Julius Streicher, the Governor of Franconia, recently came into conflict with Reich Marshal Goering and fell into disgrace. He was the Nazi Germany and was particular-"Der Sturmer," was violently anti-Semitic and led the campaign against the Jews from the moment of the Nazis' rise to power in 1934. Documents from the files of the Documents from the files of the Nuremberg police were presented to Streicher on his 50th birthday. They contained details of his conduct in former years, and could have been used against him. While Streicher was encouraged by Hitler, Goering realised that his paper was perhaps the greatest instrument of harm to Germany's prestige abroad. He not only forbade its export, but took steps to prevent single copies being taken out of the country.

Streicher organised a great summer festival at which Hitler Youth were made to dedicate themselves to hatred of Jews. He conducted a campaign to undermine Jewish businesses and financial concerns by sending notices to other firms roting "with amazement" that their noting "with amazement" that their customers included Jews whose names were given, and asking for an explanation. Streicher, who was an enemy of the Church, denounced the Confessional clergy as traitors.

craft returned safely. An Air Ministry bulletin contains details of the attack on the synthetic oil plant at Sterkade. The raiders, it says, were over the works for several hours, and dropped 14 tons of high-explosive bombs, as well as incendiaries, which set alight the oil flowing from the shattered storage

tanks.

Half an hour after the first onslaught, the flames had obtained such a hold on the buildings that observers could note their progress as the bombs continued to fall. The green and blue flashes of the explosions were mingled with the red glow of the fires, from which billowed clouds of smoke.

Towards the end of the raid the fires were spreading rapidly.

The bulletin also tells how three Blehheims patrolling the French coast yesterday were attacked by four Messerschmitts. The British pilots dived steeply in formation until they were just above the clouds. Their gunners were firing all the time, and two Messerschmitts broke away, one heading back for the French coast low over the sea, apparently in flames.

The other Messerschmitts continued to attack, but the Blenheims kept their formation intact and brought the concentrated fire of their rear guns to bear on one of Steep Dives

ORDER OF MERIT

Continental sources of supply having been cut off because of the latest phase of the war, it is obvious that Great Britain stands in greater need than ever of the essential foodstuffs necessary to carry on the struggle. Along this line New Zealand has an important part to play, for we produce those things which are now unobtainable from other sources.

With commendable promptitude the Hawke's Bay executive of the Farmers' Union faced up to the question, and after a series of discussions sought to put the various categories of supplies in order of merit so that first things should be first and the greatest effort expended in supplying whatever would be found to be most essential. Eggs, bacon, cheese, wool, beef, and lamb were shuffled, now this way and now that, but varying opinions refused to allow any one product to stay at the top of the ladder of importance for

The points were eventually presented to Mr A. P. O'Shea, Dominion secretary of the New Zealand Farmers' Union, whose comment, published this morning, goes a long way towards clearing up the fundamental issue, which has to do not so much with the order of precedence for various products, as with the root fact that the Old Country can take everything we can send, in any order whatever. To the limit of our resources she can take all the foodstuffs we can produce. According to Mr O'Shea, cheese, bacon, eggs, and wool may be regarded as one group, beef as another, lamb and barley for pig-feed as others; but essentially, it may be said, the primary produce of the Dominion as a whole may be regarded as a single necessity.

It is not only necessary, in these days when sacrifices are being asked from all, to produce and export to the Homeland to the limit of our capacity, but to see to it that we consume less ourselves so that we may send more Home. Every small home can do its share and every breakfast table can make its contribution. "Family hold back" is always the motto when we have more mouths to feed. That extra cut of beef, rasher of bacon, or pat of butter can be sacrificed by each and every one of us so that all those who are fighting for us overseas may have a sufficient supply of food. Many people ineligible for war service have been wondering, these days, what they can do to help. Here is one way. They can cut down on their consumption of these essential commodities as a voluntary service to the cause in which we are engaged.

It will assuredly redound greatly to the credit of the New Zealand people if, by their voluntary co-operation in the great effort to send food to our comrades overseas, they render the introduction of compulsory rationing unnecessary.

