BOTH SIDES CLAIM TO HAVE INFLICTED LOSSES

Japanese Spokesman Warns Soviet

MOSCOW, August 1.

The War Commissar declares that he has no knowledge yet of the Manchukuan clash between Japanese and Soviet troops.

The official news agency announces that the Japanese suffered heavy losses of men and material.

The Tokyo Foreign Office spokesman says that the Russian bombardment of Kojō Sajan was premeditated, the proof being the accuracy of the Russian fire, which was kept up until last night.

The Japanese withheld their attack until the Russians had embarked on an act of aggression. If the attack is repeated the Russians can expect more severe treatment.

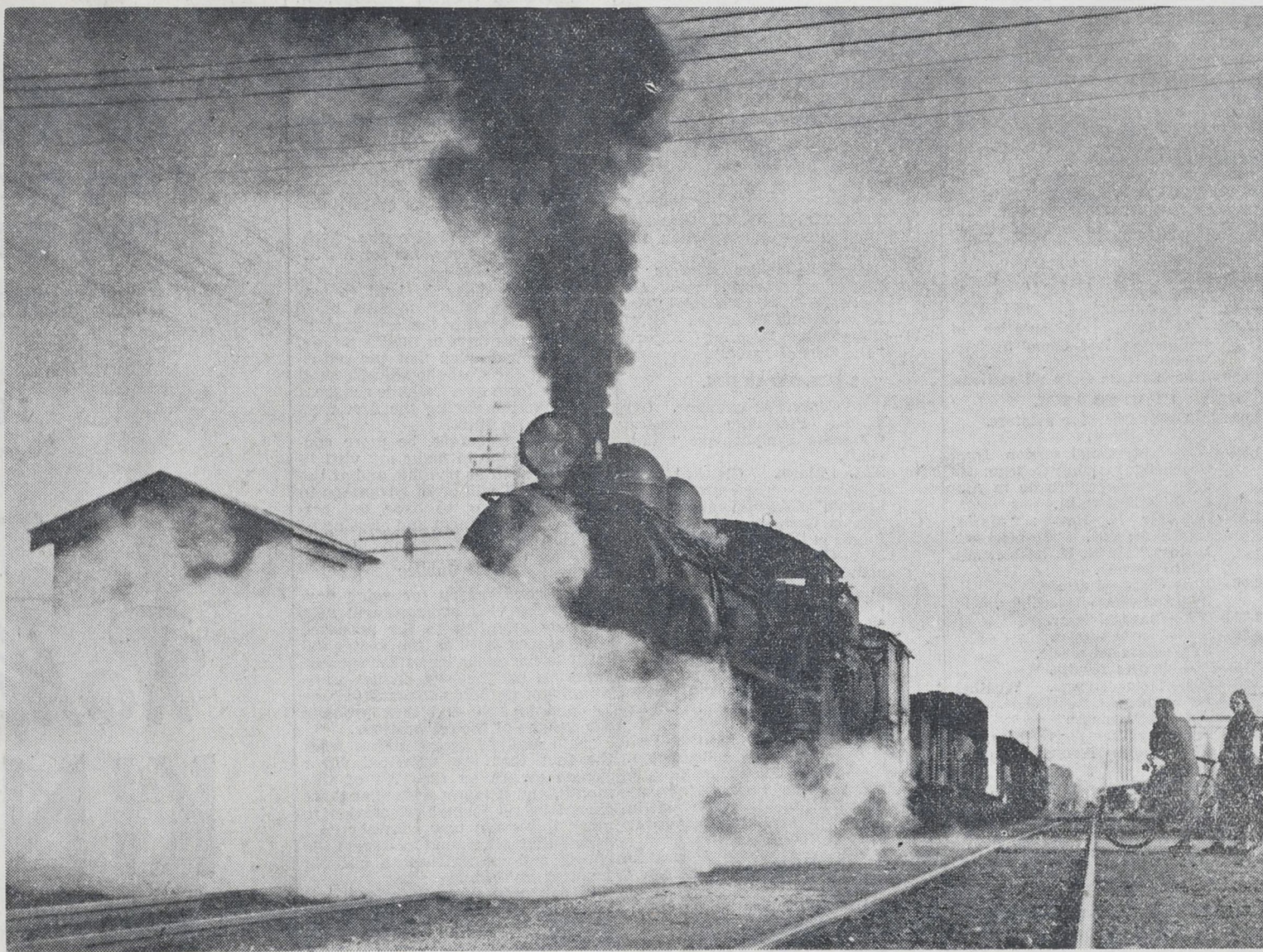
Prince Kanin, Chief of the General Staff, has hurriedly gone to Tokyo from his holiday, in view of the seriousness of the situation.

