PURGE OF AUSTRIAN NAZIS IS ALLEGED

Huge Losses Through Looting, Blackmail, Robbery and Corruption

LONDON, July 4.

The "Daily Herald" says that Herr Buerckel's admission that 12 Nazi commissioners whom he had placed in charge of Jewish businesses have been arrested, merely cloaks a thorough purge of Austrian Nazis.

At least eight hundred Nazi commissioners controlling former Jewish businesses have been dismissed. Corrupt administration is estimated to have resulted in the loss of twelve million sterling, in addition to five million sterling worth of goods by looting, blackmail, and robbery.

Herr Buerckel is compelled to stop this, and also to terminate the hurried removal of Jews which is bringing Austrian trade to a standstill. "Every man who has not done his duty will be stamped out," he declared, in a public statement at Graz.

According to a previous report the 12 Nazi commissioners whom Herr Buerckel, Nazi Party Leader in Austria, placed in charge of Jewish businesses, were arrested on charges of embezzlement.

Following the arrests, Herr Buerckel ordered a thorough examination of the whole system of confiscation of Jewish property.

LUSHKOFF'S VIEWS

Further Light on Russia

DETAINED IN TOKYO

TOKYO, July 4.

M. Lushkoff, former Chief of State for the Far Eastern Political Department of Soviet Russia, added further to his statement yesterday concerning his escape from Russia.

He said that he scented personal danger in May, when Marshal Blucher, Commander-in-Chief of the Far Eastern Red Army, after a visit to Moscow reprimanded him, after which his secretary was recalled to Moscow. Lushkoff decided to escape the execution squad. He sent his wife to Moscow so that she could go to Poland while he would contrive to reach Manchukuo.

After his wife's departure he left Habarovsk, ostensibly on a tour of inspection of the Soviet-Manchukuo frontier. He received a telegram from his wife indicating that she was safe in Poland. Lushkoff thereupon ordered a rearrangement of the frontier guards and, taking advantage of the confusion resulting from it, crossed the border in a dense fog on June 13 and surrendered to the Japanese.

He is now in Tokyo under detention but is being treated well. (A message appearing in yesterday's issue of the "Daily Mail" stated that Lushkoff alleged that Russia was preparing for war with Japan.)

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CHINESE 'PLANES' SUCCESS

SINKING OF WARSHIPS CLAIMED

MUNITIONS SUPPLY

Chinese Resources Are Detailed

SHANGHAI, July 3.

Chinese 'planes raiding the Japanese river fleet at Anking claim to have sunk 12 vessels, including an aircraft carrier and two destroyers, and to have disabled 23. The Japanese claim to have brought down seven of the 14 Chinese 'planes at Anking, besides sinking a Chinese gunboat.

Marshal Chiang Kai-shek has sent a circular to officers saying: "Although the hostilities are serious, terrain and manpower are in favour of China. In the decisive stage now imminent victory is certain if the civil and military officials co-operate with the people in augmenting the army."

The Tokyo correspondent of "The Times" says: "The Japanese agree that munitions entering China from Hong Kong and Macao are a mere fraction of the quantity from Indo-China and land routes. The Chinese boast to have enough accumulated for a year's intensive fighting."

"NO SHIPS HIT"

The Japanese naval spokesman ridicules the Chinese claim that they sank Japanese warships at Anking.

He says that the Japanese vessels were not even hit. "The fact is that Chinese bombers have not registered one hit on a warship during the whole of the war," he added.

HOSTEL REQUIRED

The Backward Cases

AUCKLAND, July 4.

The pressing need for a hostel in Auckland for backward children was brought to the notice of the Minister of Internal Affairs (the Hon. W. E. Parry), who, on behalf of Mr Savage, heard a deputation from the Institute for the Care of Backward Children.

The deputation stated that the children from various parts of the province who needed the assistance of the institute were unable to obtain homes in Auckland. They had appeals from Kaitiaki, Dargaville, Rotorua, Waikato, Feilding, Gisborne and New Plymouth.

The letters were so pleading that the institute arranged with an Auckland lady who generously offered to board a few of these children. Mr Parry assured the deputation of his sympathy with the work. He knew that a hostel was needed, and would discuss the matter with the Prime Minister.

Power Supply Affected

INTERRUPTION IN WELLINGTON

Some Curious Results

WELLINGTON, July 4.

