## INTENSE BATTLE RAGES ON THE BORDER

Russian Attacks Repulsed

JAPANESE ARMY LEADERS **CONFER** 

Plan For Settlement Sought

United Press Association-Copyright. (Received August 11, 12.45 a.m.)

TOKYO, August 10.

It is semi-officially stated that since the outbreak of hostilities on the Manchukuan border the Russians have fired between 25,000 and 30,000 shells and Russian aircraft have dropped an incalculable number of bombs.

Fighting raged throughout the night at Changkufeng. Two battalions of Russians were flung in at 9 p.m. under cover of a fierce artillery bombardment.

It is reported that they were repulsed after heavy

The Russians returned to the attack at midnight, freely using hand grenades. They strove until 7 a.m. to dislodge the Japanese from Hill 52.

Dawn revealed that the positions were largely unchanged. Forty-five Soviet 'planes bombed Kajo and Keijo in Korea, but the damage was slight.

Japanese Leaders Confer.

A few hours after the breaking up of the conference of the Japanese General Staff, members of the Supreme War Council were hastily summoned to consider the border hos-

Those present included the Emperor's uncle, Prince Asaka, the Chief of the General Staff (Prince Kanin), and the Minister of War (Lieutenant-General Itagaki). A conference was held later with 24 generals

The Japanese Foreign Office sokesman confirmed the report that Japan is agreeable to a border commission with fifty-fifty Russian and Japanese representation, which would fall in with Moscow's demands. The spokesman added that the negotiations had not reached a deadlock, but that patience was required.

#### WALLPAPERS THAT SOLVE MANY PROBLEMS

#### When Skilfully Chosen They Correct Architectural **Defects**

Wallpaper skilfully chosen is probably the most effectual single corrective of architectural defects which is offered by decorative materials. It can apparently raise or lower ceilings expand small rooms, or contract large ones; it establishes balance where it is lacking, and brings in either sunshine or shadow. This is because no other fabrication covers such large surfaces in our interiors. Paint, although it can do a great deal by the medium of colour graduations, lacks the added factor of pattern which gives paper much of its potency.

Problems are the spice of life, and our intelligence is continually whet-ted by the fact that we must solve them. In the field of interior decorthem. In the field of interior decoration, defects in architecture supply us with stimulating opportunities to be ingenious. If a ceiling seems to settle down upon our heads, we can raise it, in effect, by papering the walls with perpendicular stripes or an up-climbing vine or floral pattern. We can complete the illusion by putting on the ceiling itself a pale paper, either plain or with tiny dots or stars. To seemingly lower a ceiling whose height seems too a ceiling whose height seems too lofty, or which is too formal for its furnishings, we can do the contrary
—use a horizontal stripe or pattern
for the walls and cover the ceiling
with a much darker paper—say maroon or plum.

#### To Bring Light to Darkish Rooms





#### SAFETY ON THE ROADS

No one can say that the present Government has lagged in its endeavour to tackle the whole problem of road convenience and road safety in a comprehensive way. The fact remains, however, that there has been no appreciable lessening of road accidents to correspond with the work that has been done or with the regulations that have been formulated to prevent them.

When a man of the vigour and devoted purpose of the Hon. R. Semple cannot succeed in his task to anything like the limit of his intentions and expectations, it is time to ask whether other—and at present uncontrollable—factors come into the question.

Perhaps these other factors may be apprehended if a study is made of the locations of road accidents. The average reader of the daily news is aware that more fatalities occur on wide and busy streets than on narrow and less frequented

It is hardly necessary to mention the well-known highways where the surface has been treated by the best of scientific skill, where regulations have been piled on regulations for the guidance of drivers, and yet where the number of road victims shows no sign of declining.

The factors involved are psychological. Material amenities and advantages matter nothing if they are not used as opportunities for the preserving of greater safety.

There are better roads, clearer signs, more powerful and more efficient cars, but human nature remains as it was.

In many cases the increased facilities for easy and quick driving have been more of a curse than a blessing, giving a

greater chance for the inconsiderate motorist to misuse his

advantages. The present age has brought with it what might be termed a motoring complex that has more than a tinge of superiority about it.

Everyone, on foot or awheel, is familiar with the dust nuisance in dry weather, the splash nuisance in wet weather, and the speed nuisance at all times.

Sharp curves may be straightened, dangerous hills eliminated, the rough places may be made plain, but until the mentality of the road-user can be so treated as to enable him to use such good achievements not only for his own benefit but for the benefit of other travellers, the total of accidents will continue to mount.

It would almost seem that there is no legislative system, as such, that is sufficient to cope with the situation. The best legislation in this case is that which the individual imposes on himself

To assist towards a better road sense, it is not sufficient merely to fine offenders, or even to imprison them, whatever the cause. What is needed is a thoroughgoing test of every driver—a test that will be carried out not only once and for all, but at intervals, as well as a more searching examination of the vehicles in use on the roads.

But the essential requirement can be provided only by the individual himself; by establishing in his own mind a set of rules and regulations for his own conduct as a driver that will bring him within the requirements of any others that may be applicable anywhere.

The problem is difficult, but it is not insoluble. The sum and substance of the matter is that more stress should be put upon the human aspect of road dangers.

Accidents may best be prevented by the widespread dissemination and cultivation of a spirit of consideration and by the increasing and intensifying of attacks on that type of ideology which selfishly turns a blind eye to the rights of

The plaintiff is represented by Mr J. J. Sullivan and Mr Winter, while Mr V. R. Meredith and Mr F. McCarthy are appearing for the defendant board. Evidence for the plaintiff was completed yesterday, and

"Do you not know that Mother



As it's name implies this is a horned breed, but when mated with a polled sheep the progeny of the first cross are hornless. It is a big bodied, white-faced sheep, carrying, in the best type, a dense and fairly long fleece of wool. Being remarkably hardy and particularly good doers, the breed should thrive in almost any district, and it is asserted that the lambs grow and thrive on the mothers so rapidly that they are ready for the butcher a full month before those of any other English before those of any other English


