

AMERICA FEARS EFFECTS FOR SECURITY OF ALLIES' WAR PURCHASES OF WORKERS

Costs May Rise Now And Slump Mau Come With End Of Strife

> United Press Association-Convright. (Received February 9, 11.45 p.m.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.

The Administration's policy to meet the long-range effects of the continued large war purchases from the United States is likely to result in a conference between President Roosevelt, Mr Hull, Mr Woodring, Mr Edison, and departmental heads at the White House to-day.

It is feared that foreign purchases may rapidly increase the prices of materials needed at home, also that the financing of the expanded aeroplane factories with foreign capital may be carried too far and result in a post-war collapse of industry. President Roosevelt is reported to be anxious to formulate a policy of keeping the war demands within reasonable

The Secretary of the Treasury (Mr Henry Morgenthau)

declared that he favoured letting industry formulate its own The Atlas Powder Company officials disclose that Britain

has advanced money for the construction of an explosives plant, the total output of which will be consigned to Britain and France. It is understood that payment will be gauged

according to tonnage.

It is officially stated that the production capacity of United States aero-engine plants is 1000 a month and will reach 1500 by mid-July and 2000 by the end of the year. It is estimated that the year's production will be about 15,000 motors of an average of 1000 horse-power, of which the United States Army and Navy will require 7500 to 8000. The Allies have contracted for virtually all the remainder.

Other books of hers include "Twinkles on the Mountain," "Uncles Three at Kamahi" and "Robin of Maoriland." It is believed that there are unfinished and unpublished stories.





LABOUR'S PEACE AIMS

The attitude of the British Labour Party executive commends itself to everyone who wishes to see the war through to a victory which will establish the principles of righteousness and lasting peace. As will be seen from the account of proceedings published elsewhere in the issue, they reaffirm their opposition to the present Government at Home. They are entirely entitled to do so, for that is not the kind of freedom of speech anyone wishes to suppress. They go on to say that while that is so, they will co-operate to the uttermost in an endeavour to overthrow the Hitler system in Germany and that while loathing war, they regard it "as a lesser evil than the destruction of Parliamentary democracy and civil freedom." In other words and in both ways, British Labour is willing to fight for its principles. No one will cavil

Another point of agreement with the British Labour declaration can be found in the statement that in destroying the wrongs incidental to the Nazi regime, no new wrongs should be created. This will pass "nem. con." among all decent people. It might, in fact, have been Mr Chamberlain speaking when the Labour executives said that Hitler's word cannot be trusted, that aggression must be destroyed, and that no reasonable peace can be negotiated until the obvious acts of restitution have been made to the people who have been browbeaten by a ruthless system of tyranny.

It is also a recognisable good service to the cause of eventual justice and fair play in Europe that the British Labour authorities should bring into prominence the root of the whole matter as affecting possible future outbreaks of war. The root of the matter is the attempt which must be made when hostilities cease, to establish and to maintain the balance as between the French demand for security and the German demand for equality. These two words have been ringing down the corridors of the past twenty years and more. Given a Germany which has no reason to regard herself as the Cinderella of the European nations and a France which at the same time will have no cause to fear the violation of her safety, it is not too much to say that the Continent and even the world at large would be safe for democracy.

What Labour in Britain says to Germany, every good citizen of New Zealand will echo: "If you establish a Government which is sincerely willing that Germany shall be a good neighbour and a good European, there will be neither humiliation nor revenge."

The "destruction of the free Finnish democracy as an intolerable disaster to civilisation" is another British Labour view which will be endorsed by millions all over the Empire who do not otherwise share their opinions. It may not as yet be possible to follow the instigations of this peace scheme into the realms of world brotherhood and all the rest of it, but one may go a long way forward in agreement with what they have said.

It is noticeable that no such definite lead on the vital questions affecting international affairs has been given in this country. Our representative at Geneva has done well, but his colleagues at home have not done so well. It has been rather a disappointment, for instance, that Mr Fraser, who has been on the spot and who has seen things as they actually are under modern war conditions both from the soldiers' and the civilians' points of view, has not had more to say in the way of definite guidance to the people of the Dominion.

From what he has said already, it is suspected that he is willing to say more; yet a few perfunctory speeches followed by a long silence are all that have been received. Concerning the head of the Government nothing much can be said at the moment. His absence from various important events indicates that he is not yet fully recovered from his serious illness. But the country still waits for a strong lead, and time is passing—time that is laden with the direct of possibilities



We should regard the extinction of the free Finnish democracy as an the free Finnish democracy as an intolerable disaster to civilisation."

Turning to the more general issues which should be included in the peace settlement, the declaration states that the establishment of a co-operative world commonwealth in which national sovereignty would be subordinate to world obligations is still Labour's aim, and declares that such an associaand declares that such an associa-tion must be created and given such economic military power as to en-able it to enforce peaceful behav-lour between members.

Colonial Question

Regarding colonial questions, the eclaration pledges Labour against uperialist exploitation, whether apitalist or otherwise, and deands a speedy move forward to plonial self-government. Where populations are not ready for self government, it says, the native in terest must be paramount, being safeguarded through an enlarged nandate system.

Wind Fans Flames From House To Outbuildings

Damage estimated to exceed £2000 was done when the large two-storeyed Mangaruhe Station homestead was totally destroyed yesterday afternoon in one of the most spectacular

fires seen in the Wairoa district. Fanned by a strong westerly wind, high flames shooting from the wooden building attracted the attention of two

employees on the station at 3.30 p.m.

The fire had secured a complete hold and, with only inadequate water supply available, the attempts of hands on the farm to suppress the blaze were fruitless. In less than half an hour all the ten rooms in the house were invaded by the flames and the heat became intense. By 4.30 p.m. the entire supporting structure had collapsed.

The origin of the outbreak was in the kitchen on the first floor, but its cause is unknown.