An extraordinary succession of high tides in Wellington Harbour resulted in a considerable interruption of the power supply in the mid-city area.

Last night several trams were unable to get back from their late trips owing to the power failure. This morning at ten o'clock the tide was again exceptionally high and the water again invaded a tunnel, carrying feeder lines to the main city sub-station and waterfront. By the use of alternative circuits the trouble was minimised and the tram service was kept normal, but there were curious effects in many city buildings in which one section of a building would be lit and supplied with power while another part was in darkness and without power.

Westport Funeral

CASKET TO BE TAKEN TO DUNEDIN

WESTPORT, July 4.

The funeral of the late Mr G. W. Sellars who met a tragic death when making a parachute descent on North Beach, began the first stages of its journey to-day when a long cortege moved from the Buller Hospital through Westport's main street and on to the Buller Bridge.

Here the casket was transferred to a motor vehicle to be taken to Grey-mouth and thence by train to Dunedin, where the funeral will take place.

The pall bearers were Messrs D. Gemmill, M. A. Neill, W. Craddock, and H. D. Hamilton, all members of the Westport Aero Club. The mourners were representative of Westport, the casket being followed by the Mayor (Mr J. Kilkeny), the Town Clerk (Mr A. Taylor), and twenty-five motor cars and buses.

AIR PASSENGERS COMPLAIN

FLYING-BOAT ARRIVES AT DARWIN

POOR FACILITIES

Minister Threatens Action

SYDNEY, July 4.

Passengers who arrived at Darwin in the Empire Flying boat Challenger complain bitterly of the arrangements for handling passengers on arrival. Australian passengers were informed that they would be unable to leave the vessel until all the customs and medical formalities were completed.

They spent an uncomfortable two hours in an overheated cabin reeking with ether from the vaccinating of three passengers. A choppy sea added to their discomfort.

Only two ancient open launches were available to convey the passengers ashore, and most of them became wet with spray. They then had to wait in the darkness in a strong wind outside the Customs shed while each was admitted singly and examined, after which they had a half mile walk to waiting cars.

It was three hours after arrival before the last passenger reached the hotel.

Minister Angry.

The Minister of Defence, the Hon. H. V. C. Thorby, is extremely angry about complaints made by the Challenger's passengers, and has called for an urgent explanation.

He added that if there has been mismanagement of the kind alleged that he would see that the maximum penalty is imposed, irrespective of persons.

Dutch Machines.

The Royal Dutch Airline's machine which left Amsterdam two days after the Challenger left London has progressed according to schedule and will overtake the Challenger at Darwin to-day, arriving at Sydney early to-morrow afternoon. The Challenger arrives to-morrow evening.

UNITED STATES IS FIGHTING FOR FREEDOM

President Roosevelt Declares His Policy at Gettysburg

GETTYSBURGH (Pennsylvania), July 3.

"We are near to winning another conflict for economic freedom for our common country," President Roosevelt told the Civil War veterans attending a final re-union, as he dedicated the peace memorial on the battlefield at Gettysburg.

President Roosevelt said that he drew inspiration from Lincoln's address at Gettysburg 75 years ago, pointing out that the United States was again engaged in an effort to preserve, under changing conditions, the people's government for the people's good, inferring that the New Deal's fight against its opponents is a "conflict as fundamental as Lincoln's."

SUZANNE LENGLEN DEAD

WORLD-FAMOUS AS A TENNIS PLAYER

The death has occurred of Mlle. Suzanne Lenglen, the famous tennis player.

Suzanne Lenglen, before she achieved world fame, was a school girl at Nice. She was Lawn Tennis Champion of France in 1919-20-21-22-23 and 1925-26, Champion of England in 1919-20-21-22-23 and 1925, Olympic Champion in 1921, and became a professional lawn tennis player in 1927. In 1936 she opened a tennis school in Paris.

Mlle. Lenglen was the author of many publications including "Lawn Tennis: The Game of Nations," "Tennis by Simple Exercises," and "The Love Game" (a novel).

All N.Z. Clubs to Be Advised

Aero clubs throughout the Dominion have been advised, or will soon be advised, that they should place a temporary restriction on the use of any Miles Magister aircraft they may own. This advice has been put out by the Air Department in Wellington, and it is understood that the warning to this effect emanated in the first place from the Air Ministry in Britain.

