BRITAIN TO WARN ITALY NOT TO MOLEST GREECE

IMMEDIATE ACTION TO CHECK ITALIAN ASPIRATIONS

DEFENCE HEADS CONFER IN LONDON

United Press Association-Copyright. (Independent Cable Service) (Received April 11, 2.30 a.m.)

It is understood that the British Ambassador to Paris (Sir Eric Phipps) had talks with the French Premier (M. Daladier) and the Foreign Minister (M. Bonnet) last night, and informed them that Britain intended immediately to warn Italy through the British Ambassador to Rome (Lord Perth) that she was ready to oppose any attempt against Greece, particularly Corfu.

The British battleship Malaya has departed from Mentone, on the southern coast of France, for an unknown

An earlier message stated that with the Italian occupation of Albania virtually completed and a temporary Cabinet set up at Tirana, the Albanian capital, there were signs that Britain and France were concerned at the implications of the Italian invasion, particularly as they may affect Greece. Sudden diplomatic and staff consultations in Paris and London gave significance to the latest moves.

The British Foreign Secretary (Viscount Halifax) saw the Greek Minister and the Italian Charge d'Affaires (Signor Crolla) three times.

In these interviews with Signor Crolla, which, it may be assumed, resulted from certain disquieting reports regarding the general situation following Friday's Italian initiative in Albania, Lord Halifax'left Signor Crolla in no doubt as to the serious view taken by Britain of the Italian action in Albania, as well as to the strength of British feeling on the subject.

Signor Crolla gave Lord Halifax an assurance in firm and categorical terms regarding the strictly limited character of the Italian action in Albania.

Due note was taken by Lord Halifax of this assurance, the terms of which have been made known to the British Ambassador to Rome (Lord Perth).

Bonnet saw the British Ambassador after which he went to the Champs d'Elysees to report to President Lebrun. M. Daladier's conference with the defence chiefs lasted for two hours.









"ISMS" AND SCHISMS

This might well be termed the age of ideologies. And, as such, it has witnessed the most profound disturbances between State and State, and man and man. It is disturbing to think that the blind following of this or that political faith can blind mankind to the greater truths of right, justice, and broad common sense, or to the claims of civilisation as a whole to supersede petty ambitions or gross materiality.

This does not imply that we should desert realism for impracticable idealism. It is, rather, intended to convey that we should apply realism to our idealism, recognise the faults and limitations of man, and aim, not to introduce measures for the relief of difficulties created by these faults, but to eradicate the faults themselves.

And our greatest fault is prejudice—the individual glorification of an "ism" to the exclusion of all else. It is this fault which makes our wars, which to-day is working for the greatest conflict of all time, and which, even within the borders of our own country, sets man against man in a struggle to impose a regime of one colour or another.

It is not impossible to bridge divisions of opinion. We have in New Zealand a Court of Arbitration which has done much to avoid the danger of open class warfare between employer and employee. This term is deliberately usedthere are those who cannot recognise the mutual dependence of all classes, and who have gone out of their way to foment discord and strife, often for selfish purposes. No one section of the community has any moral or practical right to claim precedence over all others, and any man encouraging class segregation is rendering a grave disservice to the community

The Court of Arbitration is the meeting-place to settle differences of opinion in a sane and realistic manner. It is one of the few instruments we have created to overcome the results of our own stupidities and prejudice. With such an example before us-even with its imperfections-we should recognise that, in almost everything, there is room for consideration of the other man's view.

We have seen what a battle of "isms" can do in Spain and other unhappy countries. We have seen the dire results of "go slow" policies, strikes, lock-outs, and other weapons of aggressive opinionism. Surely we have now sense enough to realise that the welfare of the whole community depends upon small sacrifices—whether of opinion or in more material things-from all sections, in order that the progress of the whole may not be impeded.

After all, we have a common objective. Whether we himself. Though we have left the jungle far behind, its influence is still strong. Passion, sentiment, and the lust for material things still wage in confusion with clear thought and pure reason. Man's destiny truly lies in his head.

baser emotions is the only thing which will save this world from disaster. At loose at the moment are forces which recognise no laws but the laws of the jungle; whose supporters think with their hearts or their stomachs, and who are prepared to trample upon anyone and anything in order to gratify material desires. These forces exalt an ideology above the greater and fundamental rights of humanity. They offer a perfect example of the danger of "isms" without understanding.

During this Easter, from the various churches there has come a call to men to recognise that their destiny far transcends the importance of political, partisan, or nationalistic triumphs. There must be "that mutual understanding which encourages people to follow the lighted path of civilised progress.

Immunity From Disease

SEARCH FOR VACCINE

Two scientists, working independently in different cities, announced discoveries simultaneously in different scientific journals.

At Johns Hopkins University, Roscoe R. Hyde told in the magazine "Science" of discovering that germs of type 3 pneumonia will help to vaccinate rabbits successfully against a fatal disease known as infectious myxomatosis. There is no apparent connection between the rabbit infection and pneumonia.

Discoveries Confirmed. He also confirmed previous discoveries that the rabbit disease can be prevented with still another "alien" substance extracted from "alien" substance extracted from fibroid tumors.

fibroid tumors.

An entirely different "line" came to light in use of artificial vaccines, immunising substances that are cooked up in test tubes, reported by Walther F. Goebel, Ph.D., in the Journal of Experimental Medicine. This is the publication of the Rockefeller Institute which deals with excursions into the medical unknown that are years ahead of the doctors' remedies.

Dr. Goebel mixed up a chemical based on sugar and named azobenzyl glycoside of cellobiuronic acid. Its likeness to sugar is only in the fact that its atoms are strung together somewhat like sugar.

This vaccine immunised mice This vaccine immunised mice against types two, three and eight pneumonia. It immunised rabbits against type three pneumonia.

More General Type.
The important point in Dr. Goebel's experiment was the fact that the type of immunity was more "general" than usual in pneumonia. This "general" resistance to disease is the whole point of the universal vaccine hunt. The search is based on the fact that human immunity is carried by chemical substances which all appears to be simimunity is carried by chemical substances which all appear to be similar and are known as anti-bodies.

But in man it has not yet been true that the vaccine which would protect against one disease, such as smallpox, caused immunity against any other illness. 
