DR. McMILLAN OUTLINES HEALTH SCHEME BENEFITS

Free Medical Service And Cash Pensions: Right To Choose And Change Doctors



ENGINEER'S REPORT

Rochfort) who is carrying out the work. This estimate, however, is dependent on the weather.

When the survey is completed Mr Rochfort will probably confer with the engineers of the Public Works Department, the Hawke's Bay County Council, and the Napier Borough Council, to discuss a proposal for a comprehensive drainage scheme for the area.





WAR PRECAUTIONS

Plans for war-time control of Great Britain's food were disclosed recently by Sir Henry French, Director of the Food Defence Plans

Department. The main points are: All food supplies to be under a Food Controller, to be assisted by directors of supplies.

Meat and other important foods to be rationed.

The aim is to prevent any food shortage and to secure regulated prices and no queues.

ment agents.

A single controlling authority would be responsible for the supply of foodstuffs and animal feeding stuffs for the fighting services.

There would be no opportunities

for speculation.

If necessary, stocks will be requisitioned and distribution controlled by the central authority.

The census of available foodstuffs is now almost complete.

Special preparations are being made to protect transport from the menace of air attack by widespread dispersed of stocks.

The change from normal trading to war-time control would be operated as far as practicable by foodtraders themselves.

The public would be supplied with ration-books for meat, sugar, butter and other goods.












NEW ZEALAND'S DEFENCES

In the editorials appearing in the last two issues of the "Daily Mail," various aspects of the problem of New Zealand defence have been discussed, and the point has now been reached where attention may be given to the vital matter of land defences.

Once established on these shores, an enemy would probably attempt to occupy those areas which would paralyse communications and interrupt the continuity of supplies. A further objective would be to prevent New Zealand forces from consolidating into one

Thus, the essential requirement of New Zealand's land defences is mobility, and strength in vulnerable areas. At the present time mobility need not concern us greatly, as far as road and rail transport is concerned. All motor and rail transport required would undoubtedly be pressed into service, and with the network of roads in this country, little difficulty would be experienced in bringing our forces sufficiently close to the scene.

However, if the enemy should choose to select a base beyond the reach of roads, with the purpose of later launching attacks by transporting troops by sea to other parts, the position would become a little more complicated. In view of such a possibility, and remembering always New Zealand's mountainous and rugged character, it would appear that mounted forces can still play an effective part in

It is true that the modern cry is for increasing mechanisation. New Zealand cannot afford to neglect this most important branch. but at the same time she should not discard too hastily the mounted units. Mechanisation can be effective only where the physical nature of the country is suitable for its employment, and it must not be presumed that the enemy would choose a point from which to launch his attack, which would be suitable to our weapons.

It is not at all likely that an invader would bring any great quantity of mechanised weapons such as tanks. There might be a few armoured patrol cars, but the extent of his mechanisation would probably extend to tractor-drawn artillery and similar units. On our part, we can still use horses most effectively for many of these purposes, and could probably gain advantages that an attacker would find difficult to counter.

This is a matter which the Government might well examine. It will be necessary, in any case, to go thoroughly into the question of an adequate supply of horses of the type required, and to take what steps may be necessary to ensure that we will not be handicapped

Coming now to the question of infantry, engineers, and other essential units, it cannot be denied that the position is most unsatisfactory. In the days of compulsory training, New Zealand had a force of something like 20,000 reasonably-trained men it could put into the field at short notice. To-day, despite what may be said by the Government, it is doubtful if any great percentage of the nominal number of volunteers have received a continuity of training which would make them even as efficient as the old territorials.

Those volunteers who have keenly followed the training given are comparatively small in numbers, and it is beyond the bounds of possibility to expect them to train recruits in the short time that might elapse between the outbreak of war and an invasion. Again, it is not clear whether we have sufficient equipment of modern and efficient type to supply a large defence force, and until this is available it is useless to talk of present preparation through the volunteer

The greatest objection to the compulsory military training was that it was militaristic—that we were training the young men of the country to be war-minded. Unfortunately, contemporary events have proved that it is time we became defence-minded, and a stronger lead than is being given at present is urgently required.