The restrictions on the machines which have been advised by the Air Department are that those belonging to them should not be flown in excess of their cruising speed of 120 miles an hour, and that they should not be diverted nor put through any aerobatics.

"The Press," Christchurch, communicated with Group Captain T. M. Wilkes, Controller of Civil Aviation, in Wellington, and he said that these were only temporary restrictions recommended on the method of use of this particular series of aircraft during investigations. It was one means of ensuring that no risks were taken.

As far as could be found out yesterday there have been four Miles Magisters in the Dominion, one at each of the four main centres. That belonging to the Canterbury Aero Club was crashed and written off after it had done only about 35 hours in the air, but those belonging to the Auckland, Wellington, and Otago aero clubs have been giving satisfactory service.

The Air Department has insisted that some proportion of the time put in by the trainees at the aero clubs for the Royal New Zealand Air Force and the Royal Air Force must be in low-winged monoplanes (the Magister is of this type), but it is only at the four main centres that pilots are being trained for either of these forces. The four Magisters were obtained under the Government's deferred payment scheme.

The Miles Magister has enjoyed considerable popularity in England as a trainer, and has been ordered in quantities by the Royal Air Force for ab initio training. It is a development of the Miles Hawk trainer.

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TAXES PAID BY DOMINION ROAD-USERS

Economist's Strong Criticism

"LEVY ON MOTOR-SPIRIT WAS EMERGENCY MEASURE"

Main Highways Should Get Proceeds

The Government's retention of the motor spirits taxes in New Zealand is sweepingly criticised by Professor A. H. Tocker, professor of economics at Canterbury University College, in a report on motor taxation prepared for the Canterbury Progress League. Professor Tocker states that road users pay more in motor-spirit taxes alone than is spent from the Main Highways account; but that substantial amounts have to be borrowed to construct and maintain the highways of the Dominion. The retention of a tax originally imposed in emergency conditions, he brands as "not in the best interests of the Dominion."

The report, which gives details of the general motor taxation and its distribution, is to be laid before a conference of interested local bodies at Christchurch on July 6, together with the following suggested resolution:—

That in view of the rapid increase in motor traffic, the increased use of highways, and the consequent pressing need for maintenance and improvement of highways, this conference urges that the whole of the net proceeds of motor spirit taxation, including the 4½d now levied on petrol, be transferred to the Main Highways Account and expended for highway purposes.

"The emergency conditions which alone could justify the heavy motor taxation imposed, and the use of almost half of this taxation for purposes other than highways, are now past," the report stated. "But the taxation remains, and a large part of it is still being devoted to general revenue of the Government. This is not in accordance with the accepted understanding upon which motor spirits taxation was first imposed, nor is it, we think, in the best interests of the Dominion."

History of Taxes

"Motor spirit taxes were first imposed in New Zealand in 1927. The tax was 4d per gallon on all motor spirit imported, with provision for rebate of the tax paid where the spirit was used for other than road purposes. The whole of the tax proceeds were devoted to highway purposes, and it was accepted by all the parties concerned that motor spirit taxation should be used only for such purposes. Under the influence of the depression and consequent difficulties in public finance, however, funds formerly earmarked for highways were taken for general purposes, and to meet the temporary emergencies of the depression period, motor spirit tax was progressively increased. From the original 4d a gallon imposed in 1927, it was raised to 6d a gallon in 1930, and the whole of this tax still used for highways.

"In 1931 an additional 2d was imposed, and in 1933, a further 2d, making, with the surtax of 4d, 4½d a gallon. These additions are still in force on petrol imported. The net yield of the motor spirit tax was progressively increased. From the original 4d a gallon imposed in 1927, it was raised to 6d a gallon in 1930, and the whole of this tax still used for highways.

A Dangerous Corner

ON MAIN NORTH ROAD

Transport Manager's Report

"Daily Mail" Special Service, GISBORNE, July 4.

The opinion that the corner on the main north road about a mile on the Gisborne side of Te Karaka was dangerous, was expressed today by Mr I. Crooks, Gisborne manager of the Auckland-Gisborne Transport Company when commenting on an accident to one of the company's trucks on Saturday.

Mr Crooks said that the lorry from Taneatua to Gisborne had made a wide sweep on the corner and had overbalanced, damaging the cab and the front of the vehicle, the driver being uninjured.

"It is evident that owing to the high crown of the road the corner is dangerous, and according to my information there have been 12 accidents there in a month," he declared. "The corner needs attention, and in the meantime a warning sign would prove a help."