It is claimed that 11 Soviet tanks and two large guns were captured.

A later message from the Tokyo War Office states that the Soviet troops lost 30 more killed last night in counter-attacks.

Korean headquarters report that the Soviet troops have withdrawn from Changkufeng and Shaotsapping, with the exception of a few garrison companies. All is now quiet.

WAS MISSING CLIPPER VICTIM OF FOUL PLAY?

Dramatic Possibility Suggested: Mission Of Passenger Investigated

MANILA, July 31.

An investigation has begun of a report that Wah Sung Choy, a restaurant keeper of Jersey City, who was a passenger of the Hawaii Clipper, carried a large sum of money, ostensibly to the Chinese Government.

The report mentions the possibility that the destruction of the plane grew out of foul play over Choy's errand.

The search for the wreckage of the Hawaii Clipper continued to-day without success.

The oil spot is breaking up and it is unlikely that it can be followed much longer.

An unofficial report states that the naval craft expect to be called in from the search to-morrow night.

BORDER INCIDENT

Russian Territory Occupied

Price Of Fish In Dispute

REDUCTION SOUGHT

About 200 Men Idle In Southland

INVERCARGILL, August 1.

The Southland fishing fleet remained at its moorings to-day and will continue to do so until a dispute that has arisen between the merchants and the fishermen has been settled. The dispute is over the price of fish paid to the men by the merchants, who are seeking a reduction of 5/- a 100lb.

Up to the time of the cessation of work, the men were being paid 32/- a 100lb. The secretary of the Fishermen's Union says the fleet will remain tied up in the meantime because the agreement between the fishermen and the merchants has been broken by the merchants.

The fishermen at Bluff, Stewart Island, Pegasus and on the West Coast, numbering about 200 men, are idle.

Merchants deny that any agreement has been broken. They say the original breach of the agreement was made by the union.

The cessation of fishing operations will have a serious effect, not only on Stewart Island, but on the whole of Southland. Exports of fish form a big part of the export trade of Bluff, which, in the export of fish, has risen from fourth place to second in New Zealand in four years.

SHIP'S ENGINEER CONVICTED

REFUSAL TO OBEY ORDERS

A MONTH'S GAOL

Incidents On Voyage From England

By Telegraph—Press Association.
AUCKLAND, August 1.

An engineer's refusal to obey orders on board ship was described in the Magistrate's Court when Edward George Simey, fourth engineer in the Albyn Line steamer Thistle-garth, at present berthed at Chelsea, appeared on summons before Mr. C. R. Orr Walker, S.M., at Auckland, in answer to charges of wilful neglect of duty and of disobedience to orders between June 1 and July 2.

Mr. Cocker prosecuted on behalf of the company and Mr. Bryce Hart appeared for the accused, who pleaded not guilty to the charges. After evidence had been heard however, the plea was withdrawn in favour of a plea of guilty.

Mr. Cocker said the accused sailed as fourth engineer in the Thistle-garth when she left Cardiff on February 8. Trouble arose toward the end of April because he had refused to do his duty apart from his watches in the engine room.

On April 27 he had suffered an accident to his hand, which was sufficient to prevent him from working for a short period.

Refused To Work

"When the ship was in port at Java toward the end of May," Mr. Cocker continued, "the captain had the accused examined by a doctor, who certified him 75 per cent. fit for light work. The accused, however, objected to obeying orders and on July 1 he refused point blank to do any work at all. He has since done nothing on the ship."

As the Thistle-garth was not scheduled to reach England before the end of November, Mr. Cocker submitted that it would be inimical to discipline and to organization if the accused were permitted to remain in the ship.

The company was prepared to pay all the expenses involved in sending accused back to England if the magistrate would grant a cancellation of the accused's articles.