This subject, of course, opens out into wider fields. Before the necessary supplies can be sent, they must be worked over at all stages and by all sorts of people. The faithful and diligent service of the workers throughout the country is an integral part of the speeding up of our war effort. Those who work with poultry, pigs, sheep, or cattle, and in addition those who prepare them or their products for market, who do business as transporters, as ship-loaders and so forth, have all their parts to play. The need for greater productive effort affects all branches of industry and all kinds of workers. There is no one in New Zealand of an age to work and who is able to work, who can say that he has no contribution to make to "see it through."

It is from that wider point of view that we may line up all our efforts, group the whole into one unity of national endeavour, and say in regard to them that there is no need to allow them to stand upon the order of their going, but that they should go at once into the common pool for the good of the British race and for the salvation of civilisation.

Thirty-five young European refugees, first settlers of what is hoped will become a vast new dominion, recently left en route from Genoa, Italy, to the Sosua area of the Dominican Republic, where they will test themselves in a new mode of living and do the spade work for less hardy refugees who will join them later, says a writer in the "Christian Science Monitor." They represent the pioneer contingent of an initial group of 500 colonists who have been selected to leunch one of the most significant experiments the most significant experiments yet undertaken in organised migra-tion of refugees to the New World.

tion of refugees to the New World.

A gift of 26,000 acres of subtropical soil awaits the pioneers as a result of negotiations by the President's Advisory Committee with the Dominican Republic, Dr James Rosenberg, president of the Dominican Republic Settlement Association in New York, said. Recently incorporated under the laws of the State of New York, the association selected and trained the colonisis. selected and trained the colonists while agronomists, experienced in large-scale settlement on unoccupied land, surveyed and examined the territory.

If the undertaking succeeds, it is believed that 100,000 Europeans without a country will eventually make homes for themselves in the colony. Experts of the Commission gave encouraging reports of the sparsely settled, rapidly develop-ing Dominican Republic, whose Go-vernment balances its Budget and maintains friendly relations with the United States.

EVENTS IN EASTERN CONFLICT

Japan's Fight For Domination Of China

ADDRESS AT HASTINGS

An illuminating insight into Chinese-Japanese relations was given members of the Hastings Rotary Club yesterday by the Rev. J. McKenzie, Auckland, in what he described as a "limited sketch of the background of events leading up to the present conflict." Until some years ago Mr McKenzie was a missionary in China, and has since kept in close touch with developments there.

The present struggle between the two nations was not one that had occurred suddenly, he said; it was rather the result of deep-rooted factors such as Japan's outlook on her

future in the Pacific.

One might expect the Chinese and Japanese to be closely allied, Mr McKenzie commented, since they had a common basis in their culture: Japanese and Chinese characters, he instanced, were practically identical. However, although they might appear to be cousins with many things in common, yet the contrasts between them were also striking, and these largely led up to the strife at present raging.

As soon as contact with the Western World had been forced upon them, the Japanese had begun to modernise; their factories were among the world's best, their communications were excellent, they possessed a good army and an excellent navy.

Chiang Kai-shek's Work Referring to the remarkable work of Chiang Kai-shek in uniting China, Mr McKenzie said that Chiang had had his military education in Japan and consequently knew what he was up against. He had postponed conflict with the Japanese as long as possible while building up his nation's resources.

Forces Dominate Cabinet

China, Mr McKenzie explained, had vast natural resources; she was able to grow cotton, and had oil, coal and iron available in large quantities. Japan was not so situated; what little coal she had was of poor quality, and she did not possess the necessary oil or coal to be self-sufficient.

"By instinct China is democratic; in fact it is sometimes said that she is more so than the Americans," Mr McKenzie said, "and I think it is true." The Japanese were by nature feudal, and had not outgrown this; like the Germans, they were used to domination and to national discipline.

Chiang Kai-shek's Work

In the Japanese Cabinet the Army and Navy ministers were directly chosen by the forces they represented, and thus they could block the formation of any Cabinet they did not want. These Ministers, in each case active serving men, had direct access to the Emperor above even the Prime Minister.

