ACHILLES BERTHS TO-DAY

Tenthusiastic Welcome Awaits Naval Heroes

AUCKLAND IS AGOG

By Telegraph—Press Association AUCKLAND, Feb. 22.

Under the command of Captain Parry, H.M.S. Achilles returns to Auckland to-morrow morning from a memorable cruiser action against the

She will round North Head at 6.30 a.m. and berth at the Central Wharf at seven o'clock.

Auckland has spared no pains to give her a fitting welcome and to interpret the national feel-

ings of thanksgiving and pride.

The Governor-General (Lord Galway) is making a special visit to Auckland to take part in the welcome, as are the Deputy-Prime Minister (the Hon. P. Fraser) and four other Cabinet Ministers.

It is expected that such crowds as Auckland has seldom seen before will pack the Quay, Queen Street, and all available vantage points in and about the city.

The military parade alone will number about 6000 officers and men of the New Zealand Division of the Royal Navy, the Second New Zealand Expeditionary Force, and the Royal New Zealand Air Force, and territorials and secondary school cadets will line the route of march from the wharf to the Town Hall for the victory parade.

In addition, parades of such other organisations as the ex-Royal Navymen's Association and the Returned Soldiers' Association are being held

in honour of the ship's homecoming.

The closing of all primary and secondary schools, the suspension of business from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m., the natural eagerness of the public to see the ship's company of the cruiser, and the usual shopping invasion from the country will swell the crowds to huge proportions.

A day or two ago the next-of-kin of several of the men who were wounded in action learned from the Navy Office that these sailors were being brought to Auckland.

Two ambulances will be waiting at the wharf to take those who need it to hospital.

The men from the ships of the Mercantile Marine now in port will join with the members of the Navy, Army, and Air Force in the great parade.

Arrangements were completed to-day for their participation, it being felt that the parade would not be complete without representatives of the service which has given the Navy and the Empire





Following in the footsteps of other towns in Hawke's Bay, Wairoa has promised to give liberal support to the National Patriotic Fund Board's appeal for £100,000 for the comfort of recruits at home and abroad. After extending a welcome to the wo visiting officers, the Mayor pointed out that the funds raised ander the scheme would not be pandled by the Government or the Defence Department, but would go towards providing provisions and necessary comforts which the volunteers would not enjoy if the public failed to give support.

Help for Soldiers

Speaking as a returned soldier, the chairman of the Wairoa County Council (Mr A. T. Carroll) said he realised that no stone should be left unturned to care for the men who had offered to fight for liberty and the freedom of the world. He trusted that the appeal would bear fruit. As the appeal was intermingled with the Centennial celebrations, he believed good assistance would be forthcoming.

The Y.M.C.A. and the Salvation Army had been appointed collecting agents for the National Patriotic Fund Board because those two organisations possessed the facili-Help for Soldiers

otic Fund Board because those two organisations possessed the facilities to undertake the work, explained Major Brown. "We are desirous that this first appeal should be kept clearly confined to its own objectives. Overlapping of any sort was not wanted. If a proportion of the Centennial funds were allocated to the new scheme, as suggested by Mr Carroll at the meeting, it would probably defeat the higher objects of the board, which was anxious to encourage a co-operative effort.

LABOUR AND THE WAR

It is understood that the statement by the Labour Conference published yesterday is subject to endorsement by the annual Conference at Easter; but as it stands it is an interesting document.

To get to the heart of the matter right away, it must be said that there are two parts of the statement which are hard to reconcile. One part says: "The Conference endorsed the statement that to fail now to render the fullest support in the fight against Nazi aggression would brand the Labour movement as politically irresponsible, or worse." It adds: "In this struggle there can be no neutrality. We therefore reaffirm our determination to do everything possible to overthrow the Nazi regime, and to that end we pledge ourselves to assist the Government to the utmost."

The other part says: "We further desire to say that in our opinion there is no good reason for either conscription or anti-conscription movements in New Zealand. There is no conscription in New Zealand, and there will be no conscription while Labour is in power." It is hinted at the same time that much of the agitation is "actuated by a desire to make things awkward for the Labour Government" and it is said that "the best possible guarantee against conscription is to participate in the work of the Labour and trade union movements to help to keep Labour in power and to support the Government's voluntary recruiting campaign."

These two self-contradictory points of view seethe with burning questions of vital moment to the Dominion. What does "to the utmost" mean? To the utmost short of conscription? To the utmost short of any possible damage to the Labour Government? There is compulsory unionism in the country. Why not compulsory war service? Is it better statesmanship to force men into the ranks of the unions for political purposes than to call them up for a national service which, if voluntaryism does not succeed, will be vitally necessary to keep even the trades unions in being?

The tantalising aspect of the statements referred to is that there is no recognition whatever of the fact that the voluntary system is not succeeding as it might, or that if it fails we shall be short of men. Not a word about that. This "one shut eye" policy is not good enough. Who cares what happens to ephemeral Governments if the war is won? Why should the desperate needs of the nation be made a political issue? To ask the people to subscribe to the doctrine of "no conscription" to keep the Labour Party in power is to toy with a grave issue and to be left wide open to the charge of "political irresponsibility, or worse." It is, in other words, to ask much

To say categorically, as has been said, that there will be no conscription while Labour is in power is to jeopardise the chances of the voluntary system still more. We mean this: Now that the young men of the country know that they will never be called up under the Labour regime, they will react in various ways. Some will be content to rest on their oars as good supporters of the Labour Government, and others, who are willing to go into the army, will think again, on the assumption that it is not fair to them that they should have the responsibility of such a sacrifice put upon their own shoulders while others, equally fit, shirk the responsibility. Thus the potential volunteer might say of himself and the potential conscript: "We are both here and both fit to fight. But while he is allowed to stay I cannot see why I should go." That may not be a defensible argument, but it is a naturally human point of view.

Finally, one more question. If New Zealand Labour is so staunch in its support of British Labour, why not go the whole way and include conscription? Mere politics should not be allowed to ruin our chances of winning the war,

ROTORUA, Feb. 22. "A great duty and responsibility lies on the Press of the Dominion to-day, and that is that it should get behind the Government and assist it in every way in seeing that New Zealand puts forth all the war effort of which it is capable," said the chairman (Sir Henry Horton) at the annual meeting of the New Zealand section of the Empire Press union held

"I had the privilege of being in London when war broke out and of seeing how quickly Great Britain sprang to the task of putting forward the maximum effort. 'We must do all the work we are capable of and make great sacrifices in doing it.' This was what I heard everywhere in England.

"Returning to New Zealand, I was greatly disappointed to find that quite a large section of the community did not seem to realise fully that the Empire is at war and fighting for its very existence.

"It is the bounden duty of the Press to do all it can to alter this state of affairs. The war has struck the newspapers of the Dominion heavily, and some have already ceased publication. Dearer newsprint and supplies of all kinds, higher costs and distribution charges, combined with greatly reduced advertising revenue, are difficulties that owners have to contend with, but these are faced cheerfully in an effort to give service to the public and assistance to the authorities so that when the conclusion comes we may all be proud of our country's part.

Sir Henry Horton was re-elected as chairman of the New Zealand section of the Empire Press Union, Mr J. M. Hardcastle was appointed secretary in succession to Mr R. D. Horton, who found it necessary to resign owing to enlistment for military duty.

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