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
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





RUSSIA AND JAPAN The report from Tokyo, published yesterday, to the effect that a fugitive from the Soviet had declared that Russia was preparing for war against Japan, should not be accepted too hastily.

Despite the fact that the antipathy between Russia and Japan is well known, and generally admitted, nevertheless it is most unlikely that Russia's preparation for war has gone to the lengths suggested by Lushkoff, who was formerly Chief of State for Russia's Far Eastern Political Department.

The Soviet's tactics in Eastern Asia have followed more or less orthodox lines of peaceful penetration. She has sent armies of propagandists and agitators among the people, particularly those of the northern and western provinces of China, and by various means a number of Chinese generals have been converted to Russia's ideology.

Gradually a strong pro-Russian element has been created in the areas aimed at, and many regions to-day are little better than Russian provinces. Outer Mongolia is directly under Russia's tutelage, and even in Sin Kiang and Inner Mongolia the influence of the Soviet is strong.

Many of the Communist Chinese generals were little better than glorified bandit leaders. Having in some cases no status whatsoever, they swept about the countryside pillaging and looting, demanding tribute from the innumerable peasant communities, and generally living by wresting sustenance and supplies from the people at the point of the bayonet.

With their conversion to Communism, many of these leaders regularised their position by assuming control of local governments, and, armed by the authority so usurped, they were able to wield a great influence in promoting Russia's aims in China.

"COST OF LIVING IS OUTPACING WAGES" An Australian Criticism of N.Z. Public Works Programme

"Cost and prices have risen substantially and are still rising. The Government's most pressing immediate problem is the fact that the cost of living is outpacing wages. This is a situation that a vigorous programme of public works cannot help but aggravate." This criticism of the extent to which the Labour Government has developed its public works programme in New Zealand is voiced by Mr W. K. McConnell in the monthly circular of the Sound Finance League of Australia.

"The major objective of the Labour Government's public works policy," says Mr McConnell, "is to provide employment and increase consumer purchasing power. Most radical thinkers are infected by the over-simplified theory that the way to permanent prosperity is to get plenty of purchasing power into the pockets of potential consumers. There might be some truth in that view if lots of other things did not happen; but they do happen, particularly in times like these of marked business activity."

"Effect On Private Enterprise" "There can be no doubt that large scale public works programmes in Australia or New Zealand to-day will compete with private enterprise for various types of labour and for various kinds of materials, with resultant increases in the costs and prices of both."

"A Huge Programme" "That is a huge programme for a small country in a boom year. In addition £1,500,000 was to be spent this year on the housing programme."

"Men in Work" Flood repairs provided work for 50 teams and 172 men on the Hawke's Bay Rivers Board Ngaruro River scheme during the month of June.

"Charged by a Pig" Mr Frederick Escrett, aged 68 years, was admitted to the Hastings Memorial Hospital yesterday afternoon suffering from a lacerated hand. The injury was received when he was charged by a pig.

"Karamu Stop-bank" It was decided at yesterday's meeting of the Hawke's Bay Rivers Board to approach the Hastings Borough Council in respect of the cost of repairs to the Karamu Stop-bank. The total cost is in the vicinity of £320, and the Hastings Borough Council is to be asked to contribute two-thirds of that amount.

"Russian Opera Company" Advice has been received in Wellington that arrangements are being made to have the company of a tour of Australia and probably of New Zealand, by the famous Ariston Russian Opera Company, which has been appearing at the Paris Opera House. The company which is headed by Prince Zeretelli, will stage six of the best-known Russian operas, including Tchaikovsky's "Eugen Onegin," the same composer's "Pique Dame," Borodin's "Prince Igor," and Moussorgsky's "Boris Godonov," and two others.

CATHEDRAL AT WELLINGTON CHURCH OF ENGLAND CAMPAIGN FURTHER PLANS Dominion Centennial Scheme

"Political Propaganda"?

Special Parliamentary Reporter.

PARLT. BLDGS., July 4.

A reply to the statement made by the president of the New Zealand branch of the British Medical Association (Dr. J. P. S. Jamieson) concerning the Social Security Bill was made by the Prime Minister (the Rt. Hon. M. J. Savage) to-day. He said that there was nothing likely to be in the Bill that Dr. Jamieson was not already aware of. There would be no alteration whatsoever in the principles of the scheme. It was just a question of working out in legal shape what had been put before the Parliamentary Committee which had considered the proposals.

