After announcing the assurance to Greece and Rumania, the Prime Minister turned to consider the future of the Anglo-Italian agreement. He frankly confessed his deep disappointment at Italy's action, which he said, had cast a shadow over the genuineness of her intentions to carry out its undertakings, but he disagreed with the opinion, which he suggested some might hold, that the agreement should be ceded. He believed, on the contrary, that there would be a wipespread desire, all the greater for the uneasiness now prevailing, to see the fulfilment of the remaining provisions of the agreement.

He added that, naturally, in view of recent events, it was to Italy they looked for practical evidence that she shared that desire.

Troops in Spain.





Correct Methods Of Storing

FLOWER CULTIVATION

Clear the land of all old crops as

Clear the land of all old crops as they mature and sow down barley, lupins, oats or mustard. Lupins are to be preferred, as they produce nitrogen in a suitable form for the next crop.

These can be dug in about the end of July or August and at the same time lime can be applied at the rate of 40zs to the square yard.

In about another month's time the planting season should be begun for all fruit trees, hedges, shrubs, etc. So as to give the land time to sweeten, the holes or trenches should be dug now and the soil left in big lumps to sweeten.

lumps to sweeten.

Now is a good time thoroughly to work the manure into the soil; take care not to leave it too thick in one

During this month renovate any old lawns; rake the surface with a sharp rake and bring the soil to a fine tilth, make up the hollows with new soil, level off and make firm. All potatoes should now be lifted, graded and stored away in a dark shed. Collect and dry pumpkins and marrows ready for storing, making

harvesting.

Crops to Sow.

A small sowing of broad beans can now be made. Plant the seeds two inches deep and six inches apart. Sowings of cabbage and cauliflowers (early varieties), lettuce for winter supplies, early horn carrots and prickly spinach may be made.

Sow onions for transplate in the index in the later manuscripts.

Spray grape-vines with lime-sulphur at a strength of one part sulphur to 30 parts of water; that is two tablespoons to two gallons of water. Where mildew is prevalent it is a good plan to spray periodically so as to prevent mildew appearing at all.

ANCIENT SECRETS OF **PAPERMAKING**

Arabic Methods

FIBRE, FLAX AND COTTON USED

Searching out secrets of the ancients to account for the remarkable preservation of age-old manuscripts, the National Bureau of Standards has finally completed analysis of the Arabic manuscripts in the Princeton University Library, Washington, U.S.A., to determine the kinds of fibres used.

Like other oriental papers examined by the Bureau, these exhibited little evidence of deterioration. Most of the Arabic papers had an excellent glazed finish.

PEACE SERVED, BUT NOT PRESERVED.

Yesterday's editorial forecast of Mr Chamberlain's policy has been strikingly fulfilled by the statement made by the British Prime Minister in the House of Commons yesterday. The Anglo-Italian Agreement has not been repudiated, but Britain has indicated that she desires both definite assurances and concrete proof concerning the withdrawal of troops from Spain, and other cognate matters.

In addition, Britain has taken a decisive stand against aggression. Mr Chamberlain has nailed his umbrella of protection to the mast-head. "Britain is endeavouring," he said, "to the utmost of its ability successfully to marshal those forces which still favour peace and are willing to resist aggres-

In pursuance of this he has held the protective umbrella over the heads of Rumania and Greece. Poland already shelters beneath it, and it is not improbable that in the immediate future other minor Powers will join the band of anti-aggressionists.

Few people realise that, emerging out of the confused position in Europe to-day, and the efforts of Britain and France to seek security, we have a new League of Nations forming on a new front. The original League was founded on the conception of international law and arbitration in the settlement of disputes. The League failed when Germany, Italy and Japan flouted its authority and the remaining League Powers vacillatingly shuffled from under their responsibilities under the League Covenant. It would have been easy then to have formed an anti-aggression front—indeed, it already existed in the League itself. Weakness, indecision, fear, and selfishness in those days, have brought about the present situation.

Nevertheless, the damage was done. And now Britain and France, and, to a lesser degree, the United States of America, are giving a lead to the world in the reformation of a peace front. In spirit and effect, if not in name, the old League and the League Covenant are being revived.

This is all to the good. The one penetrating weakness at the moment is the relationship of Russia with the anti-aggression bloc. Unfortunately, both Poland and Rumania regard the Soviet with suspicion, and it is probably for this reason that Britain has refrained from inviting Russia to participate

in the joint declarations of Britain and France. There is a good deal of evidence to show that considerable tact and diplomacy is being used in handling the Russian side of the situation. It is clear that the Soviet is being kept fully informed of the Anglo-French moves, and that she is tacitly supporting these efforts. It would, no doubt, be more satisfactory to have a frank statement of Russia's policy, but it might, at the same time, provoke Germany and Italy to foolish acts. One must remember the import of the Anti-Comintern Pact.

The statement of British and French policy towards aggression, and the guarantees given to Poland, Greece and Rumania, can' by no means be considered as ending tension. As was pointed out yesterday, the crux of the whole situation rests in the reaction of the dictators to these developments. Both France and Britain are apparently prepared to concede all expansionism up to, and including, Albania. They will fight if Poland, Rumania, or Greece are attacked. But the position of Yugo-Slavia, Hungary and Bulgaria has not been defined, and the Spanish and Italian territorial claims are still "up in the air."

It may be seen that the joint declarations of Mr Chamberlain and M. Daladier are thus limited in their application. There is nothing yet to oppose aggression except in limited directions. Although the importance of the step cannot be over-emphasised, it cannot be construed as an ultimatum against all aggression.

From the other side, early reports of German and Italian reactions are not encouraging. They persist in the view that this policy is aimed at encirclement, with the sinister objective of forming an anti-totalitarian aggressive front,

In the circumstances, it may be said that peace has been served, but not preserved. Everything now depends upon the attitude of the dictators. For the first time they are faced by a front of determined resistance. Will they accept their present booty as adequate? Never more clearly could the onus for making war-if it comes-be sheeted home.

LONDON'S NEW TRAIN.

Powered by Leyland Diesel Engines.

London was provided last month with its first regular diesel railcar passenger service, when the L.M.S. streamlined 3-car Leyland diesel articulated train commenced a service from St. Pancras Station. Services are being provided daily between Bedford and London; London, Leicester and Nottingham; Nottingham and St. Pancras; St. Pancras, Luton, Bedford.

The train, which until recently was engaged on experimental runs on the Oxford and Cambridge branches, has taken the place of existing steam trains on its new services.

Powered by six Leyland engines, each developing 125 b.h.p., the train consists of three cars linked together on the articulated principle, and seating 162 passengers, weighs 73 tons, as against 173 tons of a steam train, with the same seating capacity.

One of the schedules it will work involves running the 19.6 miles from Luton to Bedford in twenty minutes at an average start-to-stop speed of 58.8 m.p.h., well within the train's capacity, for it has a top speed of 75 m.p.h.

The train will cover a distance of 350 miles daily on its new schedules.*
