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GRANTS FOR NEW BUILDINGS

MINISTER APPROVES OF FIVE

EDUCATION BOARD Monthly Meeting at Napier

Approval of grants for five new buildings was obtained in a letter from the Minister of Education, the Hon. P. Fraser, received at the monthly meeting of the Hawke's Bay Education Board.

The buildings were as follows:—Nuhaka, new teacher's residence; Rere, new school; Te Karaka, manual training buildings; Tolaga Bay, manual training buildings.

The Education Department wrote approving of the appointment of an extra assistant at the Ormondville school in view of the influx of pupils due to the commencement of the Whetukura-Te Uri road conveyance.

Demolition at Hastings. The department wrote approving of a grant for the demolition of the brick rooms at the Hastings West school and the erection of temporary class rooms.

Norsewood School. The Norsewood school committee wrote opposing the proposal of remodelling of the school and asking for a completely new building.

It was decided to proceed with the erection of a model of one of its pavilion open-air type of schools for the exhibition.

The suggestion was referred to the senior inspector, the architect, and the secretary for a report.

A long report was received from the committee stating that some cracks were discernible in the orrick wall of the infant department.

The architect was requested to report on the building immediately.

A long report was received from the head teacher, Kopuwhara school, dealing with the unsatisfactory conditions in the valley and stating that resumption of the bus service for the valley school is unlikely for five months.

On the writer's suggestion it was decided to establish a separate school at Camp No. 5.

PAID HOLIDAYS FOR WORKERS. "Bill is Necessary". VIEWPOINT OF MINISTER. Report From Britain.

WELLINGTON, June 19. The view that legislation should be put through Parliament for paid holidays for workers in all industries in New Zealand was expressed by the Minister of Labour, the Hon. H. T. Armstrong, in an interview yesterday.

The Minister pointed out that a number of awards now made provide for annual holidays and for payment for various statutory holidays as they occurred. In some industries there was no payment for holidays and the unfortunate thing was that the general labourer, for instance, lost so much time through causes over which he had no control.

It was noteworthy that in their last agreement, the coal miners had secured payment for 10 working days' holiday at Christmas.

Cheering and enthusiastic crowds greeted the Prime Minister (the Rt. Hon. M. J. Savage) when he continued his tour of Southern Hawke's Bay, the Bush and the Wairarapa districts yesterday.

The official party left Norsewood early this morning and the Prime Minister briefly addressed large gatherings at towns and villages en route to Pahiatua, where the party was entertained at lunch by the Pahiatua Labour Representation Committee.

King Koroki's Position

Sir,—To-day's issue of your paper carries the following headline: "The Wairoa Maori's Welcome 'Their King,'" and refers to the reception given in honour of Koroki, the Waikato King. The words "Their King" seems, to me, to convey the meaning that Koroki is king of the Wairoa Maori's as well. I wish to correct this impression, which most likely was due more to an error in your wording than to a knowledge of the real facts.

Koroki is a descendant of the first Maori Waikato King, set up in the troubled days of the Waikato Wars as a protest to the policy of the then Government in its general treatment of the Maori question. The institution was purely and simply a local affair, concerning only the Ngati-Maniapoto, or those tribes under the influence of Te Wherowhero. It is extremely doubtful if it was the intention at the time to extend his sovereignty to all parts of New Zealand, as, after all, each tribal chief was, in his own right, a king also, hence any move in this direction would have been doomed to failure. Te Wherowhero would in all probability have been slain then and there were he to have invaded the North Auckland tribe, the Ngapuhi, in order to press his claims upon that people.

Koroki, therefore, might be recognised as a royal personage within the boundaries of his tribe, but were he to insist upon the rights and privileges attendant upon such a person while a guest of other tribes, he would meet with a very insistent disapproval. Hawke's Bay possesses rangatiras whose genealogical tables stem with ancestors as illustrious and notable as Koroki's. Therefore to assign to the Waikato King a position in their tribe peculiar only to themselves would indeed be an insult. No doubt the warmth of the welcome extended to Koroki was due not so much to the fact that he was a Maori King as to the place he held as a distinguished visitor.

