BRITAIN TO WARN ITALY NOT TO MOLEST GREECE

IMMEDIATE ACTION TO CHECK ITALIAN ASPIRATIONS

DEFENCE HEADS CONFER IN LONDON

United Press Association—Copyright. (Independent Cable Service) (Received April 11, 2.30 a.m.)

PARIS, April 10.

It is understood that the British Ambassador to Paris (Sir Eric Phipps) had talks with the French Premier (M. Daladier) and the Foreign Minister (M. Bonnet) last night, and informed them that Britain intended immediately to warn Italy through the British Ambassador to Rome (Lord Perth) that she was ready to oppose any attempt against Greece, particularly Corfu.

The British battleship Malaya has departed from Mentone, on the southern coast of France, for an unknown destination.

An earlier message stated that with the Italian occupation of Albania virtually completed and a temporary Cabinet set up at Tirana, the Albanian capital, there were signs that Britain and France were concerned at the implications of the Italian invasion, particularly as they may affect Greece. Sudden diplomatic and staff consultations in Paris and London gave significance to the latest moves.

The British Foreign Secretary (Viscount Halifax) saw the Greek Minister and the Italian Charge d'Affaires (Signor Crolla) three times.

In these interviews with Signor Crolla, which, it may be assumed, resulted from certain disquieting reports regarding the general situation following Friday's Italian initiative in Albania, Lord Halifax left Signor Crolla in no doubt as to the serious view taken by Britain of the Italian action in Albania, as well as to the strength of British feeling on the subject.

Signor Crolla gave Lord Halifax an assurance in firm and categorical terms regarding the strictly limited character of the Italian action in Albania.

Due note was taken by Lord Halifax of this assurance, the terms of which have been made known to the British Ambassador to Rome (Lord Perth).

Defence Heads Meet.

The French Prime Minister interrupted his holiday at Rambouillet, returned to Paris and summoned the following to meet at the War Ministry: M. La Chambre, Air Minister, M. Campinchi, Navy Minister, General Gamelin, chief-of-staff of the French armed forces, General Georges, field commander, General Vuillemin, chief of the air staff, and Vice-Admiral d'Arlan, chief of naval operations.

The Foreign Minister initiated this sudden activity after telephoning the British Embassy. He returned to Paris from his country home and telephoned M. Daladier, urging him to return. M. Bonnet saw the British Ambassador after which he went to the Champs d'Élysées to report to President Lebrun.

M. Daladier's conference with the defence chiefs lasted for two hours.

British Activity.

Meanwhile, the British Prime Minister (Mr Neville Chamberlain) has returned to London from Scotland, where he went to spend the Easter holidays. Cabinet was to meet on Monday morning.

In London, Lord Halifax and Sir Alexander Cadogan, of the Foreign Office staff, conferred with Major

