GRAVE ANXIETY IN EUROPE: MOBILISATION MEASURES

ARMY STAFFS BUSY IN EUROPEAN CAPITALS: RESERVES CALLED UP

OMINOUS NAVAL MOVEMENTS IN THE MEDITERRANEAN

INDICATIONS OF GROWING TENSION

The grave anxiety with which Britain, France, and their supporters view the present European situation is evidenced by the consultations which are taking place between the war staffs and the Governments concerned.

The chief events of the last few hours have been the dramatic appearance of 14 Soviet warships in the Mediterranean, apparently sailing for Greece; the sudden dispatch of the French Mediterranean Fleet for an unknown destination; and the declaration of a state of emergency in Greece, despite the Italian reassurances to that country.

Notice must be taken also of the reports of minority friction in Poland and Germany, and the calling up by Poland of additional reservists. All the minor Powers are taking precautions against a sudden surprise move, and British measures in the Mediterranean seem to be designed for the same purpose. Tension at the moment appears to be critical.

STATE OF EMERGENCY IN GREECE

MEASURES TO RESIST AGGRESSION ARE INSTITUTED

Assurances To France And Britain

BUDAPEST, April 12.

The King of Greece is reported to have signed a decree, which is not yet published, declaring a state of emergency.

The calling up of 10 classes of reservists will be proclaimed in the event of an emergency.

It was authoritatively stated yesterday that Greece had informed Britain and France that she would resist any aggression.

The French Cabinet has decided to co-operate fully in any British and French guarantee to Greece.

Roosevelt Warns The Dictators

AID FOR DEMOCRACIES Support From America In Event Of War

WASHINGTON, April 12.

President Roosevelt, at a Press conference, urged swift Congressional action to pave the way for Senator Byrnes's Barter Plan.

He also made plain that his farewell at Warm Springs constituted an indirect warning to the dictators that they must reckon with the United States's moral, if not physical, force, in any war that they may wage against the democracies.

Polish-German Minority Tension Is Increasing

Provocative Behaviour Of Germans In Poland

Poles Persecuted

Reports Of Reich Troop Movements Are Denied

LONDON, April 12.

"The Times" Warsaw correspondent states that the so-called Polish-German minority tension is being given fresh prominence.

It alleged that Poles in Germany are being persecuted.

The view that this is not merely due to the zeal of local authorities is strengthened by the provocative behaviour of Germans in Poland.

In Berlin, rumours of troop movements toward Poland are officially denied.

Reservists Called Up

A number of Polish reservists of six classes ranging from 1912 to 1917, who are unfit for normal service, have been called up for auxiliary work. They are usually not called up till autumn.

The Polish Ambassador (M. Lipski) has gone to Warsaw to report on his conversations with Herr Ribbentrop, German Foreign Minister, during last Thursday and Saturday.

ITALIAN GESTURE TO GREECE

GUARANTEE AGAINST AGGRESSION

"FRIENDSHIP TIES" Respect For Territorial Integrity

ATHENS, April 12.

A guarantee of Greek integrity has been received by the Greek Government from Rome.

This follows a previous report that Italy intended to send an official assurance to Greece concerning Italy's intentions, with a guarantee against aggression.

A MILLION MEN UNDER ARMS

CLASSES CALLED UP IN ITALY

IMPOSING FORCE

New Fortifications In The Adriatic

United Press Association—Copyright. ROME, April 12.

An official communique issued at Rome says that, with the calling-up of the full 1911-12 classes, and the presence with the colours of the full 1917-18 and part of the 1919 classes and the partial recall of specialists and other classes, the armed forces have reached imposing levels.

Provided there are no exceptional circumstances, there will be no more calling-up.

It is estimated that there are now over a million men under arms.

The Rome correspondent of the British United Press says that, of the 900,000 Italians under arms, the strongest concentrations are in Northern Italy. There are 400,000 on the mainland, Sicily and Sardinia; 50,000 in Albania; 60,000 in Spain; 80,000 in Libya; and 280,000 in Ethiopia.

