BRITISH TROOPS AND NORWEGIAN IN CLOSE TOUCH

More Forces Landed Near Narvik

KING HAAKON SHELTERS FROM BOMBERS

Narrow Escape In Raid

United Press Association—Copyright. (Received April 12, 10.15 p.m.)

STOCKHOLM, April 12.

According to authoritative Norwegian sources, British forces to-day landed southward of Narvik and are endeavouring to join up with the Norwegians.

The same sources state that the British and Norwegians are in close contact near Bergen.

Estimates of the total number of Nazis in Norway now range from 20,000 to 40,000.

Two hundred troop-transport aeroplanes, capable of taking 20 men each, are reported to be flying regularly from Denmark.

Six German planes heavily bombed and machine-gunned the village of Nybergund, several civilians being injured. Members of the Royal Family and the Government had already left.

King Haakon has been forced to take up new quarters by the Nazi bombing of Nybersund. The King, Crown Prince Olav, the premier and the King's aide de camp were dining when the air raid alarm was given. The first bomber appeared three minutes later and hit and set fire to a school. The Royal party drove into a wood, whither the villagers also fled through deep snow.

Planes bombed and machine-gunned the village and wood three more times. King Haakon and Prince Olav comforted the villagers, after which the party left for a village, the name of which is undisclosed, where they spent the night sleeping on the floor of a cottage.

The "New York Times" correspondent in Narvik says that the German strategy appears to be to control railways and roads to the interior by using small forces co-operating with destroyers, paralysing the Norwegians and reducing them to guerilla warfare.

Narvik's capture, adds the correspondent, was incredibly quick, the action lasting half an hour. In another half-hour the Germans had established headquarters in the town and began climbing the hills to establish fortifications.

The correspondent adds: "When we arrived on the scene, we saw the Germans facing hastily-assembled Norwegian guards in the market-place. The Germans had machine-guns. We stood on one side by a concrete wall."

Surrender Demanded

"An officer waved away a curious oncoming crowd and demanded that the Norwegians should surrender. They were not ready for action, because they were armed only with rifles, and retreated before the Germans, who occupied the post office and railway. The civilians were stupefied as the Germans advanced along the main street."

M. Hambro, Speaker of the Norwegian Parliament, confirms that the Norwegians have stopped the German advance eastward of Narvik by a surprise counter-attack.

The local Norwegian commander of Narvik (Colonel Sundlo) has been arrested because he made unauthorised contact with the invaders. Colonel Sundlo is a friend of Major Quisling, the Prime Minister of the Puppet Nazi Government.

The commander of the Norwegian forces in the north has been instructed to make contact with the British commander at the earliest moment.

Retreat Cut Off

The Germans at Elverum have been thrown back at all points and isolated by the blowing-up of bridges behind them.

Five thousand Germans have landed at Bergen, but the Norwegians halted the invaders' march to the interior.

The Norwegian Government has moved from Elverum to Nybergund, which is 15 miles from the Swedish border.

The Norwegian Government has ordered the Chief of Police at Oslo to arrest the members of the puppet Government.

Entrance To River Blocked

The freighter Wannon (567 tons) struck a reef in Ulverstone Harbour last night and is now stranded on a sand bar, completely blocking the entrance to the river Leven.

The vessel, which is three-parts submerged, was formerly owned in New Zealand.

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AIR BASES IN NORWAY

WHY NAZIS MADE ATTACK

SHORTER JOURNEY Scapa Flow And Scotland Brought Nearer

RUGBY, April 12.

Discussing recent events in Norway and Denmark, the Rt. Hon. L. S. Amery, in a broadcast, said that this unprovoked and treacherous attack by the Nazis on two small neutral powers was dictated by more than a desire to continue using the Norwegian coast for transporting iron ore.

"It was, I imagine," he said, "first and foremost in order to control the whole of the eastern coast of the North Sea for the purpose of air and submarine attacks upon this country and shipping."

He pointed out that possession of the aerodromes at Bergen and Stravanger would bring German bombers some 200 miles nearer Scapa Flow and northern Scotland. At the same time the use of northern Norwegian ports would give German commerce raiders an open window on to the North Atlantic.

He suggested that the attack upon Scandinavia might be only part of an even more ambitious and desperate scheme and might be followed up at any moment by an attempt to smash through Holland and Belgium in order to secure control of their coasts as well.

NO MORE OIL IMPORTS FOR DENMARK

NAZI GAINS ARE TEMPORARY AT BEST

RUGBY, April 12.