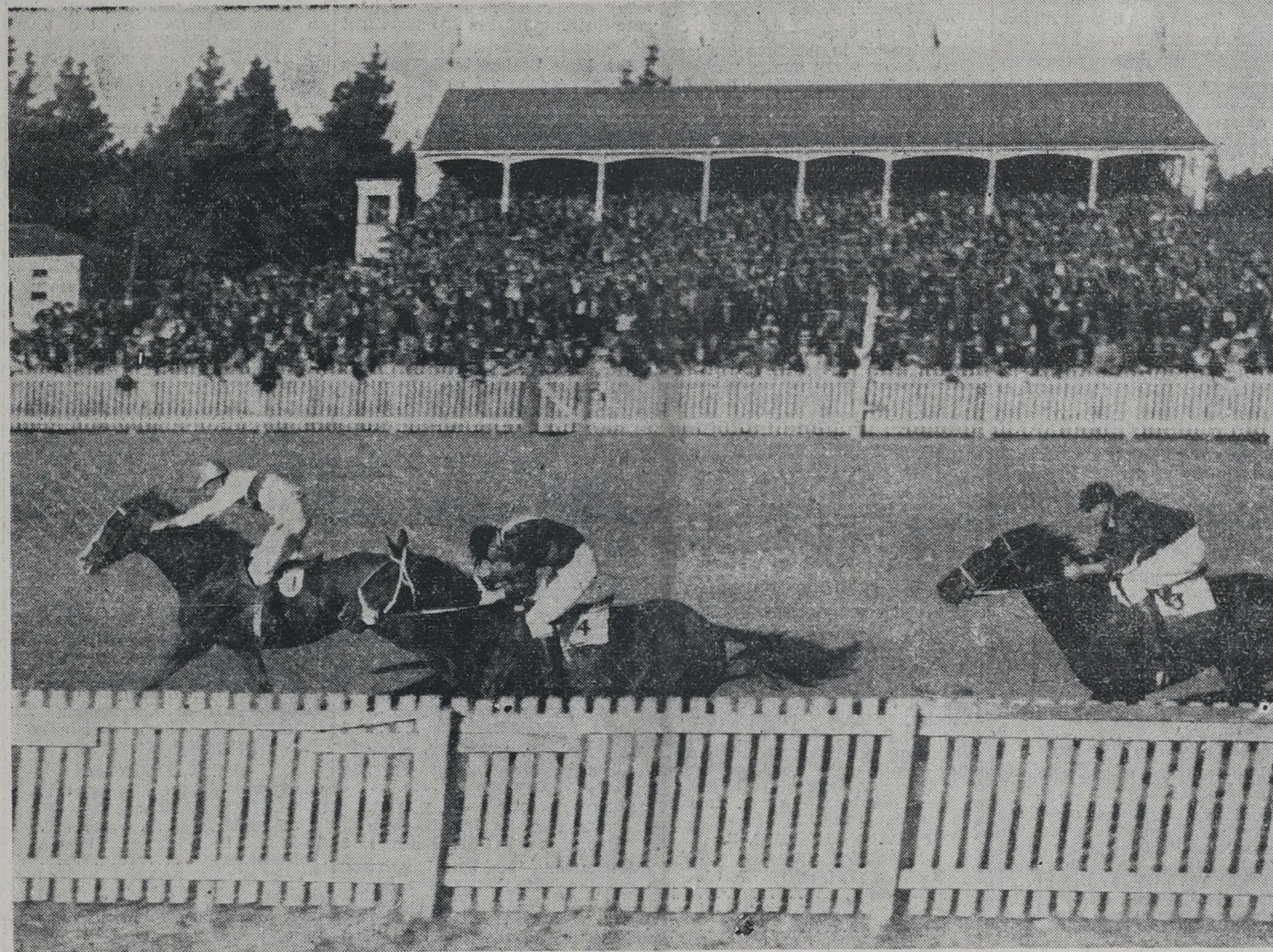


M. BONNET, who called the French Defence heads together in M. Daladier's absence.

General Viscount Gort, Imperial defence chief, and Vice-Admiral Cunningham, chief of the naval staff, at the office of the Imperial Defence Committee.

The British Admiralty denies reports from Berlin and Rome that British naval units have landed on Corfu, the Greek island off the southern extremity of Albania.

At Athens, Greek officials deny rumours that strong British and French naval squadrons have arrived in Greek waters. It is explained that three British warships were seen 35 miles north of Corfu and that possibly they belong to a squadron which is engaged on a spring cruise.

MOSLEM INDIGNATION AT INVASION

"Heinous Crime And Outrage Against Humanity"

ANGER AGAINST ITALY

Widespread Moslem indignation is felt at the invasion and bombardment of Albania. Sir Khwaja Nazimuddin, Home Minister in Bengal, in a speech at a Moslem conference, condemned "this heinous crime and outrage against humanity."

An independent Cable message from Paris says that the French President (M. Lebrun) and the Premier (M. Daladier) have received protests from Mohammedan leaders in Tunisia, Algeria, and Morocco, at the invasion of Albania. The entire Mohammedan world in North Africa is highly indignant and would be united in supporting any move to prevent further Italian aggression.

Record Trip Of 2400 Miles

EMPIRE FLYING-BOAT

Ten Passengers And Two Tons Of Rail

The Empire flying-boat Challenger made a record flight of 2400 miles from Alexandria to Southampton in 16 hours 52 minutes, averaging with a half-hour stop at each of Athens, Brindisi, Rome and Marseilles, 170 miles an hour. The Challenger carried ten passengers and two tons of mail.

Misunderstanding Due To Investigation Of Clothing

Returning to-day after spending his Easter holidays in the country, T. A. Andreassen read in the evening paper that a man believed to be him had died in the public hospital yesterday after being found lying unconscious in the yard of the Duke of Edinburgh Hotel.

He immediately telephoned the detective office and was told that someone had identified the body as his.

After a visit to a morgue, however, Andreassen was able to identify the dead man as a friend of his, Frank Bray. Andreassen's name it appears, first became associated with the accident when it was found that the victim was wearing some clothes that had belonged to him. Other articles Bray had with him bore Andreassen's name, and, strangely enough, another man identified the body as his.

The Real Victim.

Bray was found lying unconscious in the yard of the Duke of Edinburgh hotel at 3 p.m. on Saturday.

He was taken to hospital, where he died yesterday from a fractured skull. The police believe that when entering the yard, Bray fell down some steps and struck his head on the concrete edge of a sump. A post-mortem examination revealed no other signs of injury to the body.

"ALBANIAN COUP A BLOW TO ITALY'S GOOD REPUTE"

A Warning To Britain To Stem The Totalitarian Advance: Yugoslavia Threatened

United Press Association—Copyright. (Received April 10, 11.30 p.m.) LONDON, April 10.

A leader in "The Times" says that the British Cabinet is not wasting any time on the Italian pretext that the oppressed Albanians invited invasion.

"The recent exploits of the Axis have exalted the junior partner much more than the patentee of the totalitarian idea. It was time to gratify Italian pride.

