









#### SOCIAL SECURITY

It is easy to become enthusiastic over the ideal of social security. It is much harder to make sense of some of the Government's

In the first place, humanitarianism and sheer unnecessary giving should not be confused. Social security for those in need of it is admirable, and a policy to which every section of the community can subscribe. On the other hand, free gifts to those who are not

in need is carrying the ideal to absurd lengths. For instance, to make available the benefits of free medicine, free hospital treatment, free this and free that, to those in receipt of large incomes, is nonsensical. A bachelor in receipt of an income of over £500 a year is about as much in need of these benefits as a Zulu is in need of a fur coat.

The commonsense method of dealing with social security in its various aspects is to give the benefits to those genuinely in need, and if the Government had contented itself with such a scheme nothing but approval would be heard.

The argument most heard against this proposition is that it is necessary to have the contributions of the higher-salaried sections in order to finance the scheme, and therefore they should participate. It is, however, possible that with a limited scheme, applying only to those directly in need, the total expenditure could be greatly reduced, and if the wages tax in particular could be eliminated there could be no objection to those not in need not participating in all the benefits.

The whole purpose of the scheme is defeated by its very lavishness. To saddle the community with a burden of £17,850,000 (and it will grow) in order to fulfil a social security plan of such extent, must inevitably add to existing hardship. The wages tax alone will constitute such a severe drain on the pockets of the people that it will create a problem of income insufficiency which should never exist, and which will probably throw additional burdens on the scheme to an extent at present not calculated.

A man earning £300 a year will pay directly in wages tax a sum of £15 annually. Add to this the additional indirect contributions he must make through the added drain on the Consolidated Fund of over £5,000,000 a year, and it will be seen that the scheme will cost him personally, directly and indirectly, between £25 and £30 a year.

This burden cannot be carried. It will simply result in the lowsalaried and middle-salaried sections of the community being driven to a lower standard of living, throwing burdens on the social security scheme which it cannot possibly withstand.

Economically, the whole proposal starts from the wrong end. It is endeavouring to stretch the purse of the community to fit the scheme, and not the scheme to fit the purse. The wages tax should be eliminated entirely. Freed of this burden, wage-earners generally would not be in need of many pro-

visions of the scheme, and it could be modified accordingly to meet actual requirements. The cost to the community would then be not out of proportion to its capacity to pay in relation to its actual needs. The actual requirements of New Zealand seem to have been overlooked. We should provide pensions for those in need, health benefits for those unable to pay for them, and similar services for

The cost of such a scheme would be far less than the present proposals demand, and the community would be freed of an intolerable and dangerous burden.

those unable to fend for themselves. Anything other than this is

It must be remembered that our falling birthrate is tending to raise the age of New Zealanders, and we will have fewer and fewer young wage-earners to pay for more and more elderly people. If universal superannuation were introduced, the earning section of the community could not support it. The Government is to be congratulated that it has not gone to quite such extreme lengths.

At the same time, it is reasonable to presume that the burdens of the present scheme will grow from year to year, and the capacity of people to pay is even now strained beyond the limits. What sort of future is there for the younger wage-earners, who will become proportionately fewer as the burdens increase?

The fact of the matter is that the Government has allowed its discretion to be overruled by a desire to make a grand gesture. To place a burden equal to almost the whole of the Consolidated Fund expenditure in 1928 and 1929—boom years—on a community not yet recovered fully from the effects of the last depression, is the height of folly. A further recession resulting in a shrinkage of the national income—a possibility which is admitted even by Mr Nash—would

Lebrun) in a speech following the unveiling by the King of the memorial to the Australian troops at Villers Breton-

"Then, two years ago," M. Lebrun recalled, "at Vimy, on a crest which henceforth will be historic, a monument was erected to Canada, in memory of her sons.

"To-day," M. Lebrun said, "we are glorifying the admirable Australian and New Zealand Army Corps—those irresistible Anzacs of the those irresistible Anzacs of the Fourth British Army who in April, May, July and August, 1918, took such an active part in the Amiens operations, taking 22,000 prisoners, capturing considerable war booty and leaving 20,000 of their own on the field."

"It is touching to the head of the French State to stand beside your Majesties at this moving ceremony, united in the same gesture of pious homage. We are particularly touched that your Majesty combined your first visit to France with the inauguration of the memorial.

The need for certain reforms with regard to afforestation in the Hawke's Bay district were emphasised at a meeting of the Hawke's Bay Afforestation and Land Drainage Committee, which met at Napier on Saturday. The committee stressed the need for the declaration of a fire district in Hawke's Bay. It also agreed that consideration should be given to the condition of the Esk River, and to the question of State leases, where there is still a certain amount of bush.

Members of the committee are to consider the question of a future policy, and their suggestions are to be discussed at a later meeting. It is hoped that the committee will be able to work in conjunction with the Public Works Department, which has appointed a committee of three to inquire into the same

The Government has promised to take steps as soon as possible to make a complete survey of those parts of the country where flooding occurs. A letter to this effect was received from the Hon. W. E. Barnard, M.P. for Napier, who said that the matter had been placed before the House of Representatives. Mr Barnard said that Mr E. L. 

#### LETTER OF WARNING TO **MAORI CHIEFS**

Patrolling the N.Z. Coast

One hundred years ago on Saturday H.M.S. Pelorus was at Coromandel Harbour. She was patrolling the New Zealand coast and her work was to see justice done wherever Europeans were settled.

In the course of this work a very interesting letter of warning to the Maori chiefs of the Thames district was written by her commander, and is now published for the first

Within twenty years of Cook's ex-loration of the New Zealand coast convict settlement was established board my ship, punished and re-moved from the Island." at Sydney. In the following years whalers and sealers, and traders in flax and spars began to reach New

Escaped convicts and fugitives from justice of many lands were sprinkled plentifully amongst them. The evil reputation of the New Zealand coast spread early beyond her shores. Even Sydney mildly shud-dered; and humane Englishmen re-coiled in horror.

First Step.

In 1814 the first step to deal with New Zealand lawlessness was taken (strangely absurd and fantastic it (strangely absurd and fantastic it seems in retrospect), Hongi and Korokoro, along with Thomas Kendall, were made J's.P. In 1832 James Busby was appointed British Agent in New Zealand. He lacked any coercive power, and he had not the gift of ruling by persuasion; but he provided the New Zealand tribes with a pational flag and drafted



## CONTINENT BUYS DAIRY HERDS SHOULD BE TESTED

Raising Dominion Standard

TO ELIMINATE DISEASE AND INCREASE PRODUCTION

Work of Testing Associations

"I wish to emphasise that the mastitis testing of dairy herds is entirely free, voluntary, and confidential," said Mr H. R. Gilbertson, chairman of the Heretaunga Group Herd Testing Association, at the annual meeting of the association held on Saturday.

Mr Gilbertson said that many farmers did not appear to appreciate the work of the association. The last season had been a very disappointing one. The annual figures had shown a decrease of 217 in the number of cows tested, and this had resulted in a decrease of £67 in herd testing fees.

He attributed the losses mainly to the heavy floods during the season with the resultant heavy losses of stock.

Mr Gilbertson said that he hoped the coming season would show some improvement both in the number of animals tested and in the fees received by the association.