An incident, which clearly illustrates my meaning, occurred during the celebrations held in connection with the unveiling of Sir Maui Pomare's memorial at Waitara. On the arrival of Koroki, officials of the marae requested a number of Maori's from this district to remove their hats as a mark of respect. This they refused to do, adding "He might be a king in Waikato, but he certainly is not ours."—I am, etc., "KAHUNGUNU."

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




The Prime Minister Outlines Superannuation Scheme Benefits

By Telegraph—Press Association. MASTERTON, June 19.

During his speech at Masterton last night, the Prime Minister (the Rt. Hon. M. J. Savage) made some brief references to national health and superannuation.

Under the superannuation scheme, no married couple was going to get less than £3 a week, he said. He had not thought he would live to have the opportunity of establishing that. Under the health scheme, every household in New Zealand would have a medical practitioner service at call and everybody would think themselves lucky if they did not have to make a call.

Mr Savage said he looked to the time when they would have universal superannuation for everybody in New Zealand, but they had begun where the great Teacher had begun nearly 2000 years ago—with the poor.

Mr Savage said he thought about 80 per cent of the people would benefit under the superannuation scheme. He had not gone into the figures, but the scheme was being broadened as compared with the proposals laid before the Parliamentary Committee.

The maximum income for a benefiting married couple was being raised to £408 a year. That meant that a married couple might have the £3 a week superannuation and anything else they could earn up to £408 a year.

Concluding Mr Savage again expressed his desire to carry on from where Richard John Seddon had left off. The papers were saying of the present Government, as they formerly had said of Seddon, that it was destroying thrift and confidence and all sorts of things.

The Prime Minister said if he could go to his grave with the love and esteem of the people he would be well content.

He was given an enthusiastic ovation on concluding.

RARE CAUSE OF DEATH

MAN'S AORTA IS RUPTURED

"Daily Mail" Special Service. GISBORNE, June 19.

"It was an extremely rare cause of death," said Dr. Harold Angell, in the course of evidence at the inquest concerning the death of Archibald Turnbull, aged 36, who collapsed at Tehapara on Friday.

Turnbull was a buttermaker employed by the Kia Ora Dairy Co. but recently he had been on holiday leave. He had never been ill before. Dr. Angell said the cause of death was a rupture of the aorta, the great artery from the heart. There was no evidence of any disease of the heart itself but he concluded that the weakness was probably congenital in origin.

The coroner returned a verdict in accordance with medical evidence.

5,000,000 DIE IN PEACE-TIME WARS THERE HAVE BEEN EIGHT CONFLICTS SINCE 1918 The Mounting Death-roll Proves That War Is Still Mankind's Greatest Enemy

For nearly 20 years the world has been at peace. Yet in that period at least five times as many men as Great Britain lost in the Great War, have died as a direct result of armed conflict. When we talk of "the war" we still mean the Great War of 1914-18, but the present war in China is the eighth fought since then.

THE CONFLICT NOW FORGOTTEN The first war after the Great War—the "next war" of which we talk so much—was fought in 1923, and is now virtually forgotten. Two years earlier, a young Turkish staff officer named Mustafa Kemal was sent to Anatolia as Inspector-General of the Turkish forces there, because he embarrassed the Constantinian Government by his fierce opposition to the terms of the Armistice.

LOCAL AND GENERAL More Air Passengers At the end of March, eighteen aircraft were engaged in commercial aircraft services, as compared with twelve aircraft at the end of March, 1937.

Nationalist Workers "Thousands of workers are joining the National party," said the Hon. A. Hamilton during his address at the Star Theatre at Papakura recently, when he was outlining the policy points that he claimed were proving acceptable to the public.

Travelling in 1937-38 Travelling departures from New Zealand were much higher for 1937-38 than for 1936-37, the number being 43,006, as compared with 37,972.

