





Parents Should Think of These Six Points

FOR THE BABY

The problem of choosing a name for the baby is one that is not always easily solved, but the most essential point to remember is to give consideration to the surname and choose a Christian name which combines well with this. A writer in the "Literary Digest" has set out the following six points for parents to remember:—

to remember:

1. It the surname has one syllable, avoid a one-syllable first name. Example: Montgomery Smith rather than George or John Smith.

2. With a two-syllable last name, use either a one-syllable or three-syllable Christian name. Example: John Hinton or Christopher Hinton rather than William Hinton or Frederick Hinton.

3. When the last name has three syllables, use either a one- or two-syllable first name. Example: Mary Dougherty or George Dougherty, but not Alexander Dougherty.

4. If a middle name it to be used, it should contain more or fewer

it should contain more or fewer syllables than the surname, never

5. Avoid overlapping consonants such as Kathleen Norris, Bernard De Voto, or James Stephens.
6. Get away as much as possible from John, Albert, Elsie and Alice. In later life men sometimes feel John is too common a name. Albert briefs into an undignified nickname. E'sie and Alice sound "arty" enough to make their possessors uncomfortable.

Note to babies: When selecting parents, remember that one out of every eight people in New York University's Hall of Fame has a surname beginning with "W."

















THE PROBLEM OF FLOODS

Confirmation of the views already expressed editorially by the "Daily Mail" on the subject of flood prevention and control is to be found in two directions this morning, if reference is made to the news items on the question published on

The wording of the question put to the Minister of Public Works in the joint names of the Member for Hawke's Bay (Mr E. L. Cullen) and the Member for Napier (the Hon. W. E. Barnard) mentions the need for the prevention of denudation and the breaking away of hill country, and of the necessity for paying special attention to the headwaters and catchment

Secondly, in the course of his written reply, the Minister of Public Works (the Hon. R. Semple) said that committees have already been set up in every public works district to investigate the question, the order of reference including the rejuvenation of natural cover, reafforestation, and the closing

of certain grazing lands. Therefore, if, in the words of a recent letter published in the correspondence columns, the "Daily Mail" has "departed from its usual acumen," it has at any rate erred in the company of men who are in a position to speak with authority

Commendation has already been given to the policy of turning one's back to the actual flood damage on the flats and of looking to the hills to find the real cause of the trouble. That policy has been corroborated by the question and

answer to which reference has been made. Yet another confirmation of the views expressed by the "Daily Mail" is to be found in the fact that the Minister of Public Works declared that the work of flood prevention "should, if done at all, be carried out on the basis of a national scheme." That is precisely the opinion expressed last Friday by the "Daily Mail." And there is still another confirmation in Mr Semple's reply. He referred to the fact that much of the trouble could have been obviated long ago by intelligent reafforestation, and to the fact that the work would have cost much less than it will now.

It is in no spirit of carping criticism that the opinion is again stated that, worthy of respect and admiration as they were and still are, the pioneers of this country did not exercise the long view when they helped themselves to the timber on the high country (or burned it) without making any adequate

They were magnificent workers and they prepared the way for many of the comforts and advantages that New Zealanders enjoy to-day, but on the question of flood dangers they were ill-informed, short-sighted, and in many instances culpably careless. Evidence of the truth of this is to be found on the watersheds in many parts of the Dominion.

To allocate or to attempt to allocate the blame for any national danger, however, is never a very profitable pursuit. The facts are before the country and the Government must

What needs still to be emphasised is the desperate urgency

To ask and answer questions is a useful preliminary step towards the final solution of a grave question, but those who at this moment live amid the ruins of what were once prosperous farm lands and comfortable homesteads will be among the first to insist that the time for talk has gone. It is a moot point whether general agreement will be found with Mr Semple's views that rivers boards should "get

out of the road." Many of them have done useful work and

the Dominion has much for which to thank them. But there is no reason why a system of co-operation as between the Government and the rivers boards should not bring to light a lasting solution of the question. That solution must be something more than the partial prevention or the partial cure of floods. It must provide

complete immunity.