"Albania was small enough to offer a dramatic coup with little risk, yet the Duce disastrously undermined his good repute in quarters to which he is not indifferent.

"The Pope's allocution is not obscure. The revulsion of Moslem opinion at the seizure of a Moslem Dominion cannot be a light matter to the 'Protector of Islam,' nor is it profitable to provoke Mr Cordell Hull's denunciation.

"The British Cabinet may assume that Good Friday's offensive is a step towards the more substantial objective to which both dictators are parties. Albania is a bridge-head to the Balkans, enabling pressure upon Yugoslavia and Greece in order to prevent concerted measures for security.

"Such a manoeuvre, if successful, would not be the last. Rumania and Turkey lie beyond. Britain must speedily and decisively pursue her momentous departure in foreign policy, the furtherance of which Ministers must consider.

"The threat to Yugoslavia now comes from two sides. The first objective of British diplomacy must be the achievement of a common understanding on resistance to domination."

According to a Rome message Duce's mouthpiece, Signor Gayda, writing in the newspaper "Voce d'Italia," referring to the suggestion that the invasion of Albania infringes the letter and spirit of the Anglo-Italian agreement, says: "Perhaps Britain, who is never satisfied, intends to extend her encirclement policy to the Adriatic against Italy, as she is doing against Germany.

DOES ROOSEVELT FEAR OUTBREAK OF WAR?

Cryptic Utterance By U.S. President Unexplained

CONCERN OVER EUROPE

United Press Association—Copyright. (Received April 10, 10.40 p.m.) WARM SPRINGS (Georgia), April 9.

"I will be back in the autumn if we don't have war," President Roosevelt, standing on the rear platform of his train, told the crowd gathered at the station as he prepared to return to Washington after a holiday.

The President uttered no other word. The crowd waited speechless and motionless for further explanation of what Mr Roosevelt meant, but he turned, still smiling, and entered his private car, leaving the crowd and journalists to place their own interpretation on his remarks.

There was no hint whether Mr Roosevelt was voicing concern only lest Europe might become involved in a war, or whether he feared that the United States was also threatened with being involved. The use of the word "we" seemed to indicate the latter.

At any rate, there is no doubt about the reality of Mr Roosevelt's concern over developments in Europe.

According to a New York message, the Washington correspondent of the "New York Times" says that it is learned, from sources close to the President, that it is the collective judgment of ranking American observers in Europe, as given to the President by transatlantic telephone, that war on the Continent is extremely probable within a few weeks.

The "New York Times" correspondent comments: "Accidentally or by design, each elucidation recently of the President's attitude on the struggle between the European democracies and dictatorships has fol-

Ministers Confer For Over Two Hours

ALBANIA UNDER FASCISM

ITALIAN DOMINATION OF ADRIATIC

GUNS IN COMMAND

Troops Encamped Near Greek Frontier

United Press Association—Copyright. (Received April 10, 11.30 p.m.) TIRANA, April 10.

The occupation of Albania has ceased to be a military problem. Italian troops are encamped along the Greek and Yugoslavian frontiers.

The reconstruction of the country according to Fascist ideas has begun. Italian gendarmes have resumed police duty. Italian reinforcements are still reaching Durazzo.

Italy can close the Adriatic without using her navy because Italian guns now face each other on either side of the sea.

Scutari is normal, having surrendered to Bersaglieri. The victors made a peace gesture by hauling down the white flag and replacing it with the Albanian, not the Italian, flag.

The surrender followed an armistice after a gun fight in which each side lost one killed and 15 wounded. A decree orders the giving up of all arms within 48 hours.

The Italians released two Albanian officers who were imprisoned by their compatriots because the officers refused to cease fire until their ammunition was exhausted.

The crowd in the glorious Italian Army, and hopefully awaiting the execution of Count Ciano's programme of order, prosperity and justice.

A Tirana message says that the President of the provisional Government has circumscribed prefects and sub-prefects throughout the country appealing for obedience to Italian troops and ordering that they should be received warmly and respectfully.

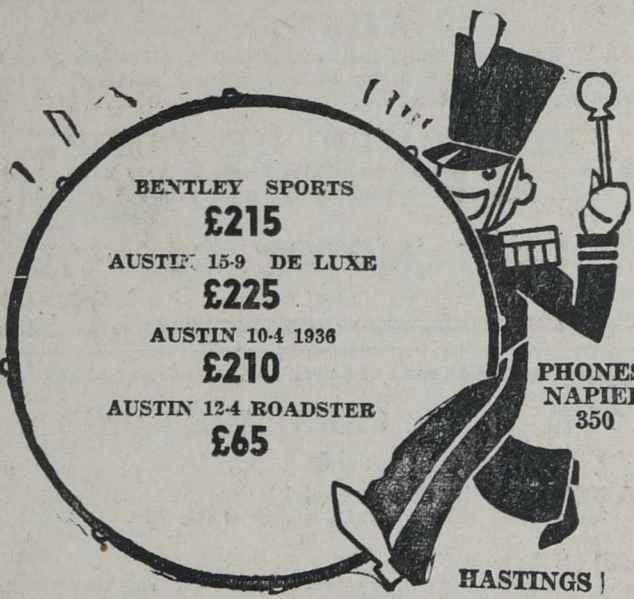

DOMINION FAT LAMBS

AUSTRALIAN PRAISES QUALITY UNIFORM TYPE

Comparison With His Own Country

Despite New Zealand's wide climatic range, the almost exclusive use of the Romney-Southdown cross for fat lamb purposes gives the Dominion a uniformity of type and quality that is not obtained in Australia.

