EXTENT OF ONEKAKA IRON ORE DEPOSITS

Early Estimates Excessive: Exhaustive Survey Now Being Undertaken

'At the moment it looks as if Mr Mackintosh Bell's estimates of the extent of the ore deposits were excessive," said the Minister of Industries and Commerce (the Hon. D. G. Sullivan), when asked to-day to comment on the report indicating that the available ore deposits at Onekaka, where it is proposed to establish State iron and steel works, are well below the original estimates.

The report referred to the Minister was published in the "Motueka Star-Times" and said: "Although no official announcement can yet be made in respect of the density of Onekaka iron ore deposits, it is understood that tests recently carried out in Wellington disclosed a much more satisfactory position than was anticipated a few weeks ago.

"It was then reported that tunnelling operations had not brought the results expected and that the Onekaka iron deposits were yet to be proved.

"Experimental forms of the moment it looks as if Mr Mackintosh Bell's estimates were excessive, but exploratory work has not been carried sufficiently far to warrant my saying more at this stage."

Reports of the georogical survey made when Mr James Mackintosh Bell was director were those on which the Government based its estimates in deciding to launch the State iron and steel industry at One-kaka iron deposits were yet to be proved.

"From inquiries made, it appears that the ore deposits at Onekaka are of a somewhat scattered nature, but on the Parapara block they are very much better. From what can be learned, it is believed that the rough estimate of 68,000,000 tons of iron ore previously made is very wide of the mark, and even a third of that quantity would perhaps be rather an optimistic estimate."

Until the present surveys now being undertaken over the whole area, the details supplied in those reports were the only reliable official data available which could indicate the likely reserve supplies of ore in the three orc bearing areas.



HOW THE DOUGHNUT RECEIVED ITS SHAPE

The Suggestion of an Old Sea Captain

An old New England sea captain, one Hanson Gregory, gave the modern American doughnut its hole. The date of the great contribution was 1847. The captain was a boy at the time watching his mother fry doughnuts, he noticed that the centres of the cakes always seemed doughy, and suggested eliminating this part before the cakes were cooked. Laughingly she followed the suggestion, and the result was so satisfactory that she never went back to the old way. Her method was copied by others until it spread over the whole country.







At the time of the strike by the rivers' board employees, he had of-fered to take the whole work over from the board and carry it out by the Public Works. The board refused to agree to this.

"If I had had my way we would have had the job finished by now," said Mr Semple. "We would have put modern machinery on the job, instead of employing the obsolete methods used. Now after all these months, when the job should have been completed, there is a request for machinery to do it. I would have been doing it that way all along if I had had my way."





SPRING SUNSHINE .- A scene near the traffic bridge at Waipukurau.







DANGERS OF A FRENCH CRISIS

The economic recession which has been developing in America and Europe during the last few months has now reached the point where its effects on those countries not sufficiently stable to withstand the impact can be plainly

The United States first felt the pinch when the prodigious spending on national relief schemes and enterprises was perforce reduced. So sudden and so drastic was the resulting economic lapse that President Roosevelt was forced to rush hurried measures through to ensure new supplies of Government finance and aid.

Great Britain was better equipped to ward off the influence of the worst features of the recession, but nevertheless it is generally admitted that there has been a relapse, and that most careful administration and general policy is, and will be, necessary if a major depression is to be avoided. It is to be remembered, however, that Britain has not plunged herself into deep financial waters in her effort to bring about a recovery, and in that she has an inherent soundness which

will prove its worth in the immediate future. Both Italy and Germany, and more markedly Japan, have been poised on the brink of an economic catastrophe for a considerable period. Indeed, in these countries disaster has been avoided only by the expedient of regimenting the reserves and resources of the people to the utmost, and by departing entirely from even the pretext of a system of

industrial and labour laws. The precarious position of these three countries is emphasised by the trend of recent events. Japan backed down before the threat of a war with Russia. Italy, more than a little shaken by German truculence in Central Europe, demonstrated that she was not unimpressed by the value of

Germany, with all her new-found national swaggering and international aggressiveness, has obviously found cause to walk a little warily during the last week or two. The dramatic collapse of the German Bourse, and the frantic efforts of Herr Hitler and Dr. Schacht to inject capital into the anaemic Reich economic body, diverted all attention from the plan to intimidate Europe and Czechoslovakia by a blatant display of military might.

However, the new crists in France has introduced a dangerous element into the whole situation. As long as the economic weakness was confined to the trouble-makers of Europe, it seemed apparent that the only danger of war would arise from sheer desperation—and it may be assumed that the financially stable Powers would see to it that the desperation point would never be reached.

The financial and industrial crisis threatening in France, if developing to a dangerous degree, may be viewed by these same trouble-makers possibly as an opportunity to begin a new campaign of truculence. A strong Britain and a strong France seeking to impose their will for peace upon a weakened Fascist alliance has been an effective combination, but if France becomes embroiled in internal difficulties it is not hard to see what the reaction of other European Powers will be.

From this point of view, and bearing in mind the characteristic international diplomacy of Herr Hitler, it is safe to say that if France does not succeed in putting her house in order without delay, there may be serious repercussions in the attitude of both Germany and Italy towards current European problems.

M. Daladier, the French Prime Minister, clearly appreciates this danger. In his appeal to the French nation for support of his rehabilitation proposals, he emphasised the profound effect national disunity and financial difficulty would have on the delicate balance between peace and war at present obtaining in Europe. Unfortunately, there appear to be large sections of the

French people who refuse to face the realities of the situation.

It is not improbable that industrial disorders will become

widespread as a result of the Prime Minister's determination

to stabilise France—even at the expense of sacrificing some of the social and labour laws which were instituted by the first Blum Ministry, and which have been augmented since. While the tension in France prevails, the world's anxiety must be considerably increased. It is sincerely to be hoped that France will find a speedy way out of her difficulty. Meantime, the reactions of other European Powers should be

watched carefully and closely.


