BIG INCREASE IN THE PUBLIC DEBT

£13,768,930 Added

During the past financial year the provision of funds for expenditure on public works and other capital purposes resulted in a net increase in the public debt of £13,768,930, said Mr. H. M. J. Savage in his Budget speech last night.

"I might explain that in arriving at these figures the expenditure estimates have been carefully overvalued, while, on the other hand, every endeavour has been made to arrive at an accurate estimate of the revenue as possible," said Mr. Savage.

The position therefore is that we are faced with the problem of increasing the revenue from taxation by £2,500,000. The problem is not an easy one, and the Government has given very careful consideration to various alternatives in order that the additional burden might be so placed as to be as light as possible upon the people.

"On the revenue side of the account we are faced with a total net surplus estimated as £822,000," continued Mr. Savage.

The importation of raw materials is estimated to be £120,000 less than the previous year. It is anticipated, however, that £1,500,000 in exports, net of import duties, will be secured.

The yield from income-tax at the existing rates is estimated to exceed £100,000 less than for 1938-39, while the revenue from stamp and death duties is anticipated to be £2,400,000.

Against these reductions are offset an increase in railway interest of £200,000, while other items have been increased by £1,150,000, of which £900,000 represents the profit derived from the sale of our silver coins. These, with other minor increases and decreases, are estimated to reduce the total revenue by the £822,000 referred to.

All this, plus, allowing £200,000 for supplementary estimates and contingencies, the budgetary position is as follows:—

"In conclusion, I would say that we have already made much progress in improving the general standard of living. Given the utmost care and most judicious support of the people, we can increase production which will enable us to maintain our position as a most economic trade. With this as a starting-point we will move forward to even higher standards in the future," declared Mr. Savage.

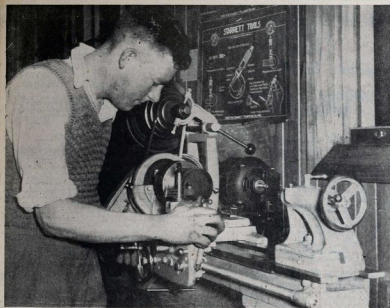

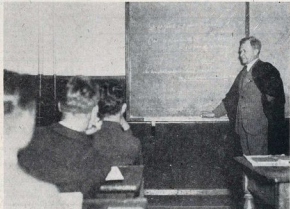

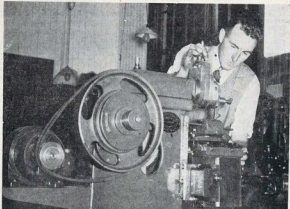
