## WARNING ISSUED **AGGRESSORS**

No Problem Incapable Of Peaceful Solution

#### SIGNIFICANT U.S. SPEECH

WASHINGTON, April 26. The United States Secretary of State (Mr Cordell Hull) to-night addressed the National Convention of the Red Cross in terms which were at once a plea for peace and a warning that war would inevitably react disastrously upon the

Unusual significance is attached to the speech, although no nations or statesmen were named, because it was delivered almost on the eve of Herr Hitler's reply to President Roose-

Mr Hull issued a warning that "armed aggrandisement under modern conditions of warfare entails destructions for which no conceivable advantages secured by the conqueror

can possibly provide compensation.

"A nation entering upon this course inflicts incalculable injury upon its own people and the world as a whole."

A warning was also issued by Mr Hull that the United States was prepared to defend, and defend successfully, its national interests.

Stating that there was no controversy which could not be settled, with greater benefit to all concerned, by the peaceful processes of friendly adjustment, Mr Hull said:

"When a nation makes deliberate resort to armed force on any plea whatever it uses war or the threat of war as an instrument of a policy of territorial expansion or domination of others. Such nations are the authors of war, the awful cost of which is paid by their own people and the rest of mankind."

Ample Room On Earth.

Ample Room On Earth. He added that there was ample room on the earth for two billion people, but no room for a political organisation under which a group of nations would enslave all the

others.

Mr Hull commented that the road to the peaceful adjustment of reasonable legitimate grievances was still open, but as long as some nations continued to arm for conquest, all the others must either surrender or arm for defence.

"Americans prefer peace negotiated before war rather than afterwards, and to such peace they make appropriate contribution, but if their hopes are disappointed and the red flames of war rather than the noonday sun of peace illuminate our horizon we are equally prepared to defend successfully our national interests and cherished institutions."

Value of Red Cross. the convention earlier, emphasised the need to meet the great requirements of relief movements.

"In a world disturbed by war and fears of war, the unselfish devotion of the Red Cross to the welfare of others stands in striking contrast to the inhumans acts which have the inhumane acts which have shocked our conscience," he said "The task before us is enormous."

Fair Distribution Of Increased Taxation: Motor Charges Resented

> United Press Association-Copyright. (Independent Cable Service) (Received April 26, 10 p.m.)

LONDON, April 25. London City circles regard Sir John Simon's new Budget which has just been announced and which provides for the expenditure of £630,000,000 on defence in Britain in the coming year, as favourable except for the incr and motor taxes, although in the case of motors it is believed that the intention is to divert motor manufacturing to armaments. The increase applies only to private cars.

The fact that income tax has not been increased is regarded as a bull point for business generally. It is believed that Sir John Simon has distributed the burden of taxation as fairly as possible.

A Royal Automobile Association official said that taxation on motor vehicle fuel in the 1937-38 period yielded over £84,700,000. It was estimated that on the existing scale the yield would be £93,000,000 for the 1938-39 period. Cars were no longer a luxury, but must be used for

A tobacco expert expressed the opinion that the increase in duty would cause people to turn increasingly to Empire tobacco, which would still enjoy a preference of 2/- in the £1

A large firm of photographic dealers said that the duty on films and plates would be increased by 3d, not 2d as the Chancellor had estimated.



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#### A HISTORY OF **BOWLS**

MARY GRANT BRUCE HOW THE GAME CAME TO AUSTRALIA

DATE DOUBTFUL

First Official Record In January, 1845

"Daily Mail" Special Service. SYDNEY, April 11. Although the game of bowls dates back to 1299 in England and Scotland, there is no evidence that it was played in Australia until the middle last century.

Various enthusiasts have endeavoured to prove that was known here in 1805, but this claim has not been substantiated.

The first official record of a match in Australia is that between T. Burgess and F. Lipscombe, in Hobart, on January 1, 1845.

In 1876 a club was formed in Sydney to play on a green made by Charles Moore, Curator of the Botanic Gardens. This, however, had to be uprooted shortly after to make

to be uprooted shortly after to make room for the Exhibition buildings. In 1878 John Young (known as "the father of bowls in Australia") formed the Kentville Club. It was he who persuaded the Victorian Clubs to send teams to Sydney, and on April 12, 1880, the first intercolonial match was played; Victoria won. An English Visit.

In England there was no central body through whom arrangements could be made for an international match until John Young persuaded Lord Jersey to form the International Bowling Association. The sequel to this was that in 1901 a combined New South Wales and Victorian team visited England, where they played 22 matches, winning 11, and drawing one. drawing one. In April, 1911, an Australian Bowling Council was formed to man-

age interstate and international games, and under its auspices the first Australian Bowling Carnival was held in Melbourne in 1912.

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









One does not need an official statement to know why the trend of the Government's economic and general policy, and it is Mr Nash's task to make some explanations and possibly to discuss proposals for the future.

The reasons are not hard to find. The present Government has often boldly proclaimed its dislike for orthodox finance, and this has done much to create uneasiness among those who have invested in the Dominion in orthodox chan-

Mr Nash's first task will be to convince Britain that the Dominion is, and can remain, solvent. He must be able to assure investors that both capital and interest payments will be made faithfully, and that nothing will be done which might affect the value of the security or diminish the returns. And this involves a full explanation of the whole of the Government's financial policy and its intentions in the future.

falling due in London at the end of this year, but in addition the lavish spending programme undertaken under the general policy, has raised the question of the Dominion's ability to meet all of its commitments. And until satisfaction on this point is assured, the chances of a successful conversion might be slender.