That is the opinion of Mr C. J. Daley, one of New South Wales' district sheep and wool instructors, who has just returned from an extensive tour of New Zealand, made to investigate the more recent developments of breed types in the Dominion, and to purchase stud sheep for various breeders in his district (Wagga), says the "Sydney Morning Herald".

"Australian Southdown breeders have inclined too much towards comparatively small sheep, he said, phased show standards," said Mr Daley, "and are breeding less profitable types of smaller, slower maturing animals."

With the exception of Canterbury and the lesser important Marlborough provinces, the type of breeding ewe to be found on the agricultural and better class grazing country in New Zealand is almost entirely the Romney. To this is joined the Southdown ram.

Mr Daley said that New Zealand is limited to the carrying of different lines from Australia in the matter of the Romney and Southdown types. At present we do not favour the thick, deep, heavy-fleshed comparatively small sheep, he said, though several of our better-known breeders, by the importation of New Zealand stock, are developing this type. Generally speaking, we err towards the bigger, less compactly built, but wool qualities rather than for type and fleshing.

Uniform Type

New Zealand studmasters favour the heavy lock wool type, he said, contending that such wool is invariably associated with better bone and constitution, and that it produces more solid fibre, and earlier maturity. He added that the influence of the Waioicongomai stud blood on leading Dominion Romney flocks had done much to raise the level of standards and uniformity of type in Dominion sheep.

Southdown sale flock rams are definitely heavier and much better grown than Australian rams of the same weight, he said. "A 'big little sheep' was the invariable reply when New Zealanders were questioned as to type of breeders most favoured. This was borne out by the fact that the average weight of solid ram sold freely from eight to 15 guineas. Quality and breeding, together with compactness and depth of fleshing, are highly prized features of the Southdown breed, but early maturity is the most valued quality, reflecting strikingly in feeding costs and cash returns.

A striking comparison of ideas was provided by the movement of the solid rams of the British breed, by breeders in the rival countries. Many Australian breeders in this regard may well take a lesson from Dominion breeders, said Mr Daley, and he urged the advice given in Dr. Hammond's report. In this matter qualities of maturity, fleshing, and covering may be more accurately appraised by intending buyers.

Value of Pedigree

New Zealand studmasters avail themselves of the more recent developments of genetics. This was most noticeable, Mr Daley said, in the leading studs, where performance of the individual in relation to pedigree are kept in mind. At Waioicongomai Stud, a pedigree of two stud Romney rams being exported to England was inspected, tracing back completely for 13 generations. This presented a most interesting and careful breeder and purchaser. He said these records were a common practice among the better-class studs, irrespective of breed.

The heavy pedigree trade of exporting stud sheep throughout the world, lately went to England, has been a big factor towards quality improvement in New Zealand.

