#### OPEN TRADE ROUTES

(British Official Wireless.) (Received August 21, 10.30 p.m.) RUGBY, Aug. 20.

Speaking in the House of Lords, the Foreign Minister (Lord Halifax) said that the Government recognised the importance of making the British position in the Mediterranean as strong as possible and keeping trade routes open. With this must come the fullest possible employment of the Air Force against Germany and Italy.

Lord Halifax paid a tribute to the Czechs, Poles, Norwegians, Dutch, Belgians and French who were co-operating with the British and spoke of the steady flow of men and material coming across the seas from the Dominions, "and, last but by no means least, the steady assistance from the United States, which is warmly appreciated.'

#### Damage Claims Carefully Checked

British Official Wireless. (Received August 21, 8.35 p.m.) RUGBY, Aug. 21.

Referring to the complaints which have been made about the speed with which the reports of air raids over Britain have been published as compared with those emanating from Germany, the Dominions Minister (Viscount Caldecote), speaking in the House of Lords, pointed out that, while it was a comparatively simple matter for the Germans to give their entirely inaccurate figures, "the British figures are scrupulously elaborated and perhaps over-elaborately check-

Lord Caldecote had stated that unconfirmed or probably lost.

The British figures of Nazi losses could be relied on to the extent of being an understatement.

Material Damage Dealing with material damage, Lord Caldecote said that that in-flicted by the Nazis on Britain was light compared with the destruction worked on Germany by the R.A.F. "The British raids are not mere "The British raids are not mere terror bombings; they are directed against military objectives," he said. "These have been carefully identified and accurately attacked so that the pressure will be constant and increasing. These are not mass attacks that cannot be persevered with, and our success up to the present time has been impressive. "Our airmen in the Middle East have been no less gallant and successful against an enemy which has not always been unworthy in the air and they have shown consistent daring and energy."

APPRAISEMENTS FOR THE SEASON

Storage For Export

The Sydney woolbrokers, Winchombe Carson, Ltd., report that Australia will have less wool for appraisement this season than durng the year ending June 30 last. Apart from the newly shorn wool, the carry-over stocks are negligible compared with the 115,245 bales held over at the close of June 1939. In ddition to that quantity supplies of the staple were on hand in repac kers and other stores besides the warehouses of selling brokers which added to the totals appraised for the twelve months. No such stocks will be available to swell the returns

will be available to swell the returns for the 1940-41 season.

Growers should be reassured by the Central Wool Committee's announcement that 1,750,000 bales will be appraised before Christmas, and appraisements are to proceed continuously until June 30, 1941. Fears have been held by some that lack of shipping facilities might reduce exports and the work of appraising would as a result be delayed. #### THE COMPRESSED SPRING

"Reculer pour mieux sauter" is a French proverb suggesting that many a time, in order to go forward, it is necessary to take a step back so as to gather more momentum. Mr Churchill, in one of the most thrilling speeches ever delivered under present-day war conditions, has bettered the French saying by giving a British twist to it. Speaking of the possibility and probability of a British offensive against the enemy he said: "The springs are already being compressed." To get into the mind of the man who spoke these words it is necessary to visualise the gathering forces, held under greater and still greater restraint, until the time comes when they can be catapulted into the thick of the fray, there to cleave their way through to victory.

The Empire has been waiting for just such words as these from our leader at Home, and those of British blood all over the world are now more sure than ever that the occasion has produced the man. Blood and breeding tell. As his illustrious ancestor, the Duke of Marlborough, looks down from Valhalla, he will wear a smile of pride for Winston Churchill, who has, by his speech, done more to stiffen the determination of Britons the wide world over than all the sky hordes of the Huns can do to break their morale. That packed gallery of foreign diplomats heard something that they will remember and over which they will ponder.

As the waves of the sea crash and break, recede and crash again on the hard rocks of the British coast, so the waves of the Nazi upstarts who presume to set foot on British soil are crashing, breaking and receding. The German air force, Mr Churchill made it clear, is living on the danger line. Consumption is greater than production. The losses are more than the gains. Even giving in their superior numbers, the ratio of air losses is greater than that of the defenders. And all the time the British are forging ahead with their production until the day is now clearly visualised by the Prime Minister when we shall see not only parity but superiority in the numbers and quality of our aircraft. The news is most barrtening and it is difficult to write mere prose about it.

There is no totalitarian "wool-over-the-eyes" policy of lying and hypocricy about Mr Churchill's frank intimation that he can now take the people fully into his confidence and say that our advantages and resources are sufficient to see us through even the longest struggle and even if we have to fight the whole thing alone.

Let these facts revealed by Mr Churchill sink into the minds of the defeatists or the nervous or the hesitant. British aircraft production to-day is greater than Germany's. British casualties in the first year of the war are one-fifth of those in the first year of the last war. The British Navy is stronger than at the beginning of the war. The Army totals 2,000,000 trained men-on British soil-the greatest in history. The type of fighting which is being developed suits the genius of the British people, "nurtured in freedom and the need for individual responsibility," and inclined at all times to throw off the shackles that would bind down initiative and personal enterprise. And Mr Churchill added: "We are stronger than we have ever been before."

