## Zealand Has A Duty To Correct Possible False Impressions

WAIROA. The fact that overseas meat markets might receive damage from the reports in other parts of the world of the recent facial eczema epidemic in the Waikato was the subject of a discussion at the Wairoa Farmers' Union's monthly meeting.

Mr O. G. Birrell stated that he had heard radio reports from Australia quite recently to the effect that a million sheep had been lost from this disease in New Zealand and that a substantial reward had been offered to the discoverer of an effective remedy. Mr H. M. B. de Lautour pointed out that Government

grading was very strict in New Zealand, but that nevertheless it should be made public, even in England, that strict inspection of the meat is always made before it goes overseas. The matter was left in the hands of the secretary to communicate with head office of the Farmers' Union, asking them to confer with the Department of Agriculture and the Press Association.

As the Board's authority on the matter could not be questioned, the demands made were unconditionally refused. Steps were taken by the Board to get in touch with the president and secretary of the Union chiefly concerned, and a conference was held between members of the department in question and the secretary of the union, who

Maori Meeting Houses A decision has been reached by the Ngati-whakaue and the Tuhourangi tribe to rebuild the two historic Arawa meeting houses, Tamatekapua, at Ohinemutu, Wahiao, at Whakarewarewa. reconstruction, which will probably entail an expenditure of over £3000 on each building, is expected to be commenced at a fairly early date, and it is hoped that the work will opening to form one of the major Maori celebrations of the commemoration of the New Zealand Centennial in 1940. Of the two existing meeting houses Tamatekapua by the far the oldest, and for the past 74 years has been the scene of many historic gatherings. The original building was erected during 1872 as a memorial to that great ancestor of the tribe, Tamatekapua, who was the captain of the Arawa canoe on its voyage from Hawaiki to New Zealand. ### WILL FIGHT. TO SAVE FREEDOM

"If There Is No Other Way" NEVILLE CHAMBERLAIN EMPHATIC

Great Britain's Attitude

(Received July 3, 9 p.m.) LONDON, July 3.

The Prime Minister (Mr Neville Chamberlain), at a mass meeting at Kettering, when referring to the Spanish bombings, said that the shipowners were getting fourfold and fivefold the ordinary freights. He said that after the warning that we could not protect ships in territorial waters, the Government would be betraying a trust if it took action that might involve war. This did not mean condonation of the bombings or recognition of the aerial blockade of ports.

Mr Chamberlain added that it was difficult to reconcile General Franco's explanations with some of the facts, but perhaps the airmen did not always adhere to their instruc-

He said: "I am not going to be diverted from the policy I believe right by ill-natured or ill-informed criticism, but I regret that the Opposition is creating an impression abroad of national disunity.

"I do not believe that the country desires the adoption of a challenging, aggressive attitude instead of a peace-seeking attitude, but if there is no other way of preserving freedom, we will fight again."



# FOR WAR IN EAST"

Will Russia Attack Japan When Chinese Struggle is Ended?

TOKYO, July 3.

"I am a traitor to Stalin, but never to the Fatherland," said M. Lushkov, who left Russia after the recent spy sensations, in an alleged signed statement to the Domei Agency.

The statement declared that Stalin was preparing for war against Japan. Russia had concentrated 400,000 men and 2000 warplanes east of Lake Baikal, and also 90 submarines at Vladivostock. It added that Stalin was assisting China to engage Japan

in war. When Japan was exhausted Russia would attack her. M. Lushkov admitted collaborating in Stalin's terrorism, which had resulted in the massacre of thousands, but he said that he had repented. He alleged that Stalin had fabricated the intrigues

featured in the recent trials in order to liquidate his rivals. The accused were shockingly tortured until they deposed according to requirements. Dissatisfaction with Stalin's activities was widespread.