Exploded Idea

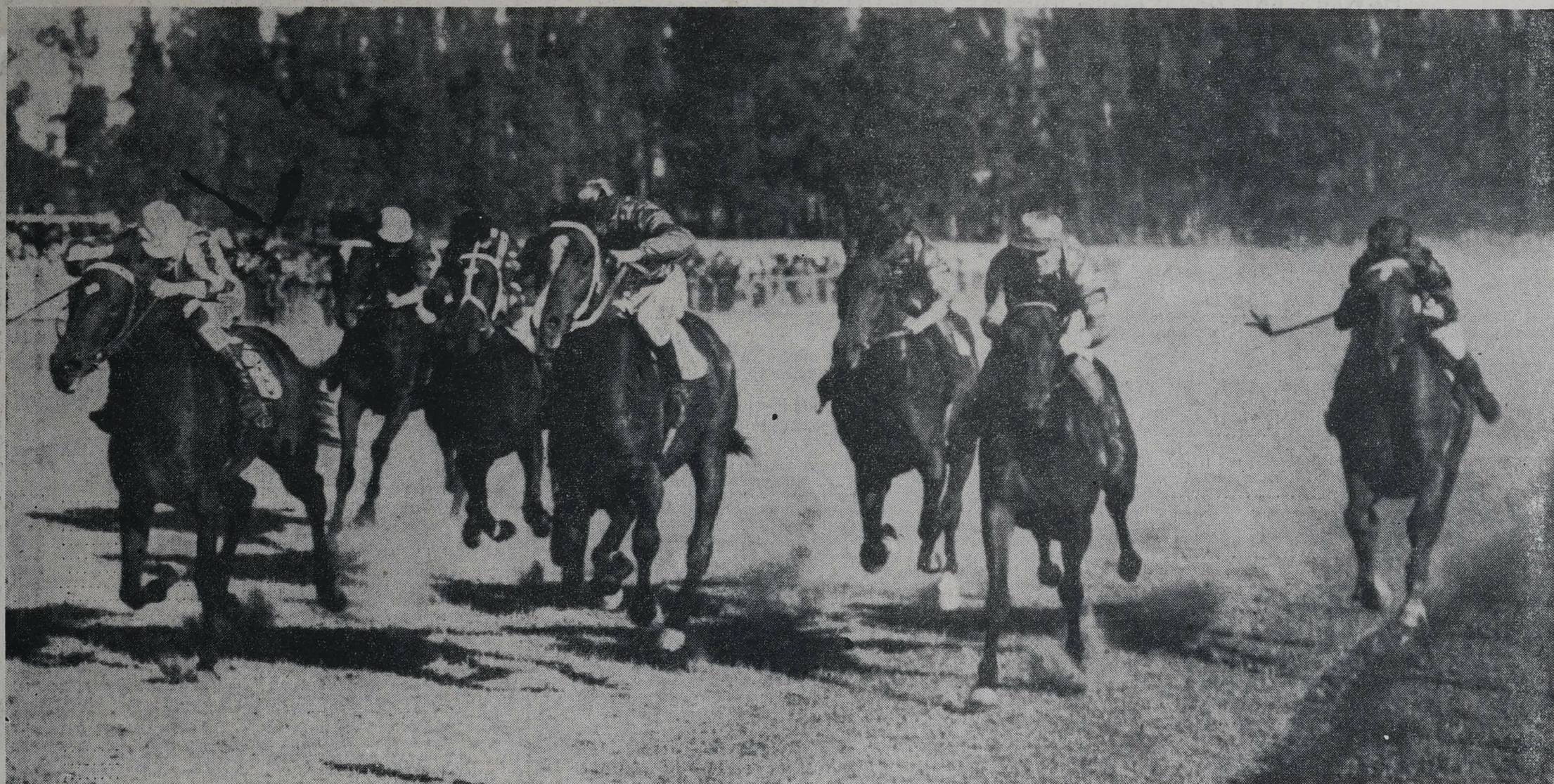
Contrary to accepted Australian ideas, said Mr Daley, Canterbury is not the premier lamb-producing district of the Dominion. The Manawatu and Wairarapa districts in the North Island and Southland enjoy a higher reputation for quality. The Canterbury Province, he said, is to be found the greatest variation of breeds and types in New Zealand.

