Enemy Relentlessly Harassed

'BLITZBOMBERS' BEATEN OFF

Thursday's Air Front Extended Over 500 Miles

A THOUSAND NAZI 'PLANES

(United Press Association-Copyright.) (Received August 16, 11.10 p.m.)

LONDON, Aug. 16.

The Air Ministry states that over 1000 enemy bombers and protective fighters participated in Thursday's mass raids on a 500-mile front from Plymouth to the Tyne. The last raid, in which 200 enemy aircraft participated, began at 6 p.m. and was directed against south coast harbours and aero-

Spitfires and Hurricanes relentlessly harassed the enemy machines, shooting down bombers and fighters at the rate of one a minute. One Hurricane squadron alone accounted for 19, losing only one pilot.

It is officially stated that little success was achieved by

the enemy at a high cost. A number of buildings were damaged at Croydon, including a scent factory, but the aerodrome itself was not seriously damaged.

The damage to the Croydon aerodrome was not as severe as was expected. Debris flew hundreds of yards as a result of large-calibre high-explosive bombs, and fires broke out. Firemen and members of the A.R.P. soon had them

The ground staff fearlessly went in and dragged 'planes to safety.

Industrial premises at Rochester were damaged and a number of houses destroyed. No fatal casualties resulted, but one was killed at Hastings. The attack against the Isle of Portland was ineffective.
Casualties occurred when a large number of bombs hit an industrial area in the north-east, 13 being killed, 15 admitted to hospital, and 30 being treated in their homes.
A bomb in one street demolished two houses and killed a man, his wife and two daughters. In the same street a widow and her married daughter were killed, but an 18 months-old baby escaped.
Three houses collapsed in another street, killing a man and woman; four were killed in a neighbouring village.

Screamers Dropped
Incendiary and high-explosive

Incendiary and high-explosive bombs, including the screaming type, were dropped in a Midland town, causing fires in two districts. Bombs were also dropped in the partheastern area.

Bombs on Thursday evening were dropped on an institution in a southwest coast town. A roll call of the inmates revealed that several were missing, and it is believed that they have been trapped in the ruins. Several were injured and were sent to hospital. Houses nearby were

damaged.

The Germans admit the loss of 29 'planes and claim the destruction of 106 British 'planes. They declare that 100 raiders forced their way into England between Portland and Portsmouth and bombed areas north of them. They also raided Bristol, Newcastle, Middlesborough and

British reports at midnight showed that "blitzbombing" was continuing in many districts, including Wales and the south-west and southeast of England.

144 Destroyed

The Germans on Thursday threw 1000 bombers into the most violent raids yet attempted in the Battle for Britain. At least 144 'planes were brought down—that is, one in every seven, said an earlier message. Twenty-seven British fighters were lost, but eight of the pilots are safe.

After a day of massed raids, the Germans threw 200 'planes into the day's last attempt, over the south

One British squadron alone brought down 19 enemy 'planes at the rate of one a minute.

Even at this tremendous cost, the Germans achieved little success. They aimed their bombs mainly at Hastings, Rochester, Yorkshire, the Durham coast, the Tyneside, and Sunderland. The casualties seem to be few. In a raid on Croydon, London's airport, very little damage was done, and the raiders were soon driven off.

Tyneside Area

The Air Ministry and Ministry of Home Security, in a communique issued early this evening, state: "Early this afternoon, a number of enemy aircraft crossed the northeast coast and dropped bombs in the Tyneside area and in the resi-dential district of Sunderland. No damage of any military importance was caused, and the number of persons injured was very small, though some were killed. Farther inland bombs were dropped at several isolated points, and some damage was done to buildings at an R.A.F. aerodrome. A number of casualties were caused."

An Air Ministry communique issued at 9 p.m. states: "Further enemy attacks have taken place in several areas of the south-east on Thursday evening. Bombs were dropped on and around Croydon aerodrome. Some damage was done, but details are not yet available."

Four Dorniers are reported to have been shot down into the sea during an attack on a south-east coastal town this morning.

Crowds of people were assembled in the vicinity for the celebration of the Feast of the Assumption. One torpedo missed the Helle and struck a quay crowded with pilgrims. Many children were killed, a woman died of shock, and several neonle were injured. ole were injured.



There are a wonderful number of women in this district devoting a tremendous amount of their time to knitting for

the men in the forces and they are always wondering what particular garments are needed most of all. An appeal has been made just the last week for people to remember the men of the minesweepers, who are much in need of warm knitted garments. Polo-necked jerseys are in

great demand, as well as balaclava helmets, sea-boot stockings, scarves, etc. We have already published patterns for some of these

LINDBERGH LOATHES **PUBLICITY**

United States Press Partly To Blame

PRINTED LYING STORIES

To most people Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh did not exist until one day in May, 1927, when they heard he was flying the North Atlantic. Others, famous airmen, were waiting to cross the ocean and before Lindbergh hopped off he had been nicknamed the "Flying Fool" and his machine, the "Spirit of St. Louis," laughed at as a freak.

