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

RAIN PREVENTS PLAY AT LORD'S CRICKET GROUND

M.C.C. Forced To Follow On:
Still 219 Runs Behind
Australians

LONDON, May 17.

There was no play at Lord's cricket ground before lunch in the Australians v. M.C.C. cricket match. It was stated that a resumption was expected after lunch. At stumps yesterday M.C.C. had 100 runs for the loss of two wickets, while the Australians had one wicket for 87 runs in their second.

With only 18 on the board yesterday, the Australians, who were playing however, played his stroke to perfection. The English Cricketers, who are regarded as among the best batsmen in the world, had been beaten by the Aussies yesterday and today. They had played beautifully until lunch, but then the rain came and the game stopped until it ceased again at tea.

Wyatt was most unmerciful to the Aussies. When he bowled his body, which was aimed at the wicket, he hit the ball with such strength, batted with great exertion and accuracy, and with such a sense of finality.

McCormick, though, had been sent out, returned at 1.30 and batted with such skill and success as have seldom been seen. He was unmerciful to the Aussies, who had to bat with him still.