The new import regulations have created another difficulty. Restrictions on British exports to New Zealand are not likely to be looked upon kindly, and Mr Nash will face some awkward questions on this aspect. Naturally, he will point out the exigencies of the existing situation. To meet the Dominion's obligations overseas it is necessary to have adequate sterling funds, and if the return from exports diminishes, or if imports increase unduly, or if there is a combination of both factors, sterling funds must inevitably dwindle. Since New Zealand has no control over export prices, it has a choice of two courses: first, to reduce internal spending so that the deficiency can be met from the surplus of revenue; or secondly, to reduce imports to the degree necessary to arrive at a balance.

The Government has decided not to reduce its internal spending, so that it has no surplus of revenue which it can use to fill the gap. It has adopted the course of restricting imports, and Mr Nash will undoubtedly point out that if the restrictions are removed the necessary sterling funds will

It will be stressed in Britain that from their point of view New Zealand will be rehabilitated if she adopts a more conservative spending policy, but this might have political repercussions which the New Zealand Government would not be prepared to risk.

that he can convince Britain that New Zealand will modify its policy along more prudent lines. Many critics have said that the Dominion's position is hopeless, but that is not the case. We have experimented,



Decline Of Sterling Funds Over £21,000,000

#### NEED FOR OVERSEAS VISIT

WELLINGTON, April 26. The Minister of Finance and Customs (the Hon. W. Nash) broadcast over a national radio hook-up from Wellington to-night a statement on the Government's import selection and exchange control policy.

The Minister began his address by setting out the origin of the policy of the Government, and recited the circumstances which operated to compel the introduction of import selection, and explained the procedure followed. It was from sterling funds alone, he said, that New

Zealand was able to pay for the import commodities necessary and essential to the development of the Dominion, and to obtain money to pay interest on the nation's debt, and to

repay the debt.

The major circumstance which led to the introduction of the policy was the fact that in eight months of last year there had been a decline of over £21,000,000 in sterling funds.

They could have been restricted by heavy tariffs or by a reduction in expenditure. This latter course had been tried previously, and had succeeded in building up sterling

funds to £46,000,000.

"Is it worth the price?" Mr. Nash asked, recalling that there had been 70,000 unemployed and widespread destitution and hardship.

Following a New Road. The present Government had decided to follow a new road and to select goods that should be imported according to the needs of the

"We want to maintain production, because it is by production that we live," said Mr. Nash. "Our standard live," said Mr. Nash. "Our standard of living depends upon the commodities produced in this Dominion. "Under the new procedure manufacturers of all the goods that are necessary to the well-being of New Zealand may obtain licences for plant, equipment, and raw materials

"We cannot buy more goods than we pay for. We might obtain goods, but if we obtained them without paying for them somebody else has to pay for them. If we can't buy more goods than we can pay for, surely it is better to select the goods to be excluded, than to have a general cutting down of imports?"

Mr. Nash said that the Government's policy provided for the expansion of local industries, and he proposed to ask the Minister of Industries and Commerce to make public a list of new factories that had started, or were about to start. Overseas manufacturers were having their goods excluded, but the Government was encouraging them to come to New Zealand and make their products here, Mr. Nash said. If, however, the Government allowed everyone to come in, it would mean a greater demand on sterling funds for plant and material. Therefore there was a committee working, and its job was to see that the licences recommended to the Minister for plant and equipment were in some accord with the quantity of ister for plant and equipment were in some accord with the quantity of

goods that were required. Help of Manufacturers Wanted. "We do want the help of manufacturers in this direction," Mr. Nash continued. "There are fairly large stocks in the Dominion of certain commodities, and if demands are kept in a ratio to what we are

#### COMPLYING WITH THE SOCIAL SECURITY ACT

## 5600 People Registered At Hastings Post Office To Date

So far 5600 people in Hastings have registered under the Social Security Act, and increasing numbers daily are seeking to register at the Hastings Post Office.

To date 4500 women have registered, 800 youths, and 300 men. The latter are chiefly old age pensioners who are being issued with levy books, but who will claim exemption as payment falls due.

Handling these registrations has involved a heavy call on the facilities of the Post Office, but according to officials the extra work is being handled with a minimum of incon-

An appeal is made by the authorities for those who have not yet registered to make early application, particularly to make their registration payments of 5/-. This will avoid a last-minute rush.

Officials emphasise that it is not yet fully realised that every person of 16 years of age or more, whether single or married, must register under the Act. By the end of this month—April 30—each person liable for registration must have a coupon book.

Those in possession of the em ployment promotion fund coupon books will, of course, continue using them, and are automatically registered through possessing them. Those already having these books have thus registered, and need take no action.

The only regrettable feature of Defaulter's trip was that his defeat in the Sydney Cup stopped his winning sequence. He had won ten races in a line and was hot on the trail of the record of 19 successive wins held jointly by Desert Gold and Gloaming.

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