When he landed in Paris, with letters of introduction so that he would not be stranded, he had his first taste of public adulation and found it good. Returning to the United States on a cruiser three weeks after he had set out, he found a mail of 3,500,000 letters and 100,000 telegrams waiting for him.

He enjoyed his ride up Fifth
Avenue in a paper shower because
he thought his flight a reasonable
occasion for acclaim and that all
the fuss would be over in a few
weeks. That he would be a hero
for 12 years never entered his head.

As the months passed Lindbergh gradually froze. People wanted to touch him, women to kiss him. In St. Louis, after a meal at an outdoor table, he finally saw what he was up against; women broke through the lines and fought for the still-damp corncobs which he had chewed and left beside his plate.

As a flyer who naturally tried to excel, Lindbergh had always been pleased to have public acknowledgment of his ability. When he was piloting the St. Louis-Chicago air mail through storm and sunshine with exceptional craftiness his relations with reporters were good and he was often in the news. He was recognised as an unusually good airman, and that was all ne wanted to be. When he returned from Paris the public, although it had never seen him, was convinced that he was a perfect figure of modesty, youth, and nobility and of heroic stature. Lindbergh's matter-of-fact mind could no more understand this mass hysteria than the public could understand him. If he had sought publicity the public would have tired of him soon enough. Because he tried to avoid it he was feted wherever he went.

Press to Blame

For this conflict the American

Press to Blame

For this conflict the American Press was largely to blame. The newspapers never told the public what sort of a man Lindbergh was. Instead of checking public adulation by informing them that he was something of a farmboy with a genius for aeroplanes, the Press succumbed to popular psychology and augmented it to an unbelievable regree. Before long Lindbergh came to realise the cause of his troubles. He saw in the newspapers the personification of malice which deliberately encouraged the mob by printing lying stories about him.

After his marriage with Anne Morrow relations with the Press grew more bitter. Newshawks and cameramen hounded them on their honeymoon. Three years later, when their son was kidnapped and murdered, the newspapers felt there was no need to consider Lindbergh's feelings. The night after the body had been identified two photographers entered the morgue and attempt. ers entered the morgue and attempted to take pictures. Other kidnap scares drove the Lindberghs out of

In Britain the Lindberghs found peace. They could go to London for dinner and the theatre without being mobbed. In France life was just as calm. He worked most of the time with Dr Alexis Carrel on the mechanical heart.

After the Munich agreement it was reported in the British radical Press and blazoned all over America that Lindbergh had addressed a banquet of the Cliveden set and had influenced Britain's decision to assent to the partition of Czechoslovakia. Actually there was no banquet. Impressed by the efficiency of the German air force, he expressed the view privately that Germany would hold the air supremacy of Europe for some years.

A second storm blew up when Lindbergh went to Germany after the Munich agreement and was decorated by Field-Marshal Goering with the Order of the German Eagle. Forewarned that he was to receive some honour, he requested that there should be not the Month of the Speakers.

CATCH THE CULPRITS

It is an utterly intolerable thought that the senseless hoodlums who perpetrated the outrage on the Napier cenotaph should be allowed to escape the full consequences of their scurrilous sacrilege. Every man, woman, and child in Napier who believes in the decencies of life and in the commemoration of gallant death should forthwith band themselves together as an organised and devoted unit to track down these larrikins to their lair and to wipe the sneering

guffaws for ever from their faces. The ape-like cunning of the nit-wits who take ghoulish delight in such midnight depredations under cover of darkness can outwit the most vigilant public servant whose duty it is to protect us while we sleep, so that it is of little use to make cheap criticisms against the police. Nothing could be easier, on a murky night of wind and rain, than to take temporary cover in case of possible discovery. And it may be added that the last thing to be expected would be the swinging of a wheelbarrow on the flagstaff of a memorial to the fallen in the Great War. Looking for a scapegoat will get us nowhere. The culprits must be found and punished. Only so will justice be done to the memory of the men and women whose names

are inscribed on the hallowed memorial. It is reported that the Napier branch of the Returned Soldiers' Association has offered a reward of five pounds for evidence leading to the apprehension of the scoundrels who metaphorically spat on the graves of the dead and dishonoured the monument erected to the memory of those who "poured out the red, sweet wine of youth" for duty's sake. All honour to the ex-"Diggers" for their immediate reaction to the disgraceful affair. But the kind of "turning King's evidence" based on a monetary reward should not be necessary. Surely the inherent good sense and right feeling of the people should be sufficient, without personal gain, to bring the culprits to

By constant vigilance it is to be hoped that the perpetrators of this vile deed will be discovered, and that when they are, the punishment will fit the crime. Many who served in the last war are naturally of opinion that the hoodlums should be given what they gave to the wheelbarrow, or a flogging at the very least. That feeling is understandable and excusable.