Fortifications In Adriatic

The British United Press correspondent at Athens says that Italy is reported to be making the Adriatic impregnable, having sent 3000 technicians to Valona to build new fortifications, besides unloading 250 Krupp guns and fortifying the Italian side of the Straits of Otranto and garrisoning the Dodecanese Islands, in the eastern Mediterranean.

Fascist View

Il Duce's Press publicist, Signor Gayda, in the "Giornale d'Italia," says: "One cannot see how Italy's occupation of Albania should upset the Mediterranean situation. One cannot see where it is a threat to Britain's vital interests."

"Should some ill-considered decision attempt to bar the road mapped out by Italy," he says, "she will calmly consider such an unjust reaction in its true significance and take the necessary steps to oppose it."

DARDANELLES TO BE OPENED

TURKEY WILL ALLOW WARSHIPS TO PASS

AID FOR RUMANIA

It is reported that the Rumanian Foreign Minister (M. Gafencu), has signed an agreement at Ankara whereby Turkey agrees to open the Dardanelles for the passage of foreign warships going to the assistance of Rumania.

INTENSE ACTIVITY IN GREAT BRITAIN

Preparations For Possible Emergencies

WAR STAFF MEETINGS

United Press Association—Copyright. (Received April 13, 1.45 a.m.)

LONDON, April 12.

Newspapers give prominence to agency telegrams regarding measures in a number of countries which would appear to be of a precautionary character. These refer, for example, to the curtailment of army leave in France and the manning of frontier posts in Holland.

There is at present no official confirmation in London of many of these reported steps, which, it is pointed out, while they have no special significance which could cause alarm, are indicative of the state of strain which has resulted in every part of Europe from the fresh blow to confidence administered by Italy in Albania.

Meanwhile, the arrangements for their Majesties to sail for Canada and the United States in H.M.S. Repulse on May 6 are unchanged.

According to a British Official Wireless message the King returned from Windsor Castle to Buckingham Palace last evening for a few hours and gave the Prime Minister (Mr Chamberlain) an audience.

In the afternoon the Foreign Affairs Committee of Cabinet held another meeting, which was attended by Mr Chamberlain, Sir John Simon, Lord Halifax, Sir Samuel Hoare, Sir Thomas Inskip, Mr Oliver Stanley and Mr W. S. Morrison, while Sir Alexander Cadogan, permanent head of the Foreign Office, also was present.

Defence Ministers Meet

Earlier, the defence Ministers, Lord Stanhope, First Lord of the Admiralty; Mr L. Hore-Belisha, War Minister; Sir Kingsley Wood, Air Minister; and Admiral Lord Chatfield, Minister for Co-ordination of Defence; together with Mr Morrison, who is assisting Lord Chatfield in defence co-ordination questions, were in conference at the offices of the Committee of Imperial Defence.

In addition to these meetings, Ministerial consultations arising out of the international situation created by the Italian occupation of Albania included an interview this morning between Mr Chamberlain and Lord Halifax, who previously had received the Soviet Ambassador, M. Maisky.

According to Press messages, the Ministerial and diplomatic activity in London has been paralleled in other capitals, particularly Paris, where there is reported to have been a meeting of the French Cabinet.

France Active

A Paris message states that the French Foreign Minister (M. Bonnet), had a conference with the Soviet Ambassador (M. Souritz).

It is stated that Britain and France are trying to evolve a formula whereby Poland and Rumania will accept Soviet aid.

The French Premier (M. Daladier), received the Rumanian and American Ambassadors. The Soviet Ambassador called at the Foreign Office.

THE PRINCE OF IRAN'S WEDDING

Presence Of Foreign Troops

FRANCE VIEWS ACTIVITY AS "UNFRIENDLY ACT"

Spain Working With Italy?

PARIS, April 12.

