New Weapon Used Against Finns

DEADLY AERIAL TORPEDOES

Many Direct Hits Scored By Recent Raids

MOST TOWNS EVACUATED

HELSINGFORS, Fep. 5.

Rusian airmen are using a secret weapon—a seven-foot torpedo containing three sections, one of ordinary explosive, one of shrapnel and one of small incendiary bombs against Hanko and Sortavala.

A captured pilot admitted that one in every four Russian aeroplane's machine-gun bullets was explosive.

Wiipuri is now a ghost town of 2000, instead of the former 80,000 inhabitants. Successive squadrons of bombers dropped 500 bombs, scoring 150 direct hits, including the cathedral and four banks, causing 16 fires but, owing to the evacuation, only 10 were killed and 30 wounded.

The Russians dropped 15 bombs on Turku, killing and wounding several people.

The Russians rained thousands of bombs on Southern and Central Finland on Sunday.

Four hundred 'planes participated in the heaviest air offensive since the outbreak of the war, killing 100 people, injuring over 100, and hitting three hospitals and seven air

raid shelters. Sixteen 'planes fired on a chapel at Sinaejoki, in the Wasa district, killing ten people.

Thirty-six bombers attacked Kervo, causing serious fires.

Damage was also heavy at Viborg and on the outskirts of Helsingfors. The Finns on the north front sent up the biggest fleet of 'planes they

The Soviet military guthorities at Leningrad have issued a statement that, despite the arrival of modern planes from England, France, the United States, Sweden and Italy. Finnish airmen were incapable of protecting commanding points, including the Finnish headquarters at Lahti, Rovaniemi, Sortavala and Viborg, which Soviet bombers demolished.

German Claims Shown To Be False

A balance sheet of the German raids on Saturday shows that at least seven airmen are dead, six have been taken prisoners and a ship was sunk and one British ship set on fire. Seven of the nine ships attacked escaped with minor dam four of whom were neutrals.

TWO SHIPS SUNK BRITISH LIFEBOATMEN SPEND BUSY WEEK-END SEARCHING FOR SHIPS WRECKED IN

TWO-THOUSAND-TON VESSEL FOUND OUT OF CONTROL WITHOUT A SOUL

LONDON, Feb. 5. British lifeboatmen spent the busiest week-end for months searching the wintry seas for victims of the Nazis and responding to calls of distress from three ships wrecked in tempestuous weather.

Two members of the crew of the Yorkshire lifeboat were washed overboard and drowned during an attempt to save the crew of the Belgian motor-ship Eminent. The lifeboat was hauled by hand for a mile overland before being launched. It made three attempts to reach the ship but failed.

Six Belgians tried to reach the shore by a raft but were drowned. The others were finally landed by breeches buoy. The steamer Jernfjeld also went ashore and was holed in the stern and the bow. The crew of 18 escaped by boat.

The steamer Baron Ruthven, which the Nazis bombed last week, met a like fate on the north-east coast, 34 members of the crew being rescued by lifeboat.

One coastal lifeboat spent 29 hours continuously at sea

seeking three ships. Another found the 2000-ton Mertainen out of control without a soul aboard. It later picked up a skeleton crew and returned them aboard the vessel, which

The Glasgow collier Yewdale. Three members of her crew were injured including the skipper, who was machine-ounned at the wheel and who died as the ship entered an east coast harbour.

The Grimsby trawler Rose of England was following the Yewdale. The mate says that four aeroplanes attacked the ship and must have dropped 60 bombs. One nearly lifted the ship out of the water. Three hit, breaking the steering gear. No one was injured.

Saved by Lifeboat

They say the ship was bombed from the air and not mined. Sixteen persons perished.