Evidence that the accused had acted in the manner described by Mr. Cocker was given by William Staveland, master of the Thistle-garth. Not only had the accused refused to obey orders, witness said, but he had fraternised with the seamen in a manner unbecoming to an officer.

Plea Reversed

After further evidence had been given by the chief engineer in the ship, Mr. Hart said the accused desired to plead guilty to the charges. "He has been at sea for more than two years," said Mr. Hart, "and has excellent credentials. His is an extraordinary case and his actions must have arisen from his state of mind, caused by the accident he suffered."

Stating that he could not see why the accused should not have shown some desire to do light work in the ship after he had recovered from his injury the Magistrate said the accused's actions had been contrary to all the rules of discipline. Simey was sentenced to a month's imprisonment and his articles were cancelled. The Magistrate ordered him to be released when arrangements had been made by the Superintendent of Marine to repatriate him to a suitable port in Sunderland, England.

KOPUAWHARA VALLEY SETTLERS DESPERATE

Farmers Facing Ruin And Destitution As Result Of Floods

WAIROA.

The present condition of the Kopuawhara Valley settlers is desperate. Many of them are facing ruin as a result of the heavy losses and damage suffered since the beginning of the year. The patience and courage shown by them in the most trying circumstances is remarkable.

At present the settlers' properties are a sea of mud and water. Over 2000 acres have been affected, comprising a number of both small and large holdings. Approximately 1000 acres of pasture are still under water. The main herds of stock left have had to be shifted elsewhere or sold off, as it is impossible to graze them.

Owing to the silting-up of the drains and the general condition of the river, a rapid succession of floods has become a monotonous ordeal to the inhabitants. Some of them, with young families, repeatedly have had to evacuate their homes.

Hockey In The Dominion

"GAME VERY ROUGH"

Comment By Manager Of Indian Team

FINESSE NEEDED

En route to Wairoa and Gisborne, where they will play matches this week, the Prince of Manavardar's Indian hockey team spent last night in Napier and, in an interview with the "Daily Mail," the manager of the team, Professor Jagan Nath, gave his opinion of the standard of hockey in the Dominion.

"The standard of the game in New Zealand is good and the team which we played in the second Test was the best that we have met so far on the tour," said the professor, "showing a 100 per cent improvement on the display given in the first Test. The backs were good but the forwards have a lot to learn. The game as played in the Dominion is very rough and there is too much personal contact. Hockey is meant to be played with the stick but the majority of the New Zealand players we have met are lacking in finesse.

Very Heavy Grounds.

"Throughout the tour we have struck bad grounds, the majority being very heavy, and it may be that this tends to make the New Zealand style of play a hard hitting, vigorous type of game. Your players must learn body and ball control if they wish to make a name for themselves in the hockey world. It is against the spirit of the game to give body checks and the only time the body should play a part is when the hand or foot is used to stop the ball.

"The members of the team are becoming acclimatised, although a few are suffering from colds, while others are experiencing muscular trouble. This latter complaint is caused by playing on the heavy grounds, on which an attempt to come to a sudden stop can easily mean a torn muscle or sinew."

Hospitable Country.

Professor Jagan Nath said that he was greatly impressed by the bright cordiality of the people of the Dominion, all of whom spared no pains to make them feel at home. He saw New Zealand as a pleasant and prosperous country in which the people apparently had sufficient of everything that goes to make for a contented race.

"You are very fortunate in that there is little if any poverty in your country," he said, "as this course soon destroys the morale of any people and leaves its indelible mark on the rising generation and acts as a decided bar to the building of a strong character."

Shahabuddin, Peter Fernandez and Sultan Kahn, all of whom had visited the Dominion before with Dyan Chand's team, were proving of big assistance to the manager, and all three were cementing friendships formed on their first trip to New Zealand.

The Indians will leave for Wairoa and Gisborne to-day and will return to Napier to play Hawke's Bay on Saturday.

At a garden party at the British Legation in Helsingfors in honour of the King's birthday, the British colony presented the retiring Consul-General, Mr. J. A. Waite, with an address and a silver bowl in appreciation of his unflinching courtesy and helpfulness.

