steamer Buenos Aires, en route to America laden with pulp, and took her to Bremerhaven. The Swedish steamer Santos (3840 tons) was sunk in the North Sea. Twelve were saved and 30 are

missing.

The Admiralty publishes the names of one officer and nine ratings who are believed to have been drowned in the loss of his Majesty's trawler Benvolio, which was sunk by a mine. The list also contains the names of ratings slightly injured.

It is reported from Berlin that a U-boat commander Herbert Schultze who has returned from a distant voyage, reported sinking 34,130 tons. Altogether it is claimed that his vessel has sunk 16 ships totalling 114,510 tons.

Two Victims A message from Hendaye states that the U-boat which torpedoed the Spanish vessel Zanderas (2740 tons)

last Wednesday is also believed to have torpedoed a Greek vessel in the same waters.

The British steamer Loch Maddy (4996 tons) was torpedoed in the North Atlantic on Monday. Thirty five survivors were picked up by a warship which is believed to have sunk a U-boat.

Flight Over The North Sea With Broken Rudder

Clever Pilot

Crew Keeps Parachutes And Life Jackets Close At Hand

British Official Wireless. (Received February 27, 8.30 p.m.) RUGBY, Feb. 27.

A remarkable flight has been made by a pilot of the Coastal Command who for three hours brought an aircraft with a broken rudder back over the North Sea and made a safe landing at the base.

The aircraft was on reconnaisance patrol towards the coast of Norway when the tail was damaged in a fight with a Dornier. Bullets wrecked the hinges of one of the double rudders, making the British aircraft practically uncontrollable. The pilot pulled out of a dive only few feet above the water.

Limping away, he made a good target, but the Dornier had taken its own share of punishment and flew off badly damaged.

Crooked Flight

After the fight the British pilot was unable to keep the machine flying straight; it vibrated violently from end to end and developed a corkscrew motion. He pulled open the emergency hatch above his head and the navigator and wireless operator opened the cabin door. All three had their parachutes and lifejackets ready. Steering by varying the revolutions of the two engines and manipulating the ailerons and the remaining half of the rudder, the pilot coaxed the aircraft back towards its base on the east coast. Very soon it grew dark and the pilot decided that the chances of making a safe landing were so small as to be negligible, and he prepared the crew to "bail out" by parachute as soon as they were over land.

FEAR OF EPIDEMIC IN TARANAKI FLOOD AREA

Slips Dam Valleys, Where Dead Stock Constitute Danger

WELLINGTON, Feb. 27.

"There is very definite fear among many of the settlers in flood afflicted areas of Taranaki of an epidemic outbreak," stated Mr L. W. Lovell, of New Plymouth, to-night, on his arrival from Awakino.

Mr Lovell, who had been marooned at Awakino since Saturday night, had to climb over many slips and walk about 30 miles on the journey back to New Plymouth.

He explained that in many of the valleys huge slips had come down and blocked up the water into miniature lakes, in which there were dead stock, dead eels and a tremendous amount of vegetation and debris. The stench was already bad and he considered that there was foundation for the fears of the settlers.

THREE ESSENTIALS

When Sir Harry Batterbee visited the Hastings High School on Monday last, he left behind him on the minds of the scholars an impression that will not easily be effaced. One somehow could not help recalling the famous address given by Sir James Barrie to the students of St. Andrews University inasmuch as the subject chosen was much the same. It dealt with three great essentials in life-honesty, courage and enterprise.

"You will not have any power over anyone unless you are implicitly trusted." He renders splendid service to the growing manhood and womanhood of the country who expounds such a doctrine as that. Individually, nationally and internationally there can be no substitute for honesty of purpose if reasonable dealings are to be carried through. The pledged word must be regarded as inviolable if decent, civilised progress is to be made. "An honest man is the noblest work of God."

The growing generation must cultivate honesty if they are to pull the world out of the morass of cross-purposes, chicaneries and double-dealings in which it finds itself. It is recognised that honest purposes may themselves come into conflict one with another, but such conflicts are always amenable to solution simply because they are based upon honest convictions. The point is that the complex system of modern society gives opportunity for all kinds of dishonest practices by which the "smart" people can gull their less intelligent fellows and make illicit gains at the expense of the losses of others. This is true in business, in politics and in international affairs.

Courage is related to honesty in that it needs courage to be honest, just as it needs honesty to be courageous. They are two facets of the same shining virtue of sincerity. Those who are growing up around us will require all the courage they have to back up their honest endeavours to make the world a better place in which to live. Physically, mentally, morally and spiritually they will have to call upon all their resources to "keep on" in the straight paths of honest dealing.

It was natural that Sir Harry Batterbee should pass forward to the school's motto "Akina," which he so succinctly translated as "Go to it." This is the kind of talk which youngsters understand, and it is to be hoped that the few words spoken to them will be held consistently in the forefront of their minds. They should remember that honesty and courage must be linked with enterprise if they are to bear fruit in the life that now lies ahead of the young. "Akina" suggests the will to press forward every advantage which opens up for the entrance of truth and justice; the determination to advance all good causes; the will to endure; the spirit that will never sound the retreat. It is a glorious slogan for the young, and it should be emblazoned on the banners of all who are on the side of honest and courageous effort.

No one can reasonably doubt that the turmoils and troubles of the tortured world have been for the most part due to examples of broken faith, moral cowardice and inertia. Nor can anyone doubt that what the world needs most at the moment is the emergence of a clear, strong, spiritual purpose which will march breast-forward through all difficulties until the vicious forces that make for loss of freedom and for anarchy are trampled underfoot as evil things which must be destroyed.

This country, like many other countries, needs a good deal more of such virile talk. We must begin with the present generation if we are to hope for future advancement along right lines. The previous generation has failed to keep this world at peace. Honesty can do it. Courage can do it. Enterprise can do it. But all three together will be an irresistible combination of power before which the citadels of lying, cheating and false dealing will crumble to the dust.