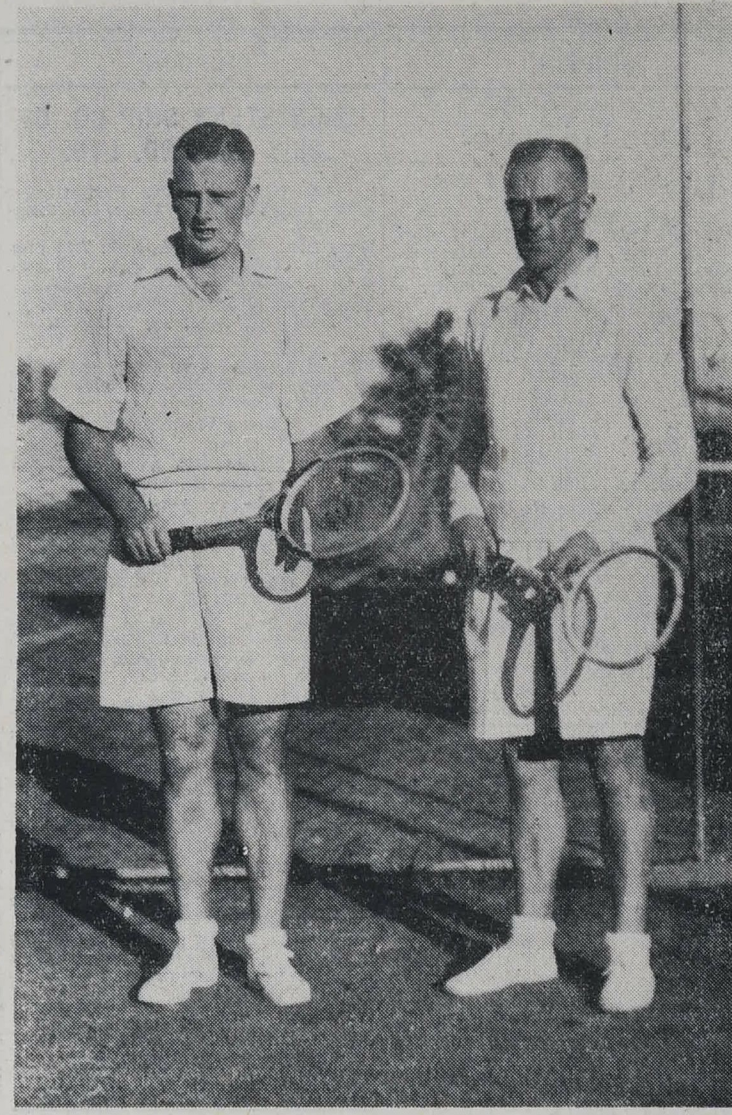

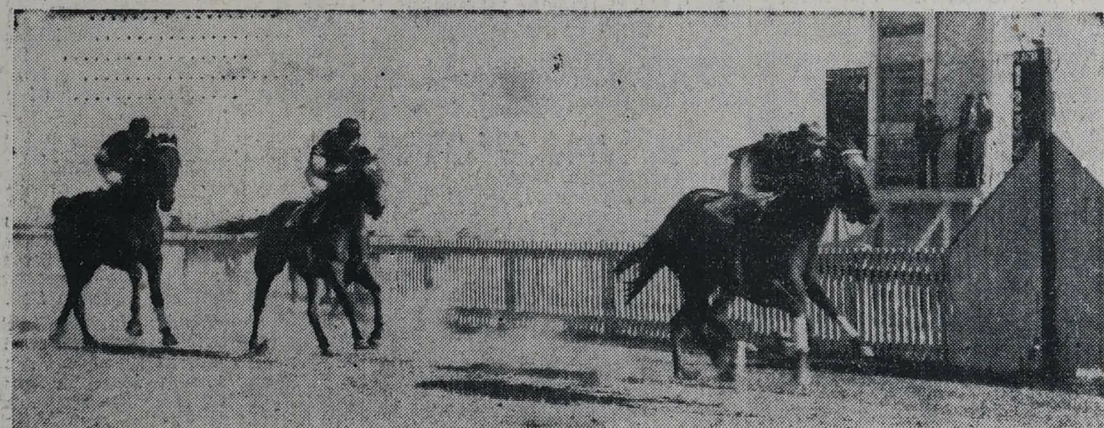

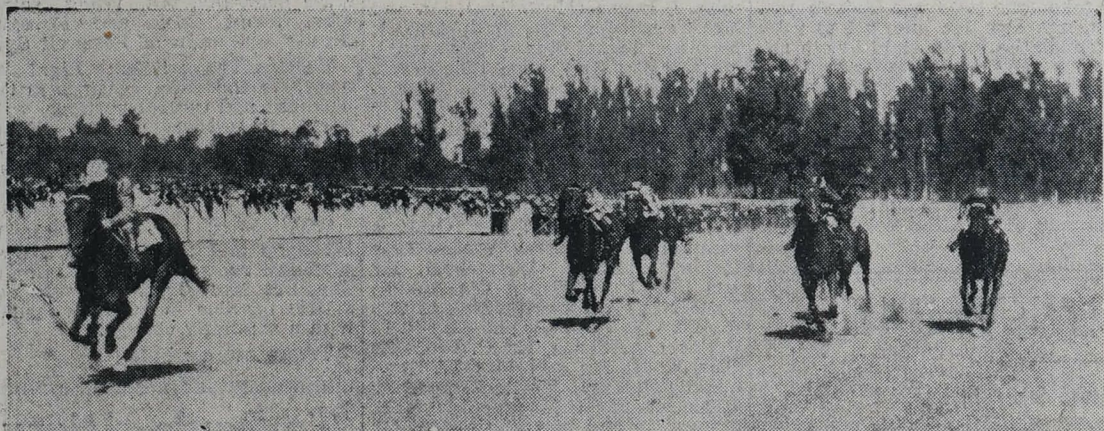

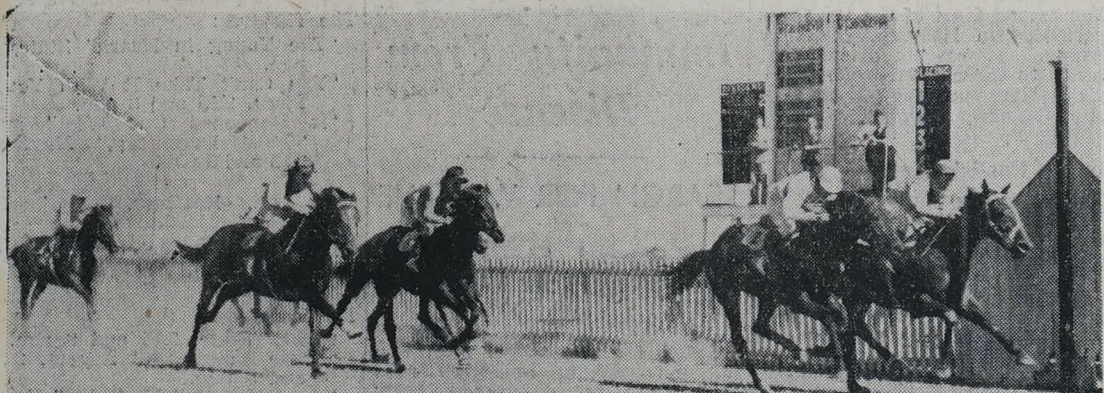

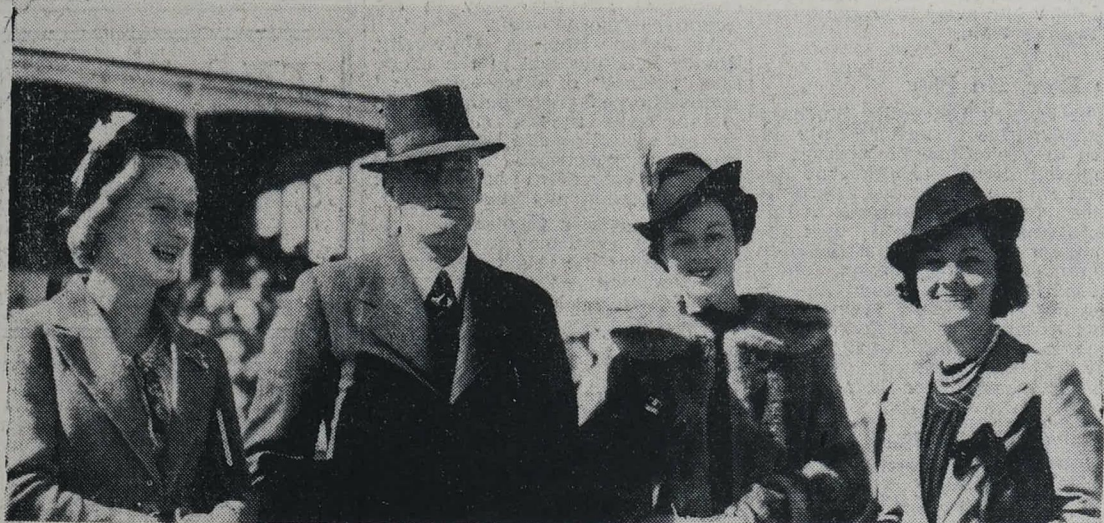



RECORD MEETING AT WAIPUKURAU GRANVALE SCORES IN CUP Classical And Golden Blonde Succeed DAY OF EXCITING FINISHES

(By MOTUROA).

Granvale won the Waipukurau Cup like a good class horse, but he was ridden perfectly throughout, whereas a number of the well-fancied candidates knocked themselves out chasing Charade and Fossicker, who set the main for a course record of 2.5 1-5 to be registered.

Granvale was never closer than seventh from the time they settled down until heads were fairly turned for home, but he simply flew when asked for his effort, and he had the measure of Big Dook nearly a furlong from the post. Over the concluding stages he won going away and thus bore out the good form he showed in finishing second in the Napier Cup.

Big Dook ran his best race for some time. He was never far away from the leaders, and he ran up to them two furlongs from home to take over control below the distance. However, ten furlongs is just a bit far for him, and he was weakening over the last 100 yards.

Pennycomequick, who made a promising run turning for home, could make no impression on the dividend payers, and had to be kept going to hold off the surprise favourite, Small Boy, who lost a good position about half a mile from home.

Otaki, Buster Brown (who was never out of trouble), and Fossicker were the next to finish.

It was the best Cup field that has lined up at Waipukurau for years, and the race was a particularly good one.

