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

Remember Te Rangi-te-kahuitia, a great chief of Central Hawke's Bay and his To-hunga, Pakatore, who prayed that he (Pakatore) might provoke the gods of storm to anger. This he did and in a moment darkness envel-oped the mountain Kahuranaki. Then with indescribable fury the sea in the bay swept up so invading sea in the bay swept up so invading enemies, led by Tamahikawai, venenemies, led by Tamankawal, ventured out to revenge certain wrongs, but perished in the storm. This story is perpetuated in Upoko Poito. Whilst the men were being beaten by the billows and as their canoes were being turned over, a voice was heard above the storm saying, "My valeur on land cannot be tested." heard above the storm saying, "My valour on land cannot be tested here"—meaning that had the speaker been on land he would have had a chance to fight.

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

ADVICE TO NEW ZEALAND

The other day Dr. H. B. Cooper, of Honolulu, who is a member of a party making a tour of the South Island, was reported to have said that he prefers 200,000 Japanese to 5,000,000 as a reasonable quota to help New Zealand along

It is comforting to note also that in his judgment the Dominion has no need to fear that within a few generations the Japanese population would overrun the country. In Hawaii, he pointed out—and one instinctively visualises the size and importance of Hawaii—the Japanese families have shown a tendency to decline. The presumption is that they will carry this habit with them to New Zealand and so come into line to take the criticisms that are at present being

Dr. Cooper admitted that "during the past month he had had little opportunity of seeing the best farming land of New Zealand," but retained his opinion that there is large scope for development. He concluded by saying that only "native" races could develop such a country as this, and that it is the increasing desire of Europeans to live in cities.

In current history Dr. Cooper may be called New Zealand Adviser Number One. Number Two was represented in yesterday's "Daily Mail" by a message from New York, consist-

According to that journal, New Zealand on the one hand needs population, and on the other various exiles and refugees from European countries need homes. Therefore, New Zealand should bring the exiles from Germany, Austria, and Italy to find homes in New Zealand.

New Zealand's developmental problems, however, are a matter for New Zealand's judgment to decide.

It is not only people who are needed to develop the Dominion—people of any sort, numbers at any price. They must be the right kind of people and they must come in at the right time under the terms of carefully regulated schemes.

Sir Apirana Ngata in the interests of his people and at the same time assured him that it was not the intention of the pakeha to dispossess the Maori of his
