The Minister in charge of airraid precautions (Sir John Anderson), moving the second reading of the Civil Defence Bill, said that it imposed heavy responsibilities and financial burdens which could be regarded as intolerable in normal times, but there was no disposition in any quarter to question its necessity.

The Bill empowered local authorities to designate buildings as public shelters or for other air-raid precautions purposes. There was provision for compensation and the requisitioning in emergency of premises and vehicles.

The Bill could impose a liability of over £25,000,000 in addition to a recurring charge of £120,000 for 40 years. Some sections would become operative as a precautionary measure immediately after the second reading of the Bill.



BRITISH AIR PRODUCTION NOW AT FULL CAPACITY

Powerful Defences Still Being Increased: Air Defence Cadets Scheme

British Official Wireless. (Received April 5, 7 p.m.)

RUGBY, April 4.

The Air Minister (Sir Kingsley Wood), speaking at Liverpool on aircraft production, said that the Government had taken many steps to add to the strength of the nation's defences, and he was glad to see that the aircraft industry, which some time ago was considerably extended, was now working to full capacity with energy and speed.

They had also in the last year greatly broadened the basis of the production of aircraft and greatly extended the policy of taking work to labour.

Some 3500 firms were now engaged in sub-contracting Their labour forces in aircraft production generally were being steadily increased monthly, and during the last few months had been increased by 40 per cent.

At the same time they had greatly increased their capacity in manufacturing engines, materials, components, accessories of armaments and equipment of all kinds, and he could say with confidence that the new British aircraft were as formidable as any in the world.

In the types now being issued to the bomber and fighting forces, Britain possessed the best in the world. Efforts had still to be intensified, but they could register to-day a great increase in their intrinsic strength, which was becoming cumulatively more powerful.

To-day's conversations between Sir Kingsley Wood and the French Air Minister (M. la Chambre), who is at present in Britain, ranged over a wide field. It is understood that they have been principally concerned with facilitating the productive effort of the two countries in respect of air frames, aero engines, accessories and equipment generally.

POLAND ANXIOUS FOR NEW PEACE FRONT

Colonel Beck Urges Removal Of **Danzig From League Control**

LONDON, April 5. There is the greatest official reticence regarding the progress of the Anglo-Polish talks. It is understood that the Polish Foreign Minister (Colonel Beck) made it clear that he was

ready to conclude a pact for reciprocal guarantees on certain conditions, also that Poland was ready for close co-operation with Rumania in strengthening the peace front.

Colonel Beck urged the advisability of persisting with efforts to include Hungary in the line-up, though he admitted that it would be most difficult for Hungary to resist German

He also argued against the inclusion of Russia in any alliance and suggested that Danzig should be removed from League control and placed under a commission of three, a Pole, a German and a neutral, preferably a Dane.

Poland was unwilling to enter a general alliance for collective security, which was made clear in the Warsaw paper "Dobrywieczor" which was quoted by all Polish radio stations last night as representing the official viewpoint.

"Poland's traditional policy is the preservation of the bal-

ance of power. It is Germany's fault not Poland's that this balance is disturbed. "Poland now wishes to restore it, but wants only bilateral treaties, and England now realises this desire and also understands Poland's objections to co-operate with Russia against Germany and with Germany against Russia."

While the Poles fear that an alliance between Poland and Russia would exacerbate German hostility it is reported that Colonel Beck raised the point that a bilateral treaty between England and Russia would secure all the advantages of a grand alliance, while avoiding the disadvantages.







# WHY ALBANIA?

The reports of Italian moves to adopt Albania under a "protectorate" (after the Hitler fashion) must be puzzling to many people. Why Albania? What can Signor Mussolini want with it?

To answer these questions one must go back some time to the formation of the independent Albanian state before and during the war period. In 1812 Austria-Hungary and Italy together supported a movement of the Albanian people to break away from Turkey, chiefly on the basis that they wished to exclude a third Power from the Adriatic Sea. The Balkan States (Serbia, Rumania and Bulgaria), supported by France and Russia, strongly opposed this move, as it was believed that the encirclement of the Adriatic might be the precursor of a push to the East, and it was only the intervention of Great Britain which prevented a war between the major

Powers. A conference was subsequently called in London, and in 1913 the independence of Albania was acknowledged and proclaimed. Meantime, both Greece and Italy had been active. Troops from both states occupied portions of Albania, which by then had become recognised as the key to the Adriatic Sea, and possibly one of the most important strategic points in south-east Europe.

At length the Italian occupation became general, and eventually Albania passed under Italian protection in 1917, though still retaining its nominal independence.

After the war, Yugo-Slavia attempted to annex portions

of northern Albania, but an allied commission intervened and a provisional government was established. In the meantime, the unhappy Albanians had become desperate as a result of the Italian occupation. They feared that Italy was prepared to barter portions of Albania to Yugo-Slavia and Greece, in return for their acquiescence in a major Italian annexation, and finally Albanian irregulars attacked the Italians and drove them back to the sea-coast. Italy, realising that this was an appropriate occasion for a grand gesture, formally recognised the new Albanian independent Government, and withdrew her troops completely.

Yugo-Slavia, then again endeavoured to carve a slice out of the northern Albania, and in 1921 Britain was forced to intervene in order to smooth over the extreme tension which was created. Finally, a Conference of Ambassadors in London defined Albania's frontiers late in 1921, and in 1926 the signing of a protocol in Paris completely established the integrity of the state.