GOLDEN BLONDE was backed as a certainty for the Flying Handicap and her army of supporters were never in doubt. She began well and was going very easily when Peter Beckford and Flammarion challenged at the foot of the straight.

In the run home nothing looked like waiting her and she scored as she liked. Peter Beckford ran his best race on the circuit. He was always prominent and hung on fairly well. However, he was lucky to beat Flammarion for that position. The last named made a promising move coming into the straight, but ran right off the course and finished down the grandstand fence.

Buster Brown was never dangerous and the others were out of the hunt.

Classical Easily. Although she was very sore and could not raise a gallop for half a mile, Classical made up her ground fast at the three furlongs mark. The Ruatanui Handicap and she ran past the pacemakers Little Dorrit and Laughing Song below the distance. From that stage she drew right away, outstriking the others over the last furlong.

Boatsong, who had run up to the leaders turning for home, finished just a shade better than Little Dorrit, who attempted to win all the way.

Hunting Mint was a fair fourth, while Laughing Song stopped badly and finished last.

Classical was a class above the opposition.

An Overdue Win. After a string of minor placings and running good races in strong hack company, Little Dorrit opened her winning account in the Maiden Race, the heavy support for Defray making her price a good one. Defray and Cherry Picker were together next, well clear of Penny Farthing.

