## "BRITAIN TAKES WAR TO **NEUTRAL SOIL"**

## America Derisive Of Berlin's Viewpoint

United Press Association-Convright. (Received February 20, 10.55 p.m.) LONDON, Feb. 20.

The official German view of the Altmarck incident is that now England has transferred the war to neutral soil a completely new military situation has arisen of which Germany will take the fullest advantage.

In a broadcast to the United States that was full of inconsistencies, Captain Dau, of the Altmarck, said he ordered the crew not to resist because his ship was unarmed. "I was determined to respect Norwegian neutrality at all costs," he claimed. "Not one German shot was fired."

He added that the British left hurriedly and seemed very nervous. Some prisoners took the opportunity to express thanks for the treatment they had received.

A Copenhagen message says that despite the paper shortage several extra pages are allotted in German newspapers for the Altmarck story. The Press continues its violent language against Britain.

Conferences continue at the Chancellery with heads of the armed forces. The Altmarck's first officer alleges that the prisoners and members of the boarding party stabbed and tore pictures of Hitler in the messrooms. The captain denies the reports of ill-treatment. He declares that many of the prisoners thanked him before leaving.

The American Press continues to Similar Dutch Case

The American Press continues to deride Berlin in "the miscast role of the pious plaintiff against a breach of international law." Even the Hearst Press applauds the raid as "brilliantly conceived and daringly executed."

Achilles, said he wished he could cut up the C.B. he was awarded into pieces and give one to every member of the ship's company, is told in some of the letters received by Auckland relatives. To a man, the ratings of the cruiser express unbounded admiration for the skill and courage of their captain, and say that to his superb control was due the escape of the ship with such little

"We all assembled and congratulated him upon the honour conferred on him by the King," says one of the letters. "He said he wished he could cut it up into pieces and give all of us a bit. In his speech he said he could not have done anything if it had not been for us."

"The captain was hit in the leg," says another letter, "but he refused to leave the bridge, and it is to him and the way he handled the ship that we owe our lives. He seemed to know just where the shells would land, and always got out of the way a second before they burst in our wake."

"After we had buried our dead at sea the next day," says the same letter, "the captain gave us a lecture. It was very hard for him not to break down as he told us how proud he was of his ship and the men and the way they had behaved and fought under fire. He said he never expected the results he got, and, after the show we had put up, he was not frightened, to take us up against anything.

"He is a marvei with his ship, and there is nothing the men would not do for him. It won't be our fault if he ever leaves this ship."

HONEY FROSTING

Boil 1 cupful of honey and 2 tablespoonfuls of lemon juice until it will form a soft ball when dropped into cold water. In the meantime beat 2 egg whites till very stiff, then pour the honey mixture down the side of the basin and beat until thick enough to spread intil thick enough to spread.

HONEY SAUCE

Ingredients: 2 tablespoonfuls buter, 1 tablespoonful cornflour, ½ cup oney, ½ cup hot water.

Method: Melt the butter and blend n the cornflour, add honey and hot water and stir over the fire until it thickens and cook for a few min utes. This is a very good sauce to serve with hot steamed puddings.

HONEY AND ALMOND CAKE

The night before baking mix albeing sugar with 11b honey. Next norning add 2 well beaten eggs, 1 teaspoonful baking soda dissolved in 2 tablespoonfuls of hot water, 3 drops vinegar, 1 teaspoonful finely ground cloves, and 1 teaspoonful ginger. Then beat the mixture for ginger. Then beat the mixture for exactly ½ hour and stand in a warm place for another half hour. Add 4 cups of flour; mix well, and pour into flat tins. Smooth evenly and ornament the tops with blanched almonds. Bake in a moderate oven till a golden brown, and when nearly cool, cut into squares. Store in earthenware jars, as the cake improves with keeping. proves with keeping.

HONEY SPONGE

Ingredients: 1 tablespoonful but-Ingredients: I tablespoonful butter, ½ cup castor sugar, 2 eggs, 1 tablespoonful honey, 1 cupful flour, ½-teaspoonful ground ginger, ½ teaspoon cream of tartar, good ½ teaspoonful bi-carbonate of soda, ½ teaspo

### Preparations For Many Activities

FLUSHING OF EWES

The autumn is a busy time for the sheepfarmer, writes Mr J. W. Palmer, Instructor in Agriculture, in an article on "Primary Production." After the weaning of the lambs and the dipping of the whole flock, preparations have to be made for flushing the ewes, fattening the remainder of the lambs, culling the ewes and disposing of surplus stock, turning out the rams, avoidance of and treatment for blowfly "strike," and crutching.

