# Big Air Battle At Massawa

(United Press Association—Copyright.) (Received August 8, 9.10 p.m.)

LONDON, Aug. 8. Heavily outnumbered because of the defection of the French, British troops in the Middle East are confidently awaiting the full impact of the Italian advance in British Somaliland and a possible onslaught on Egypt.

Estimates of the Italian strength in Abyssinia and Italian Somaliland range from 35,000 to 100,000 white troops

and 100,000 or more native troops.

Italy's Libyan forces are reported to comprise 250,000 white and native troops, together with numerical superiority

No Indiscriminate Bombing

The "Daily Express" says: "The most bitter air battle in the East African war was fought out yesterday over Italy's chief oversea war base, Massawa. Flights of British bombers attacked squadrons of Italian ships which Mussolini had concentrated at Massawa in an attempt to smash the Red Sea rout to Egypt.

Little damage is reported except to a town in the north-east of England, where a sanatorium and shop property were considerably damaged. Leaflets were dropped in a district in the north of

England. Some women walking along a country road were seriously injured.

The raiders dropped big flares before bombing a south-east coastal town, extensively damaging several houses.

'Hitler's ostentatious undertaking to square the Balkan circle so far has only made a more confused pattern of the politics in that part of Europe and has rendered less secure the position of his latest protege, King Carol," says "The Times." His own special disciples, the Iron Guard—the Nazis of Rumania—have issued a rousing manifesto, certainly not pro-German and actually introducing a pro-British note into its battle cry. Critics are once more raising their voices, while eminent Transylvanians who had parted company have united to oppose the concessions recommended by Hitler.

"Britain has already indicated "Britain has already indicated that she considers that a fair solution could be reached on these lines and it may confidently be predicted that Britain is not in the least likely, when victory has been won, to wish to upset any settlements which have been amicably reached between Bumania and her neighbours in the Rumania and her neighbours in the south-east or in the north-west.





# PRELIMINARY REMARKS

No war will ever be won by means of words, yet the utterances of combatants may give a good insight into their psychology and therefore an inkling as to the possible chances of each. Anyone who examines the statements being made on both sides of the present conflict will notice at least one root difference between the two opposing forces. The Germans have the idea that the final phase is about to begin, whereas the British merely regard the next phase as the beginning of what may prove to be a long struggle. The ruthless German wolfhound has different instincts from the phlegmatic British bulldog. On the one hand there is the marauding, predatory instinct, and on the other there is the stubborn defensive instinct that "stays put" in its chosen

The differences between the two viewpoints are clearly brought out in current news items. German ideas are few and strong-hatred of Great Britain, speedy conquest, lust of domination, and a nervous fury to cause the greatest, possible havoc in the briefest space of time. "Our Air Force is ready to strike. Our aeroplanes have been overhauled and the pilots rested. Preparations have been completed." These are the remarks made in a Bremen broadcast. They are designed to increase the tension in the Old Country and to create a feeling of imminent danger. That danger may be real or it may not, but such declarations cannot be depended upon to destroy British morale. It happens that Great Britain

Whatever may happen in the first few hectic hours of the putative raid on the British Isles, it may be well for us to realise something of the difficulties confronting the enemy so that we may take heart of courage to stand pat on our principles and refuse to be bustled by a bullying foe.

Recent points brought forward are worth recapitulating. "To establish their domination," said Mr A. V. Alexander, First Lord of the British Admiralty, "the Germans must defeat the British Commonwealth of Nations." The British, he added, have a counter to each and every possible method of attack which may be employed by the enemy. That incisive statement is a splendid example of the wide-sweeping horizon of British mentality, which can see the wood as a whole as well as the trees one by one.

The Germans will also have to beat the British Navya whole-time job for even the most furious Fuhrer in the most tearing hurry to bring things to a quick conclusion.

The Germans will also have to beat the British Air Force, an almost miraculous fighting weapon which has proved its mettle in the sky-battles of recent times in a manner that has impressed the enemy with the individual prowess of the flower

There is also a fighting unit called the British Army with which the Germans will have to deal, on the assumption that what is left of them can penetrate our defences. That indomitable force has made a lasting mark on the pages of history by its unspeakably heroic conduct on the bare beaches of Dunkirk. A land army that could not be beaten with its feet in the sea cannot be conquered when it stands on its native soil. It is a big proposition which confronts the Fuhrer, and there are details to it. A few of these may be summarised.

Hitler's vast coastline of 2000 miles from the Arctic to Spain is by no means fully manned by people ready to die for the Greater Reich. Through this great stretch of territory there are those who are embittered and, though browbeaten, still free in mind and spirit. There are those who have been pillaged, those who have seen their friends butchered. Hitler must for ever keep a wary eye on free peoples who have been outraged.

The enemy's food supplies, despite the fact that they have gone in for a policy of wholesale thieving from the occupied territories, will not "grow on trees" without a great deal of trouble that is as yet unforeseen, and starving people will hardly maintain a blockade to starve other people. The problem of reserves, of food as well as of manpower, may well be one of the deciding factors of the war.

Again, Great Britain has seen to it that Germany will not do any trading business with foreign countries. Great Britain is an old hand at that game, and the result of her present policy has been that while the "blitzkrieg" method was adopted by Germany in the first instance from motives of choice, it is now being pursued out of stark necessity to

Finally, Great Britain has taken all the necessary precautions against starvation. "It is impossible," said Mr A. Greenwood, of the British Ministry. Therefore we may await the issue with confidence and faith.