VISIT TO ROME PLANNED
ARCHBISHOP O'SHEA LEAVING
END OF AUGUST
Pastoral Letter Gives Reasons

By Telegraph—Press Association. WELLINGTON, August 1. Archbishop O'Shea, Metropolitan of New Zealand and Roman Catholic Archbishop of Wellington, is to leave for Rome toward the end of August. He will thus anticipate the visit "ad limina," which he would be bound to pay in 1940.

During his absence the Rt. Rev. Monsignor Connolly will act as Administrator of the Archdiocese. Archbishop O'Shea will be joined in London by the Rev. Father Gascoigne, and they will go on to Rome together.
In a pastoral letter the Archbishop gives the reasons for his decision as follows:—
"First, the New Zealand centennial celebrations are to take place in 1940 and, with the approval of the other members of the Hierarchy, it has been decided that the contribution of the Catholic Church shall take the form of a Catholic congress in Wellington during the first days of February, 1940.

"It will, therefore, be more convenient for me to make my visit to Rome as soon as possible and at the same time it will be of advantage to our undertaking to have the personal encouragement and blessing of the Holy Father.

Silver Jubilee
"A second reason for going now is that my visit overseas will help to draw attention to the proposed congress as well as the centennial itself in the countries of Europe and America, and perhaps induce some prominent Catholics to come to New Zealand in 1940 and thus promote the success of the celebrations.

"Still another reason arises from the fact that my episcopal silver jubilee occurs on the 17th of this month and it is my wish that there should be no formal celebration to mark this event now. Rather do I desire that all should reserve their efforts and concentrate on one big function in 1940.

"I ask only that the priests and religious, the people and children remember me and the deeds of the archdiocese in their masses, communions and prayers on August 17.

"During the period of my absence from the archdiocese let the Litany and our Blessed Lady be sung or recited in all churches and oratories of religious houses whenever benediction of the Blessed Sacrament is given that success may attend my efforts on behalf of the congress and that God may protect me on my journey to Rome, and back to you."

Electric Power Charges
Possibility Soon, Says Mr Semple
MINISTER'S CONCERN

By Telegraph—Press Association. CHRISTCHURCH, August 1. Revision of electric power charges, with the possibility of a national flat rate and the abolition of guarantees now required from consumers, were plans of the Government, said the Hon. Mr Semple, when he met the Banks Peninsula Electric Power Board at a conference this morning.

The Minister added that reform of power charges was vitally necessary, but could not be accomplished immediately because of the mass of investigation required. He proposed however, to call a conference of power-supply authorities to discuss the matter.

The problem of reviewing the power system from a national point of view had been worrying him ever since he became Minister, said Mr Semple. He was very concerned that about 30,000 people in the Dominion could not get power because of the high guarantees required. Changes in power-supply matters could not be expected this year. Information was being gathered, and if the Government were returned at the end of the year re-organisations would take place.

"My own view is that possibly very shortly there will be a national point of view," declared the Minister. "The burden of establishment costs has been overcome and the country is now nearing the stage where rates could be revised and the question of abolishing guarantees discussed."