THE PROGRESS OF WAR IN FINLAND

Russia Organises Two Zones Of Attack

THE WEATHER'S PART

HELSINGFORS, Dec. 9. Finland's staunch and only active ally, Ceneral Weather, has again foiled the Russian plans. Fog and snow have deprived the Russians of their air supremacy and saved Finnish cities from further destruction, while hindering the

Russian movement on land. To-day, against the Government order, people have been returning to Helsingfors, reassured by a five-day respite from bombardment. Daring Finnish airmen, more skilled in local flying conditions, discovered and bombed troop trains southbound along the Murmansk railway.

Discovery of these trains confirms the proposition that General Mereshoff, the Russian commander, is withdrawing two of six divisions operating along the frontier between Lake Ladoga and the Arctic, and is adding them to the five divisions now concentrated on the Karelian Isthmus preparatory for a new offensive on the Mannerheim line. Fragmentary reports received from Fron make it possible to construct a general picture of the operations.

For the purpose of strategy the Soviet has divided Finland into two zones—the southern coastal zone where most of the towns are located and which is comparatively well settled, and the northern zone, a sparsely settled wild region of rocks, grani'e hills, and forests, crossed only by a few main roads and railways.

At three other points along the northern frontier the Soviet has rushed troops to touch the Finnish communications. The present defence of Finnish roads and railways from the east is hampered by the fact that since they were built under the Czarist regime they were designed for defence against any attack from the west. Roads and railways follow the east shore of the lakes and rivers and are therefore exposed to the east. The Russian command realises that and has aimed the troops at the most vulnerable points.

Thus the outcome of the first week of the war has been that the Russians have scored little success in their attacks in the north and south, have everywhere been checked, and they have suffered losses both of tanks and 'planes.



Making Home-Made Jam

SOME HINTS WELL WORTH NOTING

Do you and your family appreciate home-made jam? If so, here are some practical hints and rules

1. Usually, a pound of sugar to a pound of fruit; less, if not needed to keep for a very long period, as keep for a very long period, as many jams are over-sweet.

2. Stone fruit should have three-quarters of a pound of sugar to a pound of sugar for unstoned fruit.

3. Fruit that is really juicy does not need water; hard kinds, or if the season has been very dry and the fruit is poor, need from half to a gill of water.

4. Crack some of the stones from plums, etc., and add the kernels to

plums, etc., and add the kernels to

5. Raspberry and cherry jams are improved if a gill of red currant juice is added to each pound of fruit. 6. To preserve the colour and shape of fruit, boil the sugar with the water first, then add the fruit.
7. Boil jam steadily and quickly. 8. Skim well. Have the pan bare-

three-parts full.

9. When the jam seems thick and reduced in quantity, pour some on a saucer, cool it, and if it jellies it is boiled enough. During this test keep the pan off the fire. Gather the fruit in on a fine dry

day and early in the morning before the sun is hot. If you have to buy the fruit, select that which is dry, ripe and sound.

Damp or over-ripe fruit will make jam ferment or turn mouldy.

See the fruit is not over-ripe for another reason; once the stage of perfection is reached, the pectose, a substance which jellies the jam, lessens in quality and quantity. It is on the amount of pectose present in fruit—and it varies greatly with the season—that the quality of the jam, jelly, or marmalade depends,

THREE WAYS WITH HONEY

One of the "old wives' remedies" that can hold its own with modern medicine is lemon and honey, to re lieve the "rough" throat that results lieve the "rough" throat that results from a rasping cough and a cold in the head. The remedy is very simply made by cutting a lemon into thin slices, dropping a thin layer of honey on each, placing the slices on top of one another, and leaving them for an hour or so to allow the lemon juice to be drawn into the honey. Pressure with the back of a spoon induce a greater flow of juice. Half a teaspoonful of the mixture will produce a wonderful effect in soothing and softening the sore tissues.

In spite of its sweetness, honey does not possess the characteristics that make sugar undesirable in the food of people liable to adiposity and indigestion. It can be used in tea and coffee without spoiling the flavour and can also be put into puddings. Try it in the next milk pudding you make, and don't forget a pinch of salt and bay leaf.