Knives and Football Agreeing that it was encouraging to find that boy scouts were enthusiastic Rugby players, Mr R. J. G. Collins, at a meeting of the Canterbury Rugby Union's management committee said it was necessary to issue a warning against youngsters carrying part of their equipment on to the playing field.

Building Decreases The value of building permits issued in the larger centres during April amounted to £131,226. The Government also commenced the construction of 38 new dwellings in other districts during the month.

Railways Good Year Complete statistics for the railways financial year are now available, and these indicate all-round increases as compared with the figures for recent years, states the May Monthly Abstract of Statistics.

BRITAIN'S LITTLE WARS America landed a huge force of marines and sent several warships to the little South American State of Nicaragua in 1927, when it seemed that a President and Government who might not agree with American interests in the State.

A Record Year Of Business In Great Britain

Companies Show Almost Uniform Rises In Profits Sound Markets

Effects Of Steadier Exports To The Colonies

United Press Association—Copyright. (Received June 19, 9 p.m.)

LONDON, June 18. Following hard upon the outstanding success of the Defence Loan has come a batch of excellent company results. The General Electric Company's profits touched a record, £1,772,000. The reserves were further strengthened by the allocation of £100,000 from the revenue, to bring them to £4,500,000, while the current assets are higher at nearly £8,000,000. The works are to be fully employed, necessitating recent extensions.

Overseas business continued to improve considerably, exceeding any previous year. New Zealand, Australia, Argentine and India were especially good customers.

Boots Drugs similarly report a record volume of sales. Calendar Cables show the largest gross profits in history, with a substantial increase in New Zealand, Australian and South African business. They are still obtaining satisfactory orders.

An economist's analysis of the results of 79 companies announced during the week shows an increase of 12 per cent. compared with last year.

Much Improved. The total profits of 1248 companies, analysed since January 1, 1938, amount to £70,000,000, compared with £179,000,000 the previous year.

Markets closed cheerfully, but business is still negligible. The Defence Loan has not only revived the morale of investors, but also is an impressive demonstration to foreign Powers of Great Britain's financial strength.

The Government is now financially well ahead of its rearmament task, and will accelerate spending with a view to mitigating a business recession.

Copper Falls. Seven non-United States copper producers sprung a surprise announcement cutting the output on July 1 from 165 per cent. to 95 per cent., lowering the output by 10,000 tons.

The feeling on the commodity markets is more cheerful than for some time. Fruit has been in strong demand at higher prices owing to the widespread failure of the British crops.

Tooley Street is endeavouring to maintain Dominion outlet at its present level, but the weakness of Continental stocks is somewhat of a drag on the market.

The lower retail prices are likely to improve consumption and strengthen the situation.


The Australians beat Gentlemen by 282 runs. The weather was sultry for the third day's play. Only a handful of spectators was present.



The death has occurred of Mr Herbert Lambert, a well known Hastings businessman. He was a man of many interests, taking a particularly active part in many cultural aspects of the town.

Born in Hastings, in 1882, Mr Lambert was educated at the Hastings District High School, as it was then known and after leaving school he joined the staff of his father's establishment, which was one of the earliest businesses in Hastings. Upon his father's death he took over the business of local hardware and gunsmiths, and later extended the business to include the cycle trade.

During the early days he was a keen member of the territorial force, being a member of the B Company. He specialised in rifle shooting, in which he was particularly keen, and was a member of the B Company team which won the coveted Coleman Shield.

Horticultural Interests. In two other fields Mr Lambert was especially interested, one being in the cultivation of spring and other bulbs, and for many years he was a leading exhibitor at all horticultural shows in the province.

His other "hobby" was that of amateur photography and some of his work in this sphere gained considerable recognition. One well-known example of his work was a photograph of Poplar Avenue. He specialised in nature studies, and scenes, and a number of examples of his work are shown in the Hastings Borough Council offices and public buildings.

Mr Lambert enjoyed the highest esteem and regard of all with whom he associated. There was a representative attendance at the funeral on Saturday.