The British Medical Association had the same right to make representations as other sections of the community, said Mr Savage.

Long before the Parliamentary Committee sat, the British Medical Association had the right to appear before Dr. McMillan's committee. They gave evidence collectively and individually and they were interviewed all over the country by Dr. McMillan.

"I don't know of any occasion when any section of the community got greater consideration than the British Medical Association in this connection," the Prime Minister said. "I would say quite frankly that Dr. Jamieson is turning this into political propaganda. I am not concerned with that at the moment, but I am concerned with providing a service for the people."

"So far as this controversy is concerned, it is ended. I am not carrying the wrangle any further, and the representatives of the people in Parliament will have to decide the rest. After that is over the people will decide it for themselves at the poll. If they don't want it, they will know what to do with the Government."

Art in Hawke's Bay

ANNUAL EXHIBITION

Striking Display of Modern Work

FINE LOCAL EXHIBITS

The annual exhibition of the Hawke's Bay Art Society is one of the most interesting displays that the society has presented to the public. It gives tangible evidence that the great social "modern" movement in art which had its beginnings in the 70's and 80's of last century has at last taken root in New Zealand. In past exhibitions we have seen isolated works which showed the influence of this regeneration of pictorial art, but this year though there are few revolutionary pictures, the great majority of artists represented show a tendency to express themselves through organised harmony of line, mass and colour rather than sentimental prettiness or mere imitation of the external aspect of nature.

Practically all the landscapes in oils are neither mere photographic reflections of nature, nor are they what is equally obnoxious in works of this kind, exhibitions of nothing more than technical skill in the handling of oil paint on canvas.

Though perhaps lacking for the most part the depth of intellectual sensibility displayed in the oil painting, the many water colours exhibited have a freshness and apparent facility of technique that never fails to charm.

Flower studies, which are always among the most popular exhibits, are prominent on the walls this year and it is pleasing to note that once again the local work in this section compares more than favourably with that of other centres.

Numbers of line drawings, wood cuts, etc., also exemplify the search for fundamental forms and rhythms in nature that is the tendency of present-day art.

Photography

A particularly pleasing section of the exhibition is the display of photographs, many of them being the work of our local camera club. The excellence of technique in these exhibits will be a revelation to many who have not previously had the opportunity to study the work in this branch of art that is being done in our own district.

The high standard of technique which is practically uniform in all sections and the interesting examples of the spirit of intellectual development, which is becoming manifest in New Zealand art, makes this one of the society's most important exhibitions.

Gibb, who replaces Ames as wicket-keeper, is bespectacled and is 24 years of age, a Cambridge University man and a splendid bat.

The choice of Nichols is surprising—he has been in and out of Test teams for many years—and his inclusion at the age of 37 suggests that the committee despairs of the younger talent.

Goddard, who is also 37, has been included presumably to keep down the runs. Farnes, who bowled to the point of exhaustion in the first and second Tests, must be considered unfortunate to have been dropped.





A WIDE DISTRICT WILL BE EXPLORED

Valuable Training Available

Railwaymen's Protest

REMARKS BY M.P.

Criticism of Discipline Resented

An objection to statements about the conditions and discipline in the railway service made by Mr W. P. Edean, M.P. for Paritaki, in the House of Representatives has been taken by the Auckland branch of the New Zealand Locomotive Engineers' Firemen and Cleaners' Association and by the Auckland branch of the Amalgamated Society of Railway Servants, both of which organisations have passed resolutions on the subject.

"I am directed to advise you that our members take strong exception to remarks reported to have been made by you in the House of Representatives on Friday last regarding an alleged entire lack of discipline and alleged appalling conditions at present in the railway service," states a letter forwarded to Mr Edean by the secretary of the branch of the Engineers' Firemen and Cleaners' Association.

"I am further directed to ask if you would be prepared to attend a meeting of railwaymen in Auckland on an early date convenient to you to discuss these questions."

TRAMPERS CAUGHT IN SEMI-BLIZZARD

Wellington Men's 20-Mile Tramp Through Snow on Tongariro

By Telegraph—Press Association. WELLINGTON, July 4.

Two Wellington visitors to the Chateau Tongariro, Messrs Malcolm Davidson and Valdemar Horne, spent an anxious time in the open on Sunday night in semi-blizzard conditions.