Regarding the effect on the enemy oil position of the German occupation of Denmark, the Petroleum Information Bureau states that Denmark imported in 1939 about 700,000 tons of oil. The German invasion brings Denmark within the scope of the Allied blockade, with a consequent stoppage of oil imports. When the existing Danish oil stocks are consumed the German oil position, which is already difficult to become worse, since appreciable quantities of oil will still be required for normal domestic purposes in Denmark.

AEROPLANE FAILS TO RETURN FROM FLIGHT

Pilot Was Undergoing Test From Wigram At Height Of 15,000 Feet

By Telegraph—Press Association CHRISTCHURCH, April 12.

Leaving Christchurch at 2.30 p.m. to-day in a northerly direction for a 15,000ft. height test, a Fairey Gordon biplane from Wigram aerodrome, whose marking number was NZ 629, failed to return at its scheduled time of 4.30 and was still missing at a late hour to-night.

The biplane was piloted by Aircraftsman W. Raphael, a pilot undergoing training at Wigram. He was accompanied by Leading Aircraftsman W. Everist.

A search was instituted for the missing plane when it failed to return, but no trace of it was found. The search will be resumed early this morning.

What is believed to be the missing biplane was seen over Ashburton shortly before 3 p.m. by Mr. John Johnson, of Harland Street, Ashburton, who was working in a field at Winchmore. His attention was attracted to the biplane by the unusual way in which it was flying. It was at a very high altitude and a big cloud of greyish-black smoke was issuing from its side. It appeared to be circling, and turned in the direction of Christchurch, but afterwards reversed its course and headed towards Timaru. After five minutes, however, it turned north once

Police And Firemen Stand By Till Dawn

COASTAL WATERS MINED

LONDON, April 12.

A Stockholm message states that a state of alarm existed all night in Sweden, including a blackout at the Swedish town of Hamlstad, on the Kattegat. All military forces, police, firemen, and air-raid precaution units have been mobilised and ordered to stand by till dawn. The reason is not known.

Similar tension existed at Malmo and Trelleborg.

It is officially announced that Sweden has mined territorial waters along the entire west coast.

The Swedish Admiralty has issued a statement saying that Sweden's western waters have been mined for 75 miles. Planes and troops are patrolling the whole frontier.

Partial evacuation has been begun from Gothenburg, outside which anti-aircraft guns shot down an unidentified plane yesterday.

MR D. LLOYD GEORGE CONGRATULATED

Entered Parliament In 1890

The Rt. Hon. D. Lloyd George celebrated on April 10 his golden jubilee of membership of the House of Commons.

He was congratulated by members of all parties.

Mr Lloyd George, who is 77 years of age, entered the House of Commons in 1890 as Liberal member for Caernarvon. Since 1931 he has been an Independent Liberal.

During the Great war he was successively Chancellor of the Exchequer (1908-15), Minister of Munitions (1915-16), Secretary for War (1916), Prime Minister and First Lord of Treasury (1916-1922).



NAZI PILOTS LACK PRACTICE IN THE AIR

R.A.F. VICTORIES DUE TO SUPERIOR TRAINING

Full Instruction Still Essential

British Official Wireless. (Received April 12, 7.30 p.m.)

RUGBY, April 12.

The continued success of the R.A.F. in their encounters with the enemy are regarded in informed quarters as being in a major degree due to the superiority of the British training over that given to Nazi airmen. Even before the war independent observers in Germany commented on the comparatively small amount of flying apparently going on in relation to the huge air forces being built.

It is not improbable that the shortage of fuel and other reasons have affected the Germans' flying training since the war.

Although many more pilots are now being trained in the R.A.F., the thoroughness of the training has no way been reduced and no pilot has been passed out to the next stage or to the operational squadron without the full flying practice and instruction insisted upon under the R.A.F. scheme.

Dornier Flying Boat Shot Down By Canadian

A Busy Week

Air Force Machines On Attack And Defence

British Official Wireless. (Received April 12, 7.30 p.m.)

RUGBY, April 12.

A Dornier flying boat was brought down in 35 seconds in the North Sea to-day by a Hudson reconnaissance aircraft of the R.A.F. Coastal Command.

The pilot of the Hudson made only one attack. He fired four bursts from his front gun while diving towards the Dornier and one of its engines was immediately put out of commission. The Dornier plunged towards the sea, landed heavily and began to sink.

"A mighty quick piece of work," was how the navigator, a young Canadian, described the incident.

The Hudson then continued its patrol and half an hour afterwards another Coastal Command aircraft saw the Dornier floating upside down and half submerged.

An R.A.F. high-speed launch was sent out to try to find survivors.

