Youth's Tramp for Help

By Telegraph-Press Association. NEW PLYMOUTH, June 28. Alone in the depths of the wild country of eastern Taranaki with his companion dead, a youth aged 18 years made his way back for help and led a party through the thick bush for many hours to where the body lay, reaching it at midnight

The tragedy occurred late on Mon day afternoon when the two men were pig hunting in the back country of the Waikaka Valley, in the Matiere district.

R. Schrieber shot a pig and after he went forward to find it found that his companion, Thomas Nicol, was not with him. On returning a short distance he found Nicol dead. "SHAPE OF HUMAN FACE IS ALTERING"

Narrowing Features: Dean of Dental Faculty Makes **Observations**

"Are standards of beauty altering?" asked Dr. Bevan Dodds, Dean of the Dental Faculty in the University of Otago, when he commented recently on the change towards the vertical in the shape ofe th human face. He was convinced that the general proportions of the human face were altering.

There hangs in Dr. Dodds's study at the school an original eighteenth century engraving, in which the persons portrayed have wide, heavy jaws, and broad noses, with the associated bones also more prominent than in the twentieth century man. An old oil painting in the school's library also shows a heavier and wider type of face.

"The modern man has a tendency in features towards the vertical and his jaws and nose are narrower," said Dr. Dodds. "That may be the result of natural selection, a lack of function, or a combination of various factors—probably the last. It is seldom indeed that one sees a jaw in which there is room for the eruption of the lower wisdom tooth, if the individual has not lost his or her teeth earlier. If a young person retains all his teeth, the wisdom tooth is not able to erupt normally, there being no room through fore-shortening, and that condition calls for an operation of vary-







PARLIAMENT AGAIN

With the traditional ceremony Parliament was opened for its third and final session yesterday. Behind the scenes of this pageantry legislators are preparing for a wordy tussle which will be a prelude to the General Elections late this year—the battle of the ballot-box

The politician's fancy in the spring, like that of the young man, turns lightly to thoughts of affection—there are votes to be wooed and won, and villains to be foiled. This year promises to be a record in this respect, and the disillusioned and somewhat cynical elector may be forgiven for wishing that fairy tales could sometimes come

Jesting apart—and it is a hardened soul who can sustain a jest on this subject—the time has arrived for the people of this country to consider seriously events that have passed and events that have yet to come. They must endeavour to form opinions unclouded by prejudice, and unaffected by the trumpetings and fulminations of political self-seekers. It may be difficult to distinguish the gold from the dross in a muddied stream of vituperation and abuse, but the sane elector can always form his own estimate of values if he stands clear of the spate. Mob hysteria, when cunningly contrived, can be insidiously contagious—it is the duty of citizens to beware the pitfalls of specious argument and false sentiment.

The man who says, "My party, right or wrong," is a fool. If he does not concern himself with its virtues, then they will soon cease to exist. It is by constant criticism and investigation that a political policy can be forged and hammered into shape that it may be constantly and beneficently useful. Complacency and self-commendation are the greatest foes of progress. Blind party prejudice is the poison that kills the very roots of sane democratic government.

political party which he chooses to support executes a policy which conforms with his beliefs in this duty, then the privilege and obligation of essential citizenship is fulfilled if he continues that support. If, on the other hand, that party contravenes his conception of duty

to his fellows and his country, then he must look for an alternative. From the mass of propaganda and the clack of tongues during the forthcoming few months, the elector should endeayour to discover

During the coming session many matters of importance will be discussed, chief of which, from the point of view of public interest, will be the social security proposals. Comment at this juncture is not justified, as the details of the plan have not yet been released. There is, however, a lively curiosity as to the next Budget, as the payment for the proposed services will, no doubt, be provided in that interesting estimate of national revenue and expenditure.

Matters concerning defence are likely to cause some lively debates, particularly in view of the fact that a very large section of the community is as yet quite unconvinced as to the adequacy of the Government's existing provisions in this respect.

The Education Amendment provisions should not meet with much criticism, and the reforms thereby instituted will be welcomed by every section of the community.

Other items visualised in the Speech from the Throne yesterday are too vague and indefinite to permit of fruitful comment. However, some disappointment will be expressed that the new housing proposals apparently do not provide for more than tenancy occupation. The Government has apparently altered its announced plan for workers' homes purchasable on the long-term table mortgage system, and existing rentals are much higher than was generally anticipated.

It may be remarked, in passing, that if the Government "is confident that it is within its power to eliminate the evil effects of those alternating periods of prosperity and depression," then it should, in the interests of humanity, pass the formula on to the rest of the world. Indeed, it should first admit New Zealand to the secret. If such a panacea exists, and the Government possesses the secret, as it claims, then the sooner the whole world knows the better. After all, why should New Zealand have a monopoly of security? Here is something to ponder over while the session passes through its preliminary stages.



"Britain and France have warned Japan that occupation of Hainan Island is likely to lead to undesirable complications, in which event they will no doubt collaborate as necessary," announced Mr R. A. Butler, Under-Secretary of Foreign Affairs, in the House of Commons.



WELLINGTON, June 28.