They had to tramp through nearly 20 miles of heavy snow.

Both men are now safe and well at the Chateau, though they are suffering slightly from exposure.

The two men left the Chateau on Sunday morning for the Tama Lakes. On the return journey they encountered semi-blizzard conditions and lost their tracks. They walked on until nightfall through heavy snow, and were compelled to stay in the open all night.

Early this morning they set out again and eventually came out past Mount Ngauruhoe on to the main road.

It is estimated that they must have travelled nearly 20 miles through heavy snow.

As soon as their absence was notified, search parties were arranged and were out until 3 o'clock this morning. They again resumed the search at daybreak under the direction of Mr Ernst Skadarazy and Guide Lovridge. Ex-guide Pisberg, formerly of the Chateau, and now of Tauranga, was also engaged. Mr S. Blackmore flew across from Rotorua and made a noteworthy search of all the valleys.

The searchers realised that the heavy snow conditions on Sunday night made urgency and thoroughness imperative.

There has been heavy snow and the searchers, who had been working in relays day and night, had to wear skins.

Messrs Horne and Davidson were members of a week-end excursion

from Wellington and set out from the Chateau with one companion from the Tama Lakes, which are situated at the foot of Ngauruhoe about 10.30 o'clock on Sunday morning. Their companion turned back at Taranaki Falls, the other two going on.

The snowfall yesterday was the heaviest recorded for three years.

Messrs Horne and Davidson were met at the intersection of Bruce Road and the National Park-Taupo road, about four miles from the Chateau. Apparently they lost their bearings last night and spent the night under a bush in the snow. At daybreak they followed the Mangatepopo Stream till they reached the Taupo road and thence walked on to Bruce Road, where they met a constable who took them back to the Chateau.

The men stood up to their ordeal well and, after a thorough rest, are now reasonably fit, though suffering somewhat from exposure. They will return to Wellington this evening.

JAPANESE ADVANCE TOWARDS NANCHANG

British Consul's Residence Reported to be Bombed

United Press Association—Copyright. (Received July 5, 12.15 a.m.) SHANGHAI, July 4.

A Chinese communique admits that owing to the flood causing a rise in the Yangtze River, Japanese warships and transports crossed the Matang Boom constantly harried by Chinese bombers.

On landing, the Japanese were promptly engaged by the Chinese, who are concentrating at the entrance to Poyang Lake to prevent the Japanese from advancing towards Nanchang.

A Canton message states that the Chinese report that the Japanese last Friday bombed the residence of the British Consul at Fochow. So far no details are available.

Torrid Wrestling at Wellington

LOPEZ'S DEBUT Former World's Champion

RAINES DEFEATED

By Telegraph—Press Association. WELLINGTON, July 4.

Vincent Lopez, Mexican professional wrestler and former world's champion, won his New Zealand debut at the Town Hall, Wellington, tonight by beating Dick Raines on points.

Two hurricane rounds provided the most vigorous grappling of the season which ended in Raines obtaining a fall with his "back-breaker" hold. The third round was the most torrid of the bout and left the two boys showing signs of strain of so fast a pace.

In the sixth round Lopez dumped Raines and pressed him, setting the score even.

The final rounds were wild. The wrestlers were dazed with interchanging elbow-jolts, staggering about the ring and rolling through the ropes into the crowd. The referee was kept even busier than usual, the two big men showing at times complete disregard for his presence in the ring.

An Exception. A general exception to liability, however, was contained in a provision that the protection should not extend in the event of the car being driven to the knowledge of the insured by someone not having a driving licence. The insurance company had pasted on the policy a slip to the effect that for the purposes of the clause in the policy under which the claim was made, Mrs O'Brien should be deemed to be the insured, and not she and the person from whom the car had been purchased.

An accident occurred when Mr O'Brien was driving the car and Mrs O'Brien was in connection with the car. Mrs O'Brien was injured. Mrs O'Brien then claimed £1000 under the policy, and in an arbitration held at Gisborne in connection therewith it was found that at the time of the accident O'Brien was not the holder of a driving licence and that Mrs O'Brien was aware of that fact.

The arbitrators then reserved for the opinion of the court the question whether that knowledge on the part of Mrs O'Brien was sufficient to defeat her claim.