Routes Closed

In Indo-China the new French Government had finally agreed to Japan's demands, and Britain had agreed to close the Burma Road for three months, being placed in a difficult position to refuse. The Japanese refusal to declare war meant that they could not close the road by force.

The first sign of Japan's influence on world affairs came in 1895 when Japan, after picking a quarrel, brought China to her knees in a few weeks, thereby gaining Formosa.

Next came the struggle with Russia, whom Japan humbled as a result of Russian inefficiency and poor organisation. South Manchuria was added to her possessions.

In 1917, said Mr McKenzie, when Britain was in a desperate situation as a result of submarine warfare, Japan, who had always timed her

China her "twenty-one demands."
These practically requested China to hand over her sovereignty, and so weak was the Government that under protest it was prepared to accept the demands. However, public opinion was so inflamed that the demands were resisted and eventually at the Washington Conference Japan was compelled to back down. By the "Nine-Power Treaty" signed then the integrity and sovereignty of China was guaranteed.

"I think it is up to us to realise to what degree China has been putting up with privation and seeming defeat, yet holding on to her ideals of freedom," Mr McKenzie commented, expressing the opinion that it was well worth while for us to do everything possible to help her in her struggle. It must be remembered, too, that in Japan a big proportion were not in favour of its militaristic policy.

BRITAIN'S NEEDS

Farmers' Union Point Answered

In reply to a query from the Hawke's Bay executive of the Farmers' Union the Dominion sec retary of the union (Mr A. P O'Shea) has written expressing the view that differentiation in the importance of primary products for export to Great Britain is unneces ary, if not impossible.

"Great Britain wants all the wool we can give her; she also wants as many eggs as we can give her, and as much bacon and cheese as we can send her," states the letter.

Mr O'Shea says that he does not Mr O'Shea says that he does not think it is possible to put things in order, but suggests that cheese, bacon, eggs and wool could be grouped as No. 1 and beef as No. 2, and then it would become a question of what we could get away. "There has been a good deal of argument about the order of necessity in production, but it should be fairly obvious that this is quite beside the point," he continues.

point," he continues. "England needs more eggs be-cause all the Continental sources of supply are gone. It is the same with theese, and the same with bacon, while the position concerning wool is well known.

"Academic" Discussion

"In my opinion a discussion on the order of preference is purely academic. Britain will take all the eggs we can send her, and I understand that we are aiming at getting half a million dozen away. She will take all the baconers we can send her, the cheese we can send her, because it is a particularly good food, and she wants us to let her have all we can. In my opinion there is really no conflict at all between any of our products except perhaps be-tween lamb and beef, in which case possessed a good army and an excellent navy.

By comparison, China was much slower, being weak technically and industrially; until recent times the army had been weak, and although the Chinese were better fliers than the Japanese, their air force was weak as a result of poor ground organisation.

LEADERS WANTED

Returned Soldiers Approached

A circular letter received by the Hastings branch of the Returned Soldiers' Association states that the formation of an auxiliary reserve has been decided upon by the National Service Department, according to advice given to the New Zealand R.S.A. This reserve is to comprise men who are not members of the existing forces—Army, Navy Air Force, Territorials or National Military Reserve (Class II).

"The function of this organisation is to defend localities in which the nembers live and areas contiguous

thereto," states the letter. Arms and equipment will be issued later, but to begin with members will parade and drill under the guidance of the Army. In the event of trouble in New Zealand the Army will take control.

Appointing Leaders

So that this auxiliary reserve may be established without delay, the New Zealand R.S.A. has been requested to submit nominations for district leaders and area leaders. Working upon the military districts, three leaders are to be appointed.