COMBINATION PERFECT

Bustling Home Team

Inquest on Child.—The adjourned inquest into the death of Rahaniana Hana, a Maori child, aged two years, of Te Aute, was resumed at Waipukurau on Saturday morning. After hearing medical evidence the coroner, Mr. P. A. Deane, returned a verdict that death was caused by septicaemia.

Basketball at Otane.—The Central Hawke's Bay senior basketball competition was continued on Saturday at Otane. Results were: Waipawa 18, 21 v. Waipukurau 16; Otane 34 v. Ex-High 10.

Abandoned Properties. "It is true that, under the policy of the present Government, the Small Farms Board is salvaging and rehabilitating a number of abandoned Crown properties," said Mr Langstone, dealing with some of the other areas being developed.

"We are utilising unemployed labour, employment funds and capital moneys. In the process of this work and in the retrieving of the State moneys so expended, the properties are being farmed by the Lands Department. It would be unwise, and in some cases, disastrous to give individual releases which would entail considerable writing down and writing off of various moneys." He explained that unless this writing off was done, settlers would be too heavily handicapped to make a success of their holdings.

"FEARS GROUNDLESS," SAYS MINISTER

Hon. F. Langstone's Comment THE GOVERNMENT'S INTENTIONS FOLLOWING LAND SURVEY

Value of Research to Agriculture

"Their fears are groundless," was the reply made by the Hon. F. Langstone, Minister of Lands, to recently published statements made by farmers who considered that the Land Utilisation Survey was the first step in the "taking over of Hawke's Bay land by the Government."

At the time that the above statement was made at the meeting of the Hawke's Bay Provincial Executive of the Farmers' Union, some of the farmers held that already some areas were being farmed by the Government, and to this Mr Langstone also replied. Mr Langstone arrived yesterday in Hastings from Wairoa. Throughout the discussion he was emphatic about the value of research to agriculture and, quoting the Hawke's Bay Land Utilisation Survey, stated that the further research could be extended to farming, the better it would be for the industry.

"Any lands acquired would have to be purchased," said Mr Langstone discussing the "taking" of land. "Dozens of farmers are requesting me to purchase their properties," he said. "But usually the price is too high or the land is unsuitable." He added that properties were being offered to him every week. Continuing, he stated that he was prepared to purchase land providing that the price was right because he held that land should be made to carry its maximum population. However, in each case, a departmental report would be made and it would have to stand the test of a very searching investigation.

State Farming. Commenting on the assertion made that the Government was indulging in State farming, Mr Langstone said that the whole question of the farming of land by the State was bound up with the land that had been bought by previous Governments and with the price paid for it. He quoted the "Ardkeen" property which had been bought in 1919 for £131,000 with one stock purchase for another £30,000. The property had already been written down to £92,000 and a recent Adjustment Commission had inspected the property and had recommended that the value be reduced further to between £30,000 and £60,000. Other blocks had similarly been shown to be unpayable and the only thing that the Government could do with them was to develop them.

In the quoted case of the 30,000 acres at Tutira, Mr Langstone said it had been found that the cost of roading was very high and, in the meantime, those who were responsible for the management of the property, found that it worked

in very satisfactorily with both the Kahariki block at Mohaka, and the Ahuriri Lagoon area. In fact, Mr Langstone added, each property helped in the development of the other two.

"However, given time, I am confident that all money will be recovered to the department and we will have State assets," he said. "One of the main activities of the Labour Government has been to keep farmers on their farms with the titles intact," said Mr Langstone in conclusion. "This is vastly different to what has taken place previously when hundreds of thousands of ordinary farmers have lost the title to their land mainly due to the prices paid for past settlement land and to the policy pursued by previous Governments."

Minister Confident. "I am confident that all money will be recovered to the department and we will have State assets," he said. "One of the main activities of the Labour Government has been to keep farmers on their farms with the titles intact," said Mr Langstone in conclusion.

The car had not been recovered at an early hour this morning and the Hastings police are making inquiries.

