OMINOUS NAVAL MOVEMENTS IN THE MEDITERRANEAN

INDICATIONS OF GROWING TENSION

The grave anxiety with which Britain, France, and their supporters view the present European situation is evidenced by the consultations which are taking place between the war staffs and the Governments concerned.

The chief events of the last few hours have been the dramatic appearance of 14 Soviet warships in the Mediterranean, apparently sailing for Greece; the sudden dispatch of the French Mediterranean Fleet for an unknown destination; and the declaration of a state of emergency in Greece, despite the Italian reassurances to that country.

Notice must be taken also of the reports of minority friction in Poland and Germany, and the calling up by Poland of additional reservists. All the minor Powers are taking precautions against a sudden surprise move, and British measures in the Mediterranean seem to be designed for the same purpose. Tension at the moment appears to be critical.







LEADING ARTICLES

The Labour Party has a perfect right to establish its own newspapers. This is the natural right of any free enterprise. But it should not be used as an excuse to level broad charges that all newspapers deliberately suppress or distort news items for the purpose of damning the Labour Party. The "Daily Mail" has, since its inception, scrupulously followed the policy of being fair to all sections—even at the risk of offending the more vehement protagonists of either side who would like to see this journal adopt a blindly prejudiced attitude in support of one cause or other.

What may or may not be said in leading articles does not affect the impartial reporting of, and the giving of space to, news items affecting political events. If critics took the trouble to examine newspaper files, they would discover that charges of bias are totally unfounded and arise for the purposes of propaganda rather than from the facts. That, at least, is how the "Daily Mail" views it in the light of its own

experience. The editorials of a newspaper are a world apart from the news columns. They may represent a point of view to the same degree as broadcasts from the Prime Minister's Department represent a point of view. And if, as in the case of the "Daily Mail," this point of view is free from malice and intolerant partisanship, the case can be argued on facts or

logic, and not on the grounds of propaganda. The "Daily Mail" views its responsibility to the community most seriously. It considers that it is its duty not only to criticise intelligently and without prejudice, but also to commend when the occasion arises. And this objective has been steadfastly maintained.

Complaints of unfairness should not be allowed to pass where they are not justified. The "Daily Mail" suggests that it is grossly unfair to damn the Press collectively. While there may be newspapers displaying bias, it must not be forgotten that this fault is not one-sided. To those not hopelessly sold into the bonds of blind partisanship it must be apparent that many of those at present screaming "Unfair!" have much to answer for themselves.

It must be that these critics are overcome by the ardour of their cause. One suspects that their view of fairness is peculiarly warped-for in hurling wild charges they fail to realise that in most cases they imply that all dissenting views are unfair, and that only servile support is fair. But the "Daily Mail" has clung to the policy of impartiality because it believes that the people as a whole are capable of thinking for themselves on the facts presented. They do not want a dinning into their ears of ceaseless and barren political

At this point a re-statement of the "Daily Mail's" views on current economic and political problems is not out of place. Possibly the two greatest questions of the day are:—(1) The trend of the Government's financial policy; and (2) the trend of its own particular ideology. The "Daily Mail's" attitude towards these may be summed up in one word: Caution.

It does not believe that there is occasion for panic, and it strongly condemns any suggestion that this country, from the point of view of investment or expansion, is worthless. But it does believe that the Government must state its future policy more clearly in order to end uneasiness. In sensible and sane terms, this country does not need a

cake and champagne political diet. All a New Zealander asks is to be allowed to live a free and useful life, to serve and to be paid adequately for serving, and to retain for his own use as much as possible of what he earns. It is admitted that this is not as simple as it sounds, but a policy designed for such ends would be considerably less complicated than the tremendous administrative machine at present being constructed. The "Daily Mail" does not believe in "isms." These

narrow political creeds often glorify a slogan even above humanity itself. It does not matter greatly what Government is in power so long as the people are faithfully and sensibly served. And in this reposes the "Daily Mail's" attitude towards criticism in its leading articles. It is not what a Government is, but what it does, that should matter.

In any case, these things should be placed in their proper perspective. At the present time the world is faced with a crisis, to which subject the "Daily Mail" has devoted a good deal of its editorial space—but probably Signor Mussolini and Herr Hitler would stand the writer against a wall and shoot him for being "unfair."



That the threat of an invasion of New Zealand by some hostile Power was not a fantastic flight of thought, but a very real probability, was the impression that the Hon. William Perry, M.L.C., president of the New Zealand Defence League and the New Zealand Returned Soldiers' Association, conveyed to a largely-attended meeting of Napier citizens in the Foresters' Hall, Napier, last night.

In a stirring and urgent appeal to New Zealanders immediately to take a greater and more active interest in the vital defences of their own country, Mr Perry impressed upon his audience the grave dangers facing democratic countries as a result of the confused state of international affairs at the present moment. To make the people more acutely aware of New Zealand's position, he gave a comprehensive review of European activities since the London unilateral naval treaty of 1930 right up to the sudden seizure of Albania by