It is stated in Paris that the French Ambassador to Burgos (Marshal Petain) has been instructed to inform General Franco that France will regard the retention of foreign troops in Spain after May 15 as an unfriendly act.

Earlier, it was reported that the French Foreign Minister (M. Bonnet) attended a conference with Marshal Petain, who was recalled from Burgos as a result of reports that General Franco had signed a military alliance and that Italy and Germany were sending further troops to Spain and fortifying the Pyrenees.

Meantime, General Franco, presiding at a Spanish Cabinet meeting, approved a network of highways in Morocco and the improvement of seaplane bases.

It is reported that large-scale fortifications in Spanish Morocco aim at preventing a French advance towards Ceuta, with the object of relieving any menace to Gibraltar.

The Paris correspondent of "The Times" says it is confirmed that Italian reinforcements have been arriving at Cadiz. Italy's attitude towards her pledges to withdraw Italian volunteers from Spain is regarded as most important in judging the value of her assurance relating to the status quo elsewhere.

Abnormal Troop Movements. Abnormal Spanish troop movements have been observed near the French frontier, notably at Irun and Pamplona, where there are strong concentrations.

The Gibraltar correspondent of the British United Press says it is reliably stated that a further contingent of Italian troops, dressed as civilians arrived at Cadiz, Southern Spain, last Saturday. Gibraltar reports that the guard at the Spanish frontier has been heavily reinforced and patrolled in full kit.

St. John's Guild Meets

MAHORA AFTERNOON Interesting Moccasin Demonstration

The monthly meeting of St. John's Presbyterian Women's Guild was held yesterday afternoon at St. John's Hall, Mahora. The Rev. F. W. Marshall presided in the absence of Mrs Marshall, president, who is visiting Wellington.

Mrs Harper, secretary, announced that the St. Matthew's Guild had invited members of St. John's Guild to their meeting next Tuesday and an invitation to a meeting of the Baptist Ladies' Guild next Wednesday had also been received.

Mrs E. Whetstone gave an instructive address on moccasin making. "Good moccasins can be made with basil, suede, or old felt hats," said Mrs Whetstone. It is most important when using old felt hats to soak the hat in a bucket of water and in the morning take an iron and flatten out as much as possible, then cut out the pattern. When using basil or suede three pairs can be cut from one skin which will cost from 10/6 to 14/.

Mrs Whetstone used a real Indian moccasin pattern, and said that before cutting out the leather shape, it was best to cut out a moccasin in cloth and sew it up, so as to be sure that it would fit. If it did not fit, any alterations could be made to the pattern before cutting into the leather. Any alterations should be made at the back seam in order that the shape would not be spoiled. A leather punch should be used to make the holes for sewing and the pattern should be folded exactly in two and the holes punched through both thicknesses.

Mrs Whetstone also showed how to stitch in the vamp, using two bodkins threaded with braid. The correct stitch to use, is the saddletry stitch.

A seam is then made on the wrong side, at the back of the moccasin. This seam can be sewn by hand or by machine, but the stitching must be along the curved edge only, leaving the straight edge at the heel unsewn. This seam is flattened out and rubbed flat with the back of a spoon. The moccasin is then turned right side out, and the corner of the heel turned up to fit the back of the heel, and sewn down and ornamented with a bead. Before sewing the heel seam, the sides of the moccasin should be turned down. The turned down flap is not sewed at the back of the heel. To ornament the flap, holes can be punched near the folded edge and ribbon threaded through and the edge clipped to form a fringe. Before sewing in the vamp, it can be embroidered with beads or ornamented with painting.

An Indian has only to look at a moccasin in order to tell to what tribe another Indian belongs.





THE VITAL QUESTION OF DEFENCE

New Zealand's Real Peril STRONG NEED FOR URGENT ACTION

Hon. W. Perry Speaks Out

That the threat of an invasion of New Zealand by some hostile Power was not a fantastic flight of thought, but a very real probability, was the impression that the Hon. William Perry, M.L.C., president of the New Zealand Defence League and the New Zealand Returned Soldiers' Association, conveyed to a largely-attended meeting of Napier citizens in the Foresters' Hall, Napier, last night.

