Failure To Plug Breaches MARSHAL CHIANG KAI-SHEK'S

LONDON, June 18.

The Japanese admit that their army is powerless against the floods, which are sweeping down the battlefield, says the Shanghai correspondent of the British United Press.

Efforts to plug the breaches in the dykes have failed. The water has risen four feet in two days. In addition to the flood barrier, Chinese guerilla forces in the Shansi mountains are preventing the Japanese westerly push which threatened the lifeline along which supplies from Russia are being received.

A Peking message states that the Chinese puppet Government has issued a manifesto condemning Marshal Chiang Kai-shek for cutting the dykes.

This, it states, will serve no purpose but the destruction of a Chinese State, and the impoverishment of its people. The Government urges him to concede defeat and to





JAPAN'S DIFFICULTIES

At the beginning of the Sino-Japanese conflict the principal question appeared to be: "How long can the Chinese resistance last?" Time has provided the answer, and current events would now indicate that the problem is: "How long can Japan continue the war?"

The cost to date has been staggering, and the stubbornness of the Chinese resistance still shows no signs of weakening. That this is giving Japan grave concern is apparent from the drastic emergency measures recently passed in the Japanese Imperial Diet.

In the previous sessions expenditure amounting to approximately £60,000,000 was provided for war costs in China. Two months later necessity compelled a further increase of £60,000,000, and last month the total reached almost £400,000,000. Since then the expenditure has been even greater, and it is not improbable that by now the conflict has cost Japan something like £600,000,000.

Among the emergency measures passed was a special Temporary Profit Taxation Law, and this, with the China Incident Special Taxation Law, is expected to provide approximately £37,000,000 additional revenue this year. Other new taxes are the Temporary Profit Tax, Sugar Consumption Tax, Dividends Tax, National Bonds Tax, Traffic Tax, and a Commodities Tax. Altogether, Japan's citizens are having a most unhappy time in paying for the cost of the war.

Not only has the Japanese Government been forced to resort to these extraordinary taxation measures, but it has also found it necessary to enact special laws aiming at the conservation of foodstuffs and supplies. Many great manufacturing concerns have been forced to limit their output in order that materials for war purposes may not be diverted into other manufactures. In addition to this, importers have had their buying from overseas severely restricted, as Japan's trade balance was so seriously weakened by lack of exports that a credit collapse was feared.

These regulations have had a profound effect on the national life of Japan. Many manufacturers fear that the loss of overseas markets due to the shortage of raw materials in industry and consequent reduced output may be difficult to recover. Although unemployment is, comparatively speaking, not great, it is feared that when eventually the war ends and the business of supplying war materials stops, there will be a superfluity of labour that the industry cannot hope to absorb, particularly in its present weakened condition.

Much of this is reflected in the attitude of investors in Japan. All Japanese stocks are down, and there are indications of a further weakening which may ultimately have disastrous results. The utilisation of all available reserves has partially succeeded in stemming the tide, but Japanese economists are now issuing warnings that the danger point is rapidly being approached.

The greater portion of the war expenditure is being defrayed through the flotation of national loans. The Government recently instituted a National Savings Campaign, with the objective of encouraging the people to increase their deposits in banks by approximately £600,000,000 during the current year. This increase will enable the Bank of Japan to underwrite the loans with safety. Up to last month the Bank of Japan had issued approximately £70,000,000 in National Bonds since the beginning of the year. This barely exceeded the amount underwritten, and the margin was sufficiently small to give concern as to the result of future issues.

The mobilisation of Japan's resources on a war-time basis was provided in the National Mobilisation Bill passed early this year-an enactment forced by the military clique, who demanded that more authority be placed in their hands. This led to a bitter fight in the Japanese Parliament, but ultimately it was passed. The result has been the institution of a virtual military dictatorship, with powers to conscript almost the whole of the nation's resources.

Despite the frantic efforts made to bring the war to an early conclusion, it became evident that Japan could not avoid a protracted struggle. Her economic position is now becoming desperate, and unless some finality is reached before long it is doubtful if she can

The present floods in China have dealt a severe blow to Japan's hopes of an early conclusion to the war. 

Christchurch Doctor Issues A Warning: Says Effect Of Drug Is Limited

CHRISTCHURCH, June 19. "Do not let people delude themselves that in sulphonamide derivatives we have at last the universal cure-all," said Dr. A. B. Pearson, pathologist at the Christchurch Hospital, when he was shown a cablegram quoting cures effected by a new sulphonamide drug.

"We have been using this product at the Christchurch Hospital for some time past, and although it has woman whose case is mentioned in certain strains of streptococci—which themselves are only one diviwhich themselves are only one division of a host of disease-causing bacteria—are destroyed by sulphonamide," said Dr. Pearson. "These are haemolytic streptococci. Sometimes pneumonia is caused by a bacteria that can be destroyed by sulphonamide, but very often it is not.