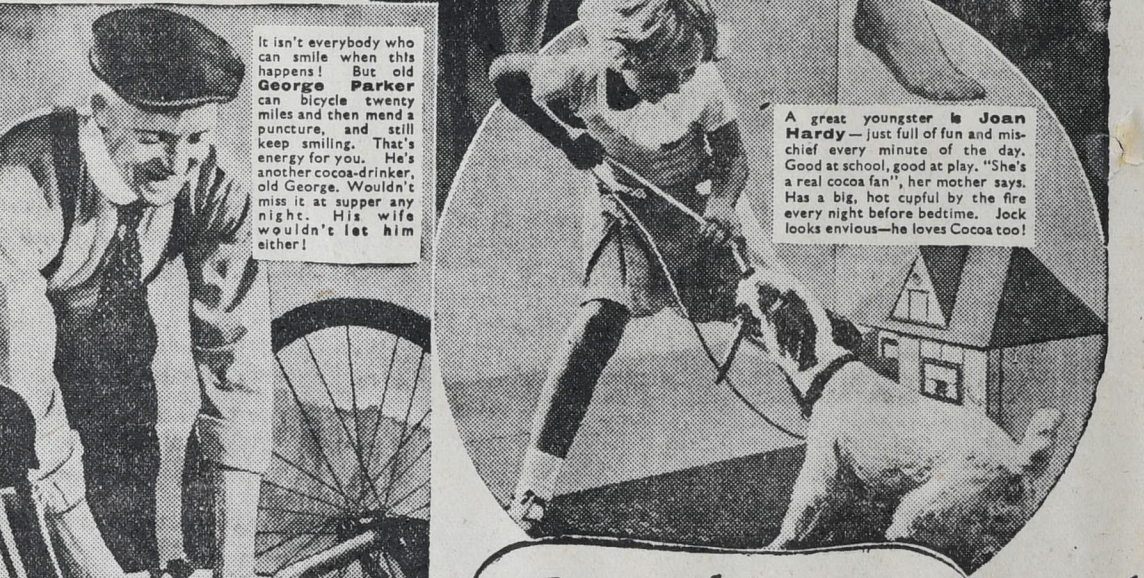

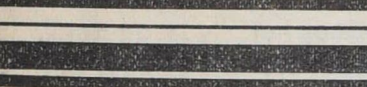

RICHARD TAUBER HELPS HIS WIFE TO CHOOSE HER CLOTHES

Mrs Tauber loves sport, and writes ballads for her husband to put to music, but she is not musical, and "can't even sing 'God Save the King' in tune."

When Mrs Tauber was interviewed by a representative of the "Sydney Morning Herald," Women's Supplement in Melbourne, she made a charming picture in a long honey-coloured Hungarian patterned house coat, with rich auburn hair curling close to her head, blue eyes sparkling, and creamy skin aglow as she declared that she and her husband had realised a dream in coming to Australia.

She dresses beautifully, and relies to a considerable extent on her husband's judgment in choosing clothes. But their tastes in hats for women differ. Mrs Tauber likes unusual hats, her husband does not.

"The higher my hat, the longer his face," she said laughingly. "Once he threatened to divorce me if I did not send a certain hat back. I sent it back. Richard loses no opportunity to tell everyone that he thinks ladies' hats to-day are funny."

The famous singer also dresses carefully and tastefully, and relies on his wife's guidance in the selection of clothes. His dress when he arrived in Australia included a blue shirt, bright red spotted tie, and brown suede shoes, and struck a pleasantly picturesque note.

Soon after they were married, Mrs Tauber arrived at the conclusion that her husband was overweight, so she planned to reduce it. She actually succeeded in reducing his weight by two stone.

"I changed his diet and used a little blackmail," she confessed. "I told him that if he ate too much I would smoke too much. He stopped eating so much when I soon got up to 50 cigarettes a day."

For slimming, Mrs Tauber recommends salads, grilled food, and no alcoholic drinks.

Mrs Tauber has travelled extensively all her life. Her father, an Army medical officer, was sent to South Africa when she was three months old. She wants to come to New Zealand, because her mother was born in Auckland.

Both Mr and Mrs Tauber are home-lovers. In London they live, whenever possible, in a little house at Elstree, which Mrs Tauber had before she was married. They hope to buy a house and settle down in London next year.

WHEN BATHTUBS WERE TAXED

Tale of the American Victorian Age

The first American woman to use a bathtub was the wife of a wealthy cotton and grain dealer of Cincinnati, Ohio, who installed a tub in 1842. The tub, which was seven feet long and four feet wide, was encased in Nicaraguan mahogany, and was lined with sheet metal. It weighed 1750 pounds.

Shortly after this miniature swimming pool had been assembled, complete with pump, its proud owner threw a party and invited his guests to try the contraption. Several of them died, with every Victorian decency observed, but next day news of the unprecedented tub and its uses found its way into an irate press.

Politicians and doctors as guardians of the public health and health were uncompromising in their wrath. In fact, so great was the general apprehension that not long after this the state of Virginia levied a tax on bathtubs, and increased the water rates.

WILL PARIS CELEBRATIONS INFLUENCE FASHIONS?

Designers May Be Inspired By Brilliant Period Costumes and Jewellery

It will be interesting to see to what extent the celebrations in Paris of the 300th anniversary of the birth of Louis XIV will influence prevailing fashions. During the long reign of "Le Roi Soleil," France knew a period of great prosperity and led Europe in the arts, in literature and in fashion. Paris will have many souvenirs of this glorious epoch before her during the celebrations (writes a Paris correspondent).