In a stirring and urgent appeal to New Zealanders immediately to take a greater and more active interest in the vital defences of their own country, Mr Perry impressed upon his audience the grave dangers facing democratic countries as a result of the confused state of international affairs at the present moment. To make the people more acutely aware of New Zealand's position, he gave a comprehensive review of European activities since the London unilateral naval treaty of 1930 right up to the sudden seizure of Albania by Italy last week.

There was an exceptionally large and enthusiastic gathering to hear Mr Perry address, the Mayor of Napier, Mr. T. W. Hercock, presiding. Also present was Major-General Sir Andrew Russell, patron of the New Zealand Defence League.

At the conclusion of the address a resolution was unanimously carried: "That this meeting of citizens of Napier and the surrounding district, viewing with alarm the existing unpreparedness of New Zealand to care for its own defence, resolves to develop a branch of the New Zealand Defence League in this area with headquarters in Napier, and actively to support the policy of the league as propounded by Major-General Sir Andrew Russell and the Hon. W. Perry."

It was also resolved that the member for Napier (Hon. W. E. Barnard) should be asked to place before Parliament the necessity for compulsory military training and the introduction of a compulsory national register for all men and women.

A Strong Indictment. A striking indictment of the ruthless methods employed by the totalitarian states to increase their power at the expense and humiliation of the democratic nations, was made by Mr Perry in checking the rule of law appeared to have gone by the board while the rule of brute force had become triumphant.

The world had witnessed a series of atrocities for 1930. Unfortunately Britain was the only country to honour its obligations under the treaty, the other signatories increasing their armaments programme instead of adhering to the disarmament treaty of Manchoukuo. Then followed an orgy of treaty breaking. In 1931, Japan, while still a member of the League of Nations, invaded China and became master of that huge tract of land now known as the State of Manchoukuo. The League had failed to take any action against the aggressor nation. In 1935 Italy invaded Ethiopia. In this case the League endeavoured to use its powers by imposing sanctions, but was unsuccessful in checking the supply of oil and petrol to Italy. The Abyssinian sovereign state was conquered and the fate of the League of Nations was sealed.

Germany was the next country to start scrapping treaties without consulting the other signatories. The Versailles Treaty was violated and German troops entered the demilitarized zone of the Rhine. It was since the Great War. The Locarno Treaty was treated in the same way.

Violation of Treaties. Following these flagrant violations of treaties, Great Britain woke up to the fact that she was not in a position to check or repel an outward attack from Germany, Italy and Japan. The British Government immediately instituted a three year rearmament programme, ending in 1939, and involving an expenditure of £1,500,000,000. Even as long ago as that some New Zealanders had expressed the opinion that the amount, huge as it was, would be far from adequate.

Last year the Prime Minister, Mr. Mackenzie King, told the House of Commons that the programme was costing the country £1,500,000,000, but even that would not be sufficient. It was anticipated that before the programme was brought up to date it would cost Britain in the vicinity of £2,100,000,000.

"Surprising figures, you might say, but not nearly so surprising as those from Germany," commented Mr. Perry with emphasis. "During the last four years, the Third Reich has spent £4,000,000,000. What for? I'll tell you. For the total domination of Europe."



Mr. Perry then dealt exhaustively with Germany's eastward thrust, including the annexation of Austria, Sudetenland, Czechoslovakia and recently Memel.

Japan commenced a new undeclared and totally unprovoked war against China, while Italy showed impatience and decided to step in and assist the Spanish rebels. There was every evidence that the totalitarian states did not seek peace, but war.

At the conclusion of the address the resolution recommending the formation of a branch of the New Zealand Defence League in Napier was unanimously carried, and before leaving the hall the majority of those present formed the nucleus of the branch.