When next you have sour milk to When next you have sour milk to dispose of, remember that a cupful of it will work up into a very pleasant honey cake, if you mix it with half the quantity of sugar, dredge in twice the quantity of flour, and add sufficient honey to flavour the mixture. Young Man Sent To Gaol

He had in his possession a handful of silver amounting to 10/-, and this he handed back. There were two other handed back. There were two other men standing on the pavement outside the shop, and the assistant asked them to hold on to the defendant while he made a check of the money in the cash register. It was then discovered that there was £1 1/- missing. When asked for the remainder of the money, Pierce said he did not have it, but that he would get it from his friends. He was

get it from his friends. He was allowed to go and get the money. Sergeant Moore described the theft as rather contemptible. The defendant, he added, had been before the court on several occasions. Mr Sainsbury said he had been instructed by the defendant that he was under the influence of liquor at the time and did not remember

Sentencing the defendant to two months' imprisonment in the Napier gaol, the Bench stated that, judging by his past record, things were not too good as far as he was concerned.





WATERFRONT CONTROL

Many severe criticisms have been levelled recently against the conduct of some of the watersiders in some places and at various times in the Dominion. Mr Fraser, as Deputy Prime Minister, has now made the announcement that the Government has decided to appoint a Waterside Emergency Control Commission "with power to deal with the unsatisfactory conditions that prevail at the present time on the waterfront, in order to bring about a more satisfactory position."

This Commission is to be given power to control the loading and unloading of ships, to speed up the work in both cases and "to ensure reasonable conditions, continuity of employment, and adequate payment to the men concerned."

This is one of the most interesting of the movements made by our present most interesting Government. And just about time, too. What the "wharfies" will say to it remains to be seen. They have been inclined to suppose until now that they are beyond criticism and that the remarks that have been made about them are the outpourings of capitalistic spleen.

Now the Government—their own particular branch of government—has stepped in to say that watersiders, like other people, must toe the line of duty and render their due service to the State in time of war. Mr Fraser made it clear that not even the watersiders' grievances can be allowed to stand between the Dominion and safety, or to interfere with the essential overseas trade. He indicated that the Government would have preferred an easier way out of the difficulty of avoiding delays and hold-ups, but that failing an arrival by the parties concerned at a solution of their problems, nothing else was left to be done but to set up the Commission to which he referred.

A Commission is an Olympic sort of institution, connoting a certain aloofness and remote authority, apart from immediate Governmental control; but it is doubtful if the "wharfies" will fail to realise that they are in this instance being brought to book by the Government to whose tenets most of them subscribe. It is devoutly to be hoped that they will be more amenable to this kind of criticism than they have been to that which has been expressed by people who emphatically do not share their political views.

It is perfectly obvious that the Government, impelled by the necessities of the existing war situation, has at length been forced to face up to the "tail-wagging-the-dog" attitude of the men on the waterfronts. Even although it is in an indirect way, the power of the trades unions is being challenged, and although the outcome may be as yet obscure, the average citizen will rejoice that a stand of some sort has been taken against the serious delays incidental to waterside hold-ups.

It is recognised clearly and admitted without hesitation that the work which these men do is hard and that it demands the expenditure of the maximum of physical power. Their hours are uncertain, their time broken, their prospects each week at the mercy of arrivals and departures and the condition of the weather. But giving all that in, they are in a key position, knowing all the time that, so long as they are concerted in their action, they have the power given by numbers. The single strand may be weak, but when it is twisted around its kind often enough, it is strong. "Unionism" in the root sense of the word, has never been more clearly emphasised in New Zealand, nor has its strength been more definitely indicated than in the case of the watersiders.

