pared to co-operate with us we should strive with courage and determination for the fulfilment of the ideal and the heaven-ordained mission of our country—enabling all nations and races to find each its proper place in the world," he declared.

HOLED IN COLLISION

Armadale Lost Some Cargo

TANKER SHOWS SCARS

By Telegraph-Press Association. WELLINGTON, Aug. 1.

It is reported with reference to the collision between the British motor ship Armadale (5066 tons) and the Norwegian tanker Ole Jacob (8306 tons) on Wednesday night south of Pencarrow Head, that the Armadale arrived about seven o'clock and the tanker about an hour later. The tanker is now tied

The ships were travelling under war conditions without lights.

Mr Delany, who has been transferred from the position of traffic representative for the company at Hong Kong, added that advice had yet to be received of the first passenger flight, but that advance bookings indicated that the Clipper would be fully loaded.



There was a surprise in the Homeby Steeples in 1937 when Cock of the North came home at tall odds, but Nocturnus, who played the role of runner-up, duly prevailed in the National, in which the Hunt Club winner lost his rider.

To-morrow's Homeby Steeplechase should be a great test, for Clarion Call and Chat are the only Grand National Steeplechase candidates of any consequence who are missing. Padishah, who won last year-with 11.11, has 16lb. more to carry on this occasion, and that is half a stone above his National weight. However, Padishah is one of the best treated on the score of National assessments, for the handicapper has realised that he is a better stayer than most of those engaged.

Slayer is up 8lb. and Ballybrit 1lb. less, Gold Wren also having 7lb. extra. The biggest increase, however, is that of the South Canterbury Steeplechase winner Flashlight, who misses a penalty for the National, but has 17lb. more to carry to-morrow. Nightbound and Trisox are both up 7lb., while the Aucklander, Dauber, has 8lb.