Question at Issue. Counsel for the insurance company said to-day that the substantial question raised was whether the words in the general exception, "To the knowledge of the insured," meant that Mrs O'Brien's knowledge of whether it meant the joint knowledge of herself and the vendor of the motor-car. If it meant only Mrs O'Brien's, then she could not recover.

He made three main submissions: (1) That the effect of the slip pasted on the policy was to make it clear that the knowledge was Mrs O'Brien's alone; (2) that the policy created a partnership between Mrs O'Brien and the vendor of the car for the particular purposes of the policy, and that the knowledge of either was in that event sufficient to affect both partners; and (3) that the scheme of the policy was to place outside the cover certain frequently-occurring incidents, such as drunkenness and the driving of cars by inexperienced or unlicensed persons.

The court should endeavour to give effect to that scheme.

Mr Iles (Gisborne) counsel for Mrs O'Brien, contended that the policy was intended to insure that it did not make it clear whether the term "insured" in the policy meant Mrs O'Brien or whether it meant Mrs O'Brien and the vendor of the car. That event the principle of the law was that the policy should be construed against the insurance company; and if that construction were adopted, Mrs O'Brien was entitled to £1000.

That construction had been adopted by Mr Justice Ostler in the Liniker v. the Hartford Insurance Co. in 1936, and Mr Iles submitted that the court should follow Mr Justice Ostler's decision.

The court reserved its decision.

AN INTERESTING JOURNEY

Hastings Man's Trip to the East Indies Tour Described

Mr George Ebbett's Address at the County Club

The highlights of a trip to Australia and the East Indies were the features of an address delivered by Mr George Ebbett, of Hastings, at the County Club on Saturday evening.

"We were two weeks at Sydney," said Mr Ebbett, "when the decorations for the 15th year celebrations were still standing. Actually, we were in time to see the second procession consisting of 112 floats and 21 bands. Some of the trade exhibits were magnificent.

"It was estimated there were 400,000 visitors in Sydney for the show and the polo."

The show was an immense affair, Mr Ebbett said, lasting for two weeks and attracting over a million visitors. On Good Friday alone the attendance reached 183,000.

The stands held 45,000 people, and the society's staff numbered 550. There were 30 telephone lines to the ground and it was estimated that the attendants and others directly interested numbered 10,000.

A wonderful Chinese carnival was held on the sports ground in aid of Chinese war refugees. There were no less than 40,000 people present.

FIRST GLIMPSES OF THE EAST

The first call was at Brisbane. There we were eight days at sea—only two with no sight of land.

We then arrived at Macassar in the Celebes. This was our first real view of the sights and smells of the East. Transport here and all through Java is largely by small ponies about 11 hands high and diminutive carts.

Very many Chinese and Indians are seen here. The climate is hot and humid, and the natives wear very scanty clothing. The standard of living is low.

One night's journey took us to Boeleng, the port of Bali, which is as big as the four counties of Hawke's Bay. The population of 1,100,000 includes only about 100 whites.

Bali and Java are volcanic with mountains up to 10,000 feet, some ejecting steam. At a distance the scenery is very like that of New Zealand.

The Balinese are a people to themselves. Their religion has its own customs, ceremonies, and dancing is their own. Temples and shrines are seen everywhere—thousands of them, from the size of pillar boxes up to elaborately carved stone structures 50 or 60 yards square.

The villages are enclosed in mud walls about two feet wide and thatched. The food of the Balinese is rice, bananas, and breadfruit and fish. The rice is always steamed, never boiled.

Every person dying is cremated. For cremations of the rich, high elaborate bamboo towers are built, the body placed therein, taken to the banks of a river or to the sea, and there the whole structure burnt. Bones and ashes of the dead are then collected and cast into the water.

Polygamy is not uncommon. Women do much of the outside work and carry everything on their heads. We stopped one woman on the road who was carrying on her head coconuts weighing about 160lbs.

EXHIBITION OF BALINESE DANCING

We saw an exhibition of Balinese dancing, said Mr Ebbett, some by girls alone, some by men alone, and some by both. All were dressed very elaborately, but we never saw more than three taking part at one time.

They tell you that these same dances, with all the attitudes and movements and exactly the same dress, with the same music, has been practised for 1000 years, but to one who is ignorant of the language and the meaning of the movements it is very tedious. Girls never dance after 12 or 13 years of age.

Nearly every village has a "game-lin," or native band, consisting of no wood instruments, one two-stringed instrument and two sizes of drum, formed of a cylinder of wood hollowed out with a dried buffalo hide stretched over the ends. They are played with the fingers.

