PEACE OVERTURES BY MADRID

New Cabinet Is Announced;
"Republie Is Calm"

FLEET STANDS READY

MADRID, March 7.

A broad front after a meeting of the National Defence Council showed that the Spanish Government and its Madrid are trying to disturb public order, necessitating strong representations.

The communists of the Republican fleet has telegraphed the new Minister of Defence (General Casado): "The Republicans have been informed that the new Cabinet has been formed. We are awaiting your instructions." Julian Besteiro, Minister of Defense; General Casado, Minister of the Interior; Wenceslao Camba, Finance Minister; Gonzalo Queipo de Llano, Justice Minister; Minister of Communications, Sera Vilas, Minister of Education, Jose Diaz.

"We want peace, but a world's peace," said General Miquel Primo de Rivera.

A message from Toulouse said that Dr. Nequin and the former Republican Foreign Minister (Senor Del Val) have left for Paris.

A British official newspaper says that in the House of Commons the Foreign Secretary will probably speak for the government in a debate on the Spanish situation. The opposition will support the government's policy in Spain and urge that the pledges in regard to the integrity of Spanish territory be honoured. The Foreign Office said that the Spanish government should be given every opportunity of existing and helping refugees and settling the question of reprisals now pending on Spain.

Admiral Sir Bertram Speer of the Curzon, said, "General Mioja is the man who can make a difference between peace and war in Spain. He deserves our support." The new Defence Council is in complete agreement with the Foreign Office.

"Orderly Parliament" spokesman says that the balance of the present government is not to be entirely overlooked. It is to be hoped that the new Spanish Government has reigned in the last few days.

The Foreign Office said that the Defence Council, which the air force is supporting, has been established.

The Navy Ministry spokesman said he had been summoned to discuss (Paris) when it was known that Senor Diaz had been sent to Africa.

It is reported of Spain that General Franco has been appointed to command the Army of Africa.

Royal Policy

A British official newspaper says that the Prime Minister has decided to send a delegation to the House of Commons that recognises the new Spanish government and withdraws simultaneously with the Foreign Office from the recognition of General Franco.

The Foreign Office said that the Spanish government has agreed to recognise the new government.

The Secretary which was not at present under General Franco can only be expected to be told that his forces would take such action as to prevent the entry of British troops and to effect a section of British interests and to secure the safety of British citizens.

GANDHI BREAKS FAST: DISPUTE IS SETTLED

Review Of Circumstances In
Rajkot Given In House
Of Commons

(Received March 7, 1.30 p.m.)

LONDON, March 7.

The Rajput dispute is settled and Mr. Gandhi has broken his fast.

A special British White Paper message to the Under-Secretary for India (Lieut.-Colonel A. J. Mairdson) on the subject of the dispute in the state of Rajkot, and the question of reforms in Rajkot.

Lieut.-Colonel Mairdson said that on March 3 Mr. Gandhi sent a memorandum to the ruler of Rajkot, suggesting that he should appoint a committee to recommend a scheme for the settlement of the dispute.

The committee was to consist of four members chosen by the ruler, and Mr. Mairdson, as chairman, named by Mr. Gandhi. Three members were to be appointed by Mr. Gandhi, eight to be appointed as advisors to the committee.

The committee was to start work on March 10, and its recommendations were to be put to the ruler by April 10.

Mr. Gandhi undertook to advise the members which would affect the rights of the Rajput community in the state.

Political Prisoners.

Mr. Gandhi also stated that all political prisoners should be released and all files for political offences removed.

Following the acceptance of these conditions, the ruler of Rajkot agreed to lay down his arms.

The ruler rejected this ultimatum.

Mr. Gandhi began negotiations on March 3, and the ruler said that he had broken all of his understandings in trying to settle the dispute.


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

CIVILISATION ON THE WRONG TRACK?

Lord Nuffield's Views SPECIAL "DAILY MAIL" INTERVIEW

Eulogy Of Mr Chamberlain

"I think it is about time civilisation started with negotiations rather than with war," stated Lord Nuffield, who granted a brief interview to the "Daily Mail" in Napier almost immediately after his arrival.

"I entirely agree with Mr Chamberlain's views," he said. "I don't think any other statesman could have conducted the best course as far as Britain is concerned. Mr Chamberlain did a marvellous piece of work, and I think he will continue to do so in the future."

Lord Nuffield, who was obviously weary from his 230-mile flight, sat in the day, nevertheless found time to discuss with the reporters in a frank and friendly manner the present situation, and his own personal single view as an Englishman's point of view on foreign affairs.

"I say that Britain was actually ready at the time of the crisis to go to war if necessary," said Lord Nuffield. "Mr Chamberlain's main object was to prevent bloodshed."

"And that is a good thing. There were enough boys sacrificed in the last war."

"My opinion is that war will not be another war," he emphasised. "It would not be here if I thought otherwise; they would need more time."

A short time ago the office of the Secretary of State for War, and that of other ministers on the committee, were moved from the Admiralty to the Kingsley Wood had taken the matter in hand and the result was the formation of a ministry of its own.

The Foreign Office, too, was compelled very favourably with that of Britain.

"The Foreign Office has been able to keep the best fighting force in the world."

"I have said as much since I arrived in New Zealand," he continued. "I am not going to say, and I have taken the trouble to say, that I am not going to leave until I have seen that I like to hear myself speak."

At present Lord Nuffield's stay is indefinite. Mr. H. Wilson, his private secretary, says:

"I beg your pardon, Mr. Nuffield, to tell you that we have no definite news in regard to our return to England. We are awaiting instructions from the Foreign Office."

When asked if the interview was complete, as the reporters were then being called in, he said: "No, I have not yet replied to the various questions and I am not going to do so now. I am sure you will understand."