It is disheartening and disgusting to discover that in these days of dire peril, when the gallant sons of the Empire are soaring up in the pride of their indomitable youth to make of themselves a living rampart between us and destruction, the criminal instinct to copy the "master crook" is still in evidence in this country. Some Auckland morons set the ball rolling when they achieved their glorious feat on the college tower, and the Napier perverts were not to be outdone. In this case, as has been indicated, every man should be his own policeman and should leave nothing undone to sheet home this dastardly outrage to those responsible for it.

It is just possible that these lines may be read by the sub-normal people concerned, and at the risk of cat-calls and cheap-jack jibes, an appeal may be made to them and to all of their persuasion to remember, for the sake of everything that is cherished and held dear in the hearts of the people, that their so-called "prank," in which their ally was possibly John Barleycorn, has damaged the name of their town, damned their own reputations, and caused grievous hurt to people who have the names of their friends and comrades on

The "practical joke" is always easy of performance and difficult to detect. It is cowardly, mean, and despicable. This country, at such a time as this, has no use for sneaks who creep and crawl in the darkness to leave their names on the scroll of infamy. They dare not share their notoriety except within their own vicious circle, and until we get rid of such evil-minded practices we shall not be worthy to fight for a righteous cause. These particular gentlemen are not worthy to lick a Nazi's boots, for not even a Hun would do what they

MIDSUMMER SCENE IN "NEW ZEALAND ABROAD"

Dominion's Soldiers Settle Down H. G. BALLANTYNE AND To Military Life In An English Camp

(From the Official War Correspondent Attached to the New Zealand Forces in Britain).

AN ENGLISH CAMP, Midsummer's Day. Never has the countryside of England looked more pleasing than now; and never has Great Britain been in

greater need of her sons' help.

"We are glad to be here. We would rather be here than anywhere else in the world," was the comment of one of our officers. Subject to the qualification that they will be even more glad to be home when this is all over, that goes for the men too. They are rapidly shaking down in surroundings much more resembling those of a holiday motor camp in New Zealand than the accepted idea of an English military camp. Tents are pitched with an eye for safety from the air; here and there among the trees.

When there is a row of them it is because a row of trees offers protection. There is no such thing as a canvas town laid out in neat little rectangles. Those of the bell tents which have not been camouflaged are brown like the pine needles or the shallow-rooted grass on the sandy soil. Those that are camouflaged melt into their arboreal background so realistically sometimes as not to be recognisable at a casual glance from a couple of hundred yards.

Except for the guy ropes of a neighbour's tent, and his canvas bucket in the foreground, the view through my tent flap as I write is all trees and fern; pines mostly (although they are out of their latitude at this end of the island) with beeches on the fringe.

Manoeuvres Expected
The three infantry battalions are together for the first time, and brigade manoeuvres will begin shortly. For the rest, it has to be remembered that England is neither as safe nor as empty as Egypt. There are hundreds of thousands of other troops in this area, and in their own interest it is desirable that they should be as well distributed as military necessities will permit.

Headquarters

To one side, on another rise and set in a glory of trees: massive, hoary, spreading trees laden with foliage and spilling shade far across close-cropped lawns, is Headquarters, once a stately private home. There Brigadier Miles and his staff work. This is the largest of the New Zealand camp groups. It accommodates the entire 5th Infantry Brigade as well as the divisional details attached to the Second Echelon.

Six miles away are the Maoris, and beside them the Medical Corps and the Dental Corps. Other separate camps have been pitched for our Artillery, A.S.C., Engineers, and Railwaymen and Foresters. This stringing out of units will make administration more difficult—visiting all the camps involves a journey of the voyage they took turns of hospital duty, and at a port en route a group of eight was transferred from a New Zealand to an Australian transport to assist in handling an outbreak of measles. They remained with the Australians until we reached our port of destination.

SEVENTY WATERSIDERS DISMISSED AT AUCKLAND

Waterfront Controller Takes A Firm Stand In The Latest Dispute

> By Telegraph—Press Association AUCKLAND, Aug. 16.

Seventy waterside workers were dismissed this afternoon by authority of the Auckland Waterfront Controller (Captain Stanich) when they refused to continue unloading the Union Company's motor-ship Waiana with the use of cranes after they had been engaged to work with the ship's gear.