Their wood carving is very artistic and generally of the highest order. Cockfighting has some connection with religion. It is illegal but is tolerated so long as it is kept in the background. We arranged with a half-Chinese to show us a fight.

He took us through devious lanes to a place close to the village. The birds were ready, each having one steel spur about five inches long lashed to his leg, the natural spur having been removed.

When everything was ready a

In old Batavia we saw an ancient cannon about 12 or 14 feet long which was lying on the ground. Nothing is known of its history, but it is surmised to be Portuguese. The natives worship it, and there is a priest there who keeps candles burning. The worshippers come at all times and place flowers and offerings on it and pray.

The Javanese have a story that in the mountains there is another similar cannon, and if ever the two come together the Dutch ruler in Java will end.

We found everything in Java very interesting—it could hardly be otherwise. Imagine a country not very much larger than New Zealand, with a population of 46,000,000 and you have Java.

You see many thousands of people working in the rice fields and plantations. Most of them are Mohammedans, and the majority of the workers seemed to me to be Indians. The Javanese appeared to be very indolent and easy going.

I saw the richest land I have ever seen there, said Mr Ebbett. They have grown rice on the same ground for 1000 years without fertilisers.

Rice is the staple food, and they grow enough to feed 46,000,000 people. Every grain is planted, reaped, and threshed by hand.

The vegetation is luxurious and the annual rainfall in some parts is 17 feet.

A VISIT TO SINGAPORE

Two nights and one day in another boat brought us to Singapore, the seventh port in the world.

There is a very fine harbour and the city has 550,000 residents, of which 400,000 are Chinese. There are 39 nationalities represented in the population, including 8000 whites exclusive of the military forces.

While we were there a Chinese committee collecting funds for Chinese war refugees took a census, which showed that there were 6765 shops in Singapore kept by Chinese, representing 114 trades.

There are whole streets of shops all kept by Chinese and Indians, but in Raffles Square there are three large European establishments.

There are many Chinese temples, the largest of which we visited. There are also Mohammedan mosques and an English Church Cathedral. Here I noticed many brass plates in memory of officers and men killed in an Indian mutiny in 1915. I had never heard of it, said Mr Ebbett, but it appears that an Indian Regiment mutinied and killed 63 officers and men during the war. Nothing about it was allowed out.

INDUSTRY AND WORKERS

We saw many Chinese women outside workers—breaking stones on the road, and at all sorts of jobs. A bricklayer was building a wall at our hotel and a Chinese woman was carrying bricks up to him. They get about 40 cents a day. A guildler is 100 cents, or 2/10 in New Zealand money.

In a climate so hot and humid there is much laundry work. It appears to be dried mostly on poles suspended out of the upstairs windows in many of the streets, and scores of poles projecting out of the roofs in each section to qualify.

The hawkers are a pest, said Mr Ebbett, and will not take "no" for an answer. There are about 10,000 licensed rickshaws in Singapore, and each carries two passengers. A rickshaw costs 10 cents for half a mile and a taxi 60 cents for a mile.

Here, and throughout Java, there are hundreds of portable restaurants which have been seen in every country road, and everywhere. They consist of a man with two iron boxes on each end of a pole across his shoulder. In one box is the fire and in the other the food supply.

A Chinese buys a meal for one three-hundredth part of 2/10. All the meat comes from Siam and Burma. I saw a consignment of beasts arrive, all led, quite plump and fat, which is 100ft. long and heavy heifers. The meat is very inferior to New Zealand meat. There are no butchers' shops anywhere and no vegetables whatever are grown in Singapore.

We visited an immense civil airport, where the buildings cost £1,000,000, said Mr Ebbett. We were about two hours in the naval base, but could see very little except the main dock, which is 1000ft. long with concrete walls 25ft. thick.

THE RETURN JOURNEY


On the return journey we were a whole day in Samarang—it is typical of all East Indies cities.

The K.P.M., a Dutch shipping company in which the Government hold 80 per cent. of the shares, appear to have a monopoly of the sea transport.

They own 147 vessels, the airways, most of the tourist services, and many of the large hotels in Java.

The service is excellent and everybody employed on board does his utmost to make the voyage interesting, enjoyable, and comfortable.

At the conclusion of his talk, Mr Ebbett received a very sincere vote of thanks for an usually interesting evening.