LIFEBOAT SERVICE OF THE AIR

HOW A GREAT BRITISH TRADITION IS KEPT ALIVE IN A NEW ELEMENT

Wireless is, of course, the key to the whole service. "Control" deals only with wireless-carrying aircraft. In the Control Tower the Wireless Room forms the all-important link between "Control" and the 'plane it is assisting.

The third vital department is the Meteorological Room which obtains observations of local weather conditions and collects reports of those in all other parts of the country.

Throughout their journeys over England commercial 'planes, such as Railway Air Services machines plying between Croydon, Manchester, Newtownwards (Belfast) and Renfrew (Glasgow) keep in constant communication with control stations. Before taking off the pilot of a north-bound 'plane obtains the permission of the Heston Control Officer to whom he reports his position.

REDUCING COLLISION

RISKS

If the control officer finds that two 'planes are approaching each other at the same height on the same route he instructs one to climb and the other to descend. This reduces the risk of collision in the clouds.

Certain aerodromes are surrounded by an area under their immediate control. No 'plane may enter these areas without the permission of the aerodome control station. If the local aerodrome has two or three 'planes coming in about the same time, one or two may be told to wait outside the area for a given time—again to reduce the risk of collision.

At the same time a similar reading is taken from another station. The red cords are adjusted and where they cross is the 'plane's position. As a check a dead reckoning is made from the time and place of de-parture, direction, ground speed, wind speed, and direction, etc. The fact that a machine begins to lose height, even over sea, does not mean immediate danger. Even with an engine dead, a pilot may be able to nurse his machine to the nearest landing point. Immediately it begins

to nurse his machine to the nearest landing point. Immediately it begins to look as if he will not be able to do so, rapid calculations are made to find the bearings of the place where he is most likely to hit the water. This is flashed to all shipping in the vicinity, and the nearest life boat sets off for the spot.

The weather forecast is for a general improvement in Hawke's Bay. The temperature, however, has shown an appreciable drop, and snow on the high country is probable. Motorists should take due care, as road surfaces are likely

This was accounted for largely by increased imports of capital goods, the type of goods which the mistaken policy of the Coalition Government forced us to go without during the depression, that accounted for the unnecessarily large accumulation of sterling assets during that period," Mr Savage continued.

The cutting down of expenditure during the depression resulted in the accumulation of many millions of pounds which should have been used instead of being hoarded up. The result was to-day that we had to spend some of that money to make up the arrears in our purchases of capital equipment.

The figures for the period 1931-33 were worth quoting. They told their own story. In this period we had some £40,000,000 in London at the very time when over 79,000 were unemployed in New Zealand and at least one sixth of the population was on the breadline.

Bank advances had declined from £53,500,000 in 1930 to £41,000,000 in 1934.

During the corresponding trading years imports declined from £49,000,000 to £26,500,000.

The possibility of establishing a district nursing service in Central Hawke's Bay was referred to by the chairman of the Waipawa Hospital Board (Mr W. H. Rathbone) at the board's monthly meeting held yesterday. A recommendation on this subject had been made by the Committee of Inquiry into Maternity Services, whose report was published in the "Daily Mail" on Tuesday of this week.

The recommendation in question was as follows:—"That a district nurse be appointed and equipped with a car to give ante-natal care to patients in outlying districts. Since the ante-natal problem in rural areas is largely a Maori problem, it is felt that a well-trained and sympathetic Maori nurse would be suit. district, the two extreme ends of the district where we have our greatest Maori population, i.e., Pukehou and Porangahau, would be more accessible, and further, she would be more easily available for attention at ante-natal clinics at Waipawa and Wingkuran pathetic Maori nurse would be suitable for this work. The committee is of the opinion that the nurse should be maintained and controlled by the Hernital Board and documents. by the Hospital Board, and does not favour district services run on a vol-untary or partly voluntary basis." Wipukurau.

Chairman's Reasons. As no official notification of the committee's report had been received, there was no general discussion, but the chairman made the fol

lowing statement:-"My own opinion is that if a district nurse is to be appointed she should be a European nurse with both midwifery and general certificates, and stationed at the headquarters of the hospital board district. I say this for the following reasons:—

(1) "As there are only about 160 maternity cases per annum in our district, and as a big proportion of these are private cases, the proportion of the nurse's work for prenatal and ante-natal services in such cases, should not be large.