Six gangs were working the ship, but two gangs which were working aft were not involved in the dispute.

The work commenced with the ship's gear shortly after the Waiana arrived from Wellington early this afternoon, but when cranes were required to unload several motor-cars on the ship the men, maintaining that they had been engaged to work with the ship's gear, refused to continue.

Captain Stanich was advised of the position and decided to dismiss the men.

The two gangs aft continued to work with the cranes. The men dismissed will be replaced to-morrow morning, when there will be a call for labour. It was too early to say what penalties the men would incur by their attitude, said Captain Stanich, but the position would be reviewed, and it was likely that some penalty would be imposed. Dense Pall Of Smoke Over District

LONDON, Aug. 16.

Sirens were sounded in London for the first time for many weeks to-night when between 20 and 30 raiders bombed Croydon. The raid was the climax of a day of most intensive aerial warfare, but air battles over England continued long after nightfall.

The bombs dropped on Croydon damaged the airport buildings, a hangar and some houses, including 20 rendered useless in one street, but a remarkable feature of the raid was that only one man is established as having been killed so far.

Strenuous Day

Fighters and anti-aircraft gunners had their most strenuous day since the outbreak of the Battle for Brit-ain as hundreds of German bombers and their escorts swarmed across the Channel, raiding widely scat-tered areas in the south-east of Eng-

The raids culminated with the rash of bombs at London's airport,

Croydon.

The afternoon raids began with a formation of 54 heavy bombers in flights of 18 strong. They met a tornado of anti-aircraft fire, but flew on across the coast, to be hotly engaged further inland by fighters. Anti-aircraft guns went into action even more violently and more accurately, rocking the raiders.

North-east England had its fiercest attacks so far, and 12 people, of whom at least three were children, were killed. A farmhand clipping a hedge was killed instantly when three bombs landed in the next field. Bomb splinters also hit a stationary train, injuring several passengers.

Most Modern Structure In The Dominion

TO BE OPENED SOON

The new nine-span concrete traffic bridge crossing the Ngaruroro River at Pakowhai will be completed next week after 13 months' work by the contractors. Although the bridge will then be finished, a good deal of preparatory work is to be done before it will be open to traffic. Saturday, September 7, has been put forward as the tentative date for the opening of the bridge, but there are many factors which may cause this to be altered.

Constructed on the cantilever principle, this will be the most modern bridge in New Zealand, and is designed to meet the needs of the district for many years to come. It is 975ft. long, with a 24ft. roadway and a 3ft. 6in. parapet. The whole structure contains approximately 3000 tons of concrete and steel, all of which is supported on eight piers each resting on 20 piles in the riverbed.

Retiring From Active Participation

Alec Fullarton, Melbourne's crack cross country horseman, has hung up his riding boots and saddle forever. He will now concentrate on the training of horses and he looks back on his riding career without regret.

"I thoroughly enjoyed my 12 years' riding over the fences and hurdles." declared Alec, "and I would not hesitate to go through it again if it were possible to put back the clock."

Neither age nor nerves prompted his retirement, however. Thirty years of age, he is still a young man, and despite approximately 1000 mounts in jumping races with quite a few spills, he has never known the meaning of fear.

"I enjoyed the same too much even

to consider the risk involved, and in retiring now I have followed a plan mapped out eight years ago," says

Fullarton.

"I determined at that time that, if I could keep going without serious injury, I would retire at 30. I turned 30 ast month, and so have not applied for a licence for the new racing season."

Started Early

Fullarton has been before the public so long that many racing regulars were astonished to know his correct age. They had considered him a veteran, but overlooked the fact he began riding in races as a boy of 12 at the pony tracks at Ascot, Fitzroy and Richmond.

"I was only 12, and still attending school, when I became apprenticed to the pony trainer, George Holden Before that I rode work for him in the mornings before going home for my schoolbag." he said.

Later, he became apprenticed to the registered trainer, W. Leyshon, and blossomed into one of the leading apprentices of his time.

From the time he learned to ride, however, Alec always had a great fondness and admiration for jumpers, and never missed an opportunity of putting a horse over the sticks. This was unknown to his master, who naturally would not have countenanced the idea of such a successful lad risking injury and prejudicing a brilliant career.

Fullarton rode over all kinds of obstacles just for the love of it, and that early training stood him in good stead when increasing weight decided him to try his skill in jumping races.

For a few moments it looked as if he had broken his near off hind leg.

Padishah was in a very bad way after the race, but was given immediate treatment and it is reported that he will probably recover sufficiently to come home. However, finis can be written to his career. Padishah is a hard horse to train, requiring a vast amount of strenuous track work to bring him into form, and it is unlikely that he will ever survive a further preparation.