Among the latest reports of air activity are two from Norway and a brief account of Wednesday's raid on Scapa Flow and the Moray Firth, which are described as "the largest air attacks of the war."

Allied Navies Able To Patrol North Sea And Mediterranean

NAZIS NOW GUN-SHY OF SCAPA FLOW

Tremendous Concentration Of Anti-Aircraft Fire

British Official Wireless. (Received April 12, 7.30 p.m.)

RUGBY, April 11.

In the course of his speech to the House of Commons, the First Lord of the Admiralty (the Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill) referring to the strength of the Allied navies, said: "We have enough to maintain control of the Mediterranean at the same time as we carry on all our operations in the North Sea."

Stating that the Home Fleet had been resting or operating from Scapa Flow since about six weeks ago, the First Lord spoke of air raids and anti-aircraft defences. He revealed that there had been five raids, in the first of which a cruiser was hit, necessitating her being laid up for several weeks for repair, and he continued that there was an air raid this morning and up to the time of speaking there had been no vessel hit or damaged in Scapa Flow and no object of the slightest military importance had been hit on shore. The enemy had shown himself increasingly gun-shy in his attacks on Scapa and this was hardly to be wondered at, since the batteries, especially when reinforced by the powerful batteries of the Fleet, could deliver what was probably the heaviest concentration of anti-aircraft fire in the world.

"It is a tremendous fire," he added, "and in the latest raid, which took place last evening at dusk, 60 aircraft attacked in successive waves without doing the slightest damage, although they themselves suffered the loss of no fewer than six aircraft. The credit for this is divided between the batteries and the very excellently combined and skilfully used air squadrons."

"We are ready to fight this matter out at Scapa Flow. The practice of the batteries against high-speed aircraft is better than any towed target we can possibly supply."

Speaking after Mr Churchill, Mr A. V. Alexander (Lab.) said he thought the Allies were entitled to say to neutrals that they must make up their minds whether to accept Nazi domination or to march with the Allies. If they marched with the Allies they would be certain of retaining their independence and freedom.

Sir Archibald Sinclair (Liberal) said it was plain that law-abiding people from all over the world were at one in condemning brutal aggression of the Nazis. All did well to rejoice at the treatment that German cruisers had received at the hands of the British Navy and the R.A.F.

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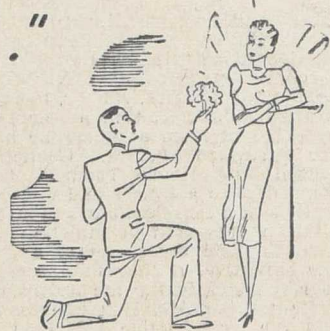

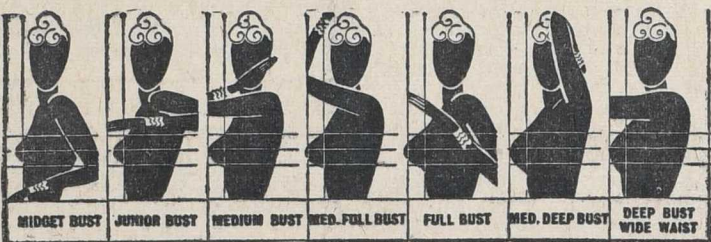

Know These Facts And Take An Intelligent Interest In Your Permanent Wave

BY BEING HONEST AND OBSERVANT ABOUT YOUR HAIR YOU CAN REALLY HELP YOUR HAIRDRESSER

Every woman desires the very best results from her permanent wave, but very few have the knack of managing their hair afterwards. The permanent wave is only the foundation of the finished hair-dress. It is the setting and the way you look after your hair which will transform it into a lovely hair-do which is modern and well groomed.

Naturally, the first essential of an excellent wave is the texture and condition of your hair. If the hair is in bad condition, you cannot expect a good wave, although it is remarkable the results some hairdressers achieve with very poor quality hair.

Therefore, although the quality and condition of your hair-do play a tremendous part in the result of the wave, the skill of the hairdresser is not secondary. In fact, we can say that good hair and good hairdresser are equal favourites in the success of your hair-do.

Test Curls Your hairdresser should give you test curls prior to your wave, as it is only in this manner that you can reliably tell which solution and what steaming to give the hair. Of course, there are many hairdressers who do not give these test curls, relying on their own judgment and skill. That is quite all right, but even the most skillful can sometimes make a mistake, and if that mistake is made on your hair it means that for five or six months. Therefore, no matter how skillful the hairdresser, insist that he or she gives you a test curler prior to your wave. This is your assurance that the wave will be successful.