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
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
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
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

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HAWKE'S BAY HURDLES TO SPENDER

John Charles In Steeplechase EXCELLENT TOTALISATOR INCREASE

(By CHILDERS) Excellent weather attracted another large attendance at the second winter meeting of the Hawke's Bay Jockey Club held at Hastings on Saturday. Racing throughout the day was of a particularly interesting nature, especially in the jumping events, the June Steeplechase, won by John Charles, and the Hawke's Bay Hurdles, taken by Spender, both providing splendid races.

The totalisator turnover for the day was £12,096/10/-, compared with £10,816 for the corresponding day last year, making a total for the meeting of £22,067, against £17,786 last year, an increase of £4,281. Although drying fast, the track was still heavy. In the capable hands of the secretary, Mr A. E. Wishart, and his committee, the meeting went off without the slightest possible hitch, and the success of the fixture was a fitting reward for their work.

On the strength of his good track work, Proclamation was installed favourite for the Hastings Trial, and he was always going like a winner to score nicely. He jumped out smartly, and when the field settled down, there was little between him and Royal Ace, the pair being clear of Hastings West, Almetic and Brilliant Ace. Proclamation soon had the race won when the field turned for home and was not extended to beat Hastings West, who hung on better than Royal Ace. Almetic was fourth and Golden Melody, Ate and Hillside next.

The winner is still a trifle green and he won so attractively that he can be regarded as a likely prospect in stronger company. Like most of the Hunting Song progeny, he handles a soft track well. Hastings West ran another useful race, but had every chance. Royal Ace was always there, his effort being a creditable one. Almetic made his usual consistent showing, but Golden Melody shaped better than he has ever done previously.

Surprisingly strong support came for Spender in the Hawke's Bay Hurdles, which was a very even betting race. The Lord Quez gelding ran right up to expectations eventually winning most decisively. Soho attempted to repeat his tactics of the previous Saturday in leading all the way, but he did not have matters all his own way, for Curie joined him early and was always well as at Napier Park, and had he not hit the second to last fence rather hard he might have been much harder to beat. Iddo was never going like a winner, but was clear at the finish than at any previous stage. Curie ran a much improved race.

Improvement in Form. Paul Robeson showed considerable improvement on his effort the previous Saturday to win the Havelock Handicap by the narrowest of margins from Royal Record, who was at long odds. Paul Robeson began smartly with Wilful Lady and Red Witch, but Colleen Gain soon ran through the fast and clear charge. However, she was beaten at the straight entrance, where Royal Record, after coming on the outside, received a run on the rails to have charge at the distance. Paul Robeson then challenged and was the outsider by the narrowest of margins. Red Witch was third, with Gai Wind fourth, followed by Royal Spades, Halle Selassie and Quake.

Paul Robeson moved very well in the easy "ring." He is a useful sort in this class. Royal Record made his best showing for some time, while Red Witch finished fast after drifting in the middle stages. Gai Wind came from a long way back. Mendelssohn not away badly and was never likely.

Thrills for the Public. Installed a firm favourite, John Charles duly won the June Steeplechase with great ease, but not before he had given his supporters a couple of thrills. He shot Lord up in the saddle at the fifth fence and dipped on landing at the final jump, in both cases his rider making a good recovery. Royal Toast set a fast pace from Skerryvore for a round, but was soon beaten, and then John Charles ranged alongside Skerryvore in the lead. The pair had drawn well clear of the other runners when Skerryvore fell at the post-and-rails, leaving John Charles with a lead of a dozen lengths from Don Erma and Kahunoke. John Charles went on to win without being pressed, while Kahunoke hung on better than Don Erma. Master Hector was fourth, while Acron, who fell at the second to last fence, and was remounted, came in next.

Except for his two slight mistakes, John Charles gave a dashing display of jumping and is a very bold fencer. He will win in better company. Kahunoke in his usual heavy race, but Don Erma again shaped below his best, jumping without his usual confidence. Skerryvore had not put a foot wrong up to the time he fell and was making a fine showing. Acron would probably have been in the money had he not fallen.