There are no objections to the volunteer system so long as it can produce an adequate force of well-equipped and efficient men. Unhappily, experience has shown that it has been left to a struggling few enthusiasts-and the encouragement that they have received in the past has not been very material. If the idea of a modified compulsory training system is still obnoxious, then far greater attention should be paid to the building-up of the volunteers. Until the time comes when we can put into the field a large

force of reasonably-trained men at short notice, our defence system must suffer a vital weakness. On the other hand, if we are in the

happy position of having such a force, no would-be aggressor would attack the Dominion with impunity, as we could probably outnumber any force he could reasonably bring. Here, then, is the crux of the whole position. We may spend millions on impressive weapons of warfare, but until we have the essential trained man-power our defences must continue to be fatally vulnerable. Unless the Government makes adequate provision for this in its proposed plans, and without delay, it must risk the charge

of being wilfully negligent.





WELLINGTON, June 16.

Suggestions by previous witnesses when giving evidence before the Board of Inquiry set up to investigate the Ratana railway disaster on March 26, that a third man, other than the driver and the fireman, had travelled on the locomotive, were discounted at the inquiry to-day.

It had been suggested that a man wearing dungarees and known as "Mac" had ridden on the footplate, but after hearing the evidence, the chairman (Sir Francis Frazer) said that he was satisfied that there was nothing in the rumour.

TOURISTS UNLIKELY TO STRIKE DELAY

"Services Running As Usual," States Manageress Of Motor Firm

"There is no doubt that the publicity given to the damage done to roads in Hawke's Bay by the floods has had a bad effect on the tourist traffic to this part of New Zealand," said Miss Cherry Harvey, manageress of the Hawke's Bay Motor Co., in an interview with the "Daily Mail" yesterday.

"The number of passengers travelling by various means in Hawke's Bay is abnormally low for this time of the year," Miss Harvey said, "and it has been brought to my notice that many overseas visitors and New Zealand holiday-makers have cancelled proposed visits to Hawke's Bay and the East Coast through reading reports about blocked roads.

"As far as the motor services are concerned, travellers can be assured that the possibility of their being held up by impassable roads is very small indeed. Apart from the fortnight immediately following the flood, when the roads were absolutely blocked by slips for considerable distances, this company has maintained daily services over all routes, and at no time, apart from the first fortnight, would travellers have been delayed at all. I hope that the widest publicity will be given to the fact that the various road services are being maintained because it obviously does harm to many classes of business in the district when the tourist traffic falls off to an abnormal extent."

Miss Harvey added that she had no criticism to make of the Public Works Department or the Automobile Association for their repeated warnings to motorists. Such warnings were necessary for the benefit of private motorists, but the experience of the service car drivers, combined with their knowledge of the roads, had enabled them to get through at all times without serious

The people who read about it after Mr Hamilton's speech knew less than they did before.

There had been no sounder piece of legislation introduced into the country than the guaranteed price, said the Minister. In the first year the amount paid to the farmer was £338,000 more than the Government had received. had received. Everyone got the benefit of that, for the money was spent in New Zealand.

Every farmer knew the guaranteed price, and knew for 12 months ahead what his income would be according to his production, and he could cut his costs accordingly.

"We have an organisation that is the envy of the world, in marketing," said Mr Langstone, "and now we have a sellers' market instead of a buyers' market. We have saved the dairy companies thousands of

the dairy companies thousands of pounds in bank charges alone."

Opponents had said that the Government was taking the control of their hutton control of was before the executive committee of their butter away from them. The farmers did not control much before. How many farmers in the Poverty Bay district to-day controlled their sheep or controlled their wool? When had they had that control? They had never had it. They were controlled by the mercantile firms, and those people were trying to "kid" the farmers that they were going to lose control. After further eulogy of the guaranteed price the Minister said, that he had been asked by a farmer that day if the Government intended to fix the price of wool.

"I told him," the Minister said, "that we have enough trouble now. We are out to help those who need help, but if wool came down to 6d per lb., wool farmers would come to the Government and ask for a guaranteed price."

Consequently, there has been an agitation for the restriction of imports from New Zealand and Australia

Lower Lamb Imports.

"Imports of frozen lamb in the first four months of this year have been somewhat less than in the corresponding period of 1937," he said. "Although there has been some increase in oversea supplies of mutton, the excess has largely consisted of the excess has largely consisted of lower grade ewe mutton. Stocks of mutton and lamb in cold storage in

mutton and lamb in cold storage in Great Britain are substantially below the levels of a year ago."

The English farmers' dissatisfaction has been encouraged largely by the comparison of this season's prices with those of last season, which were exceptionally high, and a certain annoyance at the successful results of the New Zealand advertising campaign.