North Island farmers depend almost entirely on pasture for the flushing of their ewe flock. This explains to some extent the seasonal variation in lambing percentages, the autumn seasons more favourable for green growth giving a higher lambing percentage in the following spring. Where green feed crops or pastures newly sown in the spring are available, these may be utilised for flushing the ewes. Frequently small areas of red clover, lucerne, or temporary pasture, or even specially treated grassland paddocks may be

Sowing of Permanent Pastures

In the North Island grass is normally sown down after rape, or after green feed cereals or after oats grown for chaff, or after a summer fallow following a root crop. mer fallow following a root crop. Occasionally pastures are sown from grass to grass after a fallow period. The summer fallow after a root crop allows ample opportunity for the preparation of the soil and the sowing of the seed at the right time. Under most North Island conditions March sowing gives the best results. The warmth and moisture of the soil being such as to make for the rapid and strong establishment of seedlings. It may be wiser not to wait for a second growth of rape but to prepare the soil for pasture immediately the first crop has been fed off. After rape, discing rather than ploughing gives better results for preparing the soil for grass seed.



### THE MAORI BATTALION

There are naturally many of the ways of the pakeha to which the Maori finds it hard to accustom himself. When a highly organised and intricate system of law and polity is introduced to a more primitive society, difficulties are bound to arise-although even here it is remarkable with what mental astuteness and awareness the Maori has assimilated the new doctrines and how the pupil has frequently outstripped the master in his knowledge of affairs.

But there is one department of life in which the Maori has little to learn from anyone. He knows how to organise for fighting. The old tales of the Maori Wars are full of instances wherein the best that the British forces could do was not good enough to checkmate the native forces. When Major-General J. E. Duigan, Chief of the General Staff of the New Zealand troops, visited Palmerston North the other day to view the Maori battalion now in training there, he expressed his amazement at the marvellous progress which had been made in a few weeks.

Old and cherished traditions are behind the Maori as he stands in the ranks of a modern army. In his imagination he sees the ancient battalions of the famous heroes of his race supporting him on every side. He has a tradition to uphold, just as we have. He brings to the battle not only splendid physical but strong spiritual powers. The "mana" of the Maoris is something that must be and will be jealously and zealously preserved.

The very fact that such a thing as a Maori contingent exists in New Zealand is a convincing answer to our enemies who declare that Britain has exploited her subject peoples in such a manner as to make them bitter enemies. Our Maori brethren, remembering the services rendered in the cause of the Empire during the last war by their brothers and fathers, will once more exhibit to the world that British rule is something for which all our people will fight to the last ditch. Granting that the Maoris were conquered by force of arms, we may still ask one simple sample question: Would the Czechoslovakians or the Poles fight for Germany? The Maoris are willing to fight for us.

The routine drudgery and the rigid discipline necessary in any fighting unit may scarcely fit in with the traditional Maori spirit of individualism and independence, but judging from General Duigan's remarks it is evident that the men now in camp are responding splendidly and realise that in war the team-spirit is all-important. The Maori soldiers are now part of a greater whole, and although they will introduce their own typical modes of action at times, it is evident that they are shaping well to become an efficient fighting unit.

Let it be remembered also that the Maori has even more reason than the pakeha to fight for New Zealand. This is his own, his native land, where lie the bones of his ancestors, where all his saga of song and story is enshrined and which he loves as any true patriot loves his own country. It is out of no mere youthful spirit of adventure overseas that the Maori now goes out to do battle. It is for "the ashes of his fathers and the altars of his gods." It is for Aotearoa.

Everyone knows that with all his fighting instinct and admiration of physical prowess, the Maori has a big heart full of sentiment and a real appreciation of the deeper significances of the cause for which he is fighting. Already the Maori boys have their own marching song, and it is typical of their traditional will to endure. No one knows in what strange, far corners of the world that song will echo, but there are few who will not believe that it will carry the marching feet of the Maori men forward to victory.

All these men are volunteers. There has been no domineering over them. They are now by our side as brothers in

A close link with the days of the depression, the small unemploy ment office in Warren Street, Hastings, has been sold by the Borough

In this relic of the "bad days" is embodied the very spirit of the de- said, pression years. Weeds reach to the windows about its unkept exterior; since many men who now enjoy all life's luxuries were glad to receive their few shillings weekly through one of its small windows.