The result has been the yielding to the natural temptation to abuse the possession of power and to cause trouble which could have been avoided by a more reasonable attitude. Recent events bear out that fact. The Commission may therefore succeed where other methods have failed-and it may not



THE HAWKE'S BAY LACK OF FLOODGATE AT CLIVE

Rivers Board In Deadlock With Railways

FURTHER ACTION LIKELY

A deadlock appears to have developed between the Hawke's Bay Rivers Board and the Railways Department regarding the erection of a floodgate across the permanent way near Clive. Members of the board, which met yesterday at Napier, considered the position to be serious, and suggested that the people of Clive should take up the matter with the department through the member for the district.

A letter from the Railways Department received at yesterday's meeting stated that no move would be made towards erecting the floodgate unless the board agreed to clause 10, which reads as follows:—

"The Rivers Board to agree to bear the cost, estimated at £3000, of raising the Karamu Bridge and the line north of the bridge to a height which will enable the floodgate to be eliminated should the department at some future time decide to raise the low-lying portion of the railway line south of the bridge."

"We cannot agree to this clause,"

ASSEMBLY SHED "We cannot agree to this clause," said the chairman (Mr C, Lassen). "It means that if the line is ever flooded from any cause the department will call on the board to raise the line, and we cannot commit the ratepayers to such an expense."

Work Nullified.

The department's attitude was hard to understand, said Mr L. E. Harris. If the gate was not erected the line would probably be scoured with the first flood they experienced.

Man's ingenuity was at its best hen he evolved the contraption which could record his weight. He nade another forward step when he adapted the weighing machine to make pecuniary return. Perhaps there is no stranger affair than the weighing machine to be found in the public places of all towns. After spending 12 pennies and weighing himself on 12 machines in Napier and Hastings a "Daily Mail" report-

and Hastings a "Dally Mail" reporter thinks so.

He found that his weight varied from 9st 10lb to nearly 11st. What was the reason for his remarkable loss and gain in avoirdupois? His clothing throughout the tour remained the same; he ate nothing; nor did he perspire unduly. Surely the answer must have lain in the machines which so guilelessly accepted his coins. ted his coins.

Number One

Number One

The first machine he approached was an imposing affair. Made of cast iron and standing over six feet in height it had an element of impregnability reminiscent of Gibraltar itself. The reporter stepped on to the quivering platform and dropped a penny into the appropriate slot.

There followed a muffled clanking as the coin was digested in the iron gullet of the massive monster; a guilet of the massive monster; a light whirring, a spinning of brass cogs, and the great pointer swung about the dial and came to rest on the 10st mark. Feeling that the machine had given good value for his penny by virture of its impressive performance, the reporter recorded and sought pastures fresh corded and sought pastures fresh and fields anew.

Weighing machine Number Two bore all the hall-marks of modernity. It stood no more than 3ft. in height, occupied an inconspicuous place in a shop doorway, and was finished in smart, white enamel. Baling Wire and Rope

Sir,—In the early days of New Zealand farmers who grew corn had to cut it either with the scythe, the "tilter" or side-delivery, but it all had to be tied into sheaves. When the straw was long enough, a handful was used to bind with; when the corn was short, flax had to be used. When hay was trussed for the market flax was used for binding and is still used by hand balers, only in a refined form as twine or rope.

It is nearly seventy years ago since I saw the first reaper and binder come to North Canterbury, South Island, which tied the sheaves with a fine wire, and although a big improvement in hand-tying, it had some objections, in that when chaff was being cut the wire had a habit of getting into the chaff cutter unnoticed and of eventually getting into the horses' mouths, with consciously sufficient and so with dother than the sufficient and so with sufficient and so with sufficient and so with sufficient sufficient and so with sufficient suf sequent suffering and even death.

A few years later a binder came out that tied the sheaves with string and a lot of people said the string would never be a success, but the quality of the twine soon improved and was even stronger than the wire at less cost. It was not long before the wire binder was a thing of the past.

using rope instead of whe for baling hay, and went to a lot of trouble three years ago to get a rope made suitable for the purpose and at a cheaper price than wire, and I could get no encouragement from the hayget no encouragement from the hay-balers as they were mostly on contract and the farmer paid for it.