Two-year-olds Dead-heat. A length would have covered the four in the Pukeora Handicap and the judge was unable to separate Kobi and City Song, with Lord Midas half a head away, half a length in front of Te Maari.

Lord Midas and Kobi secured the best of the start and led across the top and into the straight four lengths ahead of City Song and Hinerangi, who were together. Lord Midas looked the winner at the distance, but Kobi then secured the upper hand and was being proclaimed until the last 50 yards when City Song swept up on the outer to be given a dead-heat. Kobi, however, looked unlucky to be deprived of an outright win.

Hinerangi stopped badly in the run home, and Tashi Lama headed her for fifth. Great Finish. The Hatuma Handicap was productive of a fine race up the straight. At the distance Screen Lord, Flying Acre, Halle Sclasse, Lindrum, Quay and Royal Pageant being lined across the track. However, Screen Lord and Flying Acre, who had made most of the running then drew out.

Flying Acre was actually in front 50 yards from home, but Forsyth got to work on Screen Lord and pushed him home a narrow winner in the last few strides.

Lindrum, who had been carrying a lot of condition, was a good third just ahead of Halle Sclasse, with Royal Pageant next.

Flying Acre looks well and should not be long in adding to his winning account.

Gay Mimic Well Ridden. Better ridden than any other horse in the race, Gay Mimic won the Ladies Handicap, but he had little to spare from Hatuma, who gave him a ridiculous start from the head of the straight.

Gay Mimic was always well placed and when the pacemakers Otaki, Doctor Defoe, and Umpire and Otaki began to feel the pinch two furlongs from home, he shot through to a clear lead. At this stage Hatuma was tailed off and he made an effort to go on the outside before his rider changed his mind and came back to the fence.

Lady Defray finished over the last furlong, but Gay Mimic was hanging over on him in the last 50 yards and he could not quite get through.

Bumble, who was pocketed most

of the way, finished on to beat Kobi for third, with Doctor Defoe and Royal Ceres next.

Otaki broke a fetlock a furlong from home and was later destroyed.

Another Close Finish. Forsyth figured in another close finish in the Purimu Handicap and he rode Native Song with everything available from the distance to beat the pacemaker, Quilp, on the post.

Quilp, who missed the jump-out in his earlier engagement, got the best of a straggling start in which the field was allowed to come in at a hand gallop and The Ring, Royal Spades and Flying Acre were left several lengths.

Quilp was well clear into the straight from Native Song, Cherry Picker, Halley, The Ring and Royal

Spades, the last named being wide out of the race.

Royal Spades finished well for third, being clear of The Ring, and Royal Pageant.

There was a record attendance at the Waipukurau Jockey Club's autumn meeting. The car paddocks filled early and late-comers were forced to park on the roads. Shortly after the first race, the supply of race-books ran out and the great crowd was reflected in the totalisator turnover. However, the lack of windows for selling tickets and paying dividends prevented much more being invested, as long queues were lined up all day.

However, a very satisfactory turnover of £13,512/10/- was recorded, compared with £10,605/10/- last year, the increase being £2907.

A feature of the day's racing was the feat of the young Gisborne trainer, I. T. Tinsley, leading in the last three winners, Gay Mimic, Native Song and Golden Blonde.

The Hastings horseman, J. Forsyth, was seen to good effect in two desperate finishes, in which he got his mounts home by the narrowest of margins. The Hastings apprentice, W. J. Mudford, was also in good form, winning the double on Granvale and Golden Blonde, and finishing second on Boatsong and Quilp.

The only untoward incident of the day was that the much-raced gelding Otaki broke a fetlock in the course of the running of the Ladies' Handicap.

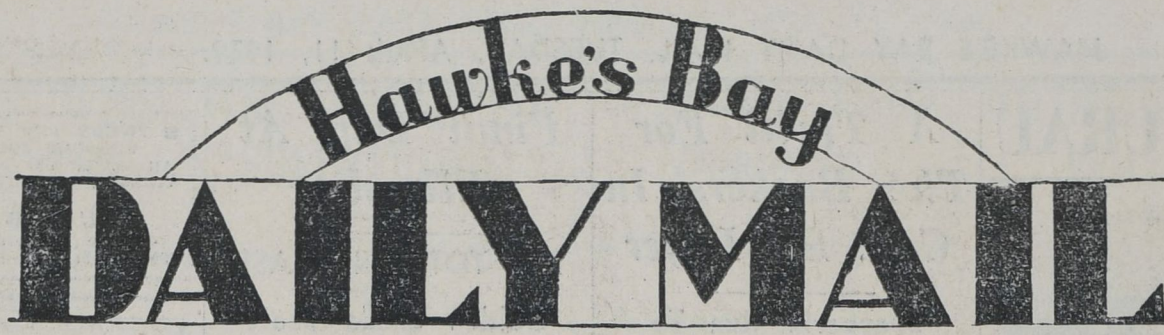
