SALAVGE WORK AT NAMSOS

LONDON, April 29. General Dewiart, commander of the British forces in Norway, in an interview with a British war correspondent, said: "Our position is much better and we are settling down. Reinforcements are arriving in good numbers. German air attacks have greatly diminished since the Allied anti-aircraft guns and fighters have gone into action. The fighters have already brought down two German bombers at Namsos, north of Trondheim.

"We must not be impatient if there is little action in the early stages," added General Dewiart. "Big things are likely to happen soon.'

He admitted that food supplies were a difficult problem owing to the destruction of some of the Namsos stores, but he emphasised that the situation was quickly remediable.

The French General Staff were equally confident and said that more and more troops were arriving at frequent

The troops are cheerful, though often labouring waist deep in snow. The French Alpine troops are, however, accustomed to the conditions.

The town of Namsos has been completely destroyed, but the harbour is functioning. British sailors are directing the salvage of stores from the lumber-strewn waters of the fiord. 'The German attacks were diabolical in fury," said one

British officer. "Bombs fell at the rate of 70 an hour, but the casualties were slight, as civilians had been evacuated and only a few troops remained.

Following the adventures of the three British battle cruisers through the maze of German propaganda is a bewildering task. Consequently, the Deutschlandsender announced on March 17 that three British battleships and one cruiser had been seriously damaged, and the next morning Zeesen informed America that the Hood, Renown and Repulse were the ships con-

Dr Goebbels had paid another tribute to British craftsmanship. Acccrding to his own story, the "enormous hole below the waterline" in the Repulse had been successfully repaired in a month and the ship was back at Scapa Flow, ready to receive the attention of German bombers, which not only damaged her again, but the Hood and Renown as well, thus putting out of action all three battle-cruisers.

> Lessons To Be Drawn From The Invasion Of Finland

The war in Finland pricked the bubble of Russian armed might and wiped away many of the myths that had been wreathed round the theory of its invincibility. It would be unwise, however, to imagine complacently that the reverses inflicted on the Red Army by the Finns would be repeated inevitably on other occasions.

Climate and terror played a large part in the defeat of the Russian units in country to which they were unaccustomed. On the other hand, in the more suitable but restricted Karelian Isthmus greater success was achieved, although at a heavy price.

The conclusion drawn is that the efficiency of the Red Army at war will depend to a great extent upon the type of country in which it operates. There are several latent faults in the Russian psychology which will always become apparent to a greater or lesser degree, and in Finland they were thrown into sharper relief than they might be on other

Generally speaking, these faults are lack of initiative, the herd instinct, the fear of taking responsibility, a slavish adherence to text book methods, faulty co-ordination, and the breakdown of the maintenance system.

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

Hurry up, you lie-a-bed sluggards—it's mushroom time! Already there will be new ones breaking through the ground and in another hour or two they will be in somebody else's basket unless you get up and do something about it. You do like mushrooms, don't you? If you don't, then don't read on any more; but if you do, what a treat in store for you with these recipes. But you've got to up and catch your mush-

And now, here are one or two hints-only don't tell your next-door neighbour, or else there will be a nasty lot of unneighbourliness lying around these verdant pastures of

But my hints—here are two: If you motor to Paki Paki and explore in the paddocks a little away from the roads, you will be rewarded for your efforts. That is really true. Only it would be as wise to ask permission at the nearest house first. And another—by the Black Bridge! So-good luck.

WORLD LIAR NUMBER TWO

Nothing that anyone else may say can dim the lurid lustre of the sinister halo adorning the long, narrow brow of Dr. Goebbels, who crows on his Nazi dunghill as World Liar Number One; but his friend and colleague, Joachim von Ribbentrop, is rapidly sneaking into the same spotlight. His latest fulmination would be ludicrous were it not so dangerous. With the most blatant effrontery he has calmly and ruthlessly twisted and tortured the truth out of all resemblance to itself and because "he did protest too much" he has come an inglorious crasher in the eyes of those nations which matter most in the present emergency—all but one. He has had something like a hearing from Italy (or rather, from Mussolini), but from no other member of his wide

Let it be remembered that Ribbentrop's followers in his own country do not know-they are not allowed to knowthe Allied side of the Norwegian question. Let it also be remembered that there is food for reflection in a small sentence tucked away in the middle of the news which ran to this effect: that von Ribbentrop was seeking to justify German action on the basis of alleged documents (whose existence is denied) of which he could have had no knowledge before the act of aggression was undertaken.

Here is how his hypocritical tirade goes, statement and answer put together:-

Von Ribbentrop: Norway was ready to enter the fight shoulder to shoulder with the Allies and only prompt action by Germany forestalled the scheme by a few hours. The Allies: The Norwegian Government consistently

refused to agree even to the passage of troops to Finland. Von Ribbentrop: The Allies had no reason for the declaration of war on September 3.

The Allies: And what of the guarantee to Poland? Or do you not understand what a promise means? Von Ribbentrop: We took prisoner a British brigade staff

and found the entire plan for the occupation of Norway. The Allies: No brigade staff has been taken prisoner in

Norway. Von Ribbentrop: The minefields along the Norwegian coast were in preparation for a long-planned landing.

The Allies: The minefields, and you know it, were to stop your countrymen from slinking down the coast by illegitimate routes. Would we have advertised the fact that the minefields were being laid (which we did) if it was part of a plan

And so it goes on. On the other side of the argument are the definite statements by the Allies that the German expedition sailed many days before the minefields were laid and that the landing in Norway by German troops was made possible by the activity of German secret agents.

There is also the opinion of America, as expressed by the "New York Times," which says in so many words that the probity of a witness comes into the question of the valuation of evidence and that von Ribbentrop's word is not to be taken. In other words, they do not believe a syllable of the cock-and-bull story. "The world knows," says this paper, "how to choose between the word of England or Norway and that of Germany."

Italy, in the meantime, is still rail-sitting and watching to see which way the cat will jump. It is a struggle between Mussolini and the Vatican, the end of which cannot yet be foreseen, but the process of which is fraught with no incon-

Taking it all in all, it must be evident to the smaller countries, which still have access to both sides of the questions affecting world affairs, that Germany's word is forever discredited and that nothing in the way of peace and happiness for mankind can be based upon a campaign of

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