Since then Italy has been fairly active in Albania. Italian financial interests were virtually placed in control of the country, and many concessions were granted. Apart from strategic considerations, Albania has much of value to offer. She has immense forests—and Italy lacks timber—and portions of the interior are very fertile and capable of sustaining a large population. From Italy's point of view she would be a valuable acquisition.

Nevertheless, it is the strategic value with which Italy is primarily concerned. In the event of a war in which Yugo-Slavia would be on the side opposed to Italy, Albania would be of immense importance. In the first place, with the possession of Albania, Italy could seal the Adriatic, thus cutting communications between the Mediterranean and Yugo-Slavia and Rumania. And since Austria, Hungary, and the Germanised Czech State lie to the north and north-west, Yugo-Slavia (and, for that matter, Rumania) would be almost completely encircled.

In addition, with Albania as a base, Italy could drive across the Balkan Peninsula to the Black Sea, and a German-Italian alliance would thus be able to complete a "pincer" movement from the north and the south, engulfing the Balkan

Knowing what we do now of the tactics adopted by the dictators, any move to bring Albania under the "protection" of Italy would be highly significant. It is impossible to overlook the full implications of the strategic advantage so gained by Signor Mussolini, and it must not be overlooked that the move has come at a time when Britain and France are preoccupied with Germany.

It would appear that Mr Chamberlain should repeat his warning to Herr Hitler, directing it this time to the Caesar of the South. There is too much at stake, too many dangers involved, for such a move to pass unchecked. We must adhere to the dictum that the day of the aggressor is ended.

# Insect Pest

Insects have been more than usually troublesome in the Dominion during the past month or two, and autumn field and garden crops have suffered heavily in consequence. Dr. G. H. Cunningham, director of the Plant Diseases Division, said that the white butterfly, the diamond back moth and the cabbage fly had caused considerable damage in the North Island. In Canterbury, the aphis had been the greatest nuisance. The ravages of the pests, combined with the long dry spell, had given a severe setback to crops in most districts, the position being most acute in Hawke's Bay and Canterbury. Auckland, by comparison, had been fortunate.

# "Taxation Must Be Checked To Prevent Men Leaving Land": Guaranteed Price?

By Telegraph—Press Association.

TIMARU, April 5.

A mass demonstration by farmers of South Canterbury was held to-day to discuss the rapidly deteriorating position of the industry. There was an attendance of 1200. speaker was Mr W. W. Mulholland, Dominion president of the Farmers' Union, who discussed at length the problem of rising costs, which, he contended, was the cause of the serious position of the farmer to-day.

He had pointed out to the Government that costs were increasing and prices were being lessened, but regretted that nothing had been done to check the position. Mr Mulholland said that the result of carrying out only part of the Government's policy was that there had been established in New Zealand two levels of values, one for goods used in New Zealand and the other for goods produced in New Zealand and

In other words, there were two pounds, one valued at £125 for £100 sterling, on which overseas trade was based, and the other the pound on which the farmers had to buy the goods necessary for production, and this pound bore no relation whatever to the other pound.

The only solution of the present situation was to get the two pounds into closer relationship. The burden of taxation would have to be removed if the farmers were to be prevented from going off their lands.

EVICTED FROM HOME IN AUCKLAND

"I am a labourer, but in the past year I have had only four months' work. Sometimes I have got sustenance, and sometimes not. The last job I had was for three weeks, and I am about £21 behind with the rent.

"My wife has been very ill for the past 3½ years. Because I was behind with the rent I was summonsed about three weeks ago to appear before the Magistrate's Court, but my solicitor said it was not worth while appearing. I did not, and the Court made an order for immediate possession.

"With my wife I left home about 10 o'clock this morning, neighbours minding the children," Mr Stewart continued. "I had to report at the Labour Office at 2 p.m. and while I was there a man came down and told me that my furniture had been put out into the street.

# CANCELLATION OF THE £66,000 HOSPITAL LOAN

# Urgent Representations Made To HON. P. FRASER HEARS The Minister Of Health At Napier

Urgent representations for the cancellation of the Hawke's Bay Hospital Board's earthquake loan of £66,000, and assistance in securing a new loan of £87,000 for a proposed new building programme, were made to the Minister of Health, the Hon. Peter Fraser, by a large deputation representing leading local bodies in Hastings, Napier, Wairoa, Havelock North, Taradale and Greenmeadows, which waited upon the Minister at Napier yesterday morn-

The disastrous effects of the 1931 earthquake were recalled by various speakers, who claimed that the greater portion of the £750,000 required for the rebuilding of Napier should have been provided in the form of free grants instead of loan money. It was a national disaster and should have been treated as such by the Government of the day.

Opening the discussion the chairman of the Napier Hospital Board (Mr C. Lassen) who presided at the meeting, stated that the Minister had been particularly anxious that the schools in the district should be rehabilitated to a standard equal to that which existed prior to the Opening the discussion the chair- course of events these would have rehabilitated to a standard equal to that which existed prior to the 1931 calamity. "It is a duty and a pleasure to extend to the Minister a hearty welcome," said the chairman of the school committee (Mr R. E. Talbot). Speaking of ground improvements, Mr Talbot said: "Somehow we seemed to have "missed the bus" in the matter of grants to aid us in this direction, but we hope to have the grounds of our school nicely laid out in the future."