Votes of thanks to the chairman, to Mr Perry and to Major-General Sir Andrew Russell were carried with acclamation. The singing of the National Anthem brought the meeting to a close.

DULL MARKET FOR FAT CATTLE

Stortford Lodge Sale STORE LAMBS MAKE BETTER SELLING

Fat Sheep Prices Still Hold

Butchers evidently have not cleared their supplies of beef from over the holidays as at the Stortford Lodge sale yesterday the 150 head of cattle which came forward met with little competition.

The sale developed into one of the duller yet held this season. Another probable reason for the slow demand is the fact that the works are still over-loaded and, on top of this, many of the employees are away from work suffering from influenza.

Once again vealers swamped the market and as there was no outlet for them apart from the few butchers who were operating, prices showed a fall. Bullocks of mixed quality were yarded in fair numbers.

Store cattle were of good quality, but the prices did not suit vendors and nearly all the lines were passed in.

Store sheep, which came forward to the extent of 7000, and lambs, which predominated the yarding, met with a brighter response.

Ewes and wethers were on a par with last week. Prime ewes were firm and sold readily. Lambs remained firm, but wethers were inclined to ease for poorer quality sorts.

Apart from the offering of fat sheep, the large number of farmers present took no interest in the selling due to the shortage of feed. Those lines that were sold were definitely in favour of the buyer.

The range of prices was as follows:— Prime fat cows ranged from £7 to £8 5/8, medium from £5 to £6 7/6, plain and unfinished from £3 15/0 to £4 16/0.

Heifers realised from £5 12/6 to £6 1/0. Bullocks made from £8 15/0 to £10 for the tops, others ranged from £6 to £7 8/0.

Store bullocks made to £4 10/0 and 30 months steers realised from £3 12/6 to £4 10/0. Wether lambs realised from 11/0 to 11/7 for the tops, others from 7/0 to 7/6. Ewes running with lambs made from 10/6 to 10/11.

Ewe lambs made from 11/9 to 14/3 and small sorts to 9/6. Mixed sex lambs in splendid order made to 18/3.





ORATORY'S FAREWELL TO THE TURF

Brilliant Mare For Stud GRANVALE COMES FROM A GOOD FAMILY

Gay Mimic Should Be Useful

(By MOTUROA.)

Oratory probably had her last race when she finished second to last in the Easter Handicap at Feilding on Monday, a result not entirely unexpected after the way she pulled up after the Feilding Cup on Easter Saturday. Oratory was then decidedly sore and her gallant effort to make a cracking pace and hang on to run a good second to the Siegfried colt Old Bill, who was meeting her on 20lb. better than w.f.a. terms, was a proof of her quality.

Oratory, who listed the G.N. Oaks in race record time among her many victories, won over a mile at Trenham in January, 1938, in 1.36, with 9.4 on her back. That equalled the N.Z. record established a month before by Courtcraft at Ellerslie. As well, she shares with Reremoana and Autopay the race record of 1.37 1/2 in the Thompson Handicap.

Her Stud career will be watched with wide interest, for the mares of her line have generally been high class matrons.

GRANVALE does not appear to be up to weight-carrying, but this year the Waikurau Cup winner has run a number of good races in open company, appreciating, no doubt, the drop in the weights. He ran Felicitation to a nose at Hastings as the New Year and finished right up with Ivar in the Napier Cup, which was run at a torrid pace. Therefore, it was not surprising that victory should come his way on Easter Monday.

In the Waikurau Cup he was perfectly handled by W. J. Mudford, who is riding particularly well just now. Granvale, who is a half-brother to Ben Braggie, is by Grandcourt from Valley Rose (dam also of Kinross and Girondo), by Solferino from Ailsa, a grand-daughter of the Musket-Atlantis mare Happy Land, ancestress of Hua (V.R.C. Derby), Hova, Laughing Lane, Lady Pam and other high-class winners.