Perhaps the greatest factor in the horoscope of victory is the resilience of the British mentality, the will which is never more powerful than when faced with the possibility of disaster, that power "to hold on just a little longer" which has characterised our breed down the centuries. Mr Churchill said that those who, some time ago spoke of peace, now speak of war. And it may be added that he has earned the Empire's gratitude for leading us on to think not only of war but of final and complete victory.

The tide of time is against the Germans. The day of the British onslaught is drawing near.

It is safe to say that nowhere in the story of human development has there ever been a more gallant effort to advance beyond the "ape and tiger" stage of evolution and to reach forward to the realisation of a world wherein the bestial instincts are sublimated in an enduring peace.

### HOTEL BECOMES HOSPITAL

New Zealand Medical Corps At Work In Egypt

#### A MODERN INSTITUTION

(N.Z.E.F. Official News Service)

On July 31 at 3.23 p.m. precisely the first New Zealand ambulance of a long convoy pulled up opposite what till recently had been the leading hotel of the thermal town of Hel-

To-day it is New Zealand's first stationary hospital in Egypt. Helwan is a small but attractive township lying about 15 kilometres north of Maadi. From Maadi where our troops are camped Helwan is accessible either by a level bitumen

For many years it was a tourist attraction on account of the sulphur springs which well up in the centre of the town. People came from all parts to bathe their rheumaticky joints or to dispel from their bodies ills which were likely to be relieved under the influence of those hot sulphur springs. Latterly, however, the tourist trade had languished and the great and imposing hotel had been empty for some years.

When the New Zealand doctors first visited it they saw

long corridors and large halls and rooms coated with the inevitable dust; the ceilings and walls were discoloured, the lighting and plumbing were hardly effective. It was, indeed, a depressing spectacle.

One enters from the street up a flight of marble steps and walks along a broad terrace to the building. At present this terrace stretches right across the main entrance, probably 40 feet in width. Soon, however, two additional wards will be erected on either side of the terrace. On the left side there is a gently rising ramp leading into the building past the Ward Master's room to the patient's reception room. ent's reception room.

Let us, however, enter by the great porchway. One is struck at once by the high stud of the hallway dome which one gazes at. On the right is the Matron's room with the assistant's next door, and immediately past is a short passage leading past the Registrar's room to the Commanding Officer's room.

On the left hand side of the hall On the left hand side of the hall there are the reception, examination and office rooms. Walking along the hall we come to the cross passages with the great dining hall immediately in front. A new lift is being installed at the crossways large enough to take a stretcher case.

case.

Down the corridor on the left-hand side are a series of rooms converted into bedrooms for patients classified as medical cases in contrast with surgical cases. At the end of this corridor there is another long corridor running back towards the street where there is a further series of bedrooms also set aside for medical cases. A special cookery service is established in this part of the hospital just as is one for the surgical ward which lies on the opposite side of the hotel. The rooms in the surgical division are much the same as those set aside for the medical cases.

On the landing of the first floor is a well stocked library for the patients. Immediately over the ground floor entrance is a terrace on which the patients may recline. The plan of the corridor on the first floor is the same as on the ground floor. Thankful that their journey had ended, two women who were evacuated from Hong Kong early in July have reached Auckland from Australia with their children. They were Mrs E. T. Adams, who has three children, including twins under a year old, and Mrs R. Higgs, who has two children.
While their husbands remain in Hong Kong, they expect to stay with friends in Auckland for the duration of the war.
The two families left Hong Kong on July 5 by a ship carrying 700 women and children, the wives and families of British civilians in the colony. About the same time another ship left with about 1100 civilian evacuees, while a little earlier another vessel took on board the wives and families of the men of the armed forces.

The party, numbering about 900 evacuees, were first taken to Manila. According to Mrs Adams, conditions on board the ship and at Manila were not nearly as difficult as those described by another evacuee in a report recently sent from Brisbane. "We had a terrible experience when we were transferred to an old hotel," Mrs Adams added. "The place was in a very bad condition and it was impossible for us to live there. However, we arranged to

there. However, we arranged to get flats and stayed in them until we left for Australia."

Stressing that the evacuation was

only a precautionary measure, the two women said that conditions in Hong Kong were little different from normal when they left. Naturally, they regretted having to leave their homes, and pointed out that they had only been allowed to bring little other than bare necessities.

#### MR H. J. McKEESICK'S VIEWS

Criticism of the way in which the Government had handled the scheme for the production of 10,000 additional acres of barley in Hawke's Bay was expressed by Mr H. J. McKeesick at yesterday's meeting of the Hawke's Bay provincial executive of the Farmers' Union at Hastings. At the guaranteed price of 3/6 a bushel the farmers would produce the barley at a loss, he said.

"There are perhaps 25 per cent. of farmers in Hawke's Bay who could grow barley as a straight-out contribution, for at 3/6 a bushel it is a straight-out contribution," said Mr Mc-Keesick. "There is not a penny in it for the farmer. That 3/6 would be paid to others in the production of the barley."