Two Methods of Waving There are many types of permanent waves. First there are two methods of winding—spiral and croquignole. The spiral kind of winding is that done on long rods similar to pencils. This wind gives excellent waves, but does not give the self-setting end curl which croquignole winding gives. With croquignole winding the curlers are placed parallel to the scalp and the hair is wound from the ends to the roots, the reverse to spiral. A combination wave is spiral curlers on top for wave, and the croquignole around the back and sides for curls.

Then there are the methods of producing heat. There are machines in which you have heaters placed over your head that are connected by wires to the electricity; non-electric machines in which the hair is wet with solution and the heaters are placed directly from a hot machine on to the head; machineless methods in which chemical heating pads are used, and steam machines in which rubber tubes are connected to your head from a boiler on the wall.

All of these methods have their own particular advantages, and your hairdresser will select the method most suitable to your hair.

Your hair must be in good condition, and it is here that you can help your hairdresser. Limp, lank hair means a lifeless wave. Strong hair means a wave full of spring. Therefore, if your hair is not in the condition that it should be, it is up to you to treat it and make it healthy and well. Either carry out some of the treatments we have recommended from time to time, or place yourself in the hairdresser's hands so that he can recondition your hair prior to the wave.

When having the wave do not refuse to have your hair thinned and tapered. You can run the risk of your wave being a "flop" by refusing to have your hair properly tapered.

When your hairdresser asks if you have been applying lotions, etc. to your hair, don't tell a lie. Remember that he or she is not asking out of idle curiosity and is not in the slightest interested personally, it is just so that proper precautions can be taken. If you do not tell the truth, you may be unpleasantly surprised.

Certain chemicals are on the hair, your hair may change colour, or break off, or the wave fall out. Therefore, honestly tell your hairdresser what soaps, rinses, dandruff lotions, dyes, hennas have been used, and he will then use chemicals and lotions which will not harm your hair, and the result will be to your satisfaction.

Remember that a permanent wave cannot have the slightest effect on hair which has not already grown. So, after you have had your wave, do not complain that the permanent waves have darkened your hair, or have made it turn grey, or have made it thinner. The wave that you have now cannot last longer than nine months, by which time it has been cut off, so how can it affect the hair which has grown in the meantime?

Even if the wave made the whole of your hair fall off, it cannot make it fall out, and your new growth would be exactly the same as it always has been. Blondes frequently think that permanent waving has darkened their hair. This is not the case. The hair would have gone darker, wave or no wave, as they grew older, therefore over the period of years that they have been having waves in their hair has gone dark naturally.

125 Feet Of Hurricane

How six artists, working eight hours a day, laboured for a year to complete 125 feet of animated film was revealed recently by Dave Fleischer, director and co-producer of "GULLIVER'S TRAVELS," which it is reported involved the investment of \$400,000, more than a million and a half American dollars.

The 125-foot sequence, which aroused much interest from those seeing the "rushes," shows a tropical hurricane causing a ship to founder. The six artists who drew it, spent the stormy equinoctial season in Miami, Florida, where they were assigned to venture out by the quays while the storm lashed and the lightning flashed, in order to embody their impressions in their drawings. The artists also made a study of the action pictures, taken during the devastating hurricanes which have recently pounded the American coast.

Every bubble of foam, every ripple, splash, shadow and reflection in the troughs and heights of the waves, had to look briny and real, as the artists showed the elements striving to deprive Gulliver of his life, after breaking up his ship.

Those fortunate enough to see the studio "rushes" of their recently completed 125 feet of film, call it one of the most vivid motion picture passages they have seen. The work of the artists is described as exceptional in the way the sombre grey of the undersides of the curling waves changes imperceptibly into black in the deep troughs, ultramarine on the ascending side of the waves, and then flashing into piercing brightness as the lightning flashes down from the clouds.

A moment after the lightning, everything has changed into a blue green, with a crown of whitecaps showing a snowy contrast while the breakers curl and clutch at the shore. As the water finally turns into little pools and receding trickles of glassy green on the shore, the tide shallows over the sands; brown tones replace the blue and green of the water, and everything turns into sand.

