# FUNERAL PYRE FOR DEAD

LONDON, April 24. Touring the Oslo war zone, the British United Press special correspondent saw a marked change in the attitude of the Norwegians to the Nazis after the news of the Allied action was received.

The bulk of Skarnes' population of 2500 met the advancing Germans with a barrage of shots from hunting rifles. Hastily prepared barricades were soon reduced to splinters, but not before 200 Germans were killed. The Germans burned

The attack on General Smuts is in Afrikaans and the document is signed in Afrikaans: "The Union of South African Patriots for Truth, Right and Freedom."

Although Sir John Simon budgeted for £2,667,000,000, he said in his Budget speech that any estimate of war expenditure must be a guess.

"The rate of war expenditure is increasing, and it must increase," he said. "Indeed," he added, amid cheers, "it ought to increase."

For war expenditure authority had to be sought at intervals by votes of credit for round sums which on the grounds of public interest did not distinguish between one service and another. He recalled that he had estimated a vote for £700.000,000 on March 13 which might suffice for rather more than four months of the war.

Firm on last week's rates for the most part, the fat cattle market at Stortford Lodge on Wednesday was possibly a fraction dearer for the top pens, medium lines remaining The yarding of 240 head included a fair sprinkling of

bullocks, the best of which made £12 10/- to £12 13/-. Late in the sale a heavy draft of heifers from Mokopeka raised the top rates in this section to from £9 10/- to £10 17/6. Apart from these heavier offerings much of the remainder of the heifer yarding was made up of light to medium sorts, making £6 18/6 to £7 14/-. Light, plain cows made £4 17/to £5 18/-; medium pens sold at £6 5/- to £7 13/-, and the tops brought to £9 12/-.

A somewhat improved market was seen in the store sheep sale, when about 3500 head were offered. A number of good quality lines came forward, and for these there was generally good competition. A line of shorn wether lambs A line of shorn wether lambs made best selling at 16/7; woolled sorts made 17/- to 17/8, medium pens selling at 12/6 to 15/2. Light pens sold at 10/7.

#### ONE, TWO, THREE, FOUR

The staggering and easily memorised figure of the British Budget must give us furiously to think. How these people of ours at Home are standing up to it! It is altogether amazing. One thousand two hundred and thirty-four million pounds will be found during the next financial year out of taxation and revenue, for the purpose of carrying on the war. It is a colossal total which beats all records in British history, and it is a magnificent tribute to the stamina and determination of the British people that they have "taken it on the chin" with a wry grimace as an indication of the fact that while the burden is heavy, their shoulders are still strong enough to bear it.

It is not the purpose of this brief article to go into the details of the British increases in duties and taxation. The details have been published and the people who take an intelligent interest in the news are well aware of them. Rather, it is felt that this opportunity should be taken to point the moral of the contrast between some of the things that go on in the Old Country and some of the things that are going on

The war, in the British view, is a desperately serious business. Our kindred at Home are cheek-by-jowl with possible disaster. They are almost within hearing distance of the heavy guns across the Channel. The war is near to them. They realise what it means. They have black-outs, shelters, warning signals, and all the rest of it. They are in actual touch with the enemy almost every day. For these reasons they see that sacrifice is necessary not only on the part of the fighting men, but on the part of civilians of every rank and grade of society. Only the desperately poor have not been called upon to make their contribution to the latest war budget, and wide as the incidence of its hardships is, no one seems to be grumbling. The whole thing is a magnificent example of British "stick-to-it-iveness," and it involves a moral.

The moral can be found as we look around New Zealand to-day. The echoes of the "Last Post" are still lingering in the memories of those who attended the numerous ceremonies up and down the country. Carefully prepared orations have been made, parades have been held, people have been hushed and impressed and not a little bewildered as wreath has been heaped upon wreath upon the cenotaphs. The inner significance of these ceremonies has been well brought out in most places, but at their conclusion the uneasy feeling has been left that while flowers for the dead may be impressive, practical assistance for the living might be more impressive still.

It is with all humility and sincerity that the suggestion is made that we in New Zealand have not yet realised to the full the magnitude of the effort we are called upon to make, nor have we understood the concentration of purpose that is demanded of us

The sacrifices already made by New Zealand were recalled in vivid fashion yesterday. The time is now when we should turn round to face the practicabilities of the future and ask what are the sacrifices demanded of us now in order that a similar calamity may not come upon our children and our children's children. A large proportion of our men have done splendidly in giving themselves for the service of the Dominion; but we who are left behind by force of circumstance or age have been given an equally splendid lead by the people in the Home country.

It is being increasingly felt that more seriousness is required of us, and more practical help. Anyone who seeks to draw red herrings across the main trail of our national duty should be ostracised. These times in which we are living are too serious for any recognition of the machinations, political or otherwise, of people who are more concerned about themselves than about the welfare of the Empire.

It was stated that importations of one year had been taken as a basis for all future importations, with the result that in many commodities there was a dire shortage, while in others the market was overstocked.

The Government of Great Britain did not want goods exported that could not be paid for. He did not know how New Zealand could obtain from the United Kingdom goods of a greater value than the total sum accruing from the sale of exports or from other credits that automatically accrued.

"We have issued or authorised licences for every pound we can see," said the Minister. "We cannot do more than that."

The efficiency of the Hastings Fire Brigade was questioned by the secretary of the New Zealand Federation of Fire Brigades Employees' Industrial Association of Workers (Mr L. Glover) in a letter to the Hastings Fire Board, in which he criticised the proposal to use voluntary workers. He referred to a proposal of the superintendent of the Hastings Brigade (Mr R. Henderson) to call a meeting of ex-firemen to discuss the possibility of their joining the brigade, replacing men who had enlisted, as a war emergency

Mr Glover in his letter said that he was continuously receiving communications in connection with the method of fighting fires in Hastings. In a report tabled at the annual meeting of the board yesterday, Mr Henderson pointed out that the Hastings Brigade had a better record than four other brigades quoted by Mr Glover as using permanent men. Mr Glover said that the Hastings Brigade to him seemed to rely to a great extent on volunteer labour that was employed in other industries and followed the occupation of fire-fighting as a side-line.


