PURGE OF AUSTRIAN NAZIS IS ALLEGED

Huge Losses Through Looting, Blackmail, Robbery and Corruption

LONDON, July 4.

The "Daily Herald" says that Herr Buerckel's admission that 12 Nazi commissioners whom he had placed in charge of Jewish businesses have been arrested, merely cloaks a thorough purge of Austrian Nazis.

At least eight hundred Nazi comnissioners controlling former Jew sh businesses have been dismissed. Corrupt administration is estimated to have resulted in the loss of welve million sterling, in addition o five million sterling worth of goods by looting, blackmail, and rob-

hery.

Herr Buerckel is compelled to stop his, and also to terminate the huried removal of Jews which is bringing Austrian trade to a standstill.

"Every man who has not done his luty will be stamped out," he delared, in a public statement at Eraz.

According to a previous report the 2 Nazi commissioners whom Herr Buerckel, Nazi Party Leader in Ausria, placed in charge of Jewish businesses, were arrested on charges of embezzlement.



The Government's retention of the motor spirits taxes in New Zealand is sweepingly criticised by Professor A. H. Tocker, professor of economics at Canterbury University College, in a report on motor taxation prepared for the Canterbury Progress League. Professor Tocker states that road users pay more in motor-spirit taxes alone than is spent from the Main Highways account; but that substantial amounts have to be borrowed to construct and maintain the highways of the Dominion. 



#### RUSSIA AND JAPAN

The report from Tokyo, published yesterday, to the effect that a fugitive from the Soviet had declared that Russia was preparing for war against Japan, should not be accepted too hastily.

Despite the fact that the antipathy between Russia and Japan is well known, and generally admitted, nevertheless it is most unlikely that Russia's preparation for war has gone to the lengths suggested by Lushkoff, who was formerly Chief of State for Russia's Far Eastern Political Department.

The Soviet's tactics in Eastern Asia have followed more or less orthodox lines of peaceful penetration. She has sent armies of propagandists and agitators among the people, particularly those of the northern and western provinces of China, and by various means a number of Chinese generals have been converted to Russia's ideology.

Gradually a strong pro-Russian element has been created in the areas aimed at, and many regions to-day are little better than Russian provinces. Outer Mongolia is directly under Russia's tutelage, and even in Sin Kiang and Inner Mongolia the influence of the Soviet is strong.

Many of the Communist Chinese generals were little better than glorified bandit leaders. Having in some cases no status whatsoever, they swept about the countryside pillaging and looting, demanding tribute from the innumerable peasant communities, and generally living by wresting sustenance and supplies from the people at the point of the bayonet.

With their conversion to Communism, many of these leaders regularised their position by assuming control of local governments, and, armed by the authority so usurped, they were able to wield a great influence in promoting Russia's aims in China.

It is stressed that at no stage, except in isolated cases such as Outer Mongolia, did Russia attempt open and aggressive expansionism comparable with Herr Hitler's seizure of Austria. The Soviet's methods were more subtle, and although there was much blood spilled in internecine wars between rival Chinese forces, Russia could not be accused directly of attempting to conquer China. The rise of Chiang Kai-Shek was regarded by Russia with

mixed feelings. In the first place, the possibility of a unified China dampened hopes for an ultimate Chinese Soviet allied with Russia, Against this, however, was placed the fact that Chiang Kai-Shek was sufficiently receptive to Russian ideas to allow of free relations between the two countries. Japanese incursions into Manchukuo, and later into the five

northern provinces of China, tended to throw China and Russia closer together. It was realised that a Japanese conquest of China might be but a prelude to further aggressions, and for that reason China has always had the assistance of Russia, concealed, it is true, in any moves taken to check Japanese expansion.

All this might be interpreted as lending colour to Lushkoff's story. However, Russia's opportunity to strike a vital blow at Japan can never come until the Soviet is sufficiently organised in Siberia and the East to support and maintain a full fighting force. She must still depend upon thousands of miles of vital trans-continental communications, which are both vulnerable and inadequate.

A more obvious course would be to allow the Sino-Japanese conflict to drag on until both sides are exhausted. This means that Russia must continue to aid Chiang Kai-Shek, but at the same time she is not likely to take any course which would provoke Japan too A prolonged struggle will mean the economic exhaustion of Japan, and by a judicious policy Russia could subjugate that country

all, Japan's territories are not the most attractive prize. It is the influence that she wields in the East, and her vast trade, that would be desired. In view of the possibility of this objective being reached without Russia's being drawn actively into the conflict, it is improbable

as effectively economically as she could by military conquest. After

that the vast preparations for war described by Lushkoff are real. No doubt a great number of people would be pleased to see China substantially assisted, but it is unlikely that a conflict so developing would continue to be confined to the three countries. The implications of the Anti-Communist Pact should not be forgotten, and if Russia marched eastward it might soon be followed by a move from Germany.

Russia knows this, and her actions recently reveal that she is not prepared to expose either her Eastern or her Western frontiers

#### "COST OF LIVING IS **OUTPACING WAGES"**

#### An Australian Criticism of N.Z. Public Works Programme

"Cost and prices have risen substantially and are still rising. The Government's most pressing immediate problem is the fact that the cost of living is outpacing wages. This is a situation that a vigorous programme of public works cannot help but aggravate.'

This criticism of the extent to which the Labour Government has developed its public works programme in New Zealand is voiced by Mr W. K. McConnell in the monthly circular of the Sound Finance League of Australia. Mr McConnell toured the Dominion recently, and his impressions are given under the heading of "Recent Economic Changes in New Zealand.'

"The major objective of the year out of taxation receipts and Labour Government's public works policy," says Mr McConnell, "is to provide employment and increase f35,000,000 of taxation receipts and consumer purchasing power. Most radical thinkers are infected by the over-simplified theory that the way to permanent prosperity is to get plenty of purchasing power into the pockets of potential consumers. There might be some truth in that view if lots of other things did not happen; but they do happen, parhappen; but they do happen, particularly in times like these of marked business activity.







PRUNING WORK IN HAWKE'S BAY ORCHARDS

Practical Suggestions: Orchard Instructor's Seasonal Notes

> (By N. J. Adamson, Orchard Instructor in Hawke's Bay)

The main activity in orchards at the present time is pruning. Treatment of trees must necessarily vary according to variety, age and condition, so that any advice given must be of a general character.

Pruning is carried out in the earlier stages of a tree's life for the purpose of training it along definite lines, the main objective being the formation of a strong framework, which may withstand the stress of heavy cropping, without a lot of propping and tying. Modifications in the older methods have been made from time to time, while some growers have made rather drastic changes, but such drastic changes have not always been to the good. There has been a swing away from older and recognised orthodox methods which required modification, but some have gone to extremes.

Apple trees should have a limited number of leaders, five or six being sufficient in the mature tree. The number may be even less, if brought about by gradual elimination and not limited to fewer from the beginning. 