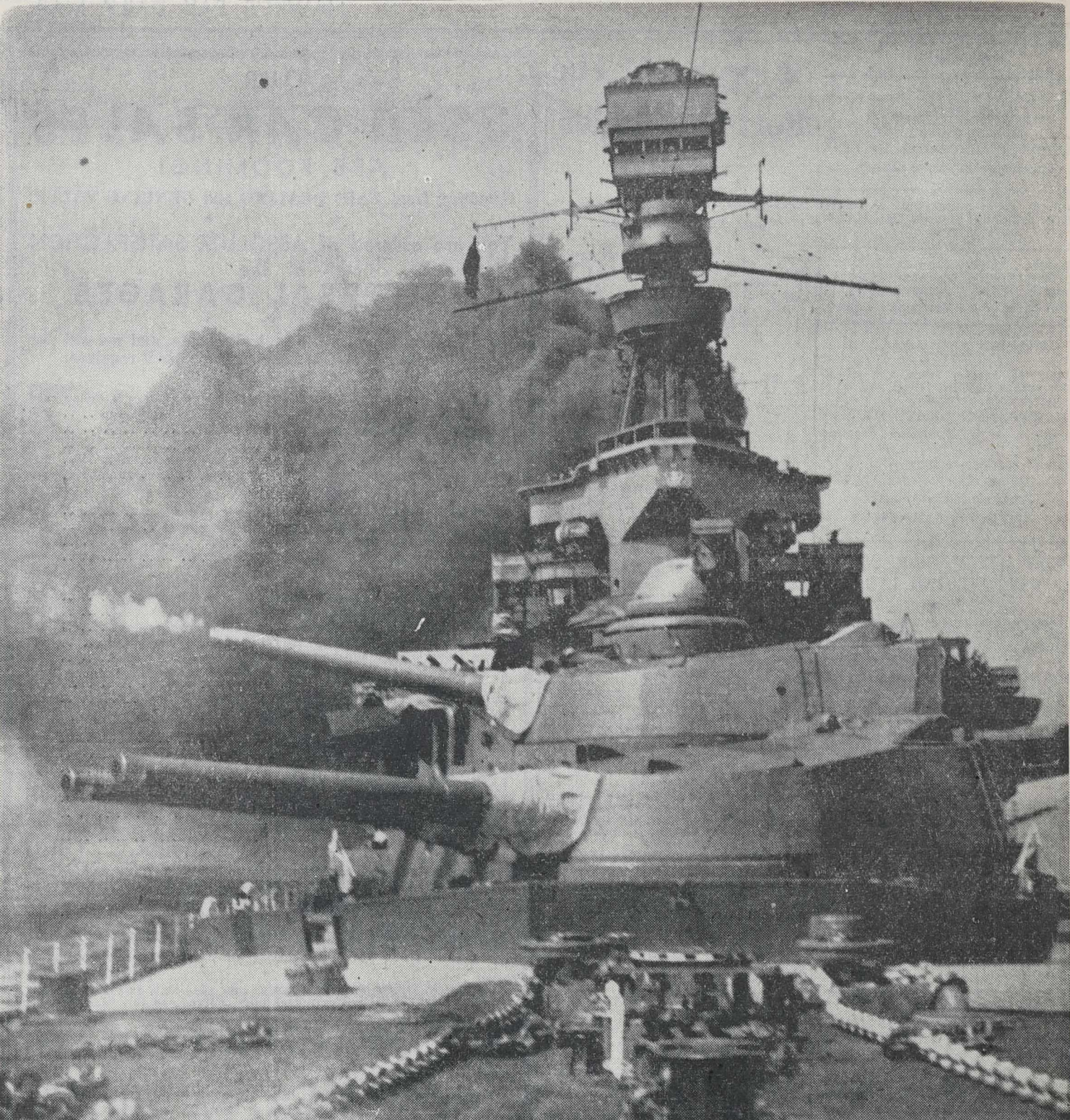

INCREASED FEES RETURNS

GOVERNMENT PAY IS RESPONSIBLE

OUTSTANDING DUES

Waipawa Hospital Board Report

Large increases in the fees returns for the year are commented upon by the chairman (Mr. W. H. Rathbone) in his annual report, to be presented to the annual meeting of the Waipawa Hospital Board on Wednesday next.

"It will be noted that the hospital and maternity hospital fees returns total £10,080/12/5 and £1054/15/5 respectively, as compared with an estimate of £8125 and £525 respectively," the report states.

"These large increases are due to the payment by the Government of hospital fees, and to a considerable amount of outstanding fees at the date of the operation of the hospital portion of the Social Security Act, and since collected. On instructions from the Department of Health, last year's estimates of maintenance receipts were based on previous years' figures, as it was not then known when hospital benefits under the Social Security Act would operate—thus the great difference between estimated and actual receipts.

"While this increased revenue has been the cause of the board's general accounts closing in credit, the benefits accruing to us will not be anything approaching those of some of the other boards, for reason that in the past we have been fortunate in obtaining a very high percentage of fees collections. Further, we have received very little benefit from the reduction of outdoor relief payments through the Social Security Act, as this board was not embarrassed by heavy expenditure under this heading in years gone by.
