he was expected in Gisborne and that many here were anxious to make flights, he decided to come on. His arrival over the town was the sign for a general lifting of heads and as soon as it was apparent that the machine was going to land on the beach as usual, large crowds made their way in that direction. The landing, which was effected without difficulty, despite the stropwind, was watched by several hundred people.

He gave the details of deceased's death, saying that he never spoke after falling over. A verdict was returned, in accordance with the medical evidence.

Mr Newrick also met several old Hastings residents during his tour, and they one and all were- anxious in their enquiries about old friends and the town for which they still have a deep regard. "I could tell you a lot more about the places I have visited," said Mr Newrick to a "Tribune" reporter this morning -"but, although Mrs Newrick and myself have thoroughly enjoyed the fortnight's tour, I can assure you that I have not been in a place that I like so much as I do Hastings."


