LONDON, April 12. A Stockholm message states that a state of alarm existed all night in Sweden, including a blackout at the Swedish town of Hamlstad, on the Kattegat. All military forces, police, firemen, and air-raid precaution units have been mobilised and ordered to stand by till dawn. The reason is not known. Similar tension existed at Malmo and Trelleborg.

It is officially announced that Sweden has mined territorial waters along the entire west coast. The Swedish Admiralty has issued a statement saying that Sweden's western waters have been mined for 75 miles. Planes and troops are patrolling the whole frontier.

Partial evacuation has been begun from Gothenburg, outside which anti-aircraft guns shot down an unidentified 'plane yesterday.



NAZIS NOW GUN-SHY OF SCAPA FLOW

Tremendous Concentration Of Anti-Aircraft Fire

RUGBY, April 11. In the course of his speech to the House of Commons, the First Lord of the Admiralty (the Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill) referring to the strength of the Allied navies, said: "We have enough to maintain control of the Mediterranean at the same time as we carry on all our operations in the North Sea."

Stating that the Home Fleet had been resting or operating from Scapa Flow since about six weeks ago, the First Lord spoke of air raids and anti-aircraft defences. He revealed that there had been five raids, in the first of which a cruiser was hit, necessitating her being laid up for several weeks for repair, and he continued that there was an air raid this morning and up to the time of speaking there had been no vessel hit or damaged in Scapa Flow and no object of the slightest military importance had been hit on shore. The enemy had shown himself increasingly gun-shy in his attacks on Scapa and this was hardly to be wondered at, since the batteries, especially when reinforced by the powerful batteries of the Fleet, could deliver what was probably the heaviest concentration of anti-aircraft fire in the world.







NEWS OF BATTLE

When great historic events are being woven on the swift-moving shuttles of destiny, it is but natural that we should be agog for every scrap of news. Behind the spume, the spindrift and the smoke-screens that obscure the North Sea from our vision, history is being hammered out by the pounding guns and one of the greatest of the saga of the seas remains to be recounted. The news is there, in the wild waste of waters, and there also are the mingled hopes and fears of millions whose sons and brothers are somewhere amid the welter of the strife.

But there are many reasons why we cannot know as much as we would like to know. There are the factual, physical difficulties of communication from the thick of a battle to the news services. Nothing calls for more absorption and single-minded concentration than a battle at sea; nor is it in the tradition of the British Navy to make much of a song about what it is doing while it is doing it. Our modern Drakes and Raleighs have not the same aura of romance surrounding them as individuals. They are members of a team, and in all things they are laconic to a degree. When their reports do get through, there is nothing in the way of flourish about them. They almost prefer to nod their heads than to say "yes" when asked if they have won a great

Mr Churchill in his speech (published elsewhere to-day) points out another difficulty about satisfying the understandably keen desire of the public for news. The old saying that walls have ears has expanded to cover the whole earth.

There is also the further consideration that when a naval engagement of the vast proportions as that now raging is being fought—covering a line of 1000 miles—it is altogether absurd to expect anything in the nature of a running commentary as though it were a football match. We must possess our souls in patience and wait.

It can be said truthfully of Mr Churchill that it is not in his nature to conceal. His virile brain appraises the psychology of the British people at its real value and he knows that all they desire is the truth, and the whole of it. His admirably clear statement of events so far gives the assurance that British sea power has not been over-vaunted and that the breed is still true to the best in its glorious naval history. The British Navy has always revelled in rough going and has preferred a fight in the teeth of a nor'-easter mingled with driving sleet to the naval exercises on a sunny sea of calm. By all accounts the men of the Fleet are now in their own true element and are giving the account of themselves that was to be expected.

In the meantime the oft-repeated warning must once again be issued in regard to the dissemination of news. When big events are astir, excitement rises and the too receptive ears of many "hear" things on the wireless that were never spoken, others guess what was never imagined, and still others, out of a perverted desire for notoriety, invent stories that will give them a gaping audience. And there is more. Others yet again-and let it not be forgotten, because it is true—will deliberately manufacture rumours with the definite purpose of doing hurt to the British cause. Our enemies are not all on the other side of the world.

Therefore it is the duty of everyone loyal to his country and to the Empire to sift and examine all the reports that are presented and to realise that sometimes the best service that can be rendered is to suppress mere suspicions and conjectures by being silent or by enjoining silence upon others. When the time comes, the full story of the present struggle will be told. Few who have read the news can have any doubt that things are going well for the British Navy, which is our life-line along the seven seas.

SERIOUS HEAD-ON NAZI NAVY BADLY MUTILATED IN KATTEGAT BATTLE

Devastating Loss Inflicted Through Strategical Error

MR CHURCHILL'S SPEECH

LONDON, April 11.

Hitler had cast the interests of the German navy upon the wild waters and most grievous losses were already sustained, said the First Lord of the Admiralty (the Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill) in the House of Commons to-day, when speaking of recent naval operations. Four cruisers—nearly half Germany's pre-war strength and much more than her now existing strength—had been sunk and a number of destroyers and several more U-boats were destroyed—all

since Sunday. The German navy was thus deeply mutilated.
"The very recklessness with which Hitler and his advisers have cast the fate of the German Navy upon the wild water may be only the prelude of far larger events which depend on the land," the First Lord added. "We have probably arrived at the first crunch of the war," he said, adding that all German ships in the Skagerrak and the Kattegat would be sunk.

The occupation of the Danish Faroe Islands, mid-way between Iceland and the Shetlands, by British naval forces was announced by Mr Churchill, who said that they would be held until they could be returned to Denmark free from Nazi domination. The islands are of great strategic value.

Mr Churchill said that the invasion of Norway and Denmark had been planned for several weeks. For months past British circles had received information that large numbers of German merchant ships were being fitted as transports and numerous small vessels were being assembled in various Baltic ports and also in the river mouths of the Elbe. 