"I am happy to say that since I had the privilege of opening the last session of Parliament the Dominion has continued to enjoy real prosperity," said the Governor-General, at the opening of Parliament.

"The prices received for New Zealand's primary products have been generally good, but in the opinion of my advisers my Government's policy of increasing the purchasing power of the people and expanding and redistributing the national income has been a still greater factor in the economic progress that is manifest to-day.

Government the national income has been distributed more evenly and more equitably over the whole community, thus on the one hand eliminating the miseries of poverty and unemployment, and on the other hand expanding the national purchasing power, on which our prosperity depends.

"The general well-being of the whole people is the proper aim of every Government, and in the opinion of my advisers this has largely been achieved in New Zealand to-day.

"These results were attained without any increases in the rates of taxation, while the whole of the Dominion's loan requirements for public works and other purposes were obtained without recourse to overseas borrowing.







DANNEVIRKE BOARD'S NEW POWER RATES

Heavy Barrage of Criticism DECISION FOR A FRESH ADJUSTMENT

Unexpected Increase to Users

DANNEVIRKE.

Replying to complaints made by consumers in the Press and at meetings, that the new rate recently decided upon by the Dannevirke Electric Power Board was raising and not lowering the cost of electricity, the chairman (Mr M. O. Grainger) made a statement at the board's meeting yester-day, which he hoped would clear the position.

After discussion, a motion by Mr H. P. Horne, "That the Finance Committee endeavour to adjust a new rate, fair to all consumers," was carried unanimously.

The reason for the change, said the chairman, was that under the old domestic rate no encouragement was given for people to use anything but lighting and power. Lighting was charged at 7d a unit and under the heating rate 200 units had to be used before the cost dropped to 12d a unit.

The board had arrived at the stage where, in order to advance, it was necessary to encourage the person of modest means to instal more appliances than a light bulb and a radio. The new rate was designed to do this. The first 15 units cost 7d, the second 20 3d, and all over that 1d, all subject to 10 per cent. discount. Wood and coal were becoming very expensive, and electricity at 9-10d a unit made it possible for the board to secure this business. It was now possible for consumers to get their lighting, heating and cooking for less than fl a month.

Mr Grainger concluded by saying that the critics did not realise that in 15 years the Government has made no reductions in its charges at all. The State had had the benefit of the largely increased turnover due to the progressive policy of the power boards.

"REMARKABLE INCREASE IN MAORI POPULATION"

Comparison With Pakeha Census Figures: Comment By Bishop

The improved health of the Maori people and "the remarkable increase in Maori population" in the last two years has been noticed by the Bishop of Aotearoa (the Rt. Rev. F. A. Bennett), who has just returned to Hastings from a tour of North Auckland. In an interview with the "Daily Mail" last evening, the Bishop predicted that the rate of increase, in spite of the continuing high death-rate, would probably be greater in the next census than the 28 per cent. increase shown by the census of 1936.

The 1936 census, the Bishop said, showed that the increase in the Maori population was almost three times as rapid as that of the pakeha. In ten years the Maori population had increased by 18,104 (or 28.4 per cent.), while the pakeha population had increased only 10.94 per cent.

"The rate of increase shown in 1936 has been maintained since," said Bishop Bennett, "and I should imagine that the increase will be greater still when the next census is taken. This is partly due to the simple life the Maoris lead, and partly to the simpler type of food.

"However, notwithstanding the increase and improved general health, the death-rate among the Maoris is still very high. The general mortality of the Maori people is 19.32 for every 1000, compared with 8.75 for the pakehas. Tubercular troubles and typhoid are still far too common amongst the Maori people, and while it is somewhat difficult to put a finger on the cause, this is probably due to unsuitable conditions in home life, and to a want of proper sanitary arrangements in the Maori pas.

"From figures supplied by the Health Department, the Maori mortality from the above causes is ten times as great as the

FIRE GREATEST FACTOR IN SOIL EROSION

Comprehensive N.Z. Review

"CLOSE MATTED TURF BEST AID TO PREVENTION"

Views of Soil Survey Officer

"The constant use of fire to control scrub and fern growth is the greatest single factor aiding soil erosion," states Mr N. H. Taylor, of the Soil Survey Division of the Department of Scientific and Industrial Research, in an article in a recent issue of the "Journal of Science and Technology." "The position facing New Zealand is serious indeed, but, broadly speaking, although land deterioration is very widespread, in the heavier rainfall districts at least, its effects are irreparable in comparatively few areas."

Mr Taylor surveys the problem facing farmers throughout the Dominion very comprehensively, and, while his remarks are intended to apply generally, they should be of particular interest to those residing in Hawke's Bay. Not only should it be of interest to those who farm areas of eroding higher country, but it should also be of interest to those whose lower level farms are endangered by floodings and periodic deposits of silt.

"Much is heard of public assets— be regarded as permanent, in that good buildings, roads, railways, and the like are regarded with pride— indefinitely.

the like are regarded with pride—but, next to the people themselves, the outstanding asset of this Dominion is the soil, and every effort should be made to safeguard it.

"When the forest was felled and burnt, many important changes took place. On the one hand all the minerals stored in the forest were returned to the topsoil as one enormous application fertiliser. 