In addition to the exhibition and fetes at Versailles there are to be presentations at the opera of the works of Lulli, his chief musician, and at the theatres of plays by Moliere and Racine. Parisian designers are almost certain to take inspiration from the dress of that period, and already there are signs that the trend of fashions is towards the brilliant costumes and extravagant jewellery and decor of the court of Louis XIV.

It is perhaps in the new hat collections that the most obvious inspiration is to be seen at the moment. Strangely enough it is from the men's hats of the period that this inspiration comes.

Already there are tricorne which have many unusual features to give them distinction and charm. Some have uneven sides and are worn tilted well forward, with low-fitted crowns. Others have high crowns which are trimmed with wide ribbon bands lying at the back. Where the point is worn in the centre of the front the tricorne is pushed well back on the head, and in some cases the point is worn fitting into the neck at the back, with the square end turned back off the face.

Very characteristic, too, of the period are bicorne, wide musketeer hats with sweeping ostrich feathers, and small hats with flat brims and high stiff crowns which recall those worn by the infantry of the French King's Guard. Several little toques of felt, velvet, and grosgrain have high pleated fronts which recall the "Fontange" head-dress particularly affected by the ladies of the French court.

Embroidered Coats

With these hats there will almost certainly go coats and suits which follow the line of the men's fashions of that time. Knee-length coats are fitted to the waist with flared basques. A tailored suit of tiny black and white checks is cut on these lines and has slanting pockets trimmed with buttons and bordered.

with Nattier blue braid. These diagonal pockets with deep flaps are a very characteristic note of the period, and they go with sleeves which have wide cuffs often buttoned back and sometimes in a different colour from the coat.

Buttons are used extensively, often in close rows which make them look like a braid trimming. Lavish embroidery appears on coat fronts, collars, and pockets, this being a further development of a fashion which has been popular all through the season.

Bows, Laces, Jewellery

Evening fashions of the period follow an off-the-shoulder decolletage with wide sweeping skirts and panniered effects. Many of the present season's most attractive dresses have been on these gracious lines, and the new influence will no doubt add its characteristic touches of bowknot motifs of ribbon on bodice, shoulders and wrist, and cabochon buckles to hold sleeve drapery. On less formal gowns will no doubt appear long, soft bishop sleeves caught in at the wrist with a narrow cuff.

There is likely to be a great demand for gold jewellery. The elaborate mural decorations at Versailles will no doubt inspire designs in clips, brooches and bracelets. There will be roses, oak-leaves and lilies, and the horn of plenty tied with twisted ribbons. True-lovers'