It is reported that the connections of Granvale are considering schooling this gelding at an early date. He certainly has the size and bone to recommend him for hurdling. **Sure to Improve.** City Song's dead-heat with Kobi at Waikurau bore out the merit of the good track work of this half-sister to the Parliamentary Handicap winner Merivan Prince and she would have won outright in another stride.

This Bulandshilly filly had raced only twice before and unlucky at

the start of her race at Hastings. She impresses as likely to improve with every race and, like the other members of her family, she should be at home under winter conditions. City Song was not stacked up against very pretentious company at Waikurau, but her opponents were more seasoned and her finishing effort was a noteworthy one.

Looks Solid. Serenata has won only one race this season, but she has been unlucky on several occasions and her two thirds at Riccarton and her showed up in favourable light.

The Ngatarawa-trained filly looks more solid than her elder sister Russian Ballet and next season she should be up to classic requirements. Her dam, the Limond mare Praise, won the New Zealand Oaks in 1930 and Serenata may follow her footsteps in the spring.

Better Things in Store. Gay Mimic stayed well to win the Ladies' Handicap at Waikurau on Easter Monday, running up to his form in the big handicaps at Hastings.

A four-year-old gelding by Mimic, Gay Mimic is bred from Princess Nata, a Polydamon mare bred from Waioewa, who traces back through Vivandiere to Gulnare, third dam of that racehorse and sire Yattendon and ancestress of Castor, Grand Sport, Patronale, Theodore, Araunah, Erebus and other smart gallopers.

Gay Mimic carries weight well and can be marked down for a good handicap race before long.

Son of Warstep. Boldstep was not a lucky runner either day at Hastings, but under lighter scale of weights and in smaller fields at Tauherenikau, he won his double against the open class horses last week-end in a manner which left the impression that the best has not yet been seen of him. Boldstep should be capable of winning good class races up to a mile and a quarter as he is by Hunting Song from Warstep, one of the greatest mares ever raced in the Dominion. The Martian mare never left anything of her own calibre, but all her progeny have been able to gallop and several won good races—notably Footfall—while Vanestep ran second in a New Zealand Cup. Boldstep has won five races so far this season and there should be more for him.

An Unlucky Runner. Hatuma was backed with confidence in the right quarter for the Ladies' Handicap at Waikurau as

it was natural that the popular president of the Waikurau Jockey Club would be keen to win the very fine trophy that was the winner's portion.

The Arausio gelding looked as if he was very unlucky as he was last in the straight and tried for a run on the straight before coming back on to the rails.

Hatuma's good second augurs well for his success in similar events this winter for he had not raced for three and a half months prior to Easter.

Sticks on Well. The Hastings double winner Royal Spades should not be dropped because of his failure at Waikurau and then covered more ground than anything else in the race. He finished very solidly into third place and bore out the opinion expressed earlier that a middle-distance race would not be beyond him later on.

Boatsong led several times before the Waikurau meeting and the future of the solid Mimitic gelding looked very doubtful. However, it was decided to race him there and it is pleasing to report that he pulled up apparently all right.

Boatsong's lack of work found him out in the concluding stages of the race, but he gamely hung on for second money, and his turn should come soon.

A Game Mare. There is not much of Classical and the extremely hard going has kept her sore since she opened her winning account at the New Year, but she has not run one bad race in the interim and she scarcely raise a trot in the early stages of the back-middle-distance event at Waikurau on Monday but, when warmed up, she buried her opponents with her superior stamina in the run home.

Classical, who is a sister to Wagner, is a three-year-old daughter of Siegfried and the Rossendale mare Polonaise. She should be in her element under winter conditions.

Although the tracks at present are not in his favour, Lucullus Boy opened his new season's winning account by beating two smart hacks in Pretty Lass and Fiancee at Feilding on Easter Monday and there should be more in store for this half relative to Lucullus Lad.

Lucullus Boy raced well at the Hawke's Bay meeting and it should not be hard to place him in a minor handicap during the winter as he looks as if he may stay.
