Fighting Continues On Border

JAPAN ANXIOUS FOR PEACE: TERMS STATED

Russian Forces On The Offensive

After a peaceful night the Soviet forces opened a fierce bombardment against the Japanese at Shuiliufeng and North Changkufeng, and also conducted large-scale operations near Shaotsaoping in the Changkufeng hills.

Sixty Soviet tanks and two battalions of infantry were detected at dawn deployed near a height in front of Changkufeng in preparation for an attack on the Japanese positions. The Russians were greeted with an intense fire, and were repulsed with heavy losses.

Simultaneously, a second Soviet force of 50 tanks and one infantry battalion was repulsed in the vicinity of Shaot-

The Soviet artillery was more accurate than hitherto. A summary of the situation published by the Japanese Foreign Office is generally interpreted as revealing that both

sides have agreed to the principle of a peaceful settlement.

The immediate issue appears to have been narrowed down to a mutual evacuation of the disputed area before opening negotiations

Japan has sent new instructions to her Moscow Ambas-sador after receiving an official account of Mr Shigemitsu's interview with M. Litvinov.

The Japanese report on the Litvinov-Shigemitsu talks states that Mr Shigemitsu declared that Japan had agreed with the Soviet that it was desirable to have a practical and a peaceful settlement of the incident, for which Japan proposed that the question of legality be reserved for the future.

Japan maintained, however, that the incident was provoked by the Soviet troops, and she contended that there was no doubt that Changkufeng and other hills belonged to Manchukuo, and thus there was no ground for the withdrawal

This would impose an unreasonable obligation on Japan. Soviet aeroplanes raided the Japanese positions in the neighbourhood of Changkufeng Hill, and also the township of Kozan and the railway settlements of Koje and Shikai in North Korea.



STORM CAUSES HAVOC ON ENGLISH COAST

Dense Fog In The Channel: Heavy Rain And Tidal Wave Reported

The great storm which moved east across southern England yesterday, but missed London, passed over northern holiday resorts to-day, causing much havoc. The temperature in London, after starting several degrees cooler than yesterday, mounted again after luncheon and in the late afternoon was several degrees higher, despite prevailing overcast

Fog was experienced in a number of districts, and was so dense in the Channel that shipping was held up in the Straits of Dover and between north and south Foreland. People in Deal standing on the beach could not even see the water.

The mist and fog delayed the continuation of the home defence air exercises, but active operations were resumed at 2 p.m. The weather, however, is still bad, and the coastland plan had to be considerably modified.

During severe thunderstorms along the east coast yesterday, a tidal wave invaded Bridlington Harbour.

Four hours previously at high tide the sea had receded suddenly by 15ft., leaving vessels high and dry. It returned with renewed force, refloating these and other craft further

Three-quarters of an inch of rain fell in an hour at Bridlington, and there was considerable flooding.

Liverpool suffered most heavily. During the sixth successive day of storms much damage and delay to Merseyside

The Mersey Tunnel was flooded for the first time in its history, and several buildings were struck by lightning.





FACTS AND FANCY IN MILK

STRANGE SUPERSTITIONS WITHOUT REASON

Many people who open umbrellas in the house, scoff at broken mirrors and never knock on wood, are nevertheless highly superstitious about milk. For instance, there has been a curious belief that cherries, oranges, and other acid fruits used in combination with milk cause digestive disturbances. The idea was apparently based upon the fact digestive disturbances. The idea was apparently based upon the fact that milk is curdled by acid. Even to-day, when most people realise that milk must be curdled by the acid of the stomach before it can be digested, the superstition persists. As a matter of fact, the acid fruits, by their curdling action on milk, are positive aids to digestion. milk, are positive aids to digestion.

Another hoary legend concerns the effects of fish and milk in combination. In the days before adequate refrigeration, fish unfit for food may have been served often. If milk happened to be served at the same time, then food poisoning caused by the fish alone might have been blamed on the combination. 





THE QUESTION OF COLOUR

A very interesting subject was touched on by Professor Jagan Nath, the manager of the Indian hockey team which spent the week-end in Hawke's Bay, in the course of an address to the boys of Hereworth School on Saturday.

When appealing for friendly relationship between India and New Zealand, the professor asked if the peoples of both countries were not partners in "the same great Empire, loving and respecting the same King and Queen," and he added that "dark skins were the result of climatic conditions and did not alter the thoughts that were harboured beneath them."

Such an appeal as this will probably be received more sympathetically in New Zealand than in other parts of the world, for the reason that the colour question has not been a point of controversy in the Dominion since the early days of European settlement. Indeed, it is not too much to say that in this respect New Zealand to-day is unique.

New Zealanders as a people have little understanding of the bitterness which has grown out of the imposition of rigid colour barriers in, for example, South Africa, and to many "colour consciousness" seems a senseless and somewhat tragic form of racial enmity which could be smoothed away by the employment of a little common sense. But then New Zealanders are in a singularly fortunate position. The pakeha is inclined to judge all native peoples by the standard of the Polynesian, a race which, as much as any non-white race, is deserving of the respect of the European. It may be said that where that respect is not given, the fault usually lies in the ignorance of the European, but this does not alter the fact that New Zealanders are in the happy position of living in a land where there is no necessity for colour barriers.

And at this point it is not out of place to add that New Zealanders of European descent can be just as "colour conscious" as other people when they are placed in different circumstances. In Western Samoa, where the Europeans are in a very pronounced minority, white residents are inclined to look askance at the white man or woman who treats natives on terms of equality.

The visitor to Samoa who has spent any length of time in, say, the French Polynesian islands, finds himself entangled in innumerable conventions as soon as he sets foot in the New Zealand mandated territory, conventions which the French, to whom differences of colour mean nothing, would never dream of observing.

But there is more to the question than this. If, as Professor Jagan Nath says, "the heat of the sun controls complexions and all human beings would look alike if they lived under the same conditions," it follows logically that the Australian aborigine is the physical and mental equal of the Maori of New Zealand, that the South African bushman can claim equality with the most cultured Hindu or Mohammedan of India, and that the chief of a Congo tribe may have the brain of an Einstein under a skin pigmented by the tropical sun. The argument ultimately leads into the labyrinths of evolution, biology, and related subjects, and any sweeping statement is open to criticism.

But if, as is probable, the professor made his appeal simply as a plea for a better understanding among the peoples which constitute the British Empire, he deserves the warm support of every British-born subject, irrespective of colour, nationality, or creed. The doctrine of "racial purity" which is being carried to

absurd lengths by the totalitarian States, and which inevitably leads to open persecution in one form or another, is subscribed to only in a very diluted form in the British Commonwealth. There is pride of race, but not racial intolerance.

Visits such as that of the Indian hockey team, which are in the nature of friendly tours without the spirit of over-keen international rivalry which is inclined to creep into some other sports, are perhaps the best means of promoting that better understanding for which the professor appeals.



A definite scheme for all meat was suggested at a cost of £100,000 per annum to be supported pro rata by all the various meat interests. and although this particular scheme was rejected by the National Far-mers' Union of Great Britain, it is still possible that two advertising campaigns may be inaugurated—one for Scottish meat and another for English meat.