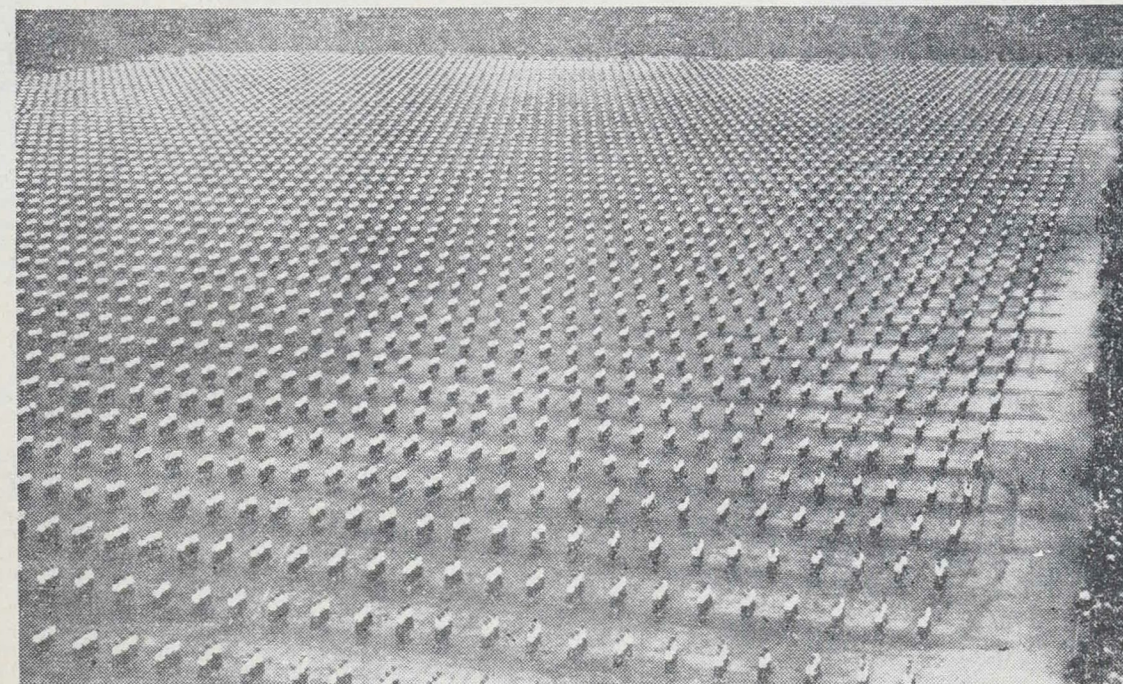

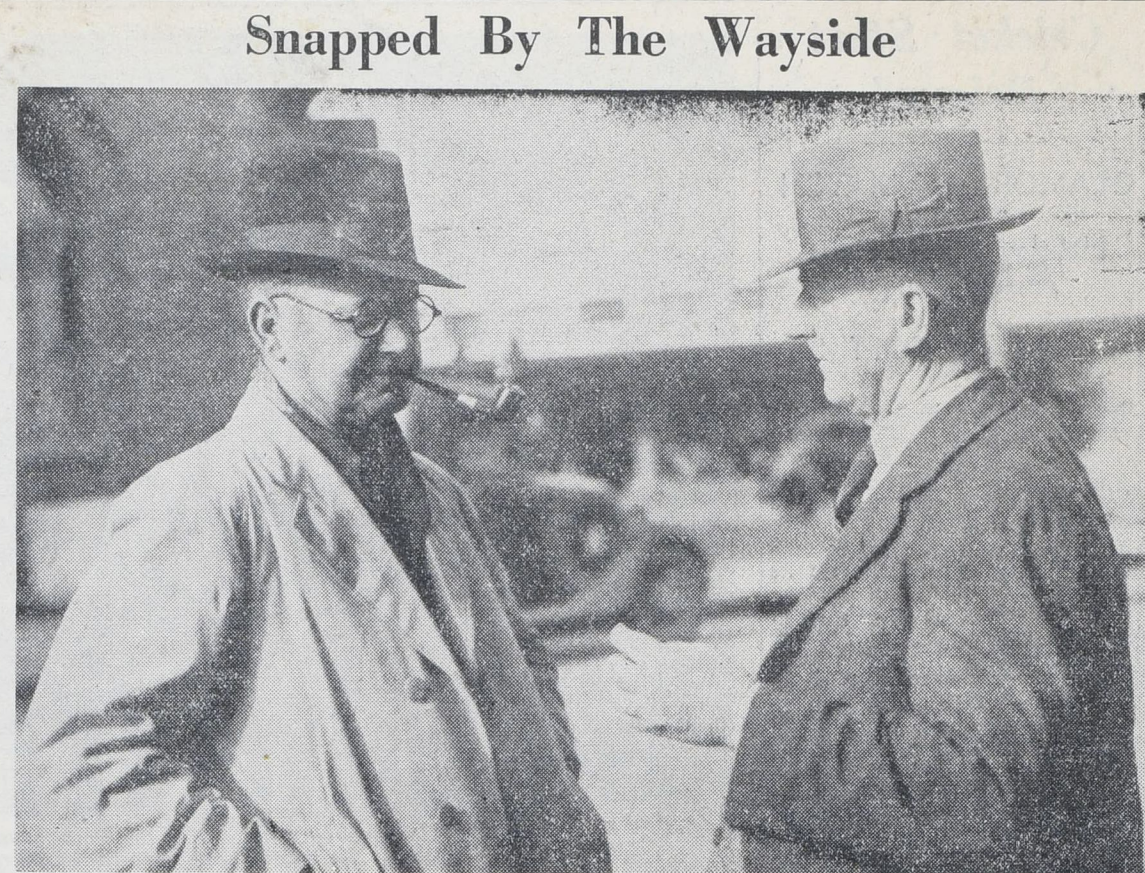