These men will be required to act in the closest concert with the officers commanding the military districts and should be persons of wide military experience and organising ability, says the circular. HOME DEFENCE IN SARAWAK, STATE RULED BY THE "WHITE RAJAH"

A Resident Of The Protectorate An Interesting Visitor To Hastings

The relative closeness of the British protectorate of Sarawak to Japan and the Philippine Islands lends to it added interest in the light of the international situation. Interesting visitors to Hastings yesterday were Mr and Mrs R. Daubney, of Kuching, the capital of the State of Sarawak. Mr Daubney, who is in the civil service at Sarawak, is visiting New Zealand while on furlough.

Sarawak, which is in north-west Borneo, has a population of about half a million, composed of Mahommedan Malays and various pagan tribes including Ibans or Dayaks, Muruts, Kayans, Kenyahs, Punans, and Klemantans. There are also large numbers of Chinese and a few other immigrants. Sago and pepper of the best quality are cultivated, and both plantation rubber and jungle rubber are largely exported. The coconut palm is grown and the illipe nut is another valuable product of the fertile State of Sarawak.

Healthy Climate

Mr Daubney described the climate of Sarawak as "hot and wet," but generally it is healthy for Europeans and the heat is never extreme. There is no sharp division in the wet and dry seasons, as is frequently found in tropical countries, but there is more rain from October to March. The average rainfall at Kuching, Mr Daubney's home, is 160in.

Communication in the State is chiefly by water, said Mr Daubney, but there are very many good roads around Kuching, one of which stretches some 25 miles into Upper Sarawak. About 13 miles of rail-

stretches some 25 miles into Upper Sarawak. About 13 miles of railway are now open for traffic.

The European population of Kuching consists chiefly of Government officers and their families. Sibu, on the Rejang River has a large population of Chinese traders. Miri, in the north, is the headquarters of the Sarawak Oilfields, Ltd., and has grown in 13 years from a and has grown in 13 years from a small village to a town of about 11,000 of which some 5000 are employees of the company and about 300 are Europeans.

The "White Rajah" Perhaps Sarawak is better known as the State of the "White Rajah," Sir Charles Brooke, G.C.M.G., who was recently in the news when a daughter married a wrestler, and another married a stage comedian. Their father disapproved of the actions of both.

The State has an interesting history. In 1840 Rajah Muda Hasim, the uncle and heir-presumptive of the Sultan, prevailed upon James Brooke, an English officer, to help him in suppressing a rebellion. In return for his services he ceded Sarawak to Brooke, who became

The principal mineral wealth of Sarawak is the oil field at Miri, where the first well was sunk in 1910, said Mr Daubney. The production of oil has approached 700,000 tons a year, and at the instance of the late Rajah a reserve of oil is kept in store for the use of the British Navy.

In recent years the progress of Sarawak has been rapid. Various departments of Government have been established, such as Public Works, Land, Trade and Customs, Forestry and Education, and there are European and general hospitals under a medical department which includes a Department of Public Health. Waterworks have been con-structed in several places, wireless installations in communication with Singapore have been set up at vari-Singapore have been set up at various centres, and considerable progress has been made in surveying the forest-clad country by land and

air.

Mr and Mrs Daubney usually visit England when on furlough, but this year they came to Australia and New Zealand because of the war. They are spending about ten days in New Zealand, and hope to travel in the South Island to see ice and spow.

Mr Daubney yesterday said that they were delighted with Hawke's Bay countryside, describing it as "perfectly charming."

Easter Handicap, but I was rather disappointed that he should weaken at the finish and have to give second place to the improving St. Cloud. That was certainly not his best form, but Black Thread left the impression at Trentham that he was not the horse he was at Easter. On Tuesday he will also have an extra 5lb. to

shoulder and that will not improve his chances.
Saturday's winner, Grey Honour, was certainly brilliant and impressive, but it would be well to bear in mind that the Winter Cup is run over a mile. Grey Honour's best form has been shown over six and seven furlongs and, unless he has improved in stamina of late, the extra furlong may keep him busy next week.

St. Cloud is not lacking in breeding or in gameness and this recently promoted hack certainly added to his admirers by the way in which he came home from a bad position in the critical stages of the race. Indeed, better placed in the run home, St. Cloud looks as if he must have gone very close to success in the Brabazon Handicap.
